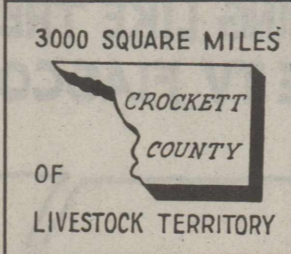

Outstanding 4-H'ers Honored At Banquet

The Mother Davidson Trophy was awarded for the 42nd time Monday evening as Stefny Sutton, 17-year-old daughter of Jeffrey and Carmen Sutton, was named Outstanding Crockett County Senior 4-H Member at the 1993 4-H Recognition Banquet. Sutton had a big night, as she was also named the winner of the \$1,000 Dan Bean 4-H Memorial Scholarship, given annually to the outstanding 4-H agricultural program member.

Sutton, who utilizes her leadership skills as Public Relations officer for the District VI 4-H Council, er ship skills as public relations officer for the District VI 4-H Council, County 4-H Council chairman, and Texas 4-H Teen Fashion board member. She received an all-expense-paid trip to National 4-H Congress in Chicago plus a \$1,500 scholarship from the McCall Pattern Company, Viking/White Sewing Machines, and House of Fabrics, who are the national donors for the program.

Sutton was selected this year from 21 contestants to narrate the Texas 4-H Fashion Show at State Roundup, and has been one of three Texas representatives in '92 to the Southern Regional Textile Symposium, returning in 1993 to present her second-year

Textile Fellow project on a new fabric. Stefny has also advanced twice to the Texas 4-H Fashion Show and has been a delegate to Texas 4-H Congress, the Texas Sheep and Goat Youth Leadership Workshop and numerous district leadership labs. In her livestock projects, Sutton has been active with market and ewe lambs and Angora Goats, capping off her experiences with the Grand Champion Angora Billy at this year's Houston Livestock show.

She and partner Jennifer Evans also presented the state-winning 4-H Sheep and Goat Demonstration at Texas 4-H Roundup this year and have given their talk on the Wool Act to several organizations, including the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Annual meeting, Ozona Woman's Forum and Ozona Lion's Club.

All of Crockett County's 4-H'ers were honored for their achievements during the 1992-93 year at the annual event, which was attended by State Representative Bob Turner of Coleman. The banquet was also the annual meeting of the Extension Program Council in Crockett County, and Extension Program Committee reports were given by Chairman Pleas Childress III.

Several other major 4-H awards were presented during the evening. Named Gold Star Award winners were Adrienne Dickerson, daughter of Terry and Peggy Dickerson, and JoLynn Vannoy, daughter of Dr. Gary and Nancy Vannoy, who will also be honored at the 1993 District Gold Star Banquet in Midland on Saturday.

Dickerson, a 9-year 4-H member, has learned she can be a winner in life by improving herself through the process of competition. Her main projects and activities include market and ewe lambs, Angora goats, foods, clothing and wool judging. As a teen leader, she's given talks on lamb at multi-county workshops, was a participant in the first Texas Sheep and Goat Youth Leadership workshop, has attended numerous district and county leadership trainings, and has been a Texas 4-H Congress delegate and Roundup contestant. For the past two years, one of her most critical leadership roles has been to organize and

host receptions for the descendants of David Crockett during the county's annual Crockett Birthday event.

JoLynn Vannoy says during her eight years in 4-H, the most valuable things she's received are friends and self-confidence, including the confidence to run for a district office. As first vice president of the District 6 Council and newly-inducted member of the Texas 4-H Council, there's a busy year ahead in addition to her project work in foods, clothing, Angora goats and both market and ewe lambs. She's advanced to the State Fashion Show two years, winning second place in both the cotton and buying divisions this year, has participated at State Roundup with demonstrations and public speaking, attended State Recreation Training and Clothing Camp, and has won numerous awards with her sheep and goats, including Senior Goat Showman at the prestigious Kerrville show. JoLynn sums up her experiences by saying "4-H is where I have learned to explore, dream and discover."

The Danforth "I Dare You" Award was presented to Tara Wilkins, daughter of Steve and Belinda Wilkins, and Casey Upham, son of Randy and Elizabeth Upham.

The Danforth Award stresses personal achievement, citizenship and leadership and is to be a challenge to its recipients to live a purposeful life.

