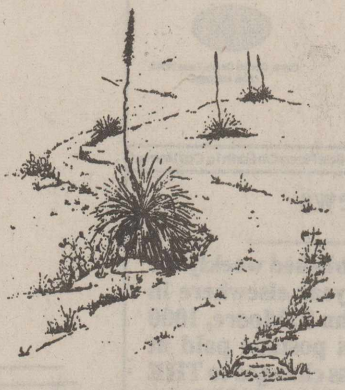

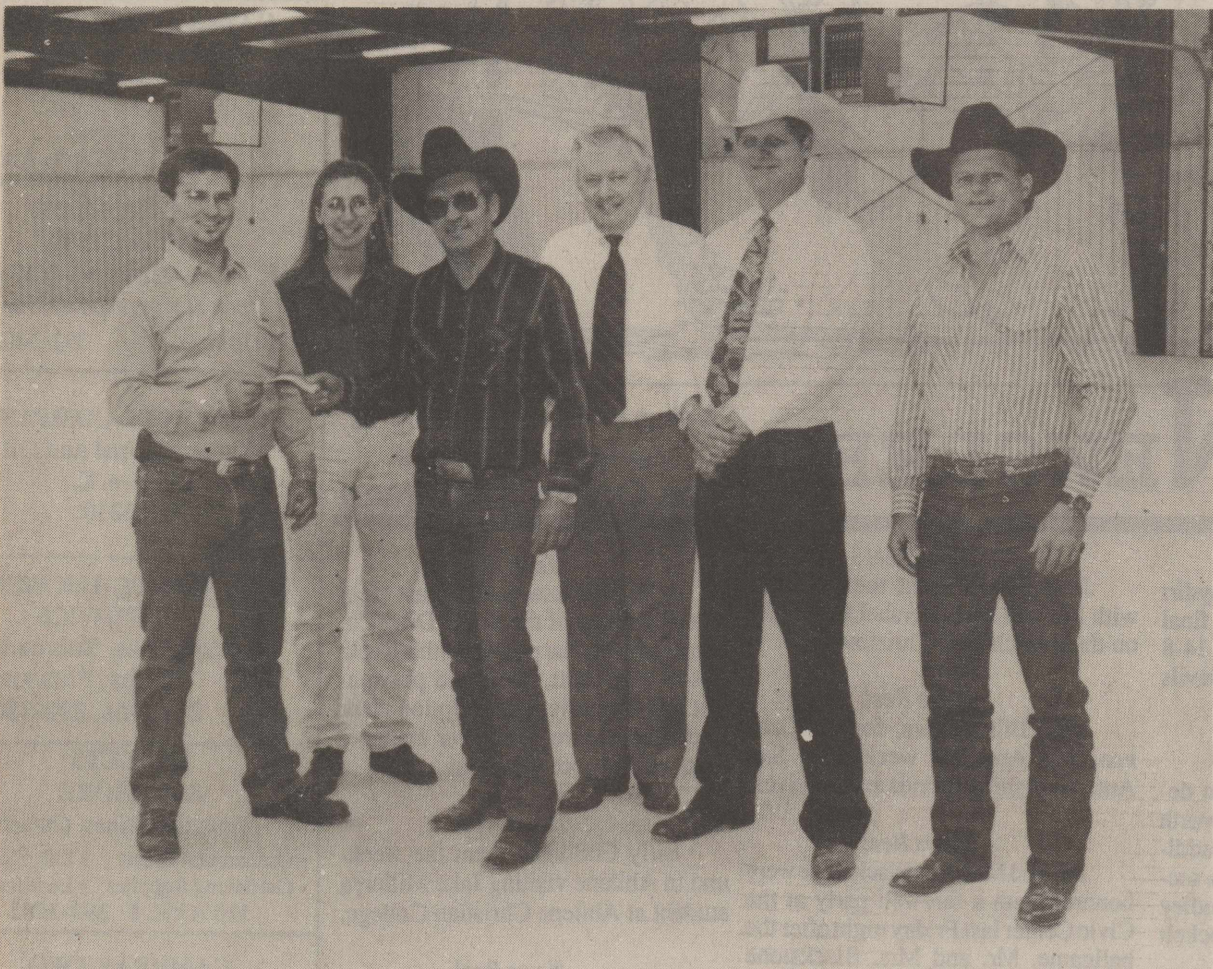

## Dreams Do Come True In Ozona

A mere seven months after an initial meeting to determine whether or not there was enough interest to build a convention center in Ozona, that building is a reality.

Fair Park Convention Center will open its doors to the 7th Annual DeerFest Friday, Dec. 2.

DeerFest Association was instrumental in getting the convention center for Ozona, said building committee chairman Pon Seahorn. "In addition to their \$25,000 donation, they are pledging money every year until it is paid for."

Ozona Chamber of Commerce has also pledged 20 percent of its motel/hotel occupation tax revenue on a year to year basis.

The \$316,000 project got an added boost last week when Ozona's two banks agreed to loan the balance needed to pay off the building. Cash donations of \$138,245 have already been received. A loan of \$185,000 from Ozona National Bank and Crockett County National Bank will be secured by limited letters of guaranty.

Seahorn said 25 people have guaranteed the \$185,000 to be loaned. The notes will actually be signed by DeerFest and Ozona Chamber of Commerce, but there will be no personal liability against these organizations or the individuals signing the notes.

Meanwhile, donations continue to come in and final determination on a possible grant from Union Pacific foundation is expected in January. Seahorn has been notified that the company will participate at the level of other donors.

"We should have the debt reduced a substantial amount by February," he said.

The bank loans are set up for a six year period to keep payments at an affordable amount. Seahorn expects the time period to be closer to three or four years, however.

The cost of \$315,000 to \$316,000 to complete the building does not include the pad which was provided by Crockett County at an estimated cost of \$34,000 for labor and materials, materials donated by Double T

Ranch, two commercial freezers donated by George Bunger and a vent hood obtained by Billy Reagor from Pecos County.

"Everybody has really pitched in," said Seahorn. "This is just one of those things that is meant to be."

The 12 people attending the first meeting showed some interest and "so away we went," said Seahorn. A building committee was named with Seahorn as chairman. "I haven't had to tell anybody to do anything, you just had to get out of their way," he said of the enthusiastic group.

In addition to Seahorn, who is on the committee as a representative of Crockett County Fair Association and Crockett County National Bank, members are Robert Bryson representing West Texas Utilities and Ozona Chamber of Commerce, John L. Henderson representing DeerFest Association and Ozona Lions Club, Don Long of Ozona National Bank, Billy Reagor representing the County Extension Service and 4-H Club, and Frank Tambunga representing Crockett County and the Knights of Columbus.

The committee drew the plans for the building which was constructed by Abbott Building Company of Midland.

