## Commissioners approve contract for new doctor

Commissioners approved a hospital board recommendation to offer a contract to Dr. Lawrence Green of Bowman, ND, when they met Monday. The vote came late in the day after meeting in executive session with Doctors Robert Owens and Marcus Sims and with hospital administrator Gerry Phillips. Board president Jack Baggett Jr. and board member Tim Brewer were also present.

Dr. Green was in Ozona last week to tour the hospital and meet with some of the board members and doctors. He accepted the contract Tuesday according to Phillips and will be on staff here in 60-90 days.

The contract provides that the doctor receive "the greater of an amount equal to 95% of Physician's Fees charged by physician or \$12,500 per month". Fees are to be collected by the hospital. The contract would also require the physician to maintain liability insurance and would allow three weeks' vacation annually and reasonable time off for seminars.

Dr. Green is a medical doctor and is presently in private practice. A native of Lawton, OK, he earned his bachelor of science degree at Oklahoma Baptist University and his M.D. at the University of Oklahoma Medical School. He interned at Mercy Hospital in Oklahoma City.

Court members also voted to approve two line item changes in the hospital budget. \$12,500.00 will be taken from the Medicare Cost Report budget and \$2,182.72 from the business office budget to pay for the Excuteone nurse call system for the hospital.

Commissioners declined to accept any of the three bids submitted for replacement of the hospital and care center roofs. Bids were submitted with a price for a clinic roof as a separate item. All, with the clinic roof included, exceeded the \$200,000 allotted for the project.

Architect Jack Meeks was asked to meet with low bidder R. R. Construction of Odessa to determine whether or not the bid amount could be reduced.

Auditor Sandy Stokes reviewed an annual report for the court. He commented that the county ended the year with approximately \$1.2 million in the bank, about the same as 1991. Since 1985 or '86, the county has been losing about \$400,000 a year," Stokes said.

A bid from The Baggett Agency for auto, fire and extended coverage insurance was accepted by the court. The firm was the sole bidder.

Orlando De Hoyos, county attorney, brought to court a revised plat from Quail Run Development showing easements granted to the county. Commissioners voted to accept the plat.

De Hoyos was also present for a discussion of removal of structures and cleaning of property under the Litter Abatement Act which was adopted in 1990. He presented information on notification methods used in San Angelo and amounts charged for cleanup by the city and private contractors there. Court members asked that he come back in February with figures on charges by local contractors.

The plan under consideration would first give violators opportunity to have their property cleaned by a private contractor. Rates charged by the county would be higher to encourage use of private contractors.

Monthly reports were presented by Garland Young for the civic and youth center, Gerry Phillips for the hospital and care center, Eddie Moore for the road and parks departments, and Louise Ledoux for the library. Written reports were read by Judge Kathryn Mayfield for Helping Hands and the fire department.

The court voted during Moore's report to install a bump gate on County Road 410. He was asked to check into need and cost for street signs.

Commissioners voted to authorize advertisement for hospitalization and medical insurance and for a depository contract with variable rate for county funds.

Stokes told the court the partially self-funded health insurance plan in force this year has saved the county

approximately \$200,000, costing \$600,000. The current plan has a \$500 deductible per family member.

Payroll, health insurance and workman's compensation insurance make up 60% of the county's budget. Crockett County pays health insurance costs for life on employees who retire with 12 years' or more of service.

As a first step in an attempt to decrease workman's compensation claims and regain a discount, the court established a loss control committee. A representative from the Texas Association of Counties will be here Feb. 16 to meet with the committee for training on how to institute the program.

Committee members are: Eddie Moore and alternate Ramon Sanchez, road department; Sheriff Jim Wilson, Jimmy Gillit, chief jailer, and Alton Davis, chief deputy, alternate; Ronald Shaw, building maintenance; Gerry Phillips, hospital/care center administrator and directors of nurses Nadine Lefeste and Shelia Griffith. Judge Mayfield and Orlando De Hoyos will serve as co-chairmen.

Court members executed conflict of interest affidavits, approved holidays for 1993, set date and location for court meetings in 1993 and drew names for grievance committee members.

Holidays in 1993 are: Jan. 1, April 9, May 31, July 5, Sept. 6, Nov. 11, 25, 26, Dec. 23, 24.

The court will meet on the second Monday of each month in the district courtroom with the commissioners' conference room in the annex as an alternate location.

