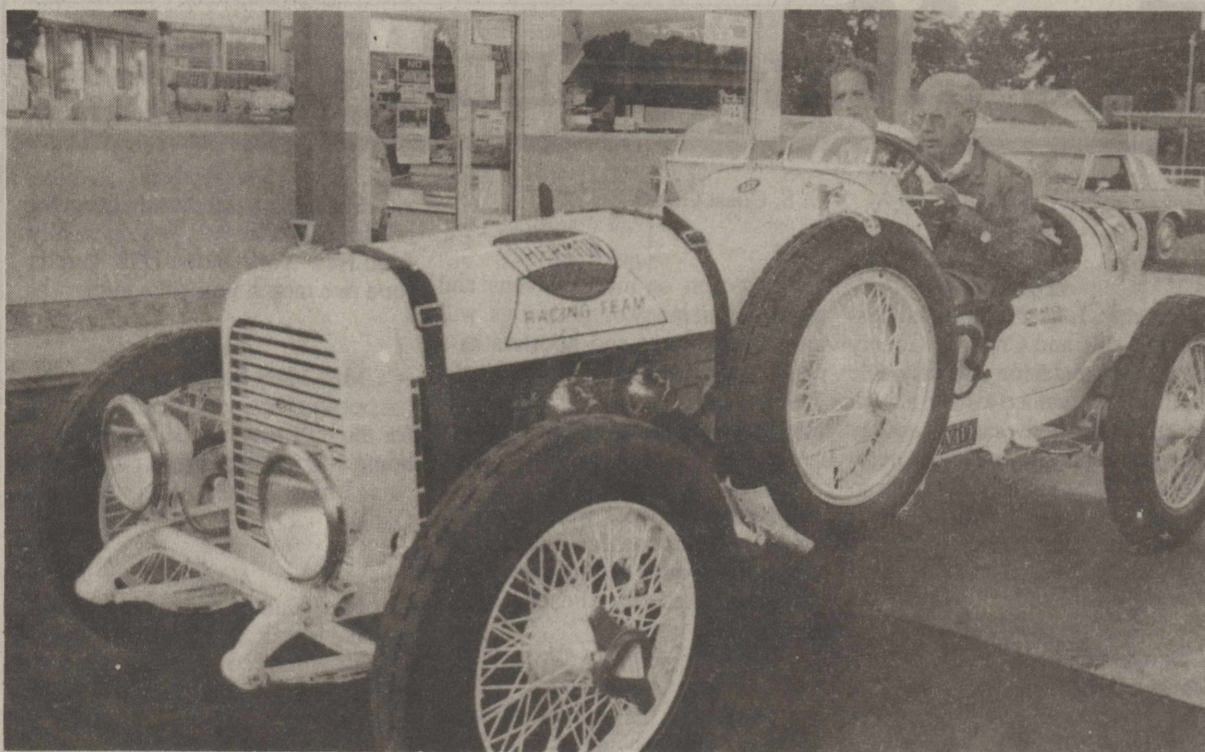
The day the Taylors passed the office was somewhere around the time the daily news carried a story about a woman who was recovering from the surgical removal of a 156-pound tumor.

Investigation Shows No Discrimination

School board members voted June 14 to accept a report from an Austin law firm which concluded that the school is not in violation of state law when students on the golf team practice at Ozona Country Club. The firm of Bickerstaff, Heath & Smiley, L.L.P., was retained by trustees to investigate allegations by Orlando De Hoyos of discrimination at Ozona Country Club.

The 73rd Legislature enacted House Bill 800, codified as Texas Education Code 21.9205 (Vernon,

supp. 19914) which provides the following:

(a) An extracurricular activity sponsored or sanctioned by a school district, including an athletic event or an athletic team practice, may not take place at an athletic club located in the United States that denies any person full and equal enjoyment of equipment or facilities provided by the athletic club because of the race, color, religion, creed, national origin, or sex of the person.

(b) In this section, "athletic club"

means an entity that provides sports or exercise equipment or facilities to its customers or members or to the guests of its customers or members.

The language of the statute prohibits use of facilities that currently engage in prohibited discrimination. The statute does not address facilities which have experienced past or historical discrimination.

