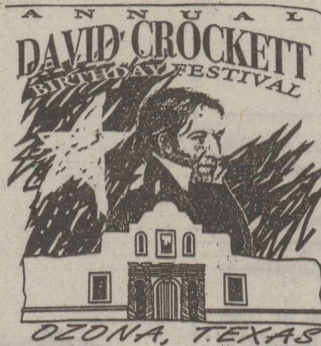
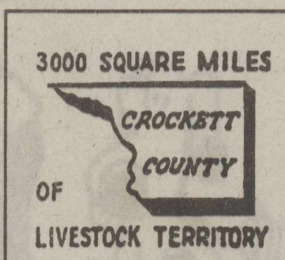

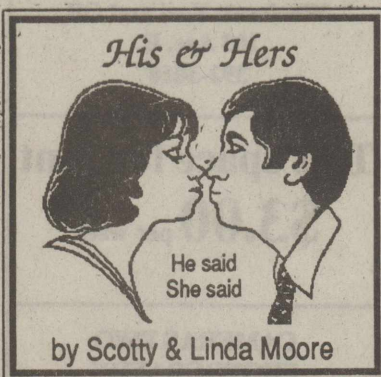

Mr. and Mrs. Pete Vargas of Oak Ridge, TN, were here last week visiting his mother, Mrs. Romanita Vargas, and other family members. Pete left Ozona 42 years ago. Twenty of those years were spent in the U. S. Air Force and 21 with the Department of Energy where he still works. Plans are to retire this August.

Pete stopped in The Stockman office to renew his subscription and asked about the beautiful western murals which had been on the walls of businesses downtown. Several of his friends from Tennessee had made a point to leave the interstate and drive through Ozona to see the murals on past travels, and during later trips, discovered that the murals were gone.

We hated to have to tell him that the colorful and expensive murals had begun to flake and peel to the point of having to be taken down and put in storage. Artist Jack Feagan attributed the deterioration to conditions in Ozona and has not repaired the murals.

Meanwhile, Pete's friends and undoubtedly many others who passed through Ozona during the time the paintings were on display, are saying, "I saw those murals. What happened to them?"

A tour of four West Texas landfills by EPA officials June 13 is planned in connection with a public hearing on flexibility of groundwater monitoring of landfills in arid parts of the state. The EPA people will be accompanied by officials from the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission.

TNRCC commissioner Peggy Garner, who is a former county judge from McCamey, knows first hand the problems that affect this part of the country when it comes to landfills and government regulations.

A relaxation in the proposed monitoring requirements could be beneficial to Crockett County. Local officials and others involved with trash disposal seem increasingly aware of the need for a landfill within the county.

Community Center Hires New Director

The Ozona Community Center needs to serve "all ages and all races in an interracial environment," said Kay Baker, new director of the center. "We want to center to help all of Crockett County," said the enthusiastic educator.

The community center offers quality day care from 7:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. Weekly rates for the program are \$25 per half day per child and \$50 whole day per child. The children are fed balanced meals and nutritious snacks.

During the summer free lunches are available at the center to children and teens 18 months through 18 years who qualified for the free or reduced lunch program at the public schools. The lunches are offered from noon until 1 p.m. Monday through Friday. More information about this state sponsored program can be obtained by calling the Ozona Community Center at 392-2710.

Registration for the center's preschool programs offered during the school year is ongoing during the summer months, leading up to the start of school. Three classes are offered; the two - 2 and 3-year-olds, Small Stars, taught by Stacy Aaron; the 3-4-year-old Tinyville group headed by Del Vinton who is a 17-year veteran of the community center staff, and herself a graduate of the program; and Kiddie Klub for 4-5-year-olds taught by Mrs. Baker.

These teachers are assisted by teacher's aide and cook Mary Martinez and Claudia Dominguez who assists the teachers and helps clean the building.

