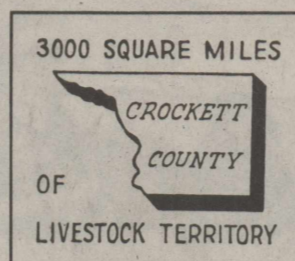

## Logo Signs Point Way To Local Businesses

History was made in Ozona June 17 with the unveiling of the state's first business logo sign. Located just east of Ozona, the sign announces to westbound travelers along Interstate 10 that the town has a Dairy Queen and Cafe Next Door.

Sen. Bill Sims, who sponsored legislation to allow the signs in counties with population of less than 20,000 people, was present to do the unveiling honors along with Jane Richardson. Jane and Wade Richardson were the driving force behind bringing the sign program to Texas.

The project began after the Richardsons were told by the Texas Department of Transportation that they could not put up signs on the family ranch advertising their Dairy Queen. The Richardsons approached their friend, Bill Sims, about the problem, citing the use of logo signs to advertise food, lodging and fuel in other

states. Sims said Thursday that "we requested the signs twice and they (TxDOT) said 'no'. Jane said, 'that's terrible!' so we passed some legislation." The senator commented that it is good that the signs are being built by private industry. "If not for that, it would not have gotten out of the senate."

Legislation passed in 1991 provides for the placement of 10-foot-tall, 8-foot-wide signs along interstates in counties with fewer than 20,000 people. The signs have space for up to four businesses which will pay an annual rental fee to display the images. The Department of Transportation will net five percent of the rental fees. Cost of the large signs and installation is \$5,000.

Jack E. Seelia of L. M. Benavidez Construction, the firm installing the signs, said more than 600 signs

will be in place when the project is completed in January of 1994.

Additional signs for Ozona list Comfort Inn, Economy Inn, R.V. Park, Chevron and Texaco. Signs are also to be placed at exits serving Circle Bar 76 according to Mark Thorp, traffic engineer of the Maintenance and Operations Division of TxDOT who was here for the unveiling.

The ceremony was attended by 37, many from TxDOT or with other connections to the sign program. Mr. and Mrs. Richardson represented Dairy Queen and were accompanied by employees Stella Ramirez and Becky Ybarra. Weldon Maness was present on behalf of Maness Texaco and Bobby Maness for The Cafe Next Door.

In order to be on the logo signs businesses must apply and are then chosen through a drawing.

## Board Approves Request To Consolidate Computer And Literary Courses

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in regular session on Tuesday, June 15, approved the sending of a waiver request by Tom Humber, principal of Ozona Middle School, to the Texas Education Agency for permission to incorporate the school's present seventh grade com-

puter literacy course into other seventh grade academic courses, such as language arts, math, science, and history during the 1993-94 school year.

The proposal calls for the merger of the school's seventh grade computer literacy course with the seventh grade language arts course to create

one course in which most of the essential elements (word processing, telecommunications, desktop publishing and page layout, graphic designs, and computer programming) of computer literacy are combined with all of the essential elements of language arts to give students more "hands on" experiences in writing reports, letters, compositions, research papers, and other documents through the use of computers.

The other elements of computer literacy will be taught in history (computer history), math (commercial spreadsheet), and science (computer usage in society and database management) classes in the seventh grade.

Although the waiver request was presented by Mr. Humber, it was approved and signed by the school's seventh grade academic team (Katrece Hale, Lloyd Winkley, Rodney Johnson, and Keith Cameron), the school's site-based committee (Fred Jones, Katrece Hale, and Tonya Poindecker), and the school's parent committee (Belinda Wilkins, Melinda Galindo, and Fred Deaton).

The combined seventh grade computer literacy/language arts course will be taught by Mr. Keith Cameron and will involve the purchase of sixteen additional IBM-compatible computers and classroom furniture to create a twenty-station lab in the

## Lawsuit challenges trustee election method

A lawsuit filed in U. S. District Court in San Angelo June 17 against the trustees of the Crockett County Common Consolidated Independent School District seeks to increase minority representation on the school board.

Plaintiff Orlando De Hoyos is represented by Rolando L. Rios of San Antonio who also filed suit against the Winters Independent School District in May on behalf of the Runnels County League of United Latin American Citizens Council 658.

