## Candidates Ask For Votes, State Views

A political forum sponsored by Knights of Columbus Feb. 15 drew a response from a majority of local candidates who are on the March 8 Democratic Primary ballot. Opposed or unopposed, they came to state their views and answer questions from an audience of 40 or so citizens.

Participating candidates, in the order they were introduced, were: Jeffrey Sutton, candidate for county judge; Pct. 4 commissioner candidates Richard Vargas and Armando

Robledo; county and district court candidates Barbie Myers and Nora Madris; Burl Myers, unopposed candidate for county treasurer; and Fred Deaton, Pct. 2 commissioner who is unopposed. Moderator Orlando DeHoyos read a statement from incumbent clerk Debbi Puckett at the end of the evening.

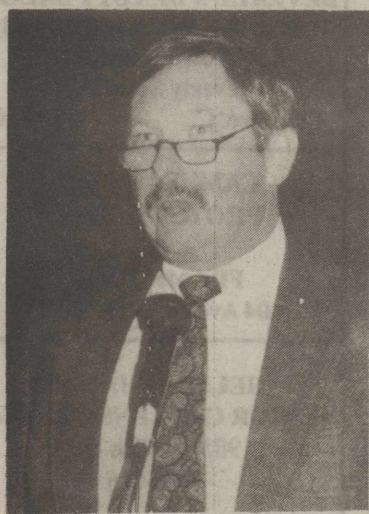
Each candidate was given time for an introduction, then questions were taken from the audience. Closing statements were also part of the

forum.

The first question of the evening was directed to Fred Deaton asking his position on appointing a county judge. The commissioner repeated some of what he had said the previous day in commissioners' court - that sometimes two to three months have passed without having county court, he believes it prudent to wait until after the primary to appoint, and that he does not wish to appoint someone who has political ambition.

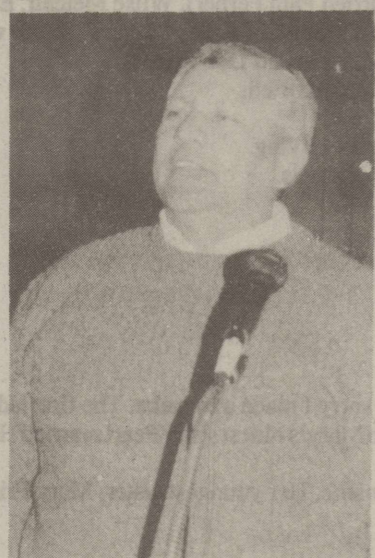
Jill De La Garza rebutted Mr. Deaton's statement that the late judge, Kathryn Mayfield, had disposed of most of the cases on the county court docket before her death. Mrs. De La Garza, who is secretary to county attorney Orlando DeHoyos, said only about 10 percent of the cases were totally disposed of.

Bringing in a visiting judge was suggested from the audience. DeHoyos explained that this is not practical due to the workload a judge from another



