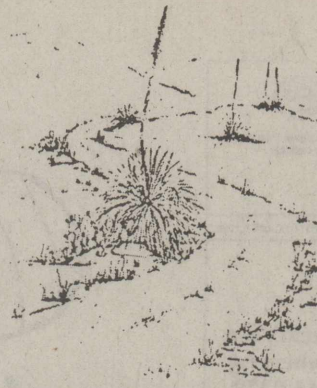

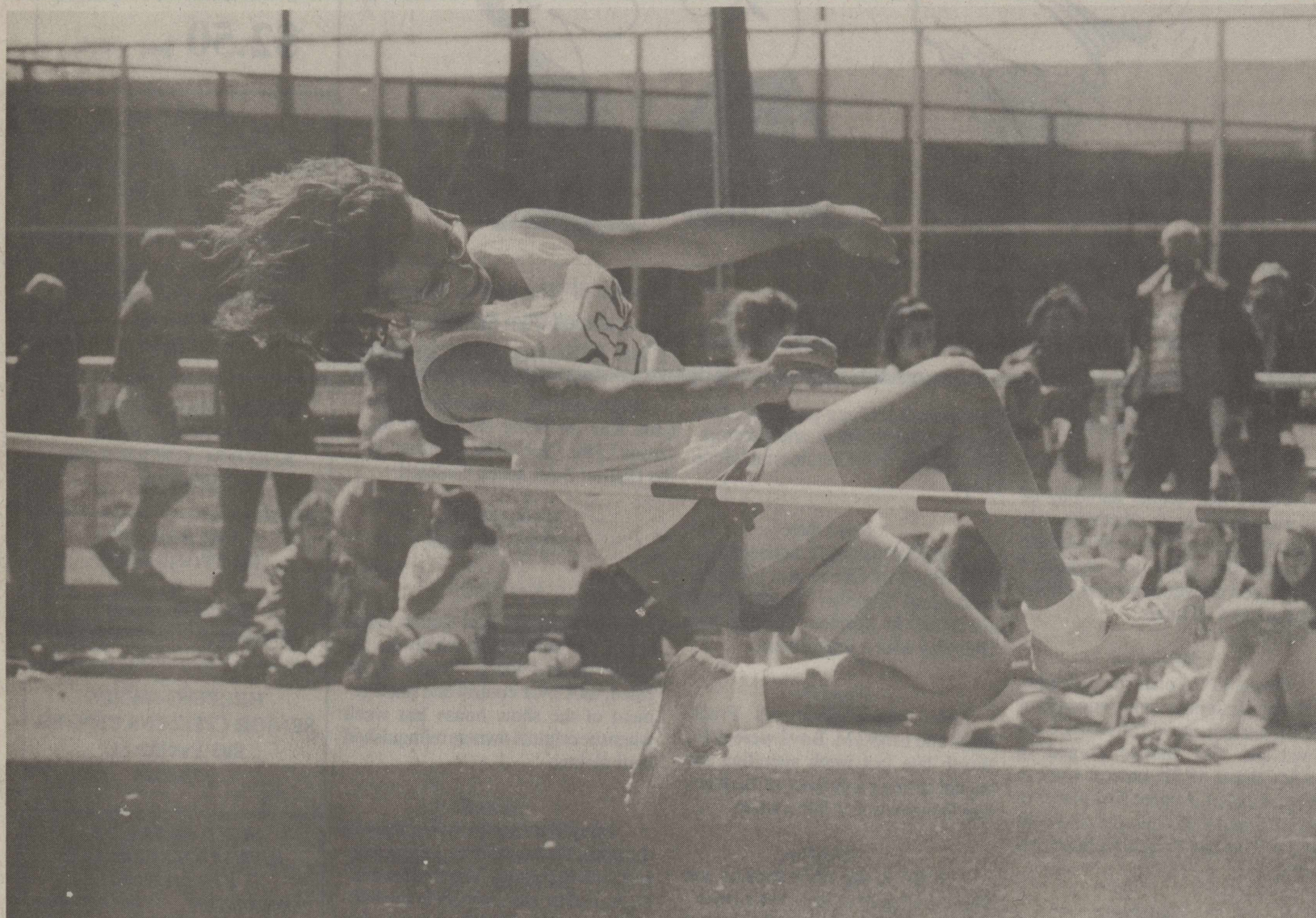

Lions Capture District Track And Field Trophy

The Ozona Lions ended their regular track season with a district championship Friday, April 16, in Lion Stadium. The Lions used a blend of upper and lower classmen in a team effort to topple the past district champs and much talented Stanton track team.