Some of the proposed uses of the convention center include a four-county sheep show in December, a possible gun, knife and or boat show at the time of the World Championship Goat Roping and the annual 4-H Livestock Show. The 4-H Club has ordered 250 yards of Astroturf to use for a 30'x50' show ring and walkway to the adjacent 4-H Barn.

Booking of the facility will be through the County Agent's office. A \$300 refundable deposit will be required when the building is used by non-profit civic organizations. If the building is left in as good a condition as when booked, the full amount will be refunded. For private use, the deposit is \$500. Of this amount, \$300 is a refundable deposit if the building is left in good condition. \$200 will be retained as a use fee.

"We can't believe how it turned out. We're real excited about it," said Seahorn

## Neumuller, Parker Re-indicted

Loretta C. Neumuller and Tyrone C. Parker were re-indicted by a Crockett County grand jury Nov. 16 in the March death of Lawrence Edmund Albers. The two were first indicted by a previous grand jury April 20 on capital murder charges in connection with the death.

A change in the method of selecting a grand jury panel led to the re-indictment.

Legislation mandates that jury panels are now selected from verified lists of county residents holding driver's licenses rather than by voter registration lists as in the past. These driver's license lists are obtained from the Department of Public Safety and verified by the office of the Secretary of State, then forwarded to counties.

The data processing firm forwarded the updated juror eligibility

list to the county tax office after the original indictments but before any hearings.

"The State elected to re-indict with the updated list instead of taking it to trial," said District Judge Brock Jones who discovered the problem when the new list was received in the tax assessor's office. Neither he or District Attorney J. W. Johnson had realized the grand jury had not been selected by the new method, Jones said.

## All District Team Honors Announced

The 1994 District 5-2A Champion Ozona Lions placed five players on the football all-district first team. Five other players were selected for the second team and six honorable mentions were announced on Monday by Head Coach Don Payne.

"We (the coaches) feel like we didn't get all the all district selections we should have. At the same time, we didn't have that many individually outstanding players--on defense particularly--but they all always played well together as a team," said Payne.

Receiving first team honors on defense were senior lineman Julio Martinez and senior linebacker Travis Davidson. This is the third year Martinez has been chosen as a defensive lineman. Davidson was on the honorable mention team last year.

Chosen as all-district first team offensive player for the third year is senior Chris Sanchez at quarterback. Other players making the first team were senior wide receiver Jesse Garza and senior lineman Clay Westmoreland.

Sanchez was an all-district wide receiver and punter last year. He was also chosen this year as an honorable mention in the defensive secondary,

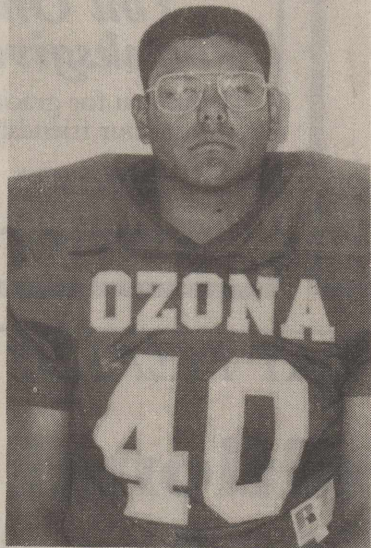
along with Garza.

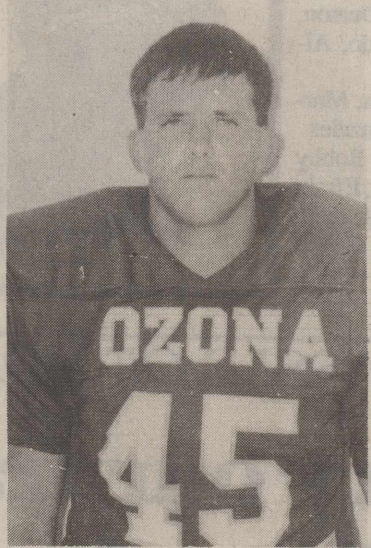
Two Ozona players chosen for the second team all-district defense were senior secondary Anthony Sanchez

and senior lineman J.J. Lozano. Sanchez was listed as a running back honorable mention last year and Lozano as a lineman honorable mention.

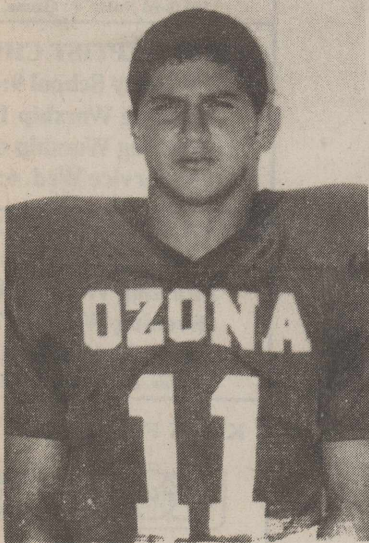
Other 1994 honorable mention designations were seniors Juan Trujillo at linebacker, defensive lineman Justin Moran, and offensive lineman Luis Longoria.



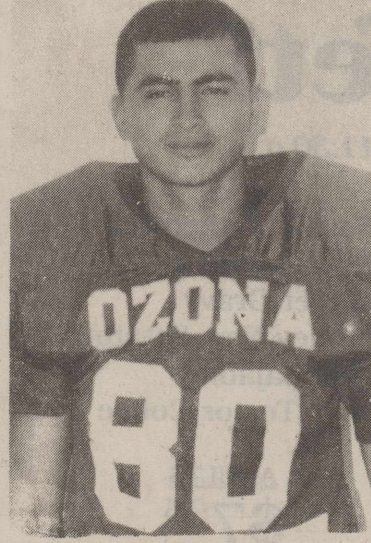

the doors open at 6:30 p.m. Space, comfort, speedy serving lines and a great sound system in the new building will combine to make this year's DeerFest a landmark event.

