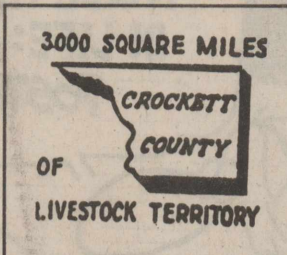

4-H Livestock Show Starts Thursday, Jan 5

The 48th Annual Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show and Sale will be held Jan. 5-7 at the County Show Barn and Fair Park Convention Center. 4-H members will exhibit market lambs, commercial ewe lambs, Angora goats, market swine and rabbits. The show, sale and barbecue lunch will be held in the new Fair Park Convention Center.

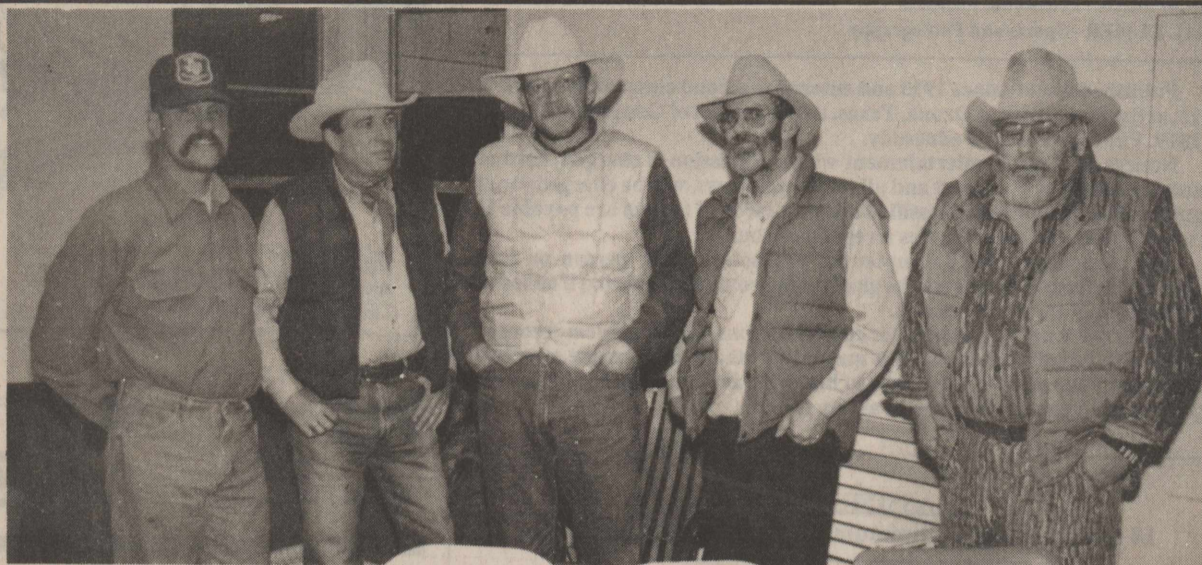
Angora goats need to be in the barn by 4 p.m. and rabbits by 5 p.m. Thursday afternoon, Jan. 5. Thursday evening's activities begin with the Angora Goat Show at 5:30, immediately followed by the Rabbit Show. A showmanship clinic will be held at 7 p.m. for all market animals in the old show barn.

All market lambs, ewe lambs and meat goats must be in the barn by 8 a.m. Friday, Jan. 6. Ewe lambs will be weighed Friday morning starting at 8 a.m., and market swine will be weighed in the afternoon.

The Friday night schedule begins with the First Year Feeder Show at 5:30 p.m. followed by the Meat Goat Show at 6, the Commercial Ewe Lamb Show at 7 and the Market Swine Show at 7:30.

Saturday morning at 8 a.m., the Market Lamb Show will begin with finewool classes, followed by crossbred classes. A barbecue lunch will be served at noon featuring brisket with all the trimmings. Takeout plates will be available. The awards presentation follows the lunch at 1:30 p.m. with the premium sale beginning at 2.

Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Clark from Eldorado will judge the rabbits and showmanship. Mr. Preston Faris, CEA from Sutton County, will judge the Angora Goat Show. Mr. Marvin Enzor, CEA from Seminole, will judge market lambs, ewe lambs, meat goats, market swine and showmanship.

Beginning Jan. 3, Long Distance Calls Within Area Codes 806 And 915 Must Include The Area Code

Beginning Jan. 3, 1995, long distance calls originating and completing in area codes 806 and 915 must include the area code ("0" or "1" plus the area code number plus the seven-digit directory number.)

"Within the 806 and 915 area codes, there continues to be a growing demand for telephone lines," according to Hardy E. White, GTE's general manager-customer operations, Western division. "This expanding need from population growth, economic progress and new technology - cellular telephones, fax machines, paging service, computer modems and others - has required a change in dialing procedures for long-distance calls within these area codes."

From July 3, 1994, until Jan. 3, 1995, callers had the option of using the area code when dialing long-distance calls within these area codes. After Jan. 3, 1995, only long-distance calls within the 806 and 915 area codes using 10-digit dialing (area code

plus the directory number) will be completed. After that date, customers will hear a recording asking them to dial again using the area code if they dial "1+" or "0+" the directory number.

GTE is reminding customers to be sure telephone equipment requiring dialing reprogramming or modification is changed by Jan. 3, 1995. Equipment that may require attention includes PBX systems, key systems, cellular phones, fax machines, computer modems, automatic dialers, voice mail, pagers/beepers, burglar/fire alarms, speed calling and call forwarding features.

This dialing change allows telephone prefixes with three-digit numbers using the middle digit of "0" or "1". The result is many more telephone numbers being available to customers in the 806 and 915 area codes. Without modification, telephone switching equipment would not be able to distinguish these numbers as prefixes or area codes.

Trustees Look To Decrease Operating Costs

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in their regular monthly session on Wednesday, Dec. 14, approved a request made by the Ozona Water Department for permission to do sewer improvements on district property south of Gurley Draw, which is adjacent to Ozona Primary School. Prior to the approval of a 15' permanent easement and an additional 25' construction easement close to the southernmost boundary of the property, Dee Keilers, Ozona Water Department Supervisor, and Scott Hay, OWD engineer, met with the trustees to present the proposed plan, which takes only a minimum amount of school property and is still financially acceptable to the water department.

In a December meeting with Mr. Keilers, trustees noted that the proposed sewer line location at that time would prevent any future permanent school buildings from being constructed on the property, and they requested that Keilers consult with the water department's engineers to see if an alternate plan could be developed to save as much district property as possible.

Members also approved a \$4,200 proposal by Johnson Controls to implement cost reduction measures in the school district on a performance contracting basis. Under the terms of the proposal, Johnson Controls will

Garza Chosen Second Team All-State, 1994 Stats Impressive

Ozona's Jesse Garza was recently selected to the Associated Press Sports Editors' All-State Class 2A second-team as an offensive end. Garza, along with teammates Chris Sanchez and Travis Davidson, were selected to the 1994 Standard Times Class 2A All-West Texas Football Team. Garza and Sanchez were selected to the offensive team with Garza at wide receiver and Sanchez at quarterback. Davidson was chosen as one of six linebackers on the defensive team. Another honor for Garza was being chosen as an offensive end to the San Angelo Standard Times All-West Texas Super Team.

Garza, a 5-foot-11-inch, 170-pound Ozona High senior, had 56

catches for 787 yards with an average of 14.05 yards per catch and eight touchdowns. Last year he had 34 catches for 611 yards and four touchdowns. In his sophomore year, he had 315 yards in receiving.

Six foot, 185-pound senior Chris Sanchez was selected all-state honorable mention at quarterback. After being moved from wide receiver last year to quarterback this year, Sanchez has also amassed some great statistics. He scored 13 touchdowns and completed 92 of 201 passes for 1,255 yards.

