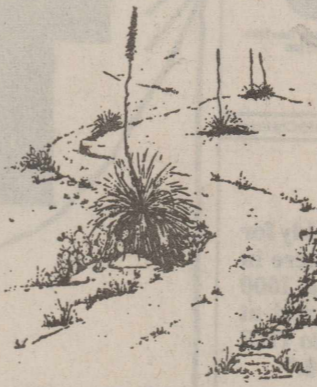

Fields Resigns As Judge

Interim county judge A. O. Fields resigned at the end of the commissioners' court meeting Monday, making way for judge-elect Jeffrey Sutton to take office. Sutton, whose term would have begun Jan. 1, 1995, was appointed by the court at the end of Monday's meeting and sworn in by District Judge Brock Jones.

During Monday's meeting, the court voted to share the cost of fencing one side of 3.7 miles of County Road 303 with Pleas Childress III.

The safety factor, there have been several wrecks on one spot on this road, led the court to decide to lane the road. Two cattleguards will be removed and used elsewhere.

Roy A. Harrell met with the court to discuss the county's lease of land for a landfill. Commissioners voted to turn back a tract of land used for car storage. The county is required to maintain the dumpground area for two more years.

Once the lease is ended, the access road will revert to the landowners. A fence will be placed down the middle and half the road will go to the Friends and half to the Davidsons.

Architect Jack Meeks met with the court to discuss his trip to Austin regarding the placement of an elevator in the courthouse. Once a building is approved for an historical marker, no changes can be made without approval by the Texas Historical Commission.

Logan Construction Company was accepted as the low bidder with

March 1, 1995 to be the completion date for the courtroom renovation project. Other bidders were A. B. Morris Painting and Construction and Lara Construction.

Because circumstances have prevented the start of a previously approved fire vehicle storage building in time for 1994 completion, commissioners voted to put the money allocated for this, \$12,500, in a fund to be used for this purpose later.

Approval was given by commissioners to hire Patsy Gutierrez as primary relief driver for the Thunderbird Rural Public Transportation System. County employee Sam Hester will continue as second backup driver.

John Williams of Williams Enterprises appeared before the court to request that the county put certain streets up for lease for oil and gas. Commissioner Frank Tambunga said he is waiting to see if the people in the precinct lease or not before committing the county. Commissioner Fred Deaton echoed Tambunga, saying that once 50 to 60 percent of the property owners in the area lease he would be inclined to lease.

Regular reports were heard from the hospital, care center, civic and youth center, library, Helping Hands, fire department, auditor and road department.

Information which was included in the hospital/care center report is included in a separate story elsewhere in The Stockman.

Sutton Begins Term As County Judge

Jeffrey K. Sutton was appointed judge of Crockett County Nov. 14 by county commissioners. Sutton, who was elected to the position Nov. 8, began his term early following the resignation of interim judge A. O. Fields at the end of the regular court meeting Monday.

After being sworn in by District Judge Brock Jones, as his first official action, Sutton declared the court meeting adjourned.

Jeffrey K. Sutton is the eleventh person to hold the office of Crockett County judge. Fields was first appointed as judge in 1983, the county's ninth judge. He resigned at the end of 1987, but continued to serve until April of 1988 when Kathryn Mayfield was appointed by commissioners after winning a run-off election. When Judge Mayfield died in 1994, Fields was appointed as interim judge.

Following his appointment Monday, Sutton took opportunity to praise Judge Fields. "I want it made part of the record that Judge A. O. Fields has contributed above and beyond his expectations for the citizens of Crockett County," Sutton said. Fields received a standing ovation from the crowd present for the ceremony.

on activities at the civic center, said there were 37 bookings in October, the most the building has ever had in one month.

Auditor John Stokes told the court that the budget is on schedule for this time of the year. He projects a \$1.1 cash balance for the end of the year.

Approval was given to pay for pipe at the time it is received during

the report by Eddie Moore. Moore, road and parks superintendent, said he has been having pipe measured, coming back for a check and going back to pay and pick up pipe.

Commissioners Tambunga, Freddie Nicks and Rudy Martinez voted to approve a resolution to apply for rent assistance vouchers from the state be moved to the Crockett County Housing Authority and administered through a Federal agency. Fred Deaton voted against.

