# **Lions Battle To 0-0 Tie With Owls**

The Ozona Lions won the battle but lost on the scoreboard as they played to a 0-0 tie with the District 8-3A Reagan County Owls Friday night in Lion Stadium. The Lions dominated both offensively and defensively in a game that was riddled with penal-

The Lions had three chances to score, of which two were touchdowns, both being nullified by penalties. A 23-yard field goal try by Bryan Mendez in the fourth quarter just missed the uprights.

Head Coach Don Payne said he was especially pleased with the effort of all the kids as they hustled from the especially proud of them as he said, "I one. can't pick out anyone that is exceptional - they all gave everything they

kickoff and returned the ball to their 33-yard line. Lion defensive safety Chris Sanchez intercepted a pass but a roughing the passer penalty gave the ball back to the Owls with a first and ten on the 50-yard line. The Owls pushed to the Lion 20-yard line, but a penalty and good defense by the Lions correct them. forced the Owls to punt.

The Lions took the ball on their own 8-yard line and two passes of 21 and 10 yards to wide receiver Jesse Garza helped get them out of a hole. Ozona recovered from a penalty and quarterback Chris Sanchez picked up 14 yards on a run. On the next play the Lions fumbled the ball to the Owls on the Lion 39-yard line Two plays later, Chris Sanchez intercepted a pass.

Senior running back Anthony Sanchez made several short runs, and a 20-yard pass to Tony Valencia put the Lions in good shape until Chris Sanchez had a pass intercepted. Aggressive defense by the Lions forced the Owls to punt the ball. The Lions ended the first quarter with a five-yard loss by Chris Sanchez and no score in the game.

The last three quarters of the game essentially were similar to the first quarter with both teams having difficulty getting into the end zone. Ozona was able to move the ball, but fumbles and penalties prevented the Lions from capitalizing on the Owls' mistakes.

Coach Payne was concerned with the offense's timing and the need of correcting mistakes and working on blocking assignments. On the whole Payne said, "I thought we moved the ball pretty well."

The Lions' greatest threat to score came in the fourth quarter with the drive starting from their own 29-yard line. Good effort by the front line in opening holes for running backs Anthony Sanchez, Bryan Mendez and quarterback Chris Sanchez with pass completions to Tony Valencia and Jesse Garza set up a 23-yard field goal

Junior linebacker and field goal kicker Bryan Mendez attempted a 23yard field goal with approximately four minutes left in the game. To the fans' and Lions' dismay, the ball missed the uprights by a few feet.

The Lions' defense, led by senior Travis Davidson, held off two other offense attacks by the Owls, thus allowing the Lions one last chance to score. The offense started its drive from the Owls' 47-yard line with about one minute left in the game. An incomplete pass and a penalty forced a desperate throw toward the end zone, but it was intercepted by an Owl de-

Although players, coaches, and fans were disappointed with the outcome, people should be proud of the unending and concentrated effort of the team. Mistakes may have been made, but exceptional play by Chris Sanchez, Anthony Sanchez, Matthew Ortiz, Jesse Garza and Tony Valencia proved that Ozona's offense is to be reckoned with.

In looking at the game statistics, Ozona outshined Big Lake in all areas except one - penalties. Penalties and fumbles could tell a story all on their own with Ozona receiving a total of 125 yards in 13 penalties and having four fumbles - losing two of them. The Owls received eight penalties for 82 yards. A total of four fumbles were opening kickoff to the end. He was charged to the Owls with the loss of

In summarizing the game, one can only look at the statistics to see who actually won the game - Ozona. The Owls received the opening Coach Payne could not have said it any clearer than, "We controlled the game from start to finish. We will stay with what we have (offensively)." He went on to say that the coaching staff was disappointed in the mistakes and mental errors. The errors are correctable ones, and they will work to

The Lions' offense amassed a total of 318 yards with 186 of those yards coming in the air from quarterback Chris Sanchez on 15 of 29 passes completed. Matthew Ortiz led the backs with 39 yards on eight carries.

