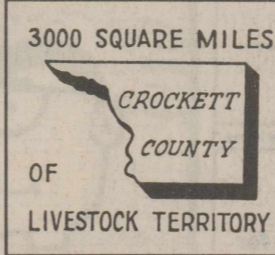

Early voting turnout heavy

A steady stream of early voters have cast their ballots in the Nov. 3 general election according to Jean Conner, election judge. Mrs. Conner said she expects the voting to increase this week. Balloting ends at 5 p.m. Friday in the courthouse.

Locations for voting on Nov. 3 are: Pct. 1, courthouse; Pct. 2, Ozona Junior High School; Pct. 3, Crockett County Civic Center; Pct. 4, Ozona Primary School. Hours will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

On the ballot countywide at the local level are Orlando F. DeHoyos for county attorney, Jim Wilson for sheriff, Tom Stokes for tax assessor-collector and Raymond P. (Bear) Borrego for constable.

Frank Tambunga is the candidate for Pct. 1 commissioner. In the Pct. 3 race, Democratic Party candidate Freddie Nicks and Independent candidate Martha A. Gries ask for elec-

tion.

Anyone who has watched television during the past month is well-aware that the major candidates for president and vice president are: Bill Clinton/Al Gore, D; George Bush/Dan Quayle, R; and Ross Perot/James Stockdale, I. Julie Childress and Jennifer Davidson, both of Ozona, were among the honorees at the 1992 District VI 4-H Gold Star Awards Banquet held here in Ozona on Saturday, Oct. 24.

These 4-H members were among 25 youth honored from sixteen counties in District VI, including Stefny Sutton, also of Ozona, who was unable to attend because of the UIL band competition in Brady.

Sponsored by West Texas Utilities Company, TU Electric, Texas-Mexico Power Company, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the district program annually recognizes the outstanding 4-H Club members in each county. Recipients of the Gold Star Award must have demonstrated outstanding leadership development and successfully completed a 4-H awards program record book after having been active in two or more projects.

Pleas Childress III of Ozona, chairman of the Crockett County Extension Program Council, gave the welcome, and Dr. Gary Vannoy of Ozona was the speaker for the banquet, which was attended by approximately 140 4-H members, parents, Extension staff and guests. Fort's Nov. 1 closure on hold

Tom Palmer, regional director for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, is in Austin this week for meetings with two groups interested in operating Fort Lancaster, Texas Rural Communities Inc. and Frontier Forts Inc.

Proposals are on the table for continued operation of the fort, and it will not be closed on Nov. 1 as previously announced, Palmer said.

The most recent proposal to

Crockett County from the state asks for 50-50 funding, \$20,500 each, and would keep the superintendent at the fort, Palmer said. Some of the original proposal is also being reworded.

This week's meeting will involve directors from three or four regions whose parks still could be affected by the state's cutback and closure plans. Ron Holliday, director of Public Lands, and Carolyn Scheffer, director of Park Operations, will also be at the meet-

ing, Palmer said.

A round table discussion with representatives of the interested corporations will allow the groups to "throw out what they can do," Palmer said. "We will look and see what they might contribute."

Palmer reaffirmed that operation of Fort Lancaster by an outside group would only be done through mutual agreement between the county and the state.

If you receive a call from the D&L Map Company saying they are working with the chamber on a map, they are not. At this time the chamber hasn't given any map company authority to use their name.

Area code (512) splits Nov. 1

On Nov. 1 the 512 area code will split into two area codes - 512 and 210. Austin, Corpus Christi and surrounding areas will remain in the 512 area code, while San Antonio, Brownsville and surrounding areas will acquire the new 210 area code.

The new area code was established due to an almost-exhausted supply of possible telephone prefixes within the 512 area code.

Everyone in both the 512 and new 210 area codes will keep the same seven-digit telephone number that they currently have. The change won't affect long-distance rates, although there may be some necessary changes in long-distance dialing.

The new area code is being established to allow more telephone numbers to be assigned in the areas around San Antonio, Austin, Corpus Christi and Brownsville.

The changeover will take place in two stages. Telephone companies will provide a six-month "permissive" dialing period from Nov. 1 until May 2. During this permissive period, calls incorrectly dialed to the 512 area code automatically will be switched to the correct number in the 210 area code.

