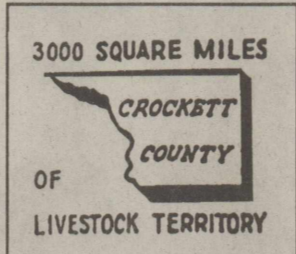

## High School Moves To New Class Scheduling

Changes approved by board members have Ozona High School principal John Curry and counselor David McWilliams smiling. Trustees gave the go ahead with block scheduling for the 1994-95 school term when they met April 14.

The accelerated block proposed by Curry and McWilliams provides three 90-minute class periods, two one-hour classes and an activity period each term. Core subjects such as English, math and science will be taught in the 90-minute blocks for 18 weeks rather than the traditional 36.

A 30-minute activity period will begin the day at 7:50 a.m. followed by a one-hour class, the three 90-minute classes and a one-hour class ending the day at 3:30. These one-hour classes will be used by some for band and athletics. Tutorials and T.A.A.S. preparation will be included in the activity period. Students needing no tutorial help will come to school at 8:20.

Periods 1, 2, 4, 6 and 8 will meet daily during the fall term. Periods 1, 3, 5, 7 and 8 will meet daily during the spring term.

Block scheduling provides several advantages for students according to McWilliams. Taking only three major courses at one time means homework preparation for fewer classes, thereby allowing greater concentration on the subjects being studied. Should a student fail a subject during the first term, he or she can immediately retake the class while the material is fresh. The scheduling could result in smaller classes which also

means better concentration on the subject matter. Over a four-year period, students will have opportunity to take more electives by completing a study in 18 weeks rather than 36.

Projected outcomes from block scheduling include improved attendance and reduction in tardiness, more concentration on learning, not just on graduating, improved test scores and reduction in failure and dropout rates.

Block scheduling allows teachers time for more activity oriented teaching and presentation of material more relevant for students, McWilliams believes. Teachers will teach six classes and have two planning periods. Presently, a majority of teachers teach five classes and have two planning periods. No teacher will have more than three preparations.

A form of block scheduling was implemented at the junior high this year.

McWilliams and several Ozona teachers visited the Mansfield school district last week where block teaching has been implemented throughout the curriculum. Approximately 90 educators from around the state were present to see the block scheduling system firsthand.

"Mansfield teachers wanted change," said McWilliams. "They took their ideas from two Colorado schools that have had great success with block scheduling."

"The Mansfield teachers say block scheduling is not a cure all for education, but it is a step in the right direction," McWilliams said.

Ozona teachers also talked with many students while in Mansfield. The students don't want to go back to the way it was despite longer classes, Curry told the board. The youngsters like knowing they will have completed a class in 18 weeks rather than 36.

"Education needs to change to fit the times, and this is a positive step in that direction," said McWilliams of the plan.

Trustees also voted to add three classes to the local requirements for

graduation at Mr. Curry's request. This will include a nine-week course in microcomputer applications and keyboarding, speech and a class in individual and family life.

The computer class may not be needed for more than one year due to increasing education on computers at the middle school level, Curry said.

Faculty members Rose Williams, Debbie Arrott and Frances Curry were present and contributed to the discussion.

Paced by an outstanding performance by Chris Cornett, the cast and crew of Ozona High School's *The Bald Soprano* won the right to compete at the Region I-AA contest to be held at Abilene Christian University on Friday, April 22. Also advancing is Iraan's production, *Scenes From Jane Eyre*.

Several Ozona students received special recognition for their performances at the Area 1-Act Play Contest in McCarney on April 7. For his portrayal of Mr. Martin, Chris Cornett was named Best Actor, the highest honor possible for an individual actor. JoLynn Vannoy, who plays Mary, the maid, and Leigh Chandler, who plays Mrs. Martin, were named to the All-Star Cast. Honorable Mention All-Star Cast members were Sandy Perez, the musician; Adrienne Dickerson, Mrs. Smith; and Slate Williams, the

fire chief. Other members of the cast and crew are Clay Westmoreland, John Baker, Dora Garcia, Luis Longoria, Melissa Porras, and Sandra Sanchez. The play is directed by Frances Curry.

