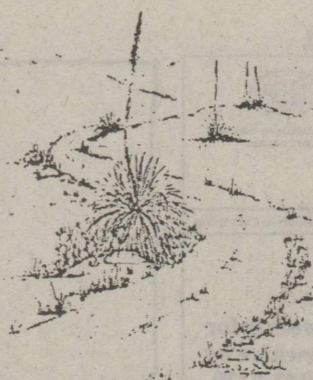

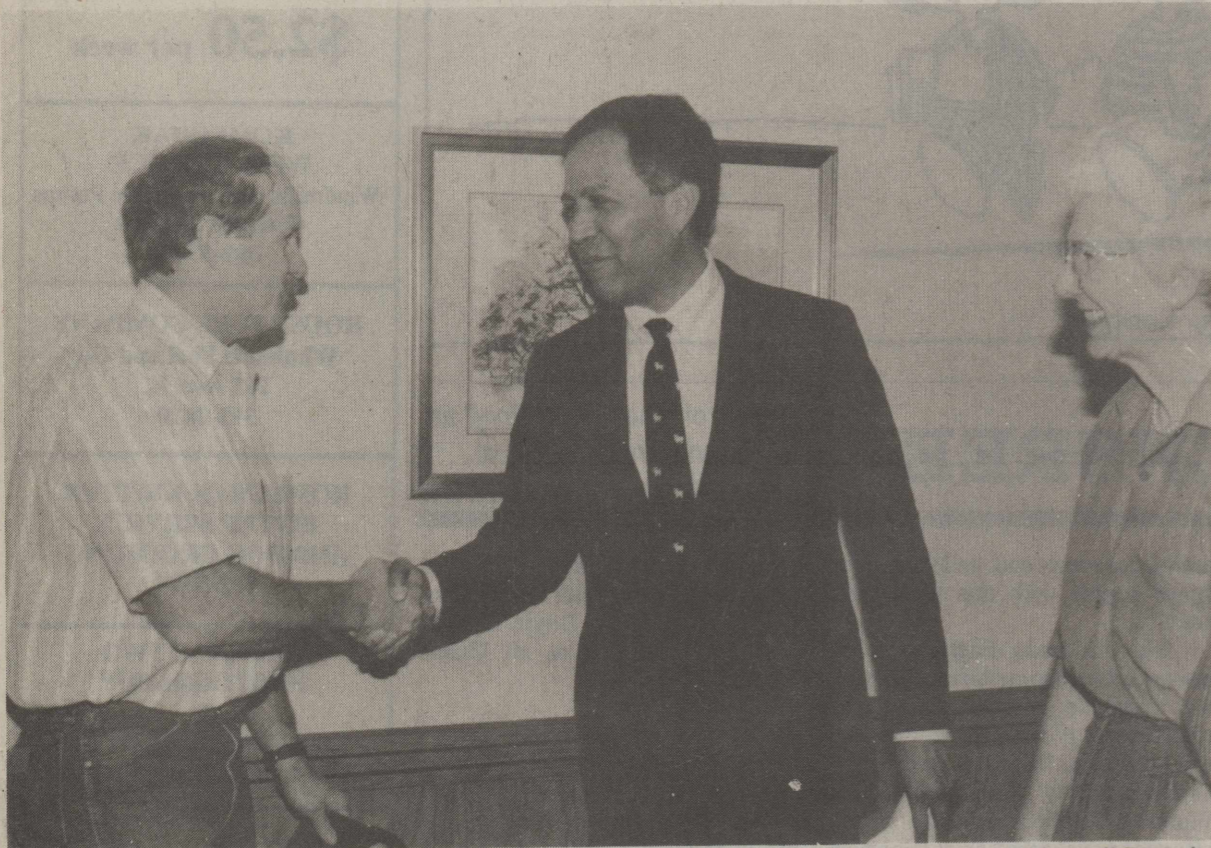

Rep. Bonilla Discusses Price Supports With Local Producers

The push to cap or eliminate price supports for the mohair industry "has been shoved aside for now," according to U. S. Rep. Henry Bonilla. The congressman made the remarks April 7 during a stop in Ozona. Bonilla was in Crockett County and other mohair producing counties to talk about the Wool and Mohair Act.

Producers and others involved in the wool and mohair industry are concerned by a bill introduced last month by Sen. Russell D. Feingold - D Wisconsin calling for the end of the Wool Act. President Bill Clinton's administration had already asked for a \$50,000 annual cap per producer on the incentive payments for the 1994 marketing year.

Recipients of mohair incentive payments have been under attack in publications ranging from the Washington Post to the National Inquirer.

Incentive payments were established in the Wool Act of 1954. The payments are from funds collected from a tariff on wool and mohair, not out of tax dollars. Incentive payments are made when prices fall below the national average market price received by all wool and mohair producers. Support levels are determined by a formula provided in the Wool Act.

The payments have been necessary 17 times in 35 years according to TS&GRA president Robert Pfluger. The Wool Act has brought in \$7.4 billion during that time with \$2.3 billion distributed and the remainder going to the U. S. Treasury.

