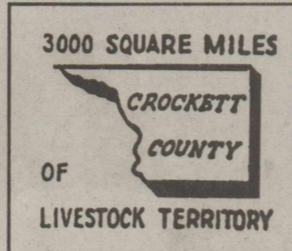

Extension Of I-27 Supported By Mexico Officials

OJINAGA, Chihuahua, Mexico - The West Texas Transportation Alliance and the Midland-Odessa Transportation Alliance gained a powerful ally in its bid to secure the extension of Interstate 27 through West Texas.

Gov. Francisco Barrio Terrazas of the Mexican state of Chihuahua voiced his strong support for extending I-27 through Midland-Odessa to a point near Fort Stockton during a meeting with representatives of MOTRAN and WTTA in Ojinaga, Mexico.

Gov. Terrazas pledged full support of the project, indicating he would ask Mexican federal transportation officials to form a commission to help

in any way possible with the I-27 project.

Enrique G. Terrazas Torres, director of the General Office of Economic Development for Chihuahua, also expressed his complete backing for the far West Texas route. He urged that the groups from Mexico, WTTA and MOTRAN, work closely together to assure that the I-27 project benefits Ojinaga and Chihuahua.

The Texas and Mexican groups will maintain regular communications and create a structure to work together. Further meetings are also planned.

"We sincerely appreciate the overwhelming endorsement from our neighbors in Chihuahua," said Skip Nichols of Crane and chairman of WTTA. "We believe that this is an extremely important step in linking West Texas to Chihuahua.

"We are also especially appreciative of the warm greeting we received in Ojinaga. We value the many new friends we have made in Mexico."

"This is a giant step forward in our relations and we look forward to working with them. Their support is critical," said MOTRAN chairman Charles Perry. "It can only benefit the economic efforts of both Mexico and the U.S. as we begin to work more closely together."

The groups from West Texas also pledged to support Chihuahua's efforts to improve federal highway 16 from Ojinaga to Chihuahua.

Also attending the meeting were: Herb Myers, WTTA co-chairman from Presidio; Mayor Ann Bradshaw of Presidio; J.D. Faircloth of MOTRAN; Darlene Gifford, executive director of MOTRAN; and Fernando De La Rosa, international trade specialist with the Midland Hispanic Chamber of Commerce.

More than 150 officials from Ojinaga and the state of Chihuahua attended the meeting held at the national office of the chamber of commerce in Ojinaga.

TAAS Results Presented

Board members received a report of the results of the spring Texas Assessment of Academic Skills at their June 14 meeting. Assistant superintendent Ted Cotton presented the report along with an overview of the testing process.

For 10 years the state of Texas assessed minimum basic skills in reading, mathematics and writing, first with the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS) tests and then with the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) examinations. In the fall of 1990, a new criterion-referenced program, the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) was implemented. The testing program currently includes assessments of reading and mathematics at Grades 3-8 and 10, writing at Grades

4, 8 and 10 and science and social studies as benchmark tests at Grades 4 and 8. Benchmark tests are those assessments being administered for the first time this year. Because the exams are new, no standards are applied to them until the second year.

The focus of the TAAS test provides a shift from an assessment of minimum skills to an assessment of academic skills.

The grades assessed through the TAAS program have changed as the functions of the test have expanded. In Fall 1990 and Fall 1991, the TAAS was administered to students in Grades 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11 (exit level) and was intended primarily to measure the mastery of objectives. In Fall 1992

Civic Center Recognized For Outstanding Program

Ozona Civic Center was recently notified that it has received the 1994 "Outstanding Worksite" award for its summer youth employment and training program.

The local program was selected for the honor from approximately 125 sites in under the Concho Valley Council of Governments. The award is based on the reports of the summer counselor, Trini Barrientz, to Monette Molinar, director of the employment and training program for COG.

Garland Young has served as director of the civic center youth program since 1975. "To us, this is like winning the academy award," said Mrs. Young during a recent interview.

Youth participating in the program learn not only how to do a particular job, but also how to "be on time, to call if unable to come in, to be a member of a work team, to be mannerly and respectful," Mrs. Young said. The participants are taken to the bank and newspaper, to the Department of Public Safety office, courthouse and jail. "We take all the teens that don't get a job with another county agency. There are five youths participating in the program this summer."