Ozona's *The Bald Soprano* will be the first play to perform at the regional contest. The six plays will begin at 4:00 p.m. in Sewell Theatre, located on the ACU campus at the corner of Campus Court and E. North 16th Street. Guests are welcome to attend the shows for an admission charge of \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students.

## Grant Awarded For Sewer System Improvements

Crockett County was notified last week that it is the recipient of a grant in the amount of \$198,869 for sewer system improvements. The award is made available through the Texas Community Development Program.

Henry Flores, executive director of the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs, made the announcement in a letter to the judge's office April 11.

A representative from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs will be here May 9 to present contracts to commissioners' court. The court will then advertise for engineering proposals.

Mike Duran of Traylor and Associates of Tyler was the grant writer for the project. The firm was suggested by Doug Meador, water superintendent, who had experience with the company in Matador.

Commissioner Frank Tambunga headed up a committee which surveyed residents on the south side of the interstate to determine community needs. Waste water disposal and improved water service were found to be the highest ranking needs, Meador said.

According to Meador, comple-

tion of this project will benefit the entire waste water system by aiding in drainage. Sewer lines will be moved from under houses and out of yards into streets and alleys. Grant funds will also be used to repair streets after the lines are placed.

According to the grant application, all of the sewer lines in the project are clay tile constructed in the 1930's and 1940's. The lines frequently become plugged, resulting in homes being flooded with raw sewage. In addition, these lines were installed prior to residential expansion into this

area. Entire neighborhoods were built immediately over the existing sewer lines. This has resulted in workers having to climb fences in order to reach sewer manholes located in the backyard of residences. Some of these manholes are more than 12 feet deep and are located in backyards where children regularly play, resulting in an unacceptable safety hazard.

The project includes 7,525 feet of sewer line, 27 manholes and 48 sewer connections.

Once this project is started, "we will apply for other grants," Meador said.

## Big Dollars Saved At '94 Health Fair

Crockett County residents saved approximately \$50,000 in health testing costs by taking advantage of free glucose, cholesterol, blood pressure, vision and other screenings at the 1994 Crockett County Health Fair last Thursday (April 14th).

Approximately 500 youth and adults took advantage of the free testing and information at this year's fair, which was sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service,

Crockett County Extension Home Economics Committee, and Crockett County Hospital.

One of the highlights of this year's event for both young and old was the landing of the new Shannon Medivac Helicopter in the FESCO parking lot. Personnel from the helicopter explained the features of the new life-saving equipment, which will

## School Board Session Covers Wide Agenda

At their meeting April 14, school trustees voted to request a letter of credit from Jay Miller Construction Company by April 22 for the work performed by the company on handicapped renovations at the school. This action was taken due to the insurance company providing the performance bond for the company being placed in court-ordered receivership and all bonds being cancelled.

Law requires that public work projects are required to have a performance bond for construction projects. The performance bond should cover all claims during the construction period and one year after acceptance of the project which will be through August 1994.

The school's attorney advised the board that there is an authority that a governmental agency may waive the bond, but any losses sustained could become the responsibility of the school. The letter of credit was the solution chosen.

Coleen Everett was present to answer questions on a proposal to join the West-Texas Multi-Regional Processing Cooperative for school cafeteria commodity products. The proposal from cafeteria manager Evelyn Keith would save labor and storage space and result in more food for the school district's money. Four education regions are participants in the cop, which requires a \$100 administrative fee to join. The board voted to become members.

Maintenance supervisor Ray Don Myers gave a report on two types of security systems for the schools. He was asked to check references from the companies and report back at the next regular meeting.

The board voted to install a new breaker box for the woodshop electrical system and to replace 20 lights in Davidson Gym. The new lights will bring the candlepower on the gym floor from 25 to 60 and it should be about 75, Myers said.