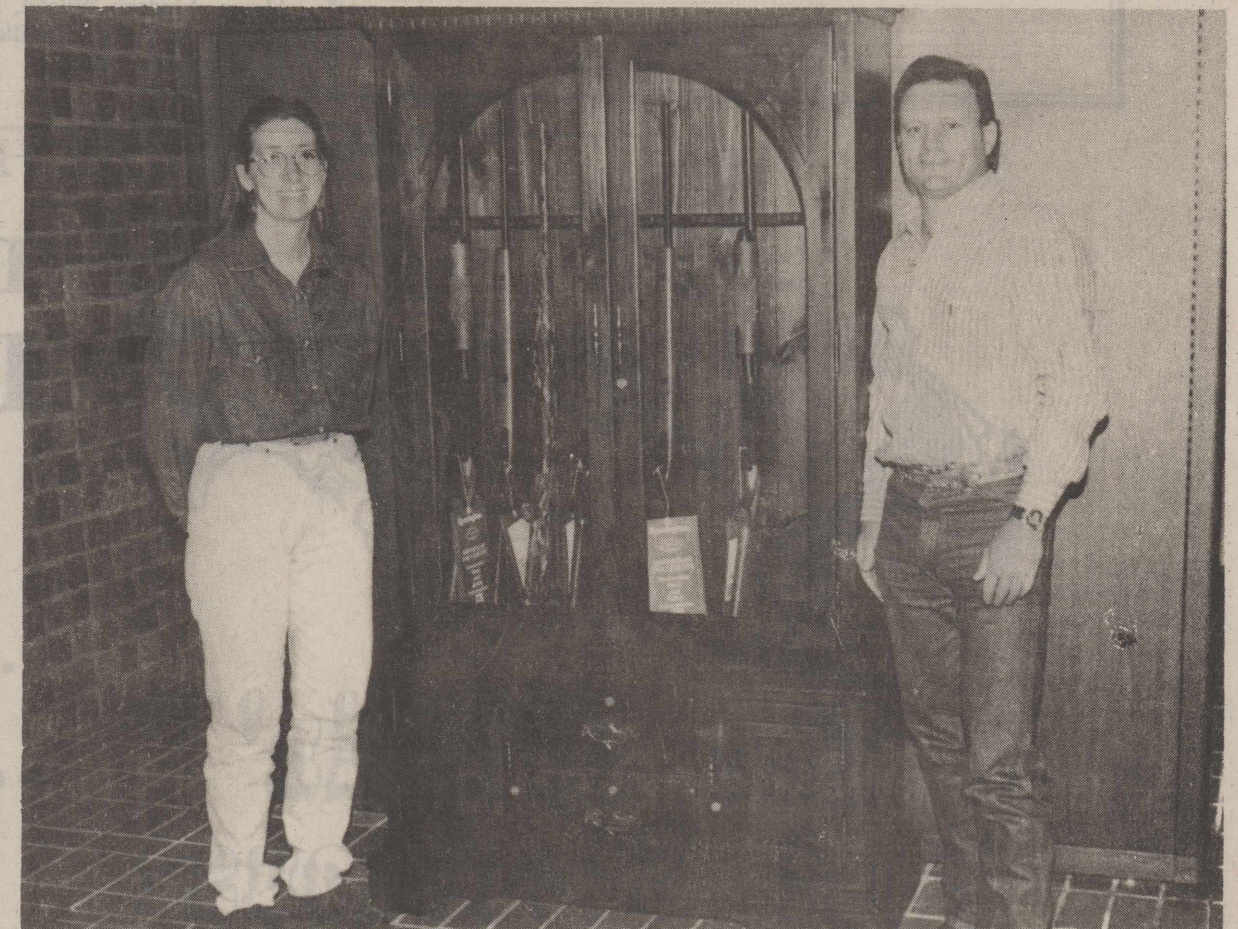
Hunters will be busy this weekend obtaining meat for the dinner. If you want to help, contact John L. Henderson or Tommy Anderson.

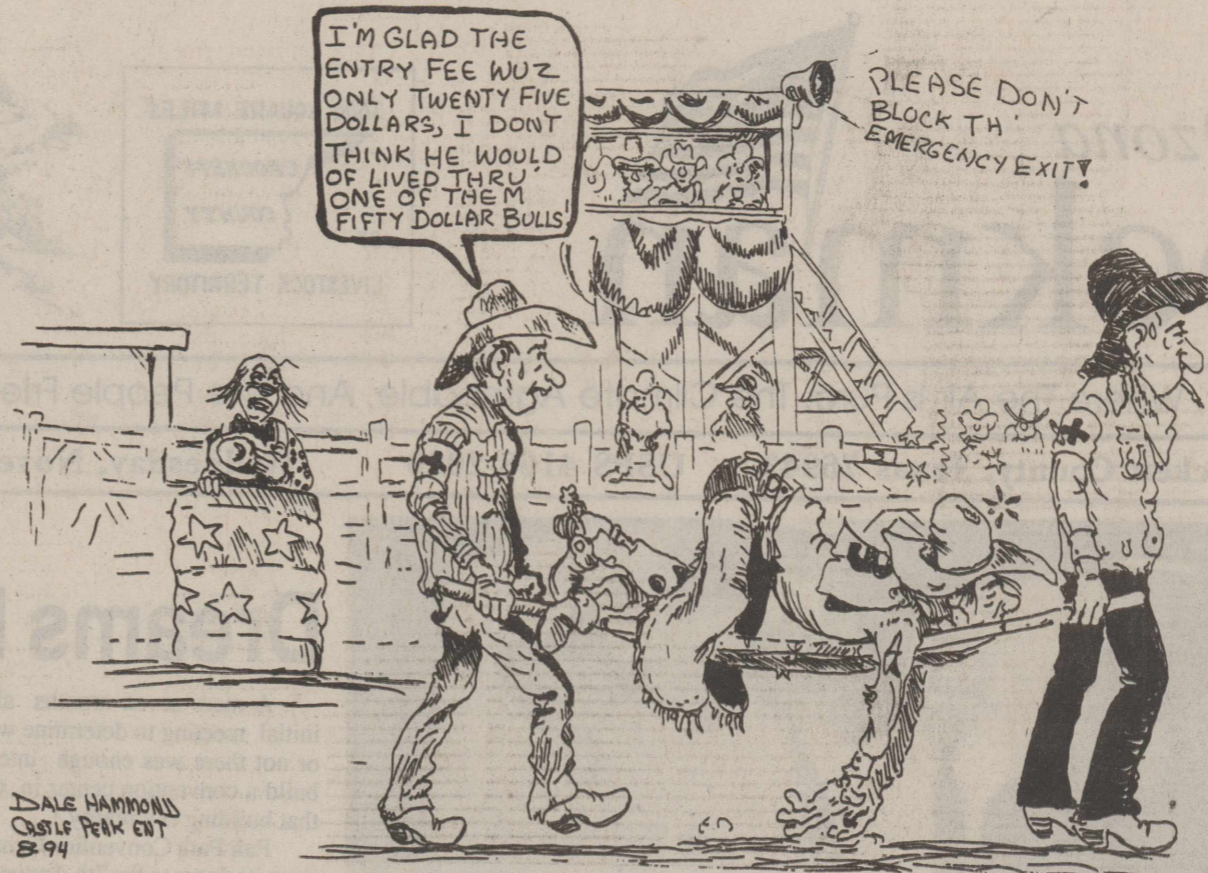

Services for George Newell Hughes were held at 3 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 14, 1994, at Ellis Funeral Homes Chapel in Midland. Burial followed at Resthaven Memorial Park under the direction of Ellis Funeral Home.

