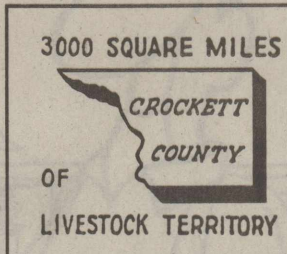

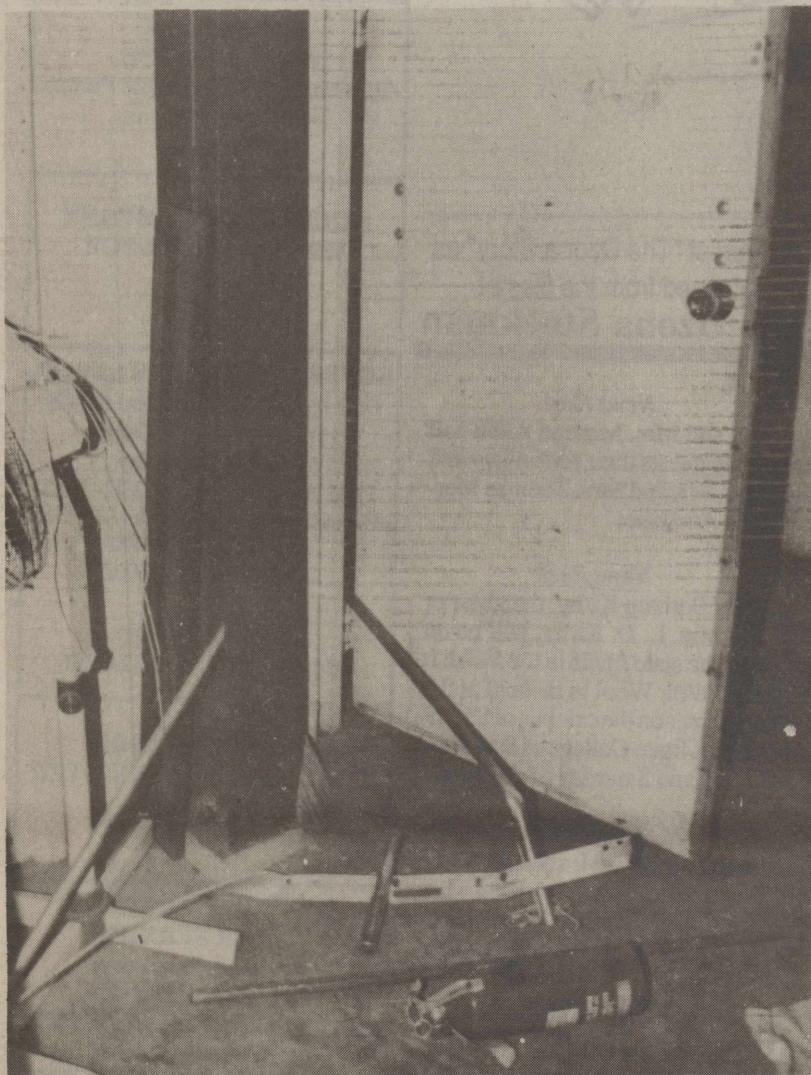

## Trash, Trash Everywhere

Ozona residents and Crockett County Water District officials alike

have been concerned these past few days about the buildup of trash in our fair city. Dumpsters in parts of town have been overflowing with excess trash, some to the point of spilling out onto the street. As of Monday afternoon, these areas had not had trash pickup since before Christmas.

Officials from several West Texas towns met in Monahans in late December to discuss their trash pick up problems with Pack Rat, Inc. Attending the meeting from Ozona representing the Crockett County Water and Improvement District #1 were directors Dan Davidson and Dennis Clark.

"I really didn't get much out of the meeting," said Davidson. "They were all trying to figure out a way to help Pack Rat." The trash disposal company is reported to have contracts with 16 entities including area cities, counties, state parks and private customers.

