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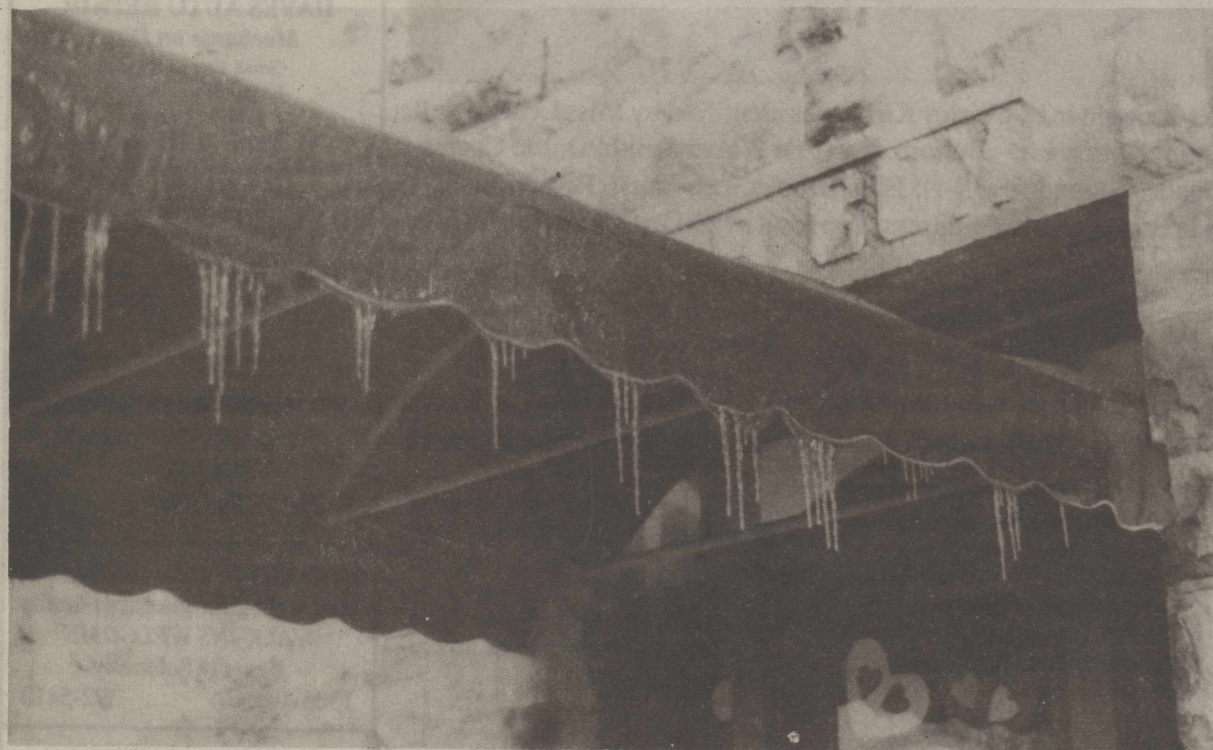

Commissioners Wait To Appoint New Co. Judge

Commissioners waited until the end of the day Monday to broach the subject foremost on many minds, appointment of a county judge. The death of Judge Kathryn Mayfield Feb. 5 leaves a vacancy which cannot in all practicality stay unfilled until a new judge takes office Jan. 1, 1995.

Kathryn Mayfield's name remains on the ballot for the Democratic Primary March 8. Jeffrey Sutton is also on the ballot in the judge's race. Troy Williams, the late judge's father and himself a former county and a district judge, earlier filed a declaration of intent to file as an independent candidate for county judge in the November general election. Under the Texas Election Code, an independent cannot actually file for a place on the

general election ballot until after the primary election, and must do so no later than May 12 this year.

County Attorney Orlando De Hoyos has expressed interest in being appointed to fill the remainder of the county judge's term as have others. Mr. Williams has stated that he intends to "run a vigorous campaign" to get his daughter re-elected.

Should the late Mrs. Mayfield receive the majority of votes in the March 8 Primary, the county's Democratic Party committee will have the responsibility deciding on a candidate for the November ballot. The committee is made up of the county chairman and precinct chairmen, one from each precinct. In Crockett County, precinct chairmen are tradi-

tionally elected by write-in vote if any are elected at all. Present county chairman, A. O. Fields, is on the ballot along with a space for a write-in.