Ozona Community Center has a proud heritage - going back to 1937 and an era that was soon to be stretched to the limits with the Great Depression and World War II. The Women's Society of Christian Service of the Ozona United Methodist Church secured two persons to start a summer youth program.

The Robert and Mary Massie Foundation of San Angelo provided the majority of funds for the erection of the present stone building in 1938. The north wing was added later to house the growing preschool program.

The non-profit organization, governed by a 21-member interdenominational board of directors, struggles against financial constraints, to meet the changing needs of the community. "We are a non-profit organization, but we have to pay the bills," said Mrs. Jana Wilson, a board member.

"All funds raised go back into the center," Mrs. Baker added. The staff has received no pay raises, and we depend on volunteers for money and supplies.

The center hopes to offer piano lessons, G.E.D. classes, have 4-H and Scout meetings, and in general, serve all ages, Mrs. Baker said. One ongoing program at the center helps people get off welfare and into jobs by providing supplemental child care.

T. C. Conner Nets Big Bass For \$10,000 Top Prize

Ozona's T. C. Conner hooked the top bass weighing 9.26 pounds and walked away \$10,000 richer Sunday in radio station KGKL's Seventh Annual Big Bass Tournament held at Twin Buttes Saturday and Sunday.

"I was fishing a Carolina Rig with a red shad-colored 10-inch Power Worm, and she took the line four or five times before my son, Tommy, finally netted her," T. C. said. "I know I must have gotten her up to the boat three or four times and she would take

the line and head straight down every time."

Conner, a veteran fisherman, and his son were fishing in 30 feet of water near the spillway. "Sooner Williams and Charles Childress were just 20 yards away and saw the whole thing, and when we got back after entering her there were a bunch of boats all around where we were fishing."

"I owe everything to the Lord and if it wasn't for Him there wouldn't be any little green bass for us to chase up and down the river," Conner said.

Child Care Management Services is a state sponsored program that pays for child care while qualified individuals attend schools or job training.

Projects to improve the community center are ongoing. A chain link fence was built around the front yard last weekend with labor provided by Ozona Lions Club and Community Service Club teens. Ozona Primary School donated supplies, and the building maintenance committee, headed by Neal Ulmer, added coats of paint where needed during the June 4 workday.

The 57-year-old center has evolved to meet the changing needs of the community. From the early 1950's until 1972, Miss Dorothy Price and Miss Ethel Wolf provided a crack of the whip and stable leadership. Following their departure, Mrs. Ray Valadez, who had trained under Miss Price and Miss Wolf, and Delfina Perez Vinton continued the educational programs. Mrs. Valadez was followed by Mrs. Susie Harrison, then Mrs. Laura Eastman was director at the center. Mrs. Pam Brewer served as director from 1992-94.

During this recent time, the state

has consistently given the preschool program at the center the highest marks - two weeks ago the program received the coveted four star rating.

Mrs. Baker, who received a bachelor of arts degree in secondary education from Angelo State University, a bachelor of arts in elementary education from Sul Ross and a master's in education from Sul Ross, plans for the center to continue on its road to excellence.

Helping Mrs. Baker meet those needs are her family: husband Fred, a rancher; and sons Jason, an OHS freshman, and John, a junior at OHS.

EPA To Tour West Texas Landfills

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission will accompany officials from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in Washington, D.C., on a tour of four West Texas landfills in an effort to persuade the EPA to allow flexibility in the monitoring of groundwater in highly arid regions of the state.

The tour will occur June 13, the day before an EPA-sponsored public hearing in Midland. The EPA is seeking public comment on whether flexibility should be granted regarding groundwater monitoring requirements for small community landfills located in arid regions of the nation. Landfills to be toured are those in Yoakum County, Seminole, Fort Stockton and Alpine.

Current proposed federal rules require at least three groundwater

monitoring wells around all landfills, regardless of locations. In arid regions, each well can cost between \$25,000-\$50,000 to construct with substantial ongoing costs for sampling and sample analysis.