Rapid expansion to serve areas

which have closed their landfills in the past two years has caused a temporary cash flow problem according to company president Jack Dorris. A \$25,000 past due bill has led the City of Alpine to lock Pack Rat out of its landfill, and Ozona trash is now being taken to Pecos according to Davidson.

Water district directors voted against renewing their contract with Pack Rat at a late December called meeting. The contract expires at the end of March. The district is advertising for bids for trash disposal beginning with this issue of the paper. Pack Rat will be able to bid along with other interested companies.

A Pack Rat truck was operating in Ozona late Monday night collecting garbage in part of the area which had not been served since Dec. 23.

A representative from the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission was in Ozona early this week and looked into the trash buildup situation.

## Filing Ends

Candidates wanting a place on the March 8 Democratic Primary ballot had until 6 p.m. Monday night to file with A. O. Fields, county Democratic party chairman.

Offices up for re-election are: judge, district and county clerk, precincts 2 and 4 commissioners, justice of the peace and treasurer - unexpired

term.

At the close of filing, incumbent Kathryn Mayfield and Jeffrey Sutton had filed for county judge. Candidates in the clerk's race are incumbent Debby Puckett, Barbie Myers and Nora Madris.

Incumbent commissioner Fred Deaton is unchallenged in Precinct 2.

In the Precinct 4 race, incumbent Rudy Martinez Jr., Armando G. Robledo, Richard Vargas and Jimmy Ortiz are all asking to be elected.

Justice of the Peace Jim Hearne has no opponent, nor does Burl Myers who asks to be elected to the office of treasurer, unexpired term.

112th District Judge Brock Jones is unchallenged.

A. O. Fields will also be on the ballot for county Democratic party chairman.

Troy Williams has filed a declaration of intent to run as an independent candidate for county judge. Candidates running as an independent may file for a place on the ballot for the November general election after the May primary runoff election day.

## Maria De La Rosa Ends 31 Year Career With WTU

A retirement party honored Maria De La Rosa Monday for her 31 years as an employee of West Texas Utilities. Company officials lauded her for her hard work and pleasant smile no matter what the circumstances.

This is actually the second retirement for Maria. She first retired in 1970 to care for three school age children and await the birth of a fourth. During two of the seven years she was out of the work force, the family lived

in Illinois and Iowa. When they returned to Ozona, there was an opening at WTU and the company was pleased to have her back.

Maria began with WTU in 1954 when T. J. Bailey was manager. He hired her away from her job at Joseph's Department Store. "It was hard to get used to a sitting job," remembers Maria. She worked under Mr. Bailey for 15 or so years and then with managers Wayne Lowrey and Glenn

Burns before the 1970 retirement.

"Mr. Bailey always said, 'remember, if you put it down right, it's going to come out right,'" she said.

Bookkeeping has changed a great deal since those days, however. "I've enjoyed the changes. We used to run tapes to balance forever. I'm glad to be part of the computer age. I never thought I'd work with computers."

During her 31 years with the company, Maria has worked under seven managers. In addition to T. J. Bailey, Wayne Lowrey and Glenn Burns there have been Pat Wester, Tim McMurry, Steve Williams and Robert Bryson. And in addition to the various managers, there were numerous other employees at the office through the years.

"Everyone I've worked with has been great. Everyone is different, but they've been really great people."

Retirement is going to be used to do things that have been put aside for later such as making photo albums for her four children. She plans to continue keeping books for her husband Raul's plumbing business, and some time will be set aside for trips to see the children and grandchildren. "I want to become more involved in things around town, too," she said. "I'm thankful for my good health. The only time I ever used my health insurance was when I had children."