Travis Davidson played in every game, recovered six fumbles and had a total of 114 tackles. Rod Schneider, Lion defensive coach, said, "He is one of our most durable and versatile players. He made a lot of defensive calls himself."

The 1994 District Champion

Ozona Lions were at the top with a 7-2-1 record and a 4-0 district record, and they compiled some impressive statistics in their season efforts.

In 10 football games, the Lions racked up 3,295 total yards of offense and averaged 329.5 yards per game. A total of 33 touchdowns and 179 first downs were made by the offense.

The passing offense composed of three quarterbacks - senior Chris Sanchez, junior David Browne, and sophomore Pete Castaneda - combined for a total of 1,557 yards. For 10 games this group averaged 155.7 yards per game with 102 completions in 211 attempts for a 48 percent completion average. They scored 16 touchdowns and had only 11 interceptions.

In eight games, Sanchez completed 92 passes out of 201 attempts for a 46% completion rate with eight

interceptions. Sanchez was responsible for 156 yards per game in passing offense plus 86 yards per game in rushing for a total of 242 yards per game. Last year Sanchez was the Lions' top receiver with 35 catches for 627 yards and eight touchdowns.

Browne played two games at the quarterback position and completed 16 of 28 passes for a 57% completion rate. He passed for a total of 302 yards, three touchdowns and had three interceptions. Castaneda had one pass complete for four yards.

Tony Valencia, the team's second leading receiver, caught 20 passes for 308 yards and averaged 15.4 yards per catch and had three touchdowns. David Browne also played as a wide receiver, catching nine passes for 111 yards, averaging 12.33 yards per catch and two touchdowns. Adam Carroll caught eight passes for 83 yards and averaged 10.38 yards per catch.

Anthony Sanchez caught six passes for 56 yards, averaging 9.33 yards per catch and one touchdown. Jon Sanchez caught two passes for 54 yards, averaging 27 yards per catch and one touchdown. Matthew Ortiz caught one pass for 31 yards and a touchdown.

The total team rushing yardage for 10 games was 1,738 yards with an average of 174 yards per game. Total carries were 379 which averaged 4.59 yards per carry, and they had 17 touchdowns.

Chris Sanchez was the leading rusher for the Lions with 128 carries, 692 yards, averaged 5.41 yards per carry and had seven touchdowns. Running back Anthony Sanchez fol-

lowed with 72 carries, 367 yards, averaged 5.1 yards per carry and had five touchdowns.

Matthew Ortiz rushed for 295 yards in 69 carries, averaged 4.28 yards per carry and had one touchdown. Julio Martinez rushed for 178 yards in 25 carries, averaging 7.12 yards per carry and had two touchdowns. J.J. Lozano rushed for 51 yards in nine carries, averaging 5.67 yards per carry, and one touchdown. Sophomore Shayne Fuentes rushed for 41 yards in nine carries, averaging 4.56 yards per carry and one touchdown.

Four Ozona players punted, but mainly two shared the duty. Jesse Garza punted 16 times for a total of 476 yards and averaged 29.75 yards per punt. Joe Esparza punted seven times for 216 yards and averaged 30.86 yards per punt. Pete Castaneda and Chris Sanchez each punted once for 28 yards.

In 10 games, the Lions had 78 penalties for 606 yards and averaged 60.6 yards per game. Last year in 12 games, the Lions had 98 penalties for 789 yards and averaged 65.75 yards per game.

Defensively, the Lions were very underestimated by sports fans, area media and district coaches. Besides looking at tackles by individuals or as a team, statistics like points per game, total touchdowns, yards per game and many others are important as well.

Three touchdowns were scored by the defense. Two TD's were scored by Adam Carroll from blocked punts. J.J. Lozano scored one TD from a fumble recovery in the Junction game.

"It was a definite team effort, and

they played as a team unit," said Coach Schneider.

In 10 regular season games, the Lions allowed a total of 974 yards rushing, 717 yards passing for a total of 1,691 yards. This averaged 169.1 yards per game, and they allowed only 17 touchdowns.

