## County gets CVCOG public bus

Crockett County received its rural transportation van Oct. 27, and applications are being taken for a driver. The van was made available through the Thunderbird Rural Public Transportation System operated by the Concho Valley Council of Governments.

Commissioners voted several months ago to accept the van. Crockett County will pay 20 percent of the cost of the vehicle and half the driver's salary and benefits. The driver will be an employee of the county.

Once a driver is selected, a week of training in Dallas will be required before the van can be put into use. Appointments to use the rural transportation system will be made through the office of Judge Kathryn Mayfield.

Use of the van is open to anyone of any age.

The objective of the program is to expand the availability of transportation to the rural public. The system is principally funded under section 18 of the Urban Mass Transit Act. The transportation program is administered and monitored by the Texas Department of Transportation. Additional sources of funding include Title III of the Older Americans Act (CVCOG Area Agency on Aging) as well as participating counties and cities within the 13-county region.

Senior citizens and Medicaid clients are not charged fares. A portion of senior citizens' fares is paid by the regional Area Agency on Aging. They are, however, encouraged to

make contributions to help meet the expenses of the program. Additionally, passenger contributions indicate local support by the community and help to justify continuation of the program. Medicaid trips are billed to the Department of Human Services.

All other riders are charged a minimal fare for each seat occupied. Seats are reserved in advance on a first-come, first-served basis. The charge for one-way local trips is 50 cents, \$1.00 one-way out of town but in-county trips, and \$1.50 for one-way out-of-county trips.

Use of the van must meet the definition of public transportation. To do so, it must satisfy the following conditions:

## Lancaster operation up for bids

Fort Lancaster and four other state parks/historic sites are the object this week of public notices seeking an operator. Going out for bids is the result of a meeting three weeks ago in Austin between Texas Parks and Wildlife people and Texas Rural Communities Inc.

TRC Inc. wants to operate Fort Lancaster, Caddoan Mounds, Fort McKavett, Starr Mansion and Eisenhower Birthplace, according to Tom Palmer, parks and wildlife regional supervisor. Palmer told county commissioners Monday that the bids process is necessary to assure that all who are interested in taking over the operation of these sites have a chance

to do so.

Texas Rural Communities, Inc. was formed in 1934 to fund farm and ranch operations during the depression and is still in the lending business, Palmer said. The corporation's purpose is to help communities generate more money according to Palmer.

The parks and wildlife department would still be the "sole governing agency", responsible for everything done, Palmer said. TRC Inc. would put in operation money and employees.

"The state will put some money in. I don't know how much. I think Pecos County is still interested,"

Palmer said. "We (TPWD) want you to be a part of it if you want to. If you can't this year and want to jump in there somewhere down the line you can do so," Palmer said.

After November Fort Lancaster will be open on a temporary basis until something can be worked out with TRC Inc., Palmer said. The organization wants a five year minimum lease and plans a seven day operation. Crockett County is number two on the TRC Inc. list to open and might be on line by April.

The parks and wildlife department will keep someone here after Dec. 1, but it may be a weekend operation according to Palmer.

## New EMS Building dedicated

Dedication of the Crockett County EMS Building Nov. 7 put the official stamp on a dream come true. An enclosed shelter for the ambulances has been a longtime wish of EMS members and the goal of one man in particular, John L. Henderson. Henderson has pushed for several years to have such a building, and Saturday he was congratulated and commended for his perseverance.

Henderson and Doug Meador, co-chairmen of the building project, were lauded by hospital/care center board president Martha Gries at the open house. Former board president John Daniels was also commended for his interest in the project.

Volunteers and government spurring each other on to greater efforts made the dream a reality, Henderson

said. Funding for the \$47,000 project was spearheaded by a \$10,000 donation from Ozona Lions Club, \$8,500 from Crockett County Deerfest Association and \$2,500 from West Texas Utilities. Others making monetary contributions were: Women's League, Crockett County Care Center's Carol Richardson Fund, Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Nicholas and Mr. and Mrs. Terry Gries. The balance was paid by Crockett County through funds generated by certificates of obligation.