Maria and Raul's children are Raul Jr. who lives in Plainfield, IL, with his wife Sally and children Raul III and Leah. Raul Jr. is an electrical engineer at the Commonwealth-Edison power plant, and Sally is a teacher. Ruth and her husband, David Craig, live in Weatherford with their son, John David. Ruth is employed in a county office and David by a cement company. Rita and her husband, Patrick Rodriguez, live in Odessa with their children Christopher, Jessica, Sarah and Emily. Tondra is employed as a bookkeeper at a savings and loan.

## 4th Annual County 4-H Stock Show This Weekend

The 47th Annual Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show and Sale will be held Jan. 6-8 at the County Show Barn. Some 83 4-H members will be exhibiting 200 market lambs, 16 pair of commercial ewe lambs, 15 Angora goats, 36 meat goats, 20 market swine and 98 rabbits.

A showmanship clinic will be held Wednesday, Jan. 5, at 7 p.m. for all market animals. All market lambs must be in the barn by 8 p.m. on Wednesday, with shearing to begin at 8 a.m. on Thursday, Jan. 6.

All rabbits need to be in the barn by 5 p.m. Thursday evening, with the rabbit show beginning at 5:30 p.m. Richard Fuchs of Big Spring will judge the rabbits and rabbit showmanship.

All ewe lambs, Angora and meat goats need to be in the barn by 8 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 6. Ewe lambs will be weighed Friday morning starting at 8 a.m., and market swine will be weighed in the afternoon. Activities for the evening will begin at 5:30 p.m. with the commercial ewe lamb show, followed by the first-year feeder lamb show at 6 p.m., the meat goat show at 6:30 p.m., the Angora goat show at 7 p.m. and the market swine show at 7:45 p.m. Marvin Ensor, County Extension Agent from Gaines County, will judge the market lambs, ewe lambs, market swine and meat goats, along with showmanship. ## Ozona Places Three On All-West Texas Team

Ozona Lions Chris Sanchez, Julio Martinez and Justin Castro were named to the San Angelo Standard-Times Class 2A All-West Texas Football Team last week. The teams are selected annually by sportswriters for the S-T.

Sanchez, a wide-receiver, was selected for the second year. He caught 35 passes for 628 yards and 10 touchdowns. The OHS junior was also a first team All-District 6-2A selection as wide receiver.

Julio Martinez, also a junior, made

84 tackles during the season. He was a first team All-District 6-2A selection as a defensive lineman.

The only Ozona senior named to the All-West Texas team, Justin Castro, was selected as a defensive back where he made 65 tackles, four interceptions and four fumble recoveries. Last year he was named to the All-West Texas team as a quarterback. This season he threw for 1,635 yards and 13 touchdowns.

The Lions ended the season 8-4, losing to Hamlin in the area playoffs.

