Jacoby chosen to direct WCREC

Pete W. Jacoby Jr. has been chosen by a search committee to be the next director at the University of Nebraska West Central Research and

Extension Center.

Mr. Jacoby, currently a professor and interim resident of research at Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Vernon, was selected from a field of 32 candidates, according to search committee chairman Dick Clark, ag economist at WCREC.

Clark said Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources Vice Chancellor Irv Omtvedt approved the committee's selection of Jacoby, and he is scheduled to begin work April 1, pending approval by the University Board of Regents at its March meeting.

Clark said the search committee, which included members of the

WCREC staff, extension agents and community representatives, interviewed three prospects for the position.

"We recommended Dr. Jacoby for the position because of his experience as an interim director of an operation somewhat similar to what we have here, his excellent academic record, and he exhibited the kind of quality in managing people the committee was looking for," Clark said.

Mr. Jacoby and his wife, Pattie, are the parents of two sons, J.D. who is a senior at Texas A&M, and Jim who is a sophomore at Texas A&M College of Canyon. Mr. Jacoby is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Jacoby of Ozona.

GTE donates \$800 to Museum fund

G.T.E. recently gave \$800 to the building fund for the new Crockett County Museum according to Mrs. Geniece Childress, museum director.

Mrs. Lucille Harrell, vice-president of the Crockett County Historical Commission and secretary of the Historical Society, made application for the grant last December. "We were presented the \$800 check Thursday, Feb. 11, by Jimmie Trojeck, local manager of mid-West Texas division, through the help of Gilbert Montez, public affairs manager, and David Gonzales of G.T.E.," stated Mrs. Childress.

The funds will be matched by the Historical Society and used to help build a new museum emphasizing and educating about the ranching industry in Crockett County.

"We are indeed grateful for the loyal support of G.T.E. to the museum and to the community," said Mrs. Childress. "We know that the new museum will be a credit to the county." The museum, located beneath the courthouse annex on Hwy. 290, is open every Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. It may be seen on Sundays by appointment.

Hazardous chemical leak contained

Hazardous chemicals leaking from two drums inside a North American Van Lines truck resulted in a temporary shutdown of Circle Bar 76 Truck Corral Saturday night. The leak was discovered by Lance Patrick Flynn, driver of the vehicle, during a routine inspection of the truck.

The leaking Alkyl Dithiophosphate solution being shipped by Phillips Mining Chemicals from Sahuarita, AZ, to Houston was contained by a sand dike, the immediate area evacuated and access to the truck stop restricted until an emergency response team could arrive from Big Spring.

Cleanup operations by a team from Fina Oil and Chemical involved removing 10 drums of the material from the truck before they could re-

move the two leaking drums. The worst drum was placed in a containment drum and the material from the second drum was pumped into a new drum and sealed. Vinegar was used to neutralize the material that had leaked in the floor of the trailer. Sand was used to cover the area and was later picked up and placed in the containment drum.

The material will be delivered to Phillips Mining Chemicals of Houston and disposed of by their hazardous materials team.

Department of Public Safety troopers Junior Bilano and Dale Burger investigated the incident. Others assisting at the scene were Game Warden Chuck Cosper and personnel from the Ozona Fire Department and Crockett County Sheriff's Office.

Students express appreciation to board members

Members of the Ozona School Board were presented with an early St. Valentine's Day "treat" during their monthly meeting last Wednesday evening when three members of the Ozona Intermediate School faculty appeared before the open forum portion of the meeting to express their appreciation and their students' appreciation for the boards' support of the Accelerated Reader program, the purchase of a videodisc science program, school classroom computers, and other educational items this year.

Susie Childress, Terri Faught, and Vicki Stokes presented the board with a collection of "thank you" valentines

which were a part of a class writing project concerning writing appreciation letters for new and interesting educational programs at the school. Following the presentation of the valentines, Mrs. Stokes, on behalf of all the teachers at the school, presented a progress report on the Accelerated Reader program which was started in October. The report made note of the fact that in the 1991-92 school year, there were 6,263 books checked out of the school library, but there was no reliable method of knowing if all of them were completely read by the students. "Up to this date, February 9, 1993, the students have read and the

teachers know they have read, 6,172 books," Stokes said. "This is an average of 28.7 books per student that have been read, and they have been tested on. These are accelerated reader books only, and this does not include other library books checked out.