Commissioners agreed Monday evening to wait until after the March 8 Primary to consider making an appointment to the unexpired term, thereby giving the voters opportunity to make their wishes known. They decided to have an agenda item at the March 14 commissioners' court meeting to set a date for making the appointment. By waiting until after the Primary, the court will not be influencing the voters' choices, and this will "take the focus off the court and put it on the election where it belongs," said Fred Deaton who presided Monday.

Hospital Board Moves Toward Medicare Decertification

The public is invited to a called meeting of the hospital/care center board Feb. 24 when Medicare decertification will be discussed. This meeting is being held during the noon hour so that those who work will have opportunity to attend according to board president Jack Baggett Jr. The meeting will give citizens an opportunity to discuss with the board any questions or concerns regarding the proposed decertification.

If the hospital decertifies from Medicare, "there will be basically no change to the way the hospital is now being utilized," said administrator Gerry Phillips at a meeting of commissioners court Monday. Medicare will pay on emergency room admissions to the hospital, Phillips said.

At the Feb. 9 meeting of the board, Ron Galloway, administrator of the hospital at Big Lake for 17 years, told of the results of Medicare decertification there. Galloway told the board that Medicare pays 85 percent of billed charges and Medicaid is still paying by diagnostic related groups, a formula for used for determining the amount to be paid on specific illnesses or conditions. Observation patients are not held to a 23-hour status. They can be held two to four days if the documentation supports the care needed. Lab work will still be done here as the lab does not fall under Medicare, Galloway said. Staffing is more flexible without Medicare certification.

Reagan County has a hospital district.

Crockett County Hospital voluntarily decertified from Medicare at the beginning of 1986. Enabling legislation was later passed in Austin to allow an election to determine whether or not a hospital district should be formed and approval given at the federal level. No action resulted, and the time period expired on holding the election. The hospital was recertified for Medicare in 1992.

Commissioners have been concerned for some time that returning to Medicare certification has not worked as planned. A year has passed, and there has been no significant change in the budget. The board and commissioners had agreed that if there wasn't a turnaround, it would be time to consider decertifying. "A main reason for decertifying is the low census of inpatients, and the ones we do have are generally short stay patients," Phillips said. He also told commissioners that Dr. Owensby is in favor of decertifying.

A board vote on decertifying was tabled Feb. 9 until the public meeting can be held to get public input and inform citizens what decertification will mean and how it will affect the care available.

Board members did vote to eliminate free meals for the dietary staff, to reduce doctors' clinic staffing to two full-time employees with the option to increase during peak season, to increase care center room rates for small and large private rooms and hospital

boarder rooms by \$4.00 per day. Small care center rooms will increase from \$64.00 to \$68.00 per day and the large rooms from \$86.00 to \$98 per day. The hospital boarder rates will increase from \$64.00 to \$68.00 per day. These rates are still lower than those of Sonora and Big Lake, Phillips said.

Renewal of physicians' contracts was discussed. Both physicians' con-

tracts expire at the end of February. Changes resulting from the Feb. 9 board meeting include reduction of personnel for the doctors' clinic to be reduced to two except during peak season, and placing of a \$7,000.00 cap on the hospital's responsibility for the doctors' liability insurance. Any premium above that amount will be the responsibility of the doctors.

County Buildings Become Smoke-Free

In quick action Monday afternoon, county commissioners voted to enact a no smoking policy applicable to all county buildings. The motion included no provisions for designated smoking areas.

Mark White and Bobby Zesch of White and Zesch Insurance in San Angelo presented four bids for hospitalization and medical insurance at the scheduled 1:45 p.m. bid opening. Commissioners voted to accept the bid by Hill House with Lamar Life as carrier. This will be the third year to insure with Hill House under a partially self-funded health care plan.

Earlier in the day, Aurora Najar met with the court about problems with the county's medical insurance for her mother. She was accompanied to the meeting by Sandra Speed, a 55 plus advocate with Angelo Community Hospital. Mrs. Najar explained that her mother, who is the wife of a retired county employee, had not received coverage she had expected

under the county's Medicare carve-out insurance plan. The carve-out, unlike a supplement, pays for prescriptions and a percentage when Medicare denies coverage for a service. Supplements, which are not part of the county's plan, generally pay the portion not covered by Medicare, and this was what the family had expected.