The youth center at the civic center offers teens a place to go where they will be supervised. "They can play what they want. We do not hassle them here. At home and at school, teens must do what they must. Here they have the freedom to choose what they want to do," Mrs. Young said. The youth center is open to those going into eighth grade and all high school youth. A nominal \$1.00 fee covers the annual membership.

Head-on Accident Claims Two Lives

A head-on collision of pickups killed two West Texas men in Crockett County Tuesday morning. The accident occurred at 1:40 a.m. 7.8 miles south of McCamey of Hwy. 305. The drivers were the sole occupants of both vehicles.

Justin Ryan Lester, age 19, of McCamey was driving south in a 1992 Chevrolet pickup at a high rate of speed according to a spokesperson for the Texas Department of Public Safety. The pickup ran into the northbound lane, crashing head-on with a 1994 Ford pickup driven by Dean Rayford Sueltenfuss, 31, of Odessa.

Buster Lamb of Eldorado, Trooper David Martinez of Iraan, Trooper Richard Barton of Crane and the Upton County Sheriff's Department assisted by the McCamey Fire Department and Texas Department of Transportation.

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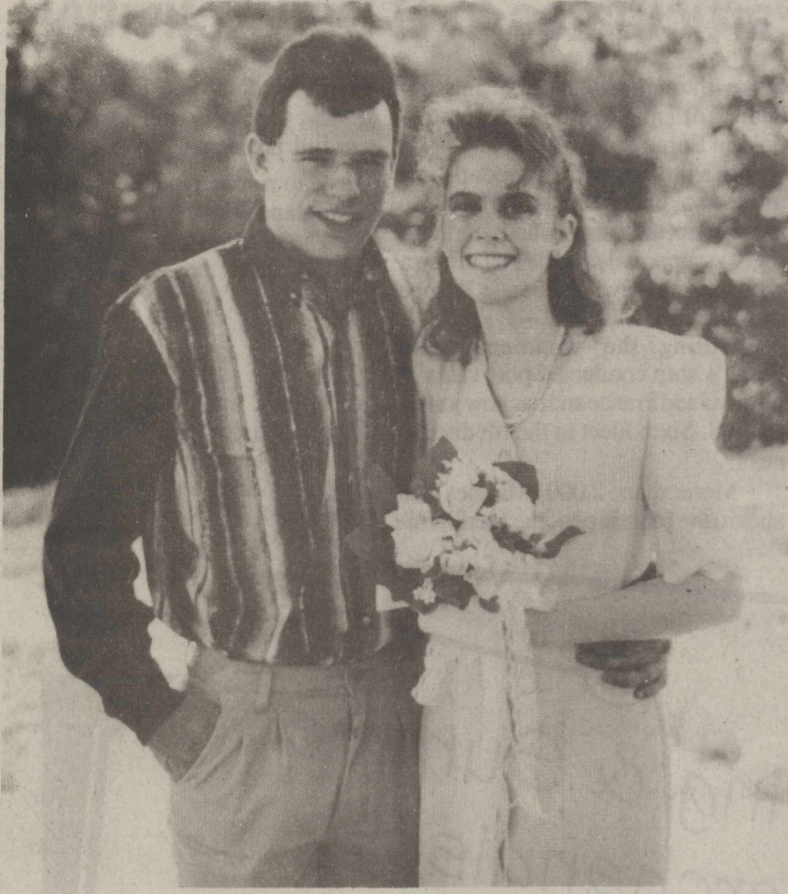