The 2,500 square foot building holds three ambulances and the care-a-van. The building is divided into a 1500 square foot bay area with the remaining space forming a large conference room, small office and

## Lions in playoff after Bulldog whipping

The Ozona Lions came from behind to defeat the Coahoma Bulldogs 28-26 on Friday, Nov. 6, to move into the 2A football playoffs for the first time since 1989.

The Lions will play the Van Horn Eagles in Odessa's Ratliff Stadium on Saturday, Nov. 14, at 2:00 p.m. The Eagles are the District 5-2A champions.

Defeating the Bulldogs was not an easy victory. Two costly turnovers early in the first quarter put the Lions behind 14-0. The Lions roared back with a nine play drive that covered 60 yards and resulted in a Justin Castro TD pass to Chris Sanchez. The PAT by Joe Mendoza was good, and the Lions trailed 14-7 at the end of the first quarter.

After stopping a Bulldog drive inside the 10 yard line early in the second quarter, the Lions marched down the field to score their second TD when Travis Davidson crossed the goal from one yard out. Mendoza's kick was good to tie the score 14-14 with 5:00 left in the half.

Coahoma scored again with 2:00 left in the half after a six play drive. A key defensive play by Joe Mendoza, Travis Davidson, and Ryan Morris stopped the Bulldogs' two point conversion attempt.

With time running out in the half, the Lion offense put together a 7 play drive that concluded with another Castro to Sanchez connection good

for a TD. The PAT was blocked and the half ended with a 20-20 tie.

Neither team could get on the scoreboard in the third quarter. Early in the final period Michael Fay scored from one yard out to give the Lions the lead for the first time in the game. The Lions faked the PAT kick and scored two points on an Alex Borrego run. This made the score 28-20 in favor of Ozona.

The Lion defense played an outstanding game in the fourth quarter as they recovered a Bulldog fumble to stop one Coahoma drive, and they held the Bulldogs inside the Ozona 10 yard line to stop another drive.

The final score of the game came with 2:30 left in the contest when the

Bulldogs blocked an Ozona punt and recovered it in the Ozona end zone. Their two point conversion attempt failed and the Lions escaped with the victory.

"I am real excited for the kids," said Coach Don Payne. "They had to fight for everything they got this season, and they deserve to be in the playoffs."

Michael Fay rushed 23 times for 90 yards followed by Justin Castro with 41 yards in 10 carries. Castro passed for 164 yards. Chris Sanchez caught 6 passes good for 103 yards. The Lions finished their regular season schedule with a 4-5 record and a 4-2 district record.

restrooms. Stairs in the bay lead to a storage area over these rooms.

In addition to providing security for the vehicles, the building will more importantly keep engines warmer and ready to go; fluids stored in the ambulances for patient use will not be frozen; and emergency patients will not be traumatized by being transported on equipment which is freezing, Henderson explained.

"You don't know how proud we are of it," Meador said of the building. "We're deeply grateful to the commissioners."

EMS training will have first priority for conference room use, but the area is available for use by non-profit organizations. Scheduling must be done through hospital administrator Gerry Phillips.

Saturday's ceremony also served

as a welcome for Mr. and Mrs. Phillips and their children, Rebecca, Jonathon and Tyler. Phillips expressed appreciation to Henderson and Meador and to Mrs. Gries, who in addition to her duties as board president, was overseer of the building construction.

### Letter to the Editor

Dear Linda & Scotty:

I read with conflicting thoughts and interests the article appearing on your October 28, 1992 issue of The Ozona Stockman announcing the "Shop Ozona...It Makes Good Cents" campaign. On the one hand, the proposals offered by Ozona merchants to all members of the Ozona community to shop Ozona first does make sense, because one could argue that the economic well-being of Ozona is a matter of concern for everyone.

