To The Residents Of Crockett County

On August 3, 1993 the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Trustees will ask voters to approve Option No. 3 as the method to be used by our District to comply with Senate Bill 7.

Senate Bill 7 requires that Districts with available taxable wealth per student exceeding \$280,000 must choose from among five methods of decreasing the amount of property wealth per student to the required level. If a district does not choose one of the 5 Options, the Commissioner of Education will choose Option 1 or Option 2 for that district.

First, I will describe the four Options your School Board did not choose and give the reasons the Board felt they were not acceptable methods for compliance with the law.

Option No. 1: Voluntary consolidation with another district. The governing boards of two or more districts could agree to consolidate the school systems to establish a consolidated district with less than \$280,000 in property wealth per student.

This option has many undesirable aspects. First it would be a permanent consolidation even if Senate Bill 7 is found to be unconstitutional, as may very well happen. Second it would require a governing board, made up from all the districts consolidated, which would be making the decisions and policies for our district.

Option No. 2: Detachment and annexation by agreement. Under this option Crockett County would agree to detach territory from our district and attach it to a district that has less wealth than \$280,000 per student. When all the detaching and attaching is completed both districts must have property value per student of less than

\$280,000.

Again this option, like Option 1, would become permanent even if Senate Bill 7 is found to be unconstitutional. This option could become very complicated and require the district to hire outside firms and lawyers to make the transaction of detachment and attachment.

Option No. 4: Non-resident student education contracts. Under this option Crockett County could, with voter approval, agree to educate students of another district that has a wealth less than \$280,000 per student.

This option would require that we reach an agreement with the other district to send them enough money to educate approximately 380 students at an estimated cost of \$3,500 per student or about \$1,330,000. This option is very similar to Option No. 3 with the exception that under this option we could be responsible for more accounting procedures and would be more complicated than sending the money to the State. Also this option would require agreement by the other district which could be as far away as 800 miles.

Option No. 5: Tax Base consolidation. The governing boards of two or more districts could agree, with voter approval in each district, to create a consolidated taxing district for maintenance and operation of the component districts. Tax rates would be authorized by the taxing district.

This option would mean that Crockett Co. Con. Common School District's tax rates would be determined by a board that was not completely composed of residents of Crockett County which is not acceptable to our Board of Trustees.

Option No. 3: Buying "attendance credits". Under this option Crockett County will, with voter approval, buy attendance credits from the state to lower its wealth per student to \$280,000 per student.

This option is less complicated, less permanent, will not require as much administrative cost, and will give far more local control over our property and taxes than any of the other options. Option No. 3 is the choice of your local School Trustees.

Voters must remember two important facts when casting votes on August 3rd. First, you will not be voting to approve giving up funds or property. That has already been decided by the legislature. You will be voting to approve the Option that your local school board has determined the best method for complying with the law. The second fact to be remembered is, if voters do not approve Option 3, the Commissioner of Education has the right by law to use Option No. 1 or Option No. 2 as the method to reduce the property value of our school district. Both these Options would be very detrimental to our school district.

All so called wealthy school districts in Texas must, by law, choose one of the 5 Options for reducing the property wealth per student. Your school board has selected Option 3 and is asking that you vote for authorizing the board of trustees of Crockett County Consolidated Common School District to purchase attendance credits from the state with local tax revenues.

Community Center To Provide Meals For Children This Summer

Ozona Community Center announced this week the sponsorship of the Summer Food Service Program. Meals will be provided at the center Monday-Friday from noon until 1 p.m. for children in Ozona between the ages of 1 and 18. The program will begin July 7 and conclude Aug. 13. For further information, call 392-2710.

Meals will be provided free of charge to all children in Ozona within this age range regardless of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, religion, or political belief. Anyone who believes they have been discriminated against should write immediately to:

Director, Civil Rights Division, MC E-609, Texas Department of Human Services, P. O. Box 149030, Austin, TX 78714-9030 or the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, DC 20250. NOTE: Discrimination complaints based on religion or political beliefs must be referred only to the Director, Civil Rights Division, Texas Department of Human Services.