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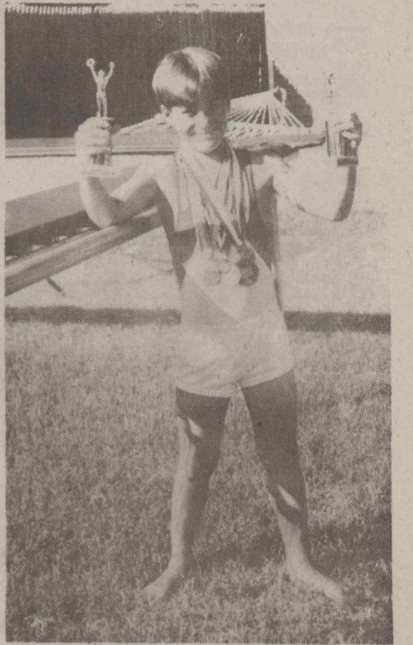
Nicholas Grandson Wins Awards

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Cpl. Lee Galan Participates In D-Day Activities

Marine Cpl. Lee D. Galan, son of Frank and Tommie Galan of Ozona, is deployed with the 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit, Camp Lejeune, NC, and recently participated in the commemoration of the 50th anniversary of D-Day.

Fifty years ago, Allied forces stormed the beaches at Normandy, France, in the greatest amphibious assault in history. Code-named Operation Overlord, D-Day marked the turning point in the European campaign of World War II. An Allied fleet of 2,727 ships and 2,606 landing craft transported the invasion force which

broke through the Nazi's "impenetrable" Atlantic Wall and dug a toe-hold in Europe.

In a little more than a month, one million soldiers were carried by sea to France with the weapons and enormous logistic support demanded by modern warfare; the drive to liberate Europe was not turned back.

During the commemoration Galan's ship conducted port visits in England and France and has now joined the U.S. Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean.

More than 2,000 Marines are aboard the four ships of the Mediterra-

nean Amphibious Ready Group. Today, the Navy and Marine Corps are full partners in joint operations, poised to respond quickly to crises in distant lands from the sea.

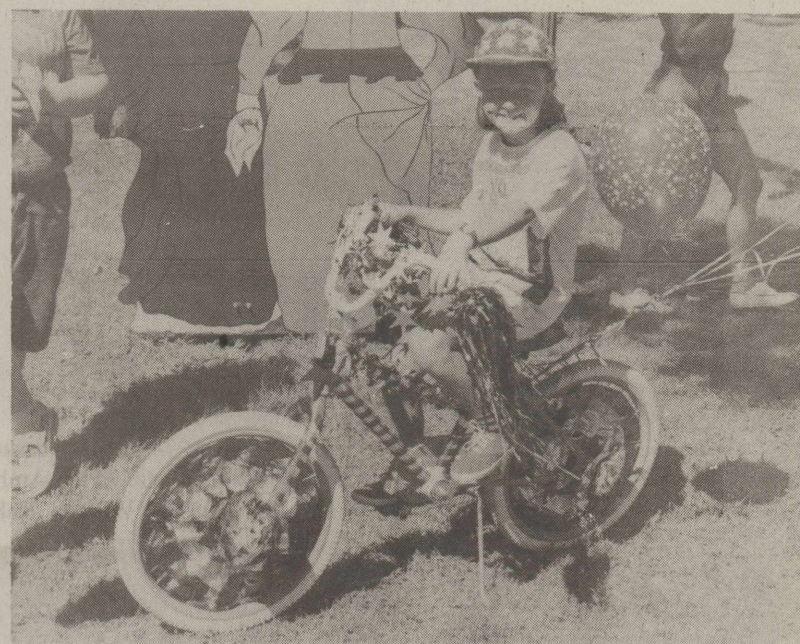

and Spring 1993, a transition year for the testing program, the TAAS was given to students in Grades 3, 7 and 11 (exit level) in the fall and to students in Grades 4, 8 and 10 (exit level) in the spring. In Spring 1994, the TAAS tests were administered to students in Grades 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 10 (exit level) to serve as a means of assessing both the mastery of objectives and student learning progress over time. Results for Ozona schools follow.

Grade 3:
Reading, 72 tested with 54 or 75% meeting minimum expectations. 36, 50%, mastered all objectives.

Mathematics, 71 tested with 45 or 63% meeting minimum expectations. 15, 21% mastered all objectives.

Forty, or 56%, met the minimum expectations on all tests taken.

Grade 4:
Reading, 49 tested with 27 or 55% meeting minimum expectations. 6, 12%, mastered all objectives.