The senior leadership, citizenship and achievement medals are presented annually to outstanding 4-H members in the high school club. They are the highest medal awards given in Crockett County. Senior leadership awards were presented to Stefny Sutton and Adrienne Dickerson. Senior citizenship medals went to JoLynn Vannoy and Nancy Arrott, and senior achievement went to Heather Hill, Jeannie Cooper and Justin Moran.

The highest junior awards are also leadership, citizenship and achievement. This year, junior leadership awards were presented to Wesley

Hawks Blank Lions In District Match

Miscues, missed opportunities and missed timing contributed to a heartbreaking 27-0 district loss for the Lion varsity in Wall last Friday night.

While Ozona's defense held Wall to their lowest point total yet this year, the offense lacked the precision they showed the previous week against Eldorado. A swarming Wall defense picked off passes, pounced on fumbles and generally made life miserable for quarterback Justin Castro and crew.

Twenty-three carries resulted in minus total rushing yardage for the Lions, who set themselves back several times with penalties and fumbles after impressive runs by Anthony Sanchez, Jesse Garza and Justin Castro. Surprisingly, total penalty yardage by Wall surpasses the Lions' total by 5 yards, but Wall managed to take advantage of sharp passing and good blocking to score several times.

Wall scored on their first possession of the ball on a 25-yard Chad Box

to Chad Meyer pass. The extra point attempt was good with only 1:17 minutes gone in the first quarter.

Quarterback Justin Castro wasted no time in throwing the ball to his receivers Chris Sanchez, Jesse Garza and others. Castro was intercepted a few moments later by a Wall defender. Two plays later, Wall fumbled and the Lions recovered but were still unable to move the ball against a quick Wall defense.

Wall made two quick touchdowns in the second quarter, one on a Box 34-yard run with the extra point good. The other score came a few minutes later on the Wall kickoff when Lion Jesse Garza fumbled. The ball was picked up by a Wall defender who went in to score on a 22-yard run. The extra point was good.

The Lions moved the ball in the second quarter with two pass plays to Chris Sanchez garnering 41 yards. A third 10-yard pass play was good to

Koerth, Mahannah Retire From Highway Department

On Friday, Oct. 1, former co-workers of Winston Koerth and Fred Mahannah honored the men on their retirement from the Texas Department of Transportation. The two retired with a combined total of 75 years of service.

Koerth ends 39 years with the department as maintenance supervisor of Crockett County highways. He has held this position since transferring here from Sonora June 1, 1987.

His career with TxDOT began as a roadman in the Llano County residency on Sept. 16, 1954. He transferred to the Burnet County residency Dec. 5, 1955, where he worked as junior inspector and senior instrumentman until Jan. 1, 1961, when he was promoted to senior party chief.

Koerth's first assignment to Ozona came April 1, 1965, when he was

assigned the duties of plan preparation and design of IH 10 through Crockett County. After completion of the plan work, he spent three years in the field as construction project manager.

In February of 1981, he was assigned the duties of plan preparation and design of IH 27 in the Lubbock district and Beltway 8 in the Houston district. He transferred to the Sutton County residency on June 1, 1984, due to the closing of the Crockett County residency, and continued his work with the Houston District on Beltway 8 plans and design.

Koerth's transfer to Ozona in 1987 saw his title change from engineer technician V to roadway maintenance supervisor.

Winston and Betty Koerth are the parents of two daughters and one son.

His retirement plans include playing a lot of golf, going fishing and hunting.

Mahannah has been an employee of TxDOT for 36 years. Born and reared in Grenville, NM, he began employment with the highway department Nov. 1, 1956, in Snyder as a surveyor.

He moved to Ozona in 1965 and worked for the engineering department that completed IH 10. After completion of this project, he transferred to the Sonora residency and inspected state contract jobs until his retirement on Sept. 30.

Now he plans to work "a little" around the house and spend "a lot" of time in Del Rio fishing and doing the things fishermen do.

In addition to his civic activities, Mr. Baize enjoys hunting, fishing, camping and working with livestock.