TNRCC Commissioner Peggy Garner says that as many as 100 rural communities in Texas would have to increase garbage fees to citizens by as much as 200 percent to pay for this level of monitoring.

"We are asking the EPA to allow flexibility in areas where there is little rainfall, significant geologic barriers to contamination, as well as water tables that are hundreds and sometimes thousands of feet below the surface," Garner said. "We feel that public health should be safeguarded, but that some consideration should be allowed for small communities in arid

regions where the possibility of groundwater contamination is virtually nil."

The TNRCC is not suggesting that no monitoring occur in arid regions, but that less expensive monitoring be allowed on a site-by-site basis. One approach is the use of probes which can be placed in the ground to detect the presence of moisture under or around the landfill.

EPA officials participating in the tour include Bruce Weddle, Director of Municipal and Industrial Solid Waste for the EPA, Washington, DC.

The public meeting on Tuesday, June 14, will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the conference room of the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission, 2910 LaForce Boulevard, Midland International Airport, Midland.

Crockett County Gross Sales Up Over 1992

A sales tax report issued by the State Comptroller last month showed Crockett County with 149 reporting outlets for all industries in the last quarter of 1993. This compared to 156 outlets in 1992. Gross sales in the fourth quarter of 1993 were \$12,130,041, up 1.2% from the \$11,985,103 the previous year.

The county's retail outlets numbered 90 for the same period of 1993 compared to 94 in 1992. Sales were down 0.3% with \$6,322,513 reported in 1993 and \$6,343,882 in 1992.

Child Development Program At Community Center

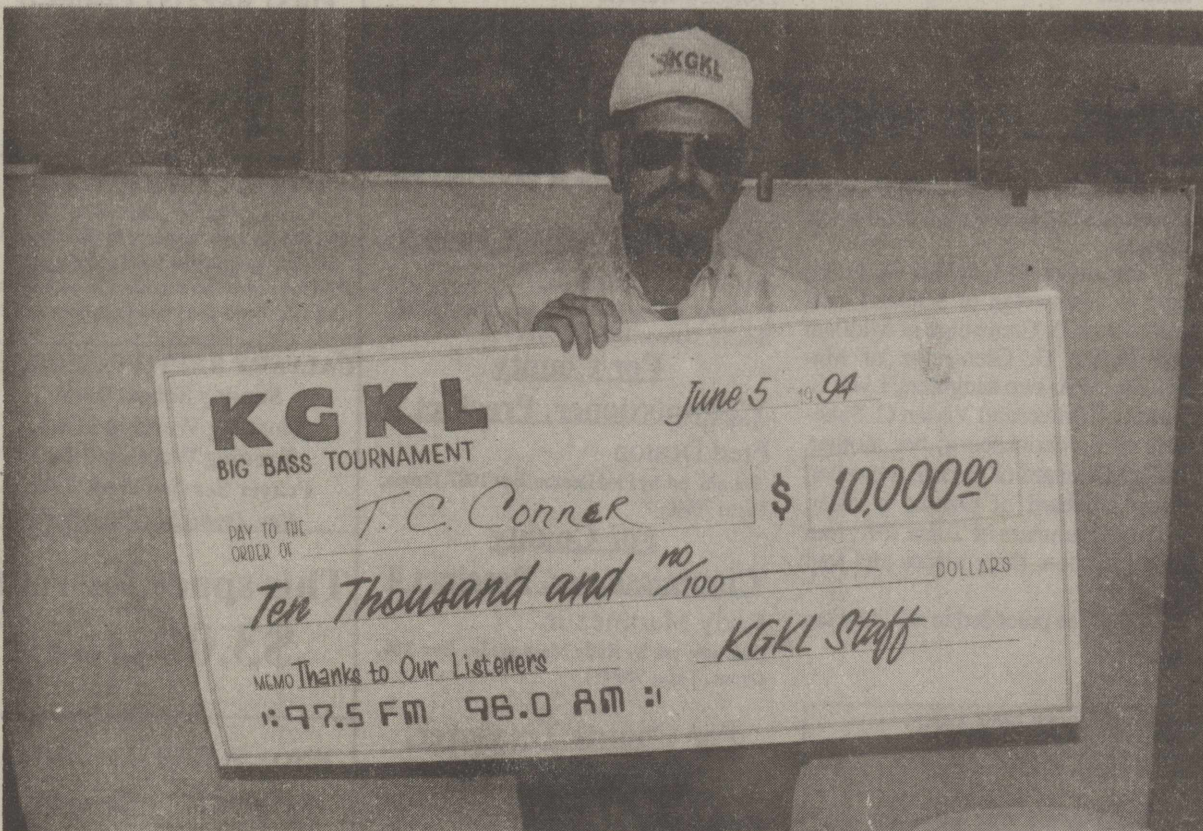
Ozona Community Center's child development program will offer three varied summer programs for children ages 18 months through age 12.