While taking questions from the audience in a crowded Crockett Room, Bonilla was asked by ranchwoman Tot Holmsley what would happen to the tariff money if the Wool Act was

eliminated.

"What they want to do is take the tariff and spend it on something else," Bonilla replied. "That's why they're looking at this. They have other things they want to spend money on. They want to continue the tariff and keep the subsidies for themselves so that they can use it for their agenda which to me is obviously for another part of the country."

Tony Villarreal of Fort Stockton spoke as a member of the shearing industry asking what could be done to solidify support of the wool and mohair industry.

Rep. Bonilla suggested finding out how state senators feel and contacting Agriculture Secretary Espy. He also suggested that Gov. Ann Richards be made aware how drastic the effect would be on this area if the Wool Act were eliminated.

Commissioners Issue Warning Ticket To Hospital/Care Center On Run-away Spending

If expenditures at the hospital and care center aren't under control by June, "we'll have to step in," Commissioner Fred Deaton said Monday at a meeting of commissioners' court. The comment was directed to Gerry Phillips, administrator, who was asked by the court to produce a plan to prevent a projected overrun.

One revenue generating measure to be instituted while trying to lower expenditures is a room rate increase at the care center. Rates are to increase June 1 from \$42 to \$47 a day for semi-private and from \$62 to \$70 for private. These rates remain below the average for other area facilities, Phillips said. The hospital side is currently full with care center residents. The cardiac room is the only place left for a patient, Phillips said.

Decertification from Medicare is still under consideration, but the administrator believes this will result in little savings. Shelia Griffith, former director of nurses at the care center, is now D.O.N. at the hospital and Deena Ramos is D.O.N. in the care center, a position she had held previously. Mrs. Griffith will also do some floor duty, a return to previous policy at the hospital. Agency nurses are no longer being used.

Commissioners voted to sign a letter signed by the hospital board terminating Dr. Robert Owensby's contract. Termination requires 60 days' written notice. He will provide coverage at the hospital two to three weekends a month at a cost of \$2,000 per weekend. Currently Owensby is paid for coverage of one weekend a month above that required by his contract.

Dr. Larry Green will begin his practice in Ozona June 15 in what is now Dr. Marcus Sims' office and Sims will move to what is currently Dr. Owensby's office.

The court voted to approve a contract with Dr. Sims.

Monday was a day for opening bids. C&W was accepted as the low bidder for fuel bids. Shelton Oil and gas was the other bidder. Low bidder on paving rock was Lilly Construction for grades 3 and 4. Capital Aggregates of San Antonio was awarded the bid for pre-coated rock. Holt Machinery of Uvalde, a Caterpillar dealer, was awarded the bid for a motorgrader. Commissioners accepted the high bid of \$113,087.00 which was \$25,000 above the lowest bid. \$110,000 was budgeted for the equipment in certificate of obligation funds. Other bidders were Airmaster with a John Deere and AIS Continental with a Dresser product (formerly Gallion). A motion to buy the John Deere failed when commissioners Rudy Martinez and Frank Tambunga voted for and Freddie Nicks and Fred Deaton voted against. On a second motion to purchase the Caterpillar motorgrader, Deaton, Nicks and Judge Kathryn Mayfield voted for and Martinez and Tambunga against.

A meeting in executive session with road and parks department superintendent Eddie Moore resulted in a \$5,000 a year increase for Moore. The vote was taken after the court returned to open session. Commissioner Tambunga voted against the increase.

A change in swimming pool policy resulted in a pay increase for pool managers from \$600 to \$900 per month. Managers will be required to have certified lifeguards at each pool. Sarah Hignight, manager of the North Pool, was present and stated that she always uses certified lifeguards and that they are paid minimum wage. There are times when two lifeguards are necessary and times when revenues from pool admissions and the concession stand do not cover lifeguards' pay and managers must make up the difference from their own pockets, Mrs. Hignight said.

Court members voted to purchase four Ford Crown Victorias with police packages through the state purchasing agency. By selecting the sedans the county can still come out under the amount budgeted for three vehicles, Sheriff Jim Wilson said. Two vehicles were budgeted for purchase through certificate of obligation money and one through the regular fiscal year budget. A fourth vehicle is needed to replace a department car severely damaged in a wreck last month.

Jimmie Thompson and Gene Lilly were present to request permission to install a pipeline along 13th Street from the fairgrounds to a line in the draw. Thompson commented on the advantage of processing the gas here instead of Houston or someplace else and reminded the court that the school derives income from the well. Commissioners approved the permit application. Judge Mayfield abstained from discussing or voting on the measure as her father has interest in the well at the fairgrounds.

Commissioner Deaton's request to have an engineering study done regarding flooding in Pct. 2 was considered. The court voted to get a cost estimate from Parkhill, Smith and Cooper on an engineering study for problem areas in all precincts. Commissioner Nicks voted against.