The Ozona and Winters suits are two of many across the state which challenge the at-large method of electing trustees. The Crockett County suit asks for a declaratory judgment that the present method of electing trustees violates the plaintiff's civil rights by diluting the minority voting strength and asks for formation of single member electoral districts.

Ozona's 7-member school board presently has two Mexican-American members. Section VI, Facts, of the suit, #11 states "Upon information and belief, if seven single member districts are drawn, at least one minority district could be created."

Superintendent of Schools Jim Payne and board president Gary Buck Mitchell were out of town Tuesday and unavailable for comment.

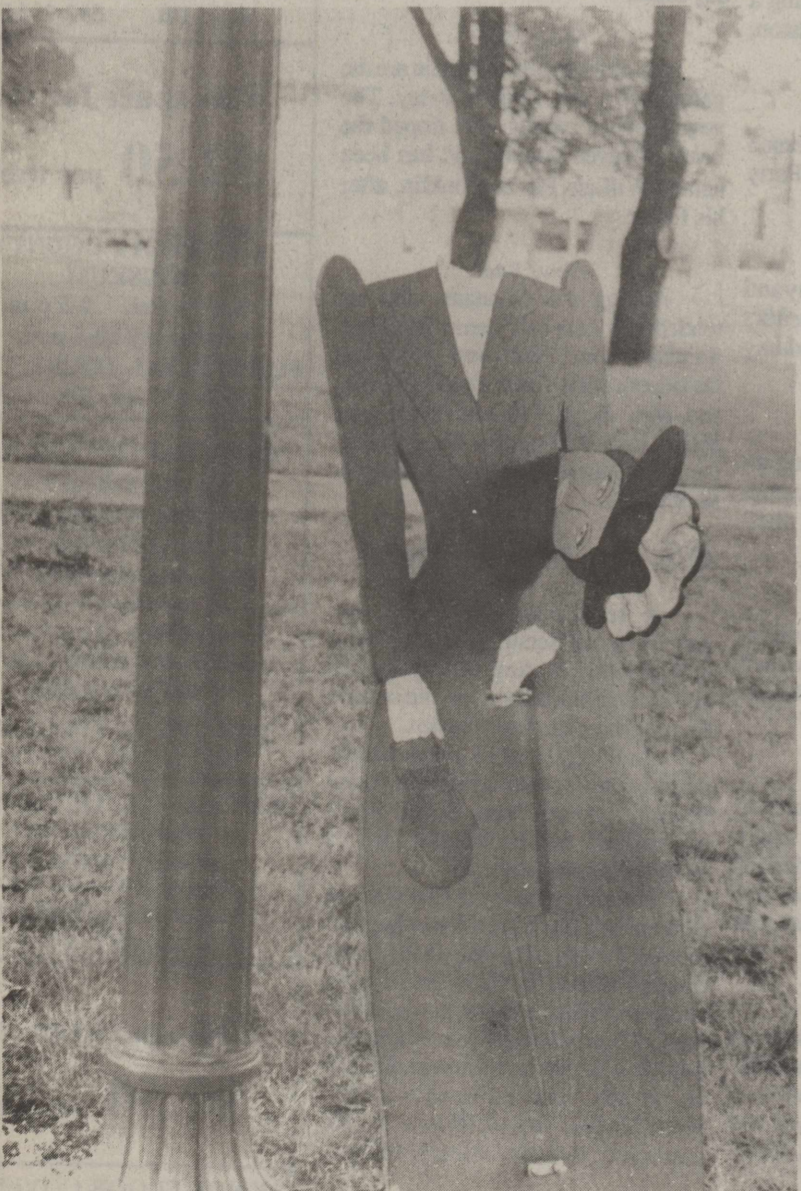
Friday night will feature a match roping between 1992 World Champion Goat Roper Johnny Bownds and 1992 Match Roping Champion Glyn Hutto.

