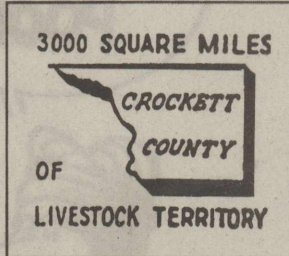

County To Aid In Construction Of New Convention Center

Use of county equipment and expertise in building a pad for the proposed fair park convention center was approved by commissioners Monday. Pon Seahorn and John L. Henderson were present to talk to the court about the project.

Seahorn said verbal pledges of \$115,000 to \$120,000 have already been received. Total cost is expected to be \$200,000 to \$220,000.

The 100'x150' building will be placed near the 4-H Barn so both can be used for the same event. The result should be table seating for 16,000 with 30,000 square feet covered.

Court members said now, before paving season begins, would be the best time for county involvement.

Seahorn forecast that stakes would be in the ground before the week's end.

An offer by Double T Ranch for use of a caliche pit for organic waste dumping is being considered by the court. Commissioner Frank Tam-

bunga is to meet with Dennis Clark to learn how much fencing will be required to fence the pit. The pit is to be kept locked. Only authorized personnel and Double T personnel will have access.

Architect Jack Meek met with the court to discuss location of a hydraulic elevator for the courthouse. The proposal deemed best is to bring the elevator up through the already crowded clerk's office to an eastern window in the courtroom. A small extension will be added to the eastern portion of the building to compensate.

Commissioners, on a 3-1 vote, denied payment of Bonnie Najjar's medical expenses beyond what is provided in the county's insurance plan. Frank Tambunga voted against denying payment.

The court did vote unanimously to appoint hospital employee Ladyne Mahannah as insurance liaison between employees and Hill House, the company administering the county's

medical insurance.

An agenda item to discuss and approve or deny changes in the period of time in which employees may use the Emergency Illness Bank time off resulted in no changes. There will be a further report at the next court meeting.

Interim judge A. O. Fields was appointed by the court to represent the

county on the tax appraisal board. Fields was already on the board in another capacity, and now that vacancy will have to be filled.

In response to an agenda item, commissioners agreed, without a vote, to request the presence of the county attorney at all commissioners' court

New Voter Registration Cards Ordered

New voter registration cards have been ordered for registered voters in the new School Trustee Districts 3 and 4. The new cards will show the voter's school district number and precinct number. These cards should be received by mail before early voting starts on April 18 to elect two members to the school board of trustees. Candidates for the May 7 election are Veronica Tijerina in District 3 and

David Bean in District 4.

Prior to the school board election in 1995, new voter registration cards will be mailed to registered voters in School Trustee Districts 1 and 6. Trustees in Districts 2 and 5 will be elected in 1996, at which time all registered voters should have received new cards.

Crockett County Public Library's Book Feast on April 23 is the place to be. Bronze Sculptures By Judy Childress To Exhibit At Crockett County National

Artist Judy Black Childress will be at Crockett County National Bank April 13 from 2 until 6 p.m. during a preview of her bronze sculptures. The exhibit will remain at the bank through April 20.

Through the medium of bronze sculpture, Judy conveys the feelings of empathy and pleasure she feels for both wildlife and domestic animals. She often depicts animals interacting with people by drawing on a lifetime of ranch-life experience in West Texas. She now lives and works in Loveland, CO, to be near the foundries and the sculpture community that has developed there.

Judy, who is the daughter of Jane Black, studied art at Texas Tech University while earning her degree in landscape architecture. She has acquired a foundation in sculpture by studying with sculptors Garland Weeks, George Lundeen, Lincoln Fox, Ken Bunn, Ed Fraughton, Jon Zahourek, Fritz White, Richard McDonald, Ned Jacob and Tuck Lang-

land. She has also lived in San Miguel de Allende, Mexico, in order to study with sculptor Lothar Kastenbaum.

Health Fair Thursday At Civic Center

Free testing and educational programs on several health topics will be featured at the 1994 Crockett County Health Fair on Thursday at the civic center. The fair, which will be held from 12 noon to 6 p.m., is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Extension Home Economics Committee, and the Crockett County Hospital. The spring blood drive by Xi Sigma Omega and United Blood Services will also be held at the civic center from 12-6.

Tests which are available this year at no cost include cholesterol screening, blood sugar and blood oxygen, blood pressure screening, hearing tests, glaucoma and vision testing, and fitness, as well as heights and weights. "These tests would cost approximately \$100-\$150 if you paid for them, but thanks to our health care providers they will be absolutely free the day of the health fair," said Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent-Home Economics, who coordinates the event.

Ulmer noted that the organizers of the health fair hope senior citizens and people with limited incomes--as well as other people of all ages and incomes--will take part in the free programs and testing. "This is the time to learn what services are available from these providers and to educate yourself about health issues--before the need arises!" she said.