Much of the Lions' success came from the running events where depth played the winning part. The Lions won only two running events, 110 M high hurdles and the 300 M intermediate hurdles, but still had enough depth to score in every running event except the 100 M and 200 M dash. "This proves again that track is a team sport and that it takes everybody's effort to win the district championship," said Coach Pete Maldonado.

Regional qualifiers for the Ozona boys track team are: Aaron Carroll-110 M high hurdles and 300 M intermediate hurdles; Owen Powell-400 M dash; Anthony Sanchez-300 M intermediate hurdles; John Ramirez-1600 M run and the 1600 M relay team composed of Keith Miller, Owen Powell, Aaron Carroll and Anthony Sanchez.

The Lions will be traveling to Wall to participate in a qualifying meet this weekend with field events starting at 2:30 p.m. The regional meet will be held in Abilene on April 30-May 1.

Health Fair And Blood Drive Thursday

Crockett County's citizens can save big bucks with free cholesterol, diabetes and other screenings at the annual Health Fair tomorrow (Thursday, April 22) from 1 to 7 p.m. at the civic center.

There is no cost to attend the Health Fair, which will feature free tests and educational exhibits for all ages. Some of the services and information available include: cholesterol, diabetes, anemia and blood pressure screenings, free adult immunizations, AIDS information, blood drive by United Blood Services, food safety, Africanized bees, mental health, drug and alcohol abuse and poster contest for grades K-5.

At press time, efforts were still being made to confirm glaucoma screenings; however, according to Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent-Home Economics for Crockett County, "We feel we have a lot to offer and participants can save a lot of money by taking advantage of the free health screenings provided."

The regular blood drive sponsored by Xi Sigma Omega and United Blood Services will begin at 1 p.m. and run through 7 p.m., with a sign-up sheet available so people can enjoy health fair activities while they wait.

A new twist to the health fair will be the testing available at the Crockett County Hospital from 1-7 p.m. "In the past, the San Angelo groups have sometimes left early, and latecomers to the fair have been unable to complete testing--this year, our own hospital will be conducting testing up until 7 p.m."

Ulmer noted the hospital is also sponsoring the K-5 poster contest. Winners will receive Sony Walkman Radios and all students are eligible to

Sutton Analyzes Proposed Constitutional Amendments

On Saturday, May 1, voters have a choice on three proposed constitutional amendments. As a school board member for 12 years, I would like to emphasize the impact these amendments will make on Crockett County.

Passage of the amendments will jeopardize local control. In other words, the local district would lose the power to control the ad valorem taxes in our county. When you lose control of funding you lose control of programs or all education needs locally. This passes the control on to the state

since they have the final control over the levy of taxes.

I received a resolution by the board of trustees of a school district in East Texas that has very different financial needs. I would like to share some of their concerns since they are very well stated and reflect the same concerns we have in our district.

One would be that the state of Texas has increasingly reduced its share of funding for the education of the children of Texas.

The State of Texas has legislated

Ozona Athletes Bring Home The Gold

The sun shone brightly on Raliff Stadium in Odessa as Ozona's own Steven Leal, Area 18 male track athlete of the year, carried the Olympic Torch the last hundred yards around the stadium track to officially open the 25th annual Area 18 Special Olympic games. The games were conducted between 336 male and female Special Olympic athletes from 11 different teams in the West Texas area.

Once again Ozona's Special Olympic athletes represented themselves and the community well by earning four gold and two silver medals in the competition. Johnny Rodriguez started the day off by winning a silver medal in the softball throw with a heave of 3.94 meters. He was followed to the ring by Luyitia Fierro who unleashed a throw of 21.83 meters which was good for a silver medal as well. All eyes then were on Steven Leal as he stepped into the ring and propelled the softball to a meet best throw of 45.03 meters to earn his first gold medal.