Both the rushing and passing defense were very good with the Lions allowing only 9.2 yards per catch in passing and three yards per carry rushing in district play.

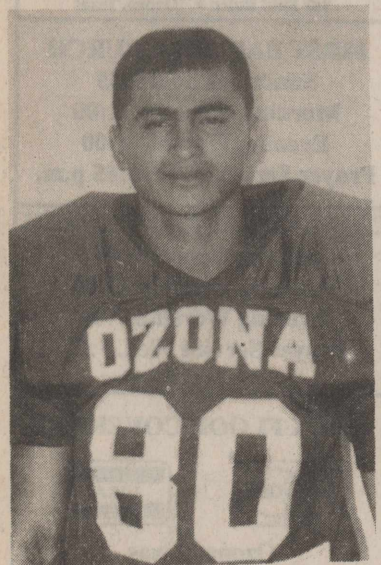
The Ozona defense forced 3.6 fumbles per game for the season and four per game in district play. Ozona was second in the district in allowing nine points per game and 10.8 for the season.

The last interesting stat shows the defense allowed only 42 plays per game in district and 45 for the season.

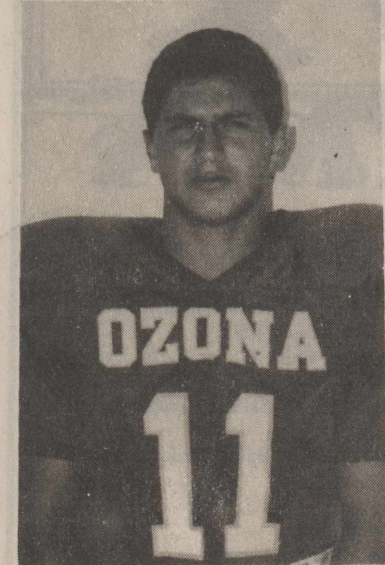
The Lions made a total of 758 tackles in 10 games. Davidson led the team with 114 tackles. The other top nine tacklers and number of tackles are as follows: Juan Trujillo 82, J.J. Lozano 59, Anthony Sanchez 72, Julio Martinez 57, Adam Carroll 52, Bryan Mendez 44 in seven games, Joe Esparza 39, Justin Moran 39 in seven games and Jesse Garza with 35 tackles.

Freshman Albert Flores made 22 tackles in five games and Steven Montes made eight tackles in two games.

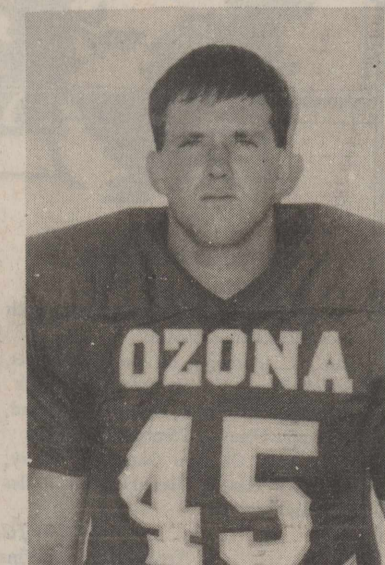
Football fans should be very proud of the accomplishments the whole team has made and the many hours of entertainment they have given us this year. They should all be commended for their efforts.

The concept of retirement is undergoing a radical change. A person approaching age 65 has a life expectancy of 85. At the turn of the century, the average life expectancy was 47. Healthier lifestyles and medical advances are making it possible for older people to continue to be productive far longer.

One result is that retirement planning is becoming far more important than ever if for no other reason than you have to plan for a longer period of time. It is becoming increasingly clear that the basis for a successful retirement is most often found in the level of planning that goes into the retirement decision. This means that the young worker needs to understand the role that Social Security, the company pension, and his own private initiative should play in providing for retirement.

