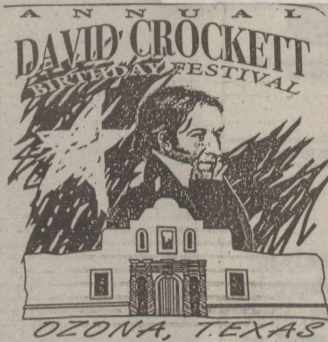
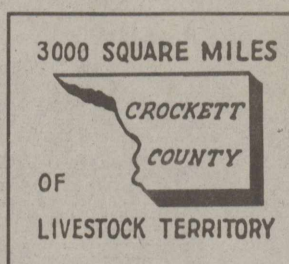

## Commissioners OK Easement For Utilities on North Taylor Box Road

Commissioners approved a 10 foot easement for telephone and electrical lines necessary to a proposed new business on Taylor Box Road when they met Monday. The easement was granted on the east side of North Taylor Box, County Road 108, from its beginning at the interstate north to property under consideration for a dairy. Gary Elliott, West Texas Utilities distribution supervisor, local WTU manager Robert Bryson and James Keating, GTE facility engineer from San Angelo, met with the court Monday afternoon to request the easement.

Representatives of Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1 also met with the court and were granted their request for a site to deposit leaves and limbs picked up by the district. Board member Dennis Clark told commissioners they can compost this material without a site permit from the state if there is a place to put it. The district has been paying Pack Rat to haul the material out of the county.

Commissioners voted to designate a site behind the cemetery as the location for the leaves and limbs. The location is not open to the public. For those who want to haul their own leaves and limbs, the county site on 14th Street still accepts this type material.

Representing the district along with Clark were Doug Meador, Dee Keilers and Dan Davidson.

Innocent Castro was the successful bidder to lease the county's Ingham Trap property. A motion to reject the two bids received failed, and a second motion, to accept Castro's \$800 bid, passed with Commissioners Frank Tambunga and Rudy Martinez and Judge Kathryn Mayfield voting for and Commissioners Fred Deaton and Freddie Nicks voting against.

The hesitancy to accept the bids stemmed from the fact that a dumpground on the property is not fenced off from the pasturage. Neither the dumpground or the shooting range are included in the area to be leased.

Fire Chief Bob Falkner appeared before the court with an end of year report and a request to purchase six new radios. The new radios, used to signal firemen at their homes, will replace six that were purchased in 1972 and are currently not working. The court approved the expenditure of \$2,650 of interest money from certificates of obligation for the radios.

Court members voted to approve purchase of a vehicle for the Sheriff's Department through the state purchasing contract. This is the same vehicle that was previously budgeted and approved.

A set of rules for use of county property including parks, fairgrounds and rodeo arena was reviewed and approved. The information will be published in a separate story.

Commissioners voted to: authorize advertisement for hospitalization and health insurance, authorize the

Feb. 8 sale, on the courthouse steps, of the 20 foot encroachment located on AA Street in the vicinity of the Comfort Inn, and authorize the probation department to apply for criminal justice grant funds.

Judge Mayfield and Commissioner Nicks were re-appointed as appraisal board members.

Names drawn as new grievance committee members were: Belle Burks, Jimmy McCollum, Steve Wilkins, Ricky Webster, Tina Moran, Debbie Fleming, Huey Ingram, Kim Tambunga and Abel Martinez Jr.

Commissioners also executed conflict of interest affidavits, an annual process.

Reports were heard from department heads Garland Young for the civic and youth center, Eddie Moore for the road and parks department, Gerry Phillips for the hospital and care center, Louise Ledoux for the library and Sandy Stokes, auditor.

Written reports were received from the fire department and Helping Hands.

Young informed the court that a new board member will need to be appointed next month to replace Curtis Keith, who is resigning.

Commissioners discussed 1994 paving with Eddie Moore, road superintendent. Each precinct will allot one mile in town with the remaining total 12 miles to be applied to the area determined to need work most. The area to be worked will be Mitchell Blacktop.

Moore was instructed to have his department build, according to grade specifications, a wheelchair ramp at the doctors' clinic. The court also discussed the fact that there are no wheelchair accessible restrooms, either public or in patient rooms, in the hospital.