Ozona's athletes continued their precious metals collection in the afternoon by picking up three gold medals in the running events. Johnny Ro-

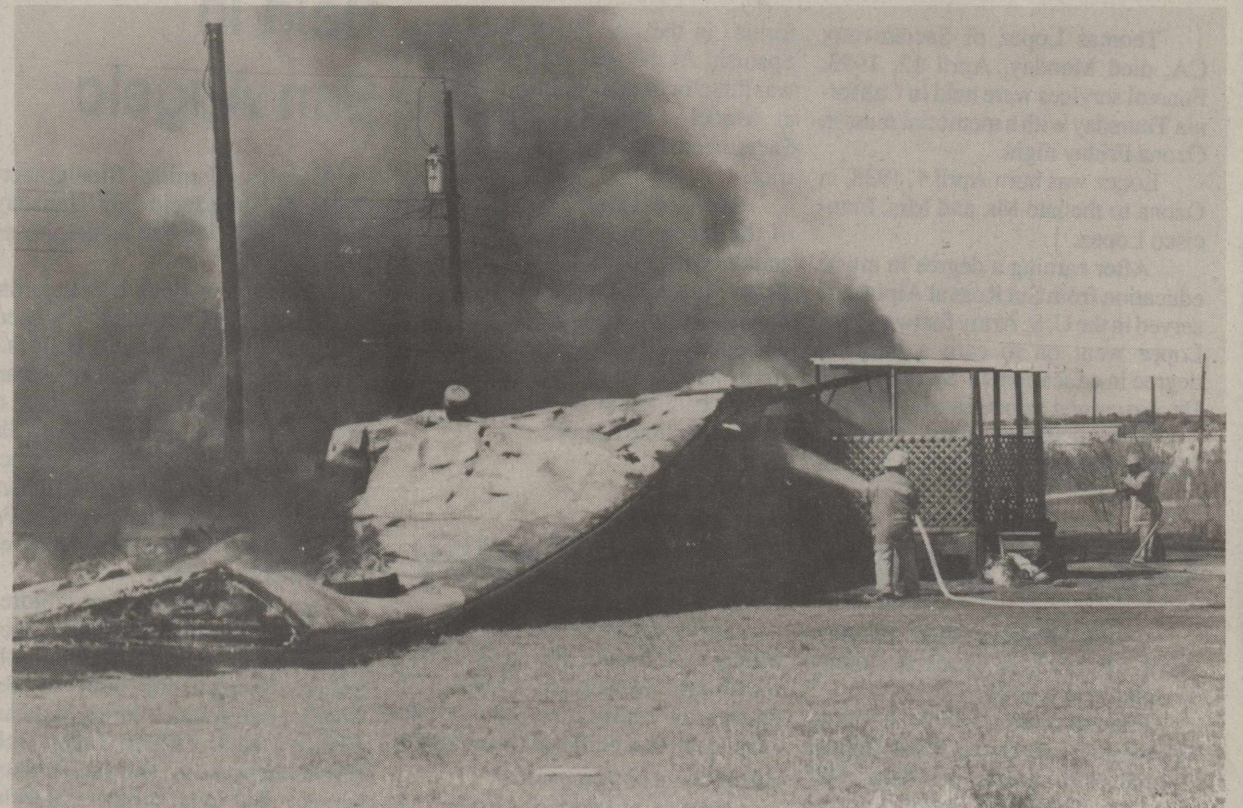
driguez started the collections with a time of 11.47 seconds in his heat in the 50 meter dash followed by Luyitia Fierro with a time of 8.53 seconds in his. It was then time for the best time of the day in the 100 meter dash as Steven Leal burst out of the starting blocks at the crack of the starter's gun and sailed across the finish line 13.36 seconds later.

With his performance at the area games, Steven again qualified to advance to the Special Olympic Summer Games. These will be held again in Denton May 18-21. This is the fourth straight year that Steven has qualified to advance to the state level of competition.