The aim of this program is to ensure that all children in Ozona receive well-balanced nutritious meals during the summer vacation from school. However, because of built-in funding limitations, the government regulations limit free meals to children between the ages of one year and 18 years of age. The meals must be eaten at the community center, and parents accompanying children are not allowed to share their children's meal. A menu appears elsewhere in this issue of The Stockman.

Voting Begins In Special Election

Early voting by personal appearance begins July 14 in the special election which will allow the school district to purchase attendance credits from the state. This is the method selected by the board of trustees as the best school finance option for Crockett County.

The school administration building is the location for early voting by personal appearance, and the last day to vote by this method is July 30.

Applications to receive ballots to be voted by mail is July 27. Requests should be made to Mae Lay at the school administration building, Box 400, Ozona.

The election will be held Tuesday, Aug. 3 in the county courthouse. Hours will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

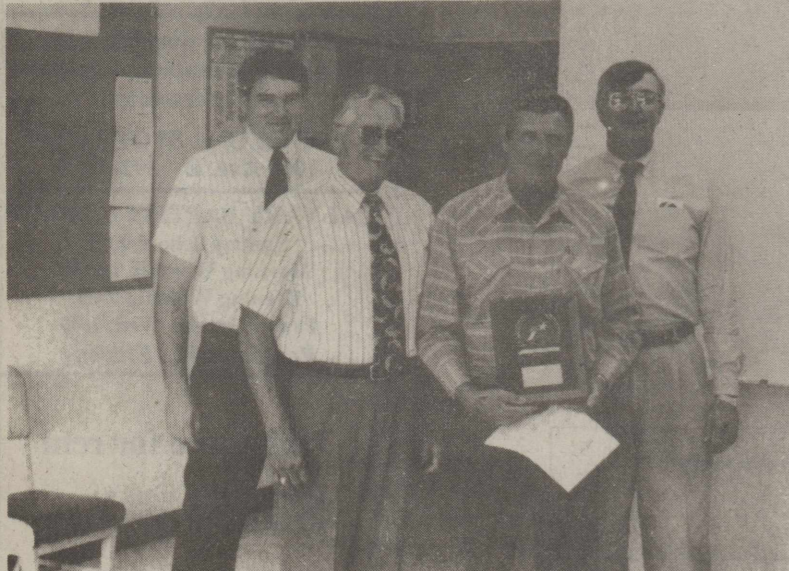
Mahannah Recognized For 35 Years Of Service To TxDOT

Social Security News Role Of Representative Payee

Among the 40 million people getting Social Security benefits each month are five million who do not receive their check directly. It goes to someone else - a representative payee - who is responsible for assuring that the funds are used on the person's behalf.

Representative payees are selected when it is found that a person is unable to manage his or her own funds. A payee may be a parent, legal guardian, a relative, neighbor, friend, member of a volunteer organization, or an official of an institution in which the person is staying.

Minor children require representative payees. The law also requires that drug addicts and alcoholics who receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments because of disability have representative payees.

Representative payees are held accountable for the proper use of the funds and will be called upon to make an accounting periodically. In general, the representative payee must first make sure the person's day-to-day basic needs for food, shelter, clothing and personal items are met. If he or she can manage, small amounts of spending money should be made available.

If these basic needs are met, benefits can be used for special needs the person has, such as school expenses, rehabilitation or medical expenses, insurance premiums, current payments on a house in which the person has an interest, tax payments, and certain similar expenses. Any money not used for meeting basic and special needs must be saved or invested. Preferred investments are U. S. savings bonds. The people at Social Security can tell

you how they should be registered.

Representative payees are also responsible for promptly reporting any event to Social Security which may affect the person's monthly benefit.

It's also important that the representative payee tell Social Security in advance if he or she is no longer able to serve as representative payee. This will give Social Security time to select a new payee and avoid any interruption of benefits.

