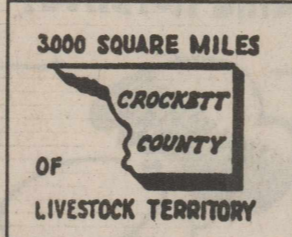

Lady Lions Ranked Fifth In State

The Ozona Lady Lions received their first-ever top 10 basketball ranking in the state Jan. 8 by a poll of the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches. They were ranked fifth in Class 2A division following their first two district wins over Anthony (70-

47) and Van Horn (88-23).

With the two wins, the Ladies improved their season record to 18-1. The Ladies have never been in the playoffs, and this is the first time for the Lady Lions to be in the top 10 TABC ranking.

Proud to have received the state ranking, head girls' basketball Coach

Dickie Faught said, "There are good things and bad things about being state-ranked. It is nice for our program and team to receive the recognition."

Faught continued to explain about the state ranking poll. "It can be misleading because the poll is based strictly on record, and factors like strength of schedule and distance trav-

eled are not always taken into account. Reputation has something to do with it as well."

Even though he was pleased on behalf of his players, Faught's final comments on the rankings were, "I have yet to see a poll win a game. Games are still played on the court and not in the rankings, so we need to keep that in perspective."

merchants is that it enables advertisers to make sales available as often as they wish. Daily, bi-weekly, even hourly -- it's all up to the advertiser. The merchants can enjoy complete control over ad content, because they can

Fire Department Elects Officers

Lady Lions Win Thirteenth Straight Game

The Ozona Lady Lions won their 13th game in a row Tuesday night, Jan. 10, in Davidson Gym by defeating the Class 4A Fort Stockton Prowlers 80-34. The Ladies now have a 19-1 season record and a District 5-2A record of 2-0. The two district wins by the Ladies were against the Anthony Lady Wildcats and the Van Horn Lady Eagles.

"I thought we played at a really high level. It kind of reminded me of the first two games because of our enthusiasm and high energy level," said Coach Dickie Faught. "It was a nice way to finish off our non-district schedule."

The Ladies came out fired up and hit the basket for a 21-7 first quarter. Continuing to play a great game and getting many turnovers, the Ladies scored 24 points while the Prowlers made 14 points for a 45-21 halftime score.

Ozona had little trouble scoring throughout the game. The Lady Lions added 16 points and held Fort Stockton to only four points for a 61-25 third quarter lead. The Ladies did not slow down one bit in the last period, as another 19 points went through the hoops. Fort Stockton was only able to make nine points and was never really able to get close to the Lady Lions as Ozona won the game 80-34.

Bobbie Bryson led the Ladies in scoring with 20 points followed by Gloria Peña-Alfaro with 17 points, Amber Tarr made 15, Shelly Sullivan scored 8, Amber McWilliams made 7, Connie Fielder scored 5, Heather Hall made 4, and Leigh Chandler scored 2 points. Tara Wilkins did not play due to illness.

"Again, Bryson, Peña-Alfaro and Tarr really got us going in the first half where we built our lead. Hopefully, that game will give us a good feeling in going into our district contest," added Faught.

In earlier basketball action, the

Ozona JV Lady Lions faced the Fort Stockton JV Prowlers and won 30-26. The JV's season record is now 8-2.

The Ladies jumped out to a 13-6 first quarter lead and kept up the pace into the second quarter to a 18-13 halftime lead.

The Ladies continued the same tempo going into the third quarter for a 10 point quarter but could only add two points in the fourth. The Ladies did maintain their lead and held the Prowlers to 13 points to win the game with the final score Ozona 30, Fort Stockton 26.

Leading scorer for the JV Ladies was Autumn McWilliams with nine points, including one three-point shot. Others scoring include Amy Laughlin with six points, Jessica Avila five, Megan Tambunga made four and Stephanie Franco and Julie Perez made two points each. A Prowler player mistakenly made two points for Ozona. Adding their efforts to the winning cause were: Lauren Wilkins, Haley Holden, Araceli Tijerina and Juli Hall.