An adjustment from \$700 per month to \$1,121 to fire station attendant Mrs. L. A. McCaleb's salary was approved by the court. Mr. and Mrs. McCaleb began work for the county after they were past the age to qualify for retirement benefits and have worked more than 20 years, many of those years without taking vacation time according to a letter to the court from fire chief Bob Falkner. Mr. McCaleb is no longer able to work due to illness.

New appointees to the child welfare board are: Della Bishop, Roylan Sullivan and Tom Humber. Juanita Delgado was appointed election judge in Pct. 1.

Approval was given to repair the airport beacon and to install a pay phone in the courthouse.

Commissioners approved resolutions to invest with Lone Star Investment Pool and TEXPOOL.

The court approved a letter to the U. S. Department of Transportation strongly opposing placement of a tower 2.25 nautical miles northeast of the Ozona Municipal Airport. The guyed antenna tower proposed by the ENMR Telephone Cooperative of Clovis, NM, would be 499 feet above ground.

Regular monthly reports were heard from civic and youth center director Garland Young and librarian Louise Ledoux.

Pandale Road Accident Injures 6

A 1987 Chevrolet Blazer driven by 43-year-old Darrell Truett Yates ran off the right side of the southbound lane on the Pandale Road (FM 2083) Sunday injuring six of the occupants.

Yates' wife, Mary, 43, and four boys were ejected from the vehicle and were taken to Crockett County Hospital and later transferred to Shannon Medical Center. Darrell and Mary Yates and two of the boys were admitted for undisclosed injuries.

DPS trooper Keith Olive investigated the accident.

Board Considers Care Center Room Rate Increase

Hospital administrator Gerry Phillips presented reports for the first quarter at a meeting of the board on April 8. Last year the projection for the hospital and care center combined was approximately \$1,250,000; this year it is approximately \$850,000 according to minutes of the meeting. A graph depicting hospital and care center expenditures from 1983 to 1992 showed a steep increase in costs beginning in 1988. The hospital was recertified for Medicare in January of 1992.

As part of a Medicare update, Phillips told the board that decertifying at this time would not be a considerable savings. Both the administrator and board believe more time is needed before an accurate evaluation can be made regarding cost effectiveness of remaining Medicare certified.

Phillips suggested an increase in care center rates from \$42 to \$47 for semi-private and from \$62 to \$70 for private rooms. Before the rates go into effect June 1, eight mattresses being used by care center residents on the hospital side will be replaced and Phillips will meet with residents who have expressed dissatisfaction about the food in an attempt to find a satisfactory solution.

The hospital and care center will sponsor a booth at the health fair April 22 and the lab will be available for free testing of blood sugar. Poster contests for children in K through fifth grade will also be sponsored by the hospital and care center.

After meeting in executive session, board members signed a letter terminating Dr. Robert Owensby's contract. Dr. Owensby will provide weekend coverage two or three times a month after Dr. Larry Green begins

his practice here June 15.

Board members voted to co-sponsor with Ozona United Methodist Church the "Dialogue" and "I Can Cope" cancer support groups. The pastor, Tim Brewer, who is also a board member, has been trained for the program. The Dialogue group will consist of cancer patients or family members and will be a talk session with support of others who have or have had cancer. The I Can Cope portion is an informative session discussing the more technical side of cancer and treatments available.

Texas Tech Health Net education program has contacted the hospital regarding continuing education for nurses. This would be available through grant money and would involve a satellite hookup.

In the care center portion of the meeting, Phillips told the board there were several deficiencies found during a full-book survey by the Texas Department of Health last month. A plan for correcting the deficiencies has been submitted to the TDH.

Corrections include: moving the telephone used by residents at the nurses' station to the Day Room to provide more privacy; preparing discharge summaries on all patients; purchasing a Geri-chair; replacing some ceiling tiles; labeling on insulin and ophthalmic solutions; documenting administrator's hours at the care center through payroll. The board voted to have payroll records reflect Phillips working at the care center 40 hours per week.

During open discussion, board member Carmen Sutton said she has had positive input from one of the care center volunteers regarding Deena Ramos, new director of nurses.



Voting Underway In 3 Elections

Early voting began Monday, April 12, for one state and two local elections. Deadline to vote early in the school board, Emerald Underground Conservation District, state senator and State Constitution Amendment elections will be Tuesday, April 27.

In the local races five candidates have filed for the two positions as school trustee. They are: George Ybarra, Roylan Sullivan, Becky Childress, Richard Sanchez and Mike Preddy. Trustees Jeffrey Sutton and Gary Vannoy's terms expire this year. Neither is seeking re-election.

Requests for a ballot to vote by mail should be directed to May Lay at the school administration building, Box 400. April 23 is the last day applications will be accepted for early voting ballots to be voted by mail for the school board trustee positions.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday, May 1 at the Crockett County Courthouse for those that choose not to vote early.

The Emerald Underground Water District is electing two directors. Early voting will be April 12 through April 27 at the Ozona Airport, 1 mile north of the hospital, from 8:00 a.m. - 5 p.m. Votes may be placed on election day, Saturday, May 1 from 7 a.m. - 7 p.m. at the Ozona Airport. Applications for ballots by mail must be received no later than April 26. To receive a ballot by mail write Mary Joan Hearne, P.O. Box 1859, Ozona, TX 76943.

