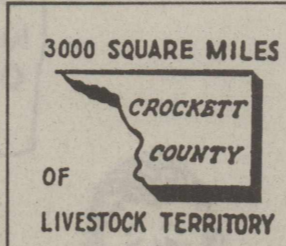

## Board Discontinues Program For 3-Year-Olds

During their regular monthly meeting that was held on Tuesday, July 12, the members of the Ozona School Board approved the discontinuance of the district's program for three-year-old students. The program, which has been operational for two years, was begun primarily to serve the needs of educationally and/or economically disadvantaged children; however, shortly after it was established, Federal Head Start funds were approved, and a program for this same group began serving Ozona children.

In board discussion concerning the elimination of the program for 3-year-olds, Superintendent Larry Taylor noted that the total costs of the school program had to be raised locally and that it served two groups of children on a half-day basis, whereas Head Start serves students on a full-day basis. "More importantly," Taylor said, "the educational needs of these students can adequately be met through the Head Start program, and we will not be in competition for kids".

John Curry, principal of Ozona High School, and David McWilliams, high school counselor, met with the board to present proposed changes in the high school gifted and talented program. Curry explained that presently freshman through senior gifted and talented students are served through one g/t English course in high school, and because of the various student maturity levels and abilities in the course, it has become difficult to meet all of the students' needs through that type of instructional arrangement.

His proposal was to allow ninth and tenth grade gifted and talented program students to take English 1 and English 2, respectively, with gifted and talented activities to be provided to them through their regular instruction. Eleventh and twelfth grade gifted and talented students, as well as other students who meet course criteria and who wish to enroll in the course, will be able to take Advanced Placement English. The goal of the Advanced Placement English for junior and

senior students will be to prepare these students to take both the College Board English Language and Composition and the College Board English Literature and Composition exams.

Curry explained that the College Board Advanced Placement Program gives students the opportunity to pursue college-level courses while still in high school and to receive advanced placement, credit, or both in college. A successful score on the College Board Placement Examination, usually taken when students are seniors in high school, allows them to receive credit for introductory-level courses in college, thus saving them from having to take these courses and saving them money for tuition fees.

The trustees approved Curry's proposal, which was also developed by Mr. McWilliams, Chesta Stuart (high school gifted and talented program teacher), and other members of his staff.

The school board also approved a change in the 1994-95 Ozona School Calendar as requested by the district improvement committee and presented by Supt. Taylor. The approved change moves a staff development day originally scheduled for Friday, Nov. 4, to Tuesday, Aug. 9. The superintendent noted that the Nov. 4 staff development day conflicts with a scheduled district football game at Van Horn in that many employees will need to leave early because of bus driving, band, and coaching responsibilities. Nov. 4 will become a school holiday, and Aug. 9 will become a full day for staff development. A copy of the new calendar is in this week's edition of The Stockman.

The issue of contracts with Reagan County I.S.D., McCamey I.S.D., and Iraan-Sheffield I.S.D. for Ozona student transfers was discussed at great length during the meeting. Supt. Taylor explained that the district does not have the authority to approve or disapprove requests from parents who live in the far outlying areas of Crockett County and who wish to transfer their

students to Big Lake, McCamey or Iraan. The school boards of the receiving districts have that authority, and they can either approve or disapprove the requests. Ozona has the responsibility to transport these students to its schools. It may enter into contracts with the surrounding school districts for tuition costs for the students.

Following this discussion, the board approved a renegotiated 1993-94 school year contract and a 1994-95 school year contract with Reagan County I.S.D. for transfer students. The Reagan County I.S.D. contracts are for tuition only, which excludes any attendance money received by Reagan County from the state. The members agreed to pay McCamey I.S.D. and Iraan-Sheffield I.S.D. a negotiated student tuition amount equivalent to Ozona's Weighted Average Daily Attendance (WADA) for maintenance and operation with the provision that McCamey I.S.D. and Iraan-Sheffield I.S.D. provide transportation for the students. If either district refuses to provide that transportation, the Crockett Co. CCSD will deduct transportation costs from the WADA.

WADA is the state's way of determining the needs and funding required by a district.

During the reports section of the agenda, maintenance supervisor Ray Don Myers informed the trustees that repair of leaking gas lines at Ozona Primary School has been completed, old air conditioners have been removed from the roof of Ozona Intermediate School, and painting and new lighting are being done at Davidson Memorial Gymnasium. In a maintenance related item, the board approved a \$21,400 bid from Silverhawk Mechanical for replacement of air conditioners located on the north wing of Ozona Primary.