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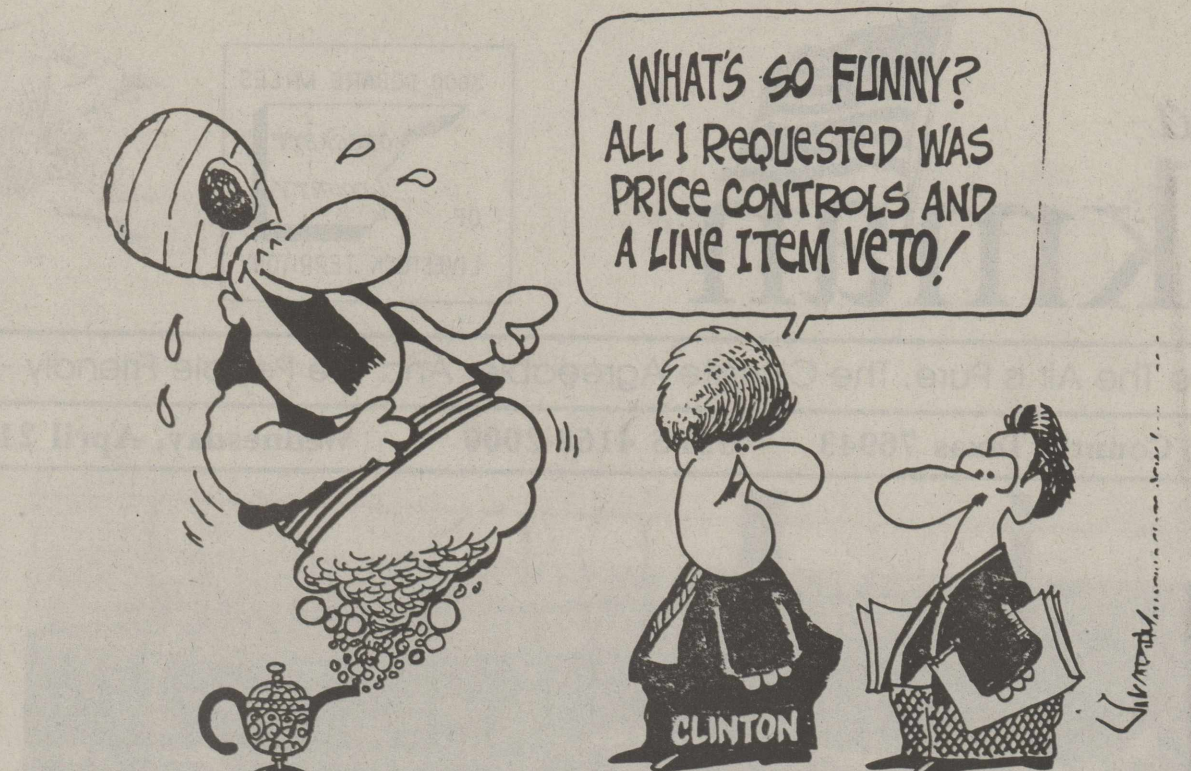

Ozona Service Held April 15 For Lucile Ingham Harrell

Mrs. R. A. Harrell Sr. died Monday evening, April 12, 1993, at her home.

Funeral service was held at 3 p.m. Thursday in Ozona United Methodist Church with Dr. Tim Brewer officiating. Burial followed in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Preddy Funeral Home.

Lucile Ingham Harrell was born July 5, 1908, to Mr. and Mrs. B. B. Ingham Sr., pioneer Crockett County ranchers. She attended Ozona Public Schools, and received a bachelor of arts degree from Texas Christian University in 1929.

She married R. A. Harrell on Jan. 8, 1931, at the Ozona Methodist Church, and joined him in a marriage partnership that lasted more than 60 years, until his death on Dec. 14, 1991.

Mrs. Harrell volunteered her time to various civic, church and county organizations.

In 1968, she accompanied her husband to the United Methodist Church General Conference and World Methodist Conference, where he served as a delegate.

Mrs. Harrell served as a trustee for the Southwest Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church, the Episcopal Committee, the Mt. Wesley Board of Directors. She was also a member of the District Council of Ministry of the United Methodist Church, a member of the board of directors of the Texas Methodist Foundation and a trustee for Huston-Tillotson College in Austin.

In the local church, Mrs. Harrell served as president of United Methodist Women, was a member and taught the Barton-Baggett Sunday School Class, and was chairman of the pastoral-parish relations committee, and a member of the evangelism committee. She served as church pianist and

organist for many years and was director of the Sunday School children's church choir.

She also served as president and member of the Ozona Community Center board of directors. She helped establish the Mary Riddle Scholarship Fund, and played for the Kiddie Klub graduation ceremonies for many years.

