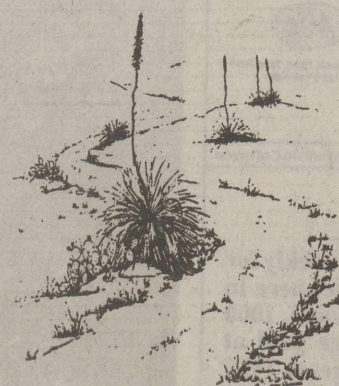
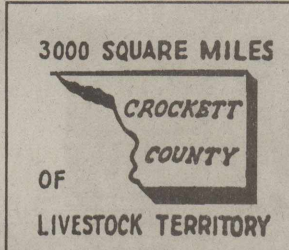

Calm Prevails At Monthly Court Meeting

Commissioners approved a bid by Juan Flores for replacement of flooring at the civic center and removal of old flooring when they met Monday. Center director Garland Young requested that work begin soon after June 1.

The court approved contracting with Gary Traylor and Associates for grant management services for the Texas Community Development grant. These are the funds that were awarded for replacement of water and sewer lines south of the interstate.

Mike Duran of Traylor and Associates met with the court to explain his company's management role. Traylor and Associates is the firm that wrote the grant application.

No action was taken after a proposal by Daryl Copeland and Bill Carlisle of Aegon USA, Inc., offering a health insurance supplement for county employees. The company has supplements pertaining to cancer, heart disease and accidents.

Plans were made to request that the state consider taking over Crockett County Road 208. Approximately 10 miles could be transferred at this time with no other work necessary other than refencing to make a wider right-of-way according to Eddie Moore, road superintendent. Judge Fields is to contact the Texas Department of Transportation regarding the possible transfer of all or part of this stretch of road.

Removal of a bump gate and replacement with a cattleguard on a road on the George Thompson ranch was discussed by commissioners. The cattleguard was removed and the bump gate installed in 1992. Commissioners voted unanimously to leave the bump gate as is.

Votes from the school trustee election were canvassed. Veronica Tijerina received three votes in early voting and 10 on Saturday in District 3. In District 4, David Bean received three ballots in early voting and 13 on Saturday.

The court voted to pay an unbudgeted \$8,000 increase in premiums for liability insurance for public officials and law enforcement personnel. The insurance is through the Texas Association of Counties.

The county's policy regarding prepayment of seminar fees and reimbursement of travel expenses was amended to allow payment of seminar

fees in advance and travel expenses upon presentation of receipts to the auditor's office. This eliminates a wait of up to a month for some of these reimbursements.

A settlement offer of \$2,500 to the estate of Samuel Mondy was approved by the court as recommended by their insurance company. Mondy is the man who hung himself in Crockett County Jail last year.

An application will be filed in an attempt to recover a crude oil refund for 6.5 years of purchases of a variety of materials by the county. The county was notified that it could be eligible on certain purchases made beginning in August of 1972.

An agenda item requesting that a letter be sent under the Litter Abatement Act to Buster Augustine regarding property at 205 11th Street was voted down three to two. Commissioners Freddie Nicks and Fred Deaton and Judge A. O. Fields voted against sending the letter and Commissioners Frank Tambunga and Rudy Martinez voted for.

During the monthly financial report, auditor John Stokes said the county has already collected 84% of its 1994 budgeted revenues. He also said that the health insurance plan is doing well this year and the hospital and care center budgets still look good. Stokes requested that some of the remaining funds from certificate of obligation money be spent for a laser printer for his office. The office has no equipment budgeted for 1994, and the dot matrix printer is having problems.

Garland Young, civic and youth center director, said his board has decided to keep the all-night graduation party like it has been in the past, for high school students only including out-of-town guests. Work on decorations for the event began May 8.

Tremendous water pressure is available at Lima Cemetery now that new later lines are in place according to Eddie Moore. The entire cemetery can now be watered in one day.

County workers and equipment spent 11 days constructing the pad for the new building at the fairgrounds. The structure is to be 100'x150'.

Early May road projects include preparation for work on Mitchell Blacktop and cleaning out cattleguards around the county. Thus far 30 have been cleaned and necessary repairs done.

Swimming pools are to open the day school is out and close Aug. 21. Managers for the coming season are to remain the same. Sarah Hignight will operate the north pool and Thomas DeHoyos the south pool.

Librarian Louise Ledoux was pleased to report to the court that the building expansion fund has passed the \$20,000 mark. The recent barbecue and book sale and a donation from Union Pacific Resources pushed the fund upward. A request for additional information from a foundation she had sent an expansion proposal to could result in added funds. The board is also considering selling bricks with the buyers' names on them, Mrs. Ledoux said. The bricks could be used in a walkway.

Hospital and care center administrator Gerry Phillips was also present to give his monthly report. (See story elsewhere this issue.)

Written reports were received from the fire department and Helping Hands. In April the fire department responded to one hazardous materials call, one rescue/EMS, three grass fires, two mutual aid calls to other counties and two vehicle fires.