Accident Fatal To Dickinson Man

David Dwight Dibble of Dickinson was killed Nov. 11 in Crockett County in a one-vehicle rollover 13 miles east of Ozona.

The 29-year-old Dibble was the only occupant of the GMC Suburban which veered off the highway and overturned four times. Dibble was traveling east on I-10 when he apparently fell asleep at the wheel according to DPS Trooper Castulo Bilano Jr. The vehicle went into a broadside skid and overturned, coming to rest on its wheels.

The driver was not wearing a seat belt and was partially ejected through the driver's window. The accident occurred about 11:50 a.m. Friday.

A 1993 Ford pickup plunged 120 feet into Howard Draw Nov. 9, seriously injuring the four occupants. The 2:30 p.m. accident occurred when driver Larry Baldock of Big Spring apparently fell asleep while traveling at a high rate of speed.

Passengers were Mike Black, Jeremiah Coker and Fernando Franco. Investigating officer DPS Trooper Castulo Bilano Jr., said two men were ejected from the vehicle. Three of the men received broken backs in the wreck, and the jaws of life tool was used to extricate one from the

pickup. The pickup, registered to W. T. Oilfield Services of Big Spring, was pulling a trailer transporting tongs.

Trooper Keith Olive investigated three accidents Monday. Two were called in at 7:48 a.m. in Ozona.

A 1993 GMC van driven by Liza Gutierrez was struck by a 1985 Pontiac driven by Eva Ramirez when Ms. Gutierrez turned in front of the Ramirez car. The Gutierrez vehicle turned left from Hwy. 163 in front of the southbound Ramirez car.

Both vehicles were damaged. Two subjects were taken by private car to the hospital for examination.

At the same time, at the intersection of 13th Street and Ave. E, Ysabel Ybarra, driver of a 1989 Dodge Ram van, stopped at a sign and then pulled

out into the path of a 1993 Chevrolet Suburban driven by Anna Ortiz.

There was damage to both vehicles. Two persons were taken to the hospital in the ambulance and two by private car.

At 10:30 a.m., a 19082 Chevrolet pickup driven by Curtis Smith wrecked 17 miles east of Ozona after hydroplaning on wet highway. Smith, who was pulling a 1994 Wells Cargo trailer, ran off the road and hit a rock cut, causing extensive damage to the pickup. There were no injuries.

On Sunday at 2:45 a.m., a 1994 Chevrolet pickup registered to Troy Williams was wrecked 16 miles south of I-10 on Taylor Box Road. Driver Clifford Kelly struck a concrete culvert. There were no injuries reported to the eight juvenile occupants.

Villarreal Places At State Senior Center Building Plans Revealed

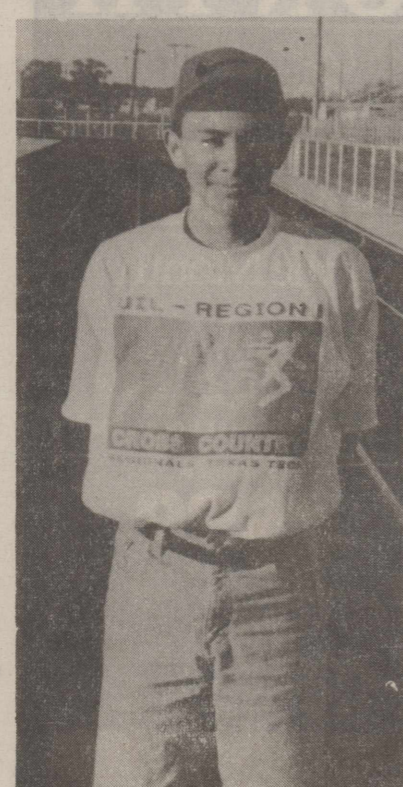
Neal Ulmer, Stockman Sportswriter Ozona's Charles Villarreal, placed thirteenth in the Class 2A boys state cross country meet in Georgetown last Saturday. Charles, the son of Ismael and Martha Villarreal ran the three mile course in 17 minutes, 26.4 seconds.

Villarreal placed tenth with a time of 17:06.2 in the regional meet in Lubbock Nov. 5 to give him a berth at the state meet. He won the district meet in San Angelo three weeks ago with a time of 16:37 minutes.