The state is holding a special election to fill the unexpired term of the Honorable Lloyd Bentsen and for adopting or rejecting the proposed Constitutional Amendments as submitted by the regular session of the 73rd Legislature of the State of Texas. The amendments deal primarily with education.

Early voting may be conducted April 12 through April 27 from 8:00 a.m. - 5 p.m. in the Crockett County Courthouse. Applications for a ballot by mail should be directed to Debbi Puckett, Crockett County Clerk, P.O. Drawer D, Ozona, Texas 76943.

The polls will be open on election day from 7 a.m. - 7 p.m. on May 1. Pct. 1 voting place is at the courthouse. Pct. 2 votes at Ozona Junior High, Pct. 3 at Crockett County Civic Center and Pct. 4 at Ozona Primary School.

In this effort, the Crockett County Museum will sponsor a poster contest for all school students, a trunk showing at the Crockett County Public Library and an archeology program in the Crockett Room at the Ozona National Bank.
The poster contest is open to all students in the Crockett County school system, grades K-12. All posters are to be turned in to the museum on or before Wednesday, April 21. To qualify the posters should be archeological in subject matter, done on regular sized poster board, and have the student's name, grade and phone number on the back. Prizes will be awarded to the top two posters from each school.
A mini-traveling trunk from The Institute of Texas Cultures will be shown on Monday, April 19, at the Crockett County Library. Everyone is invited to attend this showing which is entitled: "Indians Who Hunted Buffaloes." The trunk is filled with buffalo rawhide, horns, sinew and much more to be handled and passed around. Reproduction artifacts include hunting arrows and lance points, a hide scraper, a sewing kit, and moccasins.
The trunk showing will be from 6-6:30 p.m.
The public is also invited to attend an archeological program to be presented at the Crockett Room Thursday, April 22, at 7 p.m.
In addition to these events, students from Mrs. Katreece Hale's 7th grade history classes will demonstrate the way the Indians utilized plant fibers in weaving various items to students at the primary school.
The Archeology Awareness Week Committee is sponsoring this effort with the support of the sponsors, Texas Archeological Society, Texas Historical Commission, Texas Antiquities Committee, Texas Historical Foundation, and Council of Texas Archeologists in promoting public awareness and involvement in the protection of Texas cultural resources.

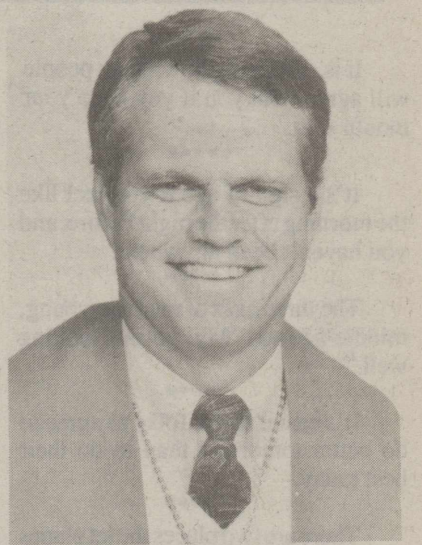

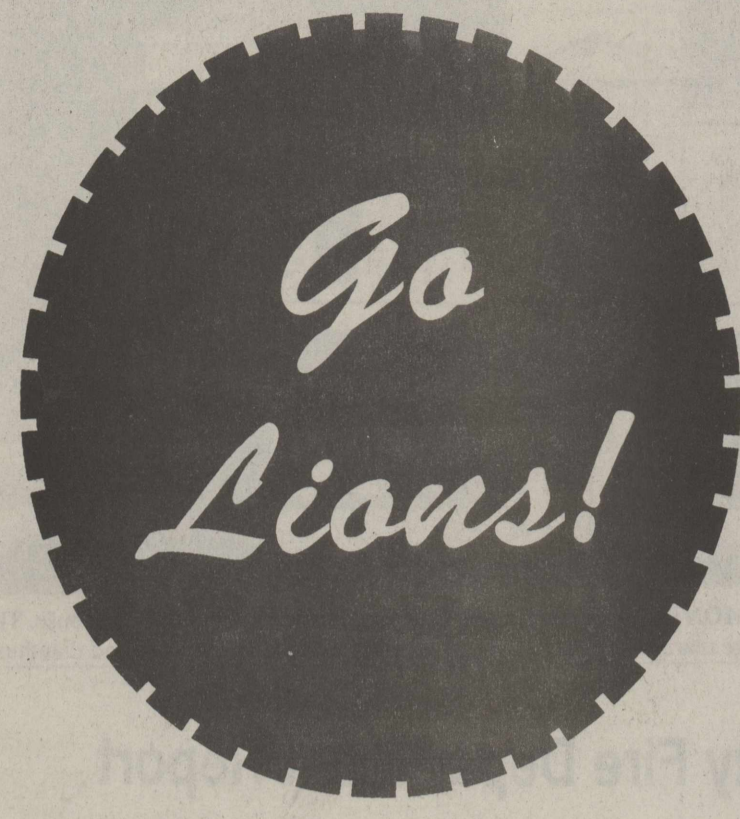

Gifted/Talented Nominations Now Being Taken

The Crockett County Consolidated Common School District is now in the process of accepting nomination for its gifted and talented program for students with exceptional intellectual abilities in grades one through twelve.