Although transition periods have been established to help callers who forget to dial the new 210 area code, callers should begin using the 210 area code for all numbers in the new area Nov. 1.

Any programmed phone features

such as speed calling numbers, FAX numbers, PBX and PABX numbers, pay phones and automatic calling devices and cellular phones may need to be reprogrammed.

GTE exchanges switching to the new 210 area code are: Blanco, Boerne, Charlotte, Del Rio, Dilley, Floresville, Fredericksburg, Gillett, Gonzales, Granite Shoals, Johnson City, Jourdanton, Kosciusko, La Feria, Laveria, Lyford, Marble Falls, Nixon, Poth, Raymondville, Rio Grande City, Roma, Round Mountain, Santa Rosa, Smiley, Somerset, Stonewall, Sutherland Springs, Weslaco and Willow City.

That is how revival starts, one person at a time. And it seems to jump from person to person.

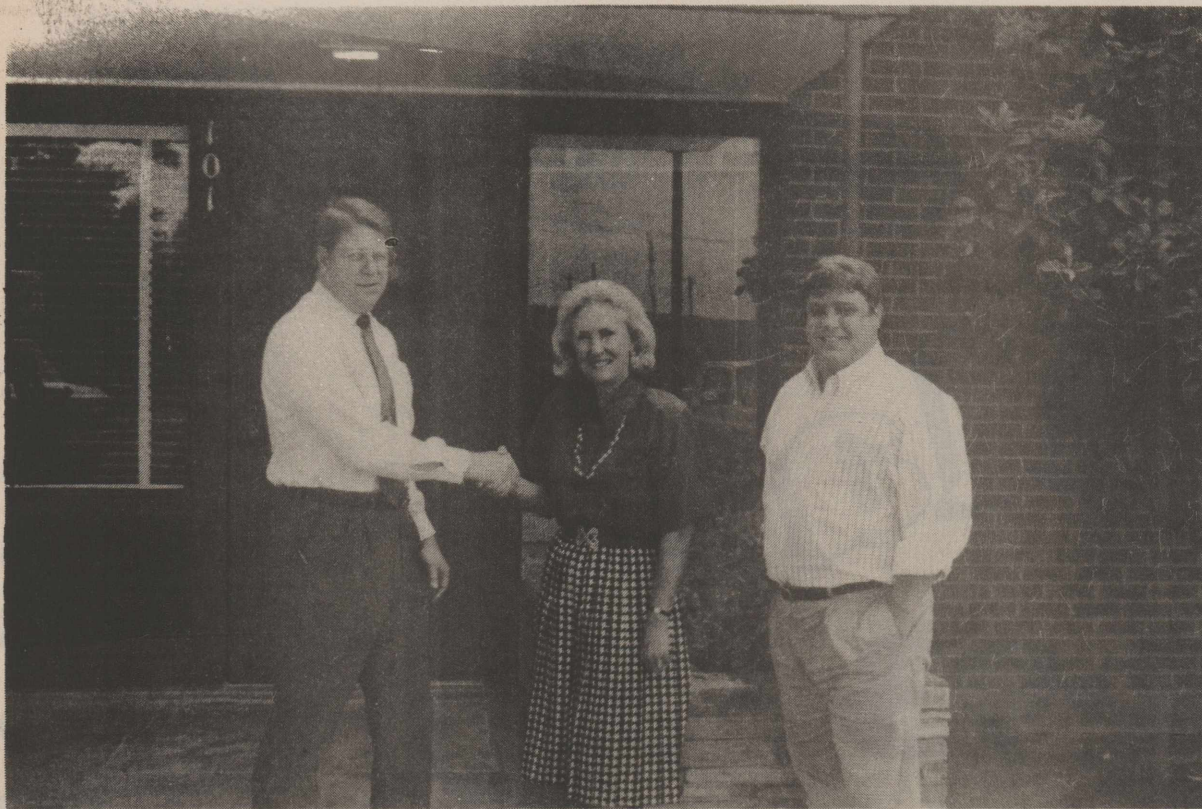

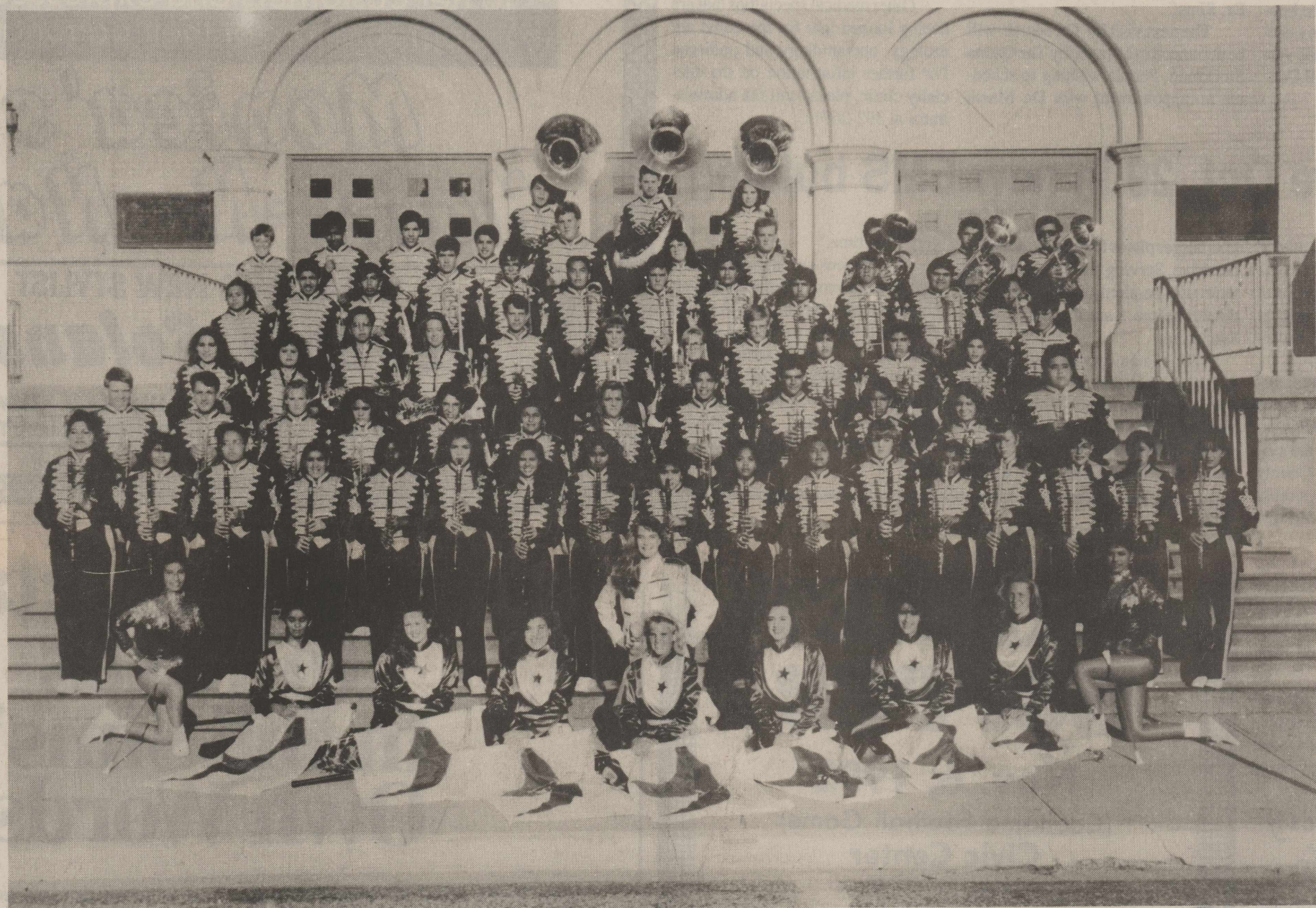

Safety tips for halloween

Parents need to be certain their children follow a few, simple safety tips this Halloween so that the festive occasion turns out to be a happy and healthy event.

"Supervised parties at home or school are the safest way for children to enjoy Halloween," said Charles L. Branton, head of the Product Safety Program at the Texas Department of Health.

He warned that if small children go trick-or-treating, they should be accompanied by an adult. The adult should carry a flashlight to show the way and to make the children more visible to motorists.