Mr. Hughes died Saturday at a Midland retirement center.

He was born Oct. 17, 1908, in Hereford. He moved with his family to Lubbock in 1922, where he was educated in Lubbock Public Schools and Texas Tech University.

In 1937, he married Alice Busby. Mr. Hughes was design engineer for the City of Midland for more than 20 years. Later, he was an engineer for the Texas Highway Department, retiring in 1973.

He was a member and past president of Downtown Lions Club and was a drummer in the Lions Club's Big Name Band for 25 years.

Last February, he was named 1994

Humanitarian of the Year by the Midland Downtown Lions Club.

He was instrumental in organizing the Buffalo Trails ranch in Fort Davis, and the Newell Hughes aquatic camp near Colorado City.


He was a lifetime Methodist.

Mr. Hughes was preceded in death by his wife, Alice, in 1978, and a sister, Maurine Hughes McCullough, in September of 1994.

Survivors include: two sons, James Newell and George Michael, both of Midland, a daughter, Judy Archer, of San Antonio, a sister, Madeline Stokes of Ozona, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

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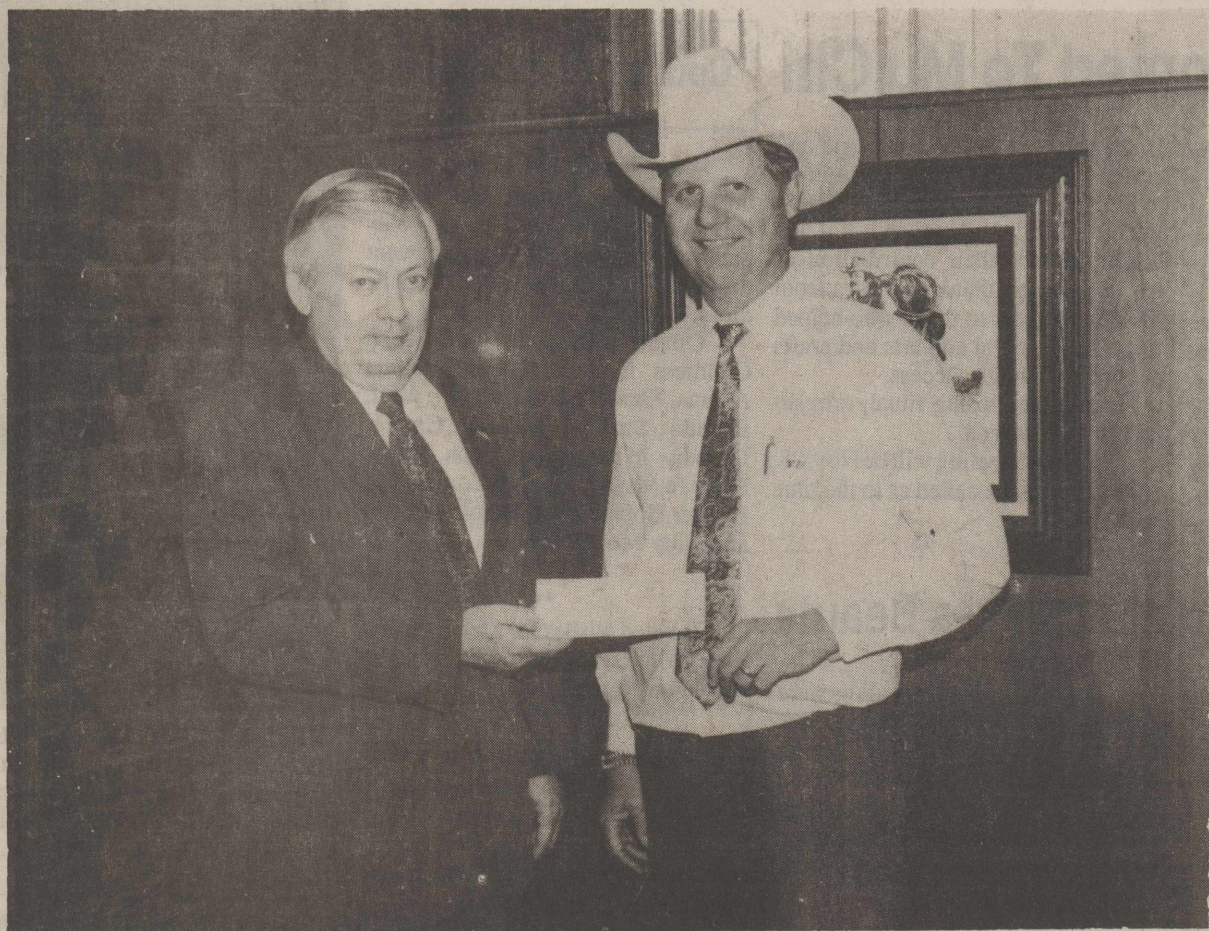

## From The Library

Librarian Sherry York is pleased to report that the new technology now available in the Ozona High School Library is being extensively used. New programs now provided on computers in the library include two new CD-ROM programs.

The new *Grolier Multimedia Encyclopedia*, 1994 edition, is available on computers in the library's computer network. This exciting new CD-ROM program allows students to search through what was formerly a twenty-one volume set of encyclopedias by simply typing in a word. The entire text of the encyclopedia is searched and all articles containing the search word are listed. The user can then choose an article, view the article, and view any accompanying pictures. Marking and printing needed information is a simple computerized process.

Other interesting features of the multimedia CD-ROM encyclopedia include options for browsing articles, a timeline and multimedia pictures.

Another useful option is the ability to do a word search on two words. This option allows a student to do a more specific search such as "Abraham Lincoln" and "slavery" to find exactly the needed information. Three words can be linked under the word

search option.

Even more sophisticated searching is possible by using the limiter "not" as part of the search process. Various forms of a word can be searched through the use of "wild card" characters ? or \*.

A knowledge tree that branches from very general to very specific topics is another interesting facet of the multimedia encyclopedia.

Many of the possibilities of the CD-ROM encyclopedia have yet to be explored by our students. During this school year the multimedia encyclopedia has been used primarily by the geography and health classes to find basic information for reports and short research projects.

Mrs. York anticipates that students will continue to use the multimedia encyclopedia during the course of the school year. "I believe we will see students becoming more sophisticated researchers as they have more opportunities to use the multimedia encyclopedia as a part of their re-

search because," says Mrs. York, "this program is a research tool, not a technological toy."

Installation of this computer program is a part of the continuing process of library automation which began last school year with the automated card catalog and search program. The library automation project has been made possible through Chapter 2 federal funds supplemented by local funds.