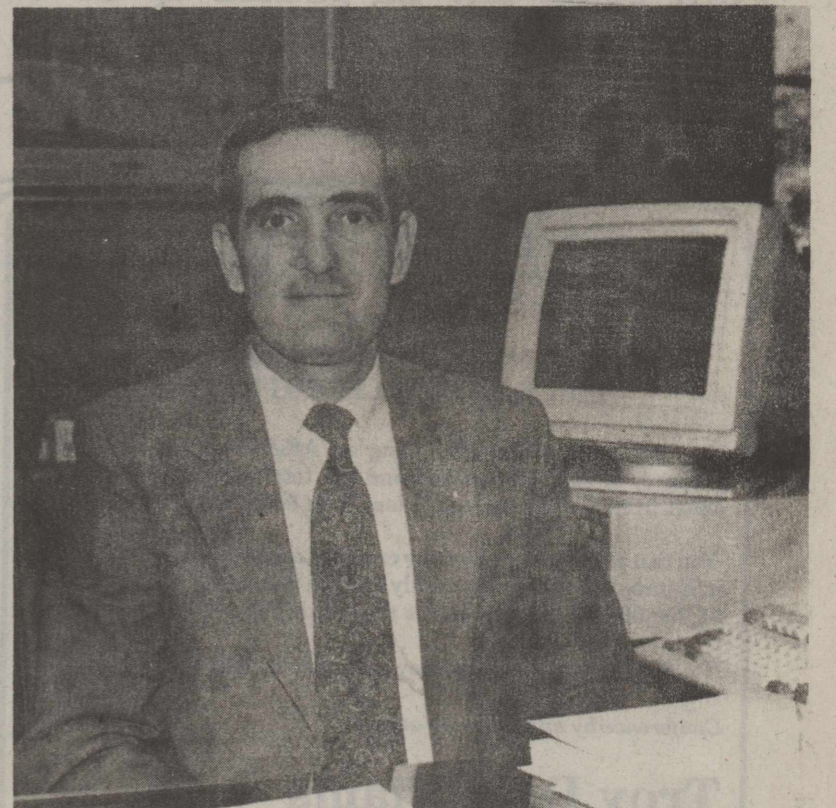
Mr. Baize and his wife, René, are the parents of two children, Todd, age 17, and Vanessa, age 14.

The Ozona 7th Grade Cubs clipped the Reagan County Owls 25-12 last Thursday evening, Sept. 30, to stay undefeated. The Cubs' record is now 4-0.

Matt Galindo made it look easy as he scampered 39 yards for a TD in the first quarter. It took only two plays for the Cubs to achieve the first score, but the extra point attempt failed.

Good overall defense by the Cubs, notably by Robert Kelly and Alex Castaneda, helped set up the second score, which came easier than the first when a miscued punt allowed the Cubs to recover the ball on the Owl 12-yard line. On the next play Galindo ran a right sweep for a touchdown, scoring his second of the evening. The extra point was kicked through the upright to make it 13-0 in the first quarter.

The Owls were in the right place at the right time when the Cubs, attempting to punt, faked and tried a pitch out. The pitch was fumbled, and an Owl defender scooped it up and ran 50 yards for a touchdown. The extra point attempt failed. The Cubs still led 13-6 when time ran out in the first half.

Good defense again in the third quarter forced the Owls to punt. David Gutierrez took the punt on the 50-yard line and returned it for another Cub

touchdown. The extra point conversion failed.

Donika Martinez, coming into the third quarter as a fullback, received the ball twice and scored on a four-yard run. A faked kick and pitch out for the extra point was fumbled and recovered by the Owls.

A Cub fumble recovered by the Owls on their own 30-yard line set the stage for an Owl touchdown. The Owls took to the air as their quarterback hit two-of-four passes and completed a 53-yard pass play for a score. The extra point attempt failed, leaving the Cubs leading 25-12.

Offensively, the Cubs ran up a total of 21 carries for 161 yards. Leading the Cubs in rushing were: David Gutierrez with 7 carries for 71 yards, Matt Galindo with 3 carries for 54 yards, Donika Martinez with 5 carries for 20 yards, Alex Castaneda with 2 carries for 9 yards, Anthony Ortiz with 3 carries for 5 yards and Brad Sullivan with one carry for 2 yards.

"Our defense played well, allowing Reagan County only one first down," Coach Rodney Johnson commented. Those playing good defense for the Cubs included: Ricky Dominguez, Jason Alvarez, Robert Kelly and Alex Castaneda.

The Cubs have an open date this week, but will play on Thursday, Oct. 14, in Iraan at 5 p.m.