Replacement of seats in the gym was put on hold until a report is received from architect Ron Barbutti on handicapped accessibility in the gym.

The gym is to be repainted. The project will be scheduled so as not to

Rudy Martinez Jr. was assured of his place on the commissioners' court April 12 when ballots were counted in the Democratic Primary run-off election. Martinez received 207 votes to 72 for Richard A. Vargas.

In Crockett County, 458 voters, 16 percent of registered voters, went to the polls in this election.

interfere with summer youth basketball camp.

Board member Wade Richardson suggested setting schoolwide priorities for education and plant renovation rather than "jumping in and doing whatever someone suggests".

Needed repairs to the football stands will require replacement of 65 foot boards and 47 backboards, Myers said. After discussing the advantages and the cost of using metal rather than lumber, the board voted 6 to 1 to repair with lumber. George Ybarra opposed.

A budget amendment was approved to purchase CD-ROM networking for computers in the high school library so more students can have access to the CD-ROM encyclopedias at the same time. The purchase will also allow networkable CD-ROM versions of magazines and newspapers for student use.

Trustees also voted to replace a 15-year-old air compressor in the auto mechanics shop, purchase a Risograph copier for the junior high and contract with Region XV Education Service

Center.

The resignation of Evelyn Keith, cafeteria manager, was approved effective at the end of the school year, and the hiring of Donna Morrow as junior high secretary was approved. Applications are being taken from people who have had school cafeteria experience to fill the manager's position.

A policy was approved requiring that students must complete all requirements for graduation, including passing the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills exit-level test, in order to participate in commencement exercises.

Ted Cotton, interim superintendent, gave statistics on 1994 seniors and juniors on non-mastery of the T.A.A.S. test. The data, based on a maximum of four attempts to pass the exit-level T.A.A.S., indicated that of the 40 1994 seniors, all have passed the writing portion, three have not passed reading and six have not passed math. Seven have not passed all three tests.

## Fierro Qualifies For State Special Olympics Meet

Decked out in new shirts provided by the parents of the athletes and hand decorated by Irma Fierro, the Ozona Special Olympic team traveled to Odessa Saturday to participate in the Area 18 games.

Johnny Rodriguez got the day started off on a positive note when he won a gold medal in his division in the softball throw for distance. Luyita Fierro followed with a fourth place finish in his division, which saw the first and fourth place finishers separated by less than one meter. Ruben Mendez finished off the morning competition by also winning a gold medal in his division.

After lunch it was back to the gold chase. And gold was all that the ath-

letes would accept in the afternoon. Again Johnny started it off with a win in his 50 meter dash division. Luyita won his 50 meter race and also qualified to advance to the state summer games May 24-27 in Austin. Ruben finished the day by rolling to a win in a confusing 25 meter wheelchair race with several heats combined for the sake of time conservation.

"The Special Olympic team enjoyed a very successful track season and is looking forward to next year," said Coach James Cox. "Hopefully we can generate some interest for forming Special Olympic organization in Ozona so that athletes who have finished school can also compete in this very worthwhile self-image enhancing activity."

## Boyd Baker Service Tuesday

Boyd Bolton Baker, 73, died Saturday, April 16, 1994, at 12:05 p.m. in Shannon Hospital after a long illness.

Graveside service was held at 2 p.m. Monday in Cedar Hill Cemetery directed by Preddy Funeral Home.

Mr. Baker was born Jan. 13, 1921, in Ozona. He began learning ranching at the age of 13 while working for his uncle, Wayne West. He attended school in Ozona and New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell, NM.

Mr. Baker began his aviation adventure by learning to be an airplane mechanic at the air base in Wichita Falls. He was a tail gunner in World War II, was shot down and became a German POW for 18 months.

