Sanchez was an all-district wide receiver and punter last year. He was also chosen this year as an honorable mention in the defensive secondary,



From The Library

Librarian Sherry York is pleased to report that the new technology now available in the Ozona High School Library is being extensively used. New programs now provided on computers in the library include two new CD-ROM programs.

The new Grolier Multimedia Encyclopedia, 1994 edition, is available on computers in the library's computer network. This exciting new CD-ROM program allows students to search through what was formerly a twenty-one volume set of encyclopedias by simply typing in a word. The entire text of the encyclopedia is searched and all articles containing the search word are listed. The user can then choose an article, view the article, and view any accompanying pictures. Marking and printing needed information is a simple computerized

Other interesting features of the multimedia CD-ROM encyclopedia include options for browsing articles, a timeline and multimedia pictures.

Another useful option is the abilmore specific search such as "Abraham Lincoln" and "slavery" to find exactly the needed information. Three words can be linked under the word

Even more sophisticated searching is possible by using the limiter "not" as part of the search process. Various forms of a word can be searched through the use of "wild card" characters? or *.

A knowledge tree that branches from very general to very specific topics is another interesting facet of the multimedia encyclopedia.

Many of the possibilities of the CD-ROMencyclopedia have yet to be explored by our students. During this school year the multimedia encyclopedia has been used primarily by the geography and health classes to find basic information for reports and short technology provided. In addition to research projects.

dents will continue to use the multi- dents to work independently. media encyclopedia during the course of the school year. "I believe we will see students becoming more sophisticated researchers as they have more opportunities to use the multimedia encyclopedia as a part of their re-

search because," says Mrs. York, "this program is a research tool, not a technological toy."

Installation of this computer program is a part of the continuing process of library automation which began last school year with the automated card catalog and search program. The library automation project has been made possible through Chapter 2 federal funds supplemented by local

Hypothermia is a condition de fined as rapid loss of body temperature, which means the body loses heat faster than it can produce it, rapidly exhausting energy reserves.

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Holidays And Indigestion Don't Have To Go Together

HOUSTON - For people who suffer from indigestion during the holidays, relief is spelled m-o-d-e-r-a-

"The holidays are a common time for people to get indigestion," said Dr. Alan Buchman, an assistant professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "You can avoid ruining the festivities by being careful about how, when and what you eat."

Acid indigestion, or heartburn, is often caused by a backflow of stomach acid into the esophagus, a long tube connecting the throat and stomach. Buchman says indigestion can usually be avoided by not eating late night meals, eating at a casual pace, and cutting back on certain foods.

"If you eat holiday leftovers late at night, the esophagus cannot clear out the acid before you go to sleep," Buchman said. "When you lie down flat, there is no gravity to help the esophagus force out the acid."

Holiday revelers should keep fatty foods to a minimum, says Buchman, because they may increase the risk of

"The fat in creamy sauces and other foods can cause acid build-up." said Buchman, who is also director of nutrition support services at Baylor.

Heartburn signs to watch for may include a burning sensation in the chest or throat, nausea, coughing while eating, and difficult or painful swallow-

Antacids usually relieve heartburn symptoms, but if they are taken regularly, they can cause constipation or diarrhea.

"Don't put off seeing a doctor if

gallstones or a heart attack." For a heartburn-free holiday, Buchman recommends the following: -Eat small meals.

-Avoid or cut back on caffeinecontaining products like cola, coffee,

cigarettes and alcoholic beverages. -Refrain from wearing tight belts

or other restrictive clothing. -Do not bend over immediately

-Wait at least one hour before lying down after eating.

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

Board Members Review Academic Excellence Indicator Report

Board, meeting in their regular monthly session on Monday, Nov. 16, reviewed the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District 1993-94 Academic Excellence Indicator System Report that was received by the school district on Oct. 31.

Education Agency and based on information submitted by all Texas school districts through the Public Information Management System (PEIMS), provides information about the performance of 1,046 school districts, more than 6,000 schools, 250,000 educators, and 3.6 million students.

The AEIS report contains data on local student performance at both the district and campus levels. In addition, the report provides four specific comparisons: (1) district performance is compared to the state and the region of the education service center in which it is located; (2) campus performance is compared to the performance of a group of 100 similar campuses across the state; (3) performances of student groups are compared to that of other groups within a single campus and/or district; and (4) campus and district performance are compared to their performance for the prior year.