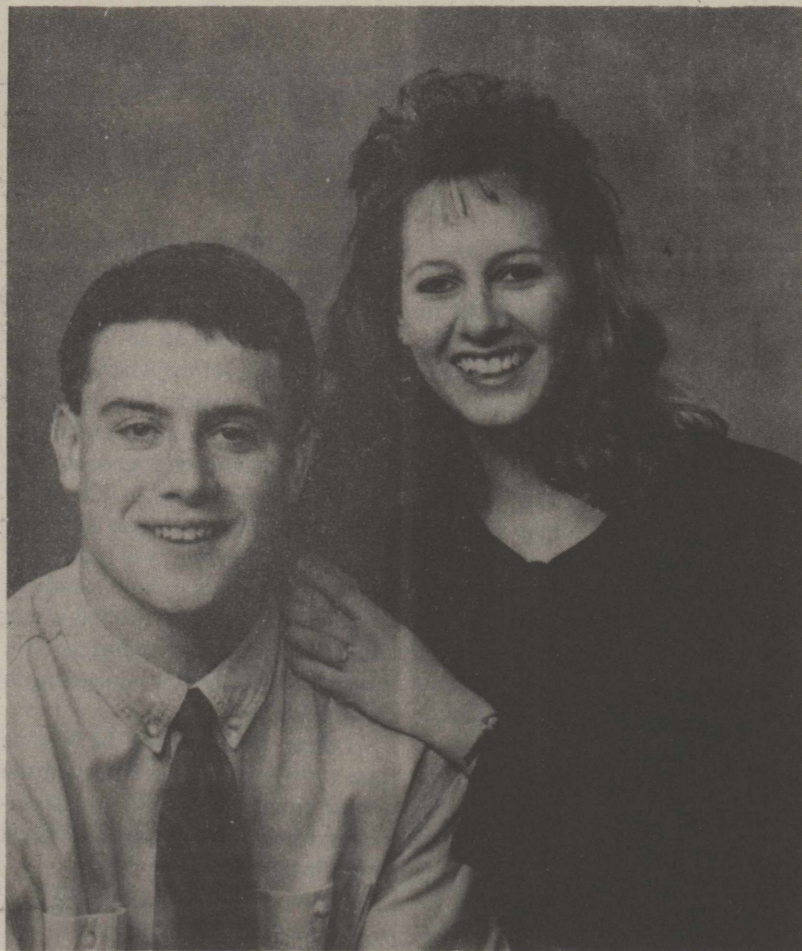

During the decade of the 90's we are turning our focus more on the home front; towns with no Assemblies, inner cities and areas of great need in America.

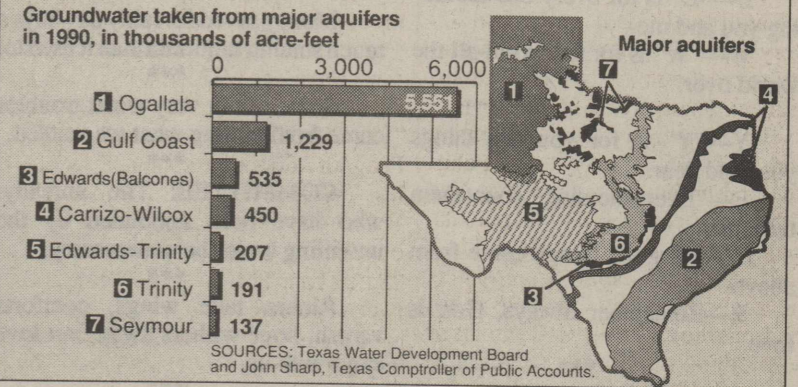

**Groundwater: A geyser of public interest**

More than half the water used in Texas comes from underground aquifers. Groundwater, used by cities, farmers, mining and manufacturing interests, belongs to the person who owns the land above and has the right of capture. It is not like surface water, which is owned and managed by the state for the public good. Texans withdrew about 8.9 million acre-feet of groundwater in 1990, about 3.5 million acre-feet more than the estimated amount replenished yearly by rainfall and runoff.