Since the Social Security program was launched in 1935, social planners have viewed retirement income as a

three-legged stool consisting of Social Security as one leg, private pensions as another, and savings and investments, including insurance, as a third. Social Security provides the anchor leg, the source of income guaranteed by government to everyone who works and pays Social Security taxes. The worker is supposed to use the other two to build up a level of income consistent with his or her lifestyle.

Most experts agree that people need about 80 percent of their pre-retirement earnings to maintain their lifestyle in retirement. Social Security replaces about 42 percent of the income of workers with average lifestyle earnings.

In the face of concerns about the future of Social Security, some people are suggesting that we rely more on private means and less on government programs. However, the record shows that left to their own devices, few people plan adequately for their retirement. Statistics show that Social Se-

curity is the only source of income for 14 percent of elderly beneficiaries and constitutes 90 percent or more of the income for another 26 percent. The National Academy of Social Insurance notes that "thinking about planning for retirement, knowing what one should do to save for retirement, and actually taking the steps to adequately save are three very different things. Only a little more than half of all people surveyed indicated that they were actively saving for retirement."

Also, fewer than 59 percent of all employees participate in an employer-sponsored pension plan.

Today, financial planners are telling people to diversify their retirement investments and start retirement planning early. These are essentially the same messages Social Security has been telling workers over the years. While Social Security guarantees one leg, you will need to actively and aggressively pursue the other two

Nov. 14-20, 1994, marked the 75th anniversary of the observation of Children's Book Week. This annual event marks a time each year to emphasize the importance of books and reading in the lives of children.

In recognition of this special week, three school libraries in Ozona held book fairs. Book fairs give parents an opportunity to buy books for their children's home libraries.

Purchasing children's books shows that parents value reading, an

important lesson for children to learn. Children who read well and often tend to make better grades in all subjects, to develop larger vocabularies, and to obtain higher educational aims.

Librarian Donnie York and library aide Kathy Hall conducted the book fair for grades three through five at Ozona Intermediate School. complete a thorough inspection of the local school plant to identify areas in which the district can implement energy saving measures to control or reduce the cost of electricity and gas.

During the meeting the board also held a public hearing on the Ozona Public Schools' 1993-94 Academic Excellence Indicator System report which is produced by the Texas Education Agency for all school districts. The AEIS report contains data on local student performance at both the district and campus levels as well as profile information on: 1) students, including enrollment, ethnicity, and economic status; 2) finances, including revenue and expenditures; 3) staff, including number and types, years of experience, degree held, salaries and staff turnover rates; and, 4) programs, including student enrollments and operating expenditures. In a related item, the board also approved 1994-95 campus improvement plans based on the AEIS report.

The board also approved bids from DeCoty Coffee Company, Ben E. Keith Company, McLane Food Service, M & M Meat Packing Company, Mrs. Rios Corn Products, and Sysco Food Service for school cafeteria supplies and materials for January through May of this school year, the

1993-94 school year fiscal audit as prepared by the accounting firm of Eckert, Ingram, Tinkler, Oliphant and Featherston, L.L.P., Certified Public Accountants, and a high school semester test exemption policy which rewards students for good grades, attendance and discipline each semester.

The trustees adjourned into executive session during the meeting for the purpose of considering property, school mineral leases, and conducting the annual evaluation of the board. Emerging out of executive session,

the members voted to accept an offer made by realtor Johnny Childress on behalf of Jake Miller to purchase Mr. Miller's property which is located across the street from the high school. They also voted not to accept an offer by Statewide Minerals, L.C. to purchase the district's mineral interests.

Following approval of a motion to set the date and time of the January 1995 regular meeting of the board on Jan. 18, 1995, at 7 p.m., the meeting was adjourned.

Sales Tax Report Shows Increase

The second quarter sales tax report recently released by the state comptroller shows a 17.6 percent improvement over last year in local sales for all industries. Retail sales, however, had decreased by 2.5 percent.

There were 129 reporting outlets in the all industries category in 1994 compared to 115 the previous year. Gross sales in 1994's second quarter were \$10,897,201 compared to \$9,267,658 in 1993.