Coach Pete Maldonado said, "He ran well as far as individuals go but it was disappointing Hawley finished third at state and beat us only 10 points at regional."

Sundown High School won first place out of 12 teams in the Class 2A boys' division of the UIL state championships Saturday, in Georgetown. The teams and placings in first through fifth places were: Sundown, 35 points; Boys Ranch, 59; Hawley, 107; Vanderbilt Industrial, 116; and Stockdale, 162 points.

Winning the gold medal in the Class 2A race was Michael Serma of Sundown with a time of 16:17.3.

The regular AARP meeting scheduled for Monday, Nov. 21, will have a special feature. The plans for the proposed Senior Citizens' Building will be on display.

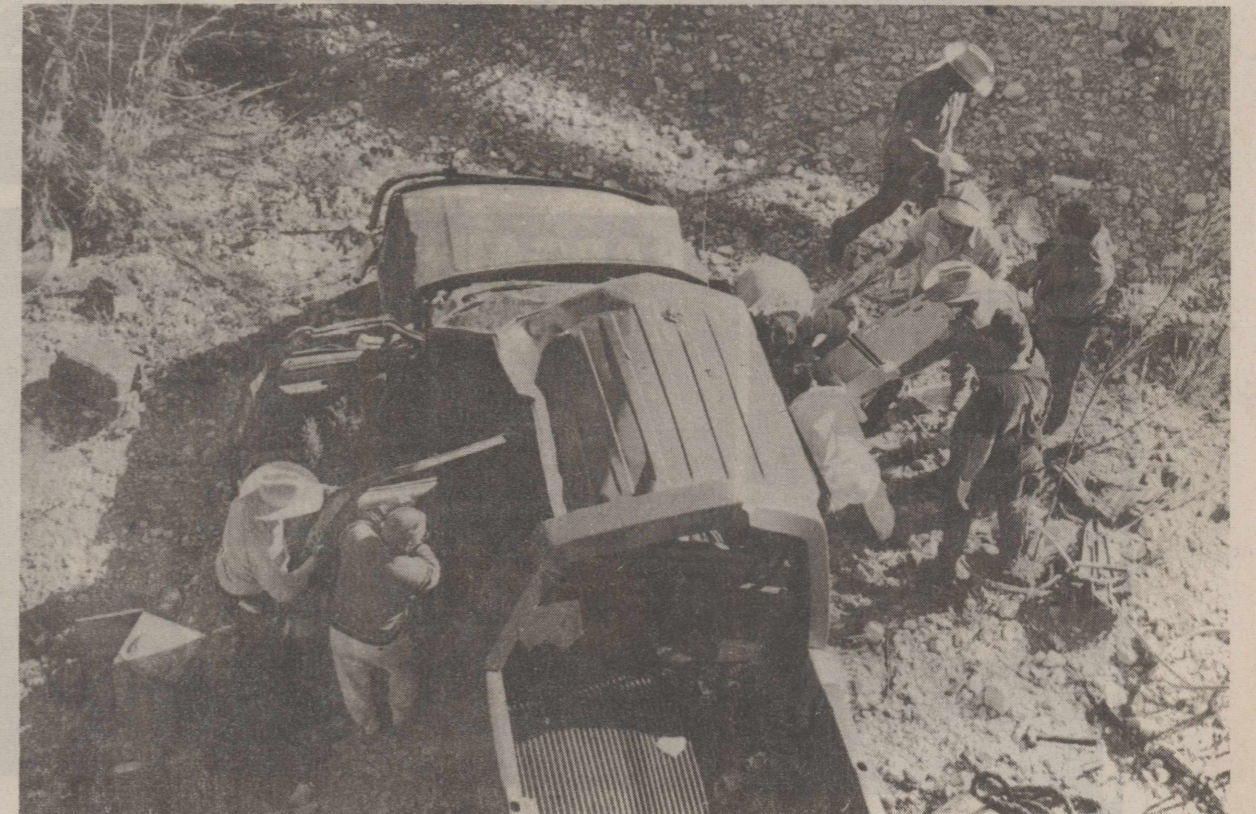

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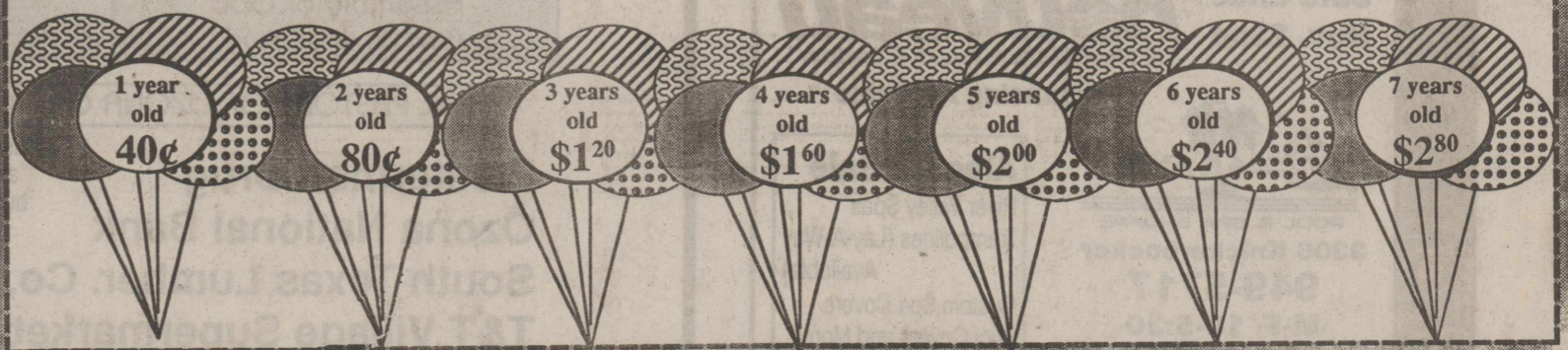
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Last Day To Buy Fashion Show Tickets

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWBT) has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to restructure the current PLEXAR I and II service offerings. This restructure will significantly change PLEXAR I and II services.

The restructuring of PLEXAR I will, among other things: (1) reduce the maximum line size from 30 to 9; (2) obsolete and grandfather certain optional features; (3) eliminate the requirement to subscribe to Feature Package Two in order to subscribe to certain optional features; (4) reduce the nonrecurring and monthly rates of certain features; and (5) increase the nonrecurring charges for the PLEXAR I System Charge (\$2.10 to \$8.00), Call Transfer Disconnect feature (\$3.00 to \$8.00), and Convenience Dialing I feature (\$6.35 to \$8.00). All current PLEXAR I customers will have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR I service, switching to the new restructured PLEXAR I service, or switching to PLEXAR II service with ten or more lines.