Man hours amounted to 10.34 with 49.20 truck hours and 3,300 gallons of water used.

Helping Hands served 950 meals during April and commodities were given to 73 families.

Care Center May Get Trained Ombudsman

Crockett County Care Center may get a volunteer ombudsman as a result of a meeting between the board and a representative of the Area Agency on Aging, Stephanie Salyards, who is regional staff ombudsman for

the San Angelo agency, explained the program at the regular board meeting May 5.

An ombudsman is a specially trained person who works with the residents, families, facility staff and the community to improve the quality of life for the residents of nursing homes. The ombudsman acts as an advocate for the resident and works to resolve problems that arise from the need for institutionalized care. Becoming an ombudsman requires special training.

EMS director Doug Meador told the board that the new EMT class has five students. Due to recertification requirements implemented by the Texas Department of Health, Meador asked the board to set a policy which would require a passing score of 70 or above to be active in the EMS. The board voted to approve this requirement.

Meador asked that the board discuss establishing a policy regarding bypassing the hospital if Medivac should ever be used for critically injured patients. Meador said if the situation calls for Medivac, a direct transfer would be necessary because stopping at the hospital takes up to an

hour in preparing paperwork and phone calls for an accepting physician. He asked for research into the legal aspects involved in utilizing the service.

The board was told that telephones in the ambulances are obsolete and will be replaced with cellular phones.

Administrator Gerry Phillips reported that April was a good month for both the hospital and care center. The final total of funds transferred for April was \$45,309 under budget. The total transferred for the year is \$61,801 under budget.

Lupe Sanchez was elected to the secretary of the board position after being nominated by acclamation. The board also voted to authorize Mr. Phillips and Diane Womack to apply for and sign provider agreements and direct deposit authorizations for out-of-state providers.

The board met in executive session at 7:40 p.m. to discuss discipline-cause. Upon returning to open session at 8:35, no action was taken.

Before adjourning, board member Carmen Sutton recounted praises for the hospital she received from a couple passing through from Las Cruces. They were most pleased with the care during the husband's stay.

The first band to perform will be the sixth grade band as they play for the public their very first time.

Next the junior high band of 7th and 8th graders will be the center of attention. These two bands are under the direction of Norman Carroll.

The pride of Crockett County, the Ozona Lions Band under the direction

of Kelly Glaze, will end the program. The Lion Band will perform: *Westridge Overture, Shenandoah Valley, Marche de Triomphe, No One Else on Earth*, highlights from *Aladdin, Amazing Grace*, and highlights from *Jesus Christ Superstar*.

Included in the sixth grade program will be: *American Spirit March, Simple Song, Fat Cat Goes Disco and Let's Go Band*.

Numbers on the program by the junior high band are: *Greenbrier March, Aztec Sunrise, Imperium, Beauty and the Beast and Jurassic Park*.

Post Office Parking Lot Expansion Approved

In one of the Postal surveys earlier this year, several concerns centered around the parking lot, and a proposal was sent to the district office and was approved for the expansion with work scheduled to begin on May 17 or 18 by a local contractor.

The parking lot will be under construction for a period of 6 to 8 weeks or more. "I have not been notified of the exact length of time," said postmaster Ernest Jones. "During this time period, we have been given the authorization to use East and the North lots which surround the Post Office for temporary parking as well as Avenue F," Jones further stated.

"I would like to apologize in

advance for any inconvenience this construction may cause you. However, I firmly believe you will enjoy your new parking lot once it is completed. The expansion involves removing the island and sidewalk on the south end of the building and adding three or four more parking spaces plus a drive through with a drop box," Jones said.

"I would like to thank you for your patience and urge our postal customers to please observe all warning signs. Surveys do help as they let us (the U.S. Post Office) know how we can better serve you our customer," Jones said in conclusion.

Airport Planning Meeting May 25

The Texas Department of Transportation's Aviation Division is conducting a series of regional planning meetings throughout the state to review and update information for each airport in the Texas airport system. One of these meetings is scheduled to discuss Ozona's airport and other area airports. The meeting will be held at 10 a.m. Wednesday, May 25, in the Ozona National Bank's Crockett Room at 509 11th Street.

During the approximately two-hour public meeting, the department will discuss funding procedures for state and federal financial assistance

programs. They will concentrate on the need for airport improvements as they relate to safety, access, activity levels, local economic enhancement, and community development. The meeting will provide airport sponsors, users and other interested persons an opportunity to discuss the needs of their airport. Specific airport development plans and timing of projects will be reviewed to determine if the information on the enclosed worksheet is still current.

Crockett County Ground-water Quality Checked By TWDB

The State Legislature charges the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) with determining if there is enough high quality water available to meet projected future needs. One of the ways TWDB does this is by studying the ground-water quality monitoring network. The network is set up to sample aquifers on a six-year cycle.