At the retail level, Crockett County had 84 reporting outlets in 1994 and 75 in 1993. Gross sales were \$5,720,378 in 1994 and \$5,868,878 in 1993.

Sutton County's retail statistics showed 78 outlets for 1994 with \$5,640,208 in sales compared to 75 outlets and \$4,965,810 in 1993, an increase of 13.6 percent.

In Reagan County, 1994 first quarter sales of \$5,685,390 were reported by 54 outlets, up 29.4 percent from the \$4,395,123 reported by 52 outlets in 1993.

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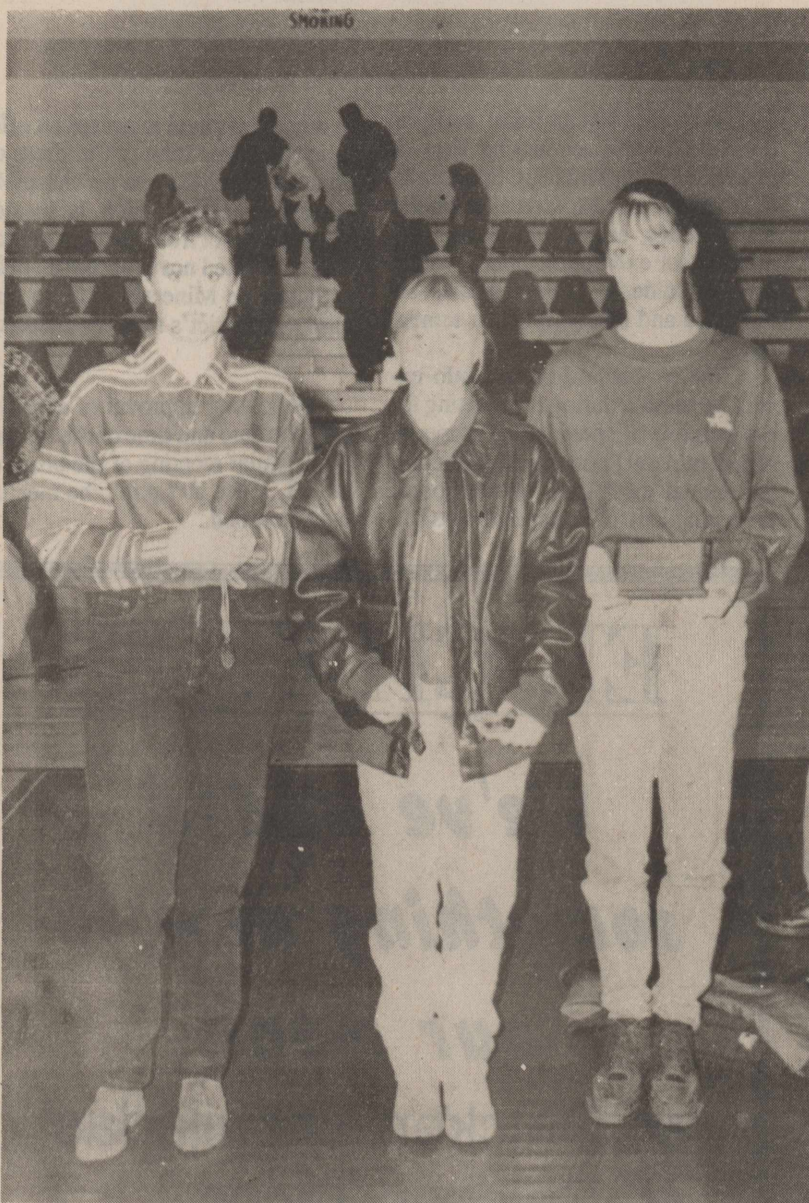

Lions Hit Snag In Reagan County Tournament

The Ozona Lions had several tough games and played for the consolation trophy in the 64th Annual Reagan County Tournament Friday in Big Lake. Lion Mel Martinez was selected to the boys' all-tournament team. Martinez scored a total of 53 points in the tournament.