Supt. Taylor gave a report on the upcoming Texas Association of School Administrators - Texas Association of School Boards Annual Convention to be held in Dallas in October, and he reported the employment of Tamara Kacmarynski as a fourth grade teacher in Ozona Intermediate School and Rick Bachman as a reading teacher in Ozona Middle School. He also informed the board he had accepted June 27 letters of resignation from John Cox, math teacher at OMS, and Adriana Cox, teacher of the program for 3-year-olds at OPS. During this report, Ozona Middle School Principal Tom Humber, Tamara Jones and Tonya Poindexter gave the trustees information concerning a schedule of classes for the 1994-95 school year.

The board also approved the following items: (1) a budget amendment to replace the electrical system at the Ozona High School woodshop; (2) a budget amendment for legal expenses; (3) a final payment to Jay Miller Construction Company for the Ozona High School Handicapped Accessibility Project; (4) the appoint-

## Youth Rodeo Slated For Aug. 5-6

Riding, roping, racing, parading and dancing will actually be the events to be looking forward to in two weeks. The dust will fly as the 38th Annual Ozona Youth Rodeo sponsored by Ozona Lions Club is held at the rodeo arena Friday and Saturday, Aug. 5 and 6.

There will be two performances held with only one go-round in each event. Rodeo performances will be Friday and Saturday nights beginning at 7 p.m. A slack performance will be held immediately following the regular performance on Friday night if needed. A parade will start at 5:30 on Saturday. Forms for the parade may be picked up at the Hillcrest Restaurant or call 915 392-3737 for more information. A dance at the pavilion with music by Sugar and Sam will start at 9 p.m. Saturday.

The rodeo will have three age divisions for girls and boys. There will be an 8 and under age division with the barrel and flag races. These two events

will cost \$10 per event to enter. The 9-13 age division will have four events for girls at \$15 per event. These events are barrel race, flag race, pole bending, and goat tying. The boys' events include barrel race, flag race and pole bending at \$15 per event plus breakaway roping and ribbon roping which will cost \$15 plus a \$6 stock charge. The 14-19 age division will have four events in the girls' division. These are: barrel race, flag race, pole bending and goat tying at \$15 per event. In the boys' division there will be four events including team roping, calf tie-down, ribbon roping and goat roping. Each entry will cost \$15 plus \$6 for stock charge.

Buckles will be awarded to the all-around girl and boy performers in each age division. These will be pre-

sented Saturday night after the performance. To qualify for all-around, the contestant must place in at least two events. In case of a tie, a coin flip will break the tie. Money pay-back will be given in each class and the checks will be mailed.

Minors and their parent, or guardian must sign a minor's release. For more detailed information, call 915 392-2896 or 392-3217 after 6 p.m.

Other events at no charge will include the 12 and under goat sacking, 8 and under boot scramble, and 6 and under stick horse barrel race (enter at pavilion). A prize will be given for the best dressed stick horse and possibly others.