Nicholas Service Held June 3

Milton Edward "Nick" Nicholas died suddenly in Shannon Medical Center on Tuesday, May 31, 1994. He would have celebrated his seventy-third birthday next month.

Funeral service was held at 4 p.m. on Friday in the Ozona United Methodist Church with the Rev. Dr. Tim Brewer officiating; burial followed in Cedar Hill Cemetery, directed by Freddy Funeral Home.

Nick was born in Lincoln, Nebraska, on July 10, 1921. He was a veteran of World War II, serving in the 35th Infantry Division with the 134th Regiment. The 35th, which included units of the Nebraska, Kansas and Missouri National Guard was ordered into Federal Service on 23 December, 1940, almost a full year before the sneak attack on Pearl Harbor. Nick had joined the National Guard upon leaving high school. After disembarking at the northwest port of Liverpool, England, in May '44, they traveled south to the Lizard Peninsula on the south coast of the country of Cornwall, and it was here that he met his future wife, Joan Donkin, who was serving as a radar operator with the R.A.F.

During the war Nick served in five European theaters of war and was awarded the Bronze Star. On June 27, 1945, he married Joan in her home town of Shrewsbury in the county of Shropshire. She joined him in Texas March 31, 1946.

After his return from the war, he chose Texas as his future home, and after working a while, he decided to return to his childhood fascination for clocks and watches and went to school in Dallas to become a watchmaker. He graduated after also learning all aspects of the jewelry trade. He was hired by M. S. "Smitty" Baker of Marfa, and the family moved to the southwest in March, 1952. He retired on the last day of 1989 from the Ozona store after managing it since 1960, when Smitty purchased the store from Louise Carruthers.

Nick was a lifetime member of the 134th Regt. Association and the Ozona Country Club which he had served in several capacities - the board of directors, secretary-treasurer and greens' chairman several times - he was awarded a lifetime honorary membership in the club a few months ago. Nick was an active member of the Marfa Lions Club also and was to have been its next president, had he not moved away. In spite of deteriorating health, he was still trying to play two or three holes of golf every morning until just before his passing. He was determined never to give up. He had also enjoyed fishing.

He was preceded in death by his



mother and father, Carrie and Douglas Nicholas of Lincoln; two sisters, Gladys and Elaine Nicholas; and granddaughter, Carrie Ann Dacy. Survivors include his wife, Joan; two daughters, Ruthella Minatra and husband Kenneth of Rough Canyon, Lake Amistad and Jennifer Newton and husband, Rick, of Brownwood; three grandsons, Nick Dacy of Wichita Falls and Brisse and husband, Harold of Lincoln and Carol Jean Bertram and husband Jim of Reynoldsburg, Ohio; and one brother, Justin Nicholas of Columbus, Ohio, and several nephews.

The pallbearers were Bill Clegg, Smitty Baker, Warren Taliaferro, Winston Koerth, Ted Cotton, John Daniels, P-nut Sanders and Jerry Hayes.