The proposed PLEXAR II restructure will, among other things: (1) change the tariffed offering to serve the market segment of 10-74 stations; (2) create two station pricing structures, one for customers with 10-29 stations, and one for customers with 30-74 stations; (3) reduce the sensitivity for the loop portion of the rate to two price bands: 0-2 miles, and beyond 2 miles; (4) offer a PLEXAR II basic station that can be flexibly configured, from a number of standard features, to meet the individual customer requirements; (5) change the way the termination liability is calculated so the customer is responsible for 65% rather than 56% of the present worth of the remaining monthly payments in the contract; (6) create an option that allows month-to-month customers to convert to long term contracts of at least three years and receive a credit or "contract signing bonus"; and (7) establish a System Subsequent Change Charge which applies per serving central office when changes are made that affect the entire system.

Current PLEXAR II customers will also have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR II service, or switching to the new restructured PLEXAR II service. PLEXAR II customers with at least 75 stations also have the option of switching to PLEXAR Custom service in certain situations.

In a study reported in the *Digest of Educational Statistics*, 54% of 9-year-olds said they read for pleasure every day, but only 35% of 13-year-olds said the same. Other data in the *Digest* show a definite correlation between higher amounts of television viewing and lower reading skills.

Which children are most likely to become lifetime readers? Children who see people around them reading...who have books and other materials available at home...who discover that reading offers many kinds of rewards.