According to Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton, gifted/talented students are those who excel consistently or who show the potential to excel in any one or a combination of the following areas: general intellectual ability, specific subject matter

aptitude, creative and productive thinking ability, leadership ability, ability in the visual and performing arts, and psychomotor ability.

"Students in the local program are identified and served in the area of general intellectual ability," Cotton said, "This area is defined as possessing superior intelligence with potential or demonstrated achievement in several fields of study and the ability to perform complex mental tasks. At the present time, the 47 students in our gifted and talented program are work-

ing on developing more higher-level thinking skills beyond what is normally required in the regular classroom. Gifted/talented education does not take the place of the regular classroom but supplements and proves time for students to use their thinking and reasoning skills to a greater degree."

Identification of gifted/talented students is very complex and comprehensive, consisting of two District steps: (1) nomination and screening and (2) selection. In the nomination and screening phase, a student may be nominated for the program by his/her parent or guardian, by a teacher, or by scoring very high on a standardized achievement test. Once a student has been nominated, he/she will be given two nationally-developed tests of higher-level thinking skills to determine the student's potential to succeed in the program, and after all data has been collected on each child, a committee of professional educators will review this information and determine which additional students qualify for inclusion in the program.

"Anyone with a child attending grades one through eleven this year and wishing to nominate them for this program is asked to go by the principal's office and request a nomination form, which needs to be returned to the school by Friday, April 23. "If you are unable to go by the school please call, and we will see that you get one," Cotton said. Students who did not make the gifted/talented program last year may be nominated again if parents wish to do so.

ASCS Announces Wool And Mohair Rates For 1992

The Crockett County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) announces wool and mohair rates for the 1992 marketing year. The National Wool Act of 1954, as amended, provides a formula to determine the wool and mohair sup-

port price each year. Herb Schwertner, County Director, reports the 1992 support price for wool is \$1.97 per pound. The support price for mohair is \$4.613 per pound. (Incentive) Payments are based on the percentage needed to bring the national average

market price received by all wool and mohair producers up to the announced price support levels.

A producer cannot receive price support payments on that portion of proceeds from marketed wool or mohair (the net sales price per pound for any individual sales document) which is more than four times the national average for wool or mohair.

The 1992 national average price for shorn wool is 74 cents per pound. Mohair is 86 cents per pound.

Payment rates for 1992 marketings are 166.2 percent of the net sales

proceeds for shorn wool; \$4.92 per hundred pounds liveweight for unshorn lambs; and 436.4 percent of the net sales proceeds for shorn wool; \$4.92 per hundred pounds liveweight for unshorn lambs; and 436.4 percent of the net sales proceeds for mohair. Promotion fund deductions are 7.5 cents per pound for shorn wool; 37.5 cents per hundredweight for unshorn lambs; and 4.5 cents per pound for mohair. Promotion fund deductions from wool and mohair payments were approved by producers in a referendum held in 1991

Pasture To Packer Program To Benefit Lamb Producers

Texas A&M's Pasture to Packer Program, designed to give sheep producers information on genetic potential of their lambs, will begin at the Texas Agricultural Research and Extension Center near San Angelo June 22 and will continue the following day. Interested producers must consign at least 10 head by May 1.

The program is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association and Texas A&M's Department of Animal Science.

The program's purpose is: 1) To give commercial lamb producers, purebred sheep breeders, stocker operators and lamb feeders a chance to determine the feedlot performance and carcass characteristics of their lambs and factors influencing their value; and 2) to familiarize producers with lamb feeding and retained ownership as an alternative marketing method.

"To get top dollar, producers need to know how their sheep fit the new lean lamb production system," said Dr. Frank Craddock, San Angelo-based Extension Sheep and Goat Specialist and a program coordinator. Also coordinating the program is Dr. Rick Machen, newly appointed Extension Livestock Specialist at Uvalde. "The program is designed to give ranchers feedlot performance and packer information on their lambs. It's not a contest.

"The big push now is for leaner lamb. New yield grading standards reflect this trend. We're now seeing a great demand for 65 to 70 pound carcasses of this size, but only a small percentage have been lean and correctly finished (less than .25 inch fat thickness). This program should show us if our sheep have the genetics to produce this type carcass. It should

also establish some base line data to help direct our breeding and management programs.

"I'm sure many participants will see they're raising lambs that yield acceptable carcasses in the environmental conditions in which they operate. Others will want to use the information to improve their flock's genetics. The program is designed to help sheep operators make such decisions.