Branton offered these additional safety tips:

For clear vision, use make-up instead of masks.

When buying a costume, look for the label stating it is fire-resistant. Costumes should be brightly colored, and dark colored ones should have fluorescent or reflective tape on them.

Teach children not to eat any treats before bringing them home for examination by an adult. Remember, many hospitals offer free X-raying of treats.

Keep children out of the street and never let them run between parked cars.

Parents should control the amount of treats children eat to avoid stomach aches and indigestion.

Branton said that children should stop only at homes with outside lighting and not enter the home of anyone they do not know.

He has some safety tips for homeowners, as well. "Homeowners welcoming trick-or-treaters should turn on their porch lights, restrain their dogs and clear the lawn of objects that a trick-or-treater might trip over," he said.

In addition, jack-o-lanterns and other candle-light devices should be kept away from doorsteps and walkways to prevent igniting a costume.

4-H food show Sat., Nov. 7th

The annual Crockett County 4-H Food Show will be held at the Crockett County Civic Center on Saturday, Nov. 7th. Judging will begin at approximately 9:15 a.m. and continue until the public viewing at 11:15 a.m.

At 11:45 an awards ceremony will be held, and district representatives for Crockett County in twelve regular categories and nine special categories will be recognized. Following the awards program, which will be conducted by senior 4-H Council members, a tasting tea will be held. At the tasting tea, guests will have the opportunity to sample the wide array of delicious dishes prepared by the 4-H members.

There is no charge to attend the food show, and all friends, relatives, and interested persons are invited to see some of Crockett County's most outstanding youth as they demonstrate the new skills they have learned in their foods and nutrition projects.

The goals of the foods and nutrition project are to help 4-H members understand the interrelationship between science, nutrition and food preparation; the connection between good health and eating foods needed by different age groups; to develop desirable eating habits, skills in buying foods, management skills in planning, preparing and serving nutritious meals, and an understanding of the social and cultural roles of food in daily living; develop leadership talents and work toward developing character and effective citizenship.

A food and nutrition project is made up of at least six different learning experiences or lessons the member participates in, and can be completed in a group or be self-determined. Participation in the food show is optional, but is encouraged as an activity where the 4-H'er can demonstrate what he or she has learned, can receive praise from peers and public, and can learn principles of sportsmanship.

4-H members in the food show also gain the ability to think on their feet and to communicate with others from their experience with the judges. In addition, they learn to carry through a task to completion.

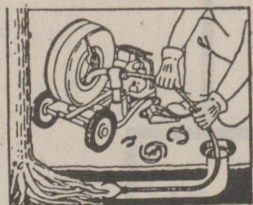
In the food show, 4-H members are judged on their nutrition knowledge, poise and communication ability, as well as the food they have chosen to prepare. The 4-H member prepares the food at home and brings it to be judged. The judges, who are 4-H leaders or senior 4-H members from another county, ask designated questions and taste the food.

Senior 4-H members are eligible to advance to the state food show if they place first at the district food show; Crockett County has had three state food show contestants in as many years, and hopes to do well again this year.

Quicken workshop offered

Tired of balancing checkbooks by hand? Feel like fainting when your banker asks for a cash flow or net worth report? Tired of trying to keep up with investments over the long haul? Quicken, a personal financial computer program, may be one solution.

The Executive Board of the Crockett County Extension Program Council is sponsoring a free Quicken workshop on Tuesday, Nov. 10, from 5 to 9 p.m. at the Ozona High School computer lab. The class will be taught by Dr. Jackie G. Smith, Extension Economist, and Steve Paz, Extension Computer Specialist.

Registration is on a first-come, first-served basis because of a limited number of computers. There are approximately 7 spaces available at this time; however, a husband and wife (or two agreeable people) may share one

computer during the workshop. Any interested person is invited to attend, regardless of age, socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or handicap.

Sometimes your own feelings about the violence may make it difficult for you to confront the situation. Contact your local domestic violence hotline or program and talk to staff about your concerns. Battered women's advocates can be an excellent source of support for both you and your friend.

Letting your friend know that you care and are willing to listen may be the best help you can offer. Don't force the issue, but allow her to confide in you at her own pace. Keep your mind open and really listen to what she tells you. Never blame her for what's happening or underestimate her fear of potential danger.

