Airport Improvement Plan Back On Track

Interested Crockett County citizens, businessmen, pilots, Judge Kathryn Mayfield and several commissioners met Friday with Texas Department of Transportation officials John Greer, airport facility engineer, and Bruce Ehly, airport facilities planner, to hear updated information and discussion concerning the future improvement of the airport.

Approximately three years ago West Texas Consultants, a Midland engineering firm, was hired with grant money by the county to do an engineering study and airport layout plan to be submitted to the Federal Aviation Administration for their approval. This plan, which was not complete, did not meet FAA standards and was discarded.

Bruce Ehly stated that a new airport layout plan report, which will be drawn up through the department, will be filed by September 1, 1993, and will cost approximately \$10,000 to \$20,000 depending on possible construction of a new and longer runway with change in direction. Of this

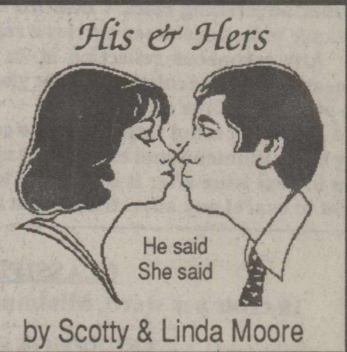
amount, 90 percent will be funded by the state and 10 percent by the county. The current 5-year-plan has construction beginning in 1996 with final approval coming in May 1993.

Possible alternatives covered in the discussion were rebuilding and widening the existing runway with larger turnarounds at the ends, or building an entirely new longer runway in a slightly more northerly direction with 600 foot clear ways at each end and a 30,000 pound aircraft weight limit. If the plan calls for a longer runway, more land will be required on the north end, and landowner James Cleo Thompson has agreed to donate what ever is needed to carry out this plan.

Other improvements included either a Loran C or GPS approach system, three-way intensity lighting system to conserve energy and two-parallel taxi-ways which could be added later on.

Department engineer Bruce Ehly warned that if a new runway is constructed and rotated to a more northerly direction several of the existing hangers will have to be moved.

Cost of construction will be divided between the FAA, state and

Randall Borrego and Amber Tarr placed in the top three of their divisions at the state Knights of Columbus free-throw contest held March 20 in Austin.