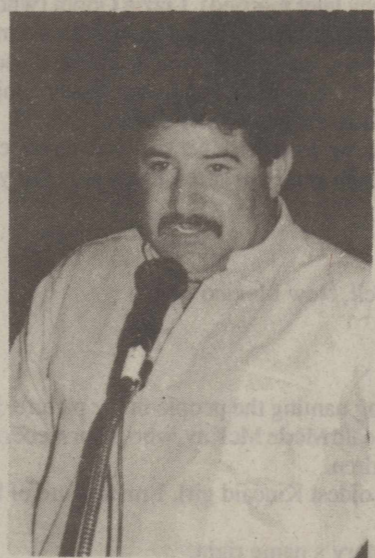

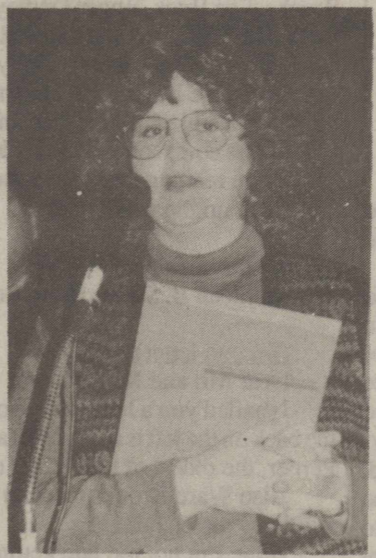

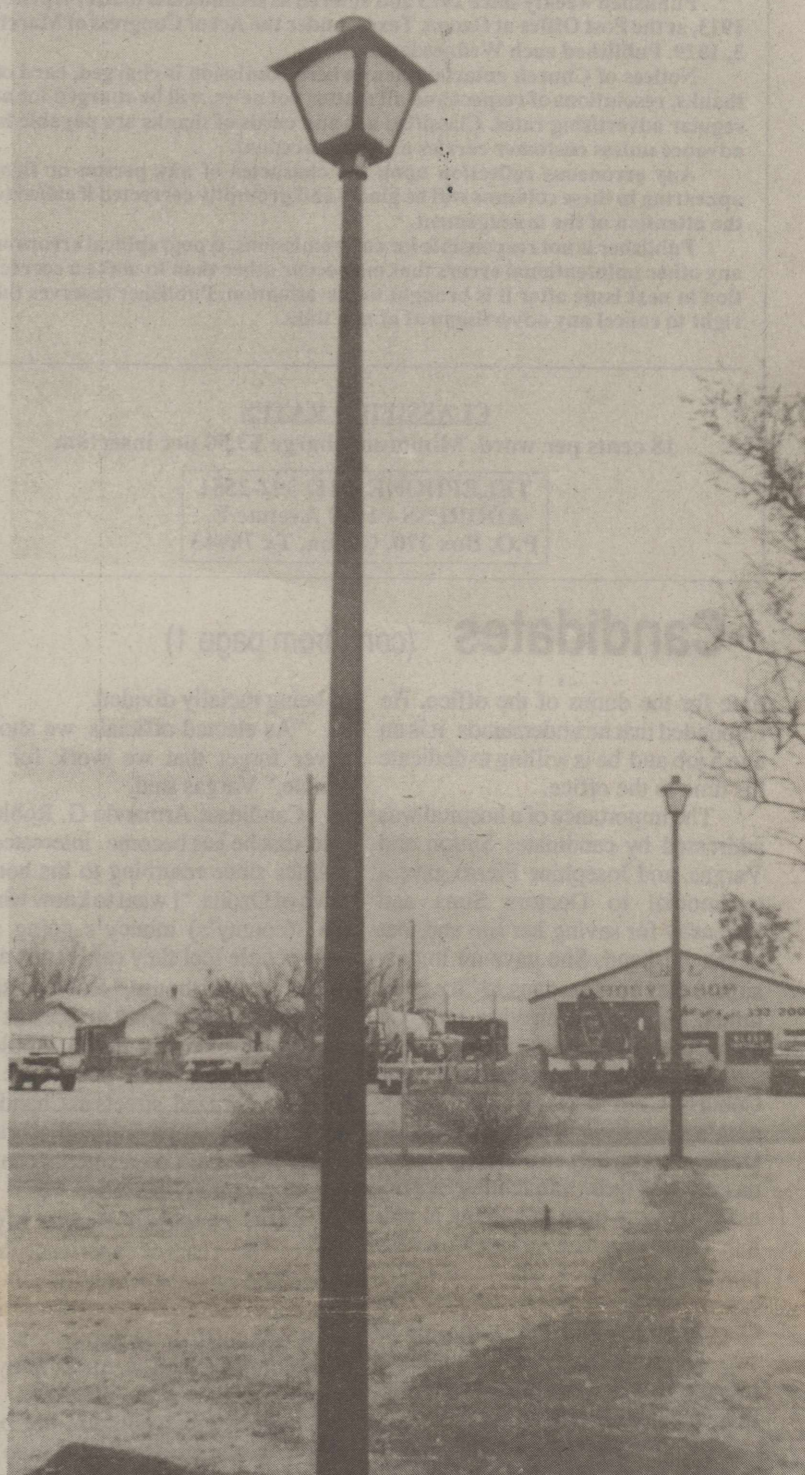
county would already be carrying and the fact that a visiting judge would have to be approved by each defendant before that person's case could be heard.

In response to a question about his interest in being appointed to the unexpired term of judge, DeHoyos said "I think I'm definitely the best candidate". Although it is not required that a county judge be a lawyer, DeHoyos said he believes a county judge should be a lawyer.

If DeHoyos is appointed to the post, the county could contract for someone to work as county attorney, he said. After completing a six month residency requirement, that person could be hired and fill the remainder of the unexpired term.

Jeffrey Sutton was questioned as to whether or not he would have the

## High School Track Season Begins Friday

Ozona High School track season gets underway Friday and Saturday with the boys and girls' teams participating in the Comanche Relays in Fort Stockton. Field events begin Friday at 2:30 and the running prelims at 3:30. Finals begin at 12:30 p.m. Saturday.

"The Ozona High School boys are looking forward to this season in order to improve on their past per-

formance," said Coach Pete Maldonado. The team is going to be a mixture of young athletes and experienced athletes due to the return of a number of lettermen.

One of the strongest areas will be in the distance events. Senior John Ramirez, juniors Rene Tambunga, Bryan Valdez, Michael Mitchell, sophomore Johnny Porras and fresh-

men Pete Casteneda, Lando Peña-Alfaro, Codie Porras and Charles Villarreal will be under Maldonado who is head track coach. The majority of these athletes were state qualifiers in cross country.

In the weight events, the Ozona boys will also be trying to improve their performance of last year. A group of juniors will lead the weight events. The juniors are: Justin Moran, Luis Longoria, Doug Meador and Clay Westmoreland. Other competitors for Ozona will be sophomores Adam Carroll and Patrick Sanchez and freshman Stephen Montes. The weight events will be coached by Tommy Wilson.