Mrs. Harrell was interested in helping preserve Crockett County history. She helped organize the effort to get Fort Lancaster made into a state park. She also helped establish Crockett County Historical Society. She was secretary of the museum board, the historical society, and served as vice-chairman of the Crockett County Historical Commission.

She was a member of the Ozona Chamber of Commerce, and headed the Red Cross Disaster Relief Effort in 1954 following the flood. Mrs. Harrell also served as chairman of the Crockett County Bicentennial Committee.

Pallbearers were: Joe Robert Valadez, Tom Gregg of San Angelo, Billy Reagor, Mark White, Ted M. White, Wade Richardson and Harrell Hodges of Raytown, MO.

Mrs. Harrell is survived by a son, Roy A. Harrell Jr. of Falls Church, VA, and his wife, Charlotte; a daughter, Cynthia Harrell Hodges, and her husband, Bob, of Raytown, MO; two sisters, Jessie I. Baccus, and her husband, C. H. (Doc), of Kerrville; Betty I. Boothe, and her husband, Nelson, of Aledo; a brother, B. B. Ingham, and his wife, Phyllis, of Ozona; four grandchildren, Carol Elizabeth Harrell of Falls Church, VA, Christine Lucile, Harrell Robert and Grant Alvin Hodges of Raytown, MO; and several nieces and nephews.

unfunded mandates to be carried out by the school districts of Texas.

The burden of funding the education of the children of Texas has unfairly fallen on the shoulders of the State of Texas property owners.

The "Robin Hood" constitutional amendment plan is nothing more than the same unfair funding of education by property taxes.

I have noted that the state government has made the statement that there are no other alternatives. That is a very unwise and simple statement coming from the representatives that we have elected to serve us.

With the experience of funding budgets in our district and serving as director on our CED, I do not understand why the state has not explained how the money is going to be collected and how it is going to be divided. I think this is a fair question of our state government, and they very definitely will not answer this question. Is it a secret?

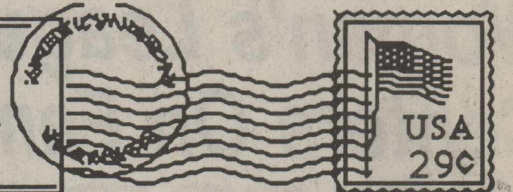
For the benefit of Crockett County, we will definitely suffer if propositions 1 and 3 are passed, and therefore we estimate that we will lose approximately one-third of our tax income to the state. We would have to raise taxes considerably in order to offset the deficiency caused by the increased amount sent to the state for other schools.

A question to which no one knows the answer is, who is going to be the collection agency? Possibly the County Education District which serves Ozona, Iraan, Brackettville, Del Rio, Fort Stockton, Imperial, Marfa, Fort Davis, Valentine and Comstock would be the organization that votes on the amount of taxes for each county. So, if this district above needed more money, then the directors of the above districts would vote on an increase. This part of the amendment has not been addressed.

How fair can this be for us if they have not interpreted the law? I say let them come up with a more equitable means of taxes and distribution.