Mathematics, 50 tested with 27 or 54% meeting minimum expectations. 8, 16%, mastered all objectives.

Writing, 49 tested with 42 or 86%

meeting minimum expectations and 13, 27%, mastering all objectives.

Twenty-three students, 43%, met minimum expectations on these tests.

The benchmark tests in science and social studies were taken by 49 fourth graders. These results were provided for each section of the test rather than overall as in other subjects.

Mastering the science tests are: acquire data, 82%; classify information, 98%;

Communicate data, 73%; interpret data, 84%; infer, generalize, predict, 73%;

Conduct investigations, 65%; draw conclusions, 47%;

Solving problems - applying knowledge, 57%

Percent mastering the social studies tests are: understanding social studies concepts and information - civic rights and responsibilities/American and other political systems, 69%; American and other economic systems, 73%; geographical concepts and information, 67%; historical concepts and information, 59%; sociological and cultural factors, 49%;

Interpret social studies data, 90%; analyze relationships in social studies/make generalizations/draw inferences, conclusions, 45%; use problem-solving/decision-making skills, 67%.

Grade 5:
Reading, 68 tested with 43 or 63% meeting minimum expectations, 11 or 16% mastering all objectives

Mathematics, 69 tested with 26 or 38% meeting minimum expectations, 8 or 12% mastering all objectives. Twenty-three or 33% met minimum expectations on all tests taken.

Grade 6:
Reading, 77 tested with 53 or 69% meeting minimum expectations and 10 or 13% mastering all objectives

Mathematics, 77 tested with 40 or 52% meeting minimum expectations and 5 or 6% mastering all objectives.

Thirty-seven, 48%, met minimum expectations on all tests taken.

Grade 7:
Reading, 60 tested with 46, 77%, meeting minimum expectations and 9, 15%, mastering all objectives

Mathematics, 61 tested with 44, 72%, meeting minimum expectations and 12, 20%, mastering all objectives. Thirty-nine students, 64%, met the minimum expectations on all tests taken.

Grade 8:
Reading, 72 tested with 59, 82%, meeting minimum expectations and 28, 39%, mastering all objectives

Mathematics, 72 tested with 46, 64%, meeting minimum expectations and 9, 13%, mastering all objectives

Writing, 71 tested with 62 or 87% meeting minimum expectations and 24, for 34%, mastering all objectives.

Forty-two, 58%, of the students taking these tests met minimum expectations.

Benchmark test results for 72 eighth graders tested in science and social studies follow.

Acquiring and classifying scientific data and information, 74% mastery; classifying information, 92% mastery

Communicating and interpreting scientific data and information - communicate data, 44% mastery; interpret data, 76% mastery; infer, generalize, predict, 86% mastery;