The lambs will be fed at Denis Feedlot east of San Angelo and processed at the Monfort facility in San Angelo. A \$2 per head non-refundable entry fee must accompany each nomination. Upon sale of carcasses expenses will be deducted and producers will be paid for their lambs. Lambs must weigh at least 60 pounds at delivery.

Billy Reagor, local County Extension Agent, will help local producers sort their lambs and accumulate lambs for the county to haul to San Angelo.

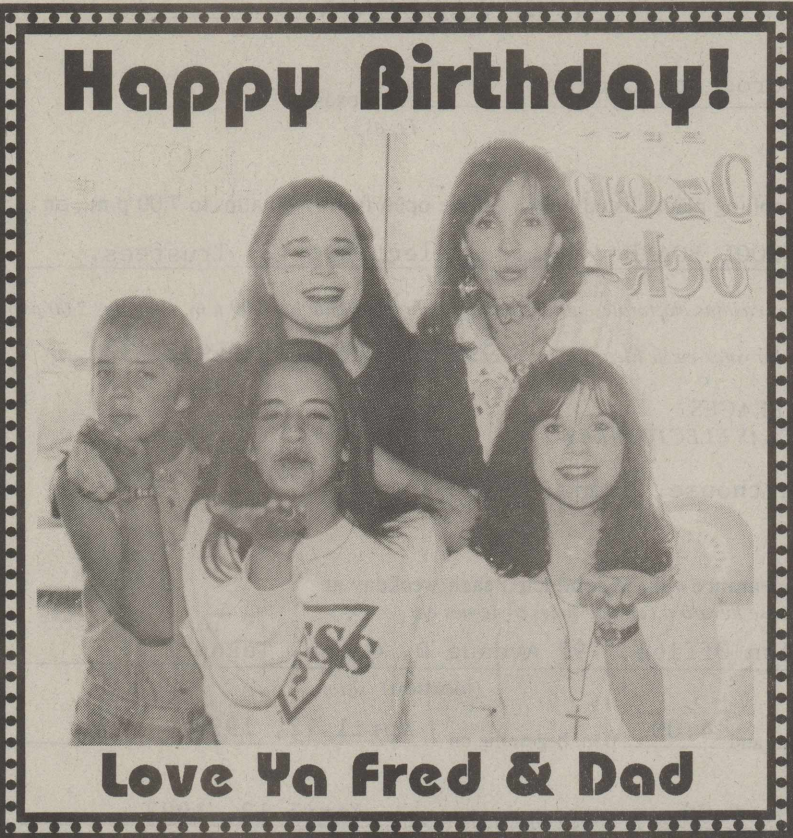

Texas Has Mohair

90% Of U.S. Production Comes From 10 Counties

How many people realize that 10 Texas counties—Crockett, Edwards, Kinney, Kimble, Mason, Mills, Sutton, Uvalde, Terrell and Val Verde—account for a major share of the world's mohair production and more than 90 percent of the U.S. total? Or that Rocksprings, in Edwards County, is known as the "Mohair Capital of the World," that its local newspaper is the "Mohair Weekly," and its high school mascot is the angora goat?

Mohair and Texas' 1.5 million angora goats rarely make headlines, but news reporters took note that Governor Ann Richards wore a mohair suit at her 1991 inauguration. More recently, federal subsidies for mohair production—some \$40-50 million each year to Texas ranchers—have become a target of the Clinton administration's efforts to cut the deficit. But very few Texans are aware how important their state is as a world producer of the fiber. Brian May, executive director of the Mohair Council of America in San Angelo, says, "I've always said it's Texas' best-kept secret. (It's) known all over the world as Texas mohair. Unfortunately, hardly anyone in Texas knows about it."

Mohair production has a long history in Texas. Angora goats are believed to have originated in the Himalayan Mountains. Their fleece was first traded by the Turks, who did not allow angora goats to leave the country until 1849, when some were given to a South Carolina farmer in exchange for showing the Turks how to cultivate cotton. In the United States, the goats were built into a herd, and some of the animals were brought to Hays County in Central Texas in 1857 by an Alabama engineer. The angora goats thrived further to the west, on the rocky, hilly Edwards Plateau, on land not suitable for raising cattle or sheep. By 1900, Hill Country livestock centered around the angora, leading Texas to become the chief site of mohair production in the United States.

The U.S. produces more than 16 million pounds of mohair a year, almost 40 percent of the world's total. Other important producers are South Africa and Turkey. In 1990, Texas produced 16.3 million pounds of mohair, valued at \$15.1 million, while the angora goats themselves represented an investment of \$51 million.

The price of mohair has been on a roller coaster ride for the last 30 years. From the early 1960s to the early '70s mohair prices dropped by more than 60 percent, to as low as 30 cents per pound. Prices rallied in the 1970s, increasing to as high as \$5.10

per pound in 1979, and peaking again in 1984. Since 1987, however, prices have been depressed. In 1990, mohair averaged 90 cents per pound, but producers benefited from federal price supports that raised their final payment to \$4.53 per pound.