Representative payees who have questions about their duties should call Social Security on the toll-free telephone number 1-800-772-1213. You can speak to a representative from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. weekdays. The San Angelo Social Security Office is located at 2214 Sherwood Way, and the telephone number is 949-4608.

The June 30 issue of The Stockman stated that schools with taxable valuations in excess of \$208,000 per student must reduce their funding to that level by sharing with the state or specific school districts. That figure should have been \$280,000. Crockett County schools are included.

Breast-fed Babies Sleep Better

HOUSTON--(May 18, 1993)--Studies at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center in Houston indicate there are significant differences between the sleep patterns of breast-fed and formula-fed infants.

Dr. Nancy Butte, an associate professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine, found that four-month old, breast-fed infants spent more sleep time in a "quiet" cycle called NREM (nonrapid eye movement) than formula-fed infants. The NREM stage appears to require complex feedback from the brain that maintains blood pressure, regulates breathing and heart rate, and inhibits physical activity.

In contrast, formula-fed infants spent more time in the REM (rapid

eye movement) cycle. During REM, also known as the dream cycle, the body experiences an increase in breathing and heart rate, blood pressure and physical activity.

"The duration of 'active' sleep and 'quiet' sleep shifts as the infant grows and begins to undergo longer periods of unbroken sleep," Butte said. "These changes in sleep behavior reflect changes in brain function."

According to Butte, differences in sleep patterns may be due to differences in the composition of human milk and formula or developmental differences between the breast-fed and formula-fed infant.

"This is another piece of the puzzle that appears to support increasing

evidence that the way a baby is fed may impact growth and development," she said.

Results from this study follow previous CNRC findings that indicate breast-fed infants burn fewer calories when they sleep and have lower heart rates than formula-fed infants.

Despite early differences in sleep patterns between breast fed and formula-fed infants, Butte emphasizes that scientists do not know the cause or the long-term implications.

The study is part of the Center's ongoing research aimed at defining the energy requirements and nutrient needs of infants.

The findings were published in a recent edition of Pediatric Research.

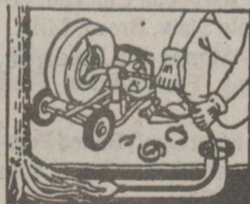
"The Mexican rodeo will benefit a retirement home in Del Rio for nuns," Galindo said.

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Governor Signs Bill For Inmate Work Programs

Gov. Richards signed into law House Bill 864 which will allow incarcerated inmates in county jails waiting to be transferred to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice to volunteer for county inmate work programs. Current law only allows persons who are in jail awaiting trial, or who have been convicted of a misdemeanor to participate in such programs.

"Implementing meaningful work, rehabilitation and educational programs continue to be major issues that face today's criminal justice system. Encouraging a positive work ethic is a vital component to the mission of TDCJ," said Gov. Richards.

"I commend Rep. Johnson on sponsoring this bill and local sheriffs for supporting it. The state needs more

of these productive work programs for inmates."

Rep. Johnson echoed the Governor's sentiments, "The general public wants inmates to work. Most inmates would rather work than sit in a cell all day, and our local communities can benefit from inmate work programs."

Rep. Johnson worked closely with East Texas sheriffs in formulating the bill and credits them with the idea. "They were instrumental in developing the idea," he added.

"The result of passage of H.B. 864 is a win-win situation. Many people have felt that these prisoners should be utilized in a productive manner. County projects and a cut down in disciplinary problems are only a few of the benefits from this program," Stated Sen. Haley (D-Center).

H.B. 864 clarifies existing law and permits local sheriffs to institute work programs and have all qualified inmates participate voluntarily. Studies show that skills the majority of the inmates claim to have do not prove to be valid.

Provisions in H.B. 864 also allow for inmates who voluntarily participate in these programs to be awarded good conduct time. It is the responsibility of the local sheriff to certify any good conduct time earned. The disposition of the good conduct time will be used by the director of TDCJ.

Sponsors of H.B. 864 are Rep. Jerry Johnson (D-Nacogdoches) and Sen. Bill Haley (D-Center). The bill will become effective on Aug. 30, 1993.