TP&W Resumes Management of Fort

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will resume management February 1 of five historical parks: Eisenhower Birthplace in North Texas, Fort McKavett and Fort Lancaster in West Texas and Starr Mansion and Caddoan Mounds in East Texas.

The five sites have been run for two years by Texas Rural Communities, Inc., a nonprofit organization that promotes rural economic development. The sites were among 11 slated for severe cutbacks in June, 1992. The TRC agreement was one of a number of partnership strategies that ultimately kept all the affected parks open.

"The public won't notice any difference at these sites as we take them over," said Andrew Sansom, TPWD executive director. "We were

prepared for this contingency, and we will work with Texas Rural Communities to ensure a smooth transition."

"We are grateful to TRC for stepping forward to assist us through a difficult period. We consider our partnership with TRC a success in that it showed us the pros and cons of doing business in different ways."

TRC assumed management of the five sites through a management contract with TPWD signed on January 29, 1993. The purpose of the contract was "to develop and implement regional marketing plans in...the Western Edwards Plateau, the Red River Region and Middle East Texas; and to allow the continued operation of..." the five sites.

The department paid TRC management fees to operate the sites and to pay the salaries of any state employees remaining at them during the contract period. Throughout this time, even though they were managed by another entity, the sites have remained integral parts of the state park system.

Delton Daugherty, Region I di-

rector of public lands, who is headquartered in Marfa, said he has had no indication from TPWD of plans for closure. Crockett County citizens went to bat for Fort Lancaster, traveling to Austin to speak at a public hearing, when the site was threatened with closure before the TRC takeover. Daugherty said the state is working on a marketing plan for this region and looks forward to having the sites back.

TRC attempted to increase visitation and revenue at the sites through special events and increased promotion and marketing, with varying degrees of success.

"TRC has learned what we learned a long time ago, that it's hard to fulfill your obligation to protect these historic places and at the same time make money off them," said Ron Holliday, TPWD public lands division director.

Holliday said TPWD plans to ask TRC employees at the sites to stay on through a reasonable transition period. TRC has named Pete McRae to manage its transition affairs. Holliday will supervise the transition for TPWD.

Gulf Coast Pipeline Co. New In County

As of December 2, 1994, Gulf Coast Pipeline Company of Houston assumed operation of what was formerly Detroit Texas Gas Gathering and ER Operating. The intra-state company operates in Texas and Louisiana.

Donald Topper, president of Gulf Coast Pipeline, said his company "is pleased to be out here in this important area of Texas." According to Topper, the company is currently re-evaluating the whole field and has plans to build 12" pipelines. Gulf Coast is also looking for additional pipeline and operating opportunities.

The company's pipeline partners program works to put equipment to

use that is currently idle in the field. "We want to continue to grow," said Topper who urges those with pipeline or operating opportunities to contact Rex Surber, West Texas district manager for the company.

"We're pleased to have someone with Rex's exuberance, drive and abilities," Topper said. The company has five employees in Ozona.

Topper stressed the fact that the company is safety and environmentally conscious. An H2S seminar set for 10 people Jan. 18 will accept non-company people as long as slots are open, he said.

"The people of Ozona and Crockett County have been most helpful and kind," concluded Topper.

New Service At Doctors' Clinic

Area citizens needing physical therapy can receive treatment in Ozona three times a week by appointment now says hospital administrator Gerry Phillips.

Kurt von Ahn, physical therapist from San Angelo, is in Ozona on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Although von Ahn cannot see patients without a doctor's prescription, he said many of his referrals come from patients' requests to doctors.

