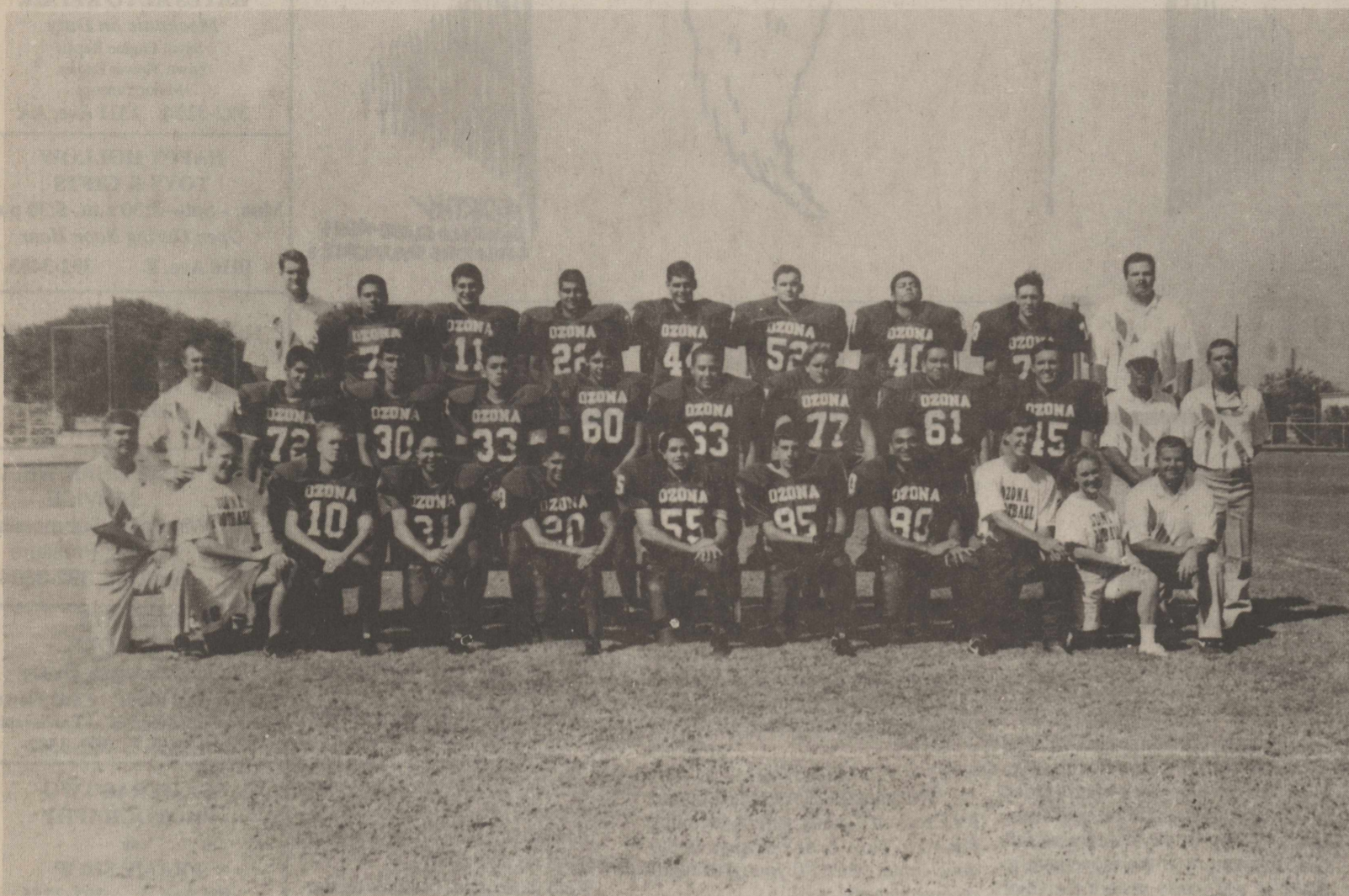

Jeffrey Sutton Elected Crockett County Judge

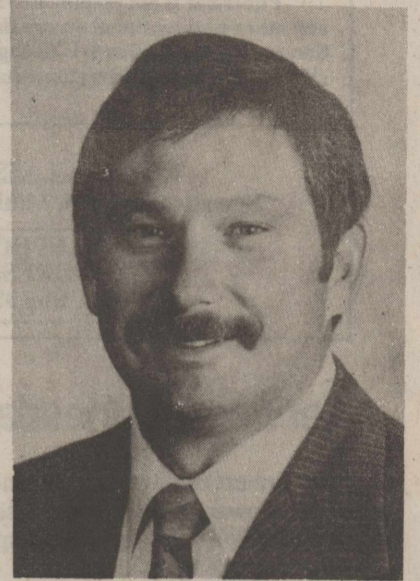
Jeffrey Sutton was elected judge of Crockett County Tuesday in the General Election.