In the hurdles, sprints and relays, numbers will be the factor which will have to be overcome. This group of versatile athletes will be led by junior lettermen Anthony Sanchez and Chris Sanchez. Anthony, who will run the intermediate hurdles and the mile relay, should be one of the top hurdlers and sprinters in the area. Chris will be one of the top field event athletes in the district and will help in the mile relay. David Browne will join this group and compete in the 400 meter and be one of the district's top pole vaulters. Jon Sanchez and Jason Stuart will help in the field events. Coach Keith Hall will direct this group of talented athletes.

Coach Leandro Gonzales and Coach John Cox will be in charge of the junior high track program. Their first meet will be in Iraan March 4.

The Ozona Relays will be held March 5 with the junior high track meet to be held March 31.

## Carroll Qualifies For State In Solo Contest

Adam Carroll earned a Division I rating on a Class I trumpet solo Saturday, qualifying him for the state solo and ensemble contest to be held in San Marcos at the end of May.

An explanation of the rating system used in music competition is: Division I, a superior performance; Division II, an excellent performance; Division III, a good performance; Division IV, a fair performance; and Division V, a poor performance.

## Ortiz Announce In Precinct 4

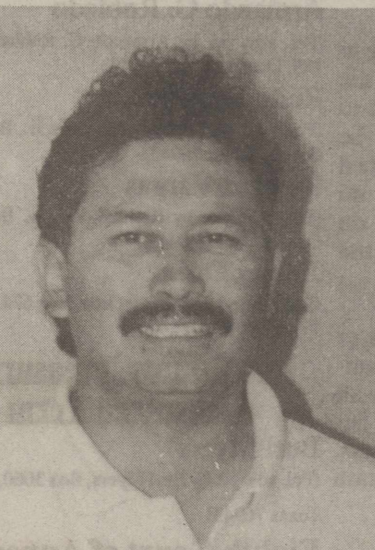

time for the duties of the office. He responded that he understands it is an 8 to 5 job and he is willing to dedicate his time to the office.

The importance of a hospital was addressed by candidates Sutton and Vargas, and Josephine Fierro gave a testimonial to Doctors Sims and Owensby for saving her life and that of her husband. She gave an impassioned plea for Ozonans to "try to be united, try to love each other, try to get along".

Membership policies of Ozona Country Club were part of the evening's discussion, involving Orlando DeHoyos who helped draft legislation passed last year preventing school athletic teams from practicing at athletic clubs which have discriminatory practices. DeHoyos, who has sought a county-owned public course for Ozona, referred to the admission of two Hispanics to the club as a token membership and reaffirmed his desire to have a public course here.

"It is a cancerous thing, and it makes Ozona look bad," said high school English teacher Thomas DeHoyos of the private club. "It is a stigma; it is a cancer. No matter how much icing you put on the cake, it still tastes bitter."

In his introduction, candidate Sutton said he would like to bring harmony to the commissioners' court and the community, working toward what's best for all instead of being divided. "We all want the same things," good government, a safe community, education, good health care, fire department, roads, streets, a clean community. The lack of a dump is a problem whose solution needs to be expedited, Sutton said.

He suggested having community workshops where people could sit down and resolve their differences.

Richard Vargas told of his commitment in applying for a job with the local cable company when he came back from the Air Force. He was hired and has been working for the same company 23 years. He will bring the same commitment to the office of commissioner along with 23 years of experience in the workforce and the trust of the public, Vargas said.

Vargas stated he wouldn't be running if people in the precinct were satisfied and emphasized the need to work together as a community instead

of being racially divided.

"As elected officials, we should never forget that we work for the people," Vargas said.

Candidate Armando G. Robledo said that he has become interested in politics since returning to his hometown of Ozona. "I want to know where the (county's) money's going and why people feel they can't trust anyone at the courthouse," Robledo said.

When asked what he sees as the biggest problems in Pct. 4, Robledo said the needs of the people are not being recognized, streets in Chandlerdale West need paving and a bridge needs to be built so residents can get out during rainy periods.

Clerk candidate Barbie Myers spoke of her years of experience in the office and said she would like to add computer jury selection to services from the office. Organization and continuing education for employees in the office are also priorities.

Nora Madris outlined her business experience as qualification for the clerk's position and expressed confidence in her ability to do the job.

Burl Myers, although unopposed, said he would appreciate everyone's vote as a show of confidence and trust in him for the job he is doing. During the year he has held office, the treasurer and auditor's offices and the hospital have been coordinated, Myers said.

Because there is not enough money to do all the things the community would like, priorities must be set, Fred Deaton said. He believes in keeping county government small as a means of managing the funds available. The landfill is his top priority, and he also listed correction of flooding in Pct. 2 as a priority.