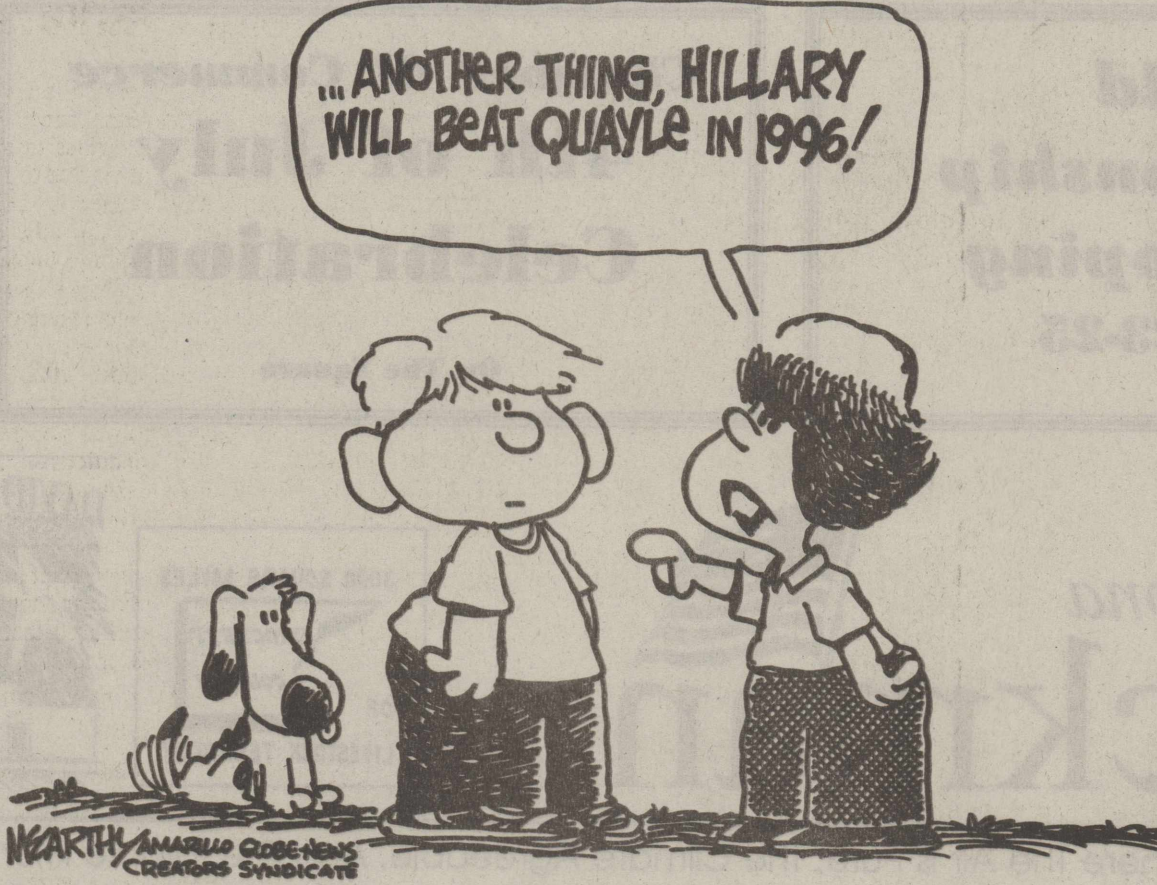
Honorary pallbearers were George Bunger, Jr., Weldon Maness, Dee Keilers and Doug Meador.

Foreign Markets Buy 80 Percent Of Country's Mohair

A mid-April foreign market update from the Mohair Council of America indicates that sales to the United Kingdom had dwindled to 5.6 million pounds in 1992, down from 1988 exports of approximately 13 million pounds. One of the biggest markets for mohair in the U.K. is for hand knitting yarn, and consumption of all hand knitting yarn in the U.K. dropped 40 percent since 1988. In 1992 it began to look as if the demand for hand knitting yarns was returning and that economic conditions in the U.K. were improving, the report said. Consumers of hand knitting yarns in the U.K. had never been made aware of the origin of the mohair fiber they were using in their yarns. The Mohair Council of America believed that if consumers were made aware of the origin and the earthy natural story of

production of U.S. mohair that they would favor it over mohair from other sources and perhaps over other fibers. If this could be accomplished, then as demand for the fiber returned in the U.K., U. S. mohair fiber would be favored over fiber from South Africa and Turkey.