Sutton has been a resident of Crockett County almost 24 years. He is a rancher, and he and his wife, the former Carmen Childress, own and operate Jeff Sutton Chevron and Small Fashions. He is partner in Sutton Brothers Oil Field Service in Sonora.

Currently president of the Mohair Council, he has also served as vice-president of the International Mohair Association, as a member of the advisory council of the Texas Food and Fiber Commission and as director of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association.

A 12-year-member of the school board, he spent nine of those years as president. He was on the local tax appraisal board several years, served three years as a director of the Texas Production Credit Association and was county representative to the County Education District.

Sutton is a native of Menard and earned a degree in business agricul-



ture from Texas Tech University in 1967.

The Suttons are parents of two children, Cody, a graduate of Texas A&M University who is now employed in the Austin office of Sen. Bill Sims, and Stefny, a freshman at Texas A&M.

Ozona Beats Van Horn 25-13

Lions Win District Championship Bi-District Game

Tickets On Sale

Feathers flew and the wind blew as the Ozona Lions beat the Van Horn Eagles 25-13 to win the District 5-2A championship in Van Horn last Friday night. The Lions brought home their first District 5-2A championship since 1976 and ended their regular season with a 7-1-1 and a district record of 4-0.

West winds up to 45 miles per hour blew most of the game, giving the quarterbacks and punters a difficult time. Luckily, the rain clouds never reached the Eagle Stadium, but the fans and players felt the cold wind.

This is the fifth time out of eight years that Head Coach Don Payne has taken Ozona teams to the bi-district playoffs.

"I don't know that we played a particularly good game, but I was proud of our kids for their effort," Payne said. "I thought they played hard, especially in the second half. We started four new guys on offense because of some injuries and sickness."

The Lion defense came on strong at the first of the game and didn't let up until the game was over. On the Eagles' first possession, the Lions' defense forced the Eagles to punt their first of eight punts for the night.

Substitutes play a very important part of the game, and this game was no different. Junior quarterback David Browne substituted for the toe-injured Chris Sanchez, and Julio Martinez replaced Anthony Sanchez as running back. Sanchez moved to defensive safety, but came back later in the game as running back.

The Lions started with good field position starting on their own 42-yard line. Wasting little time in getting their offense going, David Browne and Julio Martinez picked up good yardage along with a 13-yard pass to Jesse Garza. Martinez scored on a 3-yard run with 5:57 left in the first period. The extra point by Travis Davidson was no good, leaving the score 6-0.

The Lions moved the ball well in the second period until fumbles started occurring. Another Ozona fumble set up an Eagle touchdown, giving the ball to the Eagles on the Lion 2-yard line. The two teams received a penalty each, but the Eagles were able to get the ball to the 3-yard line. Eagle running back Matthew Molinar scored on a 1-yard plunge. The PAT kick was good, giving the Eagles a half-time lead of 7-6.

A determined Lion football team came back in the second half intent on showing the Eagles who is boss. The Lion defense forced the Eagles to punt

and gave the Lions the ball on their own 45-yard line. Senior running back Anthony Sanchez came back in the second half and ran for 39 and 10 yards to place the Lions on the Eagle 6-yard line.

Lion wide receiver Jesse Garza caught a 6-yard pass from quarterback Chris Sanchez for the go-ahead score with 9:08 left in the third period. A pass for the 2-point conversion failed, but the Lions went ahead 12-7.

A blocked punt and a 44-yard return by Ozona's Adam Carroll increased the Lion's lead with 5:27 left in the third quarter. A pass intended to Jesse Garza fell incomplete for the PAT, and the Lions increased their lead to 18-7.

Van Horn intercepted a Lion pass on their one-yard line, and a good Lion defense forced another Eagle punt. Ozona received the ball on the Van Horn 24-yard line. After receiving a penalty, the Lions took four plays to reach the end zone. Garza caught two eight-yard passes in a row with the second one getting the score. The touchdown came with 7.2 seconds left on the clock in the third quarter. Bryan Mendez kicked the extra point, making the score Ozona 25, Van Horn 7.

An Eagle player returned the kickoff 62 yards. Eight plays later the Eagles' Manuel Rivas caught a 15-

yard touchdown pass with 7:33 left in the fourth quarter. A try for the two-point conversion failed, and several minutes later the Lions won with the final score Ozona 25, Van Horn 13.