"We have had four assemblies to give awards. So far, 189 children out of the 215 students have earned at least 10 points. Forty-eight students have earned above 75 points. All students are participating, and we even have non-English speakers translating books to read.

Ozona High School's newly formed rodeo club will help sponsor an added money barrel race at the Crockett County arena Feb. 20 and 21 and March 6 and 7. Rodeo team boosters will also be sponsors of the event which is sanctioned by Tex-Mex Barrel Racing Association.

Barrel classes include: Exhibition - Green -50-150-250-500-1500-Open-8 and Under. Added money will be paid in the 1500-Open-8 and Under. Pole bending classes include: Exhibition-Novice-Open-8 and Under.

Total of added money is guaranteed to be at least \$100 per day with

additional added money probable. Pay back will be determined by the number of entries in each class.

OHS members must be in compliance with state law regarding grades

and credit requirements and rules of the State Board of Education. Any member not passing will be ineligible to compete as part of the team in National High School Rodeo competition until deficiencies are corrected.

All members of the OHSRC must have joined the National and State High School Rodeo Associations. No team member or individual will participate in any rodeo activity without a properly executed release whereby Crockett County Consolidated School District, sponsor, supervisors, stock contractors, or any other persons who may be deemed liable are properly released. Members must follow the athletic department guidelines relating to alcohol/drug use.

In order for a member of the OHS Rodeo Club to be awarded a letter and/or jacket, he/she must participate in a minimum of 50 percent of the NHSRA competitions during the school year as a team member designated by the club sponsor, and earn 30 points in an event. Points can be accumulated beginning in the ninth grade and extending through the 12th grade.

Competitions for Region II, which includes Ozona, will be March 13-14 in Crane, March 20-21 in Sonora, March 27-28 in Odessa and April 3-4 in Andrews. Regional finals will be in San Angelo on April 17.

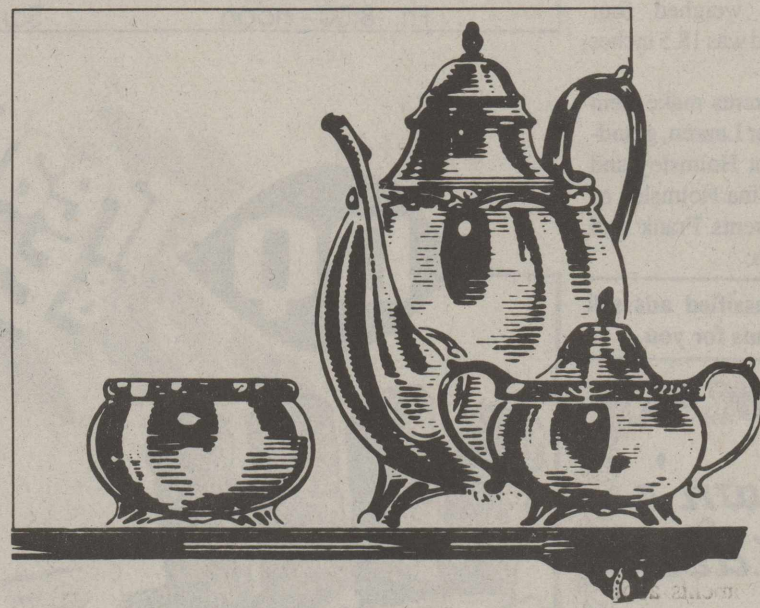

EXTENTION CONNECTION

Five a day - easier than you think!

Did anyone see the recent popular cartoon "Cathy" and the takeoff on the new food pyramid introduced last fall by the U. S. Department of Agriculture? It seems that by the time Cathy followed the pyramid's recommended daily food intake and the rule to drink eight glasses of water per day, she was in dire need of the ladies' room!