In May of 1993, Ron Mohr, engineering technician for the TWDB, sampled 22 water wells in Crockett County; most of these were completed in the Edwards-Trinity (Plateau) aquifer tapped by wells completed in one or both of the Edwards (and associated limestones) and Trinity Group. Water from wells was used for public supply, irrigation, stock, and household use. The wells were selected based on location, accessibility, pumping equipment at the well site, and prior information on the well.

Water from these wells was analyzed by the Texas Department of Health. All of the wells have very hard water. Four of the wells exceeded secondary drinking standards for total dissolved solids, sulfate and chloride;

and five exceeded the standard for fluoride. Secondary standards are recommended limits not necessarily related to health standards, but to aesthetic reasons such as taste, odor looks, and the potential to stain clothing and clog up plumbing. None of the results exceeded primary drinking standards that would affect the health of people drinking the well water. Also, radioactivity was determined on all samples. Only two of the twenty-two wells sampled had gross alphas that exceed drinking water standards. Finally, samples were analyzed for sixteen trace metals, all of which were below federal drinking water standards with most below detection limits. These results are consistent with past results.

Dennis Clark, manager of the Emerald Underground Water Conservation District, was very helpful in contacting land owners, finding well locations, and sampling wells. On behalf of the Texas Water Development Board,

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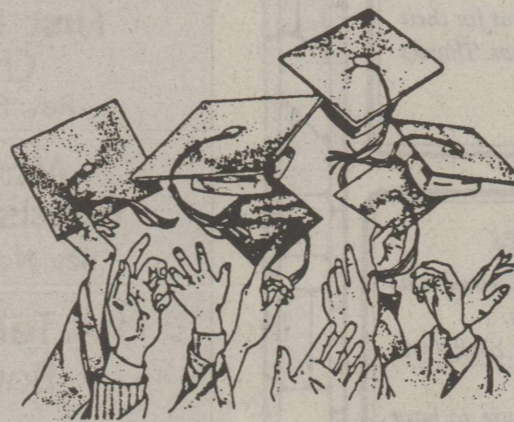

Are Your Children Running Your Life?

Discipline seems to be a dirty word in lots of homes today. Do you find yourself asking your three or four-year-old constantly---Please don't throw food on the floor, or Please don't hit your sister?

Do you find you are always frustrated? Are you always yelling at your child or constantly stifling the urge to yell?

Do you find that everything from getting dressed in the morning to going to bed at night turns into a fight?

Are taking trips to the grocery store or to grandma's trips that you'd rather never do again until your children are grown?

Well, you aren't alone and you aren't a bad parent. You have lots of company. Most parents just don't know where to turn for help on discipline questions anymore.

Should you spank your child or not, that is the question. Are you teaching your child to be violent if you smack his rear occasionally? Doesn't even the Bible say not to spare the rod and spoil the child?

What do you do when Time Out just plain doesn't work? When your whole relationship with your children has turned into one big battle of Time Out?

Looking at the number of gang members and criminals in the age brackets between-thirteen and twenty-five I find myself wondering about current theories on raising children.

It seems that the soft discipline of the past 25 years or so have begun to show up, in prisons, graveyards and

drug clinics, among other places.

There seems to be plenty of evidence that some of the discipling practices we've been using haven't been working very well. Maybe going back to the days when parents set the rules, and the children followed them might not be such a bad idea.

Most of us would never want to beat our children; however a sensible spanking might be called for occasionally. Once you've tried the other options to keep your three-year old from going into the street, a good smack on the bottom just might work.

"Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord, and in the power of His might.

"Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil.

"For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places.

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Gulf Veterans To Get Free Health Exams

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is encouraging veterans of the Persian Gulf War who may be concerned about possible environmental exposures in the Gulf region to take advantage of VA's health monitoring program.

While an aggressive research program continues to clarify the nature of any ill health patterns in such veterans, services are being offered today, including a comprehensive physical examination and lab test. These are free to any concerned Gulf veterans by appointment in every VA medical center.

In addition, a new law requested by VA simplifies high-priority access to follow up care for veterans with any condition that VA physicians think could stem from the Gulf environment.

"I urge any Persian Gulf veterans with illness they think may be related to their service as well as any healthy veterans who would like to be part of our Persian Gulf Registry to call their local VA medical center to make an appointment if they have not already done so," VA Secretary Jesse Brown said. Already, 16,025 have taken part in the examination protocol.

Eighty-nine also have received evaluations at VA's Persian Gulf Referral Centers that have been operating since August 1992 in West Los Angeles, Houston, and Washington, D.C., to handle cases of unusual symptoms in Gulf veterans. The centers assist in cases that have evaded diagnoses locally by providing expertise in such areas as pulmonary and infectious disease, immunology, neuropsychology and toxicology.

While veterans often have described a wide variety of symptoms that are common in primary care medicine—including fatigue, muscle aches, joint pain and skin rashes—VA has not fully documented a specific illness or pattern of disease pointing to the cause or causes of these symptoms.