Names drawn from the grand jury list for grievance committee membership were: Guillermo Fierro, Alena Fae Hokit, Susan Womack, Willie Payne Sr., Nora Madris, Nelda Wagner, Don Long, Lupe L. Gonzales and Huey Ingram.

The court voted to appoint Judge Mayfield and Pct. 3 commissioner Freddie Nicks to serve on the tax appraisal board.

A resolution was passed honoring Louis Martinez who will retire this month after 35 years with the county.

## Civic center plans recreation for senior citizens

Ozona's senior citizens will benefit from a new program starting soon at the civic center. One morning a week will be set aside for their use of the youth center for recreation. The program was approved by the center's board at a meeting Jan. 6 and approved by commissioners when they met Monday.

Dominoes, checkers, pool and ping pong will be among the activities available.

"We're going to try it. We hope it will work," said center director Garland Young.

The center's rules of no alcohol, drugs, smoking, dipping or chewing will have to be observed.

Young said Tuesday that a decision remains to be made as to which morning the center will be open for senior citizens. It will not be Monday or Tuesday.

The board also voted to allow the American Association of Retired People to meet free of charge at the civic center once a month.

## New Texaco plant to go on line by March 1

Texaco is constructing a new gas processing plant on the Enron compressor location approximately five miles south of I-10 on Taylor Box Road on the Gene Perry Ranch. The new plant will have the capability of processing "y"-grade product from up to 22 million cubic feet of gas a day and will have the ability to compress up to 40 million cubic feet of gas daily.

Cecil Buckner, company foreman, said, "The station will be manned 8 hours per day, seven days a week by one man and will require hiring 3 additional employees. Two of the positions have already been filled."

Texaco drilled 50 wells in Crockett County in 1992.

## Sheep dog trials Jan. 15-17

The Third Annual Crockett County Classic Sheep Dog Trial to be held Jan. 15-17 is the final trial in the Texas Sheep Dog Winter Olympics, the first two trials being the 9th Annual Sanderson Sheep Dog Trial Jan. 8-10 in Sanderson and the Second Annual End of the Road Sheep Dog Trial, also in Sanderson, on Jan. 12 and 13.

Hosts for the Crockett County trial are the Weir-Perry Kennels on Taylor Box Road.

Judge for all three trials will be Harford Logan of Newtonabby, Northern Ireland. Mr. Logan is an internationally known dog handler and

trial judge. He has won the Irish National five times and the Irish Brace National seven times, as well as winning the Scottish National. He has been in the top five of the International Invitationals a number of times.

Seventy-five to 100 entries are expected from all over the United States and Canada. The dogs will run in four classes, nursery, ranch, open ranch and open. There will be awards and trophies, as well as cash prizes, in all four classes. The Top Dog Award for the Texas Winter Olympics will be presented at the Crockett County Trial and is donated by West Texas Util-

### TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION PUBLIC NOTICE AWARD OF CONTRACT AND REQUEST FOR STATEMENTS OF INTEREST FOR THE Texas LOGO Sign Program

In accordance with Texas Civil Statutes, Articles 6674a et seq. and 4477-9a, Section 4.07, and Title 43, Texas Administrative Code, Sections 25.400-25.408 (43 TAC §§25.400-408), the Texas Department of Transportation is seeking statements of interest from a person, firm, group, or association in the State of Texas for the award of a contract to erect, maintain, lease and market signs and sign space to commercial establishments for the purpose of giving specific information of interest to the traveling public including specific brand names, at appropriate locations along interstate highways in each county with a population of less than 20,000.

A previous notice was published beginning the week of October 7, 1992, advertising the award of contract and request for statements of interest for the Texas Logo Sign Program. Subsequently, prospective contractors were prequalified and bids received. On December 22, 1992, due to unforeseen circumstances, the Texas Transportation Commission found it necessary to reject all bids. This notice is for the re-letting of the contract for the Texas Logo Sign Program. Those prospective contractors that were prequalified to submit bids at the time of the initial letting, remain prequalified for purposes of this reletting; however all others must meet the requirements of prequalification as stated below. All prospective prequalified contractors are required to attend the pre-bid conference to obtain bidding proposals.

Prospective contractors will be required to meet the prequalification requirements as provided by 43 TAC §§25.400-25.408 (published in the June 9, 1992 issue of the Texas Register, 17 TexReg - 4167; correction of error published in the June 19, 1992 issue of the Texas Register, 17 TexReg 4481; final adoption was published in the October 9, 1992 issue of the Texas Register). These sections were adopted by the Texas Transportation Commission on September 29, 1992 and became effective October 21, 1992.