In Debbi Puckett's written statement asking re-election, she mentioned the improvement microfilming records has brought to the office and that she wants to set up a computer database which will make record finding easier.

Early voting by personal appearance in the Primary ends March 4. Election day is March 8. Voting locations will be: Pct. 1 - Crockett County Courthouse; Pct. 2 - Crockett County Road Department; Pct. 3 - Crockett County Civic Center; Pct. 4 - Ozona Primary School; and Box 36 - WTU power plant near Girvin.

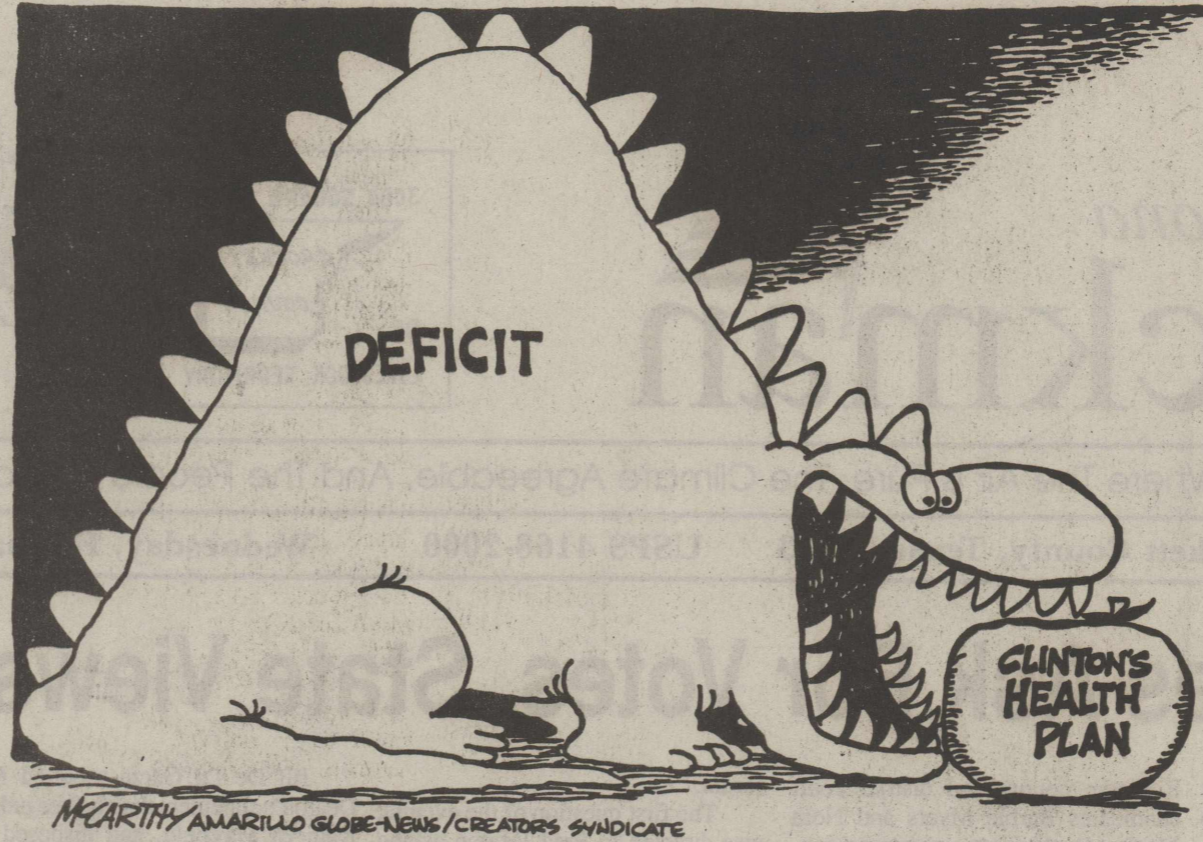

### Applied Jackets Topic Of FCE Program

This Thursday's meeting (Feb. 24th) of the Family Community Leadership Clubs will feature demonstrations on making Primitive Folk Art applied jackets from sweatshirts. Anyone who is interested is invited to attend one of the two free classes to be held at 10 a.m. on Thursday, Feb. 24, or at 7 p.m. the same day. The groups will meet at the Crockett County Civic Center.

"Participants will receive step-by-step instructions and patterns for appliques during the program," said Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent-Home Economics, who will teach the lesson. "These jackets are so simple that almost anyone - even with minimum sewing skills - can make one," the agent added.

The jackets feature blanket stitching around neckline, cuffs and front opening, as well as around the appliques. Quilting prints and unique buttons are utilized to add interest to the applied designs.

"These jackets might sell for over \$50 at a craft show or boutique, but you can make them for under \$10 if you purchase your own sweatshirt and use your own fabric scraps for the appliques," Ulmer said. The agent added that an old sweatshirt can even be recycled in this manner, making the cost almost nothing for an original designer garment.