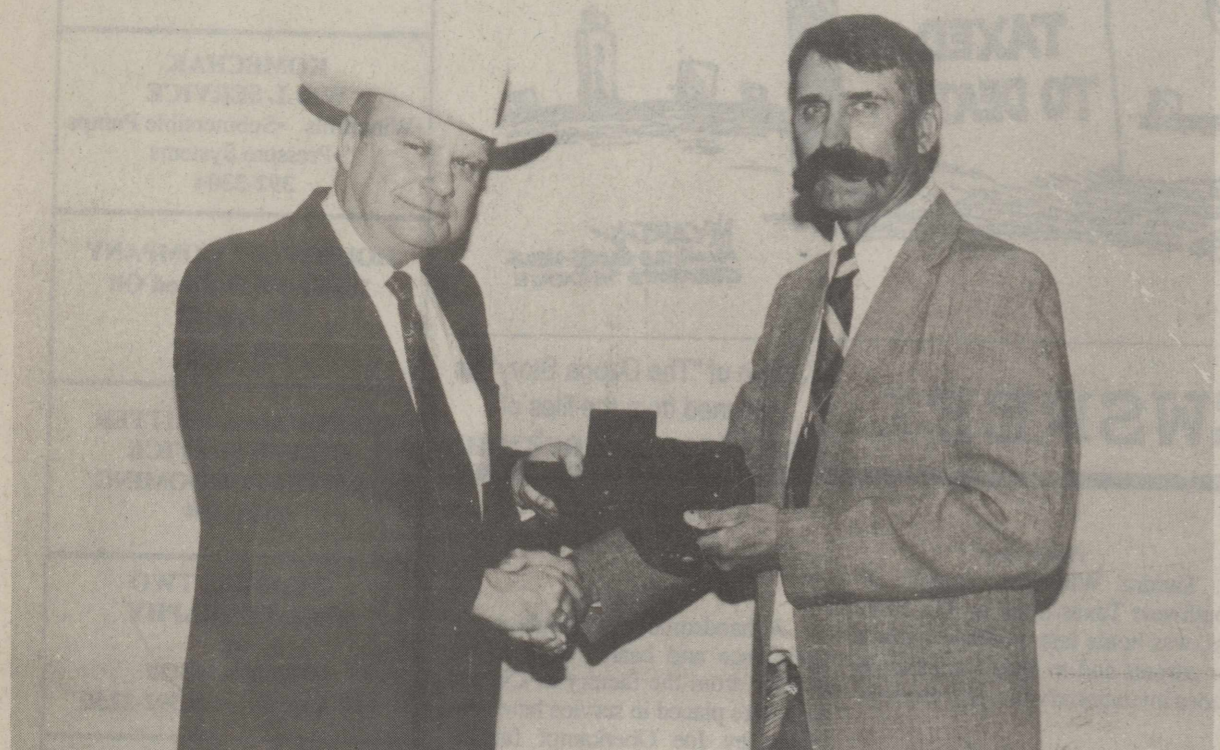

Henderson Recognized As Outstanding Conservation Rancher For 1992

Sonny Henderson was recognized by the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District as the Outstanding Conservation Rancher for 1992 at an awards banquet held in San Angelo on April 25.

Mr. Henderson has been a district cooperator for 34 years and has continuously carried out an excellent overall ranch program to improve both livestock and rangeland. His livestock operation consists of cattle, sheep and goats. This diversification allows

for more efficient use of existing forages and along with proper stocking, enhances range improvement.

Grazing management and brush control have been the highest priority for Mr. Henderson. Deferred rotation grazing systems along with switch-back grazing systems have been initiated on the 5400 acres which he ranches. Aerial spraying, chaining and tree-doing have been carried out extensively for the control of mes-

quite, juniper and pricklypear and regrowth brush has been kept under control by individual plant treatment with herbicides.

Crossfences, water storage facilities, pipelines and troughs have all been constructed to facilitate planned grazing systems and to improve livestock distribution.

"The dedication and effort Henderson has put into the improvement and conservation of the range resources speaks for itself," said district conservationist Vaden Aldridge. "The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District would like to congratulate Sonny for his work in the maintenance and improvement of our rangeland resources. The district is proud to recognize him as this year's Outstanding Conservation Rancher."

Rep. Bonilla Coming To Discuss Wool Act

WASHINGTON- Congressman Henry Bonilla (R-TX-23) is traveling to wool and mohair country next week. The Congressman's trip to the region will come in the wake of Administration budget cutting measures. One, specifically aimed at attacking the wool and mohair industry, would have a tremendous negative impact on many communities in District 23.

A United States Senate Bill, S.B. 477, designed to terminate the Wool Act has been introduced by Sen. Russell Feingold, who sits on the Senate Agriculture Committee. Feingold estimates several million dollars can be trimmed from the federal budget if his bill is passed.

Due to this economically devastating proposal which targets mohair incentive payments, Congressman Bonilla has asked for members of the wool and mohair industry, as well as locally elected officials, to meet with him to discuss this critical issue.

The Congressman points out that the industry helps to employ some 15,000 people in the United States and that wool and mohair are the dominate industries in this region of Texas.

"Over 80% of the mohair produced in Texas comes from my district. Clearly, the wool and mohair industry is of vital economic importance to this state and any attempt to cut incentive payments to producers will only cost the region jobs," said Bonilla.

"Producers of wool and mohair expect their Congressman to advocate wasteful spending cuts to help balance the federal deficit, and this I'll do. But I won't do it on the backs of farming and ranching," said Bonilla.

Congressman Bonilla will address this issue during meetings in Rocksprings, Sonora and Ozona on Wednesday, April 7. The Ozona meeting will begin at 3:15 p.m. in the Crockett Room, next to the Ozona National Bank.

To promote collaboration between ECOP (Extension Committee On Programming), ES-USDA (Extension Service - United States Department of Agriculture), off-campus/campus faculty and Extension administrators.