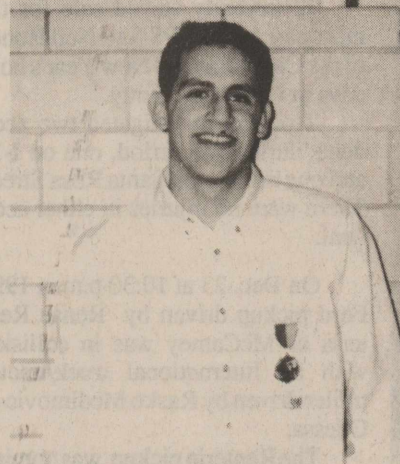
The Lions went 1-2 in the tournament to make their season record 10-6. "Overall, I thought we played pretty well, and (we are) looking forward to playing district play this week," said John Curry, head coach.

In their first tournament game on Tuesday, the Lions faced a determined Sonora Bronco team. The Lions started out cold, scoring only nine points to the Broncos' 14 points. The tempo and momentum changed in the second period, with the Lions scoring 18 points to the Broncos' 11 points to take a halftime lead 27-25.

It was the Broncos' turn to change the game around in the third period by scoring 19 points and regaining the lead at 44-38. Although Ozona fought back in the fourth with 14 points, they came out on the short end of the stick, losing to a feisty Bronco team 54-52.

"I was disappointed we didn't beat Sonora after twice beating them this year, and that put us in the consolation bracket of the tournament," said Curry.

Leading the Lions in scoring was all-tournament team player Mel Martinez with 23 points, including one 3-point shot. Chris Sanchez and Ray Fierro scored a 3-pointer each with

Sanchez making 16 points and Fierro 13 points. James Nelson completed two points to round out the Lion scoring. Adding their efforts in the game were Doug Meador, Lance Jamerson, David Browne and Lupe Llanas.

In the second game, Ozona faced their district rivals, the Eldorado Eagles, who lost to the host team Reagan County. The Lions came out ready to play, as they scored 14 points to Eldorado's seven points.

In the second period, the Eagles rallied with a 20-point quarter to pull within one point at halftime, 27-28. The Lions struck back in the third by scoring 11 points while holding Eldorado to six points, increasing their lead 39-33.

Good offensive rebounding and

scoring 23 points in the fourth quarter put the game out of the Eagles' reach and gave the Lions a 62-47 victory.

Mel Martinez led the Lions in scoring by making 16 points, including six field goals, and hitting 4 of 7 free throws. Making 13 points, including one 3-pointer, was Ray Fierro, followed by David Browne scoring 12 points. Chris Sanchez scored nine points, James Nelson made six points, and Lance Jamerson and Doug Meador scored three points each.

"I was tickled we beat Eldorado because they are one of our district opponents," said Coach Curry.

With the win over Eldorado, the Lions faced the Pecos Eagles for the consolation trophy on Friday. Pecos lost to Robert Lee in their first game and won by one point over Crane in the second game.

Both teams started out at a fast pace with the Lions coming out ahead 15-13 in the first quarter. The lead changed in the second period as both

teams fought hard, but the Eagles scored 16 points to lead 29-25.

The tempo increased in the third with the Lions scoring 18 points and the Eagles 22. The Eagles increased their lead by eight points to a 51-43 third quarter lead.

Domination by the Eagles in the fourth period with 20 points scored to Ozona's 12 put the game away for the Eagles and propelled them to a 71-55 win.

Chris Sanchez scored 22 points to lead the Lions in scoring. Mel Martinez scored 14 points, Doug Meador made eight points, Lance Jamerson put in seven points and Ray Fierro and David Browne scored two points each. James Nelson and David Browne also added their efforts in the game.

The defensive battle continued, and the pace stayed the same in the third. The Ladies added seven more points to Snyder's four points to make the score Ozona 22, Snyder 15.