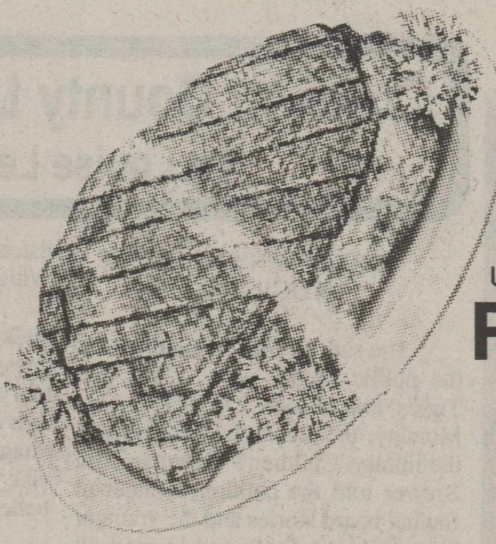

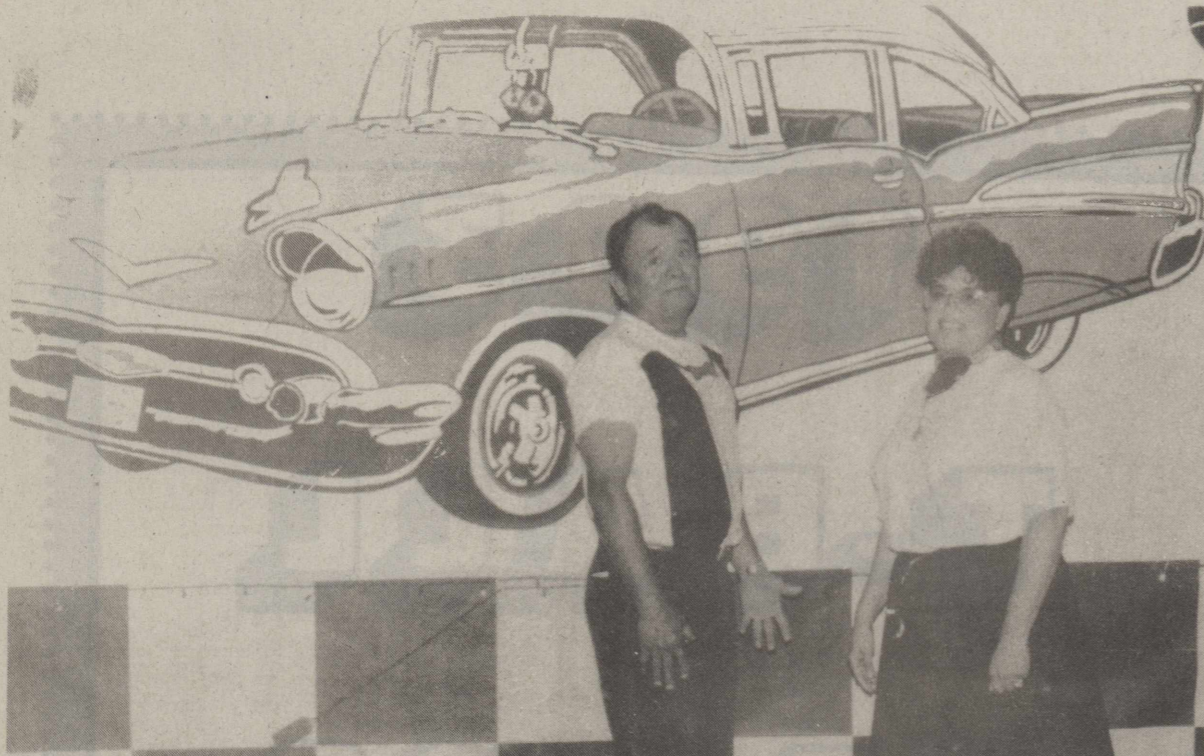

of kids put together a homemade band this year?

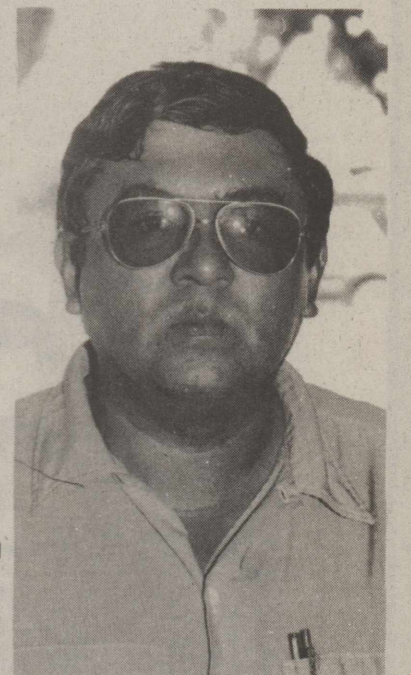
If your pet is going to be in the parade or pet show, please have all his or her shots up to date. It would really help us if as many as can would call or come by the chamber and register and pick up your parade number.

school. Equipment in the present Apple computer literacy lab will be used to teach keyboarding skills to sixth grade students.

