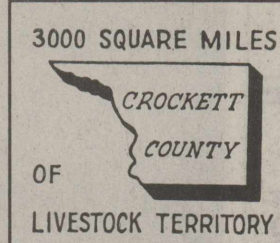

Van Horn Eagles soar over the Lions 27-7

The Van Horn Eagles brought the Ozona Lions' football season to an abrupt end on Saturday, Nov. 14, as they defeated the Lions 27-7 in a 2A bi-district game played in Odessa's Ratliff Stadium.

With the victory, the Eagles advance to the area round of the state

playoffs. The Lions finish their season with a 4-6 record.

The Eagles led all the way. After scoring their first touchdown near the end of the first quarter, Van Horn pulled ahead 14-0 early in the third quarter.

The Lion offense sputtered for most of the game. A combination of fumbles, incomplete passes and inter-

ceptions stopped most of the Ozona drives. Ozona's lone TD came as a result of a penalty against Van Horn (roughing the passer) and a four play drive that concluded with a Jason Yeager TD run from five yards out.

The Eagles came back to score their third touchdown with 4:15 left in the final quarter after a five play drive. The Eagles scored their last TD

with 1:44 left in the game to clinch the victory.

The Lions rushed for 95 yards and passed for 73 yards.

Participating in their final football game for the Lions were Chad Upham, Jason Yeager, Owen Powell, Mike Kenison, Larry Sanchez, Joe Mendoza, Alonzo Hernandez, Andy Borrego, Alex Borrego, and Eric Sanchez.

SAN ANGELO—The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association-sponsored Sheep and Goat Referendum has passed according to a Nov. 9 correspondence from Texas Department of Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry.

The Oct. 29 referendum carried 74.7 percent of the popular vote in the 111 West and Central Texas counties involved. The referendum establishes an assessment program for sellers of sheep and goats of no more than twenty cents per head. The referendum's purpose is to provide a source of funds to supplement ongoing predator control efforts.

Producers also selected three directors for the three districts dividing the 111 county area. The directors are to represent their constituents on a commodity producers board. The nine directors are responsible for

determining how the assessed funds are to be spent.

The newly elected directors, their county of residence and districts are: DISTRICT I - Monty Harkins, Terrell; Ernest Woodward, Pecos; and Ellis Helmers, Terrell.

DISTRICT II - Phillip Jacoby, Kimble; Perry Bushong, Kerr; and W. Roy Jacoby, Menard.

DISTRICT III - Mark Langford, Lampasas; Allen Turner, Coleman; and Bill Roeder, Gillespie.

He earned a degree at Lamar University in Orange before beginning his training with the DPS.