Statements of interest will be used to determine if a person, firm, group, or association in the State of Texas is prequalified for bidding on the Texas LOGO Sign Program contract. Any party interested in becoming prequalified to bid on this contract will be required to submit an introductory letter and a statement of interest. Introductory letters and statement of interests may be sent by registered mail or hand delivered, but must be received at the office of Mr. Mark Thorp, Project Engineer, by 5:00 PM, Central Standard Time, February 22, 1993. Mr. Thorp's address and telephone number may be found at the end of this notice.

Introductory letters and statement of interests will not be accepted if submitted by facsimile messages or telegrams.

Each statement of interest will be reviewed and only those parties meeting the prequalification requirements as prescribed by 43 TAC §§25.403 will be issued bidding proposals and invited to a pre-bid conference. Bids will be opened March 3, 1993 after 1:00 PM, Central Standard Time.

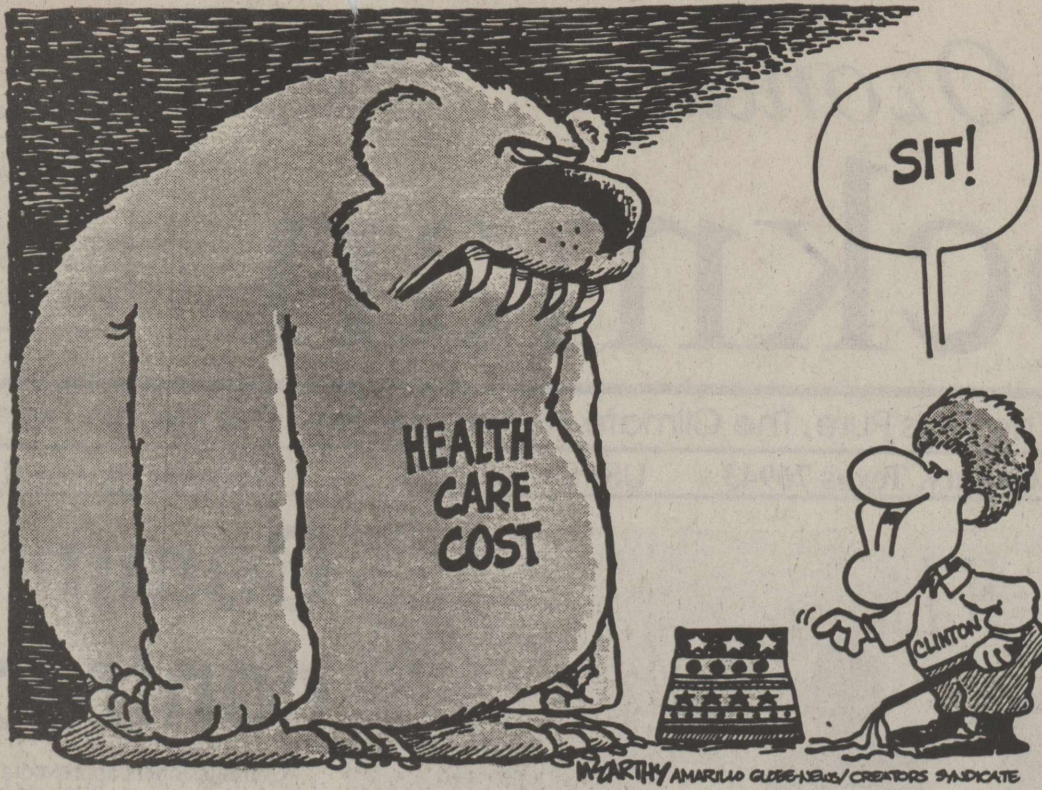

## Hospital board meets

"Don't every try to be status quo. Keep on growing and going. I'm proud of you," said outgoing president Martha Gries to the Crockett County Hospital/Care Center board Thursday, Jan. 7. Mrs. Gries was presented a plaque by Gerry Phillips, administrator.

Officers elected for 1993 are: Jack Baggett Jr., president; Carmen Sutton, vice-president; and Concha Zapata, secretary.

The board went into executive session to discuss a contract for new physician Dr. Lawrence Green.

Upon reconvening in open session, head nurse Nadine Leifeste presented a proposal for nurses to work 12-hour shifts. This change would supposedly result in a dramatic savings for the hospital. Nurses would work two days on, two off, two days on and three days off. Board members decided that this would be more thoroughly discussed at a continuation of the meeting on Jan. 10.