CCPL is also celebrating Children's Book Week with a *Free Fines Week!* If you have an overdue book, now is the time to get it back to the library and not have to pay a cent. Visit your library and check out a great book to read or a tape to listen to while you work or drive. Check out the new books for kids. Reading is one of the great pleasures that families can do together. We encourage everyone to designate a night or a time to read together or to each other, free of TV and other distractions. 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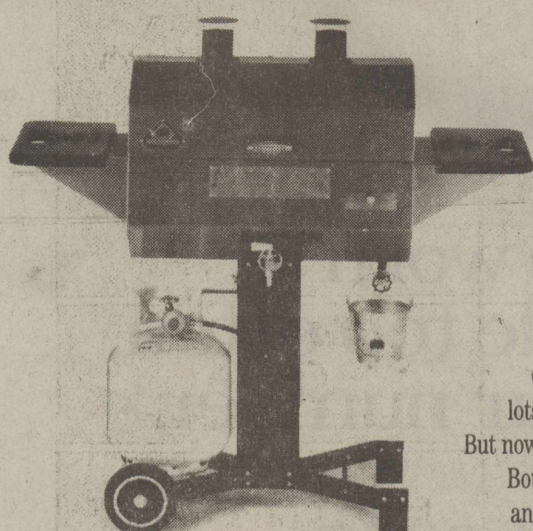

Blizzards Freeze Lion Playoff Bid 30-13

The Ozona Lions ran into the tough Winters Blizzards in last Friday's 30-13 Class 2A bi-district game. The Blizzards scored four touchdowns and one field goal to blow by the Lions and force them out of the playoffs. The Lions ended their successful season with a record of 7-2-1.

In his fifth year to take an Ozona team to the bi-district playoffs, Head Coach Don Payne said, "I'm proud of our kids' effort. I thought they played with a lot of heart."

Blizzard placekicker and strong safety Robert Reed scored their first 10 points of the game, the first three with 8:09 remaining in the first quarter on a 32-yard field goal, and the second score two minutes later on a 43-yard punt return and extra point.

Several minutes later, the Lions started on their 25-yard line and got rolling with a few passes to Jesse Garza and some runs by quarterback Chris Sanchez and Julio Martinez. Lions' wide receiver David Browne caught a 4-yard touchdown pass with 2:03 left in the first period. Coming back from a knee injury, Bryan Mendez kicked the extra point, cutting the Blizzard lead to 10-7.

In the second quarter, an Ozona fumble on the 19-yard line and a Blizzard recovery set up good field position. The Lions played outstanding defense, stopping the Blizzards and forcing them to attempt a 12-yard field goal, which was missed.

"Defensively, I felt like we played pretty good; Travis (Davidson) and Anthony Sanchez both played great. Basically, we were outmanned up front - their size and quickness. We just didn't handle it well," Payne said.

The defense stayed busy trying to control the running and passing game of the Blizzards. Three Lions had tackles in double figures, with Anthony Sanchez getting 15 tackles, Travis Davidson making 14 tackles, and Juan Trujillo with 11 tackles. Others getting tackles include: Tony Valencia, 8; Chris Sanchez and Adam Carroll, 7 each; Justin Moran and Julio Martinez, 6 each; Luis Longoria and Jesse Garza, 4 each; Joe Esparza and Albert Flores, 3 each; and David Browne, J. J. Lozano, Bryan Mendez and Elliott Barrera getting two tackles each.

The Lions had a difficult time getting the running game going and were eventually forced to throw the ball. Lion quarterback Chris Sanchez threw for a total of 200 yards, going 14-of-35 with two interceptions. The Blizzards put up a heavy pass rush all night, forcing Sanchez to hurry his passes and scramble considerably.

A good running game by the Blizzards got the ball from the Lion 37-yard line to the 11-yard line. The Lion defense held, and the Blizzards attempted a 20-yard field goal which missed wide on the right.

Winters was not through attempting to score in the first half, as they started on the Lion 47-yard line on the next possession. With a combination of running and passing, the Blizzards scored on a 26-yard pass from quarterback John Belew to John Biddix with only four seconds left in the first half. The kick failed, and the teams left the field at halftime with the score Ozona 7, Winters 16.