Ranch Women Educate 4th Graders In San Angelo

Approximately 1500 students and 76 teachers from 21 schools saw live animals, learned the relationship between sheep and wool, goats and mohair, talked with bee keepers and saw their exhibits, examined a miniature cotton gin, heard about range management and candled eggs as part of an egg to chick demonstration.

The Sheep and Goat Auxiliary booth featured samples of raw wool and mohair and clothes and blankets made from these fibers. There was also a video from the Mohair Council.

Children in Ozona schools are learning about fire prevention this week through poster contests, classroom projects and visits from fire department members. And of course, fire drills are included.

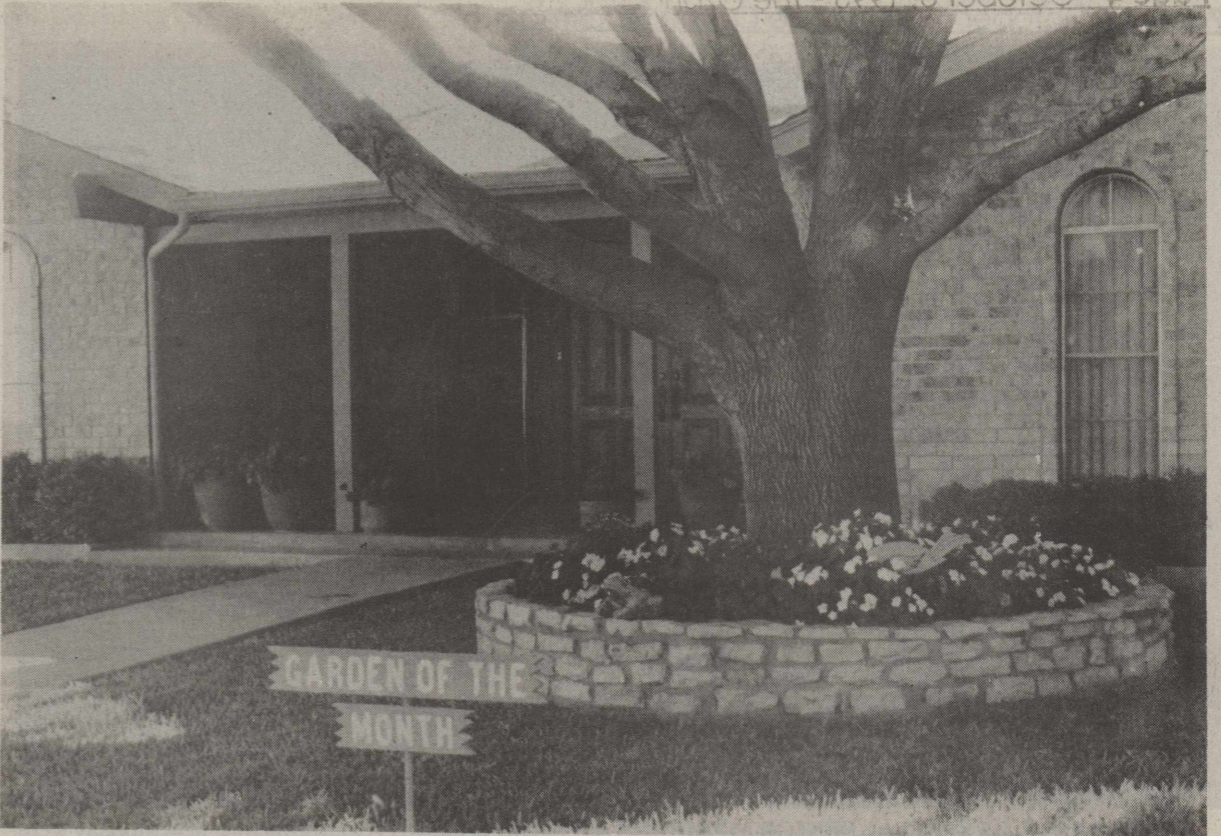
During October, which is National Fire Prevention Month, the first week is set aside to emphasize fire safety and to honor firefighters for their service in the community.

