DeerFest Draws Record Crowd

The great news is that the 1994 DeerFest fed 2,000 people with an estimated 2,200 in attendance. The surprising news is that the huge Fair Park Convention Center barely held them all.

This year's crowd practically doubled the 1993 attendance, surpassing the expectations of DeerFest Association members. Serving was completed in an hour and 15 minutes, and this included a 15 minute delay while someone went out for more plates according to Laurie Hale, association secretary/treasurer. Also included in the evening's shopping trips was a search for additional bread. One hundred ten loaves were consumed at DeerFest.

The meal included 77 deer, 21 feral hogs, 600 pounds of deer sausage, 150 dozen tamales, 250 pounds of potatoes, 100 pounds of beans, 51 boxes of fideo, 40 turkeys, 25 gallons of chili, 10 goats, four gallons of hot sauce and 30 pounds of onions.

Sheriff Jim Wilson, master of ceremonies for the event, announced the winners of 220 door prizes and 103 guns. Winners of the grand prize,

a Polaris 4x4, were Jack and Janie Riggs.

Marking the location for DeerFest was the giant Texas flag from Pecos River Crossing mounted atop a new 65 ton link belt hydraulic crane owned by Lilly Construction.

DeerFest president John L. Henderson is full of praise for the many donors, cooks and workers who made the event such a success. The high level of community involvement has enabled DeerFest Association to make a major contribution to the

convention center building fund, to buy equipment for the hospital and community center and to play a large part having a new ambulance building for Ozona.

Current DeerFest Association officers in addition to Henderson are vice-presidents Vaden Aldridge and Mike Preddy and secretary/treasurer Laurie Hale.

4-H's Cream Of The Crop At District Food Show

Crockett County 4-H'ers again demonstrated their abilities by doing a superb job at the District VI 4-H Food Show in Fort Stockton on Saturday, Dec. 3.

Competing against 4-H members from 23 counties in the district, Crockett County members did a superior job of demonstrating their nutrition knowledge and exhibiting the foods they had prepared. More 4-H members from Crockett County placed in the top three than from any other county, and both Crockett and Glasscock Counties tied for the second-most blue ribbons at eight each.

The Junior Division was almost all Crockett County, as three of the four main categories were taken by Ozona 4-H'ers. Paige Tambunga won the Nutritious Snacks and Desserts category with "Nana's Apple Pie". Erin Castro won the Breads and Cereals category with "Whole Wheat French Bread", and Kyle Richardson won the Fruits and Vegetables category with "Strawberry Spinach Salad".

Amanda Carson placed a close second in the Junior Lamb Category, while Kirsten Tambunga was fourth in the Junior Pork category. Marsha Maskill placed fifth in Junior Beef, and Kimberly Nowell placed 10th in the Junior Main Dish category.

In the Intermediate Division, Ty Porter was second in Pork, Laramie

McWilliams placed third in Main Dish, Codi Richardson placed third in Fruits and Vegetables, and Patricia Garza was third in Beef. Lindsay Flanagan placed sixth in Intermediate Lamb and Brittany Ellis was eighth in Snacks and Desserts.

"I cannot express the pride I feel in these 4-H members," said County Extension Agent-Family and Consumer Sciences Tetra Ulmer. "They and their parents and leaders - have done an outstanding job in preparing for district competition and in doing their best to represent Crockett County. They have given up other activities and made tremendous sacrifices to be at the district contest on Saturday, and I am so happy they all did so well."

Ulmer added that none of the 4-H'ers received a score lower than 88, and several of the 4-H'ers had perfect scores from one or both of the judges. "Considering that this is the first district competition for many of these 4-H'ers, I am very pleased," the agent said.

Ulmer thanked Barbara Carter, Raydene Flores and Katharine Durham for judging at district, and also noted that Crockett County National Bank and Wool Growers Central Storage of Ozona were the donors for all the lamb awards at district. "We appreciate these leaders and donors for their time and expertise," said Ulmer.

The 4-H members were judged on the quality of their dish, their knowledge of nutrition, and their communication skills. Each 4-H member must know the basic food groups from the food guide pyramid, the number of servings required each day, and an example of each. They must also know the main nutrients found in their dish, why our bodies need these nutrients, and what happens if you don't get enough. The 4-H'ers are also expected to be able to tell how they made their dish and answer any other questions the judges feel are appropriate.

"This is information many adults do not know, and we are proud of these 8-14 year-olds who have the courage and initiative to learn the information and relate it to the judges," said Ulmer.

64th Ozona Roundball Tourney Starts Thursday

In its 64th year, the Ozona Invitational Basketball Tournament will begin Thursday, Dec. 8, in Davidson Gymnasium.