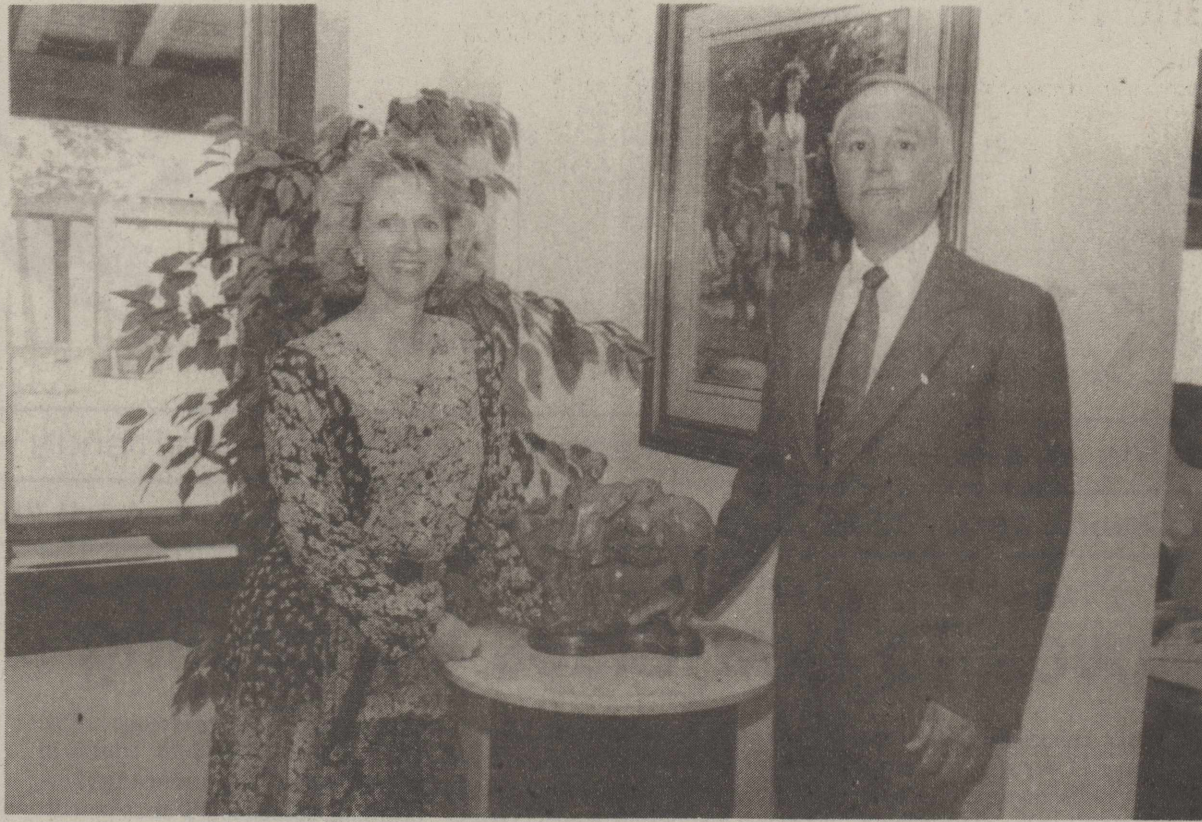
After release from Germany, he returned home and went to work for Texas New Mexico Pipeline.

On Sept. 10, 1946, Boyd and Mary Frances Bean were married at the First Baptist Church in Ozona. In 1950, he moved his family to the ranch north of Dryden. He then moved to the ranch north of Ozona and was still ranching in Crockett, Terrell, Pecos and Brown counties at the time of his death.

Mr. Baker is survived by his wife, Frances; his mother, Alice Baker; one son and daughter-in-law, Fred and Kay Baker; two grandsons, John and Jason Baker, all of Ozona.

He was preceded in death by one son, Mike, and his father, Harold.

Pallbearers were his hunters from Ozona and Lewisville.

a total of three and one-third innings and gave up four walks, three hits, four runs and had four strikeouts.