Hospital/care center minutes from the Jan. 6 meeting were read by Gerry Phillips, administrator. During his report, there was a discussion of an IRS revenue ruling which indicates that the two doctors practicing through the Crockett County clinic and hospital should be considered employees.

Judge Mayfield suggested that Mr. Phillips ask County Attorney Orlando DeHoyos for a letter regarding the legality of Ozona's system of retaining doctors.

Mrs. Ledoux informed the court that the lease on the library's copier will end in April. She would like to lease a new machine which will perform more functions and include color copying. Cost of copies to the public will have to be increased to help offset the additional leasing fee.

During the auditor's report, commissioners discussed the need to move ahead on acquisition of property for a landfill. The judge informed the court their choices are to: condemn some property, take a portion of the O.B. Trap that was offered to the county for this purpose, or pick a place in the tri-county area for a regional landfill.

## 81 Exhibit At The 47th Annual Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show

The 47th Annual Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show and Sale was held Jan. 6-8 at the county show barn in Ozona. Some 81 4-H members exhibited 170 lambs, 36 meat goats, 32 commercial ewe lambs, 20 market swine, 18 Angora goats and 80 rabbits for a total of 356 entries in the show.

According to Billy Reagor, County Extension Agent, a super group of youngsters exhibited a quality group of livestock and rabbits. Some 250 people were on hand for the show and sale and enjoyed a barbecue lunch provided by the 4-H adult leaders. George Ybarra donated his time and effort to cook for the concession stand and the lunch.

Tara Wilkins, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Wilkins, exhibited the champion finewool market lamb. The lamb sold for \$1,000 to Ozona National Bank, and she received a silver buckle donated by Ozona Wool and Mohair. Tara also won the coveted Regina Everett Memorial Buckle for placing the most market animals at major shows last year.

Exhibiting the champion finewool cross lamb was Amy Laughlin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donnie Laughlin. The lamb sold for \$1,000 to Crockett

County National Bank, and she received a silver buckle from Ozona National Bank. Amy also exhibited the champion Angora goat and won champion senior high showmanship. She received buckles from Bob Childress and Crockett County National Bank respectively.

The champion market swine was exhibited by Wesley Bean, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Bean. Buyers were Joe and Marolyn Bean and George and Wanda Bunger for \$800. He received a buckle from Flying W Ranch.

## Hospital Board Decides On New Doctor

Following a meeting in executive session Jan. 6, a quorum of the hospital and care center board decided to recommend to the commissioners at their February meeting that Dr. Heidi C. Horsley, M.D., of Lubbock be hired. There was no formal motion made pending a full board consultation. Two board members were not in attendance at this meeting.

The contracts of all physicians, including Dr. Horsley, will be discussed at the February board meeting. Dr. Sims and Dr. Owensby will be requested to attend the February meeting as their contracts expire at the end of that month.

Board members voted to raise the semi-private care center room rates from \$44 to \$48 per day to comply with the rates set by the Texas Department of Human Services. These rates, called tile rates, must be followed when setting private pay rates. Private pay patients cannot be charged less than the tile rate.

The 19 residents affected will be notified by letter on Jan. 10 and the rate change will be effective March 1.

Thorp's Laundry was the sole bidder for laundry services. The board accepted the bid, which included rates identical to those already being charged by the laundry. Tim Thorpe and Jesus Castro were there to represent the laundry.

Costs of adding a phone line to the hospital for the ambulance were discussed. Two phones will be required, one for the nurses' station and one for the emergency room.

Diane Schwertner, director of nurses, asked that a phone line currently in the x-ray viewing room be moved to the emergency room so

EKG's could be faxed to other facilities without disconnecting the patient to move the machine to the room where the phone line is. The EKG machine has a built-in FAX for sending these reports.

Mrs. Schwertner reported that there were 125 emergency room cases in December compared to 71 in November. Of the 125, 15 were transfers.

The possibility that advanced cardiac life support training and certification will be required for all licensed LVNs and RNs will be required in the future was mentioned by Mrs. Schwertner. Using grant money for this education is being looked into.