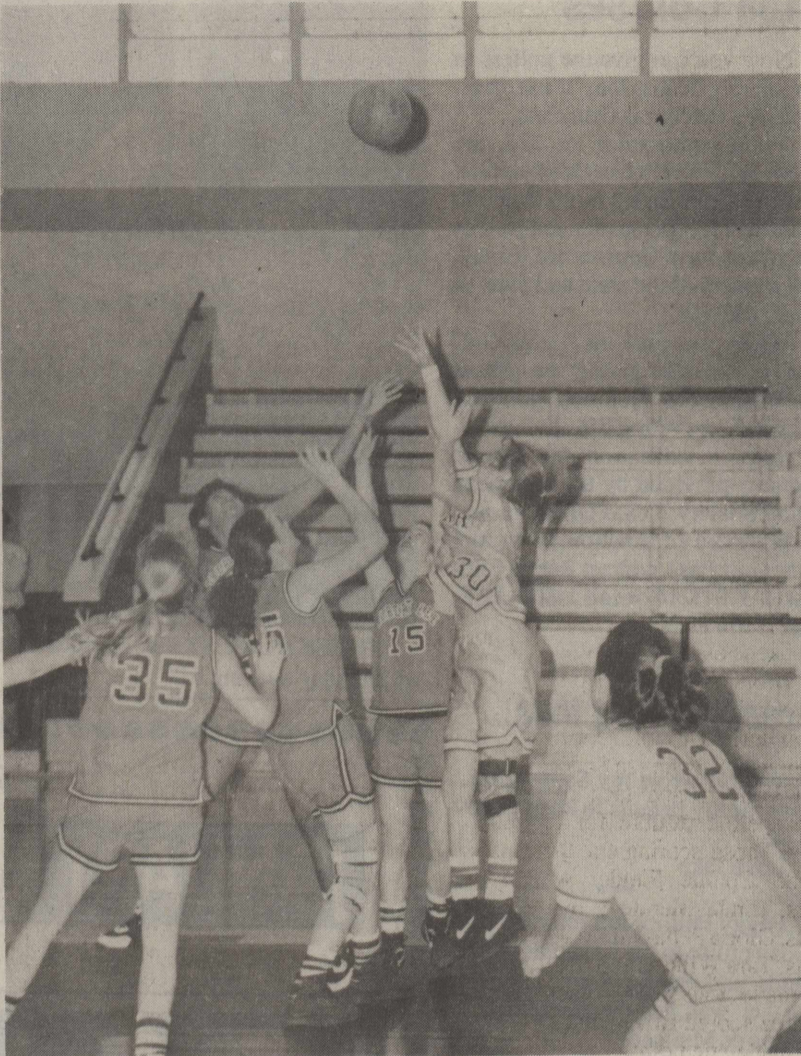

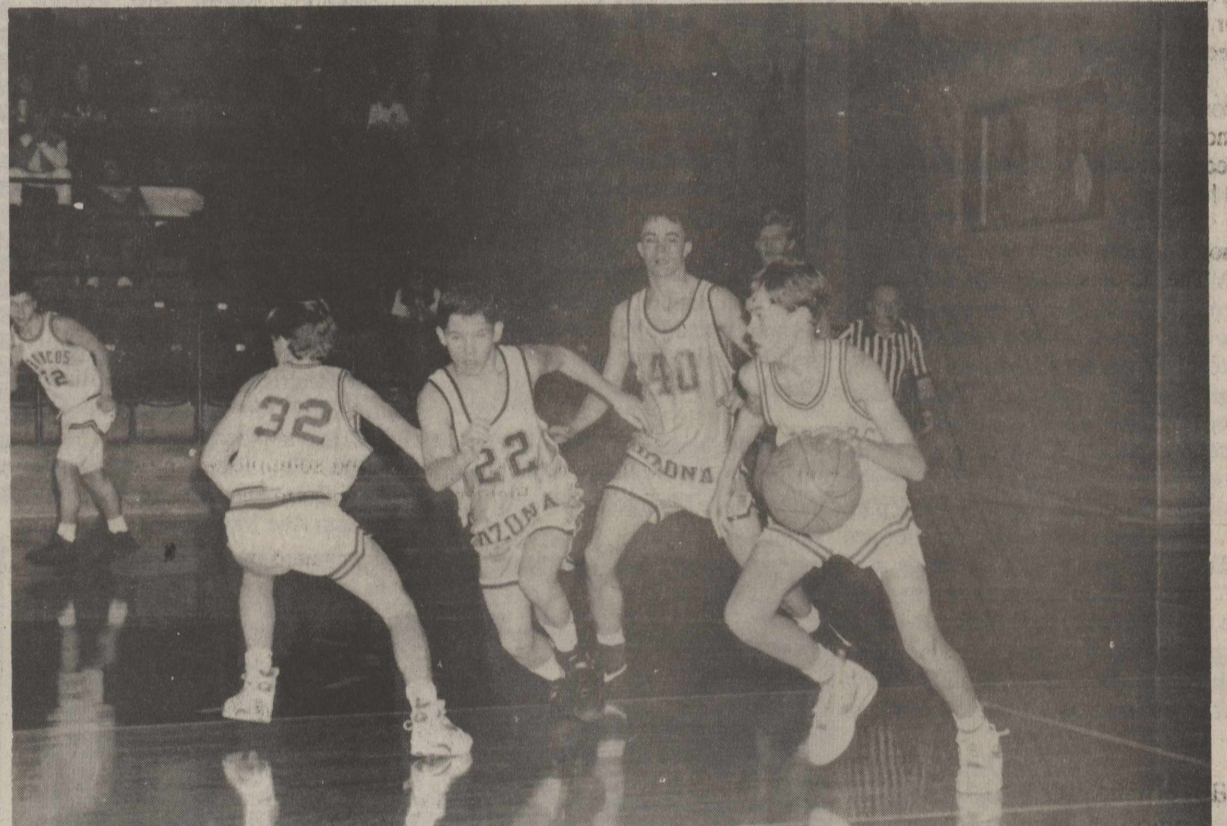

## Ombudsman Training Available

With the senior population growing rapidly, the numbers of persons requiring nursing home care is growing rapidly as well. According to the U. S. Census Bureau the nursing home population soared by 24.2 percent from 1980 to 1990 (1.8 million from 1.4 million). In Texas alone there are more than 96,000 people living in nursing homes.

Ombudsmen help residents resolve problems that may arise with the need for institutionalized care and help families and staff find solutions when often there don't appear to be any.

The Area Agency on Aging's Ombudsman program which serves Coke, Concho, Crockett, Irion,