Dietitian Sue Denney told the board that because of never knowing how many employees would eat on a day-to-day basis, providing meals for employees is no longer cost effective. Board member Tim Brewer suggested that questionnaires first be given to employees to receive their input before discontinuing the food program for employees.

Because of an insufficient kitchen budget, a problem with members of the kitchen staff had erupted. They threatened to quit their jobs rather

than launder their aprons at home. The problem has been resolved. Aprons will be sent to the care center for laundering.

The possibility of increasing cost of semi-private rooms was addressed. The average of the three closest facilities, Big Lake, Sonora and Eldorado, is \$48.66 per day. Crockett County Care Center charges \$42 per day for semi-private. An increase equaling the three closest facilities would increase revenues \$89,799.84 annually.

Representatives from the Texas Department of Health are expected to arrive soon for a "full-book" inspection.

### District court

District court convened in Ozona Jan. 4 with Judge Brock Jones presiding.

Pete Robledo Ramirez was given a six year probated sentence on a charge of aggravated assault.

Robert Yruegas Ybarra was sentenced to 10 years in the Texas Department of Corrections following a motion to revoke probation.

Roy William King was sentenced to 10 years in the Texas Department of Corrections and restitution on a charge of burglary of a building.

Michael James Thornton was given three years probation, deferred adjudication, fined \$1,000 and court cost on a charge of possession of a controlled substance.

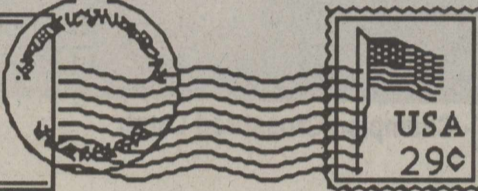

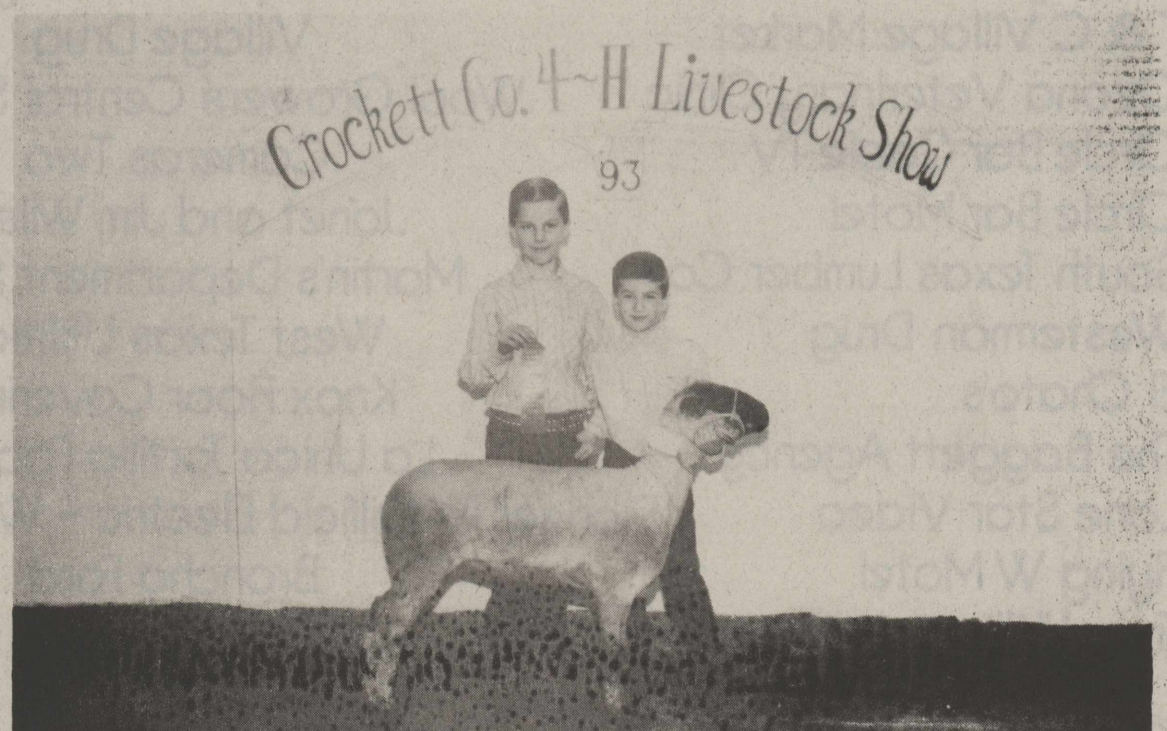

Myra Sanchez with 14 points, Myra Wilson with 13 points, and Gloria Pena-Alfaro with 10 points led the Ozona offense.