Payne had a lot of praise for his team. "All in all, I felt like our team responded to a lot of adversity, just like they have all year long. The wind was blowing 45 miles per hour, and it was hard to get an offense generated under those conditions. Defensively, our guys played aggressive and got after it like they did all year long. Adam Carroll made a big play when he blocked a punt and returned it for a touchdown."

The defense made a total of 92 tackles. Travis Davidson led in tackling with 13 tackles followed by Juan Trujillo and Adam Carroll with 10 tackles each.

Substituting and doing an outstanding job were: Justin Moran, Julio Martinez, David Browne, Joe Esparza and Casey Upham.

Looking to the bi-district game with the Winters Blizzards, Coach Payne says they have a good ball club with a 9-1 record. The Blizzards have a lot of size, a lot of speed, and an outstanding quarterback with John Belew. "We are going to have to give our best effort of the year and continue to play great defense," said Payne.

Ozona fans are well appreciated, and players and coaches hope to see them at the pep rally on Friday, Nov. 11, at 2:45 p.m. in Davidson Gym. The game will be played in San Angelo at Lakeview Stadium starting at 7:30 p.m. The Ozona Lions will be the visiting team and using the visitors' section. Advance tickets are on sale at the Ozona School Administration office. Advance tickets are \$4 adults and \$2 students. At the gate on game night, all tickets will be \$4 each.

Come out and "Back the Lions".

CCPL invites you and your family to participate in National TV Turnoff Day, November 14th, the Monday of Children's Book Week. We encourage you and your family to visit your public library and stock up on great books and cassette tapes to read and listen to on National TV Turnoff Day. Designate a regular "Family Reading Night" at home to read together and to each other, free of TV and other distractions.

The 24-hour turnoff is part of a family reading program promoting "Books, the Other Channel" sponsored by public libraries. "We're not out to eliminate television," says County Librarian Louise Ledoux. "In fact, we're encouraging people to use their VCRs to record quality programs they'd like to see later. But who doesn't want more time to have fun, to be creative, to share activities as a family? We could do a lot more of those things and still watch outstanding programming on TV. Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWBT) has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to restructure the current PLEXAR I and II service offerings. This restructure will significantly change PLEXAR I and II services.

The restructuring of PLEXAR I will, among other things: (1) reduce the maximum line size from 30 to 9; (2) obsolete and grandfather certain optional features; (3) eliminate the requirement to subscribe to Feature Package Two in order to subscribe to certain optional features; (4) reduce the nonrecurring and monthly rates of certain features; and (5) increase the nonrecurring charges for the PLEXAR I System Charge (\$2.10 to \$8.00), Call Transfer Disconnect feature (\$3.00 to \$8.00), and Convenience Dialing I feature (\$6.35 to \$8.00). All current PLEXAR I customers will have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR I service, switching to the new restructured PLEXAR I service, or switching to PLEXAR II service with ten or more lines.

The proposed PLEXAR II restructure will, among other things: (1) change the tariffed offering to serve the market segment of 10-74 stations; (2) create two station pricing structures, one for customers with 10-29 stations, and one for customers with 30-74 stations; (3) reduce the sensitivity for the loop portion of the rate to two price bands: 0-2 miles, and beyond 2 miles; (4) offer a PLEXAR II basic station that can be flexibly configured, from a number of standard features, to meet the individual customer requirements; (5) change the way the termination liability is calculated so the customer is responsible for 65% rather than 56% of the present worth of the remaining monthly payments in the contract; (6) create an option that allows month-to-month customers to convert to long term contracts of at least three years and receive a credit or "contract signing bonus"; and (7) establish a System Subsequent Change Charge which applies per serving central office when changes are made that affect the entire system.

Current PLEXAR II customers will also have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR II service, or switching to the new restructured PLEXAR II service. PLEXAR II customers with at least 75 stations also have the option of switching to PLEXAR Custom service in certain situations.

Millions of children are brought into the world without the benefit of a loving mother and father living in a committed relationship. And children growing up in single parent homes are more likely to be 'at risk.'

That this high sounding enlightenment has led to turmoil has biblical precedent. People can have deep spiri-

tual experiences and not be true followers of God. It is possible for individuals to have special gifts and receive light from God regarding the Bible and yet remain unconverted. As in the secular enlightenment just mentioned, religious enlightenment is possible when people are on the road to destruction. It might even be called enlightened self-interest. But that's the problem. Without Godly love, "it profits me nothing" (1 Corinthians 13:3).

Deadlines Approaching For 4-H Activities

4-Hers interested in several district and statewide activities should be aware of immediate deadlines, according to Tedra Ulmer, County 4-H coordinator.

The 1994 Leadership Retreat for Junior 4-H members (ages 11-13 as of January 1995) will take place at the Texas 4-H Center in Brownwood Nov. 18-20. The workshop is designed to help junior 4-H members learn and practice leadership skills, build creativity, develop problem-solving and decision-making skills, learn to set goals, organize, communicate effectively and relate to others, and to build a positive attitude.

