





The first meeting will be at the Crockett County Extension Office on the second floor of the Courthouse Annex. Other meetings may be held at different locations.


Names of those satisfactorily completing the course and passing a short exam will be listed with the Ozona Chamber of Commerce as babysitting resource persons.