The price of mohair is unstable because of the volatile demand and supply of the fiber. Mohair producers are at the mercy of fashion trends and political events that determine the market price. Mohair was very popular in the 1920s but was still used mainly as an upholstery fabric. Now, fashion designers and mohair trade associations are pushing the use of mohair in women's clothing and decorator fabrics, products such as children's toys, drapes, hats and scarves, blankets, carpeting, and even wigs, paint rollers and ink pads.

Recent political changes also affect the mohair market. For instance, former Soviet Union countries were among the biggest buyers of the fiber. Those countries' colder climates make them natural customers of mohair. Now, however, the transition to free-market economics has left them without the cash to import from U.S. producers.

Political unrest in South Africa, the world's largest producer of mohair and Texas' main competitor, also makes itself felt in the market. Continued upheaval or other setbacks in South Africa have proven to benefit Texas mohair producers. A three-year drought in the late 1980s, for instance, cut South African mohair production by 30 percent. The resulting shortage of mohair tripled the market price for Texas producers from 55 cents in December 1990 to \$1.65 in August 1991.

According to the Texas Department of Agriculture, mohair sales contributed \$30 million to the state economy in 1989. When related activities such as sales of angora goats are included, the total economic impact of the mohair industry increases to \$150 million. Many industry and state leaders, however, believe that mohair production is an underdeveloped activity. The same mohair sold by Texas producers in raw form for \$30 million ultimately accounts for sales around the world of \$1.5 billion to \$2 billion, once it is cleaned, processed, spun and made into yarn, clothing and other products.

A few examples illustrate the value that can be added in the processing of mohair:

*Raw mohair sold by Texas pro-

ducers will re-enter the United States in the form of blended fashion yarn that commands \$50 to \$100 per pound.

*An average yarn spinning mill employs about 200 people and pays about \$3.5 million in annual wages.

Currently, more than 90 percent of mohair produced in Texas is exported in raw form, mainly to the United Kingdom, Italy and Taiwan. Mohair leaves the state with very little value added, mainly because of the industry's high economies of sale. Only 40-50 million pounds of mohair are produced worldwide annually, compared to 35 billion for cotton and 6 billion for wool. This low volume makes spinning mohair into yarn profitable only for a few large, specialized processors, most all in the United Kingdom.

A couple of plants in Texas provide some initial processing of mohair, but for the most part American firms do not have the special machinery needed to process the longer hair of angora goats. State and regional officials are trying to increase the amount of mohair processing and other related activity in Texas.