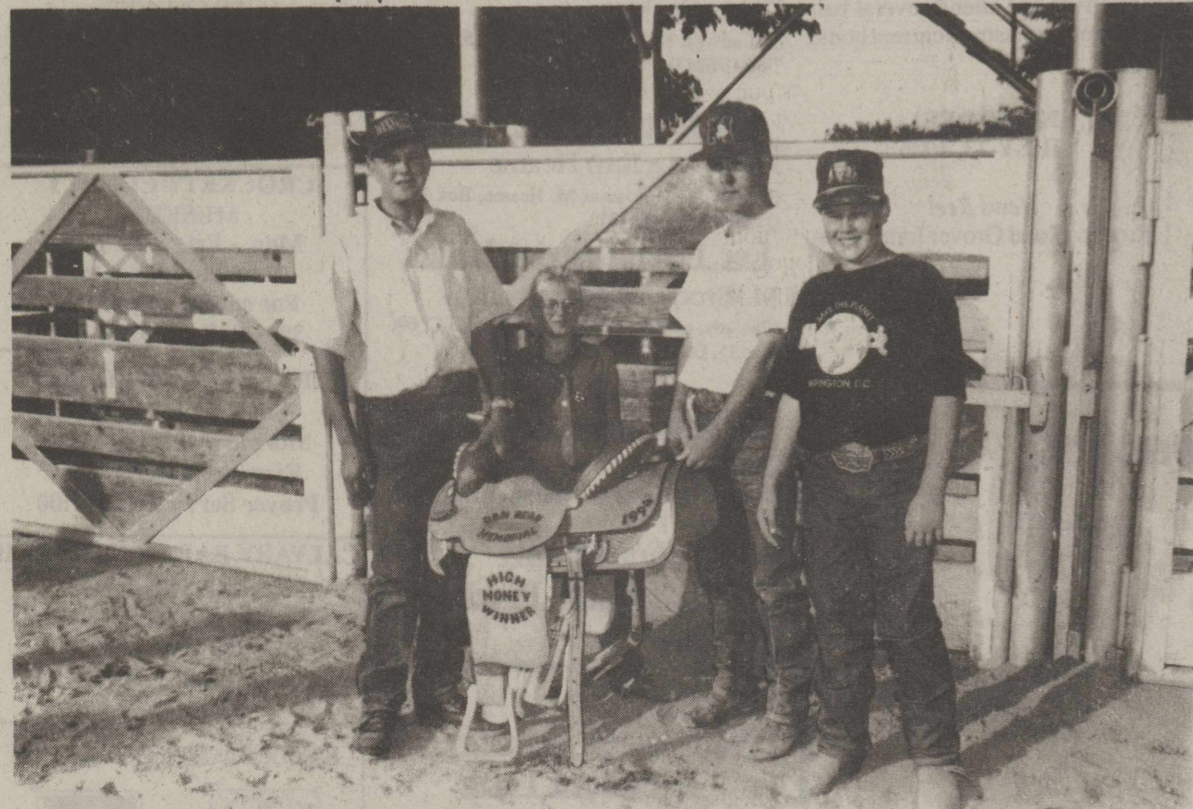
The 9th Annual Dan Bean Memorial Roping held July 16 resulted in some fast loops and happy winners. A total of 203 teams defied the hot weather and dusty conditions to compete in the annual event which was started in 1985.

Winning the saddle as the top money winner was Blake Belcher from San Angelo. Belcher also carried home with him \$1,055 in total winnings and a Gist belt buckle for winning the average. His winning partner, Kirby Jones, also from San Angelo, received \$487 in winnings and a belt buckle for his first place efforts in the average.

Team winners in the go round and splitting first and second places were: 1 Chuck Doebbler and Kirby Jones, 6.36 seconds \$325; 2 Shawn Pettit and Doug Wilson, 6.36 seconds, \$325; and 3 Rabbitt Rabiencault and Joey Campbell, 6.56 seconds, \$162.

Winners in the average on three head were: 1 Blake Belcher and Kirby Jones, 21.82 seconds, \$974; 2 Curtis Evans and Jim Phillips, 22.26, \$872; 3 Blake Belcher and Zane Bruce, 22.72; 4 Blake Belcher and Jimmy Steve Martinez, 22.77, \$488; and 5 Dane Driver and Will M. Black, 23.64, \$324.

Each year all proceeds from the roping are donated to a local charity. The Crockett County Public Library building fund will receive approximately \$400.

There will be prizes awarded to the winners, with a grand prize of a \$25.00 gift certificate. The pies will be auctioned at 1 p.m. Proceeds will benefit the Crockett County Library. There will be a sidewalk chalk drawing contest for children at 2 p.m., and a cake decorating contest at 3 p.m. Prizes will be awarded for both contests.

A Tae Kwon Do exhibition by students of Wagner Byler is scheduled for 3:30 p.m. Modeling by Princess Court members follows at 4 p.m.

The youth rodeo parade will begin at 5:30 p.m. behind the Hillcrest Res-

taurant. You can expect to see riders, horses, floats, decorated cars, and decorated stick horses.

The rodeo begins again at 7 p.m. with the presentation of the Princesses Court. Following the rodeo there will

be a dance. Sugar and Sam will provide the music.

A cowboy church service is planned for 10 a.m. Sunday at the arena. The Jay Miller Memorial Calf Roping begins at 1 p.m.

## Ranger Assigned To Ozona

New Texas Ranger Curtis Becker comes to Ozona with 13 years of experience in law enforcement. The Big Spring native began his career with the Stanton Police Department, then worked for the Big Spring Police Department before becoming a DPS trooper.