Administrator Gerry Phillips gave board members a list of tests that will be run on the new Cobas Mira lab equipment beginning Jan. 10. Completing the tests here is expected to save money for the hospital and speed up results.

During his financial report, Mr. Phillips stated that the combined county funds transferred to the hospital and care center for 1993 was \$1,061,458. This included health care benefits for the first three months of 1994 amounting to \$71,272. The facilities were \$165,839 over budget at the year end. His figures showed that the amount over budget had decreased from \$299,381 over budget in 1992.

The new workman's comp rates for the hospital and care center are expected to decrease these costs markedly in 1994. However, if the county is required to carry the doctors as employees, an additional \$20,000 to \$40,000 could result from that change, Phillips estimated. An IRS revenue ruling may require the county to consider the doctors as employees.

## Sheep Dog Trial Begins Friday

The first of 111 dogs entered in the Crockett County Classic Sheep Dog Trial will begin his run at 7:30 a.m. Friday at the Weir-Perry Kennels on Taylor Box Road South, off Interstate 10. This is the fourth year for this annual three day event. The Crockett County Classic is the third and final trial of the Texas Winter Olympics, and all three trials are being judged this year by Bud Boudreau, well-

known dog trainer and trial judge, from Marcus, South Dakota. The trial will feature four classes of trained border collies; the two-day open class will run Friday and Saturday with each of the dogs running twice for an accumulated total score. Open ranch, ranch and nursery classes will run on Sunday.

Truck hours amounted to 314.27, man hours were 2,334.59, four gallons of foam and 241,433 gallons of water were used.

The most calls occurred on Thursdays and Saturdays with 23 each. Mondays and Fridays accounted for 20 each with 21 on Tuesdays, 19 on Wednesdays and 13 on Sundays.