Kimble, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton and Tom Green Counties is currently recruiting volunteers interested in becoming certified ombudsmen. Volunteers are now being certified locally instead of traveling to Austin for the required certification. After becoming fully qualified, the volunteer is assigned to a facility and expected to spend a minimum of two hours per week in the facility.

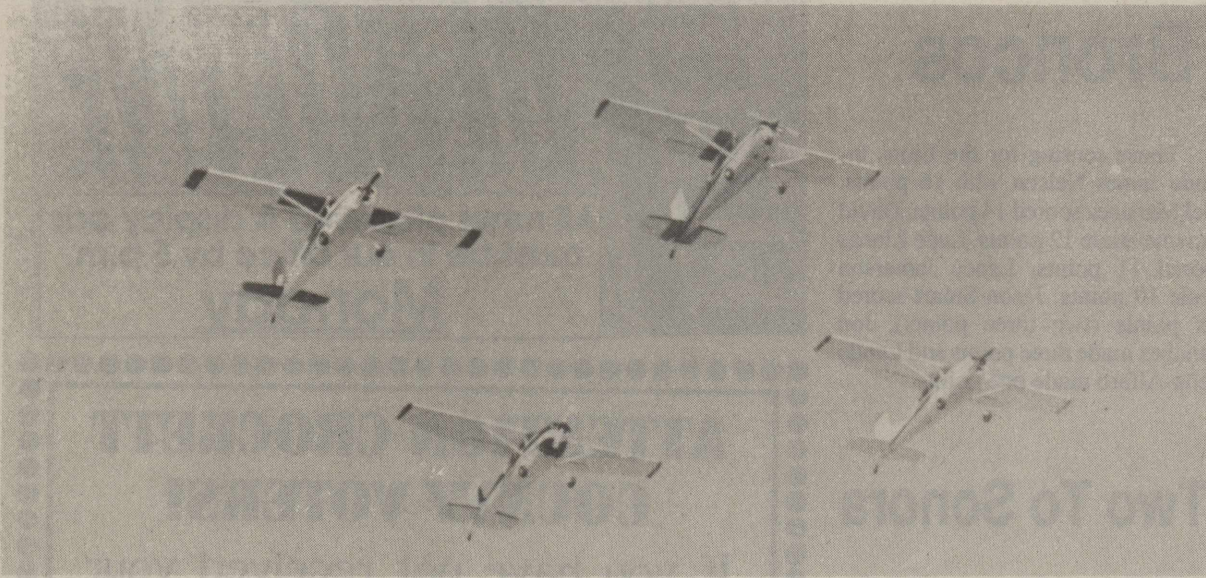

## Keeping That New Year's Resolution To Exercise

Making a New Year's resolution to exercise may sound like a broken record to many, but you really don't have to undergo strenuous routines to succeed.