On the other hand, the final sentence of this article concluded "Keep your money where you live and work to build a better Ozona". It was at that point, I felt compelled to address an "old issue".

Even though the Ozona Country Club is not a merchant per se, it is a place that accepts money and could have an impact on building a better Ozona. As most of you are aware, this club has a policy of discriminating in favor of Anglo-Americans to the exclusion of all other Americans when it comes to club membership. Because of this, several of us Ozonans have collectively spent several thousands of dollars at various golf courses to enjoy the popular game of golf. In a community as small as ours, which is rich in its history and traditions, it is certainly an understatement to say that we are now approaching the year 1993, and we are still having to fight overt racial and ethnic discrimination in Ozona and Crockett County.

The reality is therefore that the legacy of this county will include the practice of overt racial and ethnic discrimination by some members of our community as late as November of 1992.

While I recognize that most Ozonans do not agree with the policy of the Ozona Country Club, I also recognize that the membership and others have not taken major actions to change the policy of discrimination; therefore, at the present time, many of us Ozonans continue to shop elsewhere.

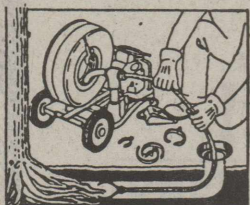

### Commissioners authorize roof bidding

Commissioners voted to authorize for bids for a new roof for the hospital, care center and clinic after meeting with architect Jack Meek Monday. Proposals for labor and materials for a new steel frame and metal roof will be opened at the Dec. 4 court meeting. The project will be paid for through certificates of obligation.

Also meeting with commissioners Monday were Tom Palmer, regional supervisor for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and Ron Alton, superintendent at Fort Lancaster. Palmer outlined a bid process which will seek an operator for the fort. Interested persons must contact the department in Austin no later than Dec. 20 at 5 p.m. (see related story, this issue)

A resolution and a proclamation were passed by the court. The resolution opposes injection and/or dumping of any level hazardous waste in West Texas. The proclamation supports the C.R.O.P. Walk on Nov. 15.

Road and parks superintendent Eddie Moore took court members for a drive in the new rural transportation van. The excursion was two-fold. Court members examined work being done to correct drainage problems in the Country Club Addition, traveled over a new section of A Street and viewed cuts made in several streets to lay gas lines.

Commissioners voted to take responsibility of maintaining fence bordering Totsy Hagelstein's property if their efforts to correct the drainage problem in the addition cause problems for the fence.

Juan Hernandez, director of the Permian Basin Adult Probation Department for the 83rd and 112th Judicial Districts, asked the court to consider allowing a small room in the annex to be used by supervision officer Ron Cook. Cook's case load of 14 in Crockett County necessitates that he be here 2-3 days a week and he is working out of an already full probation office.

Hernandez suggested the small room where the coffee pot, microwave, refrigerator and copier are kept on the second floor of the annex. He was asked to talk with other depart-

ments using the room before any changes are made.

The court heard reports from auditor Sandy Stokes, Helping Hands, librarian Louise Ledoux, Eddie Moore for the road and parks department, hospital/care center administrator Gerry Phillips, and from county agents Tedra Ulmer and Billy Reagor.

A financial report by Stokes indicated that \$155,797.31 has been collected on automobile registration this year to date. The revenue amount budgeted for 1992 is \$260,000. Stokes suggested that the deficit is due to lack of an automobile dealership here. New car buyers are registering their cars in the county of purchase.

During Mrs. Ledoux's report, the court voted to approve the addition of Emma Franco and Charlie Lopez to the library board. New board officers are: Mary Jo Mason, president; Donnie York, vice-president; and Camille Jones, secretary.

The court also canvassed election returns during the meeting.

1. The public must be invited to participate, if the public is not aware of the proposed trip, then the van is not being utilized for public transportation.

