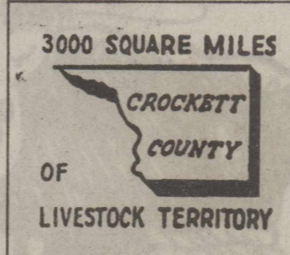

## Miss Vera Baker Celebrates 60 Years In Business

The Dallas television cameras rolled (WFAA Channel 8 and rebroadcast later on Midland's KMID Channel 2) as Vera Baker performed her magic beauty tricks on customer Louise Taliaferro.

Her hands gently massaged Mrs. Taliaferro's scalp as she shampooed and then rinsed the hair over a large porcelain basin. As she performs her magic, it becomes evident that Miss Vera's customers are part of her family. During the 60 years that she has been in business, the beautician has served generations of Ozona families.

Though firmly anchored in the present with her business, Miss Vera recently reminisced about her start in 1934 at Sellers Beauty College in Fort Worth.

Miss Vera first moved to Ozona in 1912 with her father, Frank Taylor, who ranched on the Beaver Lake Ranch near Juno. "Papa helped me go to school, as my mother died before I finished." Her mother's death meant an interruption in her schooling at Sellers to obtain her license. Her daughter, Jean, (now Mrs. Eddie Bower) stayed with her father while Miss Vera completed her training in Fort Worth. Following her schooling Miss Vera went to work for Pat Brown in late 1934. Shampoos and sets then cost \$1.75. Brown employed Miss Vera for the next three to four years, and then decided to sell her business. The new owner already had her own operators.

Close friends offered to help Miss Vera go into business for herself. She declined their financial assistance, and opted instead to call the beauty supply places and see if they would extend credit to the budding entrepreneur. She obtained the credit and went into business in her present location in a room in her home.

The equipment has changed markedly from the beginning, when the old type spiral wrap mashing was the rage. Curlers were attached to a machine overhead. The next innovation in the business was the crococo machine. Similar to electric rollers,

wave clips suspended from a machine were heated electrically and clamped on the hair with a pad. The curlers would then spew a chemical which would curl the hair.

She has resisted the blow dryer, curling iron rage so prevalent in many modern salons, opting instead to use her tried and true wire rollers and hot dryer method.

During her moment of stardom in front of the television camera, Miss Vera was able to share it with her family, daughter Jean and granddaughter Joan (Mrs. Charles Martin) who were here visiting.

Last week, Tumbleweed Smith was in Ozona to interview the beautician for his radio show. Miss Vera does not yet know the time and date the interview will be broadcast.

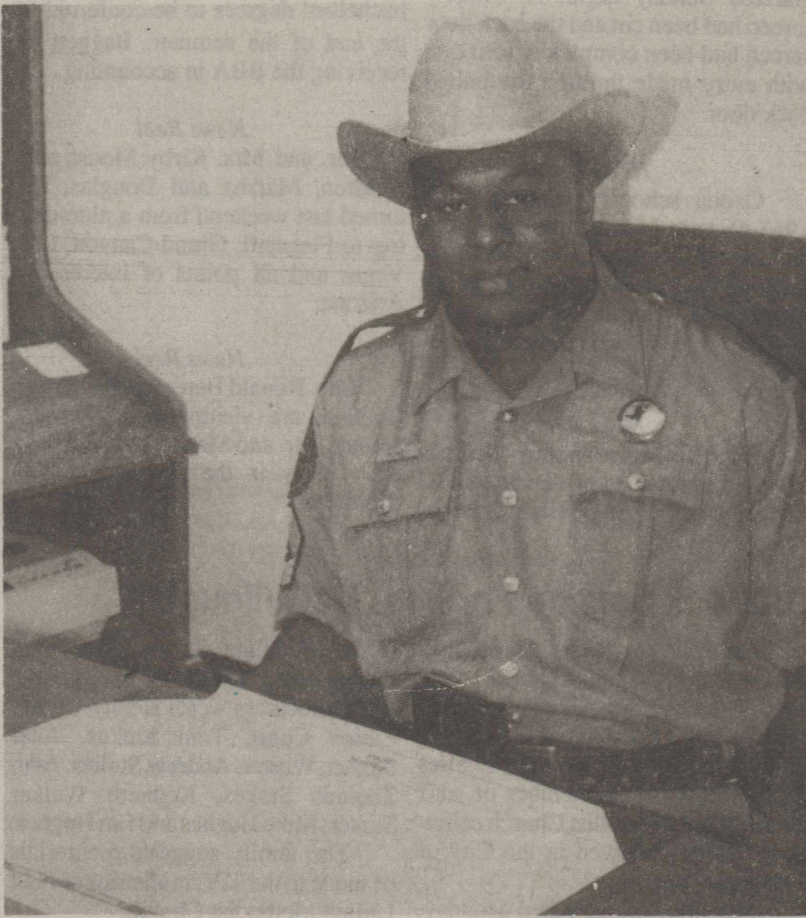
Though her business has slowed a bit in recent years, Miss Vera still enjoys visiting and catching up with her customers' lives. Their joys and sorrows become a part of her active life. The business has changed in that today's customers merely want a "good hair cut. They want to be able to blow dry their hair and go. They don't want a classic style. Young women don't have or take the time to go to the beauty shop. They do their children's hair at home."