Oscar Kost and Troy Williams presented a plan for a proposed senior citizens' center and asked commissioners to designate a location on county property for the building. The project, which originated with the local chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons, will be funded through grants if a location can be found according to Williams. County property north of town and on Ave. E was discussed.

A contingent from Crockett County Water Control and Improve-

Principal Walter Spiller To Retire

School trustees voted to accept the resignation of primary school principal Walter Spiller at their meeting Feb. 9. The resignation is effective with his retirement on May 31, 1994.

The board approved a request from Ms. Kathy Grendahl, special education teacher at the primary, to be relieved effective Feb. 18 from her present teaching position. Her parents are in ill health, and Ms. Grendahl will move to their home in Brady. The members also approved the temporary employment of a special education aide at Ozona Primary to assist in the program until school is out in May.

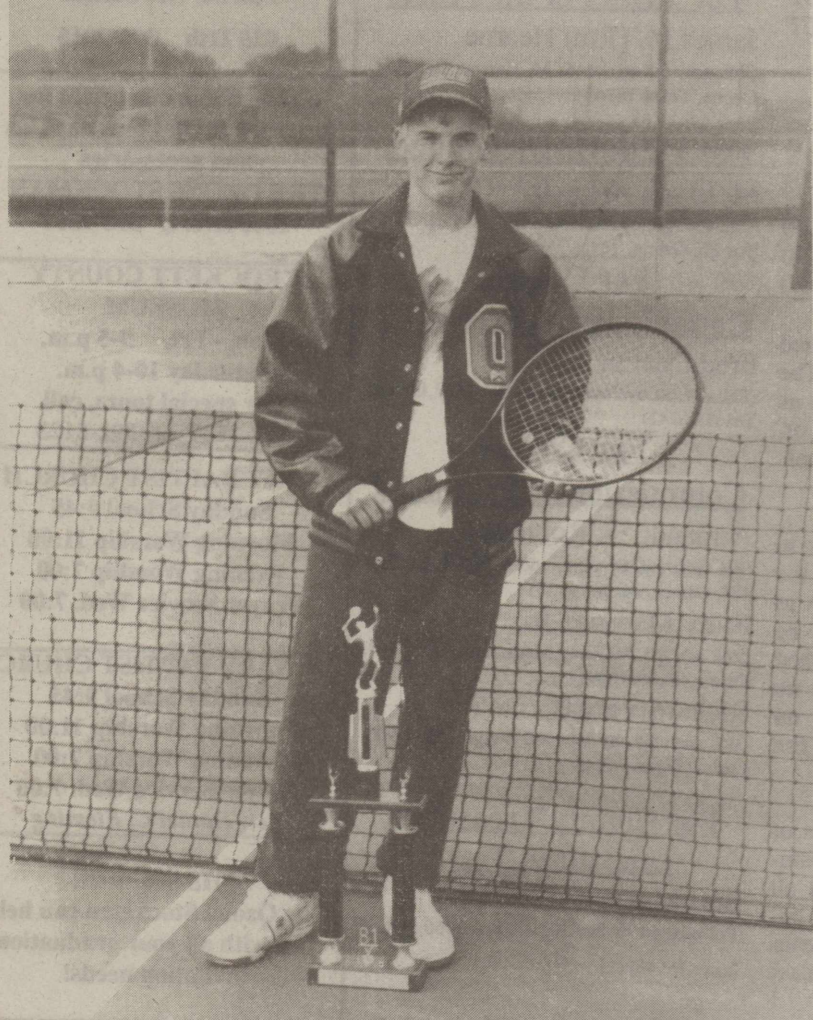
A contract extension was approved for Tom Humber, principal of Ozona Middle School, through June of 1995. All of the other administrative personnel have contracts which extend through that time.

Members also authorized the temporary employment of two clerical aides who will prepare a list of eligible voters in trustee districts 1-6. District 7 will be the at-large position for the school board voting system.

Kim Miller, OHS cheerleader sponsor, was present to request changes in the method of selecting cheerleaders. Following her presentation, board members voted to institute a new process which will involve three parts. Un-biased judges will account for 35% of an evaluation, the

student body will provide 35% and a teacher evaluation will provide 30%.