2. The nature of the transportation is not exclusive. For instance, if the trip duration is excessive, such as overnight, the public is effectively excluded. Exclusive trips by nature are referred to as "charter service". Such services are specifically prohibited.

3. An accessible alternative commercial source is not available. Public transportation funds cannot be used to bypass commercial enterprise.

Examples of use of the van are to take people to church, to transport voters to the polls on election day, to take patients to health care appointments, etc. In each case the Thunderbird transport service must be operated and publicized so as to be available to everyone to go to all locally available service sites.

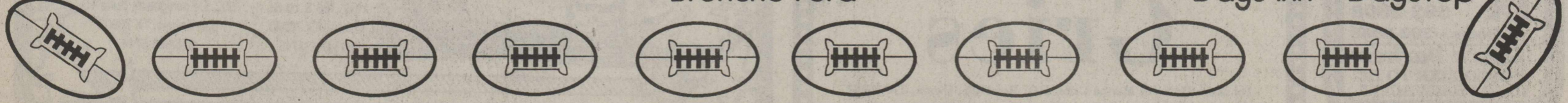

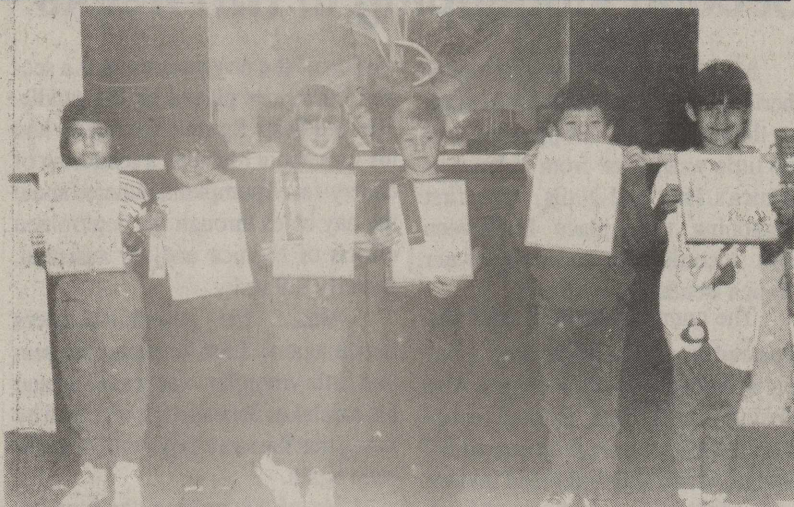

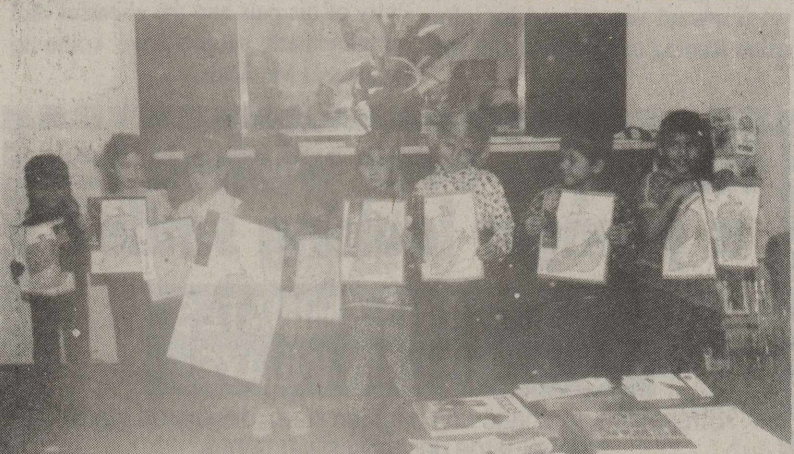

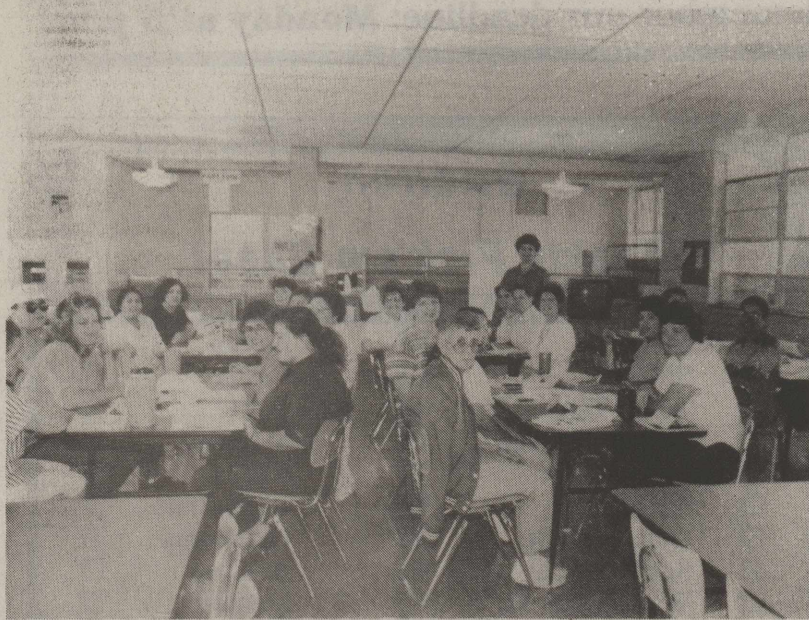

## Copy of photo "Which Altered History" presented to Museum

The 1979 original photograph had hung over V. W. "Vic" Young's fireplace mantel and had been a cherished possession of the Young family for more than half a century. The photograph was ever alive with the near stampeding cattle heading north on a trail drive. The vibrant picture became not only a family heirloom, but has now become a historical document. John Young, father of Vic Young, is pictured in the upper left hand corner of the scene where cattle are rushing across the Staked Plains toward water in Tule Canyon.

A copy of the historic photograph was recently donated to Crockett County Museum by Mrs. Billie Rose Bailey in memory of her mother, Margaret Friend Alford, and her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Friend.