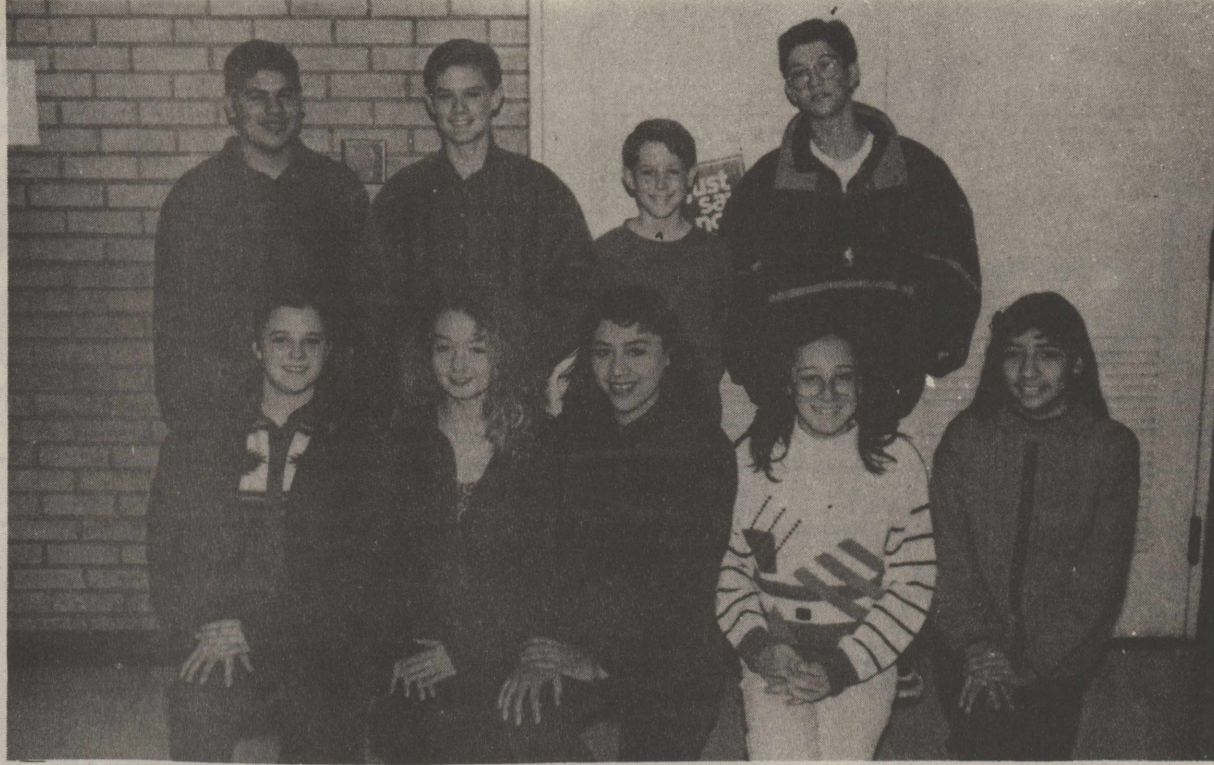

## Bonilla Encourages Families To Participate In "Vision USA"

WASHINGTON - To help low-income working families prevent eye disease, the American Optometric Association is sponsoring VISION USA - a program to provide free eye examinations, Congressman Henry Bonilla said.

"VISION USA is a great program, especially for many families who can't afford to get their eyes checked regularly," Bonilla said. "By calling a toll-free number, people could qualify for a free eye exam."

To qualify for a free eye exam through the VISION USA program, applicants must meet the following requirements:

1. They must have a job or live in a household where at least one person is working either full-time or part-time.

2. They must not be covered by a health insurance plan, Medicare or Medicaid - even if their plans don't offer vision care.

3. They must have income that falls below an established level based on family size.

4. They must not have had an eye examination during the past 12 months.

People who wish to obtain free eye exams may call 1-800-766-4466

between 7 a.m. and 9 p.m. (CST) anytime before Jan. 31. Bilingual operators are available to help people schedule the eye exams, which will take place in March.

"Routine eye exams are critical, especially for groups of people - such as Hispanics - who have a high incidence of diabetes," Bonilla said. "Diabetes-related eye disease causes 25,000 people to go blind each year. However, yearly eye examinations could prevent 95 percent of those cases of blindness," Bonilla said.

"This program provides a chance to prevent eye disease and blindness. I encourage all people who are eligible for these eye exams to take advantage of this great opportunity."

### Marketing Key To Craft Business Success

A program on home-based craft- ing, marketing and cooperatives will be featured at the first meeting of the new Family Community Education Club on Thursday, Jan. 20, from 10 to 11 a.m. at the Crockett County Civic Center.

"Mark your calendar now," said Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent-Home Economics. If you experience a lot of itching or a rash, or if the skin on your hands and feet cracks, splits or becomes infected due to scratching, see your doctor.

The filing period is underway for people who want to run for the Texas Silver Haired Legislature (TSHL), an all-senior elected body that advocates on behalf of older Texans. Filings began January 3, 1994, and will continue through Feb. 28, 1994, with elections set for May 24, 1994.

The TSHL is a nonpartisan 116-member group that represents 28 districts in Texas. Members hold model legislative sessions every two years in Austin to identify the issues that are most important to senior Texans. Then they take priority issues to the Texas Legislature for legislative consideration.

Candidates for the TSHL must be 60 or older by Jan. 1, 1994. They must

Expenses for meetings in Austin are the responsibility of the TSHL member with one exception: expenses for the Orientation and Training Session, which will be held Aug. 2-5, 1994, in Austin, is paid for by the Texas Silver Haired Legislature Foundation. The Legislative Session of the TSHL is scheduled for Sept. 12-16, 1994 in the Capitol Building.

# Keep That Diet Resolution

Probably the most common type of New Year's resolution has to do with one's diet. Most of us would like to shed a few pounds and - along the way - lower our fat intake and cholesterol levels.

Unfortunately, most resolutions of this type don't last. And that's a shame, because diet is a major factor in reducing risk for two of America's most deadly diseases - cancer and heart disease.

So how can you keep your resolutions? Here are a few suggestions, adapted from "The Achilles Syndrome" by Harold Bloomfield, M.D.

1. Build confidence by setting reasonable goals (For example, set and keep a goal of exercising three times a week for 15 minutes rather than failing at exercising daily for 30 minutes.)

2. Be specific. Rather than, "I'm going to lose weight this year," decide to: join a weight loss group, cut out 150 calories per day (54,750/yr. = 15.2 lbs.), substitute fruit for a rich dessert three times a week.