In 1993, the market promotion program, a USDA-FMD program designed to assist and coordinate export activities and help strengthen the U.S. export promotion efforts, funded an \$80,000 U.K. promotion of hand knitting yarns made of U.S. mohair. The story of mohair production and the earthy nature of the fibers were exhibited in yarn shop windows throughout the U.K. One thousand shops participated in the promotion, which yielded a 15 percent increase in mohair yarn sales over 1992. The yarn

manufacturers in the U.K. split the cost of the promotion with the Mohair Council of America and agreed to use entirely U.S. mohair in their Yarns. As a result of the promotion, an additional one million pounds of raw fiber was exported to the U.K. in 1993.

Have Documents Handy When Filing For S.S.

When you file a claim for Social Security benefits, you're going to be asked to present documents to help Social Security decide whether you're eligible, and if you are, when your benefits will begin. For example, if you are retiring, you'll be asked to present your birth certificate. If your spouse is filing too, generally his or her birth certificate is needed and also birth certificates for any children who are eligible for benefits. If you're filing for survivor's benefits, the deceased's death certificate will be needed.

Regardless of the documents needed, it's important that they are the originals or certified copies. Photo copies cannot be accepted unless the official custodian of the original document certifies that it is an exact copy of the original.

If you don't have the document needed, there are other kinds of records that may be acceptable. If you don't have a birth certificate, for example, you may have a religious record of your birth. The general rule is that the sooner in life your document is recorded, the more accurate it is. For example, a school record is considered to be better evidence of your age than a voter's registration.

Since many people file their claims by telephone, they are asked to mail the documents to Social Security.

The documents are certified and returned as soon as they are received by Social Security.

Tourism Boom To Small Towns Says Comptroller

"More and more small town and rural areas of Texas are turning to tourism as a new source of revenue to offset declining agricultural production and oil and gas exploration," State Comptroller John Sharp says.

"They are sprucing up historic homes and museums, luring new businesses, promoting a variety of art, music and local festivals and developing outdoor recreation activities to lure sightseers to their small towns.

"Economic diversity is the name of the game, and, in fact, has become a necessity for many rural communities. In addition to the loss of income from agriculture, many downtown businesses in these smaller communities are closing, as large-scale retailers move in and set up shop," Sharp said.

"Another recurring pattern in these rural communities has been one of young people leaving for college and never returning. So it's no surprise that these communities are clamoring to cash in on the \$2 billion-plus rural tourism industry."

The information on small town and rural tourism is included in a recent issue of *Fiscal Notes*, a monthly publication of the Comptroller's Research Division. The Texas Department of Commerce reports that 19 percent of all travel to Texas in 1992 was to rural destinations - an increase of three percent over the previous year. Of all out-of-state travelers, 14 percent visited rural Texas, the *Fiscal Notes* article says.

"Usually the prices are good, and a return to a small-town atmosphere can be nostalgic for city folk who grew up in a rustic setting or can recall spending the summer at their grandparents' home in the country," Sharp said.

"Industry experts tell us that tourism is one of the few growth industries that capitalizes on resources already present in rural America - things like farms and ranches, one-room schoolhouses, wooden bridges and historic churches and other buildings," Sharp said.

While recreational water facilities and national forests are top draw cards for tourists, many rural counties are quick to formulate clever marketing programs to promote local attractions. *Fiscal Notes* takes a look at the top 10 Texas non-metro counties, as measured by tourism spending in 1992.