Born in 1900, the 90's plus beautician has been blessed with excellent health. "I've never been in a hospital," she said. "Jean was born so long ago, when doctors still came to the house for a home birth. The Lord has been good to me. I've really been blessed with good health. I've visited hospitals to see friends who are ill, but that is as close as I want to get to doctors and hospitals."

The long-time Dallas Cowboys fan still treks to Dallas to visit her daughter, Jean, and granddaughter, Joan, though these days she flies from San Angelo instead of making the long drive. Her motor travels consist of going to the post office and around town. Miss Vera and her trusty Impala both get good mileage, and Ozona ladies are all the more fortunate for having someone like Miss Vera who can make their world more beautiful.

## Ybarra Receives Adopt-A-Highway Recognition

George Ybarra, maintenance technician with the Texas Department of Transportation in Ozona, was recently nominated to represent the 15-county San Angelo District as the outstanding maintenance section employee for Keep Texas Beautiful Inc. "Litter Glitter" award. This annual award goes to the maintenance section employee who has done a superior job working with their Adopt-a-Highway groups and promoting the program in their area. While Ybarra was not selected the first-place winner by KTB for the "Litter Glitter" award, he re-

ceived a certificate and a letter of appreciation from TxDOT Executive Director Bill Burnett, P.E.

Ybarra is responsible for keeping six Adopt-a-Highway groups in Crockett County supplied with safety vests and trash bags, picking up the bags after a group cleans up, notifying groups when their areas are to be mowed, and presenting certificates to groups that have fulfilled their two-year commitments to the program.

The Adopt-a-Highway program saves taxpayers nearly \$4 million in litter pickup expenditures every year.

## Lions Battle To 0-0 Tie With Owls

The Ozona Lions won the battle but lost on the scoreboard as they played to a 0-0 tie with the District 8-3A Reagan County Owls Friday night in Lion Stadium. The Lions dominated both offensively and defensively in a game that was riddled with penalties.

The Lions had three chances to score, of which two were touchdowns, both being nullified by penalties. A 23-yard field goal try by Bryan Mendez in the fourth quarter just missed the uprights.

Head Coach Don Payne said he was especially pleased with the effort of all the kids as they hustled from the opening kickoff to the end. He was especially proud of them as he said, "I can't pick out anyone that is exceptional - they all gave everything they had."

The Owls received the opening kickoff and returned the ball to their 33-yard line. Lion defensive safety Chris Sanchez intercepted a pass but a roughing the passer penalty gave the ball back to the Owls with a first and ten on the 50-yard line. The Owls pushed to the Lion 20-yard line, but a penalty and good defense by the Lions forced the Owls to punt.

The Lions took the ball on their own 8-yard line and two passes of 21 and 10 yards to wide receiver Jesse Garza helped get them out of a hole. Ozona recovered from a penalty and quarterback Chris Sanchez picked up 14 yards on a run. On the next play the Lions fumbled the ball to the Owls on the Lion 39-yard line. Two plays later, Chris Sanchez intercepted a pass.

Senior running back Anthony Sanchez made several short runs, and a 20-yard pass to Tony Valencia put the Lions in good shape until Chris Sanchez had a pass intercepted. Aggressive defense by the Lions forced the Owls to punt the ball. The Lions ended the first quarter with a five-yard loss by Chris Sanchez and no score in the game.

The last three quarters of the game essentially were similar to the first quarter with both teams having difficulty getting into the end zone. Ozona was able to move the ball, but fumbles and penalties prevented the Lions from capitalizing on the Owls' mistakes.