The Lions came out attacking with Julio Martinez running the ball. Several passes were thrown but fell incomplete with the exception of a 12-yard pass to Jesse Garza. The drive stalled with the Lions giving up the ball on the Winters 23-yard line. Garza was the Lions' leading receiver for the night with 111 yards on seven passes. Winters scored on their second

possession of the second half, starting on their own 36-yard line. The Blizzards covered the 64 yards in six plays. Reed scored the touchdown on a 40-yard pass with 2:37 remaining in the third period, then kicked the extra point - increasing the Blizzard score to 23-7.

Lions got another good drive going, starting on their own 20-yard line. Chris Sanchez picked up 37 yards on a play up the middle. Garza caught a 16-yard pass, and Sanchez rushed for another nine yards before getting intercepted by Winters' Thompson, killing a good Lion drive.

"You really had to give Winters a lot of credit because they had a really good defense against us. They put a lot of pressure on Chris, and we didn't pick up their linebackers very good. We had trouble getting a ground game going. Chris and Jesse both had an outstanding night, but we just couldn't run the ball effectively," said Payne.

Winters' last scoring drive started from their own 45-yard line. The Blizzards kept the ball on the ground except for two plays - one an incomplete pass and the other an 8-yard touchdown pass. The PAT was good with 3:40 left on the clock in the fourth period, giving the Blizzards a 30-7 lead.

"Lion Pride" never ends, and the Lions never gave up. Chris Sanchez went to the air looking for his receivers as the Lions had to start from their own 20-yard line.

Sanchez hit three of five passes to reach the end zone; connecting a magnificent 20-yard pass to Julio Martinez, a spectacular 50-yard pass to Tony Valencia and a superb 10-yard touchdown pass to David Browne. A pass for the 2-point conversion was intercepted, and the game ended with the final score Ozona 13, Winters 30.

An onside kick by the Lions was successful, as Ozona retrieved the ball on their own 48-yard line. On the next play, Thompson intercepted a Sanchez pass, stopping the Lions once again. The Lions had one other chance for an attempted score but had difficulty in completing passes.

Coach Payne was proud of his seniors, saying "They've just been an outstanding group to work with for four years, shown great leadership, desire, and have been a real pleasure to work with. We've had to overcome a lot of adversity throughout the season - particularly with injuries - but they always came out every Friday night ready to play and do their best. We couldn't ask for any more than that!"

The first official stars and stripes was made by Betsy Ross on June 14, 1977.

Let us strive hard to keep it that way.

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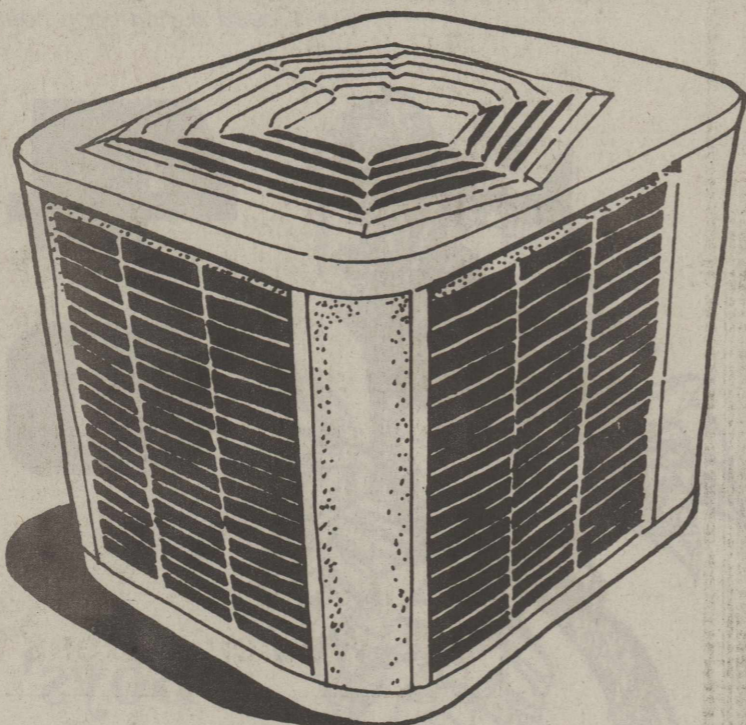
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Crockett County Sheriff's Report

County Agent Billy Reagor said that the county's new 1995-1999 Extension Long-Range Plan will be unveiled and distributed to those attending this meeting, and that all persons who served on the study groups to develop the plan are invited to attend, as well as all Extension Program Council members.

