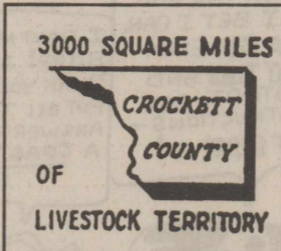

Lions Threaten In District Race

If returning lettermen are any indication of a successful football year, then the Lions should be at the top in '94. The 8-4 bi-district champion Lions are returning nine offensive and eight defensive starters this year.

Fans will see a solid squad, with positive factors such as plenty of experience at most of the positions and the team's overall size playing a big part in the Lions' quest for success.

Athletic Director Don Payne - in his eighth year as head coach of the Lions - has been in the playoffs four of seven years. In those seven years, Payne has forged a 38-37 record while keeping an emphasis on playing as many of his athletes as possible.

Stepping up and filling the shoes of last year's graduating quarterback Justin Castro will be 148-pound junior David Browne. Backing up Browne at the quarterback position will be senior Chris Sanchez, who will normally be a definite threat as a receiver, having caught the ball 35 times for 375 yards in the '93 season.

Utilizing a one-back offense, the Lions will feature returning senior running back Anthony Sanchez. Sanchez, even though missing part of last season with a broken collar bone, gained 645 yards in 123 tries. Two other running backs with experience are fellow seniors J. J. Lozno and Matthew Ortiz.

According to Payne, "Probably where we have the most experience coming back is at the wide receiver position." Returning three-year letterman Chris Sanchez, Jesse Garza and Tony Valencia provide good targets along with tight ends James Nelson and Adam Carroll. Travis Davidson has also been catching the ball in the spring and will provide another good target for Browne.

"Another area where we are in good shape is the offensive line - four out of five offensive linemen are back," said Coach Payne.

Probable starters in the trenches include Doug Meador at center, guards Elliott Barrera and Lance Jamerson, and tackles Justin Moran and Clay Westmoreland. Other linemen to watch are Luis Longoria and Patrick Sanchez, who will add depth to the front five.

The Lions run a "50 scheme" or 5-2 defense. Payne said, "The heart of the defense is back in the form of

Travis Davidson and Juan Trujillo at linebacker, along with the three down linemen - Julio Martinez, Eddie DeLuna and Andres De La Garza." At the defensive end positions are returning starters J. J. Lozno and Adam Carroll.

"At this point our biggest concern is the secondary - we have Chris Sanchez, Jesse Garza, Tony Valencia, David Browne, Joe Esparza and James Nelson all looking to fill those spots," said Payne.

Looking at the '94 football season, Payne is guarded, yet optimistic, and sees Reagan County as the first real test. "They don't appear to be as strong as the last two years, but I know they will still be a real good football team," the coach said. "That's who we will be preparing for from day one. After that, we will just take them one week at a time - hopefully preparing ourselves for district play."

The District 5-2A race is always interesting, and this year's race is no different. At this time, according to Payne, it looks like it will be hard to tell who will be the forerunner in the district, as the teams are evenly matched. "There are no frontrunners, considering Wall is out. We just want to be there (at the front) and have a

chance down the stretch to keep playing," Payne said.

Four new coaches join the staff this year. New faces on the high school campus are coaches Ronnie Casey and Brandy Gothard. In addition to high school football, Casey will serve as head tennis coach and coach junior varsity basketball. Gothard will assume training duties, coach track and assist in basketball.

Students and Ozona sports fans will see new coaches Deborah Ramon and Rick Bachman on the junior high campus. Ramon will coach basketball and track. Bachman will coach football, basketball and tennis.

Returning football coaches for the 1994 season are: Rod Schneider, Tommy Wilson, Keith Hall, Pete Maldonado, Rodney Johnson, Lee Gonzales and David Delgado.

Many helping hands are needed to keep a football team equipped and ready to play. Michael Mitchell is the manager for the team and JoLynn Vannoy will serve as student trainer.

The Lions will play their first scrimmage on Thursday, Aug. 18, at 6 p.m. in Robert Lee. The following Thursday, Aug. 25, the Lions host Crane, starting at 6 p.m. Be a fan and a good supporter and "Back the Lions".