Free educational programs and information will be available during the health fair, beginning with the Family Community Education Club meeting at 10 a.m. and again at 7 p.m. The program for the meeting, which is open to anyone interested, is "The Female Fat Cell." This program will last one hour, but other programs during the day will be 30 minutes in

length, with several being presented more than once.

At 12:15, 3:30 and 5:30, Glenda Corker of Angelo Community Hospital will present programs on "Dealing with Diabetes." Corker is the Diabetes Educator at Community, and she will discuss ways to prevent and live with diabetes.

"Safety First/Buckle Up" will be the topic of a program following the landing of Shannon Medical Center's new Medivac helicopter in the FESCO parking lot at approximately 12:30 p.m.

The 2 p.m. and 5 p.m. programs will be provided by Shannon's Cardiac Rehab Team. The group will discuss the importance of fitness in disease prevention and staying independent, as well as ways to establish a lifetime fitness program that you won't quit.

"Preventing and Dealing with 'Stroke'" will be discussed at the 2:30

p.m. program by Shannon's Physical Rehab Team. It will be particularly informative for caregivers or people at risk for stroke.

Sandy Speed, Angelo Community Hospital's "55 Plus" Coordinator, will present the 3 p.m. program on a topic important to senior citizens--and their caregivers-- "Medicare and Medigap Insurance". Speed and the other presenters will also be present during the day at their respective exhibits to visit informally with Crockett County citizens on these and other related topics.

A number of exhibits are on tap for the health fair, including Shannon Medical Center, Crockett County Hospital, Crockett County Water Department, Angelo Community Hospital, Belton, Lions Club, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Depart-