The once black and white photograph was refurbished in oils by western artist Donna Cook in the mid-1980s. The 48"x20" copy was made from the original belonging to V. W. "Vic" Young. He was the son of John Young, Mrs. Alford's uncle. The picture is titled "The Chisholm Trail".

Prior to John Young's ownership, the photograph belonged to the famed Texas rancher, Charles Goodnight. Goodnight colored the photograph lightly in 1925 and presented it to John Young. It is said that it was so well preserved and the detail was so exceptional that "you could see the ticks on the backs of the beaves."

The historical significance of the photograph was revealed when V. W. Young sent it to a restorer in Dallas to be refurbished and reframed. Shortly thereafter the restorer called to tell him "you might change history with this". Between the photograph and the matte of the picture was a signed and sealed note penned by John Young and dated June 25, 1926. There in his father's writing was the information which would add another chapter to the history of cattle drives in Texas. John Young was, according to his son and supported by the writings of J. Frank Dobie, an eloquent man although he had only a sixth grade education. John Young collaborated with Dobie on his book "Vaquero of the Brush Country". (The "I" in the book refers to Young, not Dobie.) The letter stated that the 10,000 cattle in the drive included 5,000 steers and were the "first cattle located on the Staked Plains of the Tule Canyon near Tulia in Swisher County".

Vic Young had always thought, like most people who viewed the picture, that the setting was in the Palo Duro Canyon of Texas. The rolling, but ragged, hills of the Panhandle seemed to indicate the setting and he had no reason to believe differently. The letter, in dating the picture, made it an historical document by clearing up its location.