Student Suspension Program Approved By School Board

In a special meeting of the Ozona School Board on Thursday, July 21, trustees approved the establishment of a districtwide in-school student suspension program to be used for students who need modification in their behavior at school. Only the campus principal can assign a student to the program, which will be located in a separate classroom adjacent to the auto mechanics laboratory on the high school campus and staffed by a paraprofessional aide.

The in-school suspension program will focus on student behavior modification and will be used for those students who are disruptions in the classroom. "These students certainly have a right to an education; however, by their actions, they do not have the right to disturb others who really want to learn," Superintendent Larry Taylor said. "We will work with the parents first to correct student discipline in the regular classroom program, but

if this fails and their disruptive behavior does not change, then in-school suspension will be available to the principal."

Classroom assignments for a student who is placed in in-school suspension will be set up, coordinated by, and graded by the student's regular classroom teachers. The students who are in the program will not be able to talk to each other, they will be isolated from other students on their main campus, and they will eat lunch when no other students are eating.

The trustees also voted to use norm-referenced testing (achievement tests) only in grades kindergarten through two next year because the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test is being converted into a norm-referenced test through which the district can obtain student achievement data without requiring students to take additional achievement tests. The TAAS test is currently being given to students in grades 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, 11 and 12.

A modification to the Ozona Middle School schedule for the 1994-95 school year was approved as recommended by the school's site-based decision making committee. The modification calls for all morning class periods to be reserved as academic classes, with physical education, athletics, and student elective classes to be held in the afternoon. According to Ozona Middle School Principal Tom Humber and his committee, research indicates that the prime student learning time is in the morning and changing the middle school schedule to coincide with this research will result

Commemorative Stamp Cancellation Part Of David Crockett Birthday Celebration

The U. S. Postal Service has authorized a pictorial cancellation in commemoration of Ozona's David Crockett Birthday celebration. The Ozona Post Office will have a temporary philatelic station set up for the celebration in the town square on Aug. 6.

"We will offer T-shirts, stamps and commemorative envelopes so that anyone wishing to send or receive a commemorative pictorial cancellation may do so," said Postmaster Ernie Jones.

This cancellation may only be used during the David Crockett Birthday Celebration on Aug. 6, 1994. Requests for these pictorial cancellations must be submitted or hand carried no later than the date of the cancellation. The unique part about the cancellation is that once the event is over, the hand stamp of the cancellation is returned to postal headquarters and destroyed, thus making the cancellation a valuable collectable item.

The Ozona Chamber of Commerce will also offer a cachet for sale at the celebration or by writing the chamber office at P. O. Box 1135, Ozona, TX 76943-1135. The cachet along with the pictorial cancellation will make the cancellation an even more unique and collectable item.

A cachet is a design on an envelope to commemorate a postal or philatelic event. Philatelic refers to stamp collecting. The commemorative stamp and the cachet were designed by the Ozona Chamber of Commerce.