The report also contains profile information on: students, including enrollment, ethnicity, and economic status; (2) finances, including revenue and expenditures; (3) staff, including numbers and types, years of experience, degree held, salaries and staff turnover rates; and, (4) programs, operating expenditures.

Following trustee review, they report during their next regular meeting on Wednesday, Dec. 14, at 7 p.m. Copies of the AEIS report are available for public review at the four report at the board's next meeting. The report, produced by the Texas campuses and at the school admini-

This past Monday we had 47 students signed up to take the ASVAB test. This is the Armed Forces Vocational Aptitude Battery. It is a multiaptitude test battery that is designed to measure the aptitudes at this time in a student's life. It consists of 10 short individual tests covering word knowledge, paragraph comprehension, arithmetic reasoning, mathematics knowledge, general science, auto and shop information, mechanical comprehension, electronics information, numerical operations and coding speed. Several individual test results are combined to yield three academic composite scores; verbal, math and academic ability.

Test results will be available toward the end of December or the first of January. Each participant will receive test scores and a workbook to aid in applying their results toward career choices. I will help each student evaluate their results and confer with them on school and career guidance.

The PSAT scores will be in the first of January. Before the results arrive we will have a parent night in which students and their parents can come up and learn how to read the results of the test.

Some scholarship information has just been received in my office, and I encourage all seniors to come by and check out the opportunities. At this time we have scholarship information concerning engineering. In the near future, we will begin receiving a lot of scholarship applications for other areas of study.

Pete Golwas of Johnson Controls met with the members to explain a service offered by his company which allows school districts to make costeffective facility improvements which impact their operating budget in the area of energy conservation. Mr. Golwas said that he, with assistance from Ray Don Myers, school maintenance supervisor, had performed a preliminary survey of the district's air conditioning, heating, lighting and environmental controls and had identified an annual energy savings potential of \$27,994. "By implementing energy improvements, the cost of any new equipment can be offset by the annual energy savings to the district, thus upgrading these systems at a much less cost to the district. My recommendation is to request proposals from qualified companies specializing in energy conservation to implement operational cost reduction measures at your facilities on a performance contracting basis," Golwas said. Following discussion of this item the trustees voted to approve soliciting responses to the district's intent to enter into a performance contract to upgrade facilities and control energy operating costs.

Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton reported that the district had received a \$12,300 grant from the Texas Education Agency to purchase and install the T-STAR satellite delivery program for the school system. Cotton explained that T-STAR is a TEA initiative to expand the telecommunications capabilities of school districts to help provide comprehensive delivery of curriculum, inservice training, technical assistance, instructional software, text, graphics, audio and video communications services.

"We applied for the grant this summer and received notification from TEA on the last day of October that we had been awarded the money. Currently only about one out of every three school districts in Texas has the T-STAR satellite system, and we were certainly delighted to have an opportunity to obtain this exceptional technology," Cotton said. "Satellite video and audio reception will be obtained through a 12.5 foot dish and transmit-

receiver-tuner and descrambler, amplifier, antenna remote controller, television monitor, videocassette recorder, a computer, an equipment rack, and a cable-channel modulator. Our plans at the present time are to locate this equipment in the high school library

"From the satellite receiver room, cables will be run to three video distribution rooms which will each have a television, microphones with cable for the audio return system, and a jack for telephone communication. During interactive broadcasts, participants will be able to view the presenter or presenters via television and communicate with them at the same time by way of telephone transmission.

The district will not only have access to programming of this nature, but also it will have the capacity to tape educational television programs for students and teachers as well as receive specialized inservice programs from TEA and other educational inservice providers," he said.

During the meeting the members voted to purchase local school district delinquent taxes from the old County Education District #318 that was ruled unconstitutional by the Texas Supreme Court and which was replaced by Senate Bill 7. The \$2,475 amount to purchase the delinquent taxes will



> Coyotes and bobcats, considered nongame animals in Texas, can be taken at any time during the year by a licensed hunter, Oates said. The season for taking bobcats for the purpose of selling the pelt or transporting it out of state is Nov. 15 through Feb. 15. A hunting license is required for taking coyotes and bobcats at any time.


Bobcats are not classified as furhearing animals in Texas so a trapper's license is not required, but before the pelt is sold or transported out of state it must be presented to a registered bobcat pelt dealer (usually a licensed fur buyer) for permanent tagging, he said. Only bobcat pelts taken during the Nov. 15 to Feb. 15 season may be tagged and sold. Hunters not planning to sell bobcat pelts are reminded that any bobcat pelt also must be tagged prior to export of the pelt out