Justice Department Approves New School Election Plan

The Crockett County Consolidated Common School District has been advised by the United States Department of Justice that its new single-member district plan for the election of school board trustees has received the necessary preclearance required under the Voting Rights Act of 1965. Under the Voting Rights Act, the Department of Justice is responsible for reviewing all election changes made by political subdivisions in Texas, including school district changes. Crockett County Consolidated Common School District's preclearance plan calls for six of the members of the board to be elected from single-member districts within the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District. The one remaining position on the seven member board will continue to be elected from the school district at-large.

The change in the election structure will be implemented on a staggered basis as the terms of current trustees serving on the board expire over the next three years. In May 1994, two positions are scheduled to come up for election. At that time, two of the single-member district positions under the new plan (Trustee Districts 3 and 4) will be filled. In May of 1995, single-member Trustee Districts 1 and 6 and at-large Trustee District 7 will be filled, and in May, 1996, single-member Trustee Districts 2 and 5 will be filled.

The plan was adopted by the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Board of Trustees on Nov. 17, 1993, and was then submitted to the Department of Justice for review. By letter dated Feb. 7, 1994, the Department of Justice advised the school district that it did not have an objection to the proposed

changes. The plan was adopted in part to resolve litigation filed against the school district by local attorney Orlando DeHoyos alleging that the former at-large election system had the effect of diluting minority participation in the election of school board trustees.

Maps indicating the geographic boundaries of Trustee Districts 3 and 4 are available for inspection at the School Administration Building. Candidates who wish to run for the office of school board trustee from Districts 3 or 4 must satisfy certain residency requirements under the Texas Education and Election Codes. A candidate must have lived in the trustee district he or she seeks to represent for six months prior to March 23, 1994, the deadline for filing applications to be placed on the ballot for the May 7 election. During the trustee's term of office, he or she must continue to reside within the trustee district which he or she represents.

In the May 7 school board election, only registered voters residing within Trustee Districts 3 and 4 will be eligible to vote for a representative from their respective trustee district. The polling place will continue to be the Crockett County Courthouse for all trustee districts. The Crockett County Clerk's Office is in the process of compiling a list of registered voters for Trustee Districts 3 and 4. Detailed maps of each of the six single-member Trustee Districts are also available at the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Administrative Offices.

Included in the approved change is the establishment of varsity and JV cheerleading squads. The varsity group will be limited to juniors and seniors.

A request for a change in the athletic department's drug/alcohol policy by Don Payne, athletic director, was rejected after long discussion by the board.

Payne requested that the punishment for a first violation be left up to the head coach of the athlete's current sport. Under the policy that is in place, for a first offense "The athlete shall forfeit 25% of the scheduled games of the sport in season at the time of the infraction. The athlete shall be required to continue in workouts to successfully complete the penalty." Payne said that while his proposed change might seem to some as a softening, he believes the current policy has lost some of its teeth. He believes officers may be slacking off on giving tickets for drinking or possessing alcohol because they do not want to affect athletes' eligibility.

"I want those officers giving those tickets," Payne said. "I want their (students') parents to know about it...If they have to take home a ticket, their parents will know about it."

Trustees voted to participate in the Region XV ESC cooperative purchasing program for office supplies. MacLay told the board that as much as a 25% discount may result from co-op purchases. The school will be charged a fee of 3% of the order.

ment District #1 attended the meeting to discuss the change in costs of trash disposal under a contract yet to be signed with Waste Management Inc. of Odessa. Escalating cost of service led the court to agree to pay the district \$40,000 a year toward trash disposal. The county has been contributing \$24,000 a year. The remainder of the increase will have to be passed on to the customer through higher rates for garbage disposal said board member Dennis Clark.

Water district representatives Clark, Dan Davidson, Doug Meador and Dee Keilers and commissioners discussed the need for a local landfill. A Type IV landfill, which is allowed to accept leaves, brush and limbs, would be a first step and could alleviate from \$68,846 to \$111,410 in hauling fees to the water district in one year.

Tentative plans were made for a committee composed of two commissioners, representatives from both water districts and a citizen to begin a search for possible landfill locations.