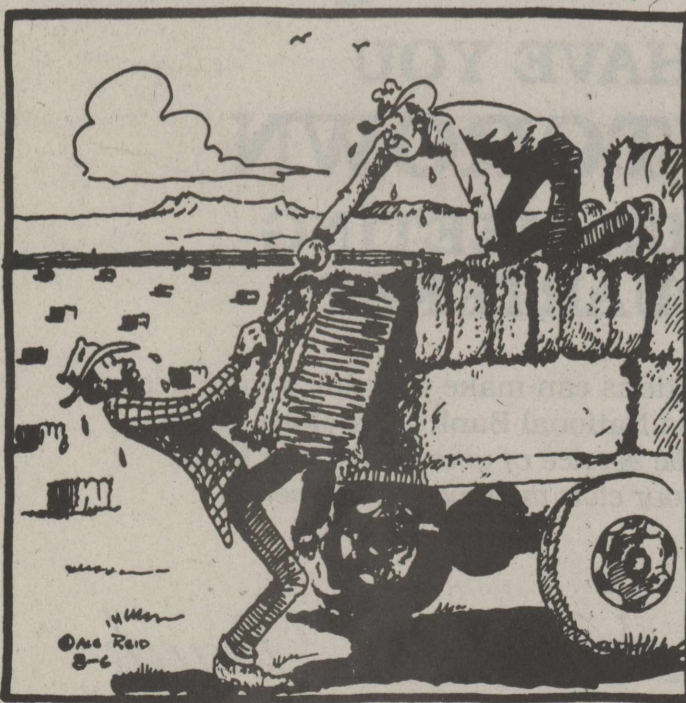

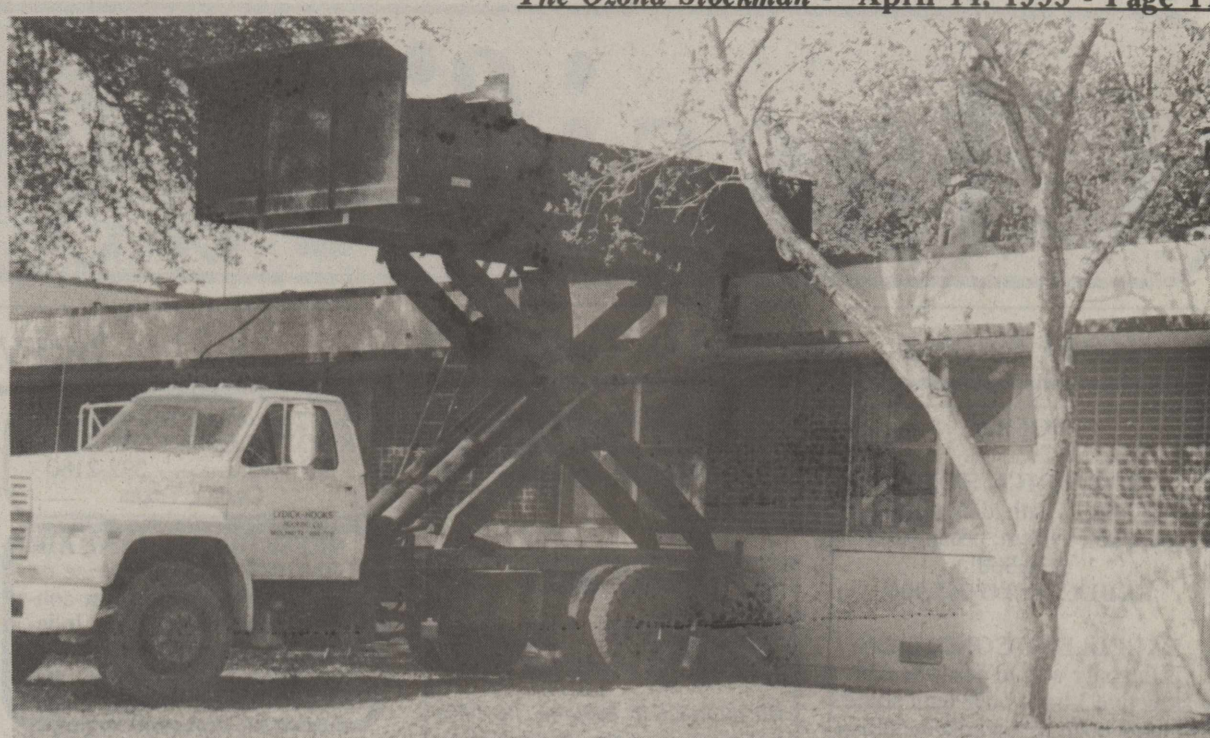

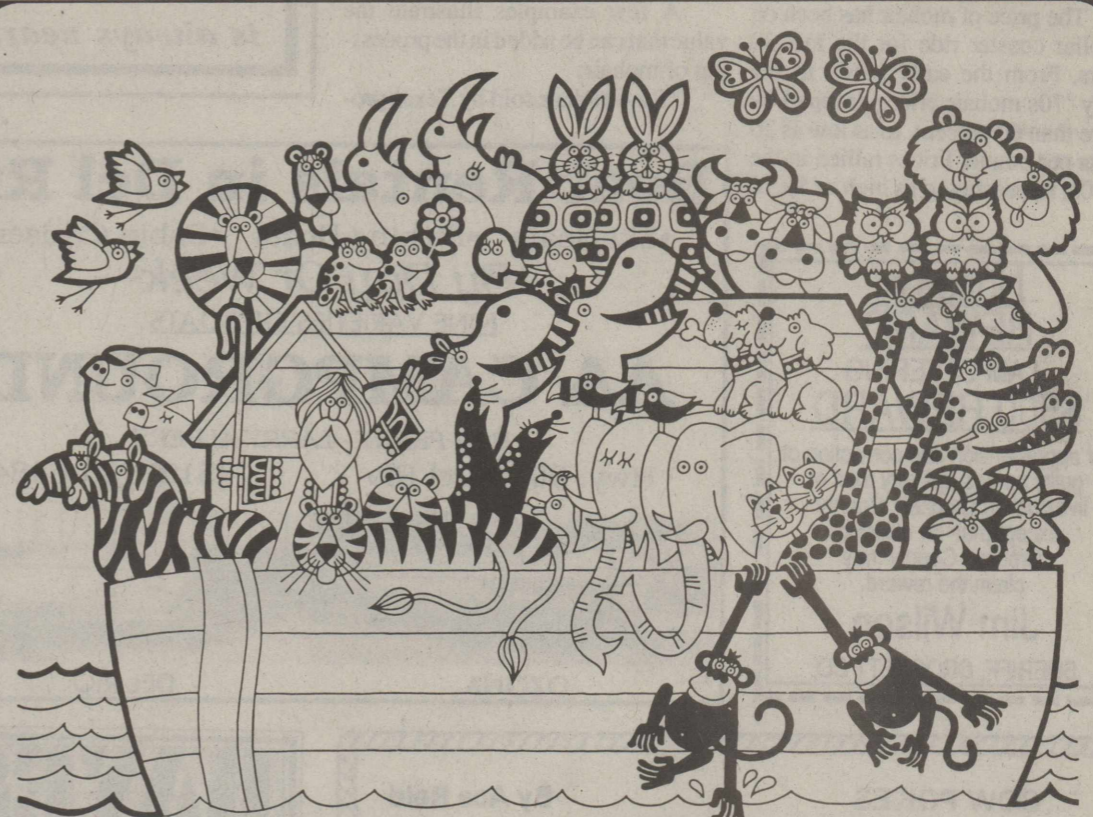