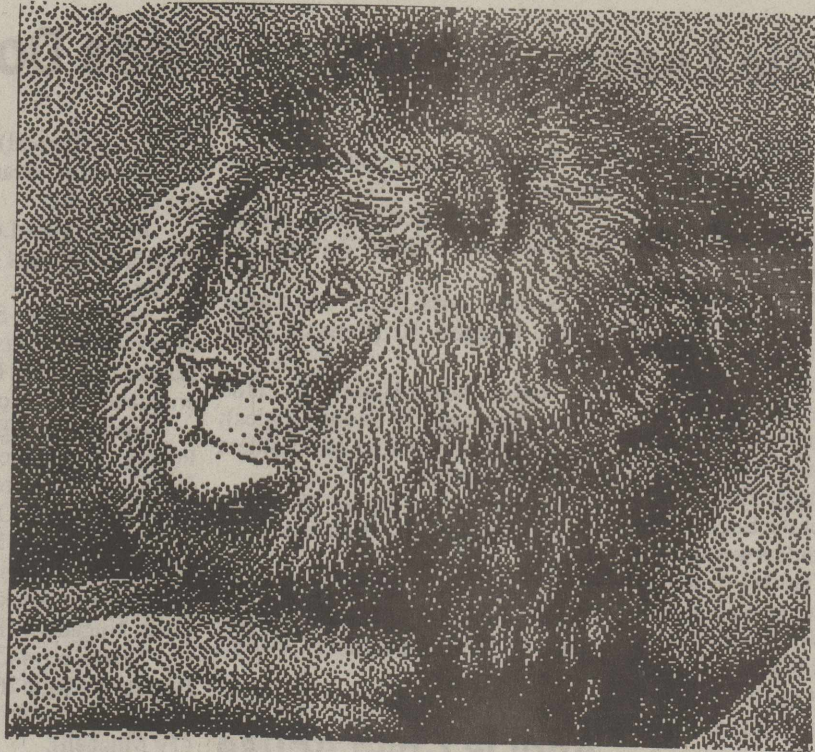

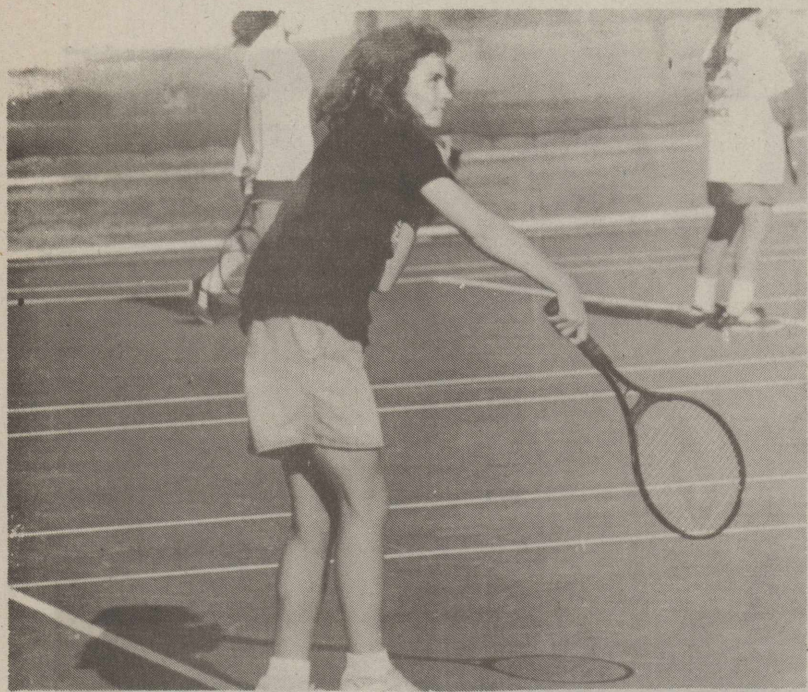

# Menzies New Director Of Mohair Council of America

M. Duery Menzies Jr. of Fredericksburg is the new executive director of the Mohair Council of America, succeeding Dr. Brian May of San Angelo who resigned to take a teaching professorship at Angelo State University.