The secret, Ulmer noted, is the use of fusibles to apply the appliques and stabilize the shirt before cutting. "Fusibles are a great tool for the non-sewer; once you've mastered the basics for using them properly, you can create many items for the home as well as embellishing your family's wardrobe," she said.

For more information about the classes or the Family Community Leadership program, interested persons can contact the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex,

religion, national origin or disability. Individuals with disabilities who require an auxiliary aid, service, or accommodation in order to participate in this meeting are encouraged to contact Tedra Ulmer at the County Extension Office; 392-2721, in order to determine how reasonable accommodations can be made.

Family Community Education clubs meet monthly; annual dues to be a member of the state FCE organization are \$4 per person. 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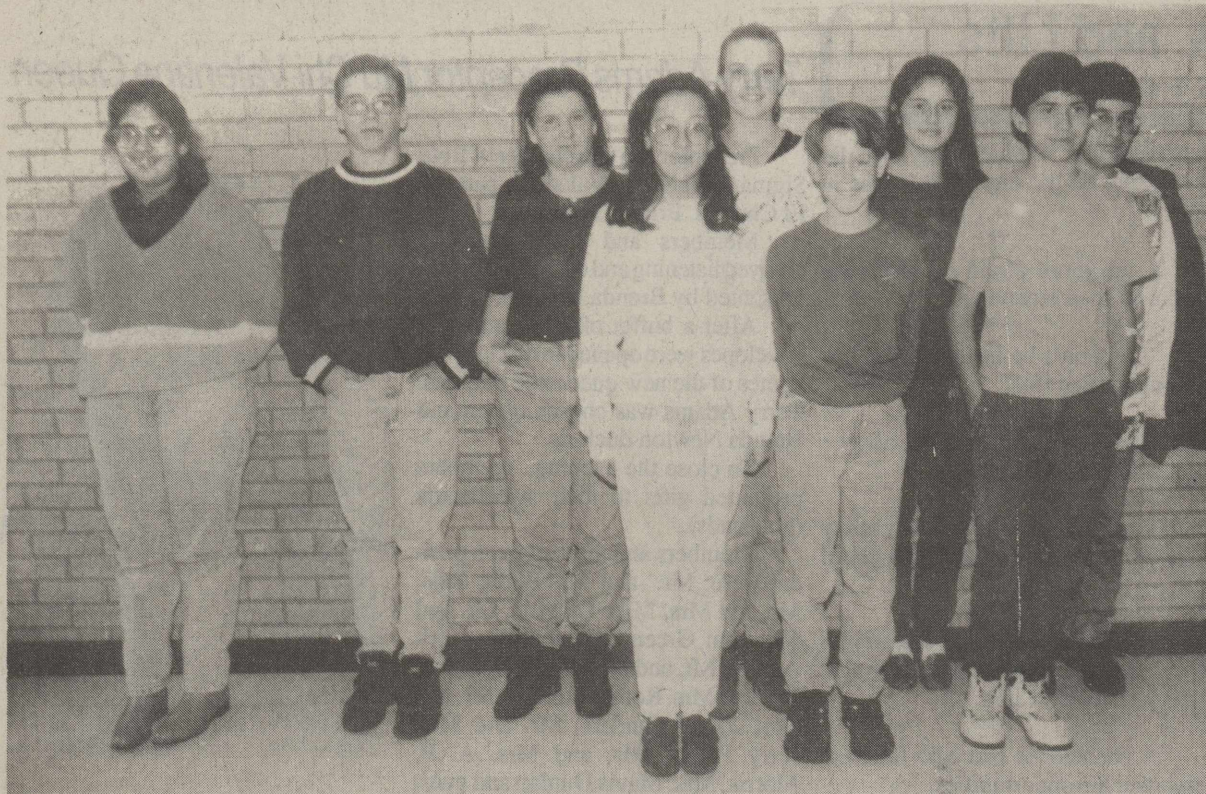

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## LET'S GET ACQUAINTED!

(Series #8)  
(Harvest Time Christian Center)

Last week, I talked with you about the baptism in the Holy Spirit, and the dimension it adds to our Christian lives and service. I did not talk about the initial physical evidence of the Baptism of the Holy Spirit.

I'm sure in this enlightened age, most know that we teach when a person is baptized in the Holy Spirit, they speak with other tongues as the Spirit gives them utterance. We base this teaching on the given instances in the book of Acts where people were baptized in the Holy Spirit. Look at them with me:

1. On the Day of Pentecost, it is written of the 120 believers who obeyed Jesus and waited on the promised comforter; "And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost and begin to speak with tongues as the Spirit gives them utterance," Acts 2:4.

2. When Peter went to Caesarea to preach to the Gentiles, the record reads, "While Peter yet spake these words, the Holy Ghost fell upon them which heard the word...for they heard them speak with tongues and magnify God" Acts 10:44,46.

3. Much later when Paul found believers in Ephesus, he asked them, "Have you received the Holy Ghost

since you believed?", Acts 19:2. They had not, "...When Paul had laid his hands upon them, the Holy Ghost came on them; and they spoke with tongues and prophesied", Acts 19:6.