VA also has asked its researchers throughout the country to develop new ideas for research projects aimed at Persian Gulf veterans and environmental hazards, with a request for proposals drawing more than two dozen submissions last month. The proposed projects will compete in peer review for scientific merit, with VA planning to fund up to three \$500,000-a-year environmental hazard research centers later this year.

However, VA is taking the issue very seriously and has committed millions of dollars to research, including \$2.5 million over 10 years to a National Academy of Sciences project, with matching funds from the Department of Defense.

In-house VA research has been focusing on evaluation of patients who may have been exposed to environmental factors such as depleted uranium use in armaments as well as neurological studies in veterans who have voiced concerns about possible nerve gas exposure.

In addition, VA's Medical Research Services recently provided supplemental funds for several VA medical centers to expand investigations in such areas as cognitive functioning and immunological status of Persian Gulf veterans.

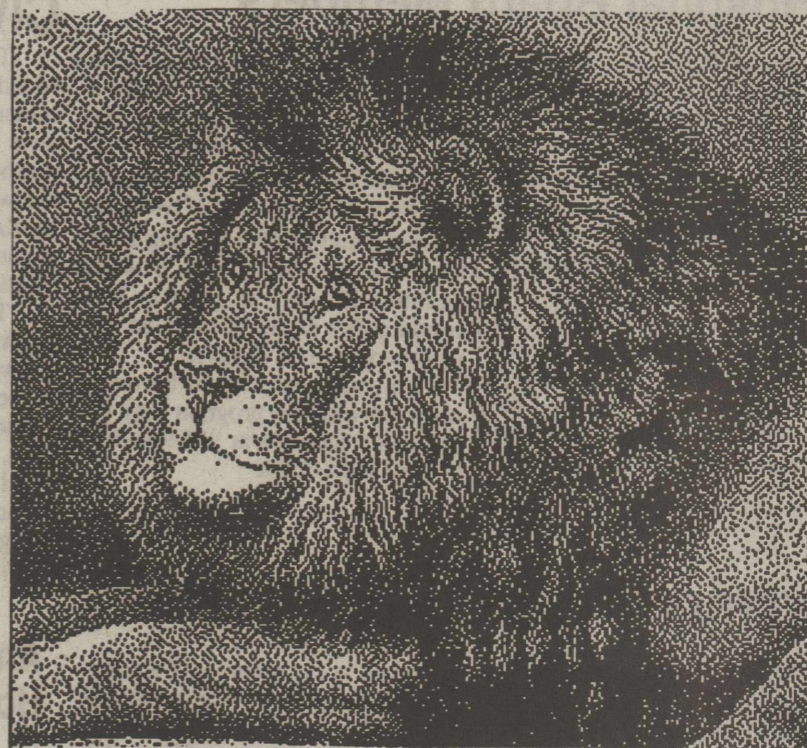

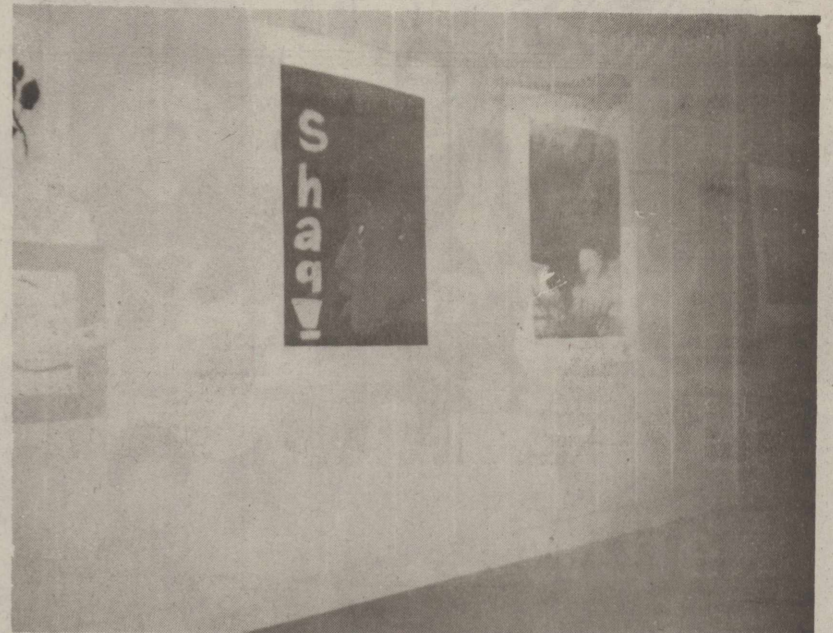

First Time Asthma Sufferers Not Just Children

Most people think of asthma as a childhood disease, but it can strike at any age, says a pulmonologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"I see adults in their 50s, 60s and 70s who are experiencing the first signs of asthma," said Dr. William Eschenbacher, an associate professor of medicine at Baylor. "Even though asthma usually starts during childhood, you can get it any time in your life."