Menzies, a native of Menard County, retired as Gillespie County Extension Agent in 1992 after 31 years with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He previously was extension

agent in Concho County and assistant county agent in Taylor County.

Mohair Council president Jeffrey Sutton of Ozona announced Menzies' appointment during a press conference in San Angelo on April 14. Menzies will assume his duties on April 25. The council had conducted a two-month search for its new executive director and had held more than two dozen interviews with prospective applicants, Sutton said.

Since retirement, Menzies has been a legislative assistant to Texas State Sen. Bill Sims. He also has ranching operations in Menard County.

Active in community and church affairs, Menzies worked with the Fredericksburg Chamber of Commerce and Gillespie County leaders in forming an industrial development

commission. He serves as an elder of the Fredericksburg Church of Christ, and teaches a Sunday school class for adults and teenagers.

Menzies is married to the former Lawanda Osbourn of Llano and they have a daughter, Misti, and a son, Dusty. Both are students at Texas A&M University.

Menzies is no stranger to mohair producers in the southwest. He currently serves on a task force to study the economic impact of the loss of the Wool Act on rural Texas that was organized by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. He serves as an advisor to the Texas Sheep and Goat Commodity Board, which funds predator control programs in 110 sheep and goat producing counties. While with the extension service, he conducted a number of selection clinics on Angora goats and mohair grading.

Menzies graduated from Texas Tech University in 1960 with a BS degree in animal husbandry, and has completed work toward an MS degree at Texas A&M University. Before joining the extension service in 1961, he was a summer intern with the Soil Conservation Service in Pecos and Crockett Counties in 1959-60 and was a soil conservationist in training in Sutton County in 1961.

## First Wool Sale Brings Improved Prices

There was good competition between buyers at the April 7 wool sale at Wool Growers in Sanderson according to area manager Donnie Laughlin. Prices averaged 36 cents a pound higher than at this time in 1993, Laughlin said. This was the first wool sale of the season.

213,000 pounds of 12-month paint free wool was offered and brought .725 to \$1.11 3/8 per pound. 10-month wool brought .80 to .85 3/8 per pound. There was no short wool offered.

The average on 12-month wool was .976 per pound and .847 per pound on 10-month wool.

Wool Growers of Sanderson and Ozona and Ozona Wool will conduct short wool sales on May 20.