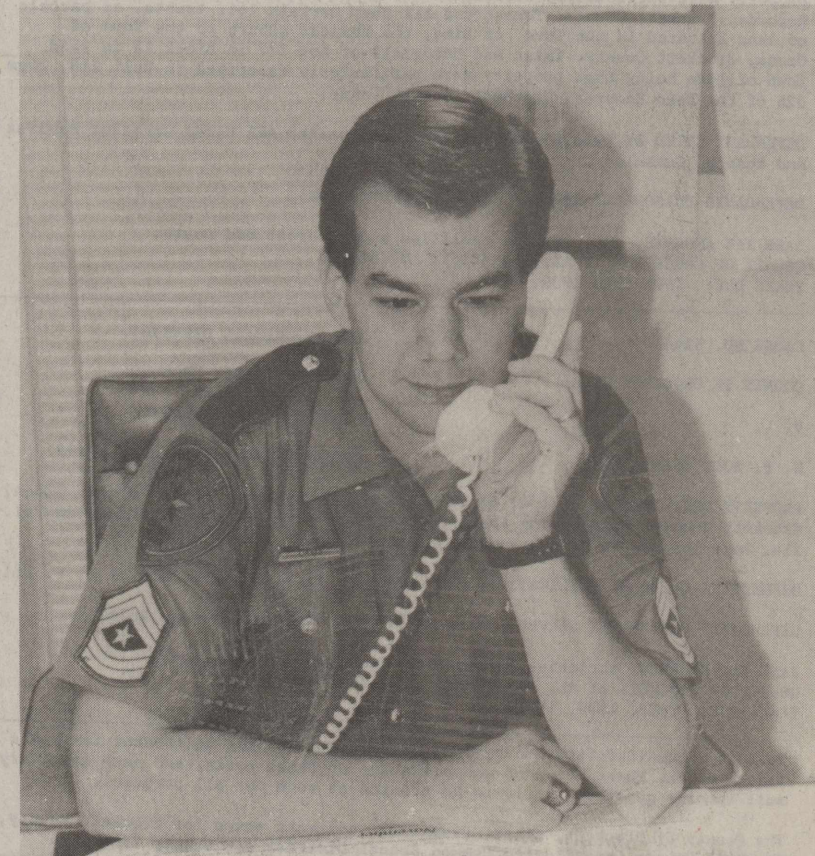
Mrs. Davis, Kim, and their daughter,

Great American Smokeout slated for November 19

When the news reports a killer is on the loose, most people lock their doors. Yet millions of Americans let a killer into their lives every day - whenever they light a cigarette.

Everyone knows smoking causes cancer. The main problem for smokers, though, is getting themselves to stop. Potential quitters who pledge to stop smoking "next year" often let their best intentions go up in smoke.

"You might have a little more success if you try to make quitting as much fun as possible," says Larry Laufman, Ed. D., stop smoking coordinator at The Institute for Preventive Medicine in The Methodist Hospital in Houston. "And, the best time to try is the 'Great American Smokeout,' sponsored by the American Cancer Society Nov. 19."

Last year, a record 5.8 million smokers were able to stay off cigarette smoking for longer than 24 hours.

want to quit for themselves. Nagging a friend or loved one will only defeat the purpose.