The district previously asked Rep. Libby Linebarger, who is chairman of the Committee on Public Education, for clarification from the Texas Attorney General on the school district's duties and responsibilities to investigate allegations of discrimination at a privately owned and operated country club in order to comply with T.E.C. 21.9205 and guidance as to how the district should proceed.

In a March 4 written response to Rep. Linebarger, James Tourtelott, Assistant Attorney General, Opinion Committee, said that the board's general powers of governance under Texas Education Code 23.26(b) give it the authority to sanction school district athletic activities. Therefore, the board has the responsibility to determine whether to sanction a particular activity.

Community Blood Drive June 30

Blood is one of the doctor's most valuable resources, and many people are alive today because blood was available when they needed it. In this area, 375 blood donations are needed each week to meet patients' needs. United Blood Services, this area's nonprofit community blood provider,

relies entirely on volunteer donors to help maintain a constant, sufficient blood supply. Blood comes from only one source—health people who are willing to give of themselves.

United Blood Services will conduct a community blood drive in Ozona on Thursday, June 30, from 1 to 7 p.m. at the civic center. The drive will be sponsored by Connie Jennings and Xi Sigma Omega. All healthy persons age 17 and over are invited to give blood during the drive to help patients in this community.

"Donating blood is safe, simple and satisfying," said Janet E. Gallagher, Senior Community Relations Representative for United Blood Services. The body contains about 9 to 11 pints of blood and, since the body constantly manufactures blood, the amount given is quickly replaced.

The donation process takes less than an hour, with about five to seven minutes for the actual donation. First a brief medical history is taken. Second the temperature, blood pressure, pulse and blood iron levels are checked. After the blood is collected, it is typed and tested for diseases that might be transmitted to those receiving transfusions. This procedure benefits the donor as well as the patient because if any of the tests indicate a need for medical attention the donor is referred to his or her personal physician.

Blood can be separated into components so one donation may help several patients. These components must be processed within a few hours of donation, so there is always a need for a constant, fresh supply of blood donated by volunteers in this community.

The World Championship Goat Roping gets underway Thursday, June 23, at the Crockett County Fairgrounds arena. The event is sponsored locally by the Crockett County Roping Association Inc. Preliminaries start a 6:00 p.m. Thursday and 7:00 a.m. Friday and Saturday. There is no charge to watch the prelims. Nightly performances begin at 7:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday at a cost of \$3.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children.

Goat sacking for children ages 12 and under and a boot scramble for ages 8 and under will be held at the Friday and Saturday evening performances. No registration is necessary, and all children are encouraged to participate.

Friday night's special event is a match roping between 1992 World Champion Roper Johnny Bownds of Eldorado and 1993 World Champion Roper Jesse Banner of Dryden.

Crockett County 4-H Club will serve barbecue brisket plates on Friday and fajita plates on Saturday for \$5.00 each. The meals will be on sale from 5:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m. each evening and take-out plates will be available both nights.

Saturday night's performance will follow the drawing for the winner of a new 1994 Ford 3/4 ton pickup. Tickets are \$20.00 each and will be available at the arena. Goat roping caps for \$10.00 and T-shirts at \$12.00 will also be for sale every day at the arena.

The Karl Kinney Kothman Memorial Trophy will be presented to the new World Champion Roper. Kinney was the first World Champion in 1985. The trophy will be presented by members of his family.

A new award for this year will be the Goat Roping Horse Award. This award is donated by the Cy Banner family and will go to the top horse judged from all events.

The Goat Ropers' Ball at the pavilion with music by Sugar and Sam will begin immediately after Saturday's performance and will last until 1:00 a.m. Tickets are \$5.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children.

Many Citizens Benefit From TDH Nursing Care

A report on Texas Department of Health nursing services in the county for 1993 was presented at the June 13 meeting of commissioners' court.

Judge A. O. Fields read the report sent by Karen K. Huffman, R.N., B.S.N., field office nurse manager.

During the period from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, 1993, there were 1195 admissions to the programs, 2510 clinic visits, 1171 immunizations given, 1363 laboratory tests collected, 3485 examinations performed and 1009 risk appraisals completed.

Case management was provided for 37 pregnant women, three clients were provided nutrition services by the regional nutritionist, 2594 educational/counseling encounters were provided, and 314 "other services" were provided.

"Other services" included tuberculosis services, sexually transmitted diseases, and HIV counseling and

testing.