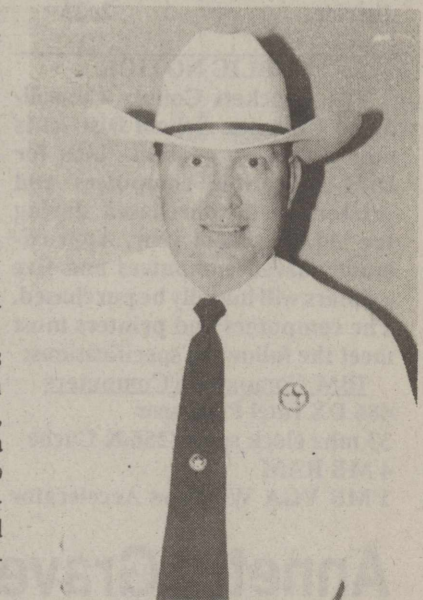
Becker was DPS sergeant in Lamesa before he made Ranger. "I always wanted to be a Ranger. That was my ultimate goal," Becker said. In order to become a Texas Ranger, you must come up through the Department of Public Safety ranks, Becker explained. Candidates take a written promotional test and the top percent then undergo an oral interview in Austin. Military service and college background are also considered.

Becker has been in the Army Reserve for more than 15 years.

"Everything is different (from the DPS). I've got to learn new ways of doing things," Becker said.

His responsibilities include the four-county area which includes Crockett, Sutton, Schleicher and Reagan counties.

Becker's wife, Charlotte, who is originally from Lampasas, was the

detective secretary of the Big Spring Police Department. Most of his family still lives in Big Spring, but his identical twin brother is a DPS corporal in Odessa.

"I'm glad to get the opportunity to be a Ranger and to stay in West Texas," Becker said. The Texas Rangers currently has 101 members.

## Annette Graves Hospitalized

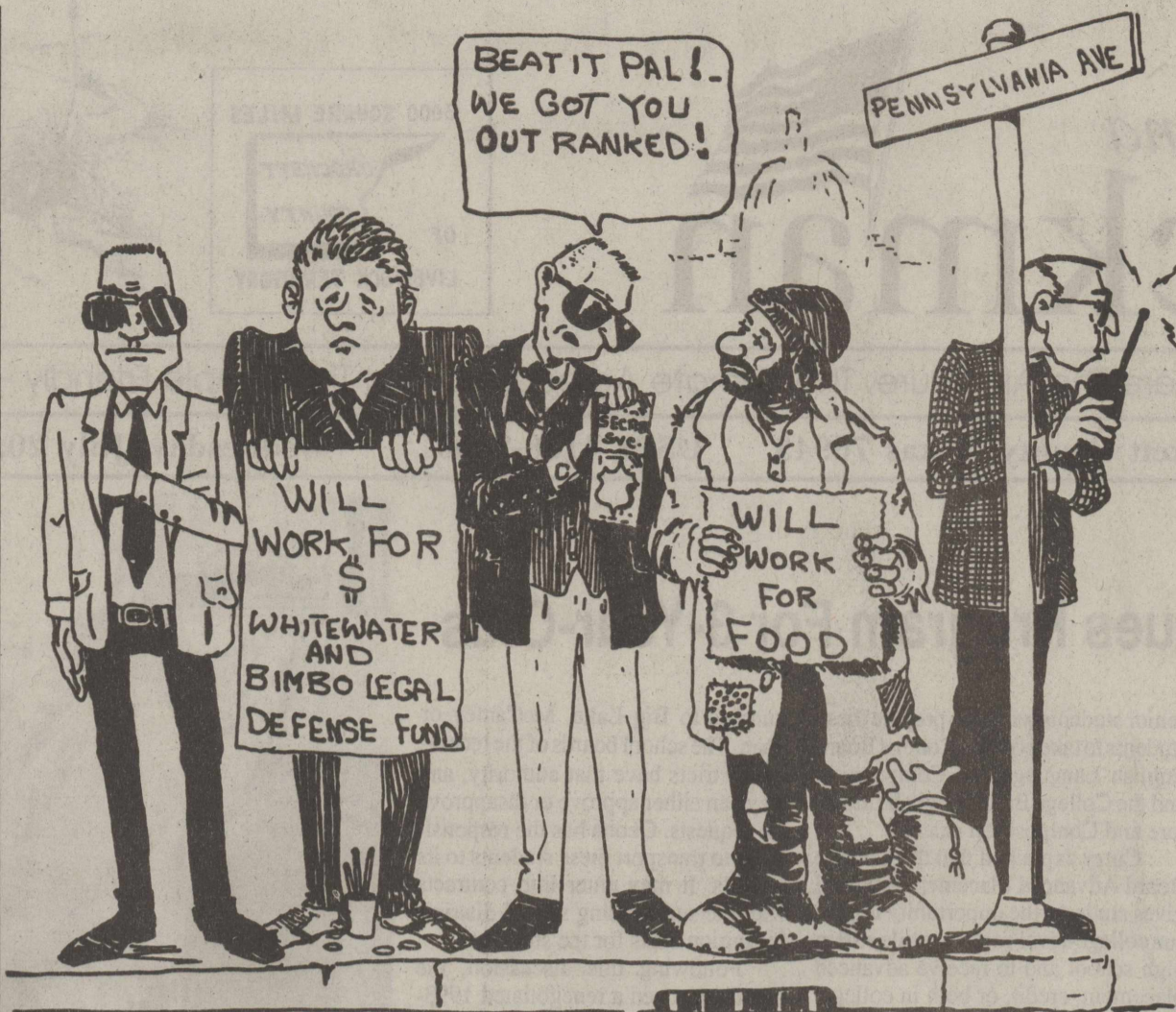
Annette Sue Graves of Ozona remained in a coma Tuesday following a one vehicle accident near Ozona Friday morning.