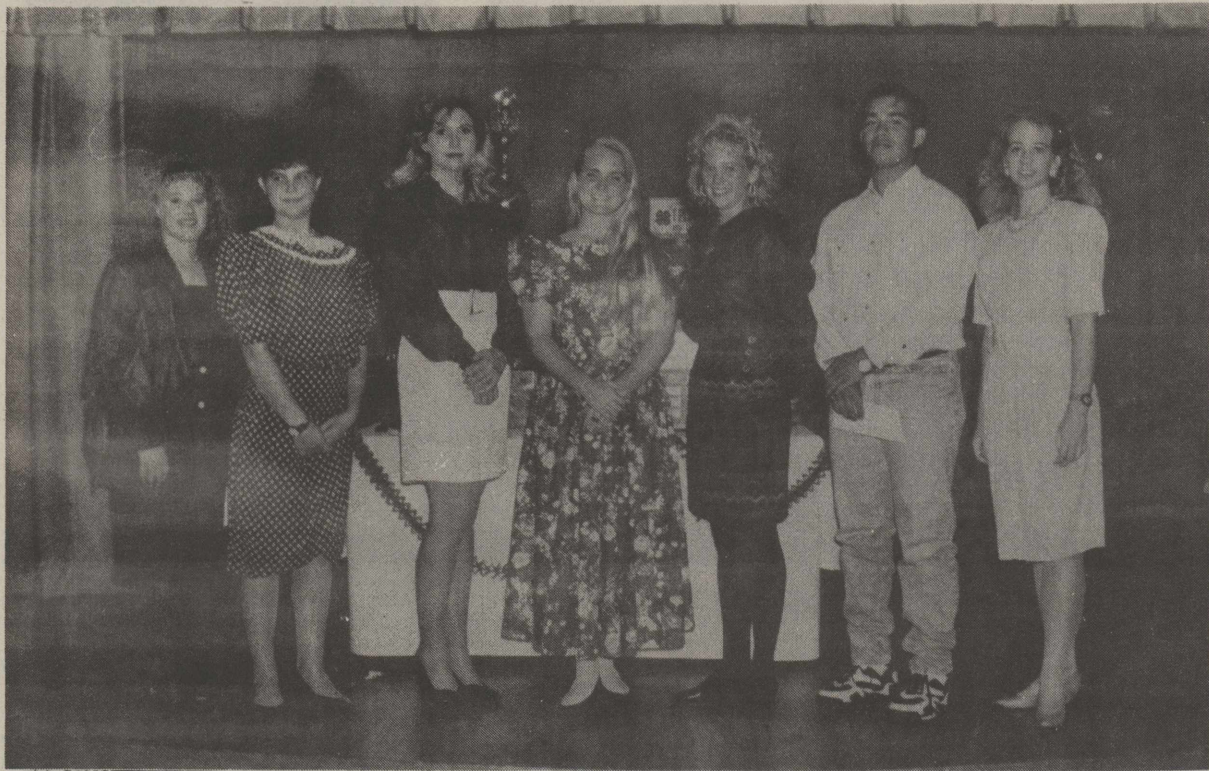

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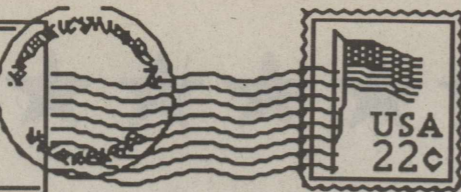

Ireland, beautiful Ireland - I am writing about the trip Sibyl Howell and I made recently to the British Isles. Ireland was our last stop.

On our arrival in Ireland we drove to our lovely hotel in Dublin where we stayed two nights.

A sightseeing tour the next morning included the major sights of the Irish capital. Dublin has a population of one million. The highlight of our tour was the library of Trinity College. (Trinity was founded by Queen Elizabeth I in 1592.) Here we saw the incredible Book of Kells, a work ascribed to medieval monks. It has been called the "world's most beautiful book" because of its color, detail and ornamental tracery. The book contains all four gospels.

The Victorian section of Dublin was interesting, each door was painted a different bright color. A small neat flower garden was in front. These are called row houses.

In the afternoon we traveled to Malahide Castle, on the coast of the Irish Sea just north of Dublin. That evening we went to a folklore show and dinner. A tenor sang age-old Irish ballads that we all know so well, lovely "colleens" danced the traditional jigs and reels.

While in Dublin I called a cousin of Jewel Baileys'. We had a good visit on the telephone.

The next morning we traveled southwest out of the capital, into lush green landscapes. The first thing I noticed was how green everything was. It's obvious why it's called the "Emerald Isle".