San Angelo architect Jack Meeks brought plans for an elevator for the courthouse. He suggested an exterior elevator on the east side of the building which would open into the courtroom or an interior elevator to open into a corner of the juryroom. Either plan would have the elevator placed in a portion of the clerk's office on the main floor of the courthouse.

Monthly reports were heard from the auditor, Sandy Stokes; Garland Young, civic and youth center director; hospital and care center administrator Gerry Phillips, road and parks superintendent Eddie Moore and Louise Ledoux, librarian.

Stokes told the court that more

Other action by the board included approving purchase of an IBM compatible computer, printer, accessories and software for the high school office.

The board also voted to join the Texas Schools for Quality Education organization. This association is an outgrowth of the Budget Balanced Schools Association and is dedicated to supporting state funding of public education at a level which will permit all school districts to achieve a high standard of excellence.

David Bean was appointed as the school's representative to the tax appraisal board.

A budget amendment was approved to pay an additional \$1,360,542 for purchase of attendance credits from the state. This is an increase of \$119,240 from the estimated amount.

Another budget amendment was to pay \$20,420 for consulting fee plus travel expenses for development of a reading assessment program in Ozona Primary and Ozona Intermediate School.

than 90 percent of the 1993 taxes have been collected. He stated he would like to put three million out to draw interest in TexPool, which is operated by the State Treasury, and keep the remainder, approximately one-half million, in the bank. The money in TexPool could be drawn from as needed. TexPool is an investment service provided by the Treasury to offer local governments the opportunity to "pool" their money with other public entities to get the highest earnings possible with relatively little risk.

During Stokes' report, County Attorney Orlando Attorney came forward to present a written opinion requested by the court regarding whether or not the two doctors under contract at the hospital should be put on the payroll as employees. De Hoyos explained that there is nothing in Texas law which prevents the type contract the county now has with the doctors and that Crockett County has not been put on Federal notice that the present method is incorrect. He ended with the conclusion that the current situation "is a proper and valid employment relationship".

Gerry Phillips informed the court of his board's move toward Medicare decertification of the hospital. A public meeting is scheduled for noon on Feb. 24 in the EMS Building to give citizens an opportunity to comment on the proposal.

Doors to the youth center have been damaged by an overhead leak and should be replaced according to Garland Young. Mr. Young will bring more information on the doors and tile replacement at the building to the next commissioners' meeting.

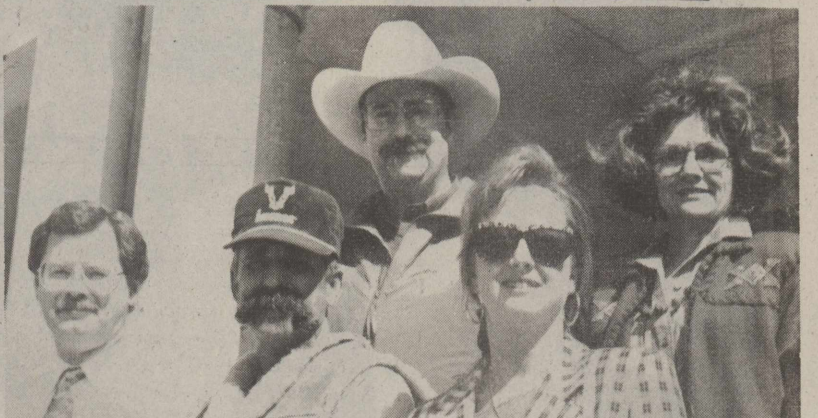

(Series #7)

(Harvest Time Christian Center)

Today, we get echoes of the same nature from the prejudiced and unlearned. Terms such as, Tongues Speakers, Holy Rollers or Radicals, are common today. Yet, we consider this a very small price to pay compared to the wonder power and contentment of the Spirit filled life. We believe according to Acts 2:37-39, this baptism is available to every believer.

Yes, we do teach the Baptism in the Holy Spirit is distinct from the new birth but subsequent to it, Acts 8:14-17, 19:1-7. I personally experienced the fruit of the Spirit, Gal. 5:22, 23 more evident in my life after I was baptized in the Holy Spirit. Also, spiritual gifts, I Cor. 12:1-11, are manifested through Spirit-filled people as God sees fit.