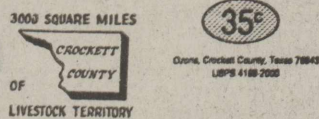

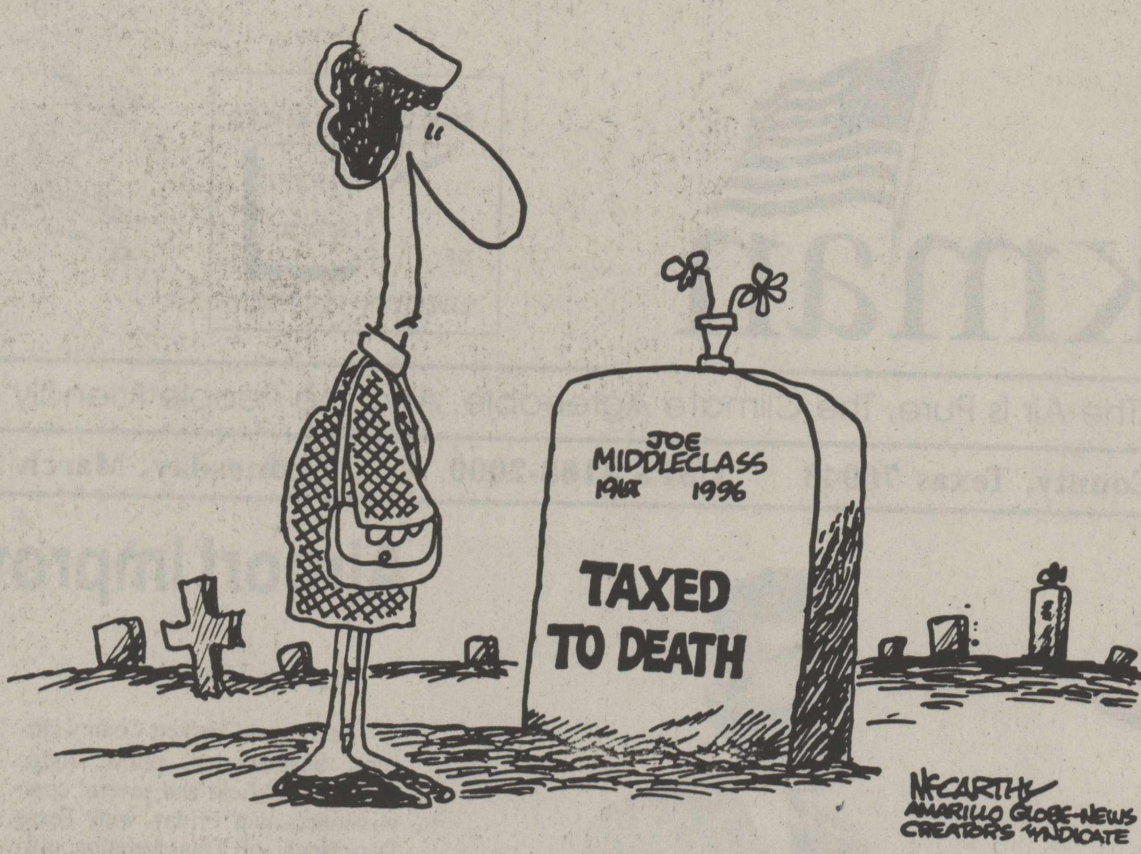

county with 90 percent coming from the FAA, five percent from the state and five percent from the county. The county's portion would include the donated value of the land which would easily more than cover the five percent.

James Cleo Thompson stated, "more companies with larger aircraft would come into Ozona, but don't because of weight and length restrictions of our present runway." He also pointed out that, "The economic impact losses to Ozona and Crockett County have been tremendous due to these restrictions of our present airport."

Questions were asked about the deteriorating runway service and what could be done about it within the time frame before construction starts in 1996. Ehly said that the old runway needs to be swept and surface treated with fog seal at an approximate cost of 25-30¢ per square yard or 10¢ per square if the county furnishes the materials.

TDH Behavioral Survey Shows Health Risks Texans Take

When it comes to the risks they take Texans differ from the U.S. population, according to a report by the Texas Department of Health (TDH).

They are more likely to drive after drinking (5 percent of Texans, compared to 2 percent nationally) but also are more likely to use their seat belts (95 percent, compared to 88 percent nationally).

Texans are only slightly less likely to be smokers (22 percent v. 23 percent), but dramatically more of them lack health insurance (22 percent, compared to 15 percent nationally). Many Texans (15 percent) said they could not afford medical care.

Roger Diamond, of the TDH Public Health Promotion Division, said that the annual Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance (BRFS) report helps to measure the state's progress toward certain health objectives for the year 2000.