Along with learning comes lots of fun and friendship with 4-H members from across Texas. Cost is \$52 for Friday arrival and \$40 for Saturday arrival. A \$10 non-refundable deposit is required for each person registering. Registration is due by Friday, Nov. 11, in the Crockett County Extension Office.

Each county that sends 4-Hers must send same-sex adult chaperones from each county in the ratio of one chaperone for every eight 4-H members. Adults will be needed for chaperones from Crockett County, and their registration will be paid.

Since Ozona will still be in the playoffs, if the Lions play on Friday night, the group will probably want to travel to Brownwood on Saturday - arrangements can be made closer to the date.

For senior-age 4-H members (ages 14-19), the District Christmas Ball is coming up and promises to be a special evening of fun, dining and dancing at the Midland College campus. This dress-up event will be held Saturday, Dec. 10, from 7 p.m. to midnight. 4-Hers may bring a non-4-H date. Cost is \$16 per person and \$32 per couple, and includes meal and entertainment by a Midland-area DJ. Registration is due to the Crockett County Extension Office by Friday, Nov. 18, at noon.

The 1995 4-H Teen Retreats will be held Jan. 6-8 and Jan. 13-15. Each session will focus on a different aspect of leadership development. Teen Retreat I, Jan. 6-8, is open to teams interested in working with pre-teens, handicapped, or senior citizens.

Teen Retreat II, Jan. 13-15, is for the S.E.R.I.E.S. training, designed to develop teens' abilities to share science concepts and processes with youth ages 9-12. The teens will be exposed to basic principles in science and will be taught to use and teach the processes of scientific inquiry. Cost is \$47 for Friday arrival and \$37 for Saturday arrival. Registration is due to the Crockett County office no later than Nov. 28 and includes a \$10 non-refundable deposit.

For 4-H members and leaders interested in record books and scholarships, a good start can come from attending the District 4-H Record Book Training on Saturday, Nov. 19, in Crane. There is no charge to attend, and lunch is on your own.

Emphasis will be on the 4-H philosophy of record keeping, the brand-new Texas 4-H Report Form, and record book format, and much more. This training is for teens and adults, and will run from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. (approximate). If you plan to attend, you must let the Crockett County Extension office know by noon Wednesday, Nov. 16.

For more information on these and other 4-H opportunities for leadership and learning, contact the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and 4-H serve people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or disability. Any 4-H member who is unable to afford training and other opportunities may apply for special scholarships from the County Parent/Adult Leader Association.

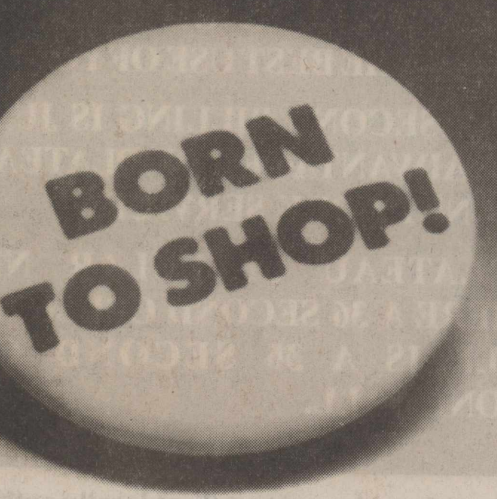

Cubs Win Games Over Colts

The Ozona Cubs ended their football season on a winning note by beating the Sonora Colts in both the seventh and eighth grade games. The eighth grade won their game 14-6 ending their season with a 7-1 record. The seventh grade won 32-0 and ended their season with a record of 7-2.

The eighth grade game started out as a defensive one in the first quarter with neither teams scoring and a similar one in the second half. All of the game's scoring came in the second period.

Ozona's defense made a great goal-line stand starting with Matt Galindo throwing a Colt running back for a 4-yard loss from the 10-yard line. Ricky Dominguez next dropped a running back for a one-yard loss.

The defense then forced two passes to fall incomplete. On the last pass, a fourth-and-fifteen play, the Colts received a penalty to place the ball on the three-yard line. On the very next play, the Colts made a superb play and stopped the Colts for no gain. The Cubs then took the ball over at that point.

Coach Lee Gonzales said very proudly, "On the first series of defense, the Cubs set the tempo of the game by their goal-line stand. We had an outstanding performance by all of the defensive personnel-- a more team tackle approach."

The Cubs, taking the ball over on the 3-yard line, could not do much and were forced to punt. Sonora received the ball on their own 42-yard line with time running out in the first period.