"The first thing people need to do is think in terms of physical activity rather than exercise," said Dr. Mary Kinney Bielamowicz, professor and registered dietitian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Too often, people see exercise as the mandatory 60-minute routine three times a week or feel that they must do a set of exercises for 30 minutes a day."

In a report, the centers for Disease Control and the American College of Sports Medicine emphasized that these erroneous perceptions have helped promote an epidemic of inactivity even though health benefits result from a variety of physical activities, she said.

Health officials now emphasize a more moderate approach to exercise to encourage people to simply get out and move about more, Bielamowicz

said. Instead of making a radical life-style change, Americans are encouraged to think of physical activity as part of their daily routine.

For example, many people feel they don't have time to exercise, Bielamowicz said. But most manage to exercise 10-minutes by getting up a little earlier or incorporating the time in their lunch hour. Allowing 10-minute intervals of physical activity throughout the day can add up to a 30-minutes daily workout.

"The good thing about healthful physical activity is that it can include a whole range of pursuits, including gardening, performing manual labor, farming, doing regular household chores and fun hobbies such as dancing, swimming and riding a bike," she said.

"Society pushes exercise because of its benefits," she said. "Research has shown that an increase in physical activity reduces the risk for several illnesses, including heart disease, high blood pressure, non-insulin dependent diabetes, breast and colon cancer,

osteoporosis and mental health problems."

Also, studies have shown that the greatest decline in the rates of disease and death occurs among sedentary people who begin to exercise moderately rather than in active people who become more active, she said.

Becoming active will be a bigger challenge to some than others, Bielamowicz said. These recommendations can get you started:

\*Begin gradually. Start by incorporating a few minutes of increased activity each day and gradually building up, accumulating 30 minutes during most days.

\*Walk instead of driving to the house of a friend who lives only a few blocks away.

\*Park your car as far away as possible from the store's entrance when you go shopping and walk an extra lap around the mall between visits to the various stores.

\*Walk up and down flights of stairs rather than use the elevator.

\*Walk the dog for 10 to 15 minutes.

\*Do stretching activities in your office and get up from your desk periodically during the day and walk around.

\*Join in play with kids by dancing, playing ball, etc. Walk them to the playground rather than drive.

\*Do all household chores at once—vacuuming, making beds, sweeping, carrying out the garbage.

\*Rake leaves or mow the lawn yourself. Also, start a garden if you have space.

\*Check to see if there is a water exercise class in your area. Older adults and those with chronic diseases may find this method to be fun and less stressful on the body than regular aerobics.

"People should also remember that physical activity not only helps deter certain diseases, but it's the beginning of feeling better physically and mentally," Bielamowicz said. "So, take advantage of daily routines by stretching those exercise opportunities a little longer."

## Childhood Cancer Facts

\*Cancer is a general name for more than a hundred different diseases characterized by abnormal growth of cells. Cancer can destroy normal cells and often interferes with normal growth and development. As a result, childhood cancers are among the most harmful of all children's diseases.

\*Cancer in children is a rare disease. Yet it is still second only to trauma as a cause of death for children over age one and up to age fifteen.

\*In 1993, approximately 8,000 children under age 15 are expected to be diagnosed with cancer, of that number, approximately 1,500 children will die of the disease. Mortality rates from childhood cancers have declined 60% since 1950.