The trustees also approved a \$125,000 technology budget for next year which will fund the Ozona Middle School's computer lab described above as well as automating the Ozona High School Library to include a twenty-student computer laboratory there. The district will move the 20 older IBM-compatible computers that are presently being used in high school computer science classes to the library so that all students will have more access to computers in regard to their classroom assignments and will purchase 20 486 IBM-compatible computers as a technology upgrade for computer science.

The technology budget also includes software allocations for all four schools, automation of the Ozona Middle School and Ozona Intermediate School libraries through the purchase of computers and library-related software, and the purchase of a participation agreement with the Public Broadcasting System (PBS) for recording educational programs and providing support materials for all teachers in the district. Financial support for the Jostens Learning System used in Ozona Primary School and Ozona Intermediate School computer labs will also be maintained.

The members approved the purchase of two 65-passenger school buses from State Wide Sales, a payment to Jay Miller Construction Company for services performed on the Ozona High School Handicapped Accessibility Project, agreed to purchase a used truck to transport band equipment, one-act play props, etc. to district activities, purchased physical fitness equipment requested by Ozona Intermediate School, and approved a request by Donnie York to be reassigned from computer literacy teacher to librarian for Ozona Middle School, Ozona Intermediate School, and Ozona Primary School.

The school board accepted letters of resignation from Glenn Graham, Janis Graham, Manuela Rodriguez, and Keith Shoush, and approved the employment of Tommy Wilson (Ozona Middle School), Mary Phillips (Ozona Primary School), Jim Green (Ozona Intermediate School), Michael Gully (Ozona Intermediate School), John Cox (Ozona Middle School), and Adriana Cox (Ozona Primary School).

During the meeting Don Payne, school athletic director, met with the trustees to give them information concerning school athletic periods and coaching assignments. Payne told the members that, after careful consideration of the issues involved in changing the present seventh-period athletic program to an after-school athletic program, he was recommending that the present athletic period structure remain in place for the 1993-94 school year. He went on to explain that coaching assignments had not been finalized but that he would make a report

## March Natural Gas Production

Texas oil and gas wells produced 471,775,245 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in preliminary production for March, up 7.9 percent compared to March 1992's gas production total of 436,956,089 Mcf.

Texas gas production in March came from 175,164 oil and 45,354 gas wells.

Crockett County was seventh in the state with natural gas production of 10,895,481 Mcf.

## March Crude Oil Production

Texas preliminary March crude oil production averaged 1,574,971 barrels daily, down from the 1,675,284 barrels daily average of March 1992.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for March is 48,824,102 barrels, down from the 51,933,810 barrels reported in March 1992.

Crockett County produced 294,944 barrels of oil during March.

## Blood Drive Thursday at 2:00 p.m.

Xi Sigma will host a blood drive at the E.M.S. building from 2:00 to 8:00 p.m., Thursday, June 24. During the blood drive, executives from United Blood Services will be barbecuing hamburgers, hot dogs and sausages for all donors in recognition of Ozona's contribution to the community blood donor program. The ladies of Xi Sigma Omega are preparing all the trimmings for the meal.

"In past years summer drives were slow ones," said Connie Jennings, local drive coordinator, "but the need for blood does not stop this time of year. Our plans are to help replenish this area's blood supply, with the help of volunteers from the community."

T-shirts will be given to those who are making their third donation this calendar year. "3 IN '93," as the program is called, is hosted by United Blood Services and Xi Sigma Omega.

Those wishing to participate still have time to meet the "3 IN '93" goal. Check for details at the drive.

United Blood Services is the nonprofit community blood provider serving patients in 16 hospitals throughout the West Texas area. Since blood cannot be manufactured or synthesized and can be stored only four days, a safe and adequate supply of blood must be available to meet the needs of local hospital patients. Currently, more than 1300 units of blood must be collected each month to meet area demands.

Blood used by patients in the U.B.S. system is freely provided by volunteer blood donors, so there is no charge for blood itself. U.B.S. charges a processing fee to recover the operational costs of the blood center, including collecting, testing, processing, storing and delivering blood and blood components. Health insurance

usually covers this fee.