The Colts continued their drive by picking up 58 yards on five plays for the score. Three good running plays by the Colts of 25, 15, and 13 yards ensured them of the touchdown with 6:04 remaining in the second period. The quarterback ran for the two point conversion but was tackled before reaching the end zone.

The Colts received the ball on their own 37-yard line but was hit with an illegal procedure penalty on the next play, negating an 8-yard run by Matt Galindo. After being placed back five yards to the 32-yard line, the Cubs started running the ball with a 6-yard run by David Gutierrez.

Larry Don Luckie caught a 12-yard pass and Jason Alvarez ran for five yards. Then quarterback Anthony Ortiz broke for a 44-yard touchdown with 3:27 left in the quarter. Ortiz attempted the run for the two points but failed, thus tying the game at 6-6.

The Cub defense "dug in" on the next Colt series. On a fourth-and-two play, Jason Alvarez stopped a Colt running back for a two-yard loss on the 38-yard line. Galindo picked up four yards on a run, then threw a pass from his back position to Jesse Salazar-- good for 32 yards. The scoring drive was capped by an 11 yard pass from Ortiz to Salazar. Gutierrez scored the PAT on a run with five seconds left in the first half to give the Cubs a 14-6 lead.

In the opening second half kickoff, Gutierrez returned the ball for a 75-yard touchdown. Unfortunately, Ozona was penalized for an illegal block, bringing the ball back to the Colt 33-yard line. Ill-fated luck fell to the Cubs as they were hit with more penalties forcing them to punt from the Colt 37-yard line.

Several players had a good game both offensively and defensively. Those players included David Gutierrez, Anthony Ortiz, Matt Galindo, Jason Alvarez, Mitchell Martinez, Larry Don Luckie, Ricky Dominguez, and Robert Kelly.

Coach Gonzales, commenting on the successful football season of the Cubs, said, "Overall, we made vast improvements in means of techniques, defensive skills, knowledge of defense and in decreasing the number of penalties. It has been an honor working with each young athlete."

The Cub seventh grade won their game with an impressive 32-0 win over the Sonora Colts in last week's game in Lion Stadium. "We had a great year finishing 7-2," said Coach Rodney Johnson.

Miguel Rios scored three touchdowns with his longest run of 64 yards to lead the Cubs in scoring. Timothy Maldonado intercepted a pass and ran it back 35 yards for a score. Matt Castaneda scored on a 55 yard run and ran for one PAT.

"Everybody had a good game. Miguel Rios had a great night running the ball. I thought our offensive line did a good job blocking," said

Johnson. Those on the offensive line having a good game included Ernie Hernandez, Dustin Shaffer, Fabian Trujillo, Tim Maldonado, Mario Barrera, Cade Clark, and Cole Wadsworth. Defensively, Ross Crawford got in two great hits along with some hits by Dustin Shaffer and Peter Rodriguez.

The Cubs played with a lot of intensity and good running by Miguel Rios. With 3:07 left in the first period Rios crossed the goal line on a 21-yard run around the right side. Quarterback Ross Crawford attempted the two-pointer but failed to make it into the end zone.

In the second quarter with 4:06 left Rios took a pitchout and ran 64 yards for the score. Castaneda scored the two-point conversion on a run making the score Ozona 14, Sonora 0.

The Cub defense forced the Colts to punt giving the Cubs the ball on the Colt 44-yard line. On the next play, Rios scooted through the line for a 44-yard touchdown with 1:55 left in the period. A pass from Crawford intended for Clay Richardson fell incomplete on the PAT and the Cubs increased their score to 20-0.

Three Colt plays later Tim Maldonado intercepted a Colt pass and returned it for a 33-yard score with 48 seconds left in the first half. Castaneda ran for the PAT but failed and the Cubs ended the half leading 26-0.

The Cubs put the brakes on the Colts and forced a fumble with the Colts recovering on their own 41-yard line. Rios picked up a 4-yard run then Castaneda broke loose for a 55-yard touchdown run. Castaneda ran a dive play for the PAT but failed giving the Cubs a 26-0 win.