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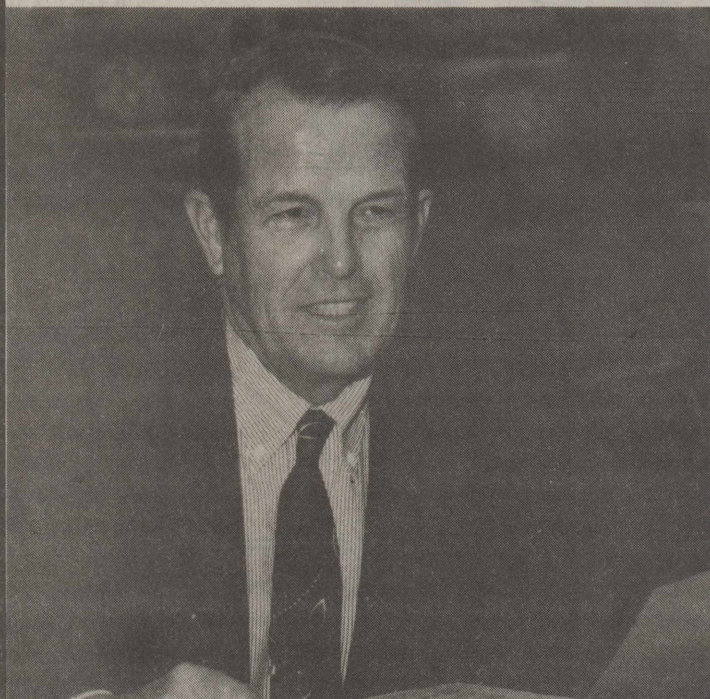
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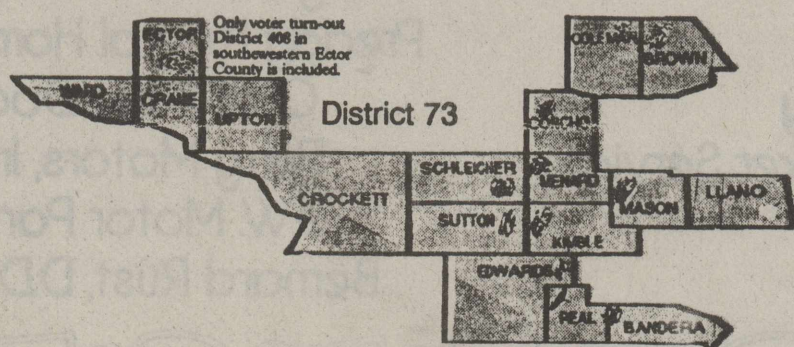
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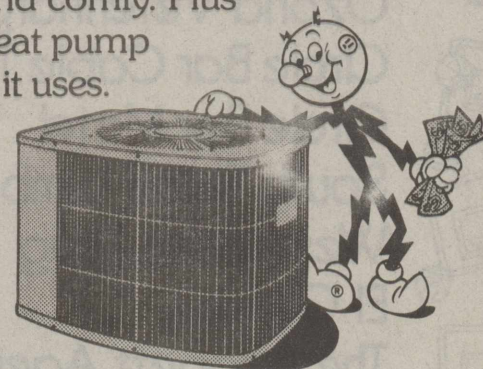
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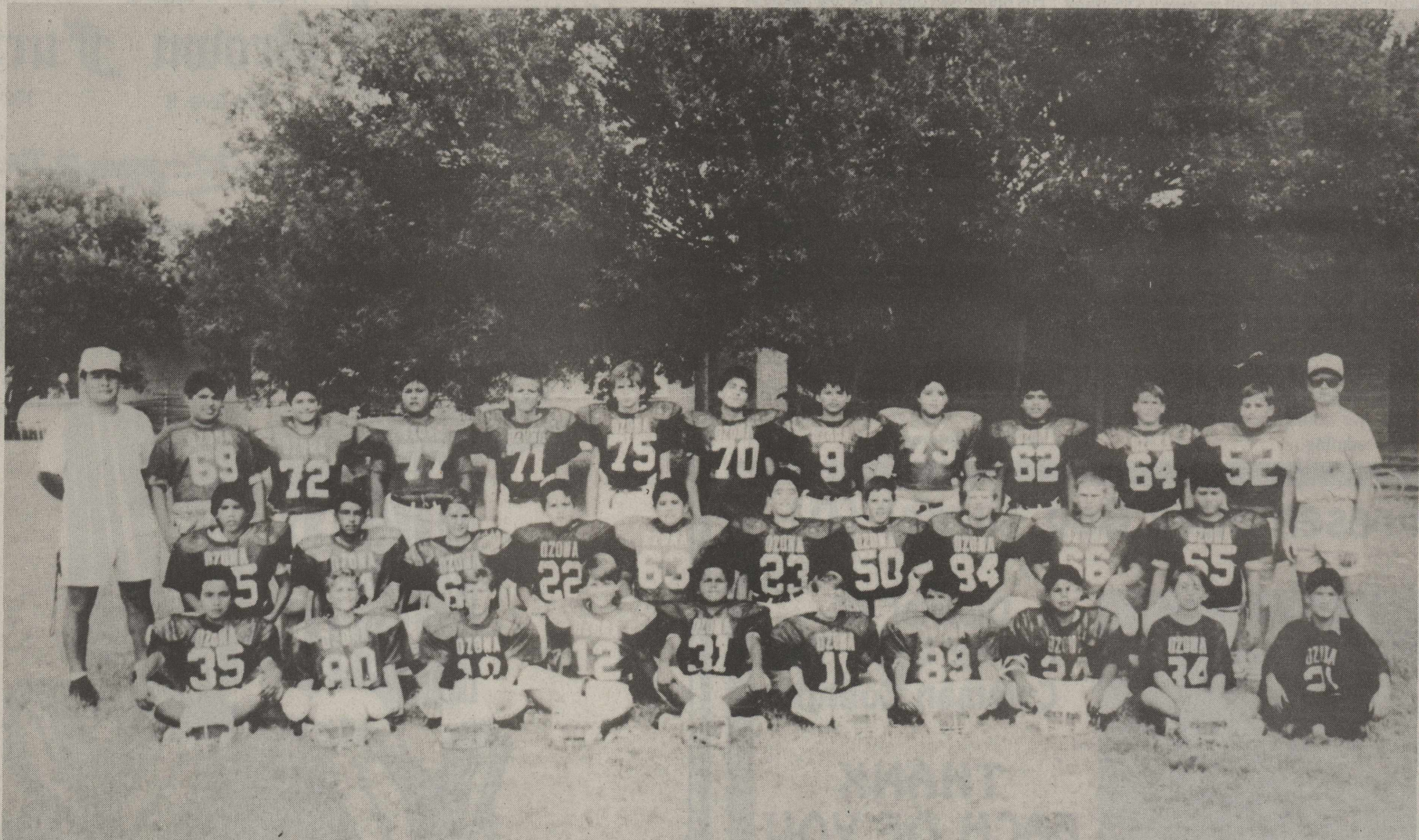

Part of the conference was a mock congress on gun control and education choice. The teens assumed the roles of United States representatives by debating, lobbying and voting on the proposed legislation.