Ranked in order, they are:
Kerr County: The arts and music

mecca of the Hill Country, Kerrville is home of the annual Texas Arts & Crafts Fair and the Kerrville Folk Festival. The ideal climate and cypress-edged Guadalupe River attracts legions of campers, swimmers, boaters and fishing enthusiasts. Tourist spending: \$88.5 million.

Llano County: Billed as the "Deer Capital of Texas," Llano County's population soars by 10,000 during the fall and winter hunting seasons. The Llano River and the Highland Lakes offer year-round fishing. Tourist spending: \$49.4 million.

Burnet County: Known as the "Bluebonnet Capital of Texas," Burnet attracts visitors looking for good fishing and camping areas at the Highland Lakes. Each winter, tour boats seek out rare views of American bald eagles near Lake Buchanan. Many visitors to the town of Burnet arrive on a 75-year-old restored steam locomotive that travels from northwest Travis County. Tourist spending: \$48.9 million.

Polk County: The Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation's extensive visitor's program, hiking in the Big Thicket National Preserve, plus fishing, camping and boating facilities on Lake Livingston, are a strong lure to tourists. Tourist spending: \$46.3 million.

Angelina County: David Crockett and Angelina National Forests, the Neches and Angelina rivers and the Sam Rayburn Reservoir combine to make outdoor recreation the primary drawing card. Tourist spending \$41.6 million.

Marion County: The town of Jefferson, more than 150 years old, one of the state's most historic, boasts 50-plus structures bearing State Historic Medallions. Lake O' The Pines and Caddo Lake are two of the most scenic lakes in the state. Tourist spending: \$38 million.

Walker County: The legend of Sam Houston lures history buffs to his burial site and museum. Huntsville State Park and Sam Houston National Forest offer camping, hiking and botany trails, fishing and swimming. Tourist spending: \$35.9 million.

Aransas County: Bird-watching at the Aransas National Wildlife refuge and pristine beaches draw many tourists but fishing is the primary attraction. Anglers fish free from beaches, the south jetty and Station Street Pier. Charter cruises are available for offshore sports and fishing.

Tourist spending: \$34.9 million.

Nacogdoches County: One of the oldest settlements in the state, Nacogdoches draws visitors to such landmarks as the state's first oil well and La Calle del Norte, known as the oldest public thoroughfare in the U.S. Tourist spending: \$32.8 million.

Val Verde County: Amistad Reservoir, covering 67,000 acres, offers an abundance of boating, fishing, swimming, sailing and scuba diving opportunities.

Teen Mothers Account For 14.76% Of Births

During 1991, teen mothers accounted for 14.76% of all live births in Texas for a total of 46,683 births. Of these, 952 were to mothers under 15 years of age, and 45,731 were to mothers ages 15-19.

In the 30 county service region of Planned Parenthood of West Texas Inc., a total of 1,945 live births to teen mothers was recorded in that period, 44 of whom were under 15, and 1,901 of whom were ages 15-19.

Statistics show Crockett County as having 51 live births during that time, with none to mothers under 15. Mothers 15-19 made up 25.49%, or 13 of the 51.

The highest percentage of births to teen mothers in the region was 33.85 in Upton County. Mason County had the smallest number, two of 43 for 4.65%.

Each year, the U. S. government spends an estimated \$25 billion on behalf of families in which the first birth occurred when the mother was a teenager. These costs include payments from Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Medicaid and Food Stamps, but does not include such other costs as the Women, Infants and Children supplemental food program, housing subsidies, job training, subsidized school meals, special education, foster care or day care.

A family begun by a first birth to a teen mother in 1990 will cost the taxpayer an average of approximately \$18,133 by the time the child reaches age 20.

According to the Center for Population Options, if every birth to a teen mother in 1990 had been delayed until the woman was in her twenties, the federal government would have saved \$10 billion dollars.

Heat Can Be Dangerous For Elderly

HOUSTON - For elderly people, summer's high temperatures can take the good out of the good ol' summertime.

