This option is less complicated, much administrative cost, and will give far more local control over our property and taxes than any of the other options. Option No. 3 is the choice of your local School Trustees.

Voters must remember two important facts when casting votes on August 3rd. First, you will not be voting to approve giving up funds or property. That has already been decided by the legislature. You will be voting to approve the Option that your local school board has determined the best method for complying with the law. The second fact to be remembered is, if voters do not approve Option 3, the Commissioner of Education has the right by law to use our school district.

ByDennis J. Prutow Box 303, Sterling, KS 67579 Have you ever thought, "I have sinned"? After Judas betrayed Jesus, "he felt remorse and returned the 30 pieces of silver to the chief priests and elders, saying, 'I have sinned" " (Matthew 27:3-4).

But Judas did not get any encouragement from the chief priests. They responded, "What is that to us? See to that yourself!" (Matthew 27:4). Imagine, these religious leaders told Judas to handle his own problems of sin and