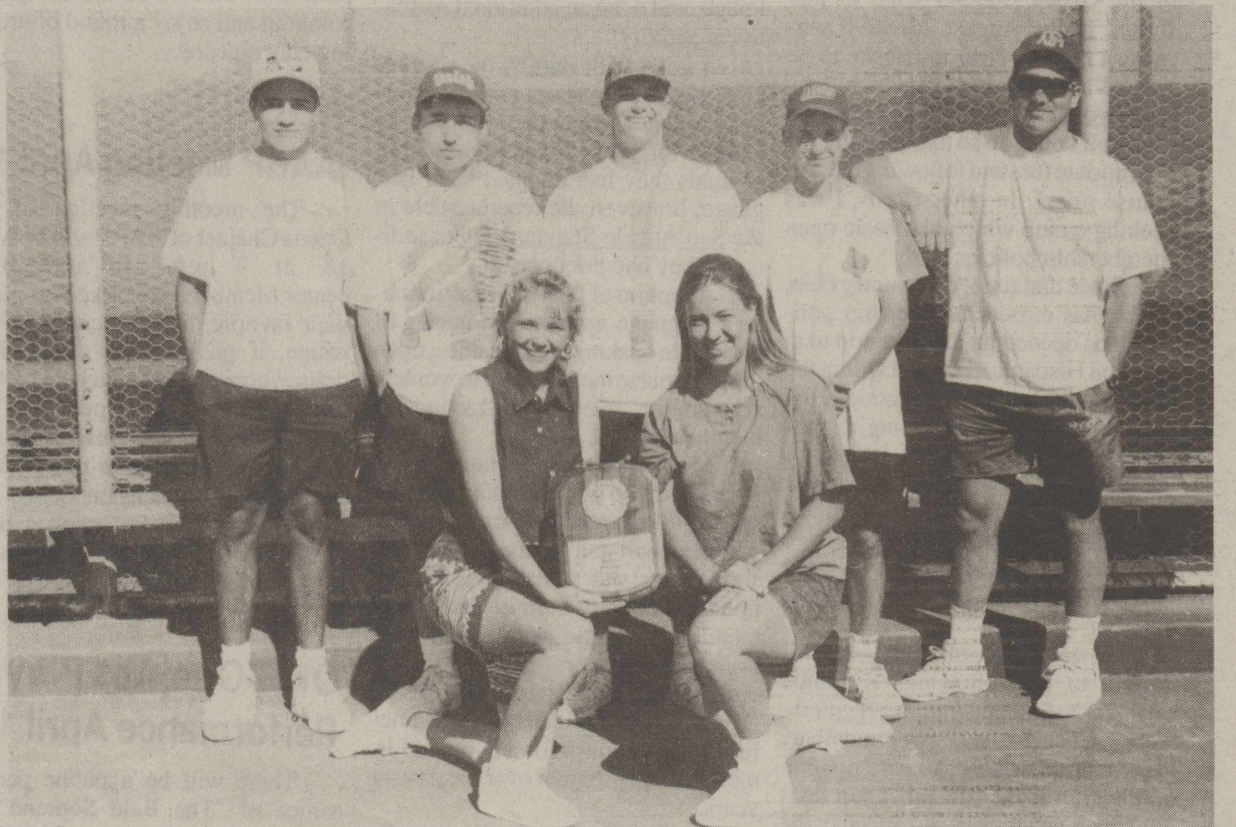
OHS Qualifies Students For Regional UIL

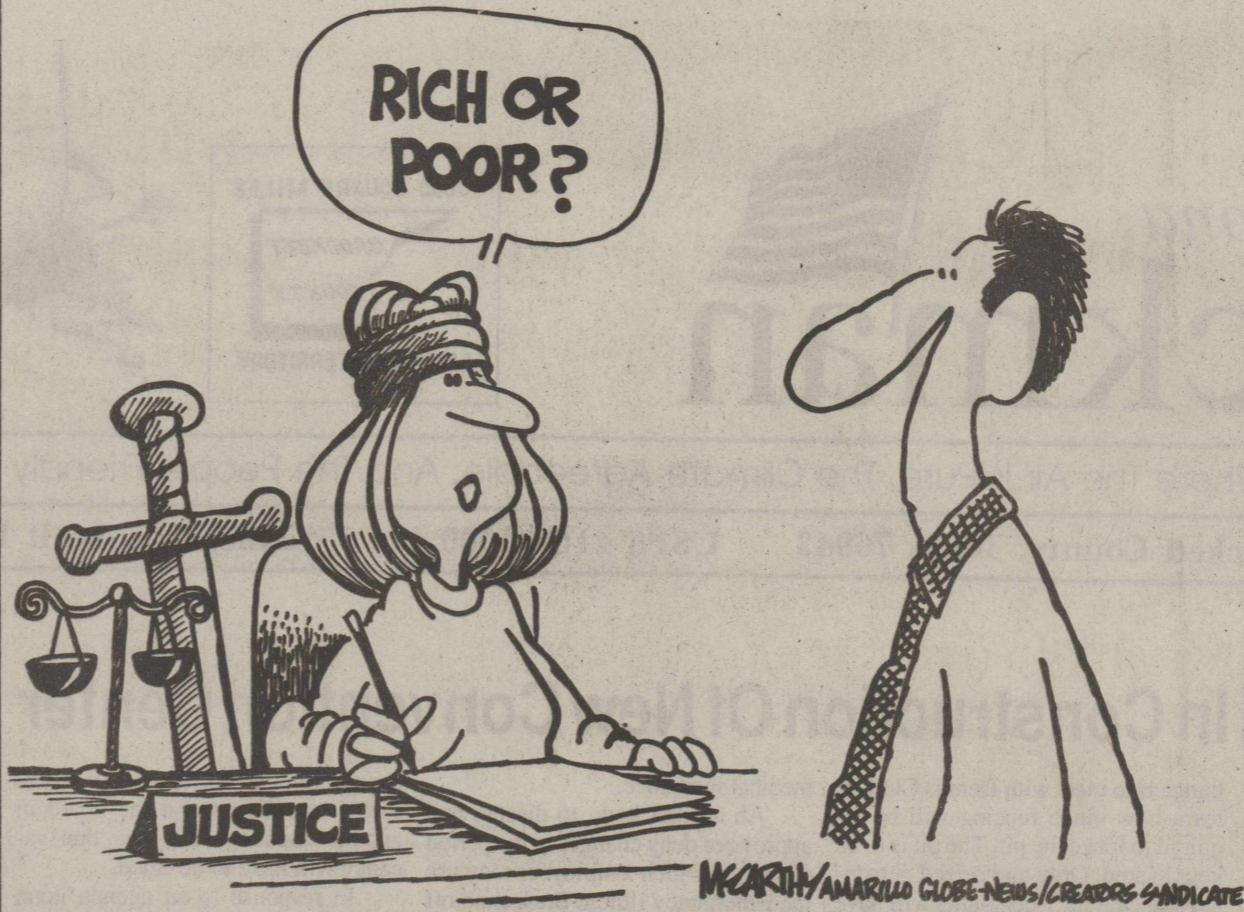

J. S. Pierce III Service Held Thursday

Funeral service for J. S. "Pie" Pierce III, 79, a Crockett County ranchman, was held Thursday, April 7, at Ozona United Methodist Church at 2 p.m. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Preddy Funeral Home.

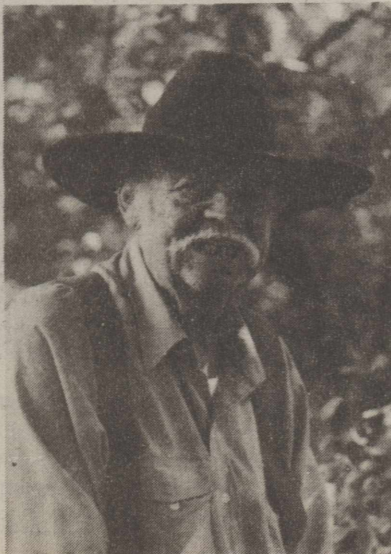
Mr. Pierce died at 2:20 p.m. Tuesday, April 5, 1994, in Shannon Medical Center. He had been ill for several weeks following surgery.