"In addition," Diamond said, "the survey results identify needs for which Texas' public health programs can be adapted. Combined with similar studies in other states, the BRFS contributes to an over-all health appraisal for the nation."

Conducted annually, the TDH survey asks randomly selected Texans about their lifestyles. The questionnaire includes such factors as seat belt usage, physical activity, weight, cholesterol levels, tobacco and alcohol use, mammograms, health care and AIDS prevention.

Of the 1,499 respondents to the 1991 questionnaire, about one fourth were overweight, and more than half had sedentary lifestyles, both of which increase risk of heart disease.

However, 60 percent of the 1991

threats, but kept entrusting Himself to Him who judges righteously" (1 Peter 2:23).

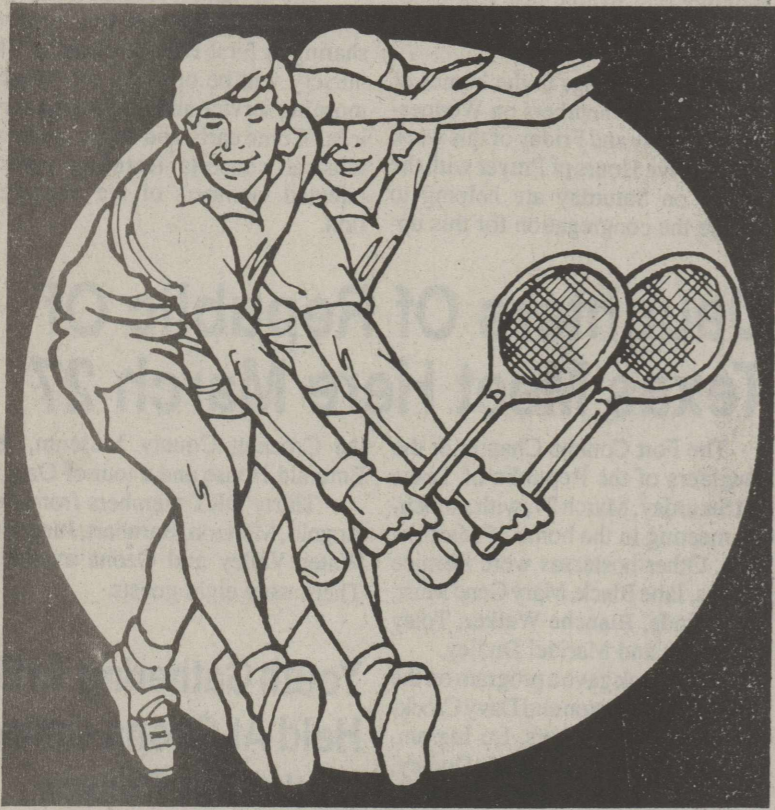

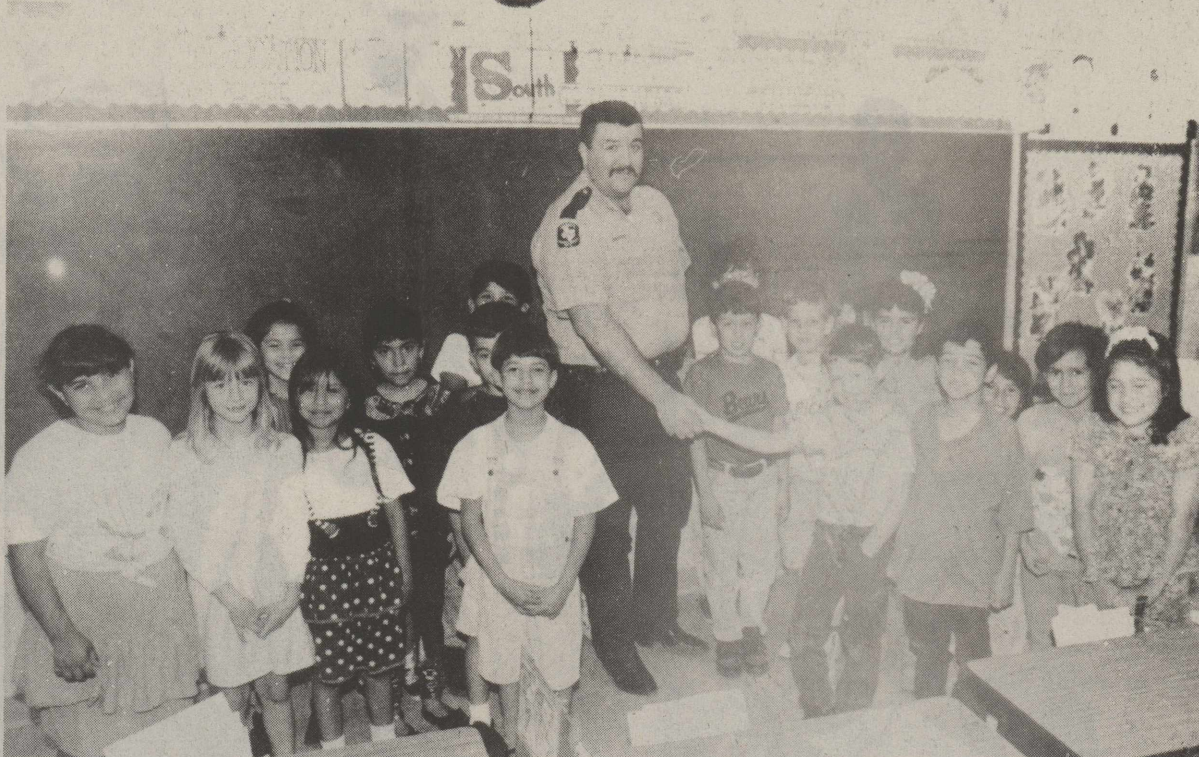
Every child and teacher is involved in trying to reach the eighth station by reading 120 books to win a gold medal. A total of 18 students have already reached this goal and are still going around the world.

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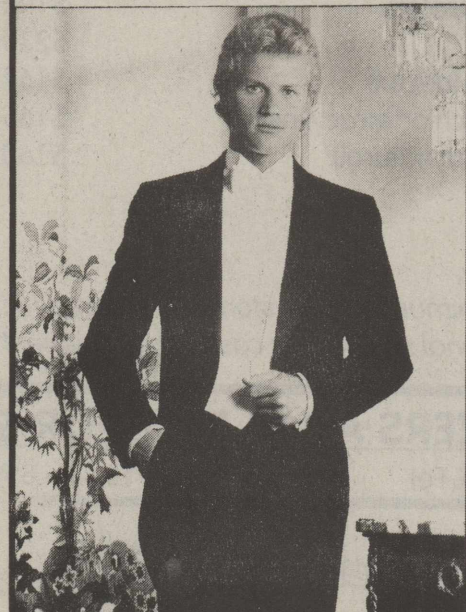