Asthma typically strikes before age five but affects nearly one out of 10 people over age 18, especially minority adolescents and young adults who are three times as likely to die from the disease as whites.

Even though asthma attacks usually grow less severe with age, Eschenbacher says adults are "set in their ways" when it comes to managing their asthma. "Adults are used to a certain lifestyle and do not want to adjust it by exercising or taking medication," he said. "They feel they can just go on with their lives but discover they have some limits."

According to the National Center for Health Statistics asthma causes missed days from work and frequent physician's visits. Adults with asthma lose \$850 million in wages and spend \$2.6 billion to treat their condition.

Eschenbacher says asthma has become more fatal in the last decade. Last year, more than 5,000 Americans died of asthma. Allergens are the main culprit.

Indoor allergens such as dust mites, mold and household pets trigger asthma in people later in life. Air pollution, cigarette smoke and respiratory tract infections can also prompt asthma attacks.

"The air you breathe or a bad cold can bring on a sudden asthma attack," said Eschenbacher, who is also associate director of the Baylor/Methodist Hospital Asthma Institute of Houston.

"It is important for asthmatic

adults working around industrial chemicals to be wary about elements that can worsen their condition."

Narrowing of the airways in the lungs, known as bronchoconstriction, blocks the flow of air into and out of the lungs making breathing almost impossible.

To prevent attacks from occurring, Eschenbacher stresses the importance of carrying an inhaler. It could avoid frequent trips to the emergency room.

"By taking proper precautions, adults who suffer repeated asthma attacks can still lead a normal life," he said. "By making a few lifestyle changes, you can keep your asthma in check."

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Texas Lottery Earns \$101 Million For State In March

"The Texas Lottery deposited a record \$101 million into the State's General Revenue Fund for March, much of the extra due to sales from last month's \$75 million *Lotto Texas* jackpot," Nora Linares, Executive Director of the Texas Lottery Commission, announced.

The Lottery's transfer of \$101,082,179 to General Revenue is by far the largest one-month deposit since the Lottery began in May 1992. The Lottery calculates its monthly transfer into the State Treasury by subtracting prizes, retailer commissions and administrative expenses from monthly sales income.

"We knew that the multi-record-breaking *Lotto* sales leading up to the big March 16 drawing would allow us to make a larger-than-usual deposit this month," Linares said. "But even I was somewhat surprised that we could surpass the \$100 million mark."

For the first seven months of fiscal 1994, which began September 1, 1993, monthly transfers to General Revenue had averaged \$61.2 million.

The deposit brings the Lottery's total fiscal 1994 earnings for the state to nearly \$530 million. "That means we've already reached 88 percent of our \$601 million fiscal 1994 goal - with four months still to go," Linares said.

The Lottery has now earned \$1.34 billion for General Revenue in just 22 months of operation. This includes:

\$203 million in fiscal 1992,

compared to a goal of \$61 million; and \$609 million in fiscal 1993, compared to a goal of \$400 million.

The Texas Lottery Act directs the Lottery to deposit all profits earned into the General Revenue Fund. This fund is the State's "bank account" from which it pays its bills. General Revenue Fund money comes from sales taxes, interest and dividends, Texas

Lottery revenue and other income sources. The Lottery's contribution is about three percent of the total.

General Revenue helps support a long list of state-run programs such as health and human services, parks, public safety, public schools and prisons. The Texas Legislature decides exactly how to spend the money in this account.



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



OHS Doubles Teams Aimed Toward Austin

"Double your fun" is an apt phrase around the OHS tennis courts this week as the Ozona High boys' doubles teams walked away with a 1-2 finish at the Regional I-2A tennis tournament held April 27-28, and the equally determined team of Stefny Sutton and Jennifer Evans also won second place to earn a berth at the state meet in Austin, May 13-14.

At the regional meet, Ryan Morris and Mickey White defeated fellow teammates John Vasquez and Marty Martinez for first place to give Ozona its unprecedented domination of the boys' doubles finals.

Senior Ryan Morris' powerful serves, overhead and net play combined with junior Mickey White's aggressive ground strokes and quickness made then an unbeatable duo. "Their smart play and mental toughness showed throughout the tournament," said Coach Renee Schulze. They defeated Rotan 6-1, 6-0; Sundown 6-2, 6-0; Memphis 6-2, 6-1 and Ozona #2 team of Vasquez and Martinez 6-1, 6-1.

Schulze reported this team only lost eight games in becoming the 1994 regional champs after placing third at state last year. She added, "They will be strong contenders for the state championship. This is their goal and they are working hard to make it a reality."

Junior John Vasquez and sophomore Marty Martinez made up the second place district team, and with a combination of solid ground strokes and strong determination. The duo also gained a second place finish at regionals.

Schulze praised this team as well, saying, "They never give up on a point. Vasquez's angle serves and Martinez's put-away shots at the net proved to be a winning combination. They played better and better each match."