Remember that your friend must make her own decisions about her life. Focus on supporting her right to make choices.

Middle Concho SWCD sponsors tree program

Would you be interested in a way to cut your winter heating and summer cooling bill? Trees are nature's way to moderate those temperature extremes which are so common to West Texas. A deciduous tree can be selected to give a summer shade and to allow solar heating during the winter. Evergreen trees provide year-long protection from wind, and make a good privacy screen. A carefully planned and properly managed windbreak will not only add beauty and protection to your home, but they will increase the value of your property.

Planning for a windbreak should begin now to determine the best species of tree to use, and the spacing between trees. Evergreen trees that can be obtained through the SWCD are Afghanistan Pine, Austrian Pine,

Ponderosa Pine, Arizona Cypress and Redcedar. Deciduous trees and shrubs available are Catalpa, Mulberry, Desert Willow, Green Ash, Hackberry, Honeylocust, Little Walnut, Nanking Cherry, Osage Orange, Pecan, Red Oak, Russian Olive, Sandcherry and Skunkbush Sumac. These species are adapted to this area and combinations can be used for windbreaks, wildlife plantings or just to spruce up that bare area out in the yard. And ladies, these trees can be potted and kept indoors as house plants.

Many of the more popular species ordered through the Middle Concho Soil and Water Conservation District are in limited quantities and sell out quickly, and there is no minimum order. If you wish to place an order or want more information, con-

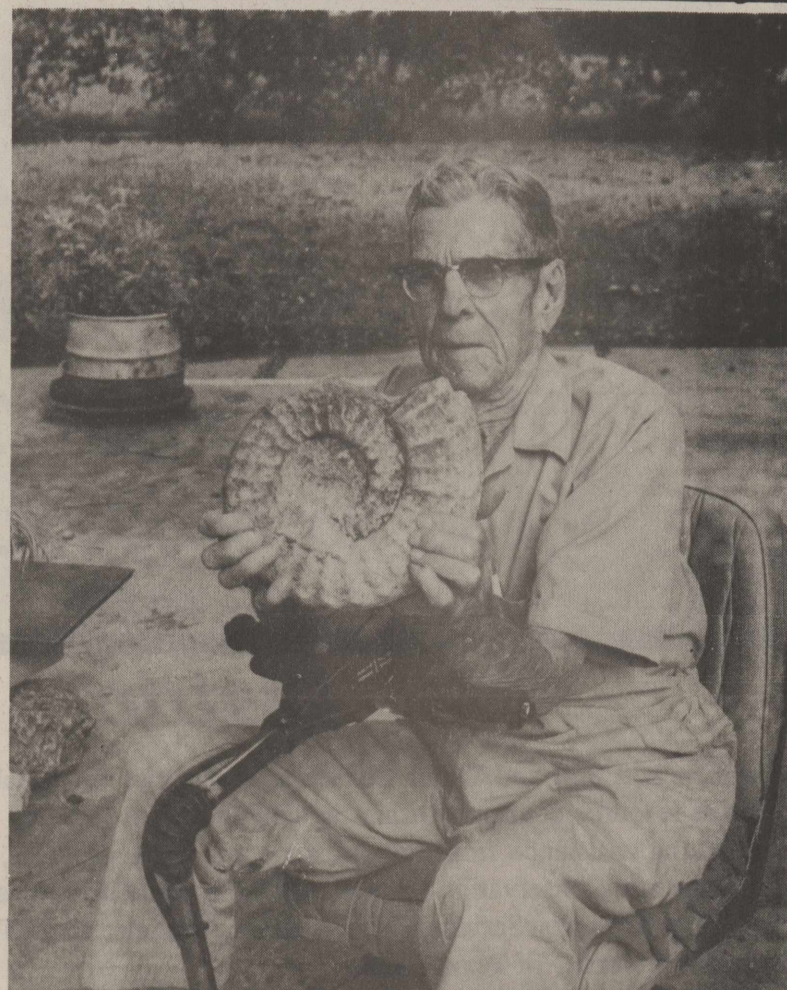

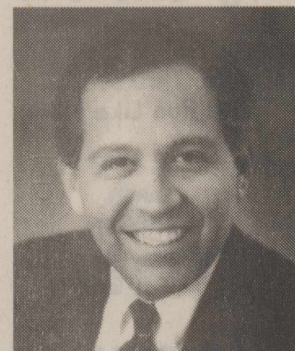

CROCKETT SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT 41st Annual Report

District

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District was established in 1950 to identify and prioritize resource concerns within the county and to serve as a medium for local ranchers in coordinating assistance from federal, state and local agencies. Agencies providing assistance include the Soil Conservation Service, Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service, Texas Agriculture Extension Service, Farmers Home Administration, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and University of Texas Lands.