Because all high school students have access to the library computer network, all students can benefit from technology provided. In addition to class visits, the library is open from 7:45 to 3:45 each school day for students to work independently.

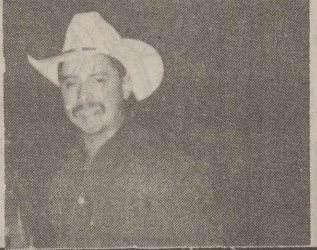

### Crockett County Public Library News

Crockett County Public Library will be closed Thursday and Friday, Nov. 24-25, for the Thanksgiving holidays. Please have a safe and happy Thanksgiving.

One of the founding principles of public libraries is the Freedom to Read. Censorship is a very insidious enemy of our constitutional rights and must be constantly guarded against. In the fall issue of *People For the American Way News* is a report on school censorship that is very disturbing.

The report states that more texts, curricula and other educational materials came under fire during the 1993-94 school year than at any time in the last 12 years. Researchers documented 462 incidents in 46 states, with California, Texas and Florida heading the list. 375 of the 462 cases of censorship involved demands that materials being challenged be kept from all students. Materials were removed or restricted in 42% of these incidents.

Large numbers of right-wing political organizations have been waging a comprehensive, highly organized campaign to challenge library books, classroom materials and a broad range of school programs and reforms. No area of the curriculum is safe from pro-censorship activists. Literature anthologies, biology text books, novels and films used in the classroom, books and magazines in libraries' reading sections, materials on supplemental and summer reading lists, school newspapers and literary magazines, self-esteem curricula, student-performed plays, and health and sex education curricula all were subject to

censorship challenges.

Religious Right political groups led the charge, lending technical, legal or even financial support in 22% of all documented incidents. The subject of sexuality provoked the most frequent complaints against challenged materials, followed by allegations of profanity or otherwise "blue" language. The third most common concern was that materials demonstrated an anti-Christian bias or somehow "endorsed New Age influences".

The good news is that censorship can almost always be defeated when a community is vigilant and encourages the broadest possible political involvement. Parents and educators must form alliances with leaders from all sectors. When people organize to support their schools and libraries, the censorship groups almost always fail. This simple and most democratic of strategies is far and away the best safeguard of our basic Constitutional Rights.

Visit your public library and exercise your Freedom To Read.

### Holidays And Indigestion Don't Have To Go Together

HOUSTON - For people who suffer from indigestion during the holidays, relief is spelled m-o-d-e-r-a-t-i-o-n.

"The holidays are a common time for people to get indigestion," said Dr. Alan Buchman, an assistant professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "You can avoid ruining the festivities by being careful about how, when and what you eat."

Acid indigestion, or heartburn, is often caused by a backflow of stomach acid into the esophagus, a long tube connecting the throat and stomach. Buchman says indigestion can usually be avoided by not eating late night meals, eating at a casual pace, and cutting back on certain foods.

"If you eat holiday leftovers late at night, the esophagus cannot clear out the acid before you go to sleep," Buchman said. "When you lie down flat, there is no gravity to help the esophagus force out the acid."

Holiday revelers should keep fatty foods to a minimum, says Buchman, because they may increase the risk of heartburn. "The fat in creamy sauces and other foods can cause acid build-up," said Buchman, who is also director of nutrition support services at Baylor.

Heartburn signs to watch for may include a burning sensation in the chest or throat, nausea, coughing while eating, and difficult or painful swallowing. Antacids usually relieve heartburn symptoms, but if they are taken regularly, they can cause constipation or diarrhea. "Don't put off seeing a doctor if

the pain becomes severe," Buchman said. "If the pain is continuous, more pressure than burning or the pain radiates to jaw or arm, seek medical help immediately. You could have ulcers, gallstones or a heart attack."

For a heartburn-free holiday, Buchman recommends the following: -Eat small meals. -Avoid or cut back on caffeine-containing products like cola, coffee,

tea and chocolate, and mints, aspirin, cigarettes and alcoholic beverages. -Refrain from wearing tight belts or other restrictive clothing. -Do not bend over immediately after eating.

-Wait at least one hour before lying down after eating.

"It's unrealistic to stay away from rich foods during the holidays," Buchman says, "but use common sense and don't overdo it."

## Board Members Review Academic Excellence Indicator Report

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in their regular monthly session on Monday, Nov. 16, reviewed the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District 1993-94 Academic Excellence Indicator System Report that was received by the school district on Oct. 31.

The report, produced by the Texas Education Agency and based on information submitted by all Texas school districts through the Public Information Management System (PEIMS), provides information about the performance of 1,046 school districts, more than 6,000 schools, 250,000 educators, and 3.6 million students.

The AEIS report contains data on local student performance at both the district and campus levels. In addition, the report provides four specific comparisons: (1) district performance is compared to the state and the region of the education service center in which it is located; (2) campus performance is compared to the performance of a group of 100 similar campuses across the state; (3) performances of student groups are compared to that of other groups within a single campus and/or district; and (4) campus and district performance are compared to their performance for the prior year.

The report also contains profile information on: students, including enrollment, ethnicity, and economic status; (2) finances, including revenue and expenditures; (3) staff, including numbers and types, years of experience, degree held, salaries and staff turnover rates; and, (4) programs,

including student enrollments and operating expenditures.

Following trustee review, they agreed to hold a public hearing on the report during their next regular meeting on Wednesday, Dec. 14, at 7 p.m. Copies of the AEIS report are available for public review at the four campuses and at the school administration building.

Rev. Jim Carter, pastor of the Ozona United Methodist Church, appeared before the board on behalf of the Ozona Ministerial Alliance to express the group's willingness to sponsor baccalaureate services in the event that the board decided in the future to discontinue baccalaureate. (The United States Supreme Court has ruled that school districts shall not permit clergymen to deliver invocations or benedictions at promotional and graduation ceremonies for secondary schools nor shall school officials direct the performance of a formal religious exercise at such ceremonies. Baccalaureate has been ruled to be a religious exercise.)

Dee Keilers, Ozona Water Department supervisor, met with the board to discuss the OWD's request for permission to do sewer improvements on district property south of Gurley Draw which is adjacent to Ozona Primary School. Trustees noted that the proposed sewer line would prevent any future permanent school buildings from being constructed on

this property and requested that Mr. Keilers consult with his engineers to see if the sewer line could be run along the draw's embankment so that the property could be saved for future use. Keilers said that he would consult with the engineers and make a report at the board's next meeting.

Jim Coffey, gifted and talented program consultant with the Region XV Education Service Center, met with the board to give information concerning the program and compliance requirements of a district's gifted and talented education program. Mr. Coffey answered questions concerning state requirements for identifying students by the nomination, screen-

ing, and selection process, admitting of transfer g/t students in local g/t programs, exiting students from g/t programs, curriculum requirements, and state requirements for teacher training in order to teach gifted and talented students.