Conduct investigations, 78%; draw conclusions 31%

Solving problems - applying knowledge, 65% mastery

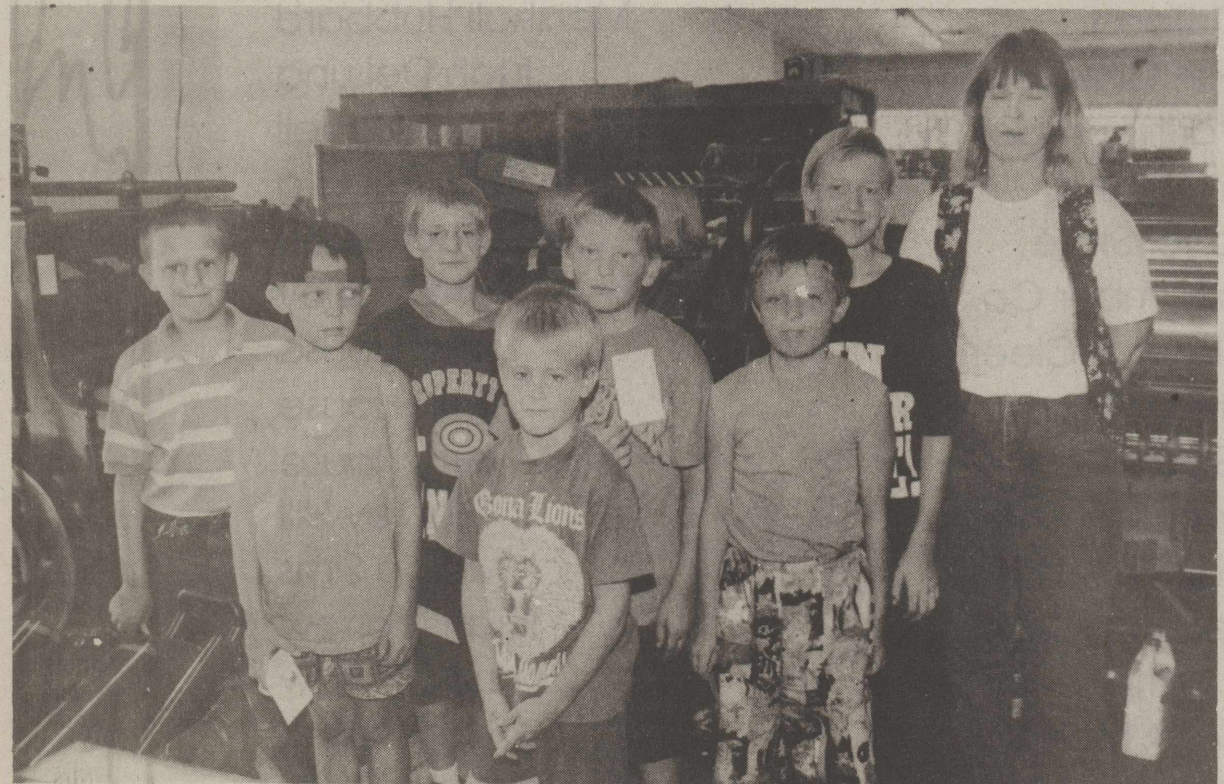
Social Studies mastery - understanding social studies concepts and information - civic rights and responsibilities, 89%; American and other economic systems, 69%; American and other political systems, 49%; geographical concepts and information, 81%; historical concepts and information, 82%; sociological and cultural factors, 51%

Evaluating social studies concepts and information - interpret social studies data, 93%; analyze relationships in social studies, 76%; make generalizations/draw inferences, conclusions, 67%; use problem solving/decision making skills, 69%

At Grade 10, exit level, 56 students were tested in reading and writing and 57 in mathematics. Reading results showed 43, or 77%, meeting minimum expectations and 23, 41%, mastering all objectives.

In writing, 48, 86%, met minimum expectations and 16, 29%, mastered all objectives.

Math results showed 31 students, 54%, meeting minimum expectations and 9, 16%, mastering all objectives.

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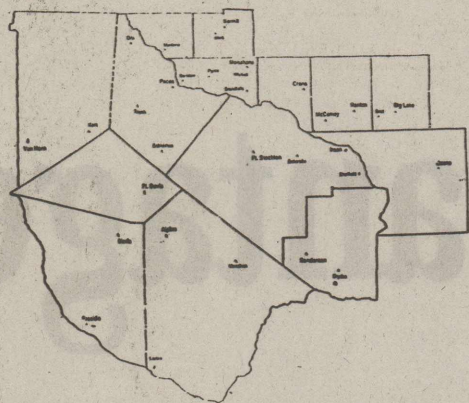

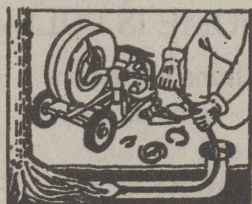

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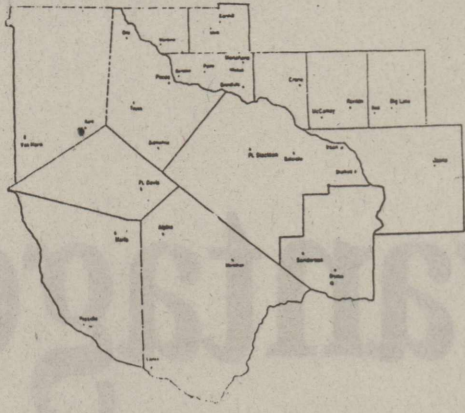