In reality, it may not be that hard to follow the new guidelines, such as the "Five a Day" program regarding fruits and vegetables.

The 5 a day program is the first nationwide health promotion, sponsored by the National Cancer Institute, to focus on the positive role of fruit and vegetable consumption in reducing the risk of cancer and other chronic diseases.

The slogan, "5 a day - for Better Health" provides consumers with a clear, understandable message that can easily be incorporated into their lifestyles.

The goal of the program is for Americans to increase fruit and vegetable consumption to five servings a day by the year 2000. One serving is 1/2 cup of fruit, 3/4 cup juice, 1/2 cup cooked vegetables, one cup leafy vegetables or 1/4 cup dried fruit.

Five main points to remember are:

- Eat five servings of fruit and vegetables a day.
- Eat at least one vitamin A rich selection every day.
- Eat at least one vitamin C rich selection every day.
- Eat at least one high fiber selection every day.
- Eat cabbage family (cruciferous) vegetables several times a week.

Some suggested ways of incorporating more fruits and vegetables into the family diet are add sliced bananas or strawberries to your cereal, top pancakes with fruit instead of syrup, add zucchini, carrot or celery sticks to your brown bag lunch or lettuce, sprouts and tomatoes to your sandwich, snack on dried fruit, use fruits to garnish main dishes, top frozen yogurt with fresh fruit and add chopped fruit or berries to muffins,

cakes and cookies.

Fruits and vegetables without added fats have no cholesterol and almost all are naturally low in calories, fat and sodium. Some are good sources of other nutrients such as folacin, potassium and calcium. Fruits and vegetables also help promote a healthy digestive tract and may lower your risk of cancer.