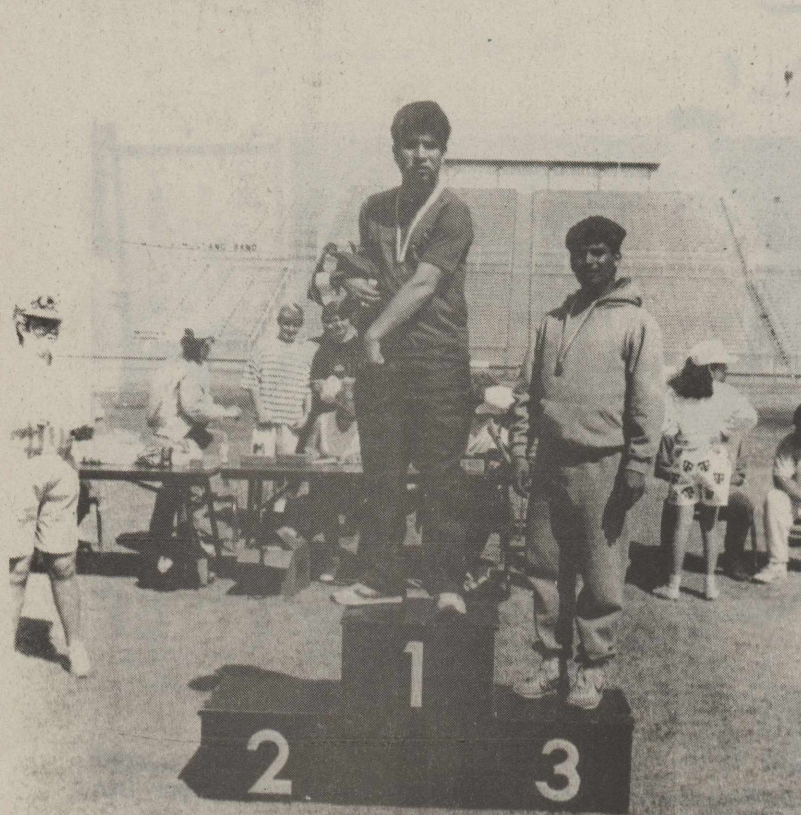

Safe Disposal Of Household Cleaners

With all our concentration on recycling and waste reduction, let's not forget a potential source of pollutants in the U.S. today - household cleaners. Using products up is, of course, the best way to answer the disposal question. If you can't use it up, find someone to give the product to who can use it. If these two options aren't possible, proper disposal is a must.

The first step in safe disposal of household chemicals is to read the label. Some may require special handling and must be treated as hazardous waste. Fortunately, however, most may be disposed of the same way they're used.

Water-soluble products, which are used or rinsed with water for cleaning, can be poured down the drain. This includes all-purpose cleaners, bleaches, dishwashing and laundry products, toilet bowl cleaners and water-based metal polishes and cleaners. Be sure and run the water when discarding. You can even dispose of water-soluble aerosol products such as spray starches or tub/tile cleaners by spraying them down the drain with running water.

One important warning when disposing of or using cleaners - never mix cleaning products, since certain combinations can release dangerous gases or even explode.

With down-the-drain disposal, these cleaning products will end up at a municipal sewage treatment plant or

in a household septic system, both of which are equipped to safely handle them. Water-soluble cleaning products are formulated to be treated in these systems and then safely released into the environment.

Items which require special handling include solid cleaning products - soap bars, rinse agents, soap pads and towelettes. They may be disposed of in the trash. Solvent-based products, however, require more care. These are the items that are not mixed or rinsed with water, and include spot removers, some metal and furniture cleaners, and any product labeled as flammable.

Some communities - ours is one - have regulations and guidelines for handling hazardous household waste. For special instructions, contact the Crockett County Water Department. Again, the best disposal is to use the chemical yourself or give it to someone who will.

For a list of safe guidelines for disposing of household cleaning products, you can call the Crockett County Extension Office. The list has been developed by the Soap and Detergent Association and it is free of charge to anyone who's interested. Call us at 392-2721 or come by our office, located on the second floor of the Courthouse Annex.

Remember, don't let your "spring cleaning" become a hazard to the environment; dispose of your household cleaners safely and correctly.

Amoco, Exxon, Lead Top Ten State Oil and Gas Producers

Railroad Commission statistics show Amoco and Exxon to be the top oil and gas producers, respectively, in Texas for 1992, Commission Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent announced last week.

Amoco led all oil producers for the period with an average daily production of 140,980 barrels, some 8.42 percent of all oil produced in the state. Exxon Corp. took second place with an average daily production rate of 111,767 barrels, some 6.67 percent of total state production. Other companies in the top ten included Shell Western E&P Inc., 79,691 bpd (barrels per day), third; Texaco E&P Inc., 75,809 bpd, fourth; Mobil Producing TX & N.M. Inc., 63,656 bpd, fifth; Chevron USA Inc., 59,625 bpd, sixth; Marathon Oil Company, 58,278 bpd, seventh; Amerada Hess Corp., 51,762 bpd, eighth; Union Pacific Resources Company, 45,002 bpd, ninth; and Oryx Energy Company, 36,804 bpd, tenth.

Nugent said Exxon Corp. was the top Texas gas producer for the period, averaging 652,124 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) per day which represented a 5.77 percent of total state production. Mobil Producing TX & N.M. Inc. was second, averaging 634,175 Mcf per day, or 5.61 percent of all gas produced in the state. Other companies included TransAmerican Natural Gas Corp., 494,323 Mcf, third; Shell Western E&P Inc., 478,544 Mcf, fourth; Texaco E&P Inc., 410,140 Mcf, fifth; Phillips Petroleum Company, 341,397 Mcf, sixth; Enron Oil & Gas Company, 336,633 Mcf, seventh; Chevron USA Inc., 333,914 Mcf, eighth; Amoco Production Company, 268,103 Mcf, ninth; and Pennzoil Exploration & Prod. Company, 249,534 Mcf, tenth.