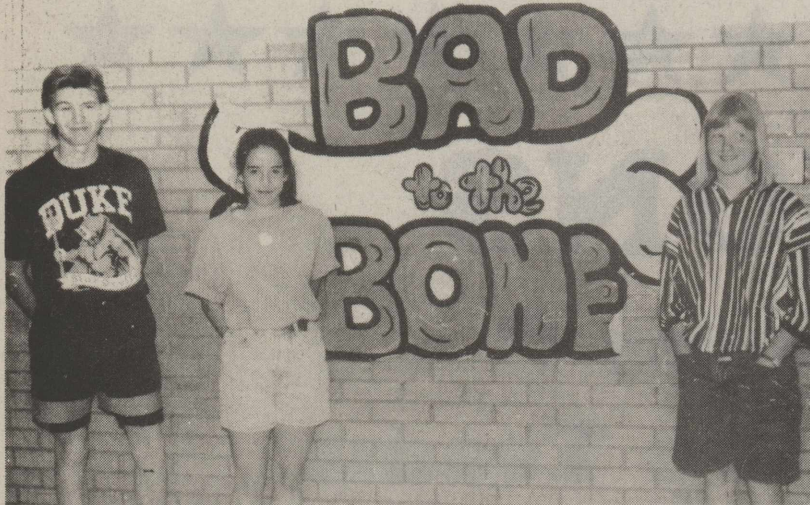

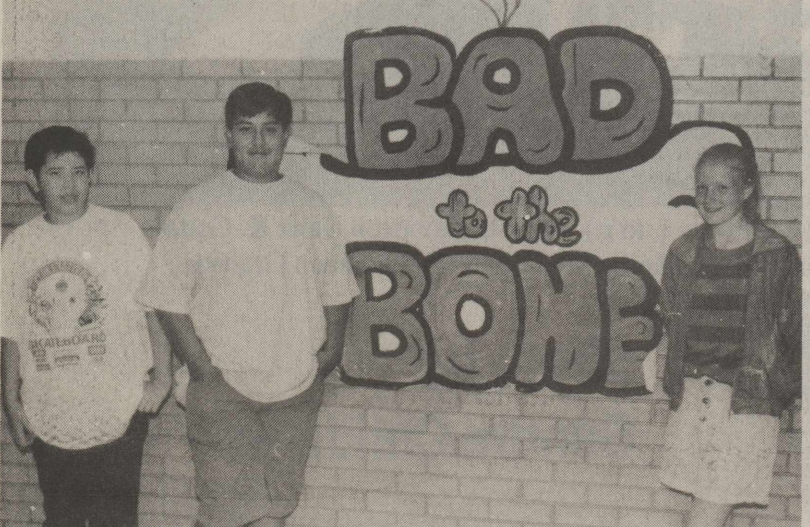

April Is Child Abuse Prevention Month

Statistics show that child abuse continues to rise in Texas and across the nation. A survey prepared by the National Center on Child Abuse Prevention Research reports that incidents investigated by Child Protective Services more than doubled from fiscal year 1981 to fiscal year 1991, from 47,340 to 91,094. Fiscal years 1987 and 1988 were the only years in the past 11 in which the number of investigated reports decreased. The number of investigated reports has increased significantly in the last three years. From fiscal year 1990 to fiscal year 1991, the number of reports rose 10 percent.

The Texas Family Code requires any person who suspects a child has been abused or neglected to report it to CPS or the appropriate law enforcement agency.

The rate of total alleged victims per 1,000 children in Texas has steadily increased from 23.0 in fiscal year 1989 to 28.5 in fiscal year 1991. This is still well below the national rate, which has increased from 37.9 in calendar year 1989 to 42.2 in 1991, as cited in Current Trends in Child Abuse Reporting and Fatalities: The Results of the 1991 Annual Fifty State Survey.

In region 4, which includes Crockett County, the figure was 28.9 per 1,000.

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month. The statewide hotline to report suspected child abuse or neglect is 1-800-252-5400. The hotline also receives calls reporting suspected abuse and neglect of people who are aged or who have disabilities.