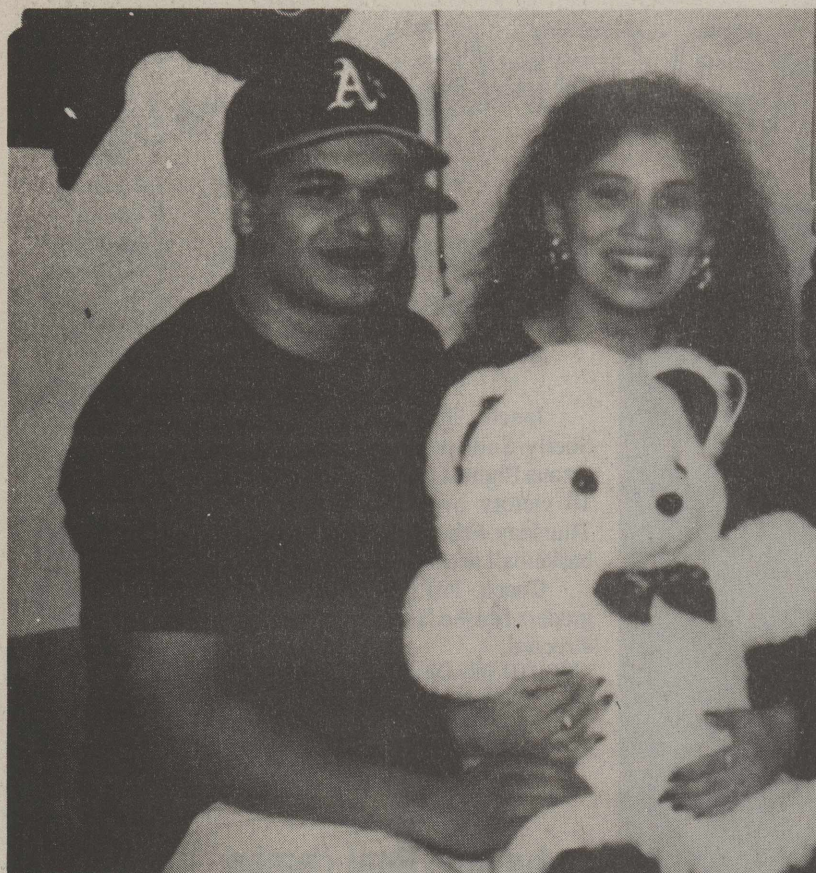

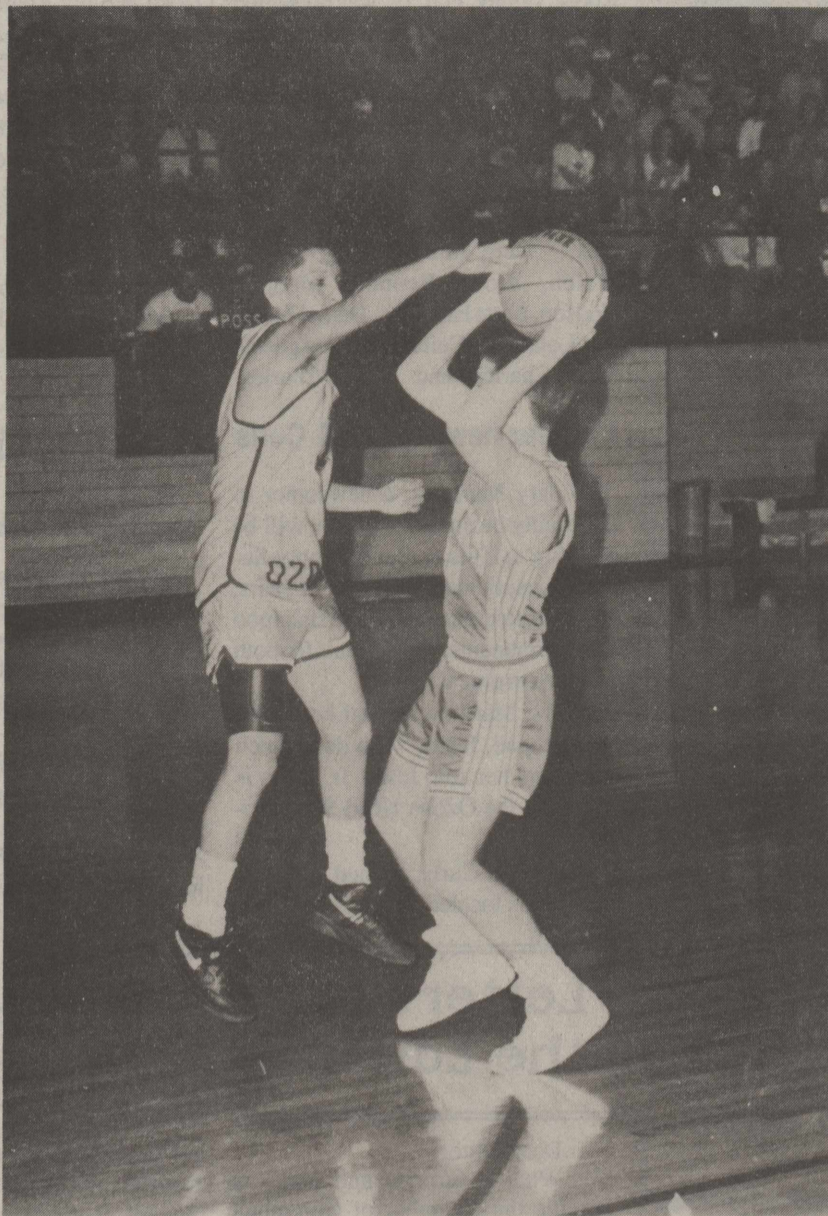

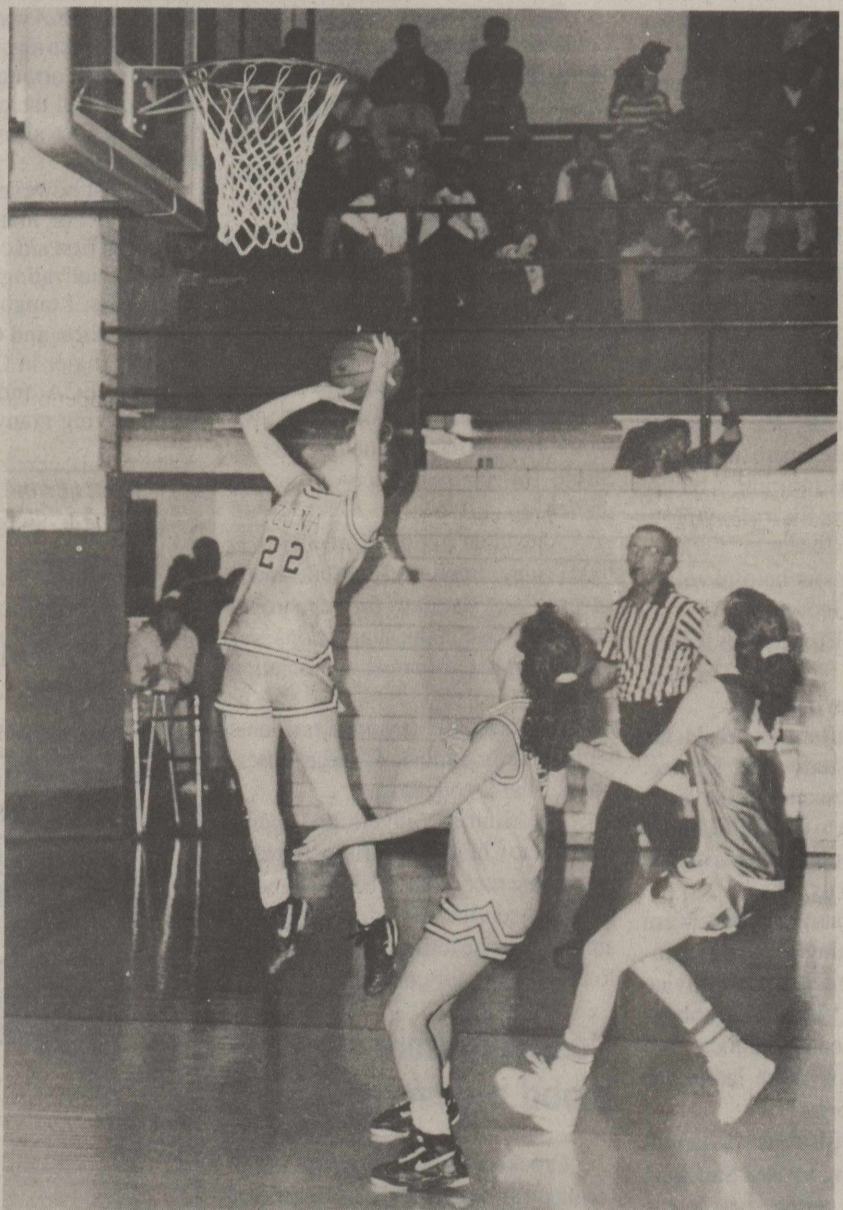

Free tax assistance in our community through VITA

Lower-income working families may be eligible for government checks of up to \$2,211 from the Internal Revenue Service.

IRS employee Dawn Sanders said volunteers in an IRS sponsored community program known as the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program will provide free tax help that includes determining if a family qualifies for government refunds through the earned-income tax credit program. "If a family made less than \$22,370 in 1992, they may qualify for the earned-income credit", Sanders said.

VITA volunteers have gone through special IRS sponsored training and are qualified to assist taxpayers with basic tax questions involving filing status, dependent exemptions, tax-credits, and itemized deductions. VITA volunteers can also prepare 1040EZ, 1040A and basic form 1040 for taxpayers. "VITA volunteers do

not handle complicated tax returns nor answer questions outside the scope of their expertise," Sanders said.

A VITA site will be located in Ozona on Thursday, Feb. 18, at the Ozona Senior Apartments meeting room from 10:30 until 12:30.

"Taxpayers going to a VITA site should bring this year's tax package received in the mail, W-2s, information on any other income and expenses, and a copy of last year's income tax return if available, Sanders added. Additional information about VITA sites is available by contacting Janet Hill at 392-2533.