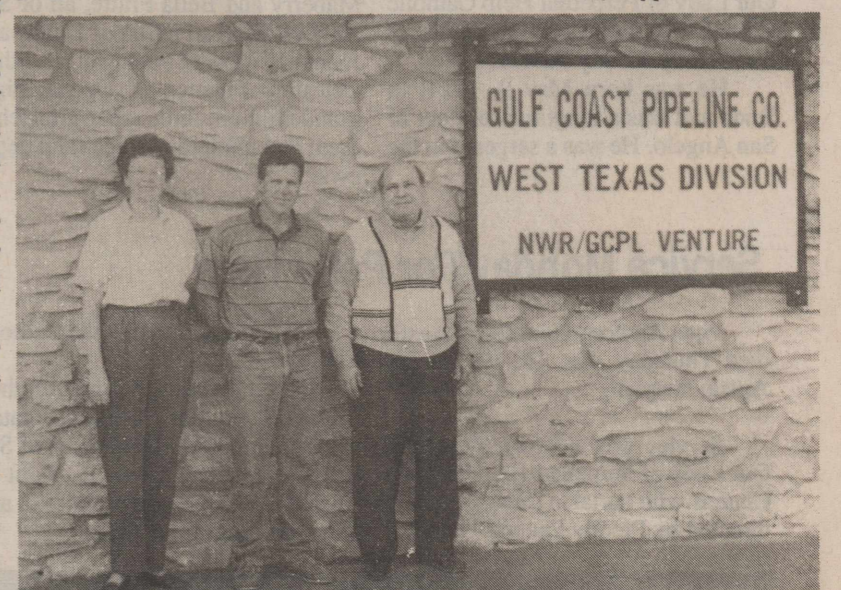
Ultra sound, exercise and hot pack treatment are used by von Ahn at the doctors' clinic adjacent to the hospital. His office is through the door on the east side of the building, facing H Street.

The therapist is not presently able

to bill Medicare, but will in the future. He is an independent, not working under an outreach program from another hospital, and does contract work in area towns.

Von Ahn earned a BS degree in science/physical therapy in 1988 from Boston University, Boston, MA. Six months of post graduate education in 1990 earned certification in manual therapy. He was employed as chief physical therapist at Healthfocus Inc. in Wharton from Aug. 1988 to June 1992. He then came to San Angelo with Rehabcare Corp./Shannon Hospital as chief physical therapist from June 1992 to the present.

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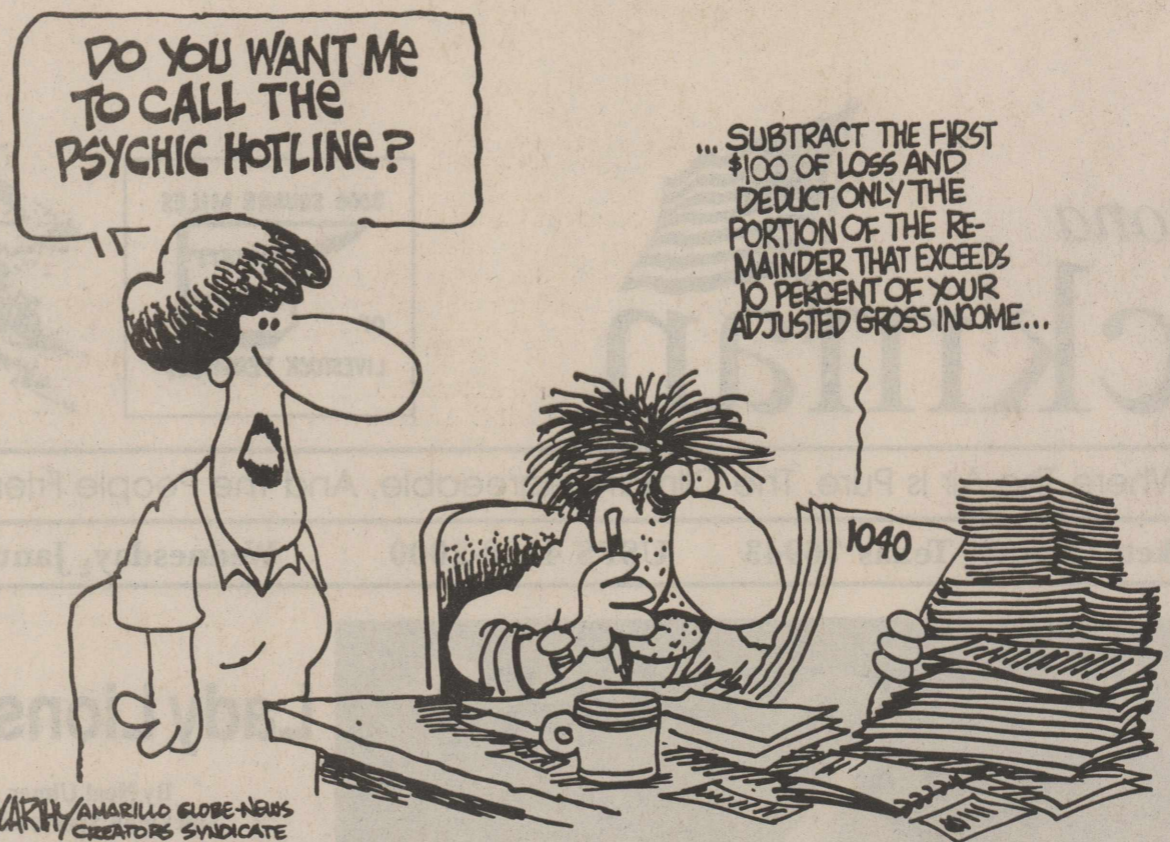