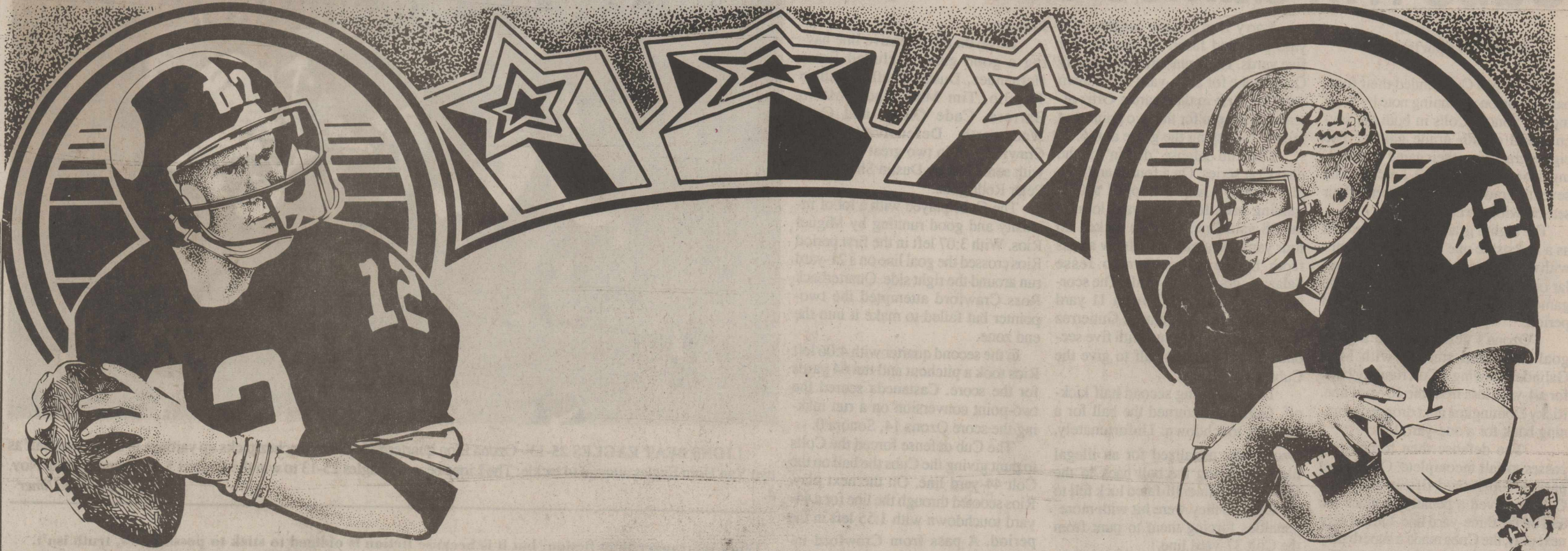

West Texas Meat Goat Conference Nov. 22

ELDORADO - Meat goats, West Texas' re-discovered natural resource, will be featured here Nov. 22 during the West Texas Meat Goat Conference in the Schleicher County Show Barn.

Registration starts at 9 a.m. and the program at 9:30 a.m. Sponsors are the Texas Agricultural Extension offices in Concho, Crockett, Irion, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, Tom Green and Upton counties.

Highlights of the morning program include a three-part session on marketing goat meat from the buyer's, processor's and retailer's perspectives and a two-part session on goat breeding and selection with emphasis on Spanish meat goat selection and intensive versus extensive breeding systems.

Following a goat barbecue lunch, the afternoon portion begins with as-

sociation updates offered by the American Meat Goat Association, the American Boer Goat Association, the Mohair Council of America, and the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. A research update on Spanish versus Spanish Boer crosses is also on tap.

The remainder of the day will be devoted to demonstrations of embryo transfer, transcervical and laproscopic artificial insemination (AI), semen collection and ultrasound pregnancy detection.

Private Rights Topic For Annual Extension Program Council Meeting

"Your Endangered Rights" is the topic for the annual Crockett County Extension Program Council meeting on Monday, Nov. 21, at 7 p.m. in the Ozona United Methodist Church Fellowship Hall.

Dr. Jim Butler, assistant vice chancellor for External Affairs for the Texas A&M University System, will be the guest speaker at this year's meeting. Butler is familiar with the property rights meetings that have taken place across the state in the past year, and has recently been involved with a major statewide meeting in Austin.

Butler will present a summary of what's taken place so far in regard to private property rights and what he sees in the future. He will also discuss how ordinary individuals can work to safeguard their own rights and the rights of others.

Increasing attention has been given to this issue in the past year, particularly in the recent elections, as both urban citizens and rural landowners are finding more and more of their rights taken away. "We're all familiar with the plight of the woman in Austin who couldn't sell her home - which was to fund her retirement - because it was in the nesting range of the Golden-Cheeked Warbler," said Billy Reagor, County Extension Agent - Agriculture in Crockett County.

Reagor added that property rights and individual rights issues are affecting every homeowner, business owner and employee in the nation, and it is up to each individual to do their part in preserving those rights.

"Dr. Butler has been deeply involved with these issues across the state and is an excellent speaker who can cut right to the heart of the property rights questions," said Reagor, adding that any interested person is welcome to attend the meeting, which is free of charge and open to the public.