Heat illness can be devastating for the elderly, particularly in areas with high humidity, said Dr. Janice Zimmerman of Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Heat exhaustion, caused by heat overexposure, can lead to heat stroke. Early signs include weakness, fatigue, dizziness or dehydration.

Antihistamines, antidepressants, laxatives and heart medicines can contribute to dehydration.

To minimize chances of heat illnesses, Zimmerman recommends:

Wearing loose, light-weight clothing. Drinking water frequently, even when not thirsty.

Using air conditioning or opening windows and using electric fans. Taking frequent breaks from outdoor activities.

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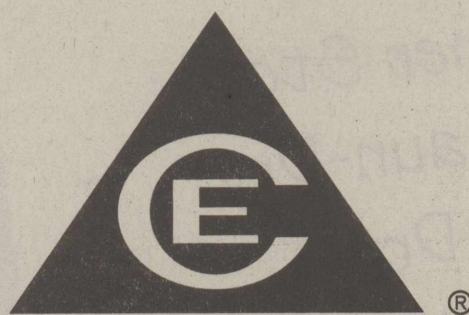

The Ozona students were joined in the class by others from Fort Stockton, Van Horn, Grandfalls and one senior P.E. major. There were 11 in the class, and all five young people from Ozona passed the test. A total of six students completed the class.

Ozona's young people had a good time exploring Alpine and the many fun places in the town. They were appreciative of the First Methodist Church for letting them sleep in the basement and to Mr. and Mrs. Mark Curry and Tony Curry, formerly of Ozona, for a wonderful meal and an evening of fun.

Garza Completes Cardiac Rehab

Pedro Garza of Ozona, an arterial bypass patient, recently completed a program of cardiovascular rehabilitation at the Reagan Memorial Hospital in Big Lake. The three-month program prescribed for Mr. Garza included conditioning and exercise to prepare him to lead a normal life after his surgery.

Lambs Needed For Rehab Club Lamb Sale

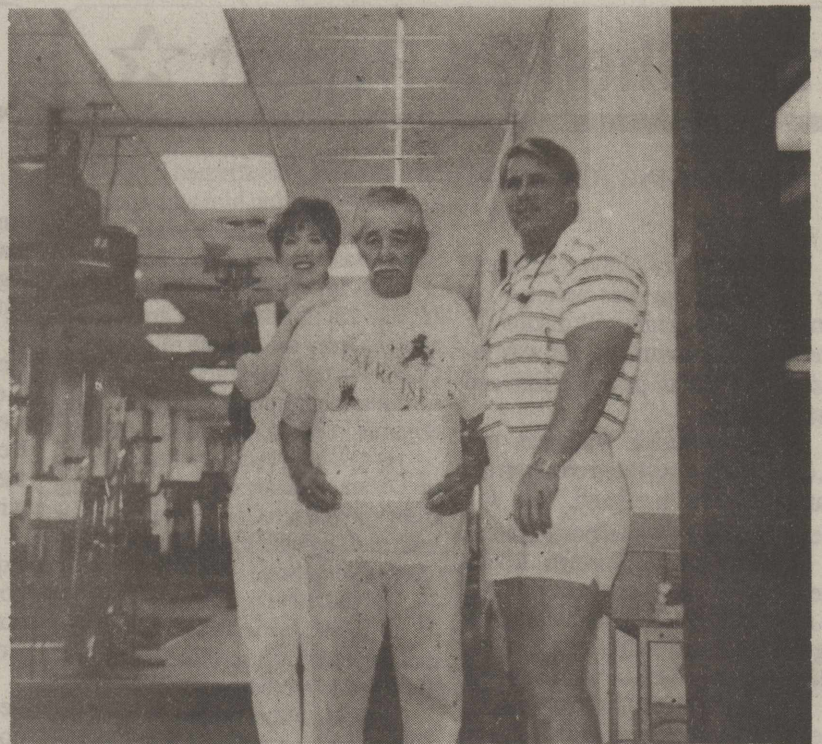