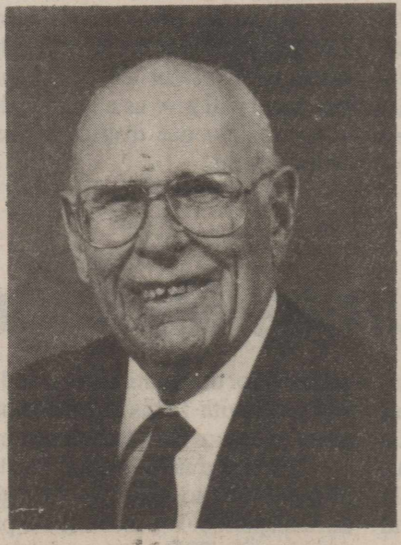
Bud Coates Service Jan. 11 in Ozona

Dennis Fleet (Bud) Coates Jr. was called to live with his Lord on Monday evening, Jan. 9, 1994. Memorial service was conducted Wednesday, Jan. 11, in First Baptist Church with Bro. Bill Fuller, pastor, and Dr. S. Nelson Lanham of Austin, dear friend and former pastor, officiating, and David McCarley, friend and former minister of youth and music, leading in music. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Born Sept. 16, 1917, Bud spent all his life in Ozona and Crockett County, graduating from OHS in 1934 and ranching with his father and brothers until entering the Army in December of 1942. He enlisted in San Antonio and on returning to Ozona the next day, he learned of Pearl Harbor. He served his country well, in Normandy, France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. He was awarded the Bronze Star Medal and had previously refused the Purple Heart Medal. On Nov. 29, 1944, he received a Battlefield Commission as Second Lieutenant. He was discharged in San Antonio on Nov. 25, 1945.

Bud married Margaret Howard Coates, Dec. 11, 1943, in Quartzite, AZ.