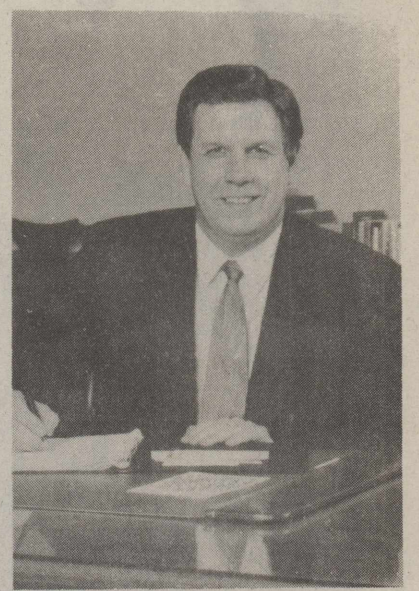
Previously, Hall served from 1979 to 1984 as a member of the Texas House of Representatives, represent-

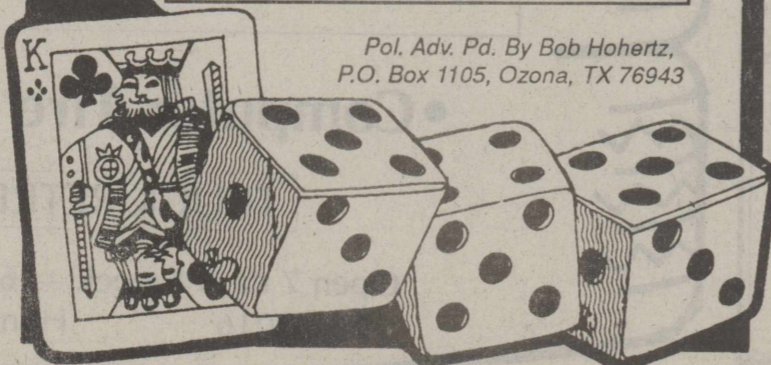

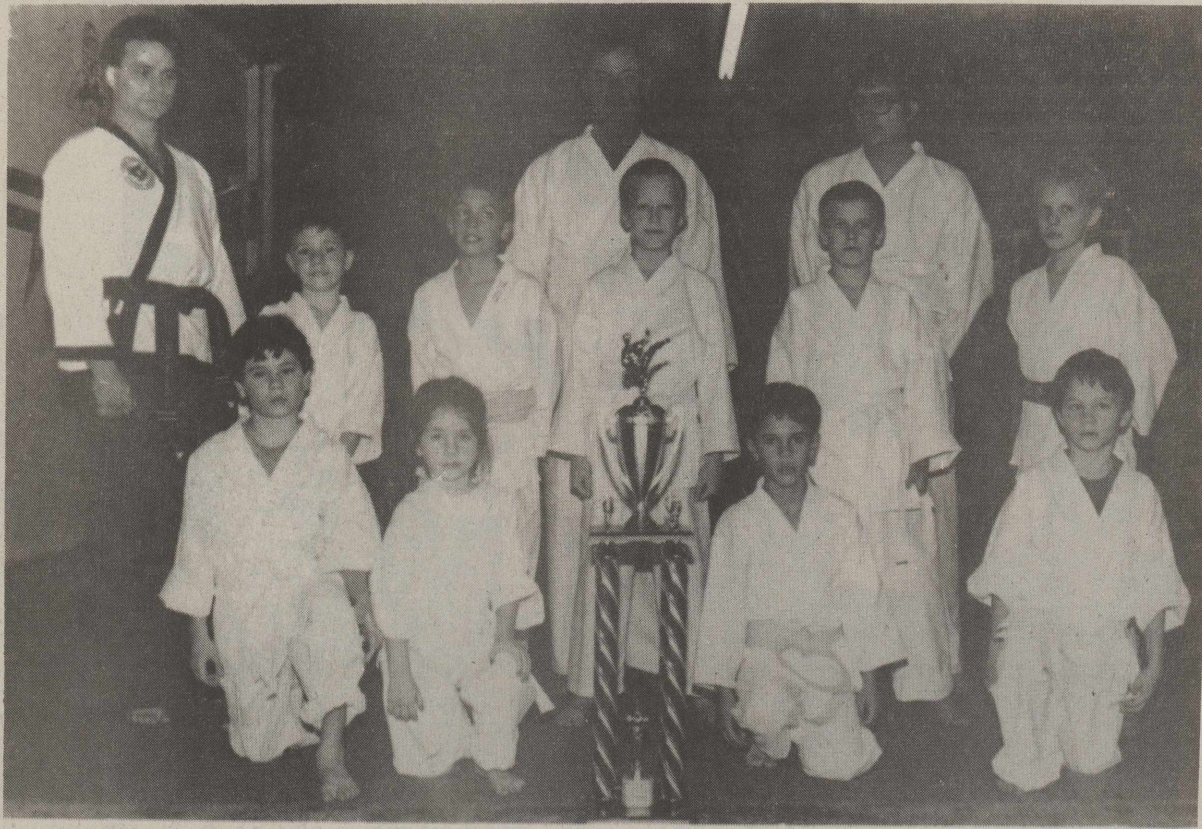

Members of the Ozona boys high school track team attended an indoor track meet last weekend at Lubbock Christian University. Most of the athletes running at the meet were running unattached. The majority of the competitors were from 5-A and 4-A schools with Ozona being the only 2-A school competing.

Some of the results from the meet are as follows: 55 meter dash Anthony Sanchez 10th with 6.87; Jesse Garza 12th with 6.93; J. J. Lozano 13th with a 7.06. 3200 meter run-Johnny Porras 7th with a 2:16 and Rene Tambunga 9th with a 2:23. 200 meters, J. J. Lozano

with a 25.74. 400 meters-Charles Villarreal 9th with a 56.94 and Pete Casteneda with a 62.38. 500 meters-Anthony Sanchez 1st overall with a time of 73.69. Anthony beat the field of 500 meter runners by nearly a second and a half. 1000 meters-Charles Villarreal won a third place medal by running a 2:58 and John Ramirez was 5th with a 3:04. 1600 meters Bryan Valdez finished with a time of 5:20, Johnny Porras 5:30 and Rene Tambunga at a 5:45. In the mile Relay Charles Villarreal, John Ramirez, Jesse Garza and Anthony Sanchez were 6th overall with a time of 3:49.