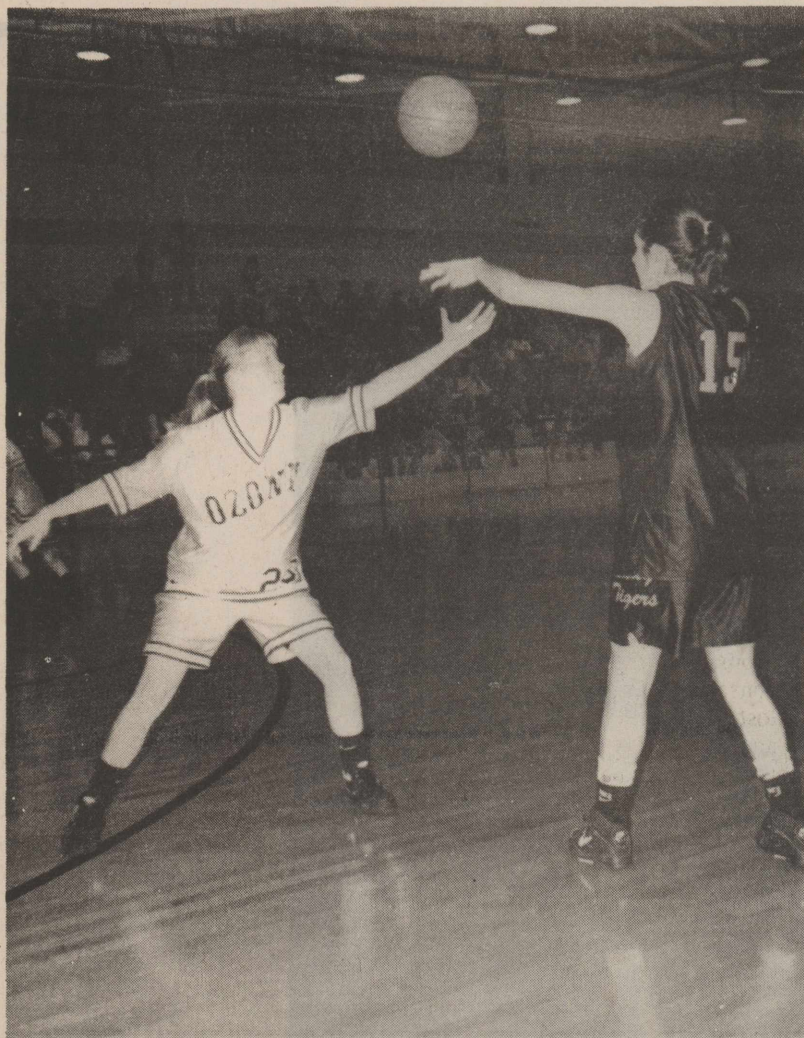
Recharging in the fourth, the Ladies scored 18 points and held the Lady Tigers to four points to finish

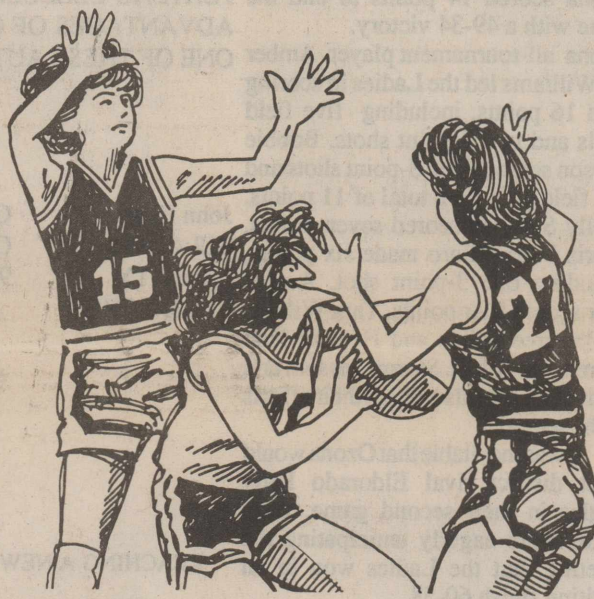