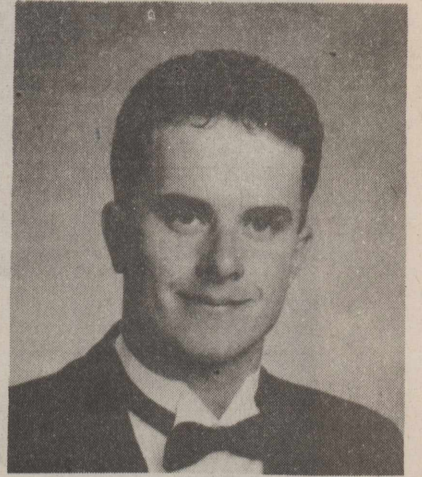

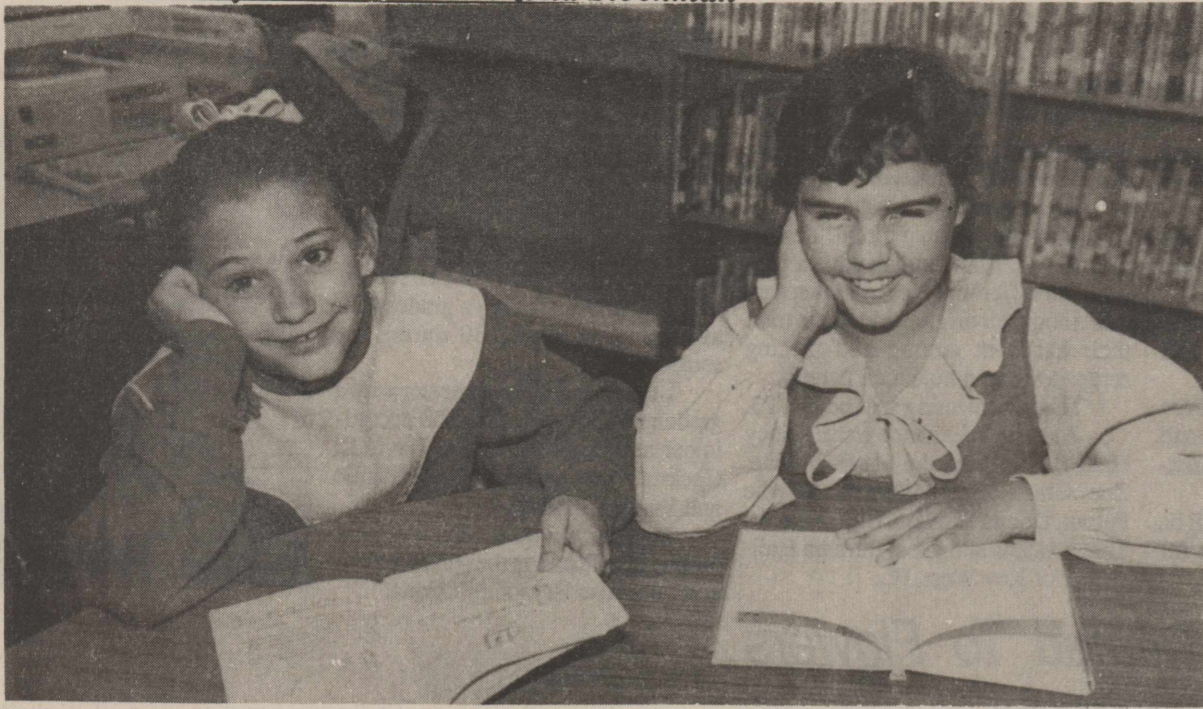

In front of a gym packed with screaming Ozona and Eldorado fans, James Nelson made a layup and sank a free throw to pull the Lions ahead at the final buzzer, 59-57. The Lions increased their season record to 13-7 and district record to 2-1.

Head boys' coach John Curry said, "I thought we played well for three quarters but our kids kept their composure, stayed together, and pulled it out. It was a big win on the road. We are looking forward to this week with McCamey and Iraan."

Exercise Or Rest?

Are you frustrated because you want to exercise, yet arthritis pain limits your mobility? Dr. Arthur Kavanaugh, assistant professor of internal medicine at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas, recommends swimming or water exercises to arthritis patients.

"The buoyancy of the water may help protect swollen joints from stress," said Kavanaugh, a rheumatologist. "Although arthritis patients need rest to protect their joints, it is also very important for them to maintain the range of motion in their joints."

"In addition, strengthening the muscles around the joints can be beneficial to patients with certain types of arthritis such as osteoarthritis."

"It's important that you ask your doctor if water exercises would benefit you," he said. "You should ask your doctor and physical therapist to recommend specific exercises tailored to your needs."