TDH also provided services through the Chronically Ill and Disabled Children's Program to 26 children. Primary Health Care served approximately 200 people in 1993.

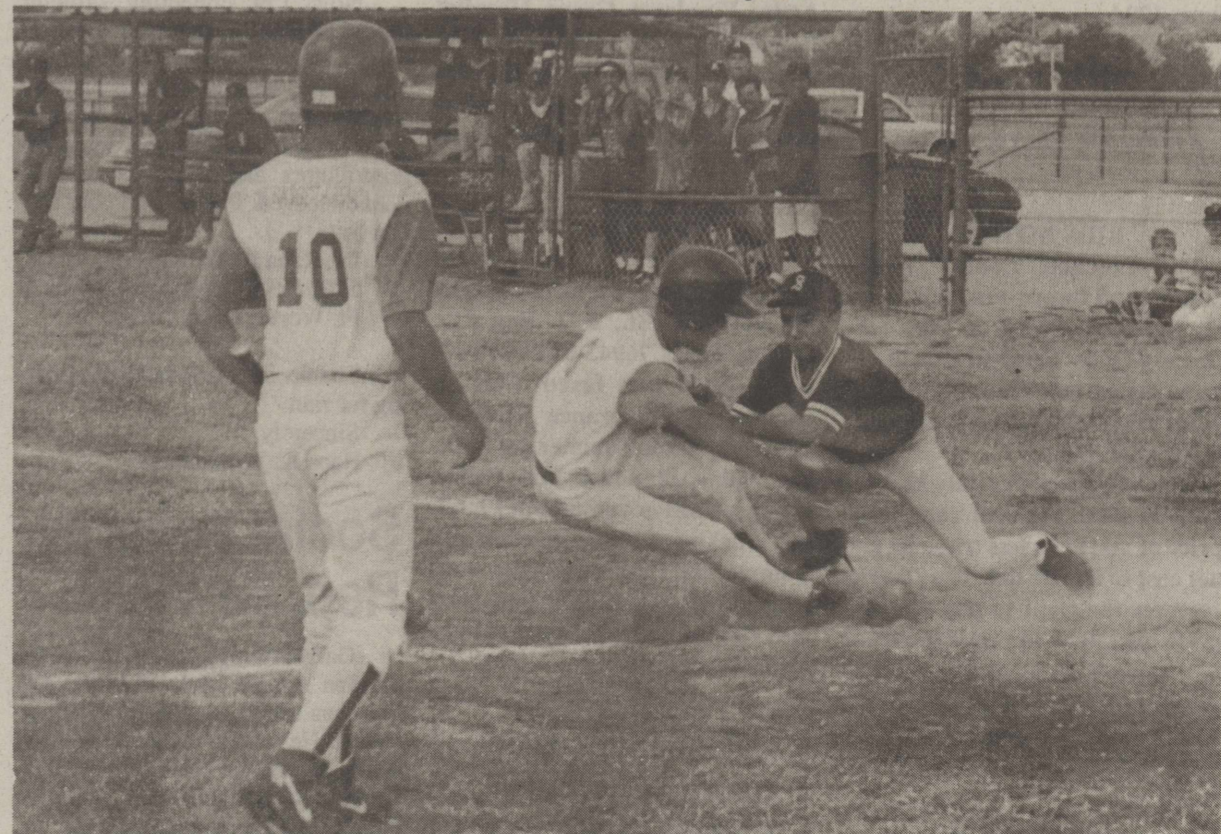
Last year, membership began in the Safe Riders Program which is a carseat loaner program. Through this program, carseats have been provided for 40 infants and children in Crockett County. The Women, Infant and Children Program served approximately 200 clients per month.

Texas Department of Health has had an office in Ozona for 10 years and has grown from a staff of one parttime nurse to two fulltime R.N.s and one fulltime L.V.N., two clerks and a community service aide.

"Each year the number of services that TDH offers grows, and there are no signs that the growth will slow down," said Mrs. Huffman.

Motions Filed In Capital Murder Cases

Attorneys for Loretta C. Neumuller and Tyrone C. Parker filed several motions for each defendant Monday in District Court. Neumuller and Parker are in Crockett County Jail charged with the murder of Larry Albers.