\*Cancer in children is treatable. Sixty-five percent of children who develop cancer are cured, although there may be the need for continued treatment or observation as the child becomes older.

\*Leukemia is the most common type of childhood cancer, accounting for approximately one-third of all childhood cancers. Leukemia is a disease involving the blood forming tissues of the body—the spleen, lymphatic system, and bone marrow. Acute Lymphocytic Leukemia (or A.L.L.) accounts for 90% of childhood leukemia.

\*The eight warning signals for childhood cancer are:

- Unusual mass or swelling
  - Unexplained paleness and loss of energy
  - Sudden tendency to bruise
  - A persistent, localized pain or limping
  - Prolonged, unexplained fever or illness
  - Frequent headaches, often with vomiting
  - Sudden eye or vision changes
  - Excessive rapid weight loss
- Children who have one or more of these symptoms do not necessarily have cancer. But they should be seen

by a pediatrician, family doctor or go to a clinic for a checkup.

## Talk To S.S Now If You're Retiring Next Year

If you're past age 62 and thinking about retiring any time in 1994, contact Social Security now to discuss your plans. Because Social Security rules permit you to work and receive retirement benefits at the same time, it could be to your advantage to have your benefits begin in January even if you aren't actually retiring until later in the year. For an application to be effective in January 1994, you should file any time before Jan. 31, 1994. For additional information, call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, business days between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m., to make an appointment to discuss your retirement plans.

If you plan to stop working and to begin receiving Social Security retirement benefits immediately at age 62, you should contact Social Security to file your application three months before your birthday.

Even if you expect your 1994 earnings to be relatively high, you should check to see if you'll be eligible to receive any benefits. For example, under the Social Security earnings rules for 1994, at age 65 a retired worker with maximum benefits of \$1,147 per month may earn up to \$49,011 during the year and still be eligible to receive a benefit for one month. If any family members also are eligible for benefits, the earnings could be higher and some benefits might still be payable. If you're under 65, you also can have substantial earnings and still qualify for some Social Security benefits.

In 1994, the earnings limit for individuals aged 62-64 will be \$8,040. For every \$2 you earn over \$8,040, \$1 is withheld from your benefits. For those aged 65-69, the amount is \$11,160. For every \$3 you earn over \$11,160, \$1 is withheld from your benefits. For beneficiaries aged 70 or older, earnings do not affect their benefit payments.

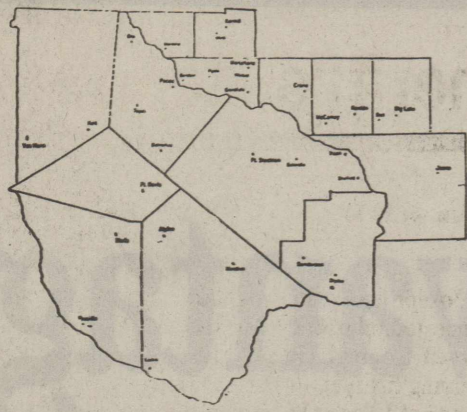

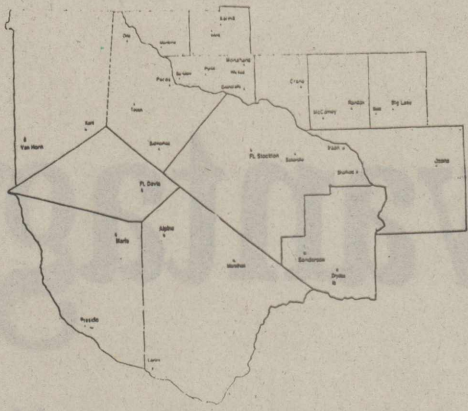

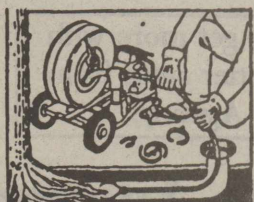