The letter, written on stationery from the John Young Land Company in Alpine read: "In the year 1879 I drove a herd of cattle from Cimaron River across the Staked Plains. We did not see a man after crossing the Canadian River at a Store called Tascosa. We located these cattle on Tulia Canyon and camped under the tree shown in this picture. These were the first cattle located on the Plains. This picture was later made by Chas. Goodnight there were 5000 steers in the herd. The location is in forks of Tulia Canyon in Swisher County. John Young, June 25, 1926"

The evidence that the letter pinpointed the spot as the Tule Canyon was prominent. That actuality is meaningful since it was at that location where Gen. Mackenzie slaughtered some 1,000 horses stolen from the Kiowa Indians to keep the Indians from recapturing them. This drive of 10,000 cattle including the 5,000 steers, with about half the herd visible in the picture, is also the largest group of cattle recorded in an area without a fence. The term "Staked Plains" originated from the treks of Mexican missionaries through the area who marked where they had been by driving stakes along their journeys.

The historical value of the picture was further increased when Vic Young contacted Ron Tyler at the Amon Carter Museum of Western Art in Fort Worth. Tyler discovered that the photograph was made by William H. Jackson, a nomadic 19th Century artist-photographer known as the "father of Yellowstone National Park" whose pictures have been exhibited in the halls of Congress. Officials from the Carter Museum also located a negative of the now-famous picture in the William H. Jackson Collection owned by the Colorado Historical Society located in Denver. It was noted that the two figures in the foreground were added by Jackson. Young had the negative copyrighted and ordered three prints from the negative to ensure that its historical value would never be lost.

The original photograph is on display at the Cowboy Artists of America Museum in Kerrville.

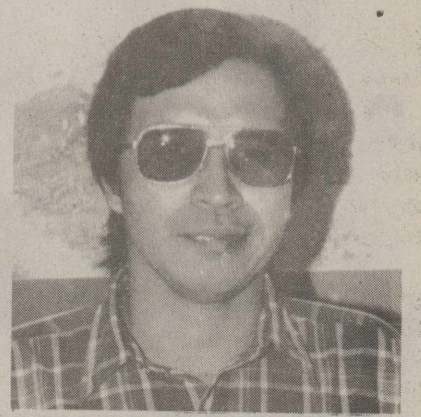
## Ramirez selected employee of month

## EXTENSION CONNECTION

### Help children to develop good eating habits

Family members have a big influence on the development of eating habits in children. If you don't think that's true, try to get a three-year-old to eat broccoli if Dad doesn't like it!

Researchers have found children and parents often have the same tastes. Of course, if the same foods are offered to the whole family, they'll probably eat the same things.

What unspoken messages are we, the parents, sending to our children? For example, what is a mother who drinks diet drinks all day long, one after the other, saying to her kids? And a father who says, "I don't like vegetables, so don't give me any," is also a model. And those wonderful brothers and sisters who misbehave at the table also send a strong message.

Television also plays a big role in children's food habits. With 98 percent of American homes having at least one TV, and with preschoolers watching an average of more than 25 hours of TV per week, we see less physical activity and interaction with others - not to mention all those messages from commercials and televi-

sion shows.

Parents must take responsibility for teaching their young children about a good diet. Talking with children about the kind of food needed for good health can help. You can have these discussions while grocery shopping, watching TV or at the dinner table.

Help children develop an interest by allowing them to help in preparing food for snacks and meals. Point out questionable claims on TV and on food packages. Make mealtime pleasant and limit distractions so your child can focus on eating. Praise good behavior at the table and remember - your child learns by watching how you eat and behave at the table.

It's important to be aware of "feeding cues". Children shouldn't be forced to clean their plates if they're full, but they should also not be forced to wait until a mealtime if hungry. A light snack such as a cracker or apple will carry them over till mealtime without ruining their appetite.

Keep nutritious snacks around the house, and try not to buy things you don't want them to have. Just

remember - an occasional soft drink or candy bar won't kill them, but if you totally eliminate any kind of "junk" they may really go for it when they get older and you don't have 24-hour control! Teaching sensible eating habits is the best way to control junk food intake.