In a related development, the trustees approved the sending of a waiver request to the Texas Education Agency for three additional staff development days in order to train all teachers in gifted and talented teaching strategies. The strategies will not only be applicable to g/t students but all students in the classroom. The

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## Texas Monthly Oil And Gas Statistics

In October operators reported 315 gas, 337 oil, and 25 service completions, compared to 260 gas, 375 oil and 67 service completions during the same period last year.

The total of well completions recorded for 1994 year-to-date is 6,633, a six percent decrease from the 7,021 recorded in 1993.

Operators reported 1,455 holes plugged and 169 dry holes in October, compared to 1,686 holes plugged and 225 dry holes reported during the same period last year.

Texas preliminary August crude oil production averaged 1,417,392

barrels daily, down from the 1,529,626 barrels daily average of August 1993.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for August is 43,939,156 barrels, down from the 47,422,101 barrels reported in August 1993. Crockett County produced 298,973 barrels in August.

Texas oil and gas wells produced 468,467,251 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in preliminary production for August, up 0.95 percent compared to August 1993's gas production total of 463,981,166 Mcf. Production in Crockett County totaled 10,690,335 Mcf with the county ranked seventh in the state.

## SCS Gets New Name, Identity

The Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service will soon take on a new identity as the Natural Resources Conservation Service as it streamlines its operations and takes on new program responsibilities. The new agency was authorized under the reorganization ordered Oct. 20 by Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy.

The new Natural Resources Conservation Service will continue to have responsibility for all the programs of the former Soil Conservation Service. In addition, several other programs have been transferred to it including the Wetland Reserve Program, the Waterbank Program, the Colorado River Basin Salinity Control Program, Farms for the Future Program, Forestry Incentive Program and Great Plains Conservation Program.

"We are working to make this a smooth transition for our customers," said Paul Johnson, chief of the agency. "And we will continue to build on 60 years of a unique relationship between federal government and this nation's private landowners as well as our conservation district and state agency partners. It's a relationship built on voluntary programs, technical assistance, and conservation cost-share programs."

Johnson said farmers, ranchers and other customers of the agency can continue to receive the same assistance they have from the Soil Conser-

vation Service during the transition period.

"Throughout this process, we will keep our customers and our employees well informed," said Johnson. "And we will stay connected to their ideas and concerns."

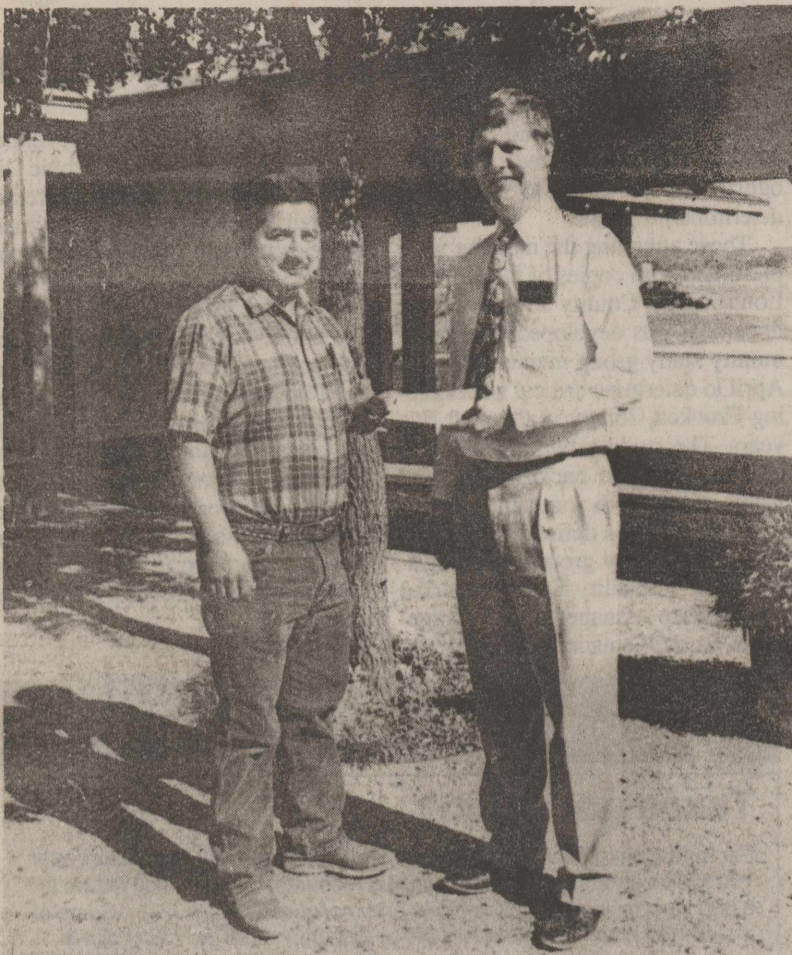

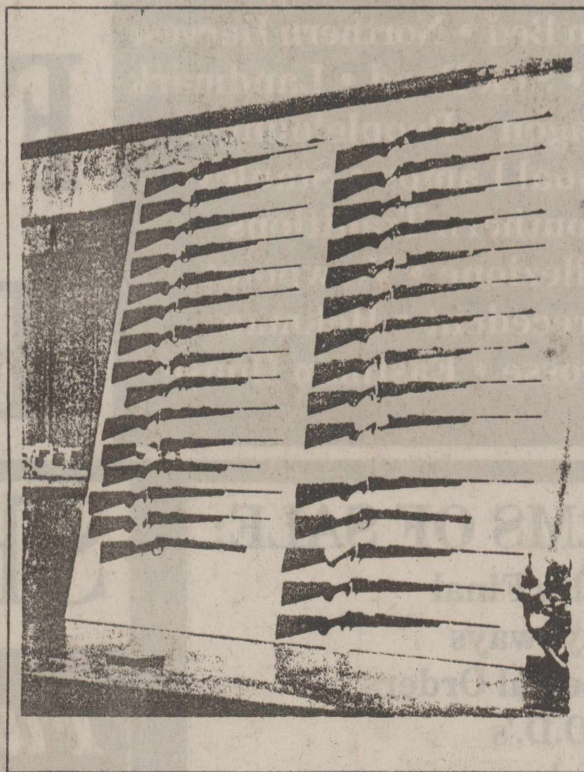

This past Monday we had 47 students signed up to take the ASVAB test. This is the Armed Forces Vocational Aptitude Battery. It is a multi-aptitude test battery that is designed to measure the aptitudes at this time in a student's life. It consists of 10 short individual tests covering word knowledge, paragraph comprehension, arithmetic reasoning, mathematics knowledge, general science, auto and shop information, mechanical comprehension, electronics information, numerical operations and coding speed. Several individual test results are combined to yield three academic composite scores; verbal, math and academic ability.