A Memorandum of Understanding between the USDA-SCS and the District allows the SCS to furnish technical assistance to ranchers, farmers and other interested individuals in order that conservation plans can be developed to meet the needs and capabilities of the land and the objectives of the landowner.

The District is governed by a five member board of locally elected directors. These directors serve as a voice for landowners and operators within the District. Directors for the past year include Earl Acton, chairman; Bud Hoover, vice-chairman; Gene Perry, secretary; Pleas Childress III, member; and Larry Williams, member.

Improper grazing management, brush infestation, conserving soil, water, plants and related resources and improving wildlife management on rangeland as a secondary land use are the primary concerns outlined in a long range program and plan.

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District realizes these concerns need to be addressed and steps taken to solve these problems in order to protect our resource base.

Following any type of brush management practice, pasture deferment or rest from grazing is extremely important. Rest periods may vary depending upon rainfall, soil moisture, soil type and existing range condition.

The Crockett SWCD considers improper grazing management as one of the primary resource concerns in the county. The District promotes the installation of planned grazing systems and proper stocking to improve overgrazing and overutilization of the vegetative resources.

Conservation ranchers Davidson and Miller honored

Charles Davidson III and Pierce Miller were honored by the District as the outstanding Conservation Ranchers for 1991 in Crockett County. Charlie was selected by the local district as the outstanding resident rancher while Pierce was the outstanding rancher in the absentee category.

Charlie has carried out an excellent overall program throughout the years he has been ranching. A combination of cattle, sheep and goats are used to obtain the most efficient utilization of existing forages. Range improvement has been achieved through proper stocking, rest, controlling unwanted brush species and by maintaining a great deal of flexibility in his ranching operation.

To enhance the outstanding grazing management program, Charlie has installed several miles of livestock water pipelines, storage facilities and troughs. A brush management program consisting of spraying and grubbing was begun in full force in the early 1970's and continues today. Over 12,000 acres of aerial spraying and 5,000 acres of grubbing have been completed. Charlie has utilized individual plant treatment programs by using farm mounted hydraulic grubbers and hydraulic plows along with sprayer mounted, 4 wheel, all terrain vehicles.

Pierce Miller operates approximately 29,000 acres of rangeland in Crockett County under the

ranching interest name of VIP Livestock.

The livestock operation consists of a combination of cattle, sheep and goats. Pierce has used his ranching and business experience along with a great deal of common sense to initiate a moderate stocking rate and to retain a great amount of flexibility in the overall grazing operation.

Conservation applied on the ranch speaks for itself. Extensive fencing and brush control practices have been applied with tremendous results. Approximately 22,646 acres of planned grazing systems have been initiated. These consist of short duration, 4 pasture-3 herd, 3 pasture-2 herd and switchback systems.

Since becoming a district cooperator, Pierce has completed approximately 17 miles of crossfencing to assist in the implementation of the grazing systems and has controlled 4,000 acres of unwanted brush species.

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District was extremely proud to recognize these two individuals for their accomplishments and was honored to select them as Outstanding Conservation Ranchers for Crockett County.

Conservation Education

Range and plant I.D.

The District has annually co-sponsored the Crockett County Range and Plant I.D. Contest. This year's contest was held on the Double T Ranch. Historically, Crockett County Youth have excelled in competition. This past year was no exception.

Senior range judges Matthew Marshall, Justin Southern, Martha Mayfield and Casey Upham advanced to state competition at 4-H Roundup and brought home first place. Martha was first high individual and Matthew was second high individual.

The District would like to congratulate these winners and thank Double T Ranch and Art Roane for their continued support of the District and our local youth.