Coach Payne was concerned with the offense's timing and the need of correcting mistakes and working on blocking assignments. On the whole Payne said, "I thought we moved the ball pretty well."

The Lions' greatest threat to score came in the fourth quarter with the drive starting from their own 29-yard line. Good effort by the front line in opening holes for running backs Anthony Sanchez, Bryan Mendez and quarterback Chris Sanchez with pass completions to Tony Valencia and Jesse Garza set up a 23-yard field goal try.

Junior linebacker and field goal kicker Bryan Mendez attempted a 23-yard field goal with approximately four minutes left in the game. To the fans' and Lions' dismay, the ball missed the uprights by a few feet.

The Lions' defense, led by senior Travis Davidson, held off two other offense attacks by the Owls, thus allowing the Lions one last chance to score. The offense started its drive from the Owls' 47-yard line with about one minute left in the game. An incomplete pass and a penalty forced a desperate throw toward the end zone, but it was intercepted by an Owl de-

fender.

Although players, coaches, and fans were disappointed with the outcome, people should be proud of the unending and concentrated effort of the team. Mistakes may have been made, but exceptional play by Chris Sanchez, Anthony Sanchez, Matthew Ortiz, Jesse Garza and Tony Valencia proved that Ozona's offense is to be reckoned with.

In looking at the game statistics, Ozona outshined Big Lake in all areas except one - penalties. Penalties and fumbles could tell a story all on their own with Ozona receiving a total of 125 yards in 13 penalties and having four fumbles - losing two of them. The Owls received eight penalties for 82 yards. A total of four fumbles were charged to the Owls with the loss of one.

In summarizing the game, one can only look at the statistics to see who actually won the game - Ozona. Coach Payne could not have said it any clearer than, "We controlled the game from start to finish. We will stay with what we have (offensively)." He went on to say that the coaching staff was disappointed in the mistakes and mental errors. The errors are correctable ones, and they will work to correct them.

The Lions' offense amassed a total of 318 yards with 186 of those yards coming in the air from quarterback Chris Sanchez on 15 of 29 passes completed. Matthew Ortiz led the backs with 39 yards on eight carries.

The Owls' statistics actually show how well the Lions' defense played - great. After several years of the Owls dominating the Lions, Ozona wreaked havoc by practically stopping the Owls' offense cold. The Lions made 49 tackles and held the Owls to only eight first downs and a total of 93 yards gained. Travis Davidson led the defense in tackles with eight and knocked down two passes followed by Bryan Mendez with seven tackles. J. J. Lozano, Bryan Mendez, Tony Valencia and Adam Carroll each forced a fumble. Tony Valencia knocked down one pass, and Chris Sanchez intercepted two passes, but one was called back due to a penalty.

Coach Payne was pleased with every phase of the defense - linebackers, secondary and the linemen. They all hustled to the front (line) well and put some great licks on the Owls after getting there.

Payne notes that in this week's game with Sonora, fans will see a much improved team over last year. The Broncos are big and strong, and Ozona should be able to match up with them.

The Broncos will probably be led by senior quarterback Jason Morley. In last week's game, Sonora lost two running backs to injuries - Gilbert Vara and Marcus Montez. Ozona will have their hands full with the replacement running back Adrian Mata who garnered 31 yards in seven carries in the fourth quarter of the Wall game.

Ozona varsity cheerleaders will lead a pep rally at 3:45 p.m. on Friday in Davidson Gym. The Lions will play the Broncos at 8 p.m. in Sonora, so go and "Back the Lions".