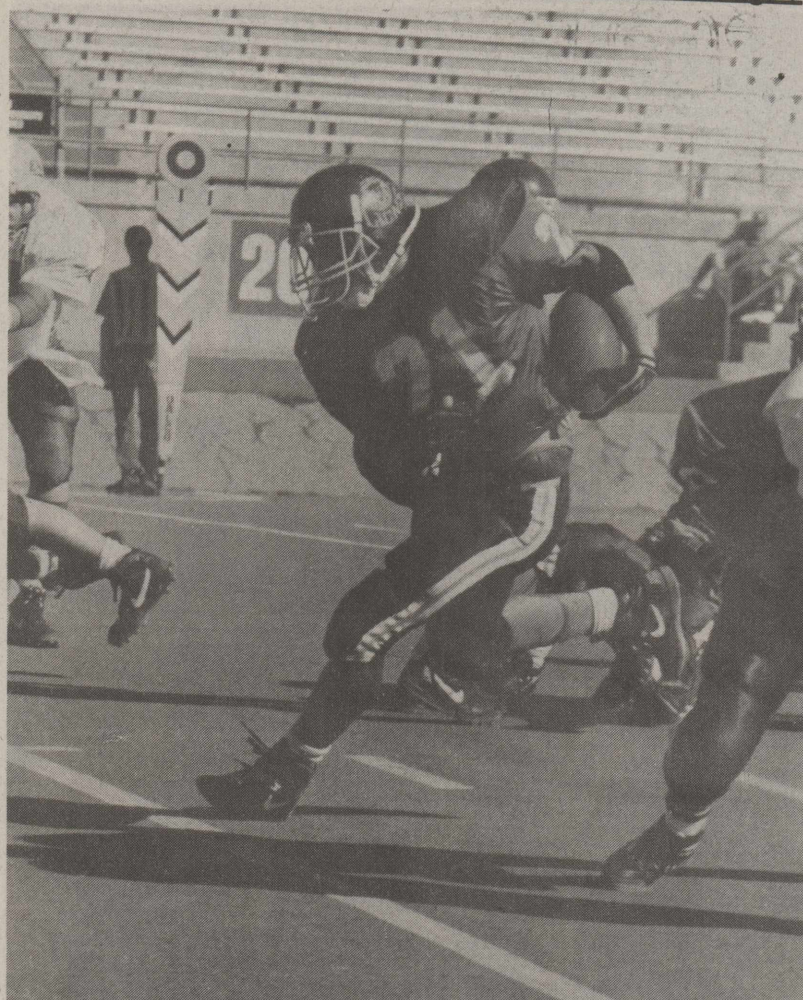
"The education choice bill was very controversial," Upham said.

The boys listened to his every word, amazed at the things he had to say. They were also given the opportunity to ask questions, which Trooper English enjoyed answering. He also showed the boys his patrol car and all the equipment necessary to do his job every day.

"Many thanks to Trooper English, for he is truly an important person to this community," said the day's den leader Donna Morrow.

(Contel) have filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to seek approval to provide two new private line services and to change rates for existing services. GTE's intraexchange DS1 Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through concurrence with GTE's interLATA access tariff rates which are lower. Contel's intraexchange DS1/DDS Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through Contel's current private line tariff rates. Existing customers with DS1/DDS Services will not be affected by these rate changes. DS1 1.544 Megabits per second (Mbps) Service and Digital Data Service (DDS) will normally be used for the transmission of data communications or large volumes of voice communications between two locations. These services are optional and will not affect the existing rates of customers who do not order these services. The estimated annual effect on GTE-SW's revenues in the first year is \$1,080,567. The estimated annual effect on Contel's revenues in the first year are \$42,383.