Their extra efforts on every shot showed as they defeated the number two and three seeded players. They beat Jim Ned 6-2, 6-3; Scagraves 3-6, 6-3, 6-3; San Saba 6-2, 7-6 before losing to their Ozona teammates 6-1, 6-1.

The dazzling duo of seniors Stefny Sutton and Jennifer Evans will also be representing Ozona at the state meet in the girls' doubles division. Schulze had high praise for these two athletes as she said, "They played like a fine tuned machine—their play complements each other to form one of the strongest teams that will be in Austin. These girls will definitely be in the center court fighting for the state championship. Their intense focus, movement and basic tennis skills are superior."

Sutton and Evans defeated Dublin 6-1, 6-2; Spearman 7-5, 6-2; lost to Memphis 1-6, 6-2, 6-3; beat San Saba 6-2, 6-1; and beat Canadian 6-2, 6-3 in the playbacks.

In other boys' action, Ozona junior James Nelson will also be traveling to the state meet this year as an alternate in the boys' singles division. Nelson lost his first match to the

number two seed from Ralls 4-6, 6-3, 6-3.

According to Schulze, the state qualifiers as well as alternate Nelson are working harder than ever to prepare for the state meet. They are all determined to win state and play hard-hitting, aggressive, never-give-up tennis. "I am so proud of these players and the tennis tradition in Ozona," said Schulze. In the last few years these competitors have piled up quite a list of tennis accomplishments, as the boys have won district the last four years and the girls have been either first or second the last four years. In 1991 three players went to regionals; 1992 saw six players in regionals and two at state. In 1994, seven players went to

regionals and six to state. Looking at individual accomplishments, Ryan Morris has gone to regionals four years and to state three years, while teammate Mickey White has gone to regionals two years and state two years. John Vasquez has attended regionals twice and state once and partner Marty Martinez has gone to regionals and state one year, and James Nelson has attended regionals one year. On the girls' side, Jennifer Evans has gone to regionals two years and state one year, and Stefny Sutton has traveled to regionals and state one year.

In summarizing her team's success, Schulze said, "These are superior athletes that are self-disciplined workers with winning attitudes."

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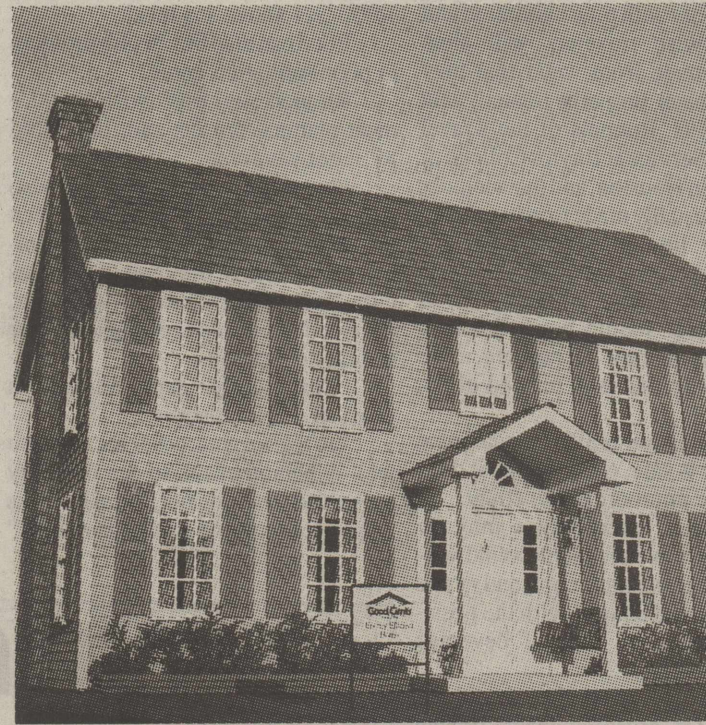

The Texas Cancer Council recently awarded Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center in Lubbock and the Harrington Cancer Center in Amarillo a grant to establish the West Texas Coalition for Cancer Control (WTCCC). The Health Sciences Center is responsible for Public Health Regions 9 and 10, and Harrington Cancer Center is responsible for Public Health Region 1.

The goals of the WTCCC project are to develop a community network in these three regions, gather information on the needs and resources, and develop an action plan for the rural areas. For Public Health Regions 9 and 10 we conducted a needs assessment by telephone surveys of county officials to find out county needs, community concerns, health problems, and what community programs are in place.

We have funds available from the Texas Cancer Council to address specific needs in your community. We now want to visit with you to discuss our findings and to learn more about health related activities and concerns in your county. We have scheduled a community meeting for Thursday, May 19, 1994, from 7-8 p.m., at the Crockett Room (509 11th Street) in Ozona. We look forward to visiting your county, and we hope you will be able

to attend the meeting.