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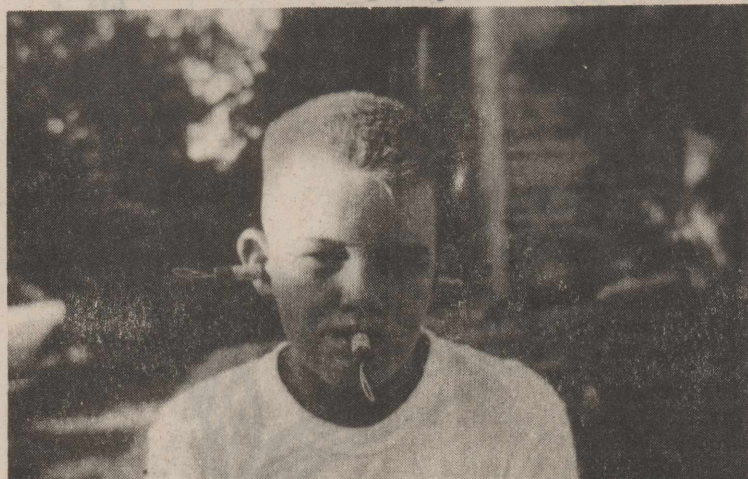

The Ozona JV Lions lost to the Fort Stockton JV Panthers 91-58 in earlier action. The JV's season record is now 3-7.

"We are going to have to learn how to play better defense and to run our offense," said Coach Ronnie Casey.

The Panthers were hot, scoring 27 points in the first period to the Lions' six points. Substituting with five fresh players, the Panthers added 19 points in the second quarter with the Lions increasing their score 10 points to make the halftime score Ozona 16, Fort Stockton 46.

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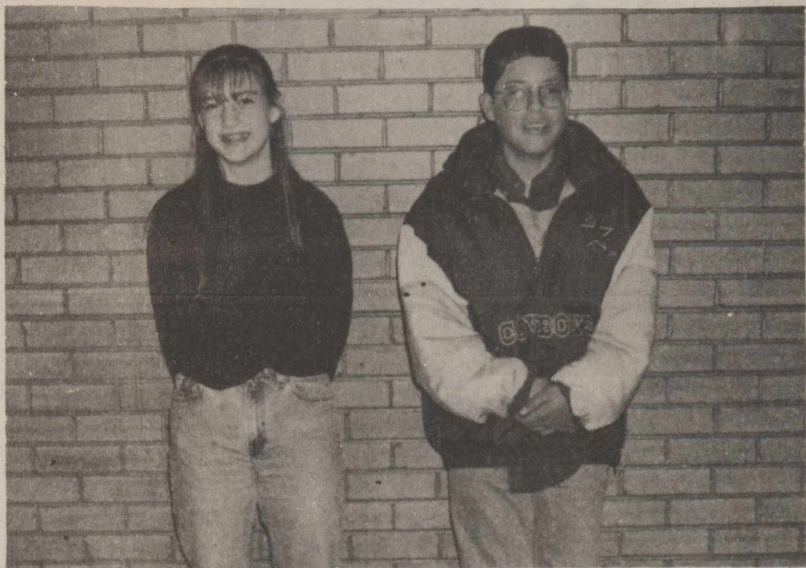

When you apply for a library card, it is now a federal law that you also be offered a voter registration card. It is not required that you register to vote to use the library, but now you will have the opportunity to do so. This law applies to all public service agencies, such as Dept. of Public Safety Drivers License offices, Dept. of Health and Dept. of Human Services offices as

well as libraries. It is hoped that in this way the more than 5 million Texans eligible to vote that are not registered will become active participating members in our government and election process. Visit your public library and register to vote now.

CCPL has a fax machine for the public to use. It's fast, it's easy and it doesn't cost an arm and a leg to use. It's a XEROX 7024 plain paper FAX and makes wonderful clear copies. is a new ACP policy adopted by the County Committee; you may pick up your copy at the office. You will be given one at the time you sign up.