Test results will be available toward the end of December or the first of January. Each participant will receive test scores and a workbook to aid in applying their results toward career choices. I will help each student evaluate their results and confer with them on school and career guidance.

The PSAT scores will be in the first of January. Before the results arrive we will have a parent night in which students and their parents can come up and learn how to read the results of the test.

Some scholarship information has just been received in my office, and I encourage all seniors to come by and check out the opportunities. At this time we have scholarship information concerning engineering. In the near future, we will begin receiving a lot of scholarship applications for other areas of study.

## Butler Addresses Extension Group

Citizens have to be aware and on guard against legislation and special-interest groups that could take away their private rights, according to the Texas A&M University Assistant Vice Chancellor for External Affairs Jim Butler. Butler spoke Monday evening at the Crockett County Extension Program Council annual meeting, which was held at the Ozona United Methodist Church.

Butler and State Representative Robert Turner were on hand to discuss the erosion of private rights through special-interest legislation, particularly in regard to property rights. Butler suggested several resources for background on the subject and noted that if the need comes to give testimony before a legislative group, the important thing is to "speak from the heart."

Time was allotted for discussion, and numerous questions were asked regarding the role of special-interest groups in sponsoring legislation which affects a private citizen's right to sell or use their property for the purpose they intended. Butler and Turner have both been deeply involved in statewide and national efforts to turn the tide against the loss of rights, and noted some key pieces of legislation upcoming which should help to amend some of the past problems.

Crockett County Extension Program Council Chairman Pleas Childress III conducted the meeting and was presented a certificate of appreciation for his outstanding leadership as chairman. In turn, Childress presented certificate to Executive Board members who were present, including incoming Chairman Steve Wilkins, who expressed the council's

thanks to Childress for all his work. All Extension committees were recognized for their efforts to expand and determine programs.

Those attending the meeting were presented with copies of the 1995-99 Long-Range County Program. The document was developed after community study group members met in April to determine critical issues facing Crockett County in the next five years. The study group consisted of citizens from all backgrounds and walks of life, both youth and adults.

Critical issues defined by the persons in the study groups were Agricultural Profitability, Economical and Bio-Diverse Management of Rangelands, Goal Orientation Among Youth,

Parenting, Safety, Crime Prevention and Personal Safety, and Chronic Disease. These issues will be addressed through Extension and other programs in the community during the five-year period.

Far from the frightening tales of vampire lore, Texas' bat population, over 100 million strong, is a valuable animal resource. One bat may eat up to 3,000 insects, including crop pests and mosquitoes, each night. Some of the winged mammals also pollinate or disperse seeds for many plants.

waiver days, if approved by TEA, will be on Jan. 9, March 20 and April 3, all of which are Mondays.

Pete Golwas of Johnson Controls met with the members to explain a service offered by his company which allows school districts to make cost-effective facility improvements which impact their operating budget in the area of energy conservation. Mr. Golwas said that he, with assistance from Ray Don Myers, school maintenance supervisor, had performed a preliminary survey of the district's air conditioning, heating, lighting and environmental controls and had identified an annual energy savings potential of \$27,994. "By implementing energy improvements, the cost of any new equipment can be offset by the annual energy savings to the district, thus upgrading these systems at a much less cost to the district. My recommendation is to request proposals from qualified companies specializing in energy conservation to implement operational cost reduction measures at your facilities on a performance contracting basis," Golwas said. Following discussion of this item the trustees voted to approve soliciting responses to the district's intent to enter into a performance contract to upgrade facilities and control energy operating costs.

Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton reported that the district had received a \$12,300 grant from the Texas Education Agency to purchase and install the T-STAR satellite delivery program for the school system. Cotton explained that T-STAR is a TEA initiative to expand the telecommunications capabilities of school districts to help provide comprehensive delivery of curriculum, inservice training, technical assistance, instructional software, text, graphics, audio and video communications services.

"We applied for the grant this summer and received notification from TEA on the last day of October that we had been awarded the money. Currently only about one out of every three school districts in Texas has the T-STAR satellite system, and we were certainly delighted to have an opportunity to obtain this exceptional technology," Cotton said. "Satellite video and audio reception will be obtained through a 12.5 foot dish and transmit-

ted via cable to the satellite receiver room which will contain a satellite receiver-tuner and descrambler, amplifier, antenna remote controller, television monitor, videocassette recorder, a computer, an equipment rack, and a cable-channel modulator. Our plans at the present time are to locate this equipment in the high school library office.

"From the satellite receiver room, cables will be run to three video distribution rooms which will each have a television, microphones with cable for the audio return system, and a jack for telephone communication. During interactive broadcasts, participants will be able to view the presenter or presenters via television and communicate with them at the same time by way of telephone transmission.

The district will not only have access to programming of this nature, but also it will have the capacity to tape educational television programs for students and teachers as well as receive specialized inservice programs from TEA and other educational inservice providers," he said.

During the meeting the members voted to purchase local school district delinquent taxes from the old County Education District #318 that was ruled unconstitutional by the Texas Supreme Court and which was replaced by Senate Bill 7. The \$2,475 amount to purchase the delinquent taxes will

bring the taxes back to the county appraisal district for collection and will effectively dissolve the old county education district of which Ozona, Fort Davis, Valentine, Brackett, Buena Vista, Fort Stockton, Iraan-Sheffield, Marfa, Presidio, Del Rio and Comstock were members during the years of 1991 and 1992.

Other items receiving board approval were budget amendments for the purchase of overhead doors at the bus maintenance facility, resurfacing of the track at the school stadium, and, following acceptance of a bid from Jim Bass Ford for the purchase of a new pickup for the school's vocational agriculture department, a budget amendment for the purchase of the ag vehicle. The members also approved installing gas lines for school owned housing that does not have individual meters and authorized Supt. Larry Taylor to sign a federal Gun-Free Schools certification form which makes possession of a gun by a student on school property a federal crime subject to a one-year expulsion. The members also met in executive session to conduct the annual evaluation of the school superintendent.

**Fur-Bearing Animal Season Opens Dec. 1**

AUSTIN - Trappers are reminded that the fur-bearing animal season is Dec. 1 through Jan. 31, except for muskrat and nutria. Muskrat season is Nov. 15 through March 15 while nutria may be taken year round.

Assistant Commander Harold Oates in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's law enforcement division in Austin, said fur-bearing animals may be taken for the purpose of sale only during these seasons. Texas statutes define fur-bearing animals as badgers, beavers, foxes, minks, muskrats, nutria, opossums, otters, raccoons, ring-tailed cats, skunks and civet cats.