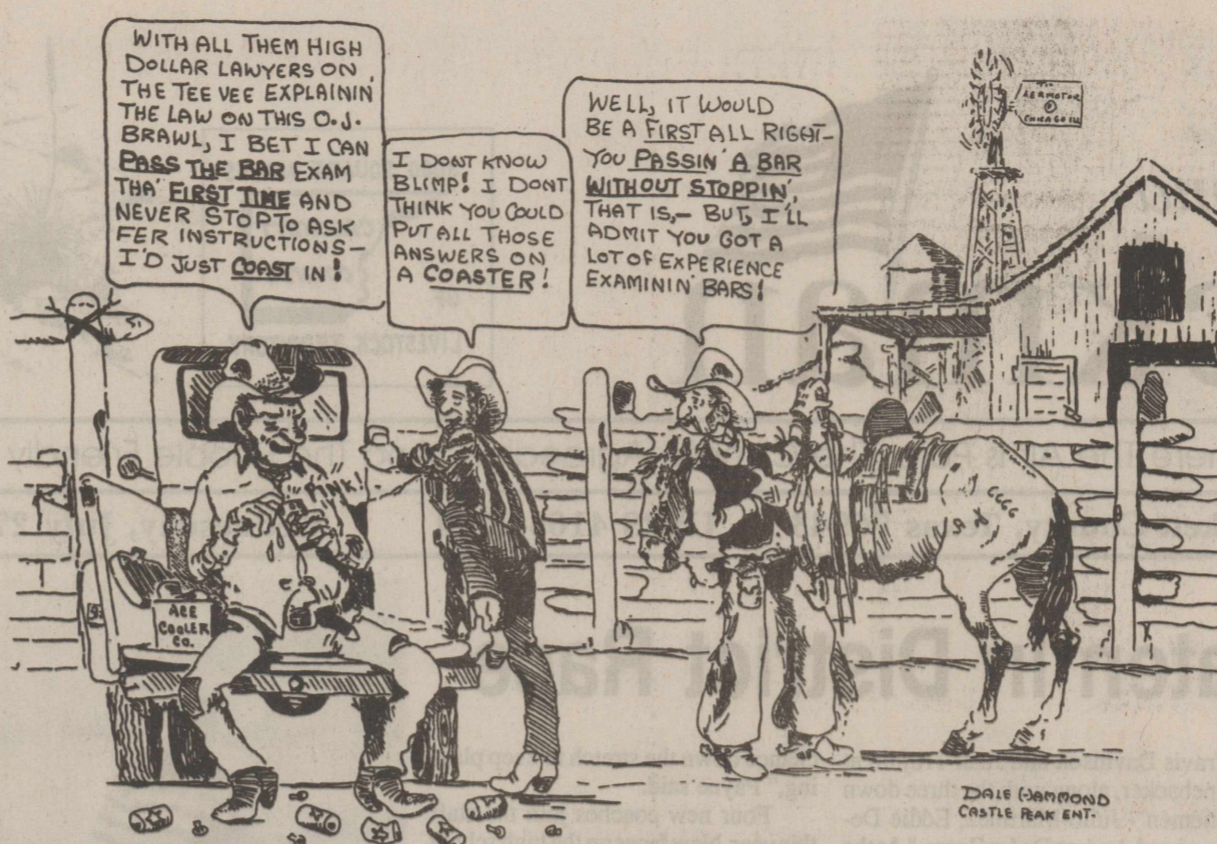

München

"The Magic of the Alps, Germany, Austria and Switzerland". This is the name the tour company used to advertise the wonderful trip that I have just made. Storybook villages and breathtaking scenery - it was all there. Zelma Johnigan made this trip with me.

We flew from DFW airport on a Boeing 747 jet - nonstop to Frankfurt, Germany. We changed planes there for our flight to Munich, Germany. We were met by our tour manager, and she took us to our hotel. Munich has a population of 1.4 million. A beautiful city with its parks and many flowers. In the evening we had a get-acquainted reception to get to know our traveling companions. There were 27 in our group, and Zelma and I were the only Texans.

Heading south from Munich the next morning, we passed through Alpine villages and small towns that looked as though they came right out of a child's storybook. The first thing we did on that exciting day in the German Alps was visit Linderhof Castle and its beautiful gardens. This

is one of several castles built by "Mad" King Ludwig, former ruler of Bavaria. It's set deep in an alpine valley. A sheer flight of fantasy, the product of the unbalanced young king's fevered imagination. Linderhof overpowers with its rich ornamentation. I have never seen so much gold. An elaborately carved grand piano covered with gold leaf. Two ornate fireplaces in each room.

Equally as interesting as the castle were the gardens, a landscaping masterpiece. At the top of one valley side stands the castle. Stretching down from it into the valley and up the slope on the other side is a vista of terraced gardens in the Italian style. Pools, cascades and an ornamental lake help create a spectacular effect.

Next, as we travel on, we are invited into a traditional, flower-laden chalet-style home of a local family in a picture-postcard Bavarian village. They smiled and seemed friendly; however I couldn't understand a word. Several in our group spoke German.

Then we went on to the most famous village of all - Oberammer-

gau. We strolled down the main street, where it seems that every shop sells only woodcarvings. The decorated houses were most interesting. We were told that artists specializing in this medium paint colorful scenes on the exterior plasterwork of the houses. They demonstrate their occupants' status, taste and pride of ownership and delight the passerby. The paintings may depict animals, a saint, a fable, a nursery rhyme, woodland scenes or a well-known story such as Hansel and Gretel.

Next we toured the Passion Play Theater that was specially designed for the reproductions of the famous play that takes place every 10 years. We viewed the costumes and the props (including the cross and crown of thorns used for the crucifixion scene). This play originated more than 350 years ago. I know several local people who have seen the play.