Sixteen teams - eight boys and eight girls - will take the floor in the annual event. Boys' teams in addition to the Ozona Lions are: Comstock, Irion County, Wall, Coahoma, Sterling City, Brownfield and Fort Hancock. Girls' teams other than the Lady Lions of Ozona are: Comstock, Ster-

ling City, Coahoma, Irion County, Sonora, Brownfield and Fort Hancock.

The tournament will use an elimination-type format. Five games will be played on Thursday, with the opener between the Coahoma and Sterling City boys at 2:30 p.m. Following that game will be Sterling City and Coahoma girls at 4 p.m., then Irion County and Wall boys at 5:30 p.m. The Ozona Lady Lions will play Comstock girls at 7 p.m., and the Ozona Lions will close out the first evening against Comstock boys at 8:30 p.m.

On Friday, games begin at 1 p.m.,

and on Saturday, basketball fans can get an early start with games beginning at 10 a.m. Seventh place girls' and boys' games will be played at the junior high gym starting with the girls at 10 a.m. and the boys at 11:30 a.m. on Saturday morning.

This year's event promises to be full of exciting games, as several close matchups in both the boys' and girls' brackets should result during the tournament. Both Ozona teams look to be competitive and should do very well. Winning last year's tournament in the girls' division was Sterling City's Lady Golden Eagles. The Brownfield Cubs won the boys' division of the tournament.

Fans are urged to come out and support their home teams.

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration office located in Eden, FmHA County Supervisor Fred Greenway said.

Crockett County is one of five in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Greenway said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For those unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Greenway said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 26, 1995, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr. Greenway said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to

farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Eden is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

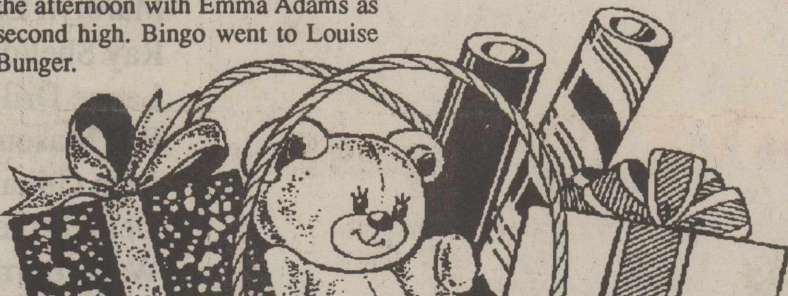

Crossing The Financial Finish Line For '94 A Winner

A little over three weeks remain in this year. These are weeks filled with holiday expenses on top of the usual budget crunching challenges. What can you do to reduce the stress and feel you are in control of your finance?

People can manage emergency situations that seem bigger than their resources by first "sizing up the situation". This is exactly what families can do about financial matters. Work together and size up your financial situation. How much money will your family have? How much are the bills you have to pay? What does each family member need and want to buy or do? What expenses can you adjust by the way you shop and live?

A calendar is a good "size up" tool. Write the amount of money you will have coming in each week from gifts, things you will sell, and ways family members can earn money other than salaries and pay checks. List only the money you know you can count on receiving.

Next list the bills that have to be paid. Figure out how much is left.

How can you use this information, use your resources, keep the situation under control and have a successful year's end? First, by working together you will find out what is really important to each family member. Too often families get into the habit of buying and doing things they have outgrown or no longer enjoy. Keep a list of things you would have been using your money to buy if you had not taken time to talk. Talk can be both cheap and valuable!

When you know everyone's priorities, think of as many ways as possible to get what your family wants and needs. For example, children can save coupons and help shop for the best buy when you're shopping. Money they save the family can become their "gift fund". Each family member could decide on the most important things they want to buy or do, and suggest how they might pay for it. Help children plan to do things that are reasonable for their age and ability. Parents need to model the process of identifying and planning to meet individual needs rather than denying their needs "for the children's sake".

Make an envelope for each person's goal and each type of ex-

pense the family has. Write the amount that needs to go into the envelope each week until that goal is reached. If each child's gift envelope needs \$50 and it's three weeks until the holiday, write \$16.66 on the envelope three times. After essential bills are paid from each pay check or when individuals earn or receive money, put the amount needed into each envelope. Mark the \$16 goal reached for the week. When shopping for gifts, use only money from the gift envelope. You can take advantage of sales without wrecking the rest of your budget.

The key to feeling in control in times of financial crunch is to have planned ahead as much as possible. A family can always reconsider its goals and make changes to meet new opportunities or needs. Making decisions as a family builds the family team, lets everyone feel their needs and ideas count and avoid surprises.