A native of Crockett County, he was born Dec. 13, 1914. His grandfather, Joe Sellers Pierce, came to Texas from Pennsylvania. He was an early-day Crockett County settler. Pie's parents were Mr. and Mrs. Joe S. Pierce Jr., who ranched south of Ozona on the old Pierce Headquarters Ranch.

He was educated in the Ozona Public School and Texas Tech University. After attending college, he helped his father in the ranching business until going into ranching on his own. He ran the Pierce ranch north of Ozona called "Rancho Bonito" for several years, moving to the old Pierce Headquarters Ranch when his father retired. He ranched in Hudspeth County for 20 years. He also ranched his wife's property known as the Howard's Well Ranch. He was involved in the oil and gas business.

He was well-known for his historical stories of Crockett County, which he told with humor, and he could recall any date.

He married Dorothy Flora Henderson in September of 1935; she preceded him in death Aug. 17, 1986. Survivors include two sons, Joe S. Pierce IV and wife, Sammy, and



William Henderson Pierce; one grandson, J. S. "Joe" Pierce V and wife, Luann; three great-grand-daughters, Marie, Laura and Rebecca Pierce; one sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Dempster Jones; two nieces and their families, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Acton and children, Mrs. Billy Dell Renfro and Marty Acton, and Mr. and Mrs. Tom Conner and children, Tommy and Robin.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editors:

It has been nearly four years since I initially began my public criticisms of the Ozona Country Club in this forum. In the August 22, 1990 segment, I made it clear my desire to be part of a golf course in which "any man, woman, or child" that desired to play golf could do so upon paying the appropriate fees and following the golf course rules". In other words, I was seeking a club which had basic open membership policies.

Since that time, the country club, which has closed membership policies, has opened its membership to at least ten Hispanic males, all within the last year. These "new and good" Hispanic members were willing to subject themselves to being judged or screened by anonymous individuals who previously denied them membership because of their ethnicity. I have never been in agreement with their discriminatorily-motivated screening process.

However, the golf course remains closed to the following: 1. Single women 2. Students/minors/Jr. members 3. Guests 4. Ozona non-members. A further barrier to participation at the club is their membership dues which alone tends to screen away the vast majority of Crockett County citizens from utilizing the facility.

Opening their membership to the above-mentioned groups would have the following positive effects: 1. more money for the club; 2. an economic

boost for Ozona; 3. the scheduling of conferences and seminars in Ozona; 4. foster better community relations; 5. help overcome the club's negative image; and 6. be an additional recreational activity.

A good faith start by the country club would be to adopt anti-discriminatory language into their by-laws. In October of 1993, I was told by club officials they had adopted such language; however, the recent article in the San Angelo Standard Times indicated they had not done so.

Adoption of this anti-discriminatory language would, as a matter of direct rule-making consequence, open the golf course membership to women, Jr. members, guests, and Ozona non-members!!

Maybe the "new and good" members, who failed to commit themselves to overcoming exclusionary policies, will put away their shortsightedness and selfishness, and remind the country club of the above-mentioned simple yet fundamental principles that are important to a community, since past and present Ozona school officials have shamefully failed to push for any type of Jr. membership program over the past 44 years.

I would venture to say that the fruits of working together will yield tremendous results for our students who are our future.

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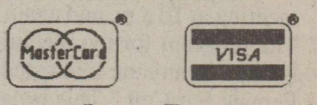

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More Lighting Required For Care Center

A survey of Crockett County Care Center by the Texas Department of Health showed no patient care deficiencies, but found that hallway lighting was inadequate.

Administrator Gerry Phillips told board members at a meeting April 7 that better lighting will have to be installed. This will require 12-15 more lights at approximately \$40 per light to meet the light safety codes.

Continued problems with the pharmacies regarding strip labeling for insulin and eye drops, and patient histories and physicals which have not been completed in a timely manner were brought to the board's attention.

Phillips said there are still some physician orders which need to be updated. Law requires that this be done every 60 days.

In the hospital portion of his report, Phillips told the board there have been inservices on outcome oriented nursing and on documentation. CPR certification classes are almost completed by the licensed personnel and aides.

All patients age 55 and over are to have an advance directive on file. Patient Rights of Self-Determination have been posted in the emergency room.

A patient/resident complaint book has been instituted and there has also been a policy added to the policy and procedure manual regarding transferring patients between the hospital and care center.

There are still some overdue history and physicals which cause the hospital to be behind in reimbursements, Phillips said. These are dictated by the physicians. The medical record consultant suggested withholding staff privileges, paychecks or hiring extra personnel.

Food temperatures continue to be a problem. Phillips suggested better coordination between dietary staff and nursing staff regarding trays for patients who need to be fed rather than ordering insulated dishes. Diet orders in relation to diagnosis were in com-

pliance.

Repairs have been made to the x-ray machine, and the lab's co-ag machine temperature controls have been repaired. Cobas-Mira controls and correlation studies have been completed and show the controls to be holding.

No problems were found during a surprise inspection by the Texas State Board of Pharmacy.