None of the Ozona athletes attending had ever run on an indoor track which was a 200 meter all-weather track and only running events were

held. Teams attending were from Midland High, Andrews, Tulia, Abilene Wylie, Lubbock Monterrey, Lubbock Coronado, Lubbock Roosevelt, Lubbock High, Brownfield, Abilene Cooper and Ozona.

Most of the athletes attending are on the Ozona High School track team and this was their final tune-up before the outdoor season begins at the Commanche Relays in Fort Stockton on Feb. 25-26. The Ozona boys will be trying to defend their championship title that they won last year.

Arron Garza traded in his yellow belt for an orange. He performed the 21 movements in the pattern (pronounced) DAN-GUN. It was named after the holy Dan-Gun, the legendary founder of Korea in the year of 2333 B.C.

Earning yellow belts are former white belts: Jon Moran, David

Martinez, Jenny Whitehead, Jake Stewart, Floyd Sheppard, Shane Albers, Lacy Vestal, Stephen Humphrey, Danny Whitehead, Jason Davis, Chris Smith, Casey Petty, and David Whitehead. They performed the 19 movements of CHON-JI which means literally the "Heaven the Earth." It is, in the Orient, interpreted as the creation of the world or the

beginning of human history. Therefore, it is the initial pattern played by the beginner. This pattern consists of two similar parts: one to represent the Heaven and the other, the Earth