As children try new behaviors or make mistakes, give positive feedback. Be consistent - not rigid one time and indifferent the next. Mixed messages are confusing to a child. Be sensitive to your child's development readiness and set some mealtime standards that will help your child develop good lifelong eating habits.

## Living history demonstration at Ft. McKavett

Life in the late 1800s will become a reality on Nov. 14 as Fort McKavett State Historical Park hosts the 1880 Saddletramps, a group who performs various living history demonstrations interpreting life of a frontier town in November of 1883.

Fort McKavett SHP is an 1850s-1880s military post on the western edge of Menard County. The 1880 Saddletramps, a group of about 20 civilian reenactors from San Antonio, will portray 1880s businessmen, ranchers, cowboys, Texas Rangers and frontier women and children.

Featured will be businesses or occupations that portray a mercantile store, a non-alcoholic saloon, representative gamblers, a representative post office, a medicine show and other activities that portray life at a frontier town. The Saddletramps strive for authenticity and public enjoyment when performing their activities.

When the soldiers left Fort McKavett in June 1883, civilians moved into the old fort structures and formed the nucleus of the Fort McKavett community. This event will represent some of the civilian life at Fort McKavett and give visitors a taste of what life was like in the 1880s.

In case of inclement weather, the event will be moved into Fort McKavett's restored structures - about half of the 20 structures are open. The program will run from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. Park fees are \$2 for adults and \$1 for children 6 to 12. Children under six and individual holders of the Texas Conservation Passport are free. A small store operates near the park for visitors' convenience.

The park is located 17 miles west of Menard on Highway 190, then south six miles on Ranch Road 864. For further information, call the park at 396-2358.

## Texas Parks and Wildlife Department makes deer surveys in Crockett County

Wildlife personnel with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department recently completed annual deer population surveys here in Crockett County. The counts resulted in an estimate of 67 deer per 1,000 acres or about 116,000 deer county wide.

This year in Crockett County the deer season opens on Saturday, Nov. 7, and runs through Sunday, Jan. 3. The bag limit is the same as last year - four deer, no more than two antlered bucks.

Most Crockett County landowners are already aware that, as has been the case for several years now, doe permits or special doe tags will not be issued nor required to harvest antlerless deer here in the Edwards Plateau. Hunters will need only the appropriate tag off of their hunting license, and landowner permission, to bag doe or antlerless deer in Crockett and the other "either-sex" counties this year.

After reviewing the results of the recent deer population surveys, local

wildlife personnel are recommending that Crockett County landowners located in the western two-thirds of the county try for a harvest of one doe or antlerless deer for every 300 acres and one buck for every 500 acres. Those landowners in the remaining one-third of the county should try for a harvest of one doe for every 125 acres and one buck for every 250 acres. The recommended rates result from the need to better balance the sex ratio observed in the herd and from a desire to pro-

duce a healthier deer population that is properly matched to the existing supply of deer foods in the county.

These general harvest rates are based on county averages and may not be completely suitable for each individual ranch in the county. Landowners interested in closely managing their local deer herd need to conduct their own on-site fall population surveys, with resulting harvest recommendations that meet their specific management objectives.

## ASCS announces conservation sign-up

Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Programs are available to assist producers solve their conservation problems. These are referred to as Long Term Agreements (LTA) and Annual Program (ANA). The LTA program allows certain conservation work to be completed over a period of three to five years. The Soil Conservation Service assists the rancher in planning the work. When the work is completed to specifications, the Soil Conservation Service certifies the completion. The ASCS agency then

pays the cost share.

Herb Schwertner, County Director, reminds producers that a Long Term Agreement sign up is underway from Nov. 16 through Dec. 16, 1992. If you are interested in long term conservation, contact the ASCS Office to apply. Also remember that any application made in a prior year is now null and void and a new application for 1993 must be re-submitted.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established under law without regard to race, color, religion, age, sex, marital status, disability or national origin.