The Owls' statistics actually show how well the Lions' defense played great. After several years of the Owls dominating the Lions, Ozona wreaked havoc by practically stopping the Owls' offense cold. The Lions made 49 tackles and held the Owls to only eight first downs and a total of 93 yards gained. Travis Davidson led the defense in tackles with eight and knocked down two passes followed by Bryan Mendez with seven tackles. J. J. Lozano, Bryan Mendez, Tony Valencia and Adam Carroll each forced a fumble. Tony Valencia knocked down one pass, and Chris Sanchez intercepted two passed, but one was called back due to a penalty.

Coach Payne was pleased with every phase of the defense - linebackers, secondary and the linemen. They all hustled to the front (line) well and put some great licks on the Owls after getting there.

Payne notes that in this week's game with Sonora, fans will see a much improved team over last year. The Broncos are big and strong, and Ozona should be able to match up with

The Broncos will probably be led by senior quarterback Jason Morley. In last week's game, Sonora lost two running backs to injuries - Gilbert Vara and Marcus Montez. Ozona will have their hands full with the replacement running back Adrian Mata who garnered 31 yards in seven carries in the fourth quarter of the Wall game.

Ozona varsity cheerleaders will lead a pep rally at 3:45 p.m. of Friday in Davidson Gym. The Lions will play the Broncos at 8 p.m. in Sonora, so go and "Back the Lions".





# Where's The Beef? Will Thompson Knows

Even though he's a self-proclaimed "rookie," Will Thompson knows his business. Thompson spoke to members of Alpha Alpha Mu on Monday, Aug. 29, as a representative of the Texas Beef Industry Council. As part of National Cattlemen's Association program, Thompson attended a training session in June on several aspects of the beef industry. He must now give a total of 12 educational presentations in the community over the course of the next year. Alpha Alpha Mu members hosted his first presentation.

Thompson's topic was safe food handling, specifically on meat. Three basic principles apply: cool it, clean it, cook it. According to Thompson, ground meat and poultry are more perishable than most foods. In the danger zone between 40 degrees and 140 degrees F, bacteria can multiply rapidly. Keeping meat products cold keeps them safe from bacteria.

Keeping everything clean, including hands, utensils, counters, cutting boards and sinks, also wards off bacteria. One common mistake, Thompson said, is putting cooked meat. The next meeting will be held Sept. on the same platter it was on before it 12.





"You must be very thankful to God for all you have," I exclaimed. But the retort shocked me, "I'll have you know I've earned all I have.' People today don't think of God as providing shelter, clothes, transportation and food. And when Thanksgiving Day comes along, they're glad for the four day weekend. They head for the golf course.

Nabal, a rich character in the Old Testament of the Bible, was like this. He had three thousand sheep and a thousand goats. But even though there was war in Israel, Nabal's flocks were protected by a young man named David. David camped in the area and no one dared harm Nabal's sheep or goats. But when David was in need of food, would Nabal offer help? "Shall I then take my bread and my water and my meat that I have slaughtered for my shearers, and give it to men whose origin I do not know?" (1 Samuel 25:11). Look at what Nabal said. "It's my bread, my water, my meat."

But God causes the grain to grow so bread can be made. God causes the animals to gain weight so we can have hamburgers and steaks. God makes water flow in rivers and streams so we can drink. We should give thanks to God for these things rather than just patting ourselves on the back.

# **Confusion About Dove Bag Limits, Identification**


Each fall some hunters get con- Laredo. fused about daily bag and possession limits for mourning doves and other large, slow-flying mourning dove. The species. Hunters also should be able to identify the species of dove they are

Ron George, deputy chief of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's wildlife branch, said a daily bag limit is defined as, "the maximum number of the indicated species that legally may be killed, taken or possessed during the permitted shooting hours in one calendar day."

A possession limit is defined as, "the maximum number of the indicated species permitted by regulations to be possessed by one person at the end of the second day's hunt or at any other time," he said. "A lawful possession limit of migratory game birds usually is twice the daily bag limit. A person cannot legally shoot a daily bag limit of doves in the morning, then go out in the afternoon and shoot more

Texas has three native species of doves which may be legally hunted. Most people easily recognize the mourning dove, which occurs statewide, with the long, pointed tail, but many people in Central and North Texas have never seen white-winged and white-tipped doves.

Whitewings, which are currently increasing their range into Central and North Texas, have distinctive white stripes across each wing and a squaredoff tail. Whitewings should not be confused with white-tipped doves, which are even larger in size and found south of a line from Corpus Christi to