3. Make a written contract with yourself. Example: "I, \_\_\_\_\_, am going to lose five pounds by \_\_\_\_\_, and I will do this in these specific ways. (List ways)

4. Be sure you really want to lose! 5. Share your plans with those you can count on for support - but keep your goals to yourself if you think someone is watching for your first slip-up!

6. Remember, each of us is ultimately 100% responsible for our own dieting success - or lack of it!

7. Be prepared for setbacks - when they occur, relax! Making changes often involves two steps forward and one step backward!

8. Decide to lose weight out of self-love, not self-hate.

9. Learn to reprogram your mental dialogue. When your mind tells you, "I'll die without a taste of that chocolate cake," realize you don't have to listen!

10. Sometimes you may choose to tell yourself "Yes, tonight I'll treat myself to that piece of cake" - but

make sure you're in charge of that decision.

11. Make use of mental pictures - Visualize yourself exercising, weighing five pounds less, feeling good about yourself.

12. Build on small victories - small successes breed larger ones.

By setting attainable goals and taking charge, you can finally keep those New Year's Diet Resolutions. As an added help, a new "Fit for Life" six-week fitness and diet class will be starting in February. If interested, call the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721.

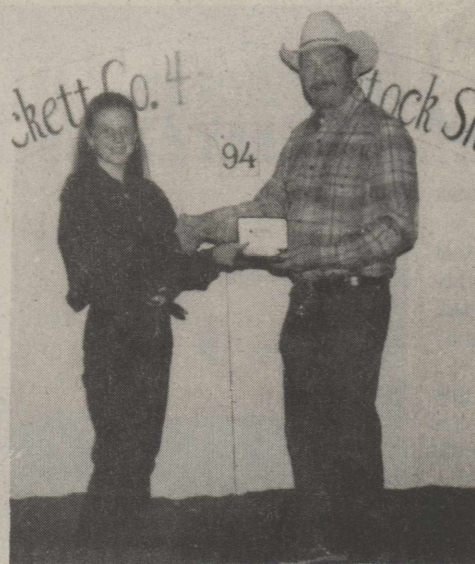

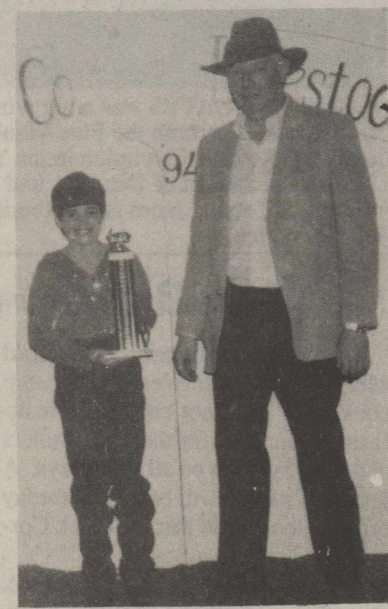

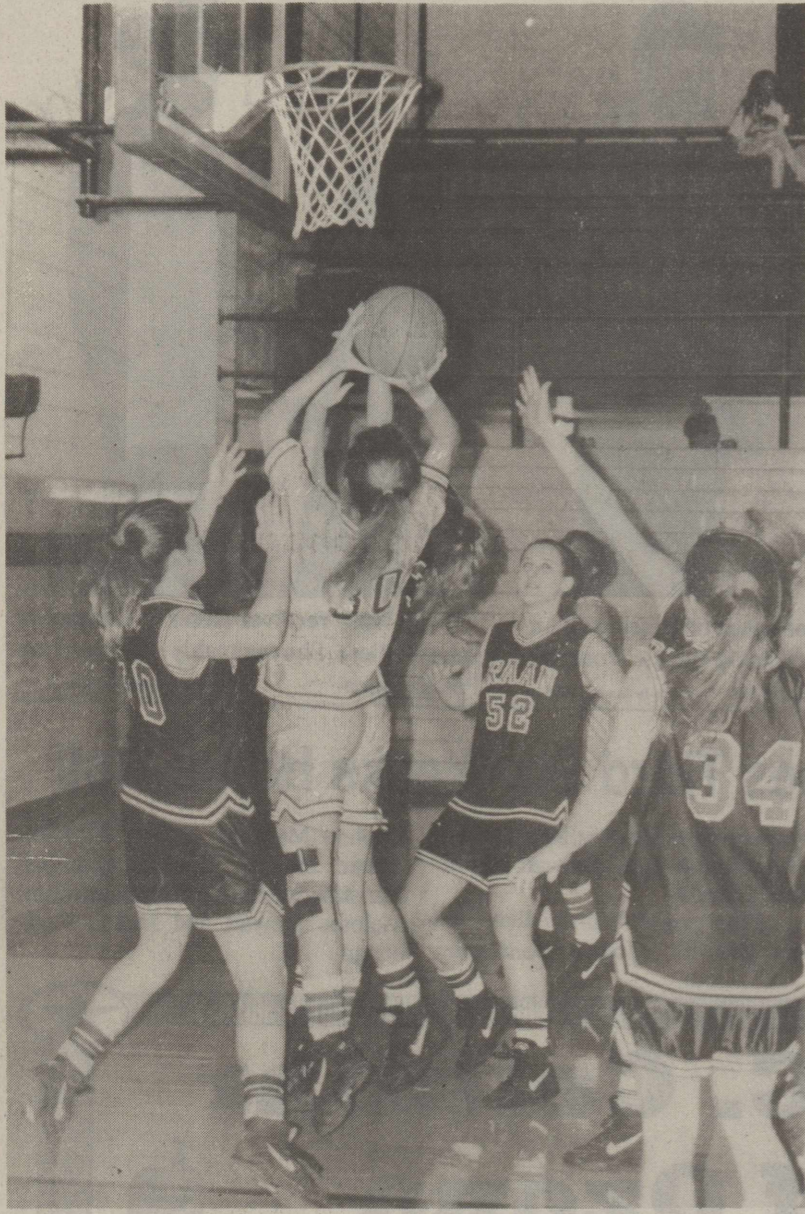

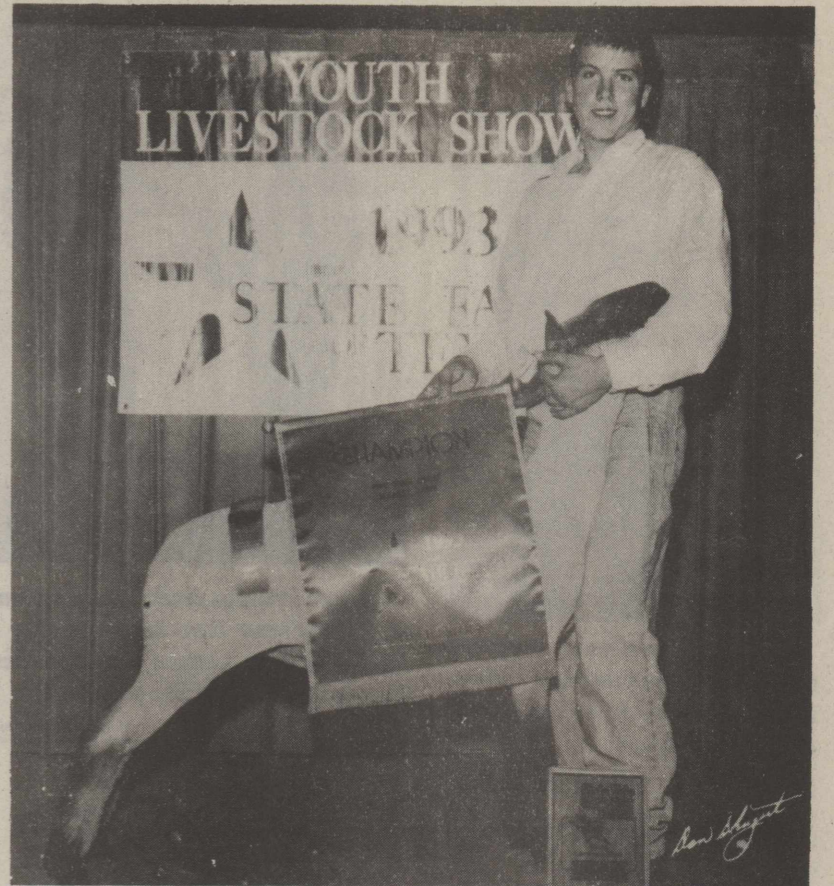

## Successful Area 4-H Horse Show Is Open To All

A horse show program born three years ago with the express intent of encouraging young people to get involved showing horses at the county and district level has worked.