I'm not sure there is a definition for what I feel as I write this letter. At 11:50 p.m., May 7, 1994, an unusual thing happened that left me completely baffled, hurt, humiliated, and wondering why some people are so quick to make conclusions before getting true facts and information.

First of all, yes, my son has made one mistake in his 16 years of life, but then how many adults have committed evil, mortal crimes and have been forgiven and were able to live happily everafter. He's not even the first nor the last youngster to make a mistake and get caught.

Somewhere in this fine community of anxious people to give wrong descriptions there was an accident and the vehicle involved left the scene. Witnesses described my son's pickup to the investigating officers as being the vehicle involved. Incidentally, the pickup my son drives had been parked in the same spot for two weeks with the clutch out. While he was being accused of this, he was dancing the night away at the prom.

Mr. Editor, the upsetting part about all of this is that tact-diplomatic behavior was not used by either of the officers who came to my home that night. My belief is that when love ones or families are informed of an accident, those bearing such news do so very tactfully. I am slowly recovering from a very serious operation and doing very well, by the way, but can anyone begin to imagine the fright and emotional trauma I suffered the instant I was informed that my son was involved in an accident and had fled the scene. As soon as I was asked by one officer if my son was home and answered "no" he said to the other officer, "It was him." All I knew was that he meant it was my son. I was so frightened. In my opinion, unprofessional of course, that is the most tactless, inconsiderate behavior a peace officer can display.

Mr. Editor, I have a lot of respect for all peace officers and have made sure my children do also. We are proud of our sheriff's department and department of public safety. I pray this was an isolated incident and that it won't happen again. I'll also pray for those involved in that accident.

Thanks for letting me get this off my chest.

ASCS Reminds Foreigners Of AFIDA Requirement

"Foreigners who have bought or sold agricultural land in Crockett County are reminded to report the transaction to our office within 90 days," Laurie Hale, PA of the Crockett County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said.

To avoid Federal penalties and monetary fines, foreign owners of U.S. agricultural land must report their holdings, acquisitions, dispositions, leases of 10 years or more, and land-use changes to (ASCS) within 90 days.

"The report is required by the Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act, (AFIDA) which is still in effect," Laurie said. Foreign investors are required to file a report if all or part of any agricultural land is sold, or the title is transferred to another person.

Failure to file the AFIDA report could result in a civil penalty of up to 25 percent of the fair market value of the interest held in the agricultural land, she said.

For reporting purposes, agricultural land is any tract of more than 10 acres in the aggregate now in farming, ranching, forestry, or timber production. Land used for forestry production is land exceeding 10 acres in which 10 percent is stocked by trees of any size, including land that formerly had such tree cover and will be naturally or artificially regenerated. "This includes land in agricultural use when purchased, as well as land later converted to agricultural use," the ASCS official said.

County government officials, realtors, attorneys and others involved in real estate transactions are asked to notify the foreign investor of these reporting requirements.

USDA Seeks Comments On 1994 Support Prices For Wool And Mohair

WASHINGTON — April 29 — The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation today asked for public comment on the support prices for pulled wool (wool on unshorn lambs) and mohair for the 1994 marketing year.

The National Wool Act of 1954, as amended (the Wool Act), provides that the support price for pulled wool — the wool removed from the pelts of unshorn, slaughtered sheep — be set at a level relative to the shorn wool support price that will maintain normal pulled wool marketing practices. This provision has been implemented in the past through payments based on the live weight of unshorn lambs marketed.

The Wool Act also provides that the mohair support price be set at a level to maintain about the same percentage of parity as for shorn wool. Under the Wool Act, the mohair support price may be set at not more than 15 percent above or below the shorn wool parity percentage.

The shorn wool support price is determined by a formula specified in the Wool Act. Based on the current reported parity index, the 1994 marketing year, producer payments will be calculated using the support prices covered by this proposed rule, but will then be reduced by 25 percent for 1994 in accordance with section 704 (9) of the Wool Act. The Wool Act is in effect through December 31, 1995.

The proposed regulation is scheduled to be published in the Federal Register on May 2. Comments on the proposed regulation should be sent to: Director, Fibers and Rice Analysis Division, Room 3760-S, USDA/ASCS, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013-2415 and must be received by June 1. A preliminary regulatory impact analysis on the options considered is also available from that office. Public comments will be available for inspection in Room 3756-S of USDA's South Building here during normal business hours.

"Straight Talk" Program Offered For Parents, Pre-teens

Children grow up too rapidly, it seems, but help is on the way for parents who want to educate their children about topics such as reproductive development, puberty and menstruation. Why is this important? The teen pregnancy rate in Crockett County, Texas, and the U.S. should be enough to convince any parent - and when the threat of AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases is added, the need for education becomes even stronger.

A free program for parents and their pre-teen daughters and sons - called "Straight Talk" is being sponsored by the Texas Department of Health, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Planned Parenthood of West Texas. Through films, discussions and exercises, parents and pre-teens ages 9-12 will explore the exciting road to "growing up". Communication between parent and child is strongly emphasized in the sessions.