We returned to Munich in the afternoon and went to St. Mary's Square where the chimes of bells on the city hall played at 5 o'clock. High on the tower - doors opened and fig-

ures came out and danced. The top door opened last and a rooster came out - flapping his wings and crowing. This was the end of the working day, and many made their way to meet friends at a beer hall - we were told. Our tour manager walked us through a large beer hall - it was full of people, and the mugs or steins would hold a quart or more.

That night we had dinner in one of the city's many Bavarian beer halls - the music and food were good.

I will try to write more next week about our trip. These are my thoughts and impressions of the places we visited. I'm sure each one on the tour would tell a different story.

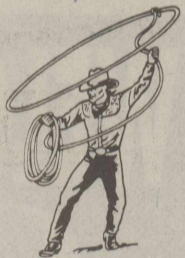

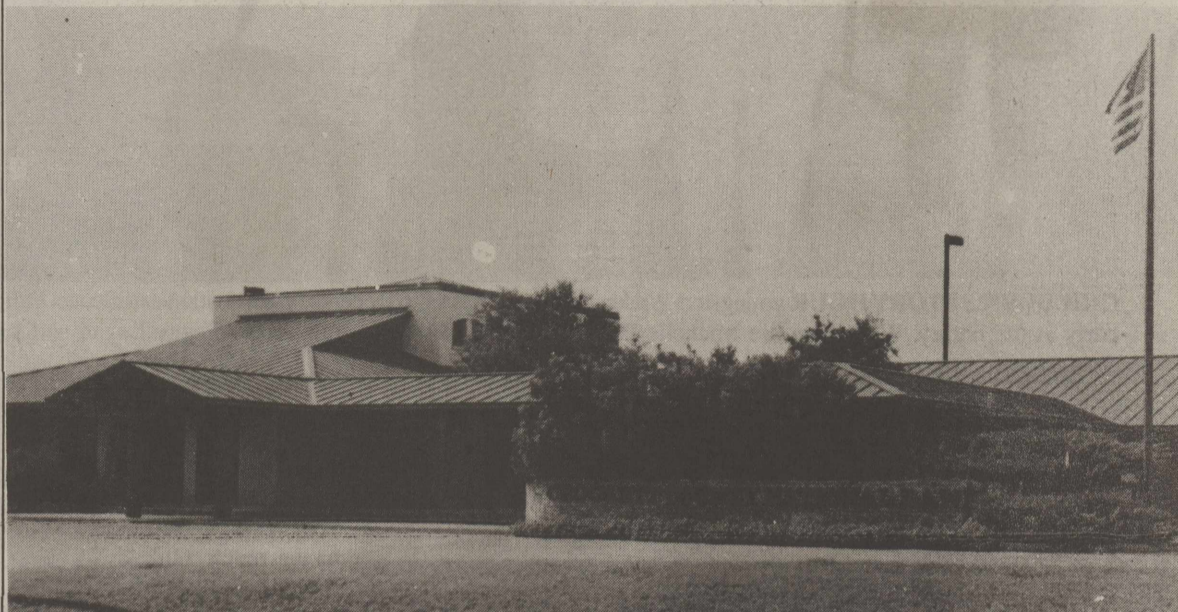

Thompson Promotes Cattle Industry

Will Thompson recently completed a two-day training session under the National Cattlemen's Association to become a Myth Buster for the beef industry. Fort Worth Stockyards' Hotel was the site for the July 17-19 event.

The objective of the Myth Buster program, which began in 1991 in Idaho, is to train and equip a grassroots corps of industry spokespersons to be positive ambassadors for the cattle industry with public and thought leader audience. NCA's funding for the program comes from the Beef Promotion and Research Board. Texas has been a participant in the program since 1991.

As a Myth Buster, Thompson will be available for talks on such related subjects as beef safety, nutrition/health, environment, animal welfare and economics. In addition to talks, he will have printed information and videos available for teachers, school groups and others. Myth Busters conduct 12 activities during the year following their training.

The difference between this program and any others currently available in the industry is the commitment and follow-up from the participants, the state and NCA. The participants commit to conducting positive activities on behalf of the industry, but with the knowledge that they will be supported. NCA and the state are committed to supporting trained Myth Busters as long as they are willing to remain active. Thirty-one states participate in the program.

Annually, 18 to 20 people are trained as Myth Busters in each participating state. To date, more than six million people have been reached through the program.