4. When Peter and John went up to Samaria to where Philip had seen people converted, "They prayed that they might receive the Holy Ghost"... "They laid their hands on them and they received the Holy Ghost", Acts 8:15,17. There is no mention of tongues here. However, something caught the attention of a professed believer, Simeon, a sorcerer. He was impressed to the degree that he offered money to Peter and John for power to lay his hands on people that they would receive the Holy Ghost. We believe in view of other experiences what Simeon heard was them speaking in tongues. (Acts 8:1-19).

When Ananias laid his hands on Saul (Paul) in Acts 9:17 to be healed of his blindness and receive the Holy Spirit, no mention is made of tongues, but every Bible student knows that Paul told the church at Corinth, "I thank my God, I speak with tongues more than ye all", I Corinthians 14:18.

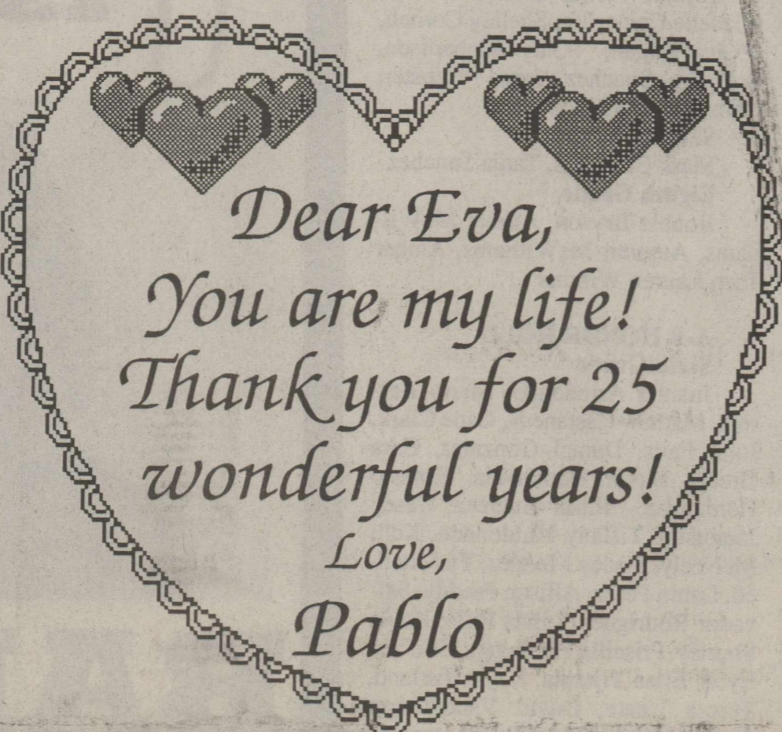

The spill was cleaned up by Eott Energy.