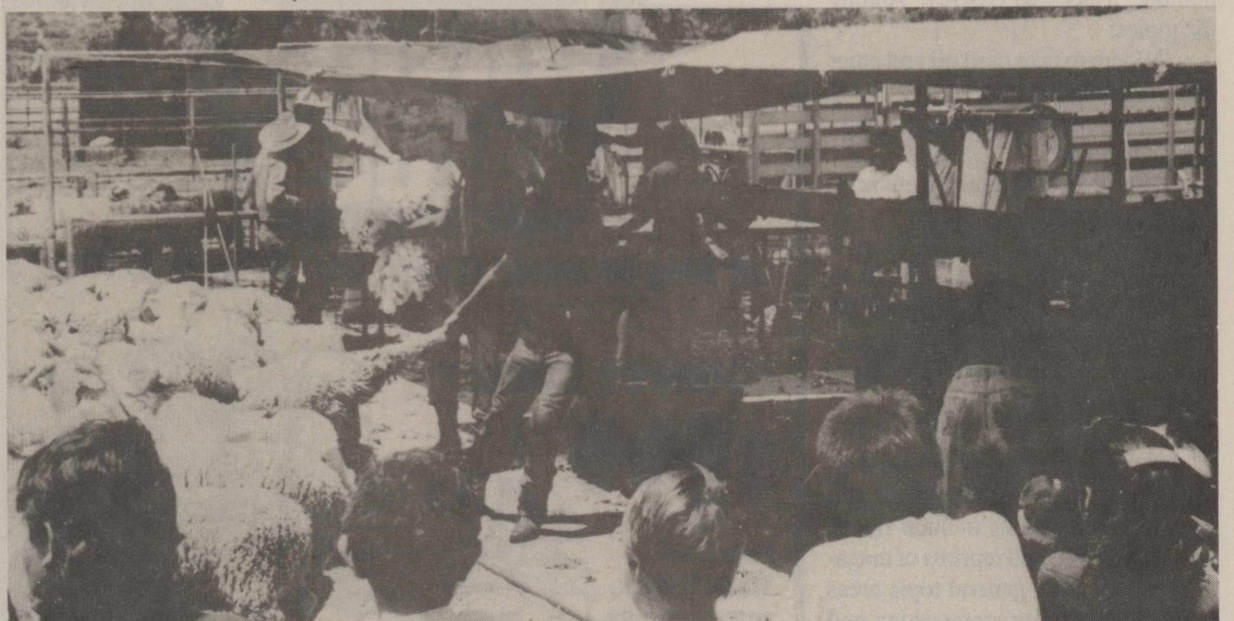
Sixth grade Conservation Field Day

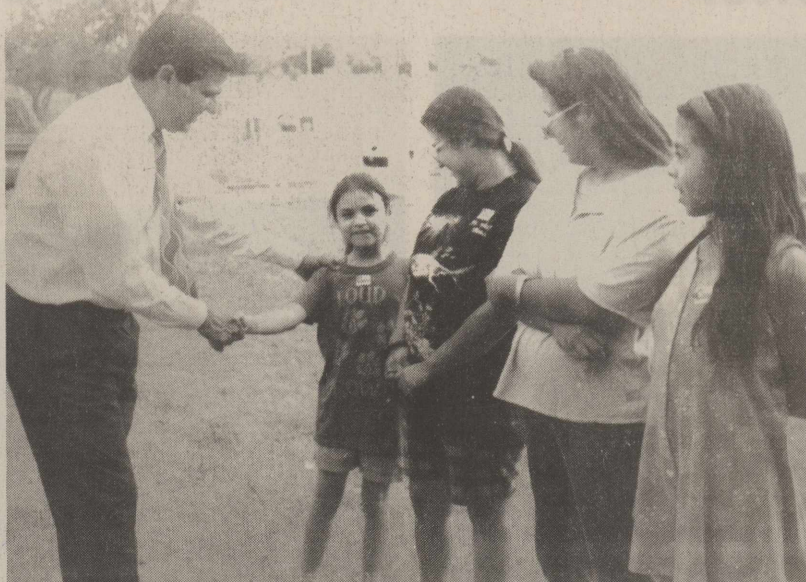

Hispanic get-out-the-vote tour works for Democratic victory

Sen. Eddie Lucio of Brownsville led the get-out-the-vote tour of Hispanic elected officials at a rally held in Ozona Oct. 22. The Ozona stop was part of a four-day tour through the state by elected Hispanic officials calling on Hispanic and other registered voters to show their strength in record numbers this year.

