

#### Lawsuit challenges trustee election method

A lawsuit filed in U. S. District Court in San Angelo June 17 against the trustees of the Crockett County Common Consolidated Independent School District seeks to increase minority representation on the school board.

Plaintiff Orlando De Hoyos is represented by Rolando L. Rios of San Antonio who also filed suit against the Winters Independent School District in May on behalf of the Runnels County-League of United Latin American Citizens Council 658.

The Ozona and Winters suits are two of many across the state which challenge the at-large method of electing trustees. The Crockett County suit asks for a declaratory judgment that the present method of electing trustees violates the plaintiff's civil rights by diluting the minority voting strength and asks for formation of single member electoral districts.

Ozona's 7-member school board presently has two Mexican-American members. Section VI, Facts, of the suit, #11 states "Upon information and belief, if seven single member districts are drawn, at least one minority district could be created."

Superintendent of Schools Jim Payne and board president Gary Buck Mitchell were out of town Tuesday and unavailable for comment.

school. Equipment in the present Apple computer literacy lab will be used to teach keyboarding skills to sixth grade students.

The trustees also approved a \$125,000 technology budget for next year which will fund the Ozona Middle School's computer lab described above as well as automating the Ozona High School Library to include a twentystudent computer laboratory there. The district will move the 20 older IBMcompatable computers that are presently being used in high school computer science classes to the library so that all students will have more access to computers in regard to their classroom assignments and will purchase 20 486 IBM-compatable computers as a technology upgrade for computer

The technology budget also includes software allocations for all four schools, automation of the Ozona Middle School and Ozona Intermediate School libraries through the purchase of computers and library-related software, and the purchase of a participation agreement with the Public \$.45-\$.53# Broadcasting System (PBS) for recording educational programs and providing support materials for all teachers in the district. Financial support for the Jostens Learning System used in Ozona Primary School and Ozona Intermediate School computer labs will also be maintained.

The members approved the purchase of two 65-passenger school buses from State Wide Sales, a payment to Jay Miller Construction Company for services performed on the Ozona High School Handicapped Accessibility Project, agreed to purchase a used truck to transport band equipment, one-act play props, etc. to district activities, purchased physical fitness equipment requested by Ozona Intermediate School, and approved a request by Donnie York to be reassigned from computer literacy teacher to librarian for Ozona Middle School, Ozona Intermediate School, and Ozona Primary School.

The school board accepted letters of resignation from Glenn Graham, Janis Graham, Manuela Rodriquez, and Keith Shoush, and approved the employment of Tommy Wilson (Ozona Middle School), Mary Phillips (Ozona Primary School), Jim Green (Ozona Intermediate School), Michael Gully (Ozona Intermediate School), John Cox (Ozona Middle School), and Adriana Cox (Ozona Primary School.

During the meeting Don Payne, school athletic director, met with the trustees to give them information concerning school athletic periods and coaching assignments. The preliminary Texas oil production figure for March is 48,824,102 barrels, down from the 51,933,810 barrels reported in March 1992.