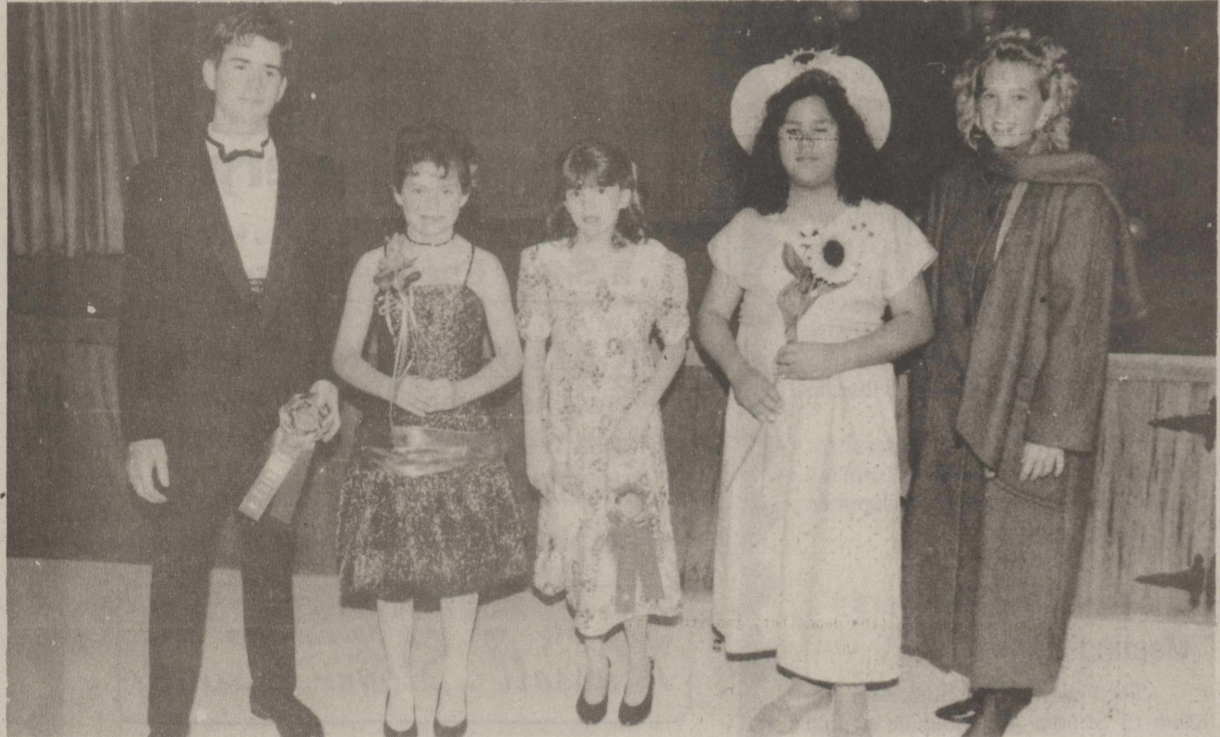
The regional meet will be held in Abilene on April 29-30. Fans will want to continue cheering on their athletes and wish them luck.

## Long-Range Planning For Extension Service

Long-range planning for 1995-1999 was begun by the Extension Program Council Monday evening (April 18) at a town study group meeting held at the Civic Center. Thirty-two youth and adults attended the meeting, which was planned to represent a wide cross-section of the community.

P. L. Childress III, chairman of the county's Extension Program Council, was moderator for the meeting. After a brief introduction in which the group was told they were working on a plan which would be used up to the new century, four groups were formed to identify and prioritize critical issues.

An issue, as Childress explained, "is matter that arises out of complex human problems. These issues share a broad public concern and often have no easy answers."

County Extension Agents Billy Reagor and Tedra Ulmer assisted with orientation, discussing the mission of Extension and its scope, vision and goals. Extension provides educational programming to the people of Texas, utilizing the resources of local extension staff and the Texas A&M University system to provide the latest research-based information on a wide variety of topics relating to agriculture, economic development, the environment, families and homes.

The groups each focused on one specific area, with the four areas addressed including Natural Resources and the Environment, Developing Leadership and Life Skills, Health and Well-Being, and Economic Development. Facilitators for each group were Robert Bryson and Donnie Laughlin, Economic Development; Steve Wilkins, Environment; Veva Vargas, Health; and David McWilliams, Leadership and Life Skills. The facilitators had attended an earlier training session to familiarize themselves with the process and to develop a strategy for identifying and ranking the issues. Following the individual sessions, each area facilitator presented identified issues to the entire group. The issues will now be presented to the county's executive board for further clarification and to be written into a comprehensive long-range plan for programming in the next five years.

Reagor noted that the long-range plan will include issues Extension can effectively address through educational programs, issue awareness campaigns, and coordination of com-

munity efforts. Any identified issues which other groups may need to address will be passed on to those groups.

"Some issues may be too broad or may be impossible to address through educational programs and the scope of Extension's responsibilities," said Reagor.

Ulmer noted that the last long-range plan has been used in numerous ways—by the Extension program council to develop annual program plans, by County Commissioners to develop a similar plan for the hospital, and to provide information to legislators about specific needs in the county.

Summer fun and learning combined await youth from ages 8-18 this summer in 4-H camps of all kinds. The traditional summer camp at Brownwood, plus special-interest camps, make any summer a true learning experience.