At the June 20 pre-trial hearing, Neumuller's lawyer filed motions for discovery and disclosure of evidence in the capital murder trial, a memorandum of law in support of that motion, a motion for notice and disclosure of sentencing evidence and evidence of alleged extraneous acts, a motion for discovery, a motion for disclosure of the grand jury list and records, a motion to invoke a rule at all hearings and prior to a preliminary examination to determine the competency of a witness or juror to prohibit witnesses from conversing and to prohibit the prosecuting attorney from advising witnesses of previous testimony. Also filed was an invocation and non-waiver of all rights under the 4th, 5th, 6th, 8th and 14th amendments and analogous provisions of the Texas Constitution and Texas law.

Filed June 20 on Parker's behalf were a motion to allow defendant to view the scene of the crime with his attorneys, motion for disclosure of evidence in a capital murder trial, motion for disclosure of evidence in a capital trial and a motion to inspect, examine and test physical evidence.

Former Ozonan Appreciated In Knoxville

The following article written by Michael Thomason about Dorothy Price is reprinted from the Monroe County Tennessee Advocate. The article was sent to The Stockman by Roy Alvin Harrell of Falls Church, VA. Miss Price influenced the lives of many Ozonans during her 16 years at Ozona Community Center.

Dot Price wasn't sure what was going on. All she knew was that she had received a phone call and been told they would be there about 2:30. "They wanted to set up an interview," she said. "I don't know what they want, but I told them to come on down."

"They" are Channel 8 News out of Knoxville. What they wanted was to interview Dot Price for one of their "Hometown Hero" segments.

"Oh, they can find someone better than me for this," Price said when told of their plans. "Maybe I can point them toward someone better."

Anyone who knows Dot Price would disagree with this. There are very few people in this area who have done more for the community than Price.

"Close the curtains," Price ordered her guest. "They might see in and realize they've got the right place. If

they don't know we're here, they might go on."

The letter noted that the board should consult the well-developed body of federal law in determining whether an athletic facility is discriminating against any person in violation of T.E.C. 21.9205.

De Hoyos filed a complaint in January with the University Interscholastic League alleging that the school district's use of Ozona Country Club's golf facilities violated state law.

The League determined that the complaint was outside the scope of its jurisdiction. Bonnie Northcutt, assistant to the director, also responded that a formal complaint which De Hoyos had filed with the Texas Education Agency was referral to the proper agency.

Kevin O'Hanlon, general counsel for TEA, contacted interim superintendent Ted Cotton regarding the complaint TEA received from Mr. De Hoyos about the school district's use of private golf course facilities. After receiving a written response from Cotton, O'Hanlon informed the school district that TEA was satisfied and that no future action is contemplated by TEA.

The school district was notified in February by the U. S. Department

of Education Office for Civil Rights that a complaint had been received alleging that the district was in violation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The complaint concerned the district's use of Ozona Country Club golf facilities. The name of the complainant was not included in this notification.

After review of information from the school district, the complainant and other witnesses, the Office for Civil Rights determined that the evidence did not support the complainant's allegations and dismissed the matter in April.

The school district proceeded with its investigation of the allegations of discrimination at the Ozona Country Club by retaining Bickerstaff, Heath & Smiley for this purpose.

Their report concluded that "Review of the complaint and other documents submitted by Mr. De Hoyos; interviews of Mr. De Hoyos, the President and Hispanic members of the Ozona Country Club; and examination of the documents requested from the Ozona Country Club provided no evidence that the Ozona Country Club is discriminating against any person because of the person's race, color, creed, religion, national origin, or sex."

Among the documents examined in the investigation were an undated copy of the country club's constitution

and by-laws, a copy of the constitution and by laws of the club as revised in 1990 and a copy of by-laws adopted May 4, 1994.