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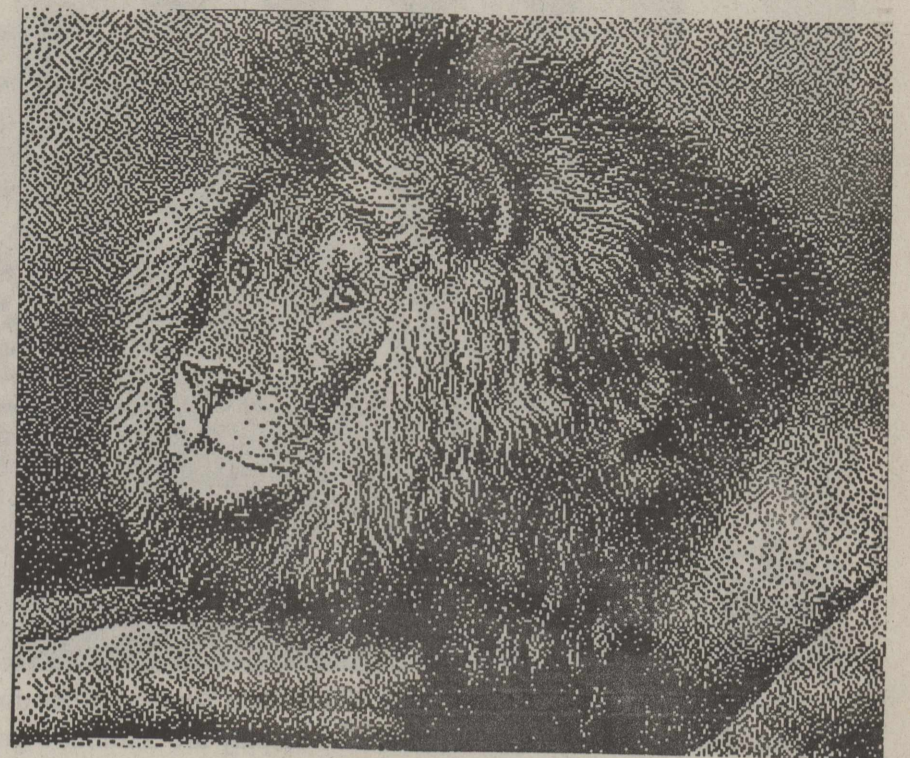

Ozona High School Library Automation Project

A Series Of Three Articles

There's a whole new look to the high school library these days. Where once tables and chairs were clustered behind wooden card catalog cabinets, computers now sit. Five tables with four computers per table make up the new library network. Twelve printers sit atop the new double-decker computer tables.

Availability of these computers means students have access to an automated card catalog. Each book in the library is now found in the computer data base to which all 20 computers are connected.

The old card catalog is gone, and no one misses it. Students can now search for books at any of the computers by choosing the Search Catalog program. They can then search for books by choosing title, author, subject, call number, keyword, series or LC (Library of Congress) or ISBN (International Standard Book Number).

Students have found that searching by computer is much faster than the old card catalog. An additional feature that students like is being able to tell from the computer screen whether or not a book is checked out. No time is wasted searching the shelves for books that are already checked out.

The keyword search capability of the program means that students can link more than one term together to make very specific searches. These Boolean searches using the terms "and", "or" and "not" give students the opportunity to practice logical thinking. Since critical thinking is required on the TAAS tests, which students must pass in order to graduate, using the library search program allows students to apply critical thinking to a real-life situation.

According to librarian Sherry York, the high school faculty were the first to try out the new technology at an inservice day in October. All high school teachers and administrators got to try out the new system.

Computer teacher Rod Miller was responsible for installing network connections and all the necessary software to make the system work. The 20 IBM compatible computers were moved from the high school lab to the library to become part of the network. Computer software was purchased through Chapter Two federal funds which are designated specifically for libraries.

Student orientation to the new catalog program was conducted through the English classes. Student learning was "hands-on" all the way. The search program proved to be very easy to use with little formal instruction necessary.

Computers are available in the library throughout the day for use by classes working on projects and by individual students seeking books and library materials.

Mrs. York has been working on adding other library materials to the computer data base. Video tapes which are a part of the professional library for teacher use have been added. Titles from the vertical files in the reference room and career room have also been added.

When new books are received by the library, it is now a simple matter for the librarian to add bar codes to the books and add pertinent information to the computer system quickly. Time that once was spent on typing and filing catalog cards can now be spent in more productive ways.

Mrs. York is very enthusiastic about the automation. "It's the most

exciting thing that has happened in my years as a librarian. Every student can use the computers, and they learn while they're working. It takes the drudgery out of research and makes library use fun."

The high school library will be open to the public during an open house on Thursday, March 3, from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. during Texas Public School Week. Everyone is invited to come by and see some of the good things happening in the O.H.S. library.

The catalog search program is only one of the features of the automated library. Look for part two of this series next week.