The Long-Range Plan was developed through the efforts of a wide

range of Crockett County citizens. Key issues which need to be addressed in the next five years were identified.

The identified issues include agricultural profitability, economical and bio-diverse management of rangelands, goal orientation among youth, parenting, safety, crime prevention and personal safety, and chronic disease.

Also during the meeting, outgoing chairman Pleas Childress III will be recognized for his service to the program council and incoming chairman Steve Wilkins will take over the reins for the group, which provides guidance and leadership in Extension programming.

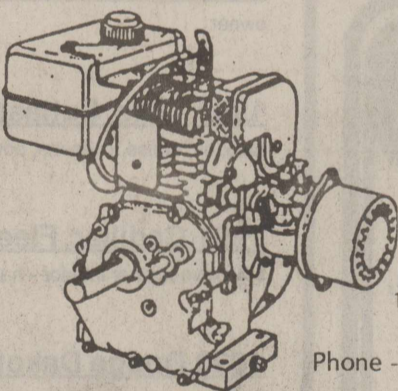

Coach Rick Bachman said there are a total of 28 boys out for basketball and they should travel with 15 kids each for out of town games.

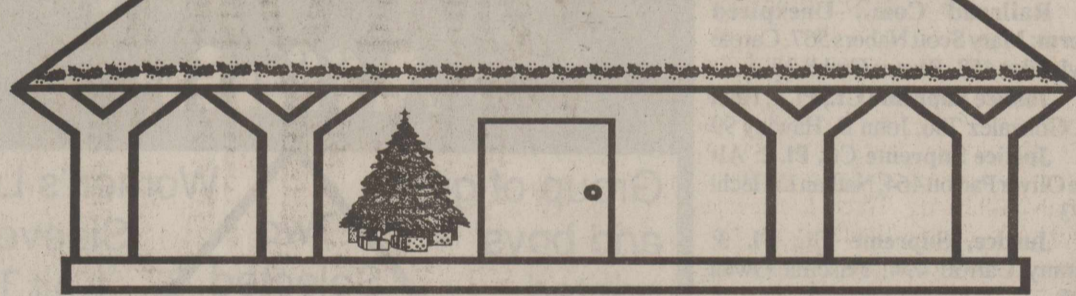

Care Center Expansion Plans Continue

At a meeting of the board Nov. 10, hospital and care center administrator Gerry Phillips reviewed information regarding care center expansion. John Gary, architect at the Texas Department of Human Services, wrote Phillips with a list of basic items needing to be addressed in order to comply with the Life Safety Code and licensing standards for nursing homes.

Many of the items can be taken care of in-house or with little problem. Some, such as the requirement for an architect and smoke detectors were mentioned by Phillips as potentially costly.

Phillips presented the information to commissioners Monday along with a recommendation that an architect be hired to draw up plans.

The proposed expansion would add six rooms to the care center, leaving four rooms for the hospital.

A financial report given by Phillips showed that the combined hospital and care center operation is under budget by \$17,300 for the month of October. Year-to-date operation is \$6,319 under budget. The hospital and clinic billed out \$70,075.55 in October. Year to date billed is \$651,325.70.

EMS coordinator Doug Meador told the board he has received contracts for a grant for \$3,900 to train 30

people in basic trauma life support. This training is expected to be in February.

Meador discussed the ambulance EMS III, keeping it equipped and in service. The ambulance was used about three times last year and was called to service Nov. 9 when EMS II broke down. EMS II is the ambulance that

Doug has requested to be replaced. This particular accident had three out of four injured with broken backs and other serious injuries.

Meador suggested keeping the ambulance ready for service as a backup unit and was told by the board to order a \$500 suction unit needed to pass inspection.

How Crockett County Voted

Early voting accounted for 49 percent of the votes cast in Crockett County during the General Election Nov. 8. On election day, 720 votes were cast, 153 in Pct. 1, 172 in Pct. 2, 184 in Pct. 3, 11 in Box 36 and 200 in Pct. 4.

The office of County Tax Assessor Collector Tommy Stokes recorded 2548 registered voters at the time of the election. Fifty-six percent voted in this election.