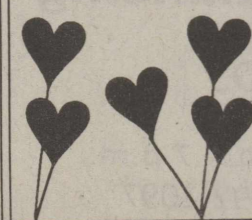

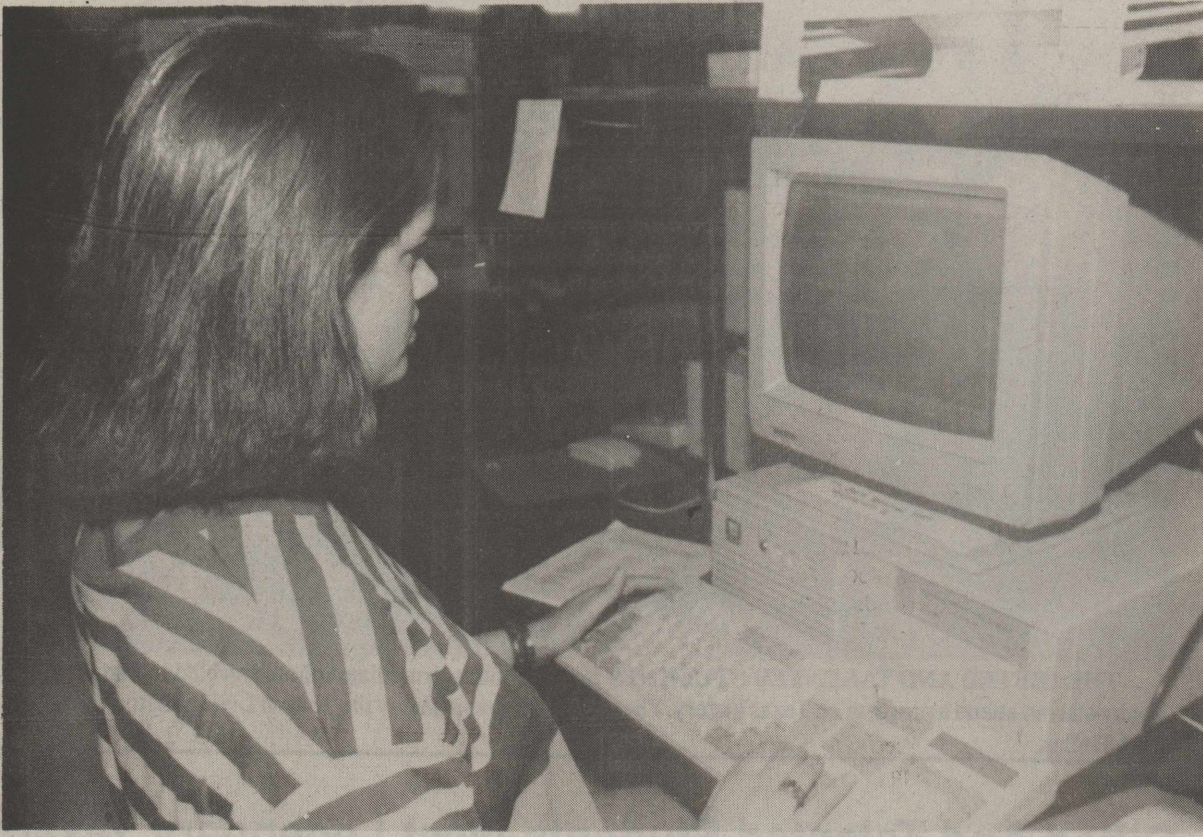

## Automated Library Offers Word Processing Capabilities

The new 20-computer network in the Ozona High School Library offers students the opportunity to do word processing. Each of the computers now available in the high school library network has the Microsoft Works program on it.

"Computers have almost replaced typewriters in many high schools and higher education institutions," says librarian Sherry York. "Since we got our computer network going in mid-October, a number of students have used the computers to write papers and reports. I expect this trend to continue when students see how much easier it is than typing the traditional way."

The main advantage of word processing over typing is in editing and correcting mistakes. To correct a mistake on a computer, just space back, delete, and type in the correction. No correction fluid needed. No erasing. No smudges.

The Works program contains a spelling check option. When this option is selected, the computer checks all words printed against a dictionary contained in the program. The computer then highlights the misspelled word so it can be corrected. It will even offer suggestions.

Another feature of the Works program is a thesaurus. Students seeking to improve their vocabulary or to find a more precise term for a word can get suggestions from the computer.

Debbie Arrott's English I classes worked on a writing project during December. Under Mrs. Arrott's direction, students used the computers in the library to write reports on short stories. After the writing was finished, the papers were printed out and edited by other students. After the editing was finished, the students corrected their reports on the computers and printed corrected copies.

Freshmen students participating in the writing project learned to create files, open and close files, to spell check, to save files, and to print.

Other high school students have used the library computers for word processing individually to complete required reports and research papers. For students who don't have typewriters or computers at home, the library offers an opportunity to get papers typed.

The Works program is easy to learn. (Even adults can manage it.) Speed and accuracy depend on a student's keyboarding skills, but word processing a research paper sure beats typing it up the old-fashioned way.

The word processing program is available on all the computers in the network at the Ozona High School library.

The library will host an open house on Thursday, March 3, from 7 to 8:30 p.m. during Texas Public Schools Week. Parents and community members are invited to come and visit the Ozona High School Library.

"Come take a look at our automated library and the amazing features it offers," invites Mrs. York. Look for part three of this series next week.

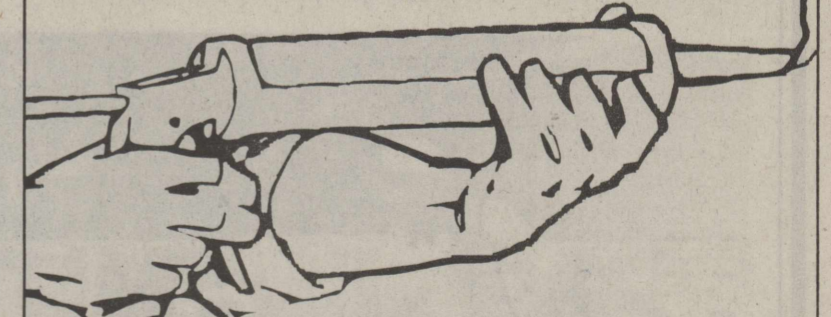

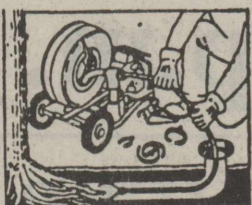

## Wind Rights In West Texas

Ranchers in West Texas own a valuable wind resource that is becoming of interest to electric utilities and wind power developers. In California where the wind energy industry had its birth in the early 80's, unwary ranchers lost control of their "wind rights" by making mistakes.

A co-operative study by ranchers of the region's wind resource would document the quality of potentially promising sites for commercial wind power plants. A broad regional cost-shared approach towards wind resource evaluation would make participation in the study affordable and produce a good understanding of what the winds are doing 50 meters up in the air and where the most promising sites for commercialization are located.