New glass doors have been installed at the emergency room entrance and south employee entrance. These were purchased with grant money. Painting and renovation is continuing in the hospital. Independent phone lines for the ambulance were installed and run to the nurses' station and x-ray view room. EKG lines have also been installed in order to fax EKGs without disconnecting the leads on the patient.

Diane Schwertner reported there were 107 emergency room patients, two deaths and no births at the hospital in March. There are currently four boarder patients and there have been two Medicare patients since the hospital became decertified.

Mrs. Schwertner has stepped down as director of nurses due to her husband's transfer. This position is now held by Martha Vickers with Mrs. Schwertner as assistant director of nurses. She will work 16 hour shifts every other weekend.

The March financial report given by Phillips showed the hospital to be \$3,380 under budget and the care center \$1,142 under budget. The first quarterly report reflects a combined \$16,492 under budget.

ment of Health, Hospice and Am-Tex Medical Equipment.

Am-Tex Medical Equipment is the area provider for the American Cancer Society, which provides free medical equipment for cancer patients. They also work closely with Hospice and other groups. An exhibit featuring medical equipment and a spokesperson who can explain Medicare benefits will be on hand at the fair.

Beltone will again be providing free hearing tests, and according to Ulmer, "We are extremely pleased to have Dr. Dan Wilson of Angelo Clinic Association with us to do eye exams, particularly the glaucoma testing." Diabetes, according to Crockett County health officials, is our number-one problem, and glaucoma is a related problem which can be prevented through early diagnosis.

Transportation to the health fair can be arranged from noon to 5 p.m. through the Thunderbird transportation system by calling 392-2021. Cost for riders under age 60 is 50 cents per trip, and those over age 60 are asked to make a donation if they would like to do so. Individuals with disabilities who require an auxiliary aid, service or accommodation in order to participate in the health fair are encouraged to contact Tedra Ulmer at 392-2721 to determine how reasonable accommodations can be made.

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TEA Announces One More TAAS Date

Commissioner Skip Meno of the Texas Education Agency announced in March that the state would provide another opportunity for graduating seniors and out-of-school individuals to pass the exit level test.

Only those students that will have the opportunity to graduate in May 1994 will take the test May 5, 6 and 9. Underclassmen who have not passed the TAAS will not have the opportunity to test at this time.

Out-of-school students, individuals who have met all graduation requirements other than passing the TAAS may also take the test May 5, 6 and 9. However, these out-of-school students must contact their school

district or education service center by April 22, 1994, to reserve a place for testing. They will not be required to register in the past. If you are an out-of-school student and have met all graduation requirements other than passing the TAAS, go by the counseling office at the high school and reserve a place for testing.

Results from the March exit level test should be received by the district by April 29. The results of the May 1994 exit level tests will be returned to the districts by May 25.

Call the high school if you have any questions concerning the extra TAAS testing dates.