**June Oil And Gas Completions**

In June operators reported 338 gas, 327 oil, and 34 service completions, compared to 252 gas, 386 oil, and 36 service completions during the same period of last year.

The total of well completions recorded for 1994 year-to-date is 3,968, a seven percent decrease from the 4,255 recorded in 1993. Operators reported 1,484 holes plugged and 126 dry holes in June, compared to 809 holes plugged and 171 dry holes reported during the same period last year.

Texas preliminary April crude oil production averaged 1,477,854 barrels daily, down from the 1,569,167 barrels daily average of April 1993.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for April is 44,335,609 barrels, down from the 47,075,609 barrels reported in April 1993.

Crockett County produced

273,663 barrels of crude oil during the month of April, 1994.

Texas oil and gas wells produced 456,834,577 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in preliminary production for April, up .78 percent compared to April 1993's gas production total of 453,239,435 Mcf.

Texas gas production in April came from 170,655 oil, and 46,980 gas wells.

Crockett County produced 10,474,468 Mcf of natural gas for the month of April, 1994.

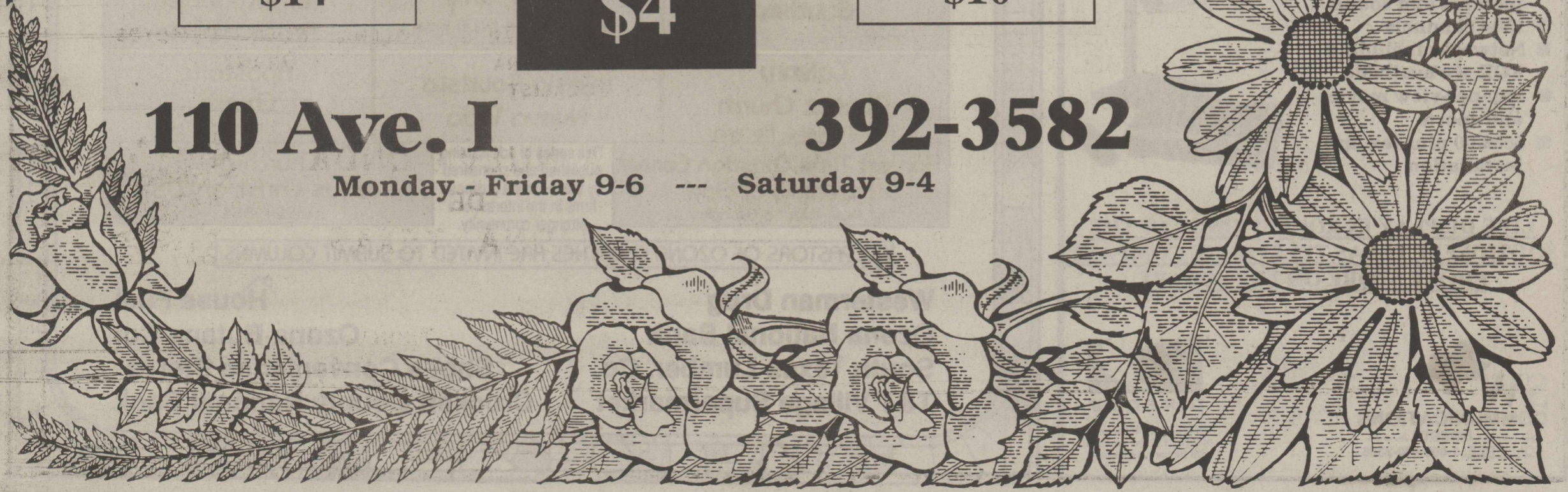

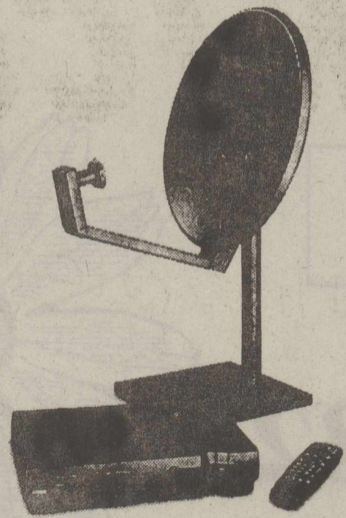

**Landowners Concerned About Fish And Wildlife's Proposed Warbler Critical Habitat For 33 County Area**

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife's proposed designation 33 Texas counties as "critical habitat" for the golden checked warbler has more serious ramifications than even the spotted owl in the Northwest, according to a spokesman for Texas Farm Bureau.

"The plan, if adopted, would require all federal agencies operating within the designated area to consult with the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service before any activity that might harm the species or its habitat," said Ned Meister, TFB commodity and regulatory director.

Meister's comments were made following a news conference called by State Sen David Sibley of Waco who stated his opposition to the wildlife agency's plan.

Sibley charged that the plan is an "unconstitutional taking" of land from private property owners, adding that designating the 33-county area as an endangered species locale for the warbler would devalue property and lower tax revenues.

Sibley said he will be in contact with U.S. Sens. Phil Gramm and Kay Bailey Hutchison to thwart the proposal.