The program was geared where it would provide a place for all ages to ride and compete, and to offer a horse activity for the 4-H youngster who had never even seen a horse show, all the way up to the experienced AJRA barrel racer.

As a matter of fact it worked so well that after the first year the Tri-County (Ward, Winkler and Reeves), opened the shows to any 4-H or Cloverbud member from anywhere after other interested parents began asking if their children could bring their horses to the shows. Originally the shows were only for 4-H'ers in the three counties.

Parents and county agents in the "founding" counties had become concerned as participation at the District Horse Show continued to drop off- finally one year to less than 20 contestants.

Particularly since the District VI show once attracted upwards to 200 or more equestrian contestants year-after-year.

### Tri-County

In the tri-county program, awards are presented to the top six places in each of the five divisions at all of the shows and then at the awards banquet following the series, all-around high-point winners are recognized.

While the shows follow 4-H regulations-one of the rules has intentionally been disregarded.

Exhibitors do not have to own their own horse. In fact, the 4-H leaders encourage the youngsters to "beg, borrow or 'steal' a horse to use at the shows.

And 4-H has got to be one of the most economical activities a youngster can belong to-since there are no fees to be a member. Any youngster age 9 to 19, enrolled in school, is eligible to be a member. Cloverbuds are for those kiddos under 9 years of age. Enrollment forms are always available at the shows for new members.

Divisions are broken down into Pee Wee (age 8 and under); Sub-Junior (9-10); Juniors (11-13); and Seniors (ages 14-19). (Ages are as of January 1st).

And a Novice division is offered in all the judged events for youngsters who have never had the opportunity to show a horse before. All ages compete together in the novice events.

### Classes

Classes offered in judged events include Showmanship at Halt, Western Pleasure, Western Horsemanship, and Western Riding. (Pee Wee judged classes are walk-trot.) The timed events are Barrels, Poles, Stake Race and Goat Tying.

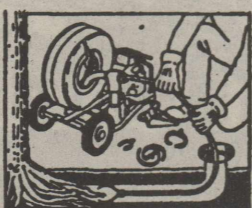
Entry fees are \$2 per class. Registration opens at 7 a.m. at all the shows with the first class scheduled for 8 o'clock.

To be eligible for a year-end award, contestants must show in at least four of the shows, and enter at least three classes in either the judged events, timed events, or both.

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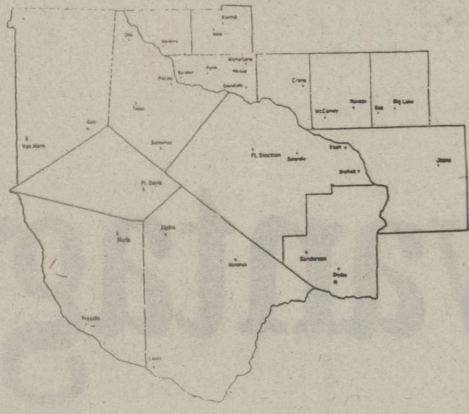

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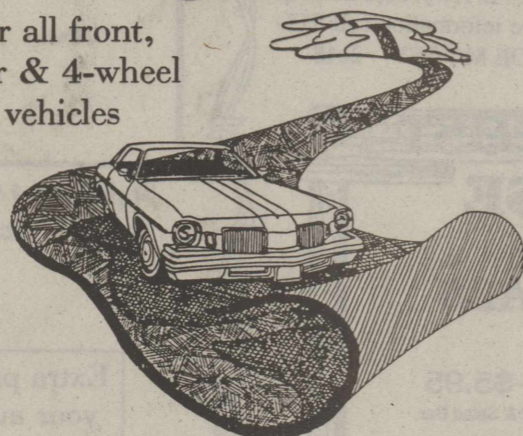
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