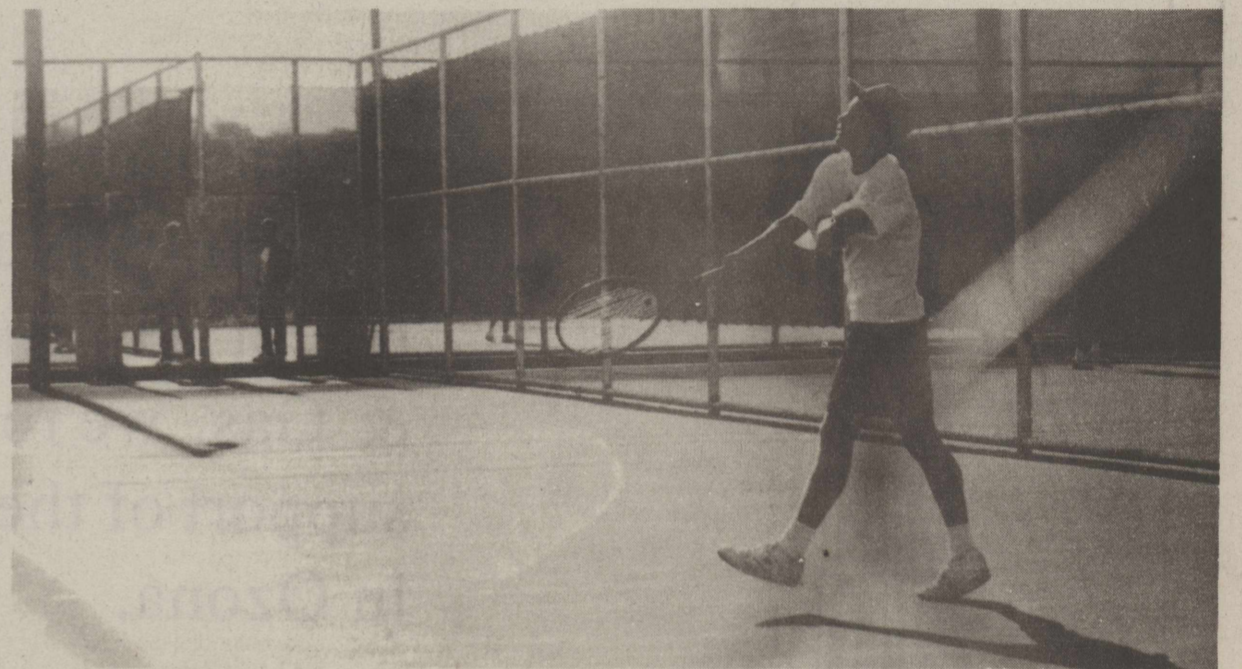

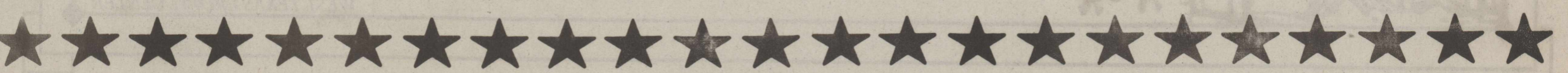

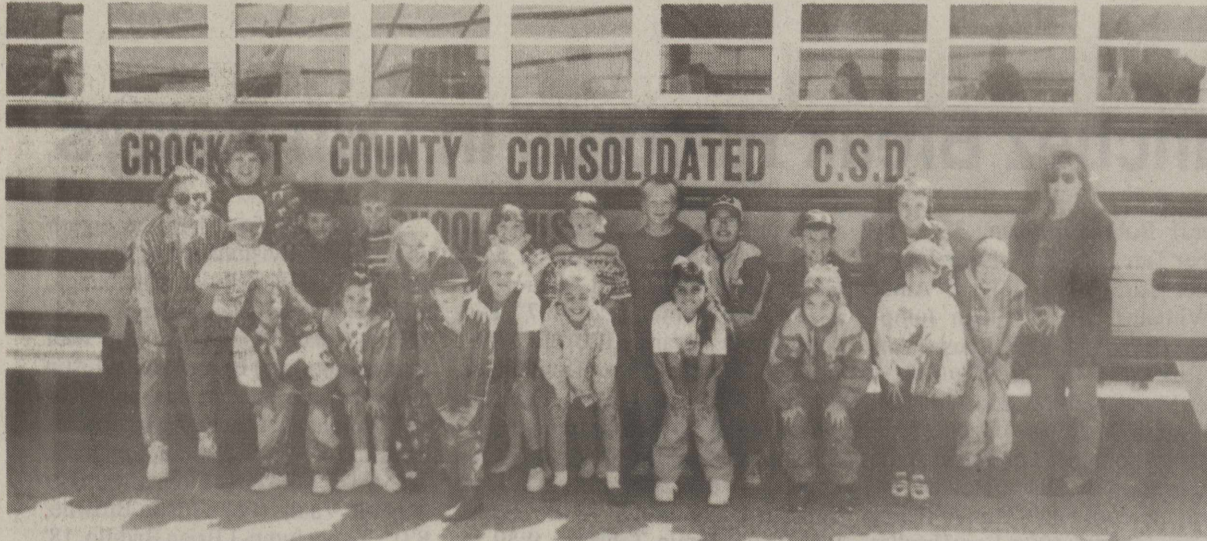

meetings. Court members briefly discussed 911 emergency telephone service. A charge of 50 cents is on every phone bill whether or not a county has the plan. The money is accruing for the service in the county. Commissioners decided to let the accrual continue rather than decide to enter the service at this time.

The court voted not to adopt a resolution to participate in a state program which would add \$10 to any county court case in which there was a conviction. The money would be sent to Austin from the county clerk's office and a percentage returned to the county, resulting in more work than benefit, court members decided.

Commissioners informally agreed to Tambunga's request to ask for a release of rights of redemption on a property owned by the county on Piedra Street. Property bought for back taxes is subject to redemption by the former owner for a period of two years. A release of rights of redemption would allow removal of a small greenhouse on the lot.

Commissioners agreed to ask a local garden club for assistance in planning a flower bed at the north corner of the south swimming pool. Once a plan is established, the area will be filled with donated plants.

Opening of bids took much of the morning. Two bids were received for civic center flooring. Action on this bid was tabled until the next meeting.

CSA of San Angelo was the successful bidder for coated and uncoated paving rock. 880 cubic yards will be purchased at \$26.11 per cubic yard and 2,640 uncoated cubic yards at \$23.59 per cubic yard. Bids were also received from Lilly Construction, Capital Aggregate and Vulcan.

C&W was the successful bidder for diesel and transport fuel. Shelton was the other bidder.

Janet Hill McDaniel was the only bidder for the contract for Housing and Urban Development services. Under this contract, Mrs. McDaniel will serve as the housing authority, inspecting rental properties and processing applications for their inclusion

in the Section 8 HUD rental assistance program.

Once a property is accepted into the program, part of her job will be to issue certificates to both property owners and renters.

Crockett County has contracts with HUD allowing the program here.