The program normally costs \$15 per family; however, thanks to the generosity of the Guadalupanas, Ozona Woman's League and Crockett County Extension Home Economics Committee, there will be no charge to attend.

The classes will be offered on Tuesday, May 17, at the Texas Department of Health offices, 701 9th Street in Ozona. The class for boys and their parents is from 4:00 to 5:30 p.m. and the class for girls and their parents is from 6 to 7:30 p.m. Grandparents or other guardians who are responsible for pre-teens' care are also encouraged to attend with the youth.

Watch Out For Those Ice Cubes

A word of advice for travelers venturing into less developed areas of the world: Avoid ice cubes.

In places with poor sanitation and hygiene, wise travelers will shun anything made from water that may not have been properly treated, said Dr. James H. Runnels of the Travel Medicine Service at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, and that includes ice cubes, usually made from tap water.

"For liquids, your best bet is carbonated beverages or drinks made with boiled water," he said. "Even bottled water should be carbonated. Otherwise, it may be nothing more than a bottle that was refilled at the tap."

Chlorination is also no guarantee that water is safe, even though it does reduce the microorganism count.

In areas where water may be dangerous, travelers should avoid non-disposable glasses and cups, and straws can help avoid contact with the possibly contaminated tops of beverage bottles and cans.

Untreated water also should not be used for brushing teeth, rinsing dentures, cleaning contact lenses or

washing hands before eating. Water for these activities should be vigorously boiled for one minute for each 1,000 feet above sea level.

Food can also be a health problem in poor-sanitation areas.

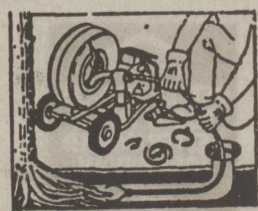
Runnels suggests avoiding cold-meat platters, buffets and foods sold by street vendors.

Uncooked vegetables are also suspect because they may have been grown in contaminated human or animal feces. Fruits, nuts and vegetables with thick skins or shells are safer, provided they have been peeled under sanitary conditions.

"That usually means peeling them yourself," Runnels said.

"In restaurants, order meat or fish well done and check to see that they are served steaming hot," he said. "This helps eliminate the risk of parasites."

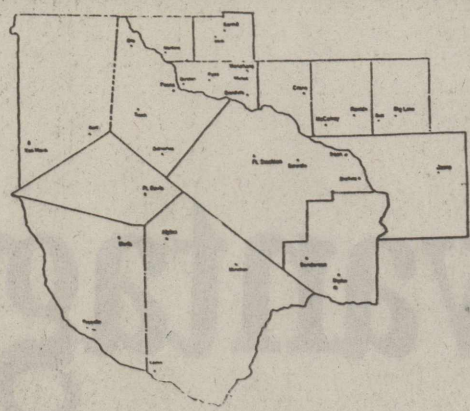

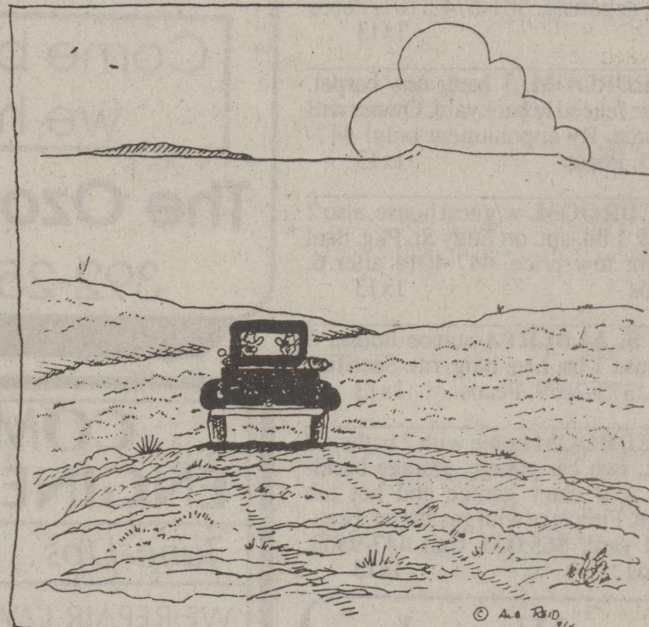

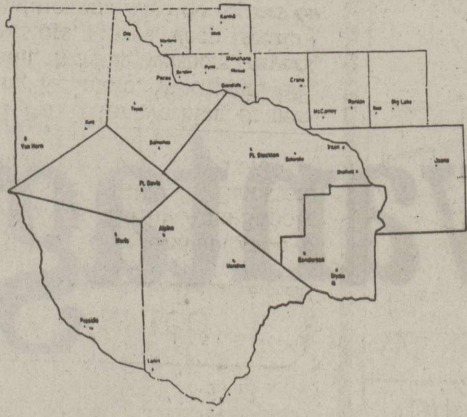