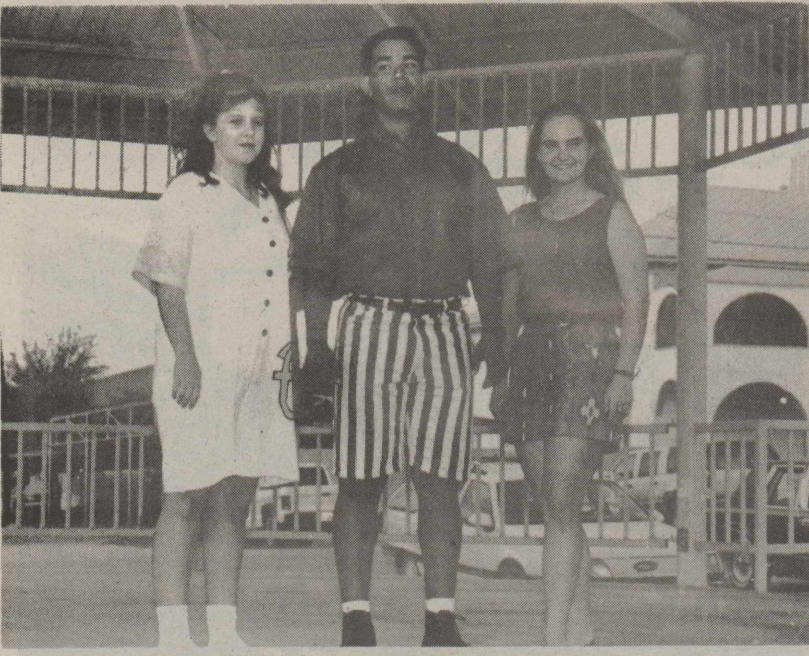



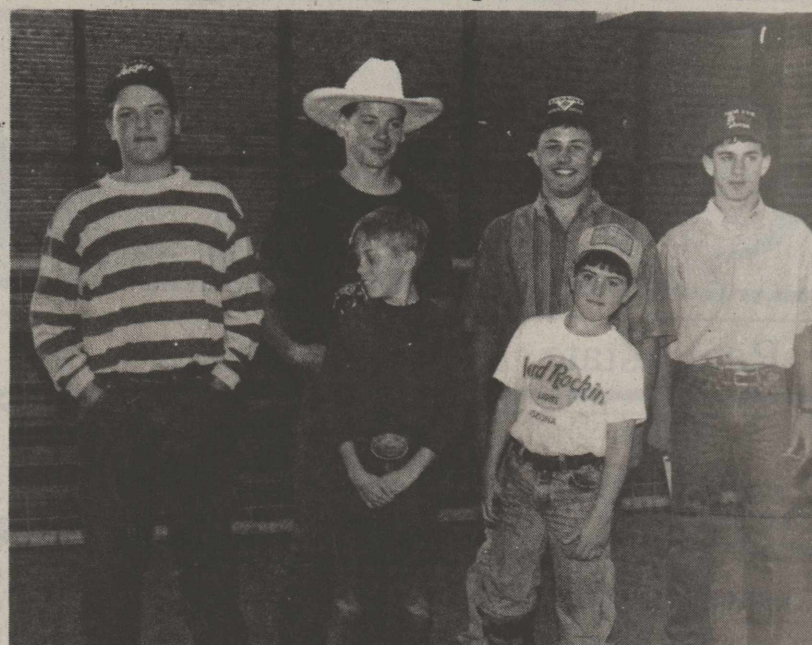

Texas Wool Production Increased, Mohair Production Declined During 1992

AUSTIN - Slightly higher wool prices during 1992 encouraged Texas wool producers to shear a few more sheep and lambs which led to an increase in wool production. Significantly lower prices for mohair were discouraging to mohair producers, leading to a decrease in mohair production.

According to the annual report released by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, wool production totaled 17.60 million pounds, five percent above the previous year's total. Texas producers sheared 2.45 million sheep and lambs during the year, five percent more than they did during 1991. The average fleece weight was 7.2 pounds - the same as last year.

Total value of the state's wool production increased 22 percent from the previous year to \$16.90 million. Price per pound averaged \$.96, up from the average of \$.83 during 1991.

Texas mohair production during 1992 totaled 14.20 million pounds, down four percent from a year ago. Producers clipped 2.00 million Angora goats with an average clip of 7.1 pounds. Although the number of Angora goats clipped increased two percent from the previous year, the average clip at 7.1 pounds was down from the 7.5 pounds in 1991.

Value of the state's mohair production declined 36 percent to \$12.35 million. Price per pound averaged \$.87, down significantly from the \$1.31 average a year earlier.

United States shorn wool production during 1992 was 83.4 million pounds, down five percent from a year earlier. Sheep and lambs shorn during 1992 totaled 10.6 million head, a decrease of four percent from 1991. Average fleece weight of shorn wool was 7.89 pounds per head, down 0.08 pounds from 1991.

The average price paid for wool sold in 1992 was \$.74 per pound, for a total value of \$60.5 million, up 28 percent from \$47.2 million in 1991. There was 48.3 million pounds of domestic and foreign apparel and carpet scoured raw wool stored in the United States on Jan. 1, 1993.

Mohair production in the five major producing states, Arizona, Michigan, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas, during 1992 was 15.6 million pounds, down five percent from 1991. Goats and kids clipped, at 2.25 million head, were up slightly from 1991. Average weight per head clipped was 6.9 pounds, compared with 7.3 pounds a year earlier. Value of mohair production was \$13.4 million, down 36 percent from 1991.