Monthly reports were heard from the county auditor, civic and youth center director, hospital and care center administrator, road and parks department superintendent and county librarian. A written report was read from Helping Hands.

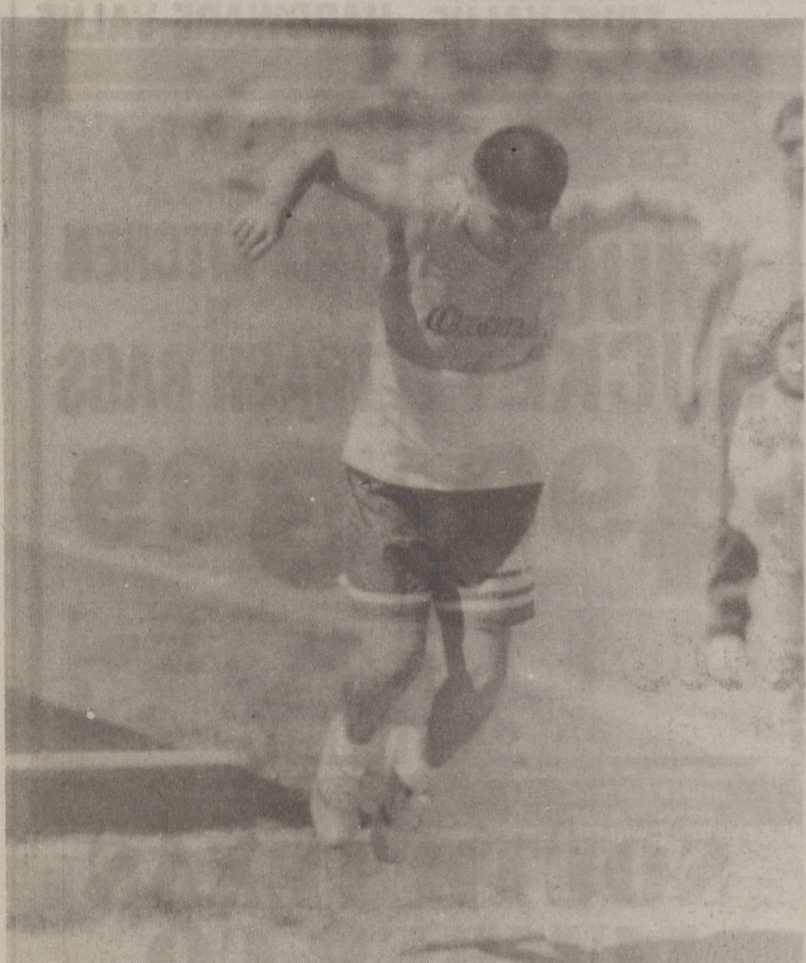

Lucky Crockett County 4-H members have combined fun and learning in this year's clothing project. In March, a group of nine 4-H members were accompanied by County Extension Agent Tedra Ulmer and adult 4-H leader Debra Bangeman as they toured clothing-related businesses in San Angelo.

The group started their morning at Hancock Fabrics, where they learned about buying fabrics, patterns and notions. They then traveled downtown to J. Wilde Boutique for a look at ways to decorate clothing and make old clothing look new again. Using what they had learned at the previous stops, the group then visited the Salvation Army and put together trendy outfits and identified ways they could "dress up" items to look expensive.

Sunset Mall was the next stop on the tour, as the group compared prices from similar outfits they'd put together at the Salvation Army - a lot of surprised looks were the result as the youngsters realized there are inexpen-

sive ways to have a nice wardrobe if you know about sewing and notions.

The March tour was taken by Leta Bess Bangeman, Sophie Jo Bangeman, Kristin Tambunga, Paige Tambunga, Andrea Ewen, Tabitha Ewen, Michelle Necessary, Kimberly Nowell and Bobbie Sue Bangeman.

Saturday, April 9, another clothing workshop was held, this time closer to home - at the county 4-H barn and the Methodist Church. Attending this workshop were: Rani Davis, Leta Bess Bangeman, Amanda Hignight, Kristin Bullard, Ashlee Ramos, Brittney Ellis, Andrea Ewen, Lisa Bryant, Reagan Shaw, Rebecca Shaw, Kimberly Nowell, Sophie Jo Bangeman, Tabitha Ewen, Codi Richardson and Paige Tambunga. Teen leader JoLynn Vannoy taught modeling and part of the design session, and adult leaders assisting or attending included Rhonda Shaw - also known as the "tie-dye queen", Debra Bangeman, Jane Richardson, Wendi Tambunga and Sara Hignight.

This time, the group started out by learning to tie-dye and paint T-shirts and shoes. They then learned about the 4-H design project and designed their own garments, accessories or textiles. Following some recreation and lunch, the group's attention was turned to modeling, as two-time State 4-H Fashion Show contestant JoLynn Vannoy taught basic skills to the group.

Modeling proved to be a particularly popular activity, and the adult leaders enjoyed the show as much as the 4-H'ers, as the youngsters learned to use props such as hats and sunglasses, do turns skillfully, and smile while looking out at the audience.