District VI holds State Water Camp in Monahans each year, and Crockett County is fortunate to have two expense-paid scholarships for lucky senior 4-H members from the Crockett County Water District #1 and the Emerald Underground Water District. Young people who have attended this camp say it is an outstanding experience, and the July 17-22 time frame makes it a neat mid summer break. Registration for Water Camp is due May 16th, so anyone interested needs to contact the County Extension Office for details as soon as possible.

The Texas 4-H Center at Lake Brownwood, site of both Prime Time and SpecTra summer camps, is a special place for young people to grow in their personal and leadership skills. The basic goals of both camps are to improve leadership skills, enhance 4-H project work, and build self-esteem and self-image.

Prime Time participants are between ages 9 and 13 (certain ages can attend certain camp dates), and SpecTra participants must be no younger than 14 and no older than 18 on July 31, 1994.

Activities in Prime Time camps include swimming, canoeing, shooting sports, new games and initiatives, crafts, and outdoor cookery, recreation and parties. College-age counselors and program assistants conduct the educational sessions. Staff leaders and County Extension Agents will be there to supervise 4-Hers at all times, and a nurse is on location and on call 24 hours a day.

Total cost for the 3-day event (age-based camps run from July 17-30) is \$78, which includes three daily meals and a snack, lodging, refreshments and limited accident insurance coverage. Dorms are modern and air-con-

ditioned, and house 13 persons each. To register, pick up a form from the County Extension Office. A \$20 deposit must be sent in with registration, and this deposit is non-refundable/non-transferable. Applications must be in the county office prior to April 25th, 1994.

SpecTra '94 offers project enhancement, leadership development, self-image enrichment, and career exploration in ten separate project areas. Each participant can attend one area, and registrations for each area are taken on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Southwestern Bell proposes to implement the revised tariffs on a revenue neutral basis. Although the proposed tariff changes will affect all customers subscribing to Switched Access Service, the Local Transport and Directory Transport categories of Southwestern Bell's Switched Access Service is primarily for interexchange carriers. If approved, this application will result in an increase in Southwestern Bell's revenues of approximately \$1682.00 during the first year. Southwestern Bell proposes that the changes be effective on December 1, 1994.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. 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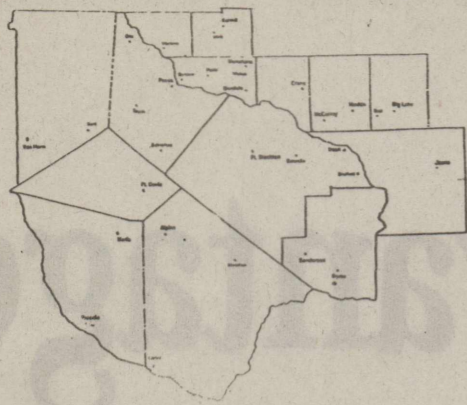

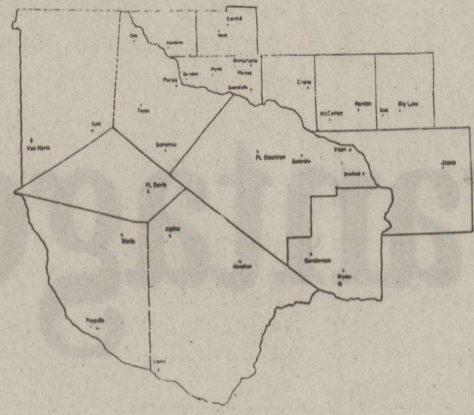

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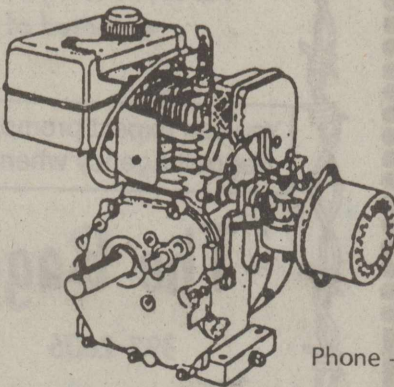