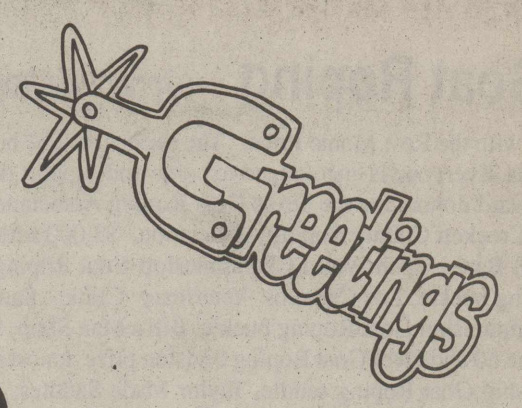

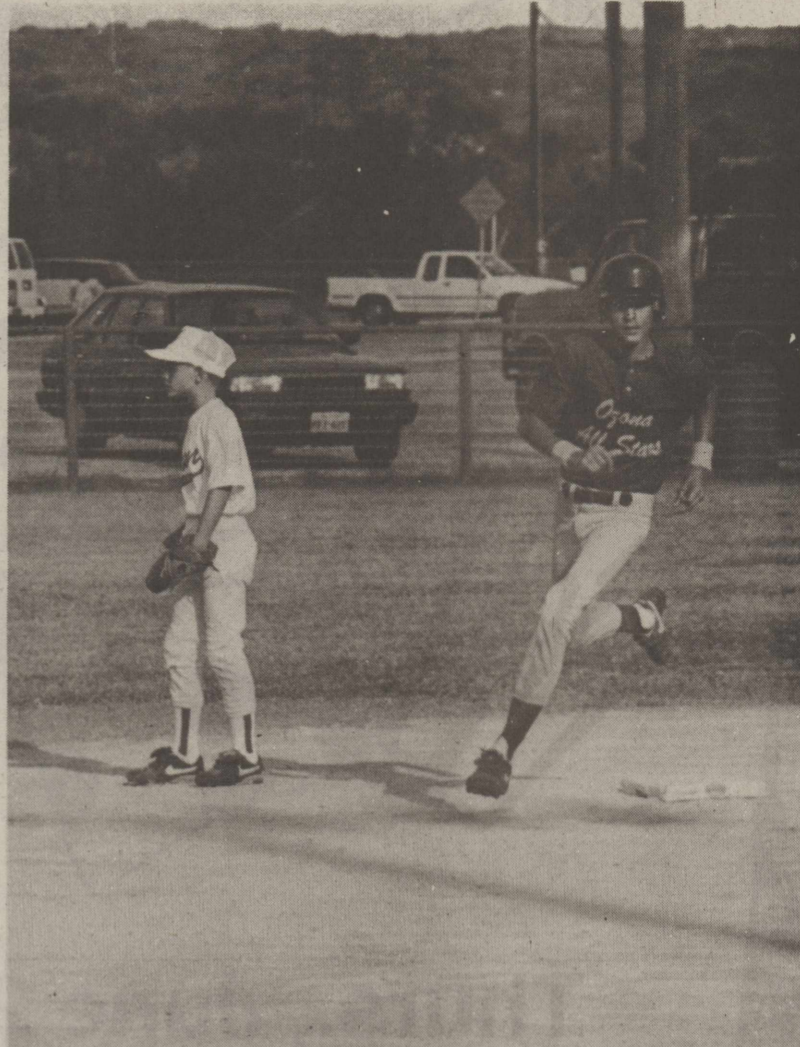

Helicopter Transport Used For Accident Victim

The new medical helicopter service available from San Angelo was utilized Sunday morning to transport a young boy injured in an auto accident in Crockett County. Three-year-old Jacob Vela was ejected through the rear window of a stationwagon when the car struck a guard rail 25.7 miles west of Ozona on I-10.

Also ejected through the back window with incapacitating injuries were Crystal Vela, age 9, and Jose Vela, age 13, who received non-incapacitating injuries.

Jose Vela of Alamo, age 30, was the driver of the vehicle. He and 30-year-old Belinda Vela received non-incapacitating injuries according to a report filed by DPS Trooper Ben English. A one-year-old between them in the front seat was not injured.

In addition to the helicopter transport, the other two injured children were taken by ambulance to San Angelo for hospitalization.

The accident occurred at 7:15 a.m. when Vela, who was westbound, dodged a deer. He lost control of the car and overcorrected, then struck a guard rail, peeling it from its posts.

Arcadio Ortiz of Abilene was the driver of a Mac truck tractor towing a

gravel dump trailer involved in an accident June 15. The accident occurred at 1:55 p.m. 8.3 miles north of Ozona on Hwy. 163.

According to the accident report, the driver looked in the rear view mirror to determine whether or not a tire was flat and ran off the road to the right. He lost control and the trailer overturned.

DPS Trooper Junior Bilano investigated.