"We saw self-confidence and coordination grow within a few minutes with these young women," said Ulmer, noting that developing poise and confidence are two of the goals of the 4-H clothing project.

Many of the 4-H'ers involved in the project are currently busy either sewing or comparison shopping, and the competition part of the project - which is optional - will culminate in judging on Wednesday, April 13, and a fashion show on Monday, April 18, at 6:30 p.m. at the civic center. All interested persons are invited to the free fashion show. All 4-H members who have participated in any phase of the project will receive a participation certificate at that time.

Leadership Training Offered For Adults

Since the Family Community Leadership program began in 1987 in Texas, it has successfully taught leadership skills to thousands of Texas citizens, enabling them to assume leadership roles in their families and communities. The program, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is open to persons of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or handicap.

With volunteer-taught lessons, the mission of FCL is to "empower women and men of diverse cultures and family structures from across the state to develop their ability to advocate, educate and lead". The program's success is demonstrated by graduates who have taken on elected positions in organizations or local public offices, such as school boards, town councils or various commissions. All have benefited from the personal growth and increased confidence that come from learning new skills.

Comments from two graduates express why FCL in Texas continues to be a viable program for leadership development.

Minnie Martinez, FCL volunteer from Matagorda County says, "Being part of the FCL program has increased my leadership skills many times over. I am confident enough now to accept leadership positions in other organizations. And I am able to take an active part in board meetings by fully participating with input, by asking questions, giving ideas and solutions. Before FCL training, that was not possible for me. FCL has certainly strengthened my leadership abilities."

Ricky Morales, 1991 FCL graduate from Winkler County, says, "I took the FCL course because I wanted to gain more leadership skills and confidence for working with the public. I want to encourage other Hispanic citizens to take the course to gain skills and confidence that will enable them to get involved in their community. FCL has helped me gain knowledge about resources and information on issues and problems. I have more background knowledge on these and I feel competent to speak out more."

Morales continued, "I ran for a city council seat in 1991 and made a good showing, gained a lot of helpful experience and will probably run again

in the future."

FCL sessions will again be taught in this area, beginning May 19 and 20 in Big Spring at Howard College, continuing with a session on June 20 in Odessa, and concluding with a session July 11 in Kermit. Crockett County Extension Agent-Home Economics Tedra Ulmer will teach the July 11 session on "Listen and Lobby".

FCL members who complete the training give 96 hours in payback time - either through speaking to other groups, teaching lessons, working on community issues or other activities that benefit the community. Cost to attend all sessions is \$40 and covers all supplies, room cost for May 19, lunch for two sessions, and refreshments. Registration fees and applications are due in the Crockett County Extension Office by April 25. Registration is transferable, but not refundable.

If approved, this application will result in an increase in Southwestern Bell's revenues of approximately \$1682.00 during the first year. Southwestern Bell proposes that the changes be effective on December 1, 1994.

Free Parenting Video Classes To Begin Soon

A series of early childhood video-based parenting classes will be offered in Ozona after April 15th, according to County Extension Agent Tedra Ulmer, who will teach the free classes for couples, singles, or anyone interested in improving their parenting skills.

Over 100,000 parents have attended parenting classes offered through Extension in Texas over the past three years. Parents who attended half or more of the sessions in their programs changed three or more parenting practices, including communicating and disciplining in a more positive way, providing encouragement to children, and reinforcing positive behavior.

Any parent who decides to be a more competent parent can do so, resulting in happier, healthier, more successful children. Ideally, before each of us becomes a parent, we should receive help and support to learn important parenting skills such as understanding the growth and development of children, communicating and disciplining in a positive way, and enhancing the child's positive self-esteem.

According to Ulmer, "In real life, we don't receive that help soon enough in most cases. Parents have always copied the behavior of their own parents as a model for their own parenting styles. It's as if good parenting skills are supposed to come with the baby-like instincts animals seem to have," she added.

Unfortunately, today's situation reminds us that this is not true. As parents, we may begin to realize that our parents' behaviors were not necessarily appropriate for today's more democratic family. Those rigid, strict practices often result in rebellion, poor decision-making skills and low self-esteem.

Parents have a responsibility to learn skills that help them relate to their children in positive, productive ways. These skills take practice, and that's where parenting classes come in. More than at any time in history there is parenting information and support available to help people learn parenting skills. Parenting classes

such as the ones offered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service can provide support and encouragement, help change negative parenting patterns, and help your entire family communicate in a more positive way.

There is only one catch--you have to attend the classes.

"But I don't have time!" you say? How much time is your child's happiness worth to you? For only eight to 10 hours of your time, you can tremendously improve your chances of raising a happy, well-adjusted child--while maintaining your own sanity. If you're interested in attending classes--whether you're a new parent, parent of a pre-teen, teen or a grandparent

who'd like to be helpful with the grandkids--call the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721. The classes are free and are centered around a set of entertaining videos and group discussion.