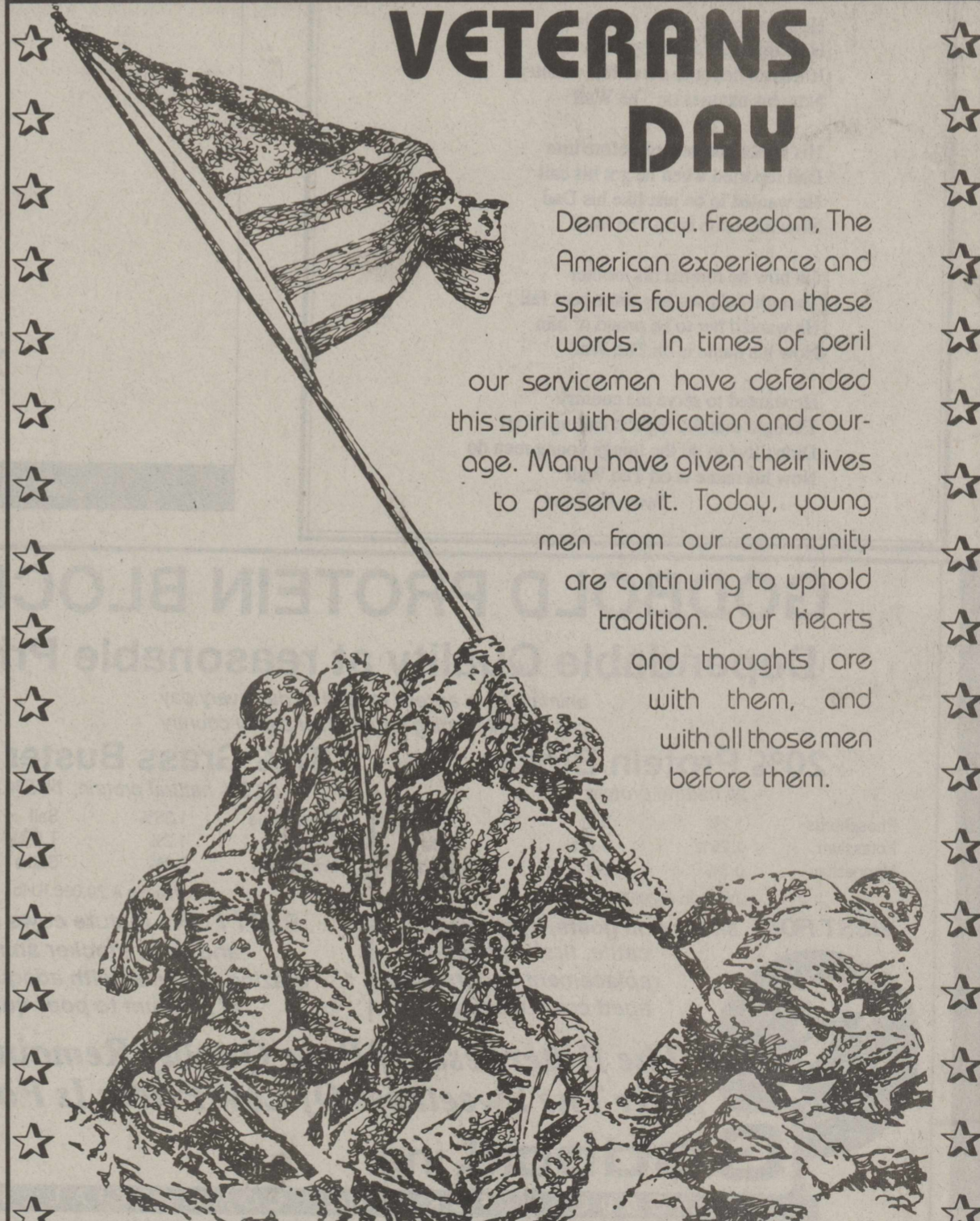