Reagor added that the county's new 1995-1999 Extension Long-Range Plan will be unveiled and distributed to those attending this meeting, and that all persons who served on the study groups to develop the plan are invited to attend, as well as all Extension Program Council members.

The Long-Range Plan was developed through the efforts of a wide range of Crockett County citizens. Key issues which need to be addressed in the next five years were identified. Extension staff then worked with key leaders and the Program Council's executive board to prioritize and develop the issues.

The identified issues include agricultural profitability, economical and bio-diverse management of rangelands, goal orientation among youth,

parenting, safety, crime prevention and personal safety and chronic disease.

Also during the meeting, outgoing chairman Pleas Childress III will be recognized for his service to the Program Council, and incoming chairman Steve Wilkins will take over the reins for the group, which provides guidance and leadership in Extension programming.

Forage Report Filed For County

Kent Mills, nutritionist with Ezell-Key Grain Co., Inc., has prepared a forage report for four ranches in the county. They include Cheryl Clayton, Flying W Ranch, 3-R Ranch and Joe Will Ross.

According to Mills, there is a wide variety of forage conditions this fall, all dependent on when moisture was

received. For those fortunate areas that received rains through the summer, the forage is curing and declining in quality. However, these areas seem to have the most forage available for this winter. For those areas that began to receive rain in September, the forages are fresh and of high quality, but have a very low amount of forage available. The last is the areas that have only recently received rains, and

these forages are just beginning to green-up. These forages are lower in nutrients and will lose more of these nutrients as the winter progresses if there is not enough time for new forage growth to get started.

Amounts of available forage will vary in these samples due to rainfall during the growing season, stocking rates, and/or grazing systems management.

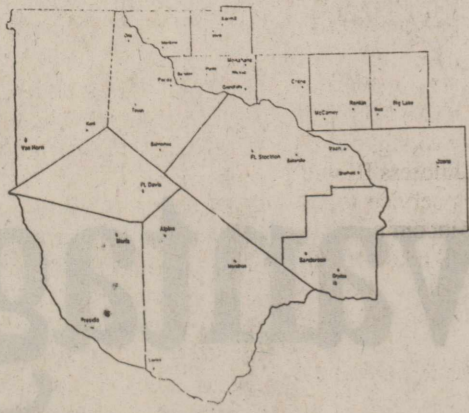

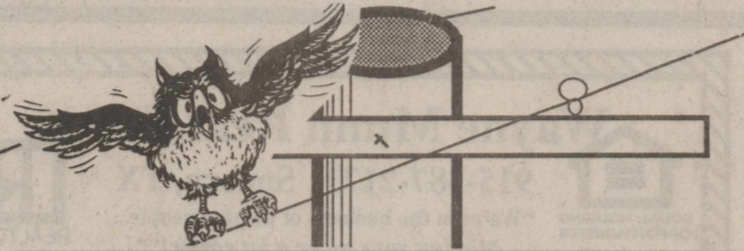

E-Coli Bacteria In The News

Meat contaminated with the E-Coli bacteria is once again making news. And the most often asked question is: Why don't processors just test for the bacteria? Meat scientists at Texas A&M University say one reason is because it presently takes labs more than 24 hours to run the tests that detect E-Coli. Secondly, since E-Coli usually occurs in only tiny amounts, testing a small sample of the meat would not give reliable results.

Extension meat scientist Dr. Davey Griffin says that when E-Coli is detected, it is usually a strain that rarely causes serious illness in humans. The bacteria strain that causes life-threatening conditions — E-Coli 0-1-5-7-H-7 — is harder to detect. Griffin also notes that labs cannot distinguish between the two strains just yet.

Griffin says that no matter how well meat is handled at the processing plant, it may still be contaminated, because E-Coli occurs naturally in all beef cattle. However, he says that the general public should not worry about the safety of the meat supply, because the bacteria can be easily destroyed through cooking. In ground beef, just make sure that the meat is cooked to a medium-well, and in muscle cuts - like steak - make sure that both sides are browned thoroughly.