Bilano also investigated a June 14 accident in Ozona. The accident occurred at 2:50 p.m. Drivers were Dennis Riddle of San Angelo and Rogelio Sanchez of Ozona.

Sanchez was the driver of a 1986 Chevrolet pickup towing a compressor east on Waterworks Street. Riddle, driver of a 1990 Chevrolet pickup, was southbound on Collins Street. He stopped at the sign, then made a wide right turn, striking the other vehicle and compressor.



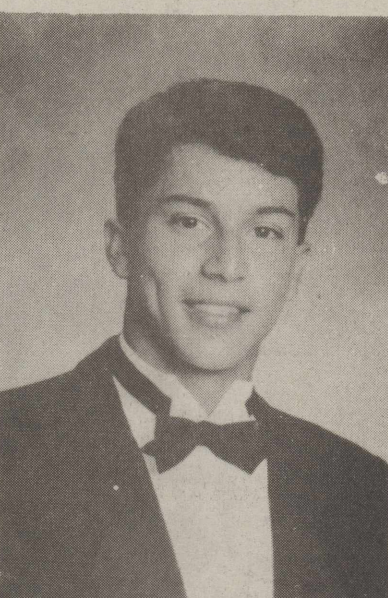
Castro Receives Scholarship Offers

Is Your Child's Safety Seat Old, Used Or Abused?

Well-meaning parents may not be providing adequate crash protection for their young children.

Many of the child safety seats parents are using are old, used or abused and do not provide adequate protection. A child may be endangered when instructions are not available to explain how the safety seat should be secured to the vehicle. If a safety seat has been involved in a crash, it has done its job and should be destroyed. The straps or shell may have experienced stress and may not provide protection if involved in another crash.

Families (in Texas only) who cannot afford a child safety seat can contact the Texas Department of Health, SafeRiders, at 1-800-252-8255 for the nearest locations of safety seat loaner programs.

To provide protection for a child, parents should:

-Select the correct safety seat for the child. make sure it is the correct size and type (infant, convertible or booster); it meets Federal Safety Standards; it is for use in a motor vehicle; and that it has not been in a crash, has instruction and all the parts.

-Secure your child in the safety seat correctly. Infants should face the back of the vehicle; babies over 20 pounds and one year of age face forward. Straps should be secured snugly over the child's shoulders, with the harness clip used to keep the straps in place.

When a child is too large for the safety seat, use a booster seat with a lap/shoulder belt. Use a booster seat with older children until they are at least 28 inches tall in a sitting position. Secure the children according to the safety seat manufacturer's instructions.

-Correctly secure your safety seat to the vehicle by following the vehicle

instruction manual as well as your safety seat's instructions. Secure the convertible seat facing forward or to the rear, depending on the size and age of the child. The seat should be held securely in position.

Even if you purchase a new child safety seat, be aware that occasionally parts of seats are found to be defective and the manufacturer issues a recall. If a recall occurs, the manufacturer will fix the defect at no cost to the owner.

If you have recently purchased a new child safety seat, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration recommends that you either send in the manufacturer's registration card (if one is provided) or send your registration information to them and they will forward it to the manufacturer. (NHTSA is collecting names and addresses of individuals who want this information provided to child safety seat manufacturers, so they can be easily notified of any future recalls regarding their particular seat.)

The information provided must include your name, telephone number, address, child seat manufacturer, model name and number, date of manufacture (located on labels on your child safety seat), and a written request that you are authorizing NHTSA to provide this information to your child safety seat manufacturer. Send this information to NHTSA Office of Defects Investigation, NEF-124007th St., S.W. Washington, DC 20590.

If you have questions regarding child safety seats or motor vehicle safety issues, call the U.S. Department of Transportation hotline at 1-800-424-9393.

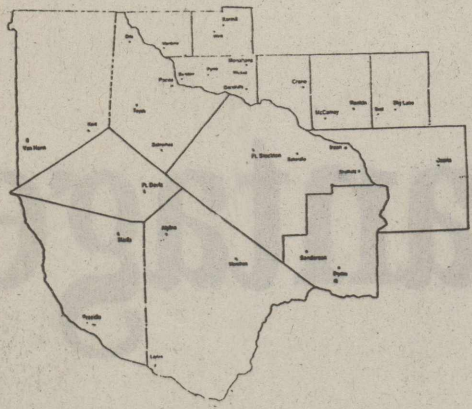