County Landfill Coverup Completed

Crockett County's two new dump trucks have accumulated 15,000 miles since their arrival Nov. 10. And most of those miles are from the 13-mile round trip from a pit north of the cemetery to the landfill.

The trucks have hauled 27,380 cubic yards of material to cover the landfill with 18 inches of fill dirt and six inches of topsoil as part of the closure process. Now that the required amount of fill and topsoil has been placed at the landfill, the site must pass an inspection by a representative of the Texas Water Commission.

After the inspection, the soil will be seeded with several types of Bermuda grass.

Cardiovascular Diseases Remain Number One Cause of Death

Someone dies from cardiovascular disease every 34 seconds.

Since 1980, heart attack and stroke deaths have steadily declined according to a report from the American Heart Association, Texas Cardiovascular Death Statistics. However, these and other cardiovascular diseases remain the number one cause of death.

In 1991, 51,710 deaths in Texas were caused by heart and blood vessel diseases. Total deaths from cardiovascular diseases has dropped from 41.4% in 1990 to 40.9% in 1991.

The cardiovascular related deaths

were broken down as follows: Hypertension--2,278; Coronary heart disease "Heart Attack"--25,701; Rheumatic--218; Stroke--8,399; Other diseases of arteries--1,332; Other diseases of endocardium--638; Atherosclerosis--1,140; All other forms--12,004.

In Crockett County in 1991 six of the 29 deaths recorded were cardiovascular related. This represented 20.69% of the county deaths. In 1986 there were 21 cardiovascular related deaths of the 41 deaths recorded. This represented 51.2% of the county deaths were cardiovascular related that year.

Capitol Comments
by **BOB TURNER**

Health care and related issues are receiving major attention during this session of the Texas Legislature. It is my opinion that health care cost, availability and health insurance affordability are some of the most important issues facing Texas at this time. Governor Richards, along with several House and Senate members, have introduced bills that should provide better access and affordability for small employer/employee groups. The Governor's plan creates a statewide group purchasing cooperative, which would provide a larger number of persons with health insurance, and make negotiating price more effective with insurance companies, plus, providing a larger total group to share the costs of the few insured who have major and costly health problems. One of the major issues that is being debated in the Governor's plan, as well as most of the others that have been introduced, is the aspect of guaranteeing insurability. This means that even if someone has a terminal illness, the insurance company could not turn them down for insurance coverage if they applied and paid their premium. Many of us feel that with guaranteed insurability no one would feel it important to buy health insurance until they get sick and need it, thus, making the insurer group have more and more sick clients, and less and less well clients, which would increase the cost of coverage drastically in a very short period of time. It is a known fact that some individuals do not have health insurance through choice. Their priorities in life are such that they had rather have a newer car - larger boat - or better home, than to spend their money on a health insurance premium.

amount of time being spent in committees and subcommittee meetings and conferences. In addition to spending the time required in our assigned legislative committees, and these meetings last often until 9 or 10 P.M., we must also make presentations of our own legislation before other committees, which can consume hours. In the Agriculture Committee, one of my two committee assignments, we have passed out legislation in the past week that will expand the financing capability of the Texas Department of Agriculture's lending capability for agriculture and ag-related enterprises. This would add value to the agricultural products that we grow in Texas. This piece of legislation will be heard in the full Texas House in the next week or so and will be of great assistance to rural communities, such as those in the 73rd District.

A number of pieces of legislation are pending that do all sorts of things - from how local counties determine what county officials they will have - to the squabble over the expansion of the DFW Airport. Trucking deregulation is a major topic of discussion with both a Senate and House bill being introduced that will deregulate trucking within the State of Texas. It is felt by those proposing the legislation that there will be more competition if the permitting and control system currently in place in the trucking industry, which is operated by the Railroad Commission, is eliminated. Those who oppose this deregulation stress that this would likely be a shortlived reduction in rates until all the smaller, and newer truckers would go broke and go out of business because they priced their services too low. The detractors give the deregulation of airlines in the U.S. as a prime example, stressing how many of the carriers have gone broke since they were deregulated and stress the fact that all but one or two of the airlines are in deep financial trouble and fewer and fewer airlines remain in business at all. This is because deregulation allowed them to set prices for fares

A reception was held in the Capitol for the U.S. Surgeon General, Dr. Antonia Norello, this past Tuesday. She was in Texas for a number of speaking engagements, and spent a couple of hours visiting with us State Legislators in the Capitol. The new Surgeon General will play a major role in any national health care reform, and she discussed the various possibilities briefly with those of us who took time to visit with her. A few days earlier, a delegation from the nation of Ghana in West Africa were guests in the House Chamber. Discussions with these Ghanaian representatives was a very enlightening experience, relating to their country's philosophy and challenges.