Once the rancher has a good understanding about the quality and quantity of his wind resource, superior production royalty agreements can be negotiated from an informed position. A good wind site averaging 16-18 miles per hour annually should command a production royalty arrangement for the landowner similar to a good oil or gas lease with proven reserves.

Most of the traditional landowners in California's wind parks didn't get advice in time about how to protect themselves and their long-term interests. Today in Texas, few attorneys, C.P.A.s and real estate advisors have any wind industry experience to begin assisting ranchers with windy land develop their interests safely in a very complicated power industry dominated by giant utilities.

## Oil And Gas Statistics

### JANUARY PERMITS TO DRILL

The Railroad Commission issued a total of 910 drilling permits in January 1994 compared to 822 in January 1993. The 910 total included 505 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 36 to re-enter existing well bores, 38 to deepen existing holes, 136 to plugback existing holes, and 60 for other wells. January amended drilling permits totaled 135.

Permits issued in January included 288 oil, 196 gas, 375 oil and gas, 31 injection, eight disposal, and 12 other permits.

### JANUARY OIL AND GAS COMPLETIONS

In January operators reported 247 gas, 376 oil, and 24 service completions, compared to 294 gas, 377 oil, and 23 service completions during the same period of last year.

The total of well completions recorded for 1994 year-to-date is 647, a seven percent decrease from the 694 recorded in 1993.

Operators reported 964 holes plugged and 209 dry holes in January, compared to 1,175 holes plugged and 306 dry holes reported during the same

period last year.

### NOVEMBER CRUDE OIL PRODUCTION

Texas preliminary November crude oil production averaged 1,503,864 barrels daily, down from the 1,628,480 barrels daily average of November 1992.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for November is 45,115,910 barrels, down from the 48,854,399 barrels reported in November 1992.

Crockett County produced 288,702 barrels of crude oil during the month of November, 1993.

### NOVEMBER NATURAL GAS PRODUCTION

Texas oil and gas wells produced 451,504,998 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in preliminary production for November, up 1.16 percent compared to November 1992's gas production total of 446,316,872 Mcf.

Texas gas production in November came from 172,137 oil, and 46,345 gas wells.

Crockett County produced 10,652,354 Mcf of natural gas during the month of November 1993.

## Medicare Part -B Enrollment Deadline Is March 31

"If you don't have part B of Medicare and you want it, you have from now until the end of March to sign up." That reminder comes from Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo.

Every year, the government offers a three-month enrollment period—from January 1 to March 31—during which people who turned down or previously dropped the part B coverage can sign up for it.

Part B coverage, also called "Medical insurance," helps pay for doctors care, outpatient hospital visits, and other medical services.

Upp said people who want to sign up for Part B should call the San Angelo Social Security Office or call Social Security's toll-free number 1-800-772-1213.

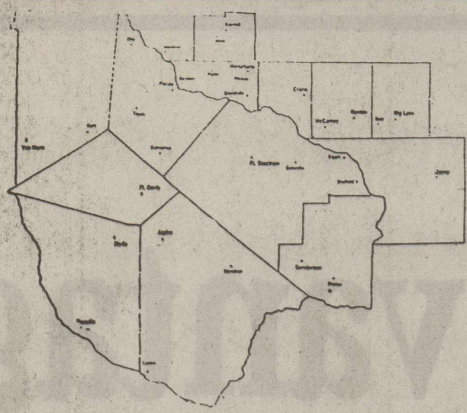

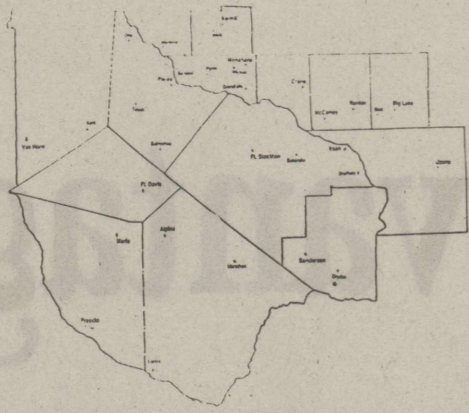

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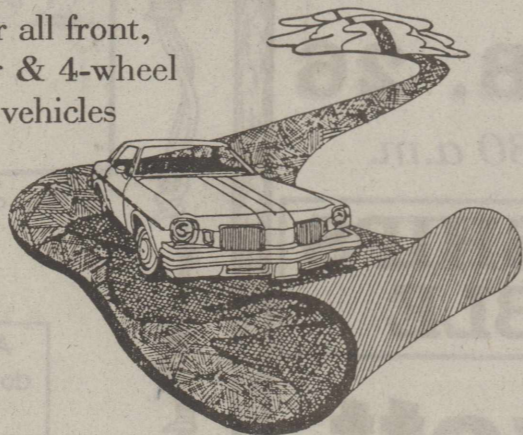
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