Meister said the wildlife agency's proposed 20.5 million acres of land in Texas for the warbler constitutes the largest block of land chosen for a critical habitat in the nation's Endangered Species Act.

Meister sees the proposal as a "wake up call" to all citizens as it relates to full implications of the Endangered Species Act.

**Methodist VBS Marks 100 Years**

Continuing a tradition that began a century ago this year, the Ozona United Methodist Church will sponsor a vacation Bible school on July 27, 1994. All children in the community from the age of three through the sixth grade are invited to attend.

In May and June 1994, Mrs. D. T. Miles, wife of the pastor of the Methodist church in Hopedale, IL, organized the first known vacation Bible school in the United States. That school enrolled about 40 children and lasted four weeks. It was held in a public school building and an adjoining park.

After a century, the vacation Bible school is still a highlight of many children's summer vacation. "Beneath the storytelling tree; Parables Jesus told" is the theme for this year's school.

Your former spouse must be:  
**\*\*at least 62, and**  
**\*\*receiving Social Security retirement or disability benefits.**  
You can also get benefits if your former spouse is eligible for retirement benefits but not actually receiving them, if you have been divorced for two years or more. If your ex-spouse was receiving retirement benefits before the divorce, the 2 year period doesn't apply. If your own retirement benefit is higher than what you could receive on your ex-husband's record, you will be paid only your retirement benefit.  
If your former spouse is deceased, you may be eligible for Social Security benefits on his or her record if you're 60 or older. If you have a disability, you can get benefits as early as 50. In either case, your marriage must have lasted 10 years. You can receive divorced widow(er)s benefits at any age if you are caring for your former spouse's child who is under 17 years old or disabled. The 10 year marriage rule does not apply in these cases.  
If you remarry before age 60, you cannot get Social Security from an ex-spouse unless that subsequent marriage also ends. But, if your ex-spouse remarries, you may still be eligible for benefits on his or her record. However, you are not eligible for divorced widow(er)s benefits if your own retirement benefit is higher.