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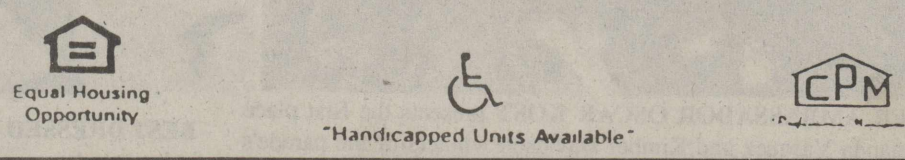

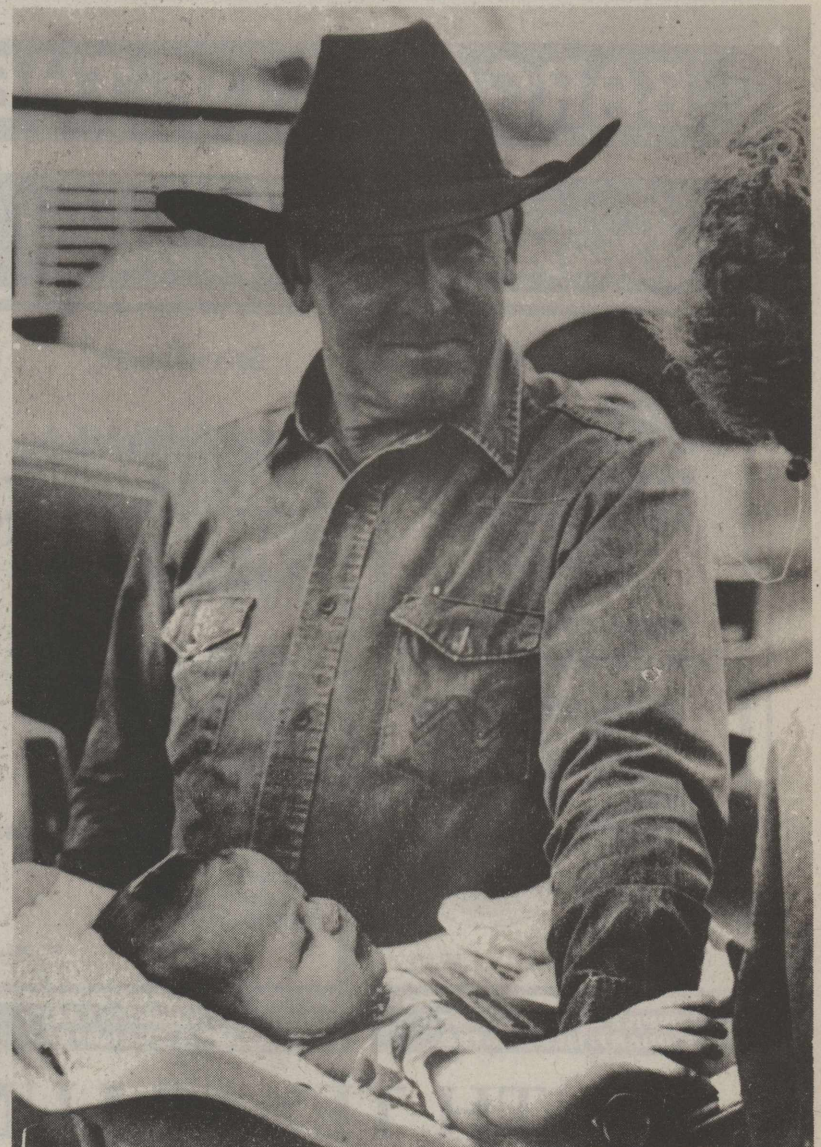

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Babies Can Get ACNE

HOUSTON - Babies can have acne just like teenagers.

Just like teenage hormones, baby hormones are very active, and acne is a normal response to this hormonal activity, said Dr. Moise Levy, a dermatologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Neonatal acne appears at birth or in early infancy and affects an estimated 20 percent of newborns, mostly boys.
