Lemmons service pending in San Angelo

Dr. Maurice Aaron Lemmons died Feb. 15, 1993, at 3:30 p.m. in San Angelo. He was of the Jewish religion and a member of Temple Beth Israel

of San Angelo. Maurice was the first of six children born to Blanche Ulshen and Benjamin David Lemmons. Ben, a Russian immigrant who came to the United States by the way of Galveston, survived the 1900 Galveston flood by floating days in the Gulf. He later married Blanche Ulshen of New York in El Paso where Maurice was born on Dec. 9, 1920.

A merchant by trade, Ben followed the prosperous Texas oil boom and moved his family to Rochester, finally settling in Ozona in 1928 and opening Lemmons Dry Good Store. The store serviced all of West Texas until the 1950s.

Maurice's love for flying began early in Ozona and by age 16 he had his pilot's license. He continued his flying at Ragsdale Field in Austin where he graduated from the University of Texas. He was a member of Sigma Alpha Mu Fraternity.

Upon graduation, Maurice was a natural candidate to enter World War II as a United States Air Force pilot. After service to his country in the South Pacific he returned to continue his education. He married Eve Katherine Hoagland in 1946.

In 1949, Maurice graduated from Northern Illinois College of Optometry where he had served as president of his graduating class. Two children were born to Maurice and Eve, Laurel Dianne Lemmons and Benjamin David


He was preceded in death by his wife in 1954 and his daughter, Laurel Dianne, in 1975.