The pace in the Legislature is getting unbearably fast with a large

and the price competitiveness, which made the fares lower and lower, has damaged the industry. Most issues are just as complex as this, in that there is no clear-cut good or bad or right way, versus wrong way to vote on so many of the issues facing the Legislature.

During the past week we have had a large number of individuals and groups from the district visit the Legislature, my staff and I. A cross section of farmers - realtors - school groups - truckers - nursing home/long term care providers - health care professionals - just to name a few, have visited and shared their concerns with us. This is extremely important, in view of the fact that there are such a tremendous number of different bills. We need your help in keeping us informed on those issues that come up that have an impact on you, your business or your profession.

In closing I want to mention a prime example of what a seemingly simple act of government can cost the tax payers of the state. This was exhibited in the determination last session of the Legislature to change the name of the "Texas Department of Health (TDH)" to become the "Texas Department of Public Health (TDPH)". Comptroller Sharp, in his newest effort to restructure state government (against the grain) had discovered that this simple name change would cost tax payers of Texas approximately \$162,000.00 over the next two year period. This, of course, included highway signs at facilities over the state - office supplies, printing changes - and etc. This week the House passed SB 372 by Senator Bivins that will repeal that change in name for the agency, and make this saving possible. All the bill lacks to become a law at this time is the Governor's signature.

Texas Traffic Fatalities Decline in 1992

Traffic accidents killed fewer people in Texas during 1992 than in any other year since 1974, according to figures compiled by the Texas Department of Public Safety. Traffic deaths have declined during each of the past four years.

Last year, 2,690 fatal traffic accidents claimed 3,057 lives - a 0.7 percent reduction from the 3,079 deaths in 1991.

"Although we are pleased that there has been a decrease in the number of traffic deaths, we are still concerned about the number of lives lost because of traffic accidents," DPS Director Col. James R. Wilson said. "Some of those deaths could have been avoided if motorists and their passengers had adhered to our traffic laws."

Of the traffic fatalities in 1992, 40 percent (1,222) were killed in alcohol or drug related accidents, a decrease from the 40.6 percent in 1991. Nearly 65 percent of all people killed in the front seats of passenger cars and light trucks were not wearing safety belts, and approximately 24 percent of the 134 fatally injured motorcyclists were not wearing helmets.

work hard to maintain a downward trend in traffic fatalities," Wilson said. "The combination of legislation and increased societal pressure against drinking and driving, along with the increased use of safety belts, child safety seats and helmets by motorcycle riders will help law enforcement agencies keep our streets and highways safe."

The state's death rate, 1.9 deaths per 100 million miles traveled, remained the same as in 1991. The Texas Department of Transportation reported that 162,769 billion vehicle miles were traveled in Texas in 1992, which is a very slight reduction from 1991.

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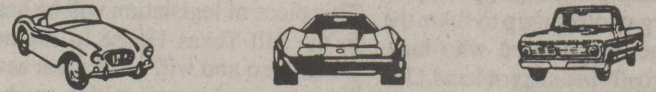
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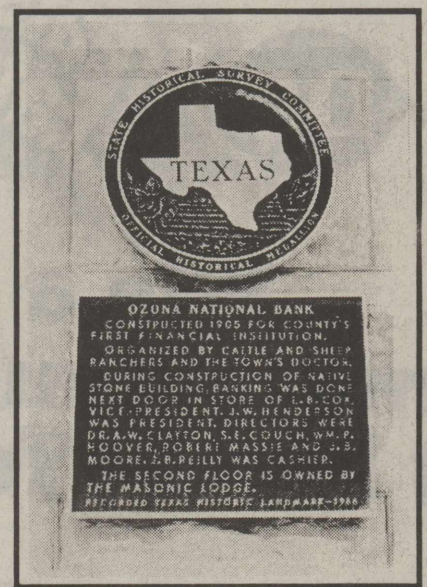
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
