That Reindeer Is Becoming a Tradition That reindeer is becoming an

American tradition.

Once upon a time there was a reindeer with a built-in flashlight bulb for a nose. You know, Rudolph, the red-nosed reindeer. From a small beginning in 1938, the little animal with the built-in beacon has become as familiar as Humpty-Dumpty and Cinderella to youngsters everywhere.

First invented as a sales give-away promotion for Montgomery Ward by Robert L. May, Rudolph was featured in many free booklets before he became associated with Christmas. Songwriter Johnny Marks liked the title "Rudolph, the Red Nosed Reindeer," so he wrote a song about it. He was so sure he had a success that he started his own Publishing company, using "Rudolph" as his first release. Gene Autry made the initial recording, and that one record sold 2,000,000 copies.

Last year, there were 16 different recordings of the song for sale, ranging from boogle-woogle by Sugar Chile Robinson to Bing Crosby, and cowboy singers.

Yule Seal Idea Was From Denmark

This year millions of Americans have received a letter from their local chapter of the National Tuberculosis association containing Christmas seals, the seasonal reminder of the never-ending fight to stamp out the disease.

Puritans Outlawed Yule as Frivolous

It is observed religiously in the churches and as a day for family reunions and social gatherings, in contrast to the lavish feasting and boisterous merry-making of olden

Merry-making and gift-giving come in for their share, however. on December 26 which is Boxing Day. The origin of Boxing Day antedates Christmas and can be traced to the custom of gift-giving during the Roman festival of Satur-

In Christian liturgy December 26 is observed as the feast of St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr, and during the centuries when journeymen and apprentices were in the habit of levying upon their masters' customers, "Christmas Boxes" were collected on St. Stephen's day

The Christmas tree industry is big business in the United States -better than \$50,000,000 annually.

The majority of our trees come from New England, New York and Pennsylvania, the north Middlewest, and Northwest Pacific regions. In recent years, New Jersey has annually marketed around 100,-000 trees.

Most of the trees for Christmas sales are cut early in the fall and the trees are kept green with plenty of water until shipped to distribution centers.

Some mass producers, however, cut trees early in the new year, and treat them with preservatives and coloring solutions for storage in chilled warehouses.



Largest Number Polio Patients Need Treatment

A new and tragic record will be set when 1954 starts with the largest number of polio patients ever reported who still require March of Dimes aid in paying treatment costs. On Jan. 1, some 66,000 polio victims stricken in 1953 or previous years were re-ceiving such help from March of Dimes funds. This is the longest list of carry-over patients in his-

Continued high polio incidence rates year after year have resulted in each year starting with a greater number of "old" cases than the year before. At the beginning of 1953, there were 60,000 cases from earlier years, while 1952 started with a patient load of 45,000 "old" cases

Long-term Lung Patients Some of these are longtime iron lung patients; others still require regular physical therapy while some need orthopedic surgery to restore use of their crippled limbs. A survey made in March of last year revealed that 98 per cent of longterm respirator patients had polio before January

No polio patient who can benefit from further treatment ever is refused aid by the National Foundation, regardless of when the disease struck. Four patients who received March of Dimes assistance in 1953 had had polio back in the 1890's. Also, 17 per cent had had the initial onset of the dis-

ease at least five years before. However, new techniques of treatment are constantly being developed through March of Dimes research and training programs, so new hope often can be given to "old" cases. Patients once considered hopelessly crippled have been enabled to work again. This is one extra dividend of the dimes you give.

Recently, a group of scientists and engineers was asked to predict what's next.

Now that we have electrified farms, factories and homes, is that the end? The answer appears to be no, that the electrical industry is a "giant boy" with its great growth still ahead. Here are some of the predictions.

Take a personal thing first. Millions of homes will have heat pumps to heat and cool automatically—using electricity for fuel.

You can expect to cook food someday by electronics-in seconds. Electrical incinerators will consume your waste paper and waste food. Dust will be taken from the air electrically. The day may come when TV screens hang like pictures on the wall, with only a tiny wire to the set.

Nuclear fuels are on the timetable of the scientists. Energy from the atom will eventually be a major source of power, regardless of whether fossil fuels are seriously depleted. By century's end, most new plants generating electricity will operate with atomic (fission) fuel. Aircraft, battleships and the like will measure fuel consumption in grams.

Storing heat from the sun is another long-range project of scientists, with billions in savings as the potential result.

The year 2000 looks big and distant. Actually it is only 47 years away. By then, any puny prognostications made today will have been rewritten many times. But larger. Electricity has always been a field where each new fact generates many more things new. The years should be interesting to watch.

This simple idea of wishing your friends a Merry Christmas brought honor and knighthood to the originator, Henry Cole, a middleclass Englishman.

Cole mailed his cards on a De-cember day in 1846. The cards depicted a Victorian family assem-bled at the festive board and the traditional Christmas custom of giving to the poor. They also bore the now-classic greeting: "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to you."

He had a thousand of the cards struck off by a lithograph. They were such a success that plain Henry Cole subsequently became Sir Henry Cole.

The cards we send today, however, a far cry from those mailed by Cole. The cards you send and receive this year will be designed by famous names in contemporary

An American shopping for cards this year may select scenes painted by such famous people as Winston Churchill, Britain's prime minister and famed amateur artist, and Grandma Moses, one of America's most famous artists.

The demand for cards is so great that many companies spend their entire time in designing and pro-ducing them for the holiday sea-



is one of the most beloved of all Christmas writings.


Dr. Moore was an aloof professor of Greek and Oriental literature in the Episcopal Seminary in New York. He wrote the poem on

Christmas Eve 1822 and read it to his seven children.

He had not planned for the poem to go further than his own family, but a relative who was visiting the Moores put a copy in her diary. The next year the relative's father

other newspapers printed the jingles and they quickly became known all over the country. The dignified Dr. Moore was embarrassed and considered it beneath a man of his scholastic standing to be the author of children's lingles.

Twenty-two years later, however, he finally publicly admitted authorship of the jingles and it was published in book form under his name for the first time.






(From State Line Tribune) Numerous Parmer County farmers mindful of the dry condition of much of the area's cultivated acreage and the likelihood that strong spring winds may materially damage topsoil, petitioned the county commissioners Monday morning, calling for an election to decide whether Parmer County will vote itself into a wind erosion conservation district

Paul Koeltzow, Rhea tarmer, led the petitioners, who numbered about one hundred. The instrument was given the county governmental body, and the commissioners set Jan. 30, as the date for the special election to decide the matter.

If Parmer County votes itself into such a district, it would mean that a farmer can be instructed by the commissioners to plow and care for his land if it appears to them to be blowing.

If he does not abide by their instructions, they are empowered to contract the necessary



1. Store right now the extra drinking water that your family might need. Don't wait for an emergency. When emergency occurs, drink only water or other liquids that you know are safe.

Be prepared to purify water for drinking purposes in your own home, if necessary.

4. Keep a three-day food supply on hand, and replace the things you use to keep your stock fresh or in good condition. In emergency, eat only safe foods prepared only under safe condi-

5. Know what you can eat or drink safely. Avoid using foods or liquids that might be contam-