Healthy people over 17 may donate blood. In Texas, state law requires 17 year olds to have written parental or guardian permission before they can donate. Each donor receives a thorough pre-donation interview, including a careful review of medical history and a check of temperature, pulse, blood pressure and blood iron level. After the blood is collected, it is typed and tested for diseases which could be transmitted to the recipient. Should any of these tests indicate the need for medical attention, the donor is notified.

The actual donation takes about 10 minutes. The donor relaxes in a comfortable chair while one unit (about a pint) of blood is collected in a special container. Afterward, donors will be treated to dinner and dessert before returning to their normal routine.

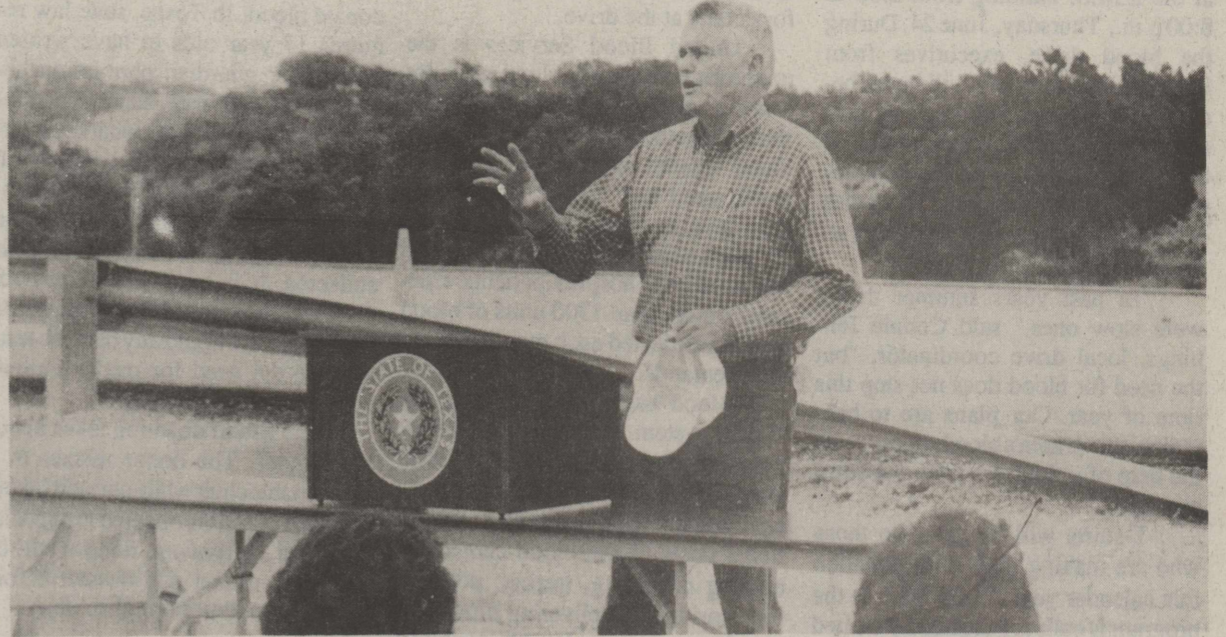

## Gun Control Hot Topic In Colorado, Too

Sheriff Jim Wilson became a radio talk show guest during a recent week in Salida, CO. Wilson was there to attend the annual gathering of The Shootists, an organization of western writers.

On June 8, Wilson joined Shootist founder John Taffin who writes for the *American Handgunner* magazine and teaches in Boise, ID, and Buena Vista police sergeant Jerry Randall to talk about The Shootists on a radio program at a station which serves three small communities in the Arkansas River Valley.

The men were invited to do a one-hour program on the organization, but when the program was opened to callers, people wanted to talk about gun control and violent crime, Wilson said. The show was extended to almost two hours, and during that time, only one caller was in favor of gun control, Wilson said. Many of the callers were fed up with the return of criminals to the streets. Wilson, Taffin and Randall all

felt, and the audience agreed, that family values are most important. The audience agreed that school and law enforcement officials can't do it for you when it comes to instilling values in children, Wilson said.

"In Colorado, fire arms are

another tool, like in Texas," Wilson said. Handguns can be worn openly by citizens in Colorado, and this is often seen during hunting season. They are not allowed in schools, banks or places that serve liquor, however.