A \$15 trapper's license (\$250 for nonresidents) is required to take fur-bearing animals or the pelts of fur-bearing animals, except landowners may take fur-bearers without a license when found depreddating on that land

(fur-bearing animals taken under such conditions may not be possessed or sold); anyone may transport a suspected diseased fur-bearer to a public health facility for diagnosis; and a person who possesses a hunting license and is engaged in a lawful hunting activity for any species other than fur-bearing animals may take and possess a fur-bearing animal without the need of a trapper's license. Bag limit is one per day, not more than two in possession.

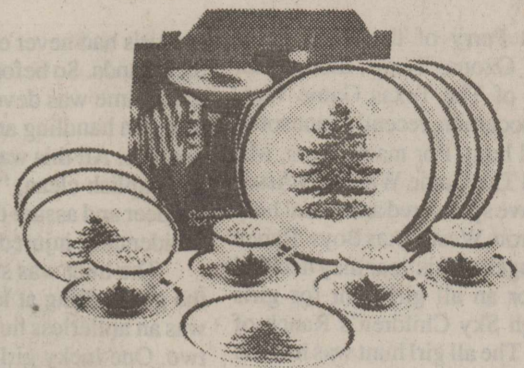
Coyotes and bobcats, considered nongame animals in Texas, can be taken at any time during the year by a licensed hunter, Oates said. The season for taking bobcats for the purpose of selling the pelt or transporting it out of state is Nov. 15 through Feb. 15. A hunting license is required for taking coyotes and bobcats at any time.

Bobcats are not classified as fur-bearing animals in Texas so a trapper's license is not required, but before the pelt is sold or transported out of state it must be presented to a registered bobcat pelt dealer (usually a licensed fur buyer) for permanent tagging, he said. Only bobcat pelts taken during the Nov. 15 to Feb. 15 season may be tagged and sold. Hunters not planning to sell bobcat pelts are reminded that any bobcat pelt also must be tagged prior to export of the pelt out of state.

Other restrictions may apply for hunting and trapping fur-bearing animals and are explained in the Fur-bearing Animal Regulations Digest. For further information on fur-bearers or bobcats, contact any TPWD law enforcement field office or TPWD headquarters at 1-800-792-1112 or (512) 389-4505.

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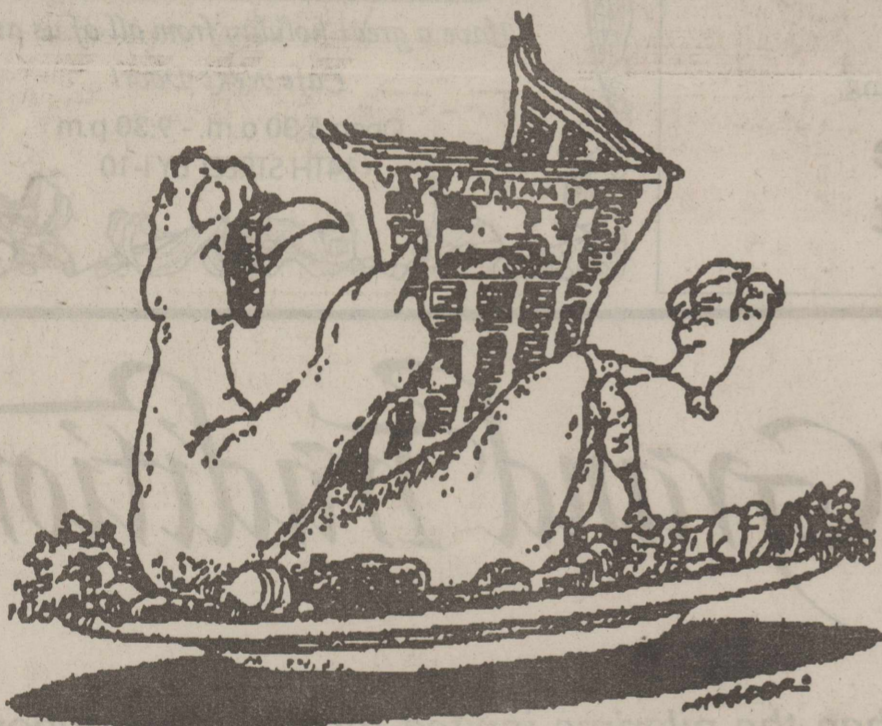
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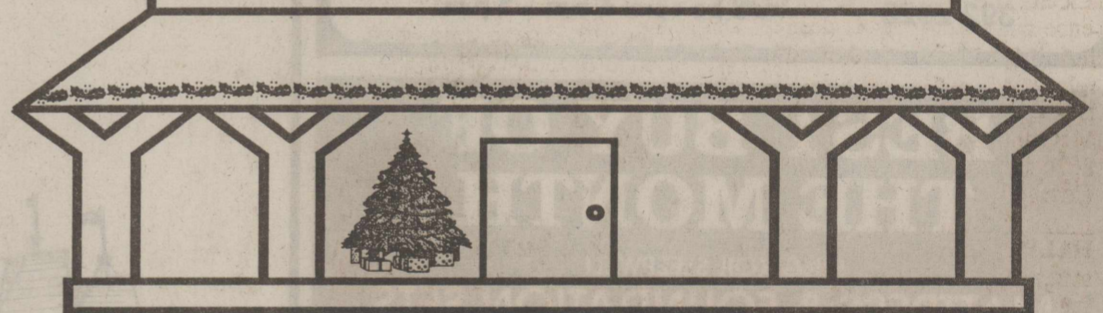
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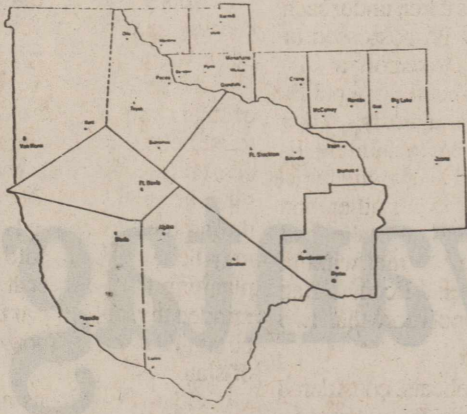
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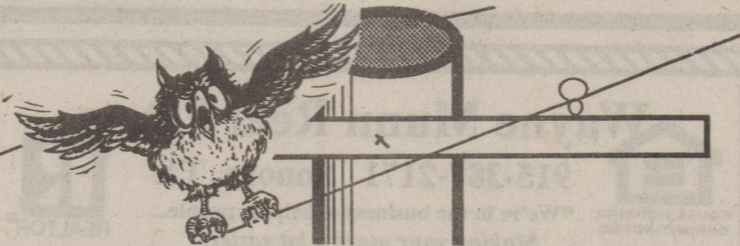