Our first stop was at Kildare to see the Japanese Gardens and the National Stud Farm of Ireland. The government owns this farm and is known for their ability to produce fine racehorses. They export them all over the world.

In this central area of Ireland, we saw where they were strip-mining the peat bogs. This is cut about the size of a brick and stacked to dry. Peat is not only the fuel of rural Ireland but now is used to generate electricity. After a bog has been stripped, it's planted again with trees.

We stopped at Cashel for tea. A young girl played the harp for us. This was an enjoyable stop. From Cashel we went south to Cork where we stayed that night. Our lovely room overlooked the River Lee. The next morning we made a stop at the little village of Blarney. Saw the Blarney Castle and I didn't kiss the Blarney Stone. We made a stop at Blarney Woolen Mills-could find most anything there, much like a mall. I bought Irish lace for Jan, as she had requested. From the gentle landscapes of the interior we traveled into rugged mountains of southwest Ireland.

Groups of people were camped along the way. We were told that they were tinkers and did repair work to earn enough to live.

Killamey is our next stop for the night. On arrival we took a ride in a "jaunting car" - a horse-drawn buggy. Drivers are called "jarvies", and are known for their never-ending stream of tales, songs and ----blarney. The ride was fun and it took us through the lovely gardens of Muckross House. The gardens were delightful and the house most interesting.

Next day we drove the famed Ring of Kerry. This is the name given to the road along the coast of the Iveragh Peninsula. This is on the North Atlantic Ocean. Mountains and sandy beaches all so beautiful. Whitewashed cottages dot the land. Tiny fields and beside each dwelling was a stack of dried peat. The road was narrow and bumpy. Stopped at a tearoom for lunch - had Irish stew - very good.

The next morning we stopped for a visit and tea at the farm home of Jim and Margaret Cumdrum. We followed Jim to the barns and he told of his cattle and dairy operation. He had feed stored for winter. Now I have lived around livestock all my life but the odor in that barn was bad - so as we made our way back to the new house for tea, I softly said to the lady walking beside me, "I guess we had better do the barnyard shuffle". She said loudly "the barnyard shuffle - what do you mean?" Others gathered round and I had to show them the Texas barnyard shuffle along with my little tune. Next time I'll just stay quiet.

We made our way back to Dublin for the night and our farewell dinner. On day 16 we started our journey home from Dublin Airport.

This was a wonderful trip and we saw so much beauty and we made new friends. But Ozona is still the best place on earth to call home.

The defense held the Hawks on the next set of downs. The two teams then traded interceptions with Jesse Garza saving a Wall touchdown. A Lion fumble two plays later gave the ball back to Wall, but time ran out in the first half of play. Wall had a comfortable lead with the halftime score 21-0.

Ozona fans were stunned to see their team being outscored after such a good game last week against Eldorado, and could only hope the Lions could come back with some scoring in the second half. However, six lost turnovers, a minus one yard in total rushing, and eight penalties were just too much for the Lions to overcome. Incomplete passes and a lack of a rushing game hurt the Lions' chances in the third quarter and the rest of the game.

In the third quarter, Chris Sanchez intercepted a pass to stop a Wall scoring threat. Moments later a Castro pass was intercepted, and the Hawks again were able to convert this turnover into a 29-yard scoring drive topped off with a 25-yard pass play from Box to Medina. The extra point attempt failed.

Good defense by both the Lions and Hawks kept the last quarter scoreless. The Lions' best chance to score came after Robert Bryson's interception and 15-yard return to the Wall 5-yard line. However, a good rush by Wall sacked Castro for a 10-yard loss on first down. On third-and-15, Wall recovered a fumble at his 5-yard line to end the Lions' threat.

The Lions had the ball two more times before the game ended, but were unable to score. The game ended with Castro completing 11 of 27 passes for 144 yards. Those receiving passes from Castro were:

"We just faced a real good football team--making good plays. We had a hard time blocking their people. They rushed with eight players, it seemed like twelve, and we didn't always get them blocked."

Ozona's season record now stands at 3-2, district play at 1-1.

Looking to next week, the Lions will be facing their third district team as the Stanton Buffaloes will be coming to town. Stanton has two outstanding backs, Ricky Lucas, a 1992 honorable mention All-State running back, and junior Jeroid Lee, a fullback. These two players average 80-100 yards each per game. Game time will be at 8 p.m. in Lion Stadium.