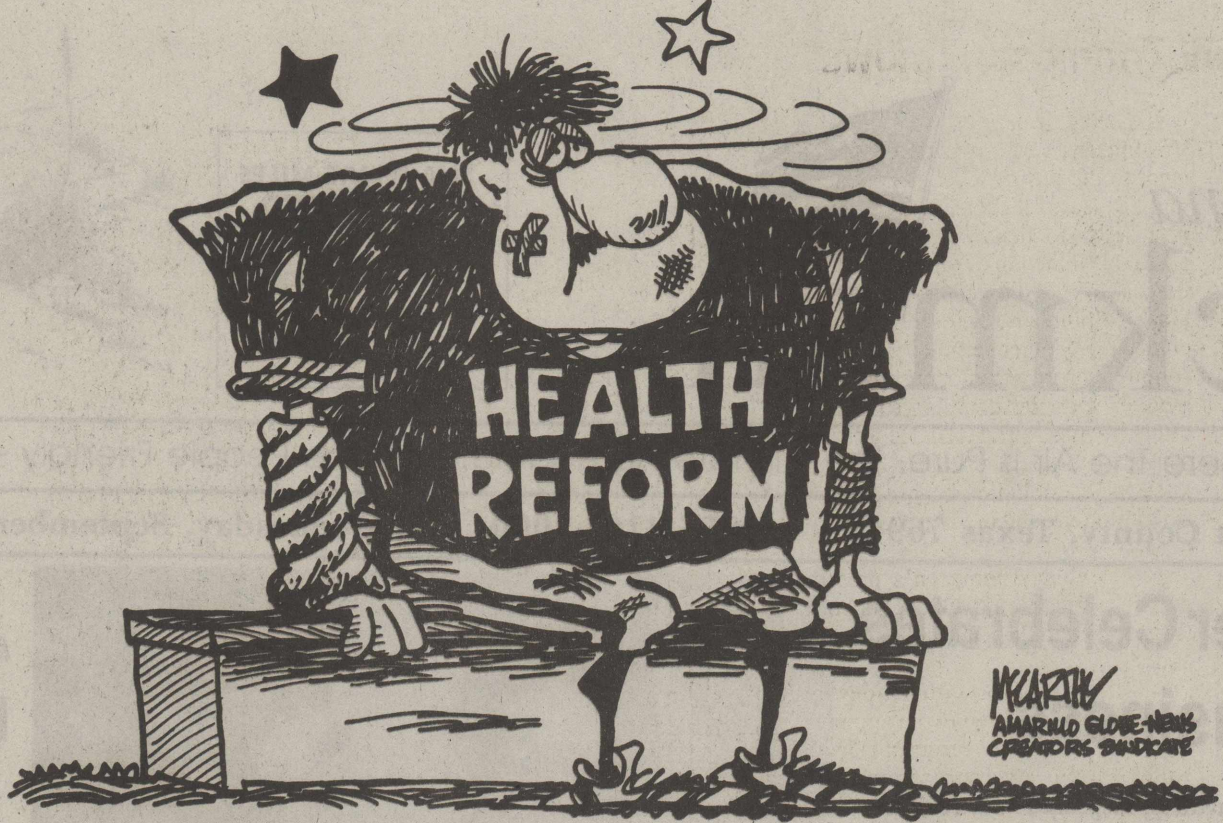

### Where's The Beef? Will Thompson Knows

Even though he's a self-proclaimed "rookie," Will Thompson knows his business. Thompson spoke to members of Alpha Alpha Mu on Monday, Aug. 29, as a representative of the Texas Beef Industry Council. As part of National Cattlemen's Association program, Thompson attended a training session in June on several aspects of the beef industry. He must now give a total of 12 educational presentations in the community over the course of the next year. Alpha Alpha Mu members hosted his first presentation.

Thompson's topic was safe food handling, specifically on meat. Three basic principles apply: cool it, clean it, cook it. According to Thompson, ground meat and poultry are more perishable than most foods. In the danger zone between 40 degrees and 140 degrees F, bacteria can multiply rapidly. Keeping meat products cold keeps them safe from bacteria.

Keeping everything clean, including hands, utensils, counters, cutting boards and sinks, also wards off bacteria. One common mistake, Thompson said, is putting cooked meat on the same platter it was on before it

was cooked.

Finally, Thompson said cooking meat to the proper level of doneness will kill harmful bacteria. One of the best ways to determine if meat is cooked is if the juices run clear and in the case of beef, the center is no longer pink. Thompson's presentation included many other helpful tips, and he supplied sorority members with informative brochures detailing safe handling of meat products. He is also available to speak on other beef-related topics including health and nutrition, environment, and beef economics.

Following Thompson's presentation, members enjoyed beef kabobs (properly handled and cooked, of course).

Moves to other communities by two members resulted in the appointment of two new officers: Diane Anderson will serve as recording secretary for the year while Jackie Necessary will assume the duties of vice president. This year's president is Sally Roane.

Monday's meeting was hosted by Tanya Olive and Melissa Glosson. The next meeting will be held Sept. 12.

### Confusion About Dove Bag Limits, Identification

Each fall some hunters get confused about daily bag and possession limits for mourning doves and other species. Hunters also should be able to identify the species of dove they are hunting.