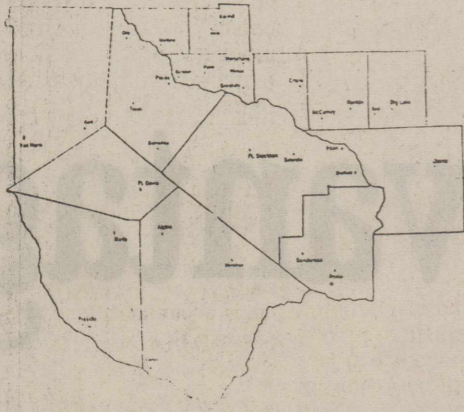

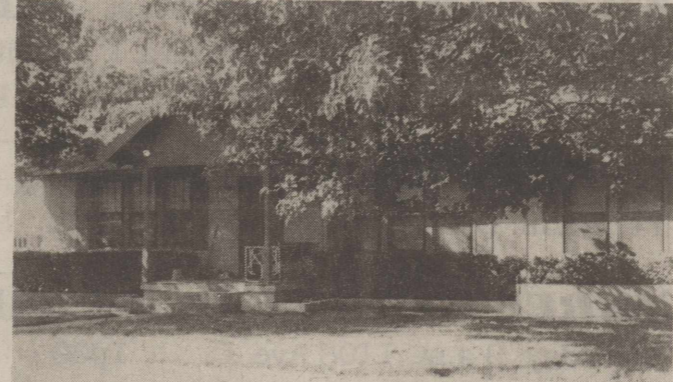

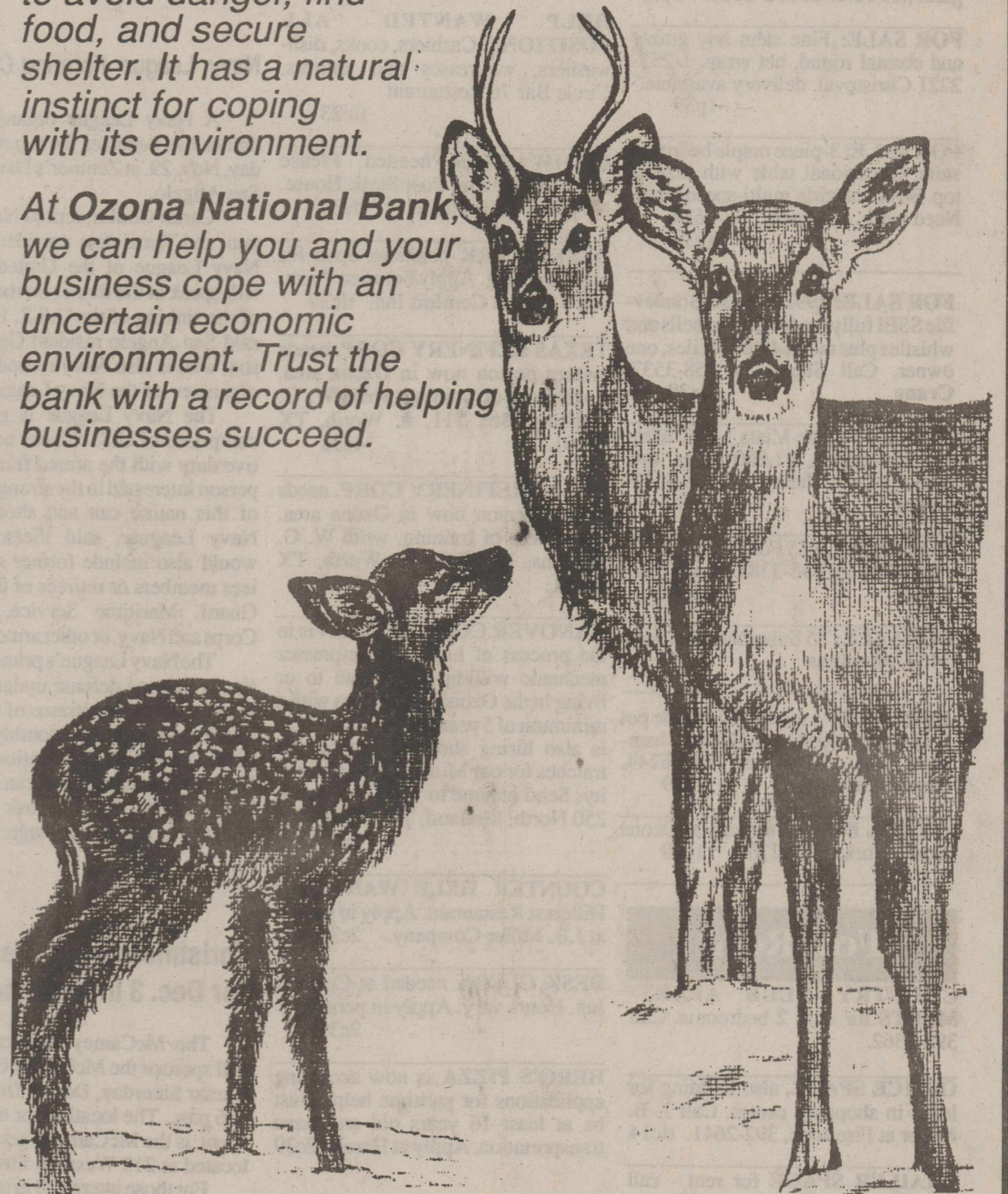