During the report, Stokes thanked volunteers Helen Bean, Shawn Mitchell, Jane Richardson, Sally Roane, Luann Pierce, Matilda Camarillo, Diane Martinez, Mabel Hernandez, Isabel Ybarra, Patty Davis, Debbie Bangeman, Tracy Preddy, Pam Tarr, Karen Bishop, Irma Sanchez, Gwin Jamerson, and Mrs. Lupe Alvarez for their work in establishing the program. "These ladies accumulated many, many volunteer hours, starting with laminating covers, placing contact paper on all soft cover books, checking each book through (test number, level, points, color code, succession number, price, gluing cards, etc.) and helping kids get started with the program. Many are still putting in hours in the library helping kids check out books, work the computers, keeping bookshelves in order, decorating the library, and whatever needs to be done in order to keep things rolling."

Also receiving special recognition were the sponsors of the reading program. They are Dairy Queen of Ozona, Perry Ranch, Weir-Perry Kennel, Perry Motors, J.W. Motor Parts, Amax Oil and Gas, Ozona Lions Club, Crockett County National Bank, Ozona National Bank, Beth Smith, Ozona Storage, West Texas Utilities, David and Helen Bean, Wade and Jane Richardson, NatGas, James Cleo Thompson, and Sara Highnight. "These sponsors have contributed

money, candy, prizes, food, contact paper, a computer and printer, and many other items to make the program a success," she said.

During the meeting the trustees reviewed third, seventh and eleventh grade Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) results from the first semester of school. In the third grade, 72% of the students passed the writing test, 80% passed the reading test, and 91% passed the mathematics test. Student scaled scores (statistical conversions of the number of items correctly answered by students) were 1611 in writing, 1629 in reading, and 1728 in math.

In the seventh grade, 68% of the students passed writing, 41% passed reading, and 42% passed mathematics. Scaled scores included writing (1594), reading (1468), and math (1475). At the eleventh (exit) level, 91% passed writing, 65% passed reading, and 43% passed math. Scaled scores included writing (1706), reading (1616), and math (1516).

Statewide third grade results indicated 60% of Texas students passed the TAAS writing test, 79% passed reading, and 84% passed mathematics. Scaled scores were 1573 in writing, 1654 in reading, and 1667 in math. Seventh grade state results indicated that 68% passed writing, 51% passed reading, and 51% passed math. Scaled scores for the seventh grade were 1610 in writing, 1493 in reading, and 1507 in math.

Texas results for 183,567 eleventh grade students revealed that 83% passed writing, 76% passed reading,

and 60% passed mathematics. Scaled scores included writing (1672), reading (1633), and math (1559).

While local passing scores on TAAS when compared to state results were somewhat mixed (four were above the state, four were below the state, and one was even with the state), the report also indicated that Ozona tests a higher percentage of economically disadvantaged students than does the state as a whole, and this can be a significant factor in test results. An economically disadvantaged student is one who is eligible for free or reduced lunches according to family income.

In the third grade, 50% of the students were economically disadvantaged, and this compares to a statewide percentage of 41%. 45% of the local students in the seventh grade were economically disadvantaged, and 35% statewide were in this category. At the eleventh grade level, 23% of the students across Texas were economically disadvantaged, and on the local level, this figure was 46%.

Cafeteria bids for the second semester of school were awarded to Ben E. Keith Company, McLane Food Service, Sysco Food Service, M&M Packing Company, Decoty Foods, and Mrs. Rios Products, and the school board approved a request from Pete Maldonado for the use of Lions Stadium for the West Texas Masters Track

Meet on July 10, 1993. Proceeds from this event will be used for worthy causes in Crockett County.

Administrative contracts for Manley Holmes, John Curry, and Ted Cotton were extended through the 1994-95 school year, as was the contract of Don Payne, head football coach and athletic director. Tom Humber, a new principal in Ozona Middle School this year, received a contract extension through the 1993-94 school year. Ozona Primary School Principal Walter Spiller requested that his contract not be extended past the 1993-94 school term because he plans to retire at that time.

The trustees also approved a position, effective next year, for an additional high school mathematics teacher who will be responsible for teaching secondary mathematics and coordinating the elementary and secondary math programs.