Ron George, deputy chief of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's wildlife branch, said a daily bag limit is defined as, "the maximum number of the indicated species that legally may be killed, taken or possessed during the permitted shooting hours in one calendar day."

A possession limit is defined as, "the maximum number of the indicated species permitted by regulations to be possessed by one person at the end of the second day's hunt or at any other time," he said. "A lawful possession limit of migratory game birds usually is twice the daily bag limit. A person cannot legally shoot a daily bag limit of doves in the morning, then go out in the afternoon and shoot more doves."

Texas has three native species of doves which may be legally hunted. Most people easily recognize the mourning dove, which occurs statewide, with the long, pointed tail, but many people in Central and North Texas have never seen white-winged and white-tipped doves.

Whitewings, which are currently increasing their range into Central and North Texas, have distinctive white stripes across each wing and a squared-off tail. Whitewings should not be confused with white-tipped doves, which are even larger in size and found south of a line from Corpus Christi to

Laredo. White-tipped doves look like a large, slow-flying mourning dove. The most distinctive feature of a whitetip is its bright, rusty-red coloration on the underside of its wings.

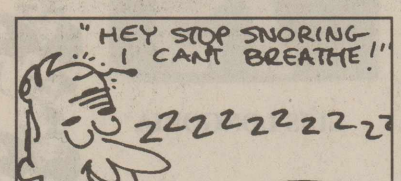

### Project Range Care Symposia Scheduled

Three symposia are scheduled for producers to learn how to use stocking rate to increase short term cash flow, guarantee long term ranch profitability, optimize livestock and wildlife productivity, lower risk, reduce sediment and non-point source pollution, and improve rainfall effectiveness according to Dr. Allan McGinty, Texas Agricultural Extension Service. These symposia are scheduled for September 21, 1994, at Hondo, Sept. 26, 1994, at Fort Stockton, and September 28, 1994, at Stephenville as part of a state-wide program entitled "Project Range Care".

These programs are based on needs identified from a 1990 Texas rancher survey. Only 20 percent of Texas ranchers use quantifiable techniques to monitor and improve grazing management/stocking rate decisions. Nearly half (45%) of Texas ranchers do not make seasonal adjustment of livestock numbers.

After 174 years of grazing domestic livestock on Texas rangelands, ranchers are still struggling with stocking rate decisions. Dr. Barron Rector,

a speaker at the symposia, considers this an important reason ranchers need to attend these programs. They will learn "techniques to help plan and monitor your grazing resource using your most valuable asset, your experiences".

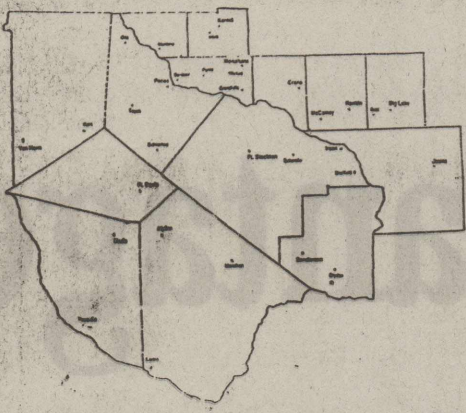

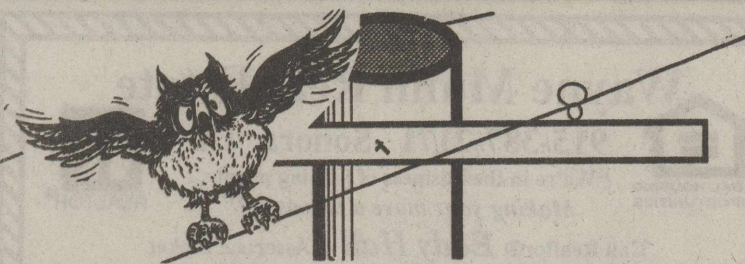

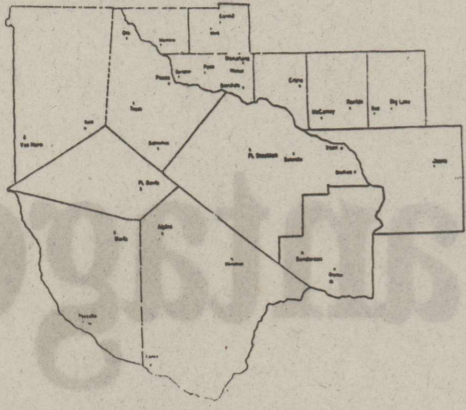