Challenges to plans are not a sign of failure -- they are a sign of the reality of living within our means. Success is defined by being in control of your decisions versus getting everything you want now.

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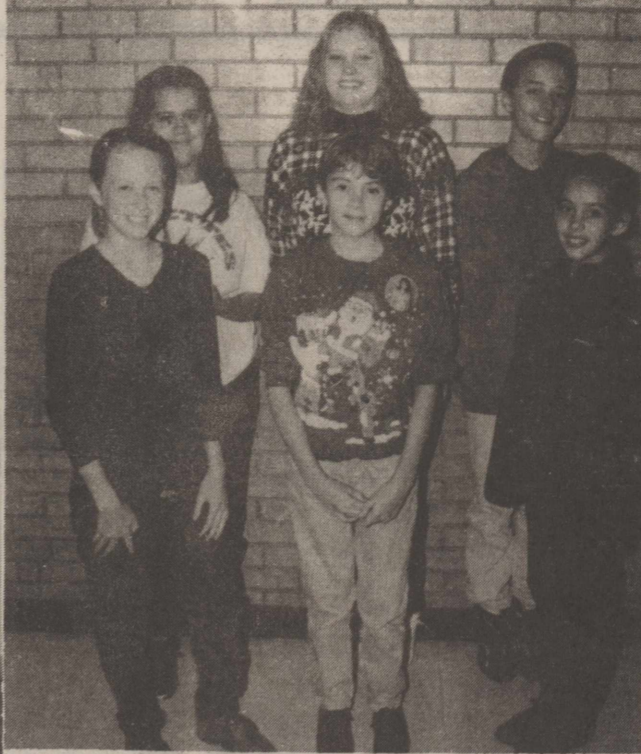

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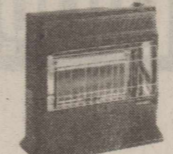
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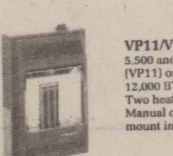


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Beware Of Holiday Hazards

Dry Christmas trees, faulty tree lights and mistletoe can make the holiday season dangerous.

Dry Christmas trees are a major hazard, said Dr. Kenneth L. Mattox of Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. Faulty electrical wiring and out-

lets can burn trees by setting off sparks. The base of the tree should be watered regularly.

Twinkling tree lights can attract toddlers who do not realize the lights should not be put in their mouths.

Parents should be careful with

mistletoe; if eaten, it can cause serious reactions such as heart failure. Holly berries are also poisonous, but, though fatal in rare instances, they usually cause only an upset stomach. Poinsettias also can cause an upset stomach.

Bachman added, "We succeeded in out-hustling and out-scoring them. We played a great three games, and the hometown fans helped motivate the boys to play better."

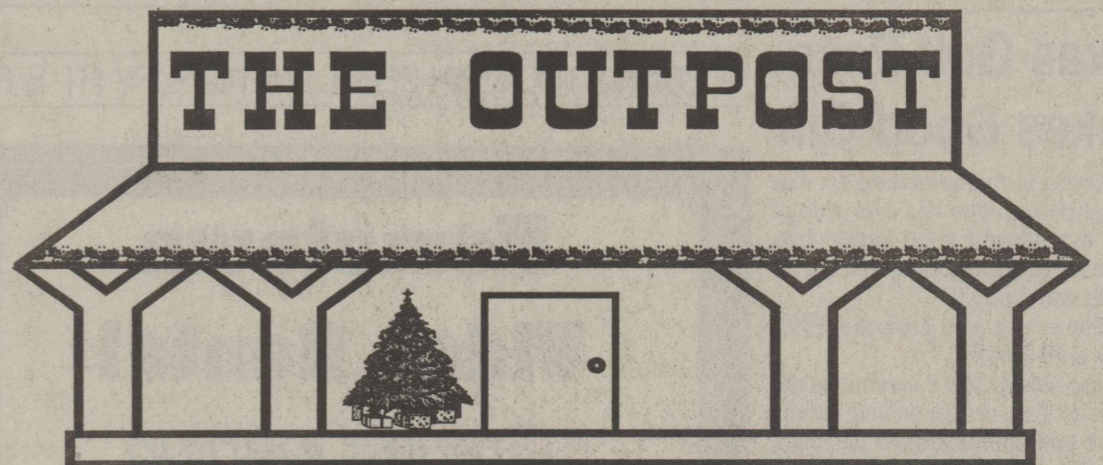
"What Are You Putting In There?"