Lucio stressed the importance of one vote in an interview with The Stockman. "One person can do so much to make things happen." He empha-

sized this by pointing out that the Texas election for statehood was won with one vote.

"Hispanic voters, if they vote, are going to allow Clinton to win the state," Lucio said. "We have two good captains (Clinton and Gore), now we need a united team (Democratic voters)," Lucio said.

Lucio noted that Hispanics represent 26 percent of the Texas population and their median age - less than 26

years, compared to 32 years in the non-Hispanic population - makes them the youngest and fastest-growing group in the state.

"Along with this phenomenal growth has come an emerging political power," Lucio said. "In the past few years, Texans have elected nearly 2,000 Hispanics to public office, about half the national total."

The 1,200-mile caravan concentrated on places not usually visited by candidates for public office. Elected

officials from school board members to city councilmen to state candidates and elected office holders were part of the bus tour.

U. S. Congressman Joe Kennedy and Lena Guerrero, candidate for Texas railroad commissioner, traveled by helicopter and joined the caravan at some of the rallies according to caravan director Frank Castillo of Austin. Kennedy and Guerrero did not come to Ozona.

Public offering of bonds

West Texas Utilities Company on Oct. 15 sold to underwriters in a negotiated offering \$35 million of 6-7/8 percent First Mortgage Bonds, Series Q, due Oct. 1, 2002, and \$40 million of 7 percent First Mortgage Bonds, Series R, due Oct. 1, 2004.

The Series Q bonds are being offered to the public at 99.391 percent to yield 6.96 percent to maturity, and the Series R bonds are being offered to the public at 99.316 percent to yield 7.09 percent to maturity. Both series are noncallable for life. The new bonds are rated Aa2 by Moody's Investors Service, AA- by Standard & Poor's and AA by Duff & Phelps. The First

Boston Corporation is lead manager for the offering with Morgan Stanley as co-manager.

Net proceeds from the sale of the new bonds will be used to refund on Nov. 19, 1992, West Texas Utilities Company's \$75 million principal amount of 8 7/8 percent First Mortgage Bonds, Series N, due May 1, 2016 at 106.25 percent of principal amount.

"WTU is always looking for ways to keep its costs as low as possible," according to Paul Douty, vice president of finance. "In this environment of low interest rates, we have taken the opportunity to reduce interest costs which will provide stability in our future rates," he said.

State sheep and goat referendum nears

Oct. 29, the voting date of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association's Sheep and Goat Referendum, is nearing. The referendum, which encompasses 111 counties, will, if passed, affect producers in the heart of the Texas sheep and goat production area.

If accepted by producers, the referendum would add funds to existing predator control efforts. Producers will also vote on three directors to represent their respective districts on a Commodity Producers Board. These nine board directors will decide how the referendum's funds are to be spent. Nominations are now complete for the October 29 election.

The referendum would levy a maximum of \$0.20 (twenty cents) per head assessment to the seller of sheep and goats at the first point of sale. The charge would be imposed on all sheep and goats sold in the 111 county referendum area.

Anyone, regardless of age, who produces sheep or goats in the referendum area is eligible to vote. Voting will be done at the County Extension office in each county. Producers may vote in the county in which they live or where their ranch headquarters are.

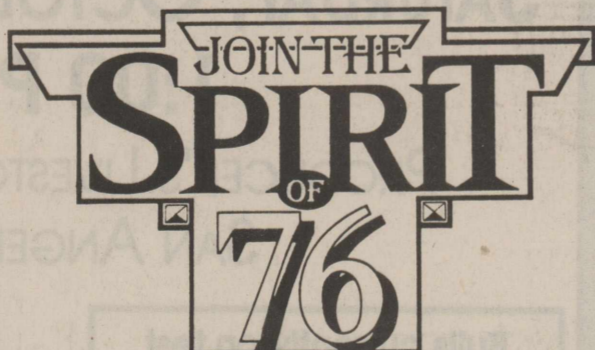