DS1 Service

DS1 Service is an intraLATA Private Line Service which provides a dedicated, high capacity channel which may be used for simultaneous two-way transmission of voice data or other digitally encoded customer information signals. DS1 Service provides a transmission speed of 1.544 Mbps and is designed to provide an average performance of at least 95 percent error-free seconds of transmission over a continuous 24-hour period.

DS1 Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL), between a Serving Wire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. Under the month-to-month service, the additional DS1 Local Loop rate applies only when the additional DS1 Local Loop (s) is (are) ordered at the same time and between the same two CDLs as the first DS1 Local Loop.

The OPP plan allows the customer to select a term of service (1 YR, 3 YR and 5 YR) with lower monthly rates associated with longer term contracts. If the customer selects an OPP, additional DS1 Local Loops may be ordered and installed at the Additional DS1 Local Loop rate between any SWC and CDL covered by the OPP, at any time during the term of that OPP.

DS1 Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DS1 signal between Serving Wire Centers. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

DS1 Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DS1 Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DS1 Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the DS1 Transport.

Digital Data Service

Digital Data Service (DDS) is an intraLATA Private Line service which supports synchronous, full-duplex transmission between the CDL and the SWC or the point of connection with another telephone company at transmission speeds of 2.4, 4.8, 9.6, 19.2 and 56 kilobits per second (Kbps). DDS provides a transmission path for digital data signals within the same LATA.

DDS Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DDS Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two CDLs or between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider.

IntraLATA DDS Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DDS Local Loop, DDS Transport and DDS Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

DDS Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer may establish and disconnect DDS Local Loops without penalty other than the minimum service interval of one month's service, as his/her needs demand.

DDS Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DDS signal between SWCs. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

DDS Transport Termination

Harvest Tea at Concho Valley Home for Girls

More than 260 girls have been helped over the past 19 years through the Concho Valley Home for Girls in San Angelo. And in celebration, the home is sponsoring a Harvest Tea on Nov. 22.

This year, the focus will be "A Time to Grow". The tea will celebrate the newly begun construction of the third home - Tucker Home. The project should be completed in June and will be home for eight more girls.

The tea, conducted each fall, is a fund-raising event sponsored by the home's founding organization, the Philia Club. It will be from 2 to 4 p.m. at both homes, McCaw at 444 Preusser and Haby at 404 Preusser. "We're hoping many of the home's supporters from Crockett County will come and see the progress toward the third home," said Carmen Sutton, Ozona member of the CVHG Regional Advisory Council.

"Former staff and residents are encouraged to attend, as are members of the general public," said Sammie Ruppeck, the CVHG director. The tea will include a tour of both homes and the construction site at 331 Preusser.

The girls' home first began ac-

cepting residents in 1973. It offers a constructive alternative for girls faced with a destructive home situation. Residents attend San Angelo public schools and are encouraged to participate in social, cultural and religious activities of the community. On-site tutoring and individual and group counseling are provided.

Now, the agency not only provides foster care of 15 girls, but offers Preparation for Adult Living sessions for 15 to 17-year-olds under a contract with the Texas Department of Human Services. And, it is offering additional counseling through a pilot program called "PAL Plus". PAL Plus offers intensive casework to assist DHS foster children - those in the girls' home and those residing elsewhere - to make a successful transition to independent living when they leave foster care. PAL, a 12-section program, involves various members of the community who have helped and will be helping with the special interest areas. Topics include money management, marriage and family issues, health care, career choices, meeting transportation needs, and finding an appropriate place to live.

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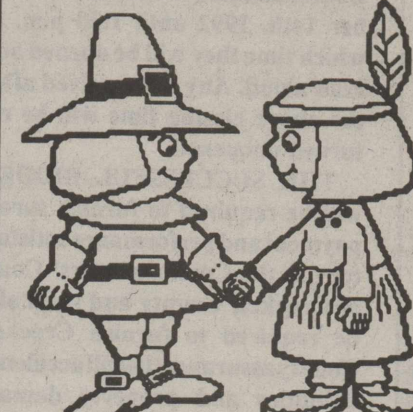