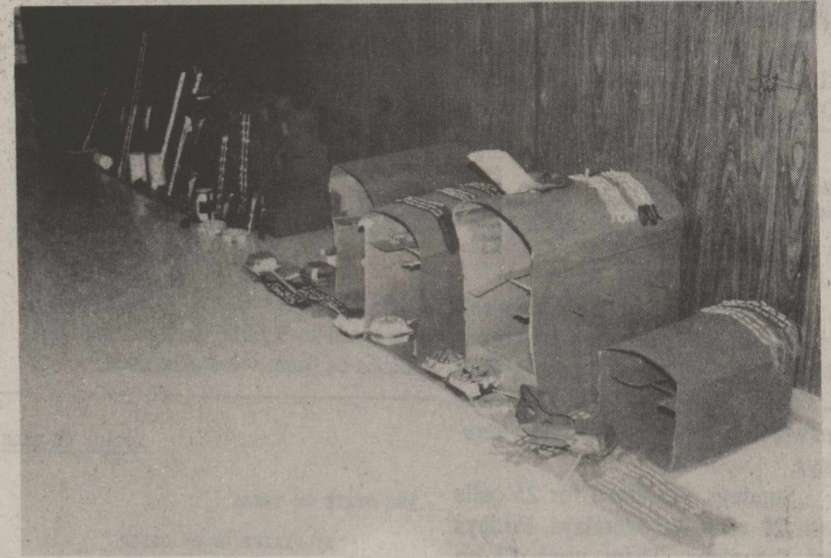

### Diet resolutions-easier than you think!

Ah, January! Time for New Year's Resolutions and good intentions. Many of us make one resolution year after year - to lose weight or to stick to a healthy diet.

Doomed to failure? Not necessarily!

Currently, 50 percent of the American population is on a diet but not getting thinner - we're just as overweight today as we were in the 1960s.

As more and more evidence points to what we had already suspected - namely, that diets don't work - health professionals are increasingly questioning whether thin is better and if dieting is the best way to fight obesity. In fact, repeated dieting sets up a frustrating and even dangerous cycle and is downright counterproductive.

As an example, dieters in an Arizona State University study were found to have more body fat than non-dieters and had a lower energy expenditure during exercise - which supports other recent studies suggesting that an individual's metabolism slows down with frequent dieting, making weight control more difficult.

So if you don't diet, what do you do? Probably the best solution is a non-diet approach, utilizing long-term behavior modification and increased exercise.

In other words, gradually change your habits. If you always put two spoonfuls of sugar in your coffee, try one. If you just MUST have catfish on Friday, skip the tartar sauce and Thousand Island dressing and don't eat more than one serving of crispy fried fish.

Small, slow changes are less painful, and once you get used to your new eating habits you can add a few more gradual changes. Same with exercise - walk up the stairs rather than taking the elevator. Park the car at the end of the parking lot rather than by the office door. Walk faster when you go to the mall - and walk right by the cookie vendor!

If this seems too slow to work, consider that most experts recommend a goal of losing about a pound a week. Reducing your intake by only 500 calories per day will achieve this goal, since a total reduction of 3,500 calories is needed to lose one pound of fat.

Next week, more ideas for painless weight loss and healthier eating habits.

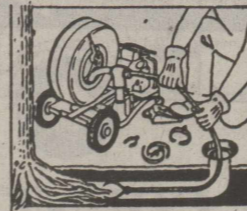

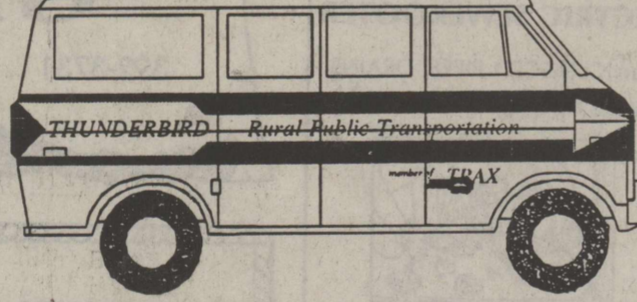