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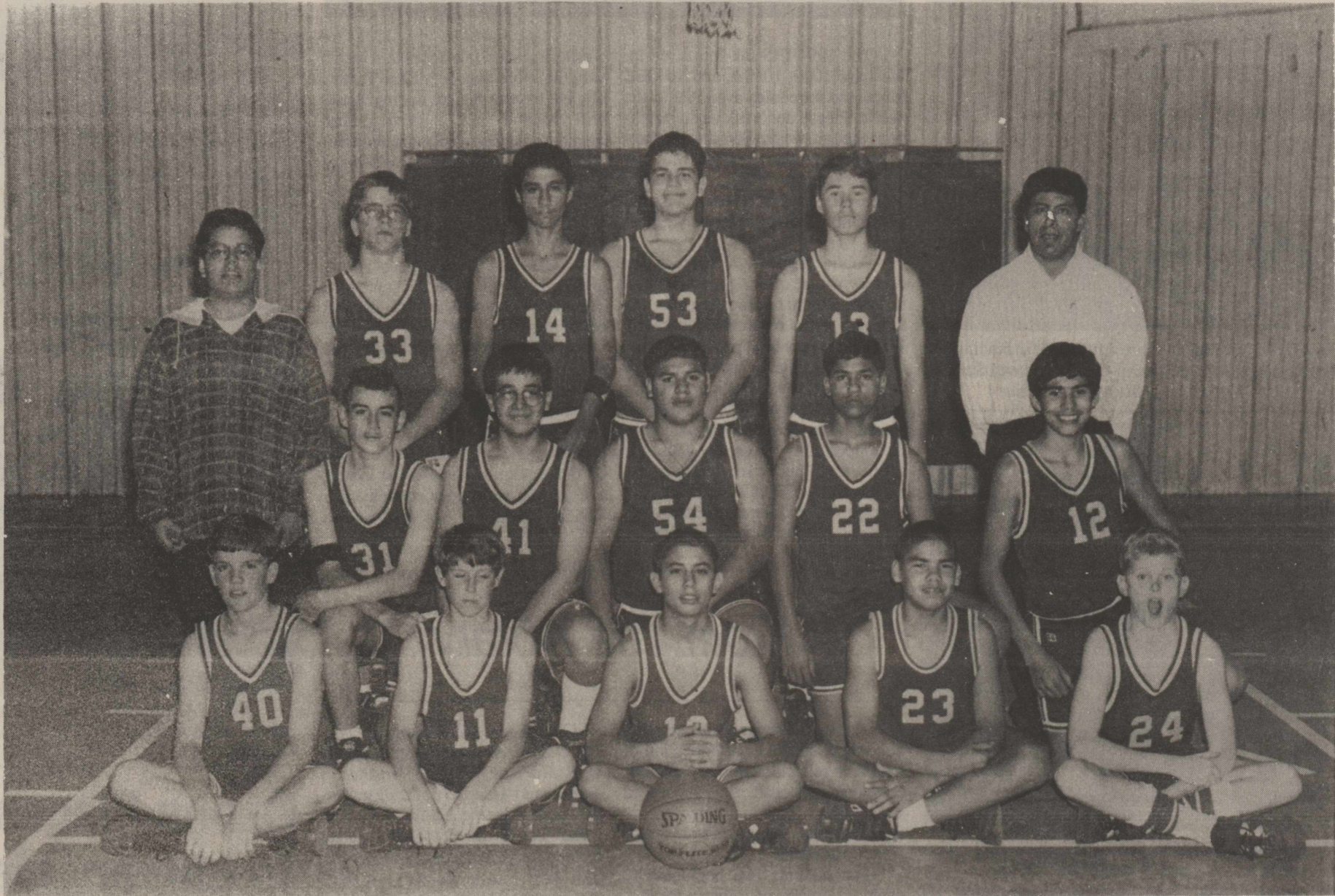

Bagel Bugs Beware

Routine drug screening in the work place, organized sports and the military has become a fact of life. Therefore, those of us who love bagels and other pastries seasoned with poppy seeds need to know this culinary habit could create problems.

Dr. Paul Orsulak, professor of psychiatry at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas, says the small amount of opium in just one bagel topped with poppy seeds won't affect your mood, but it can cause a positive result on some routine drug-screening tests. Orsulak is studying the effectiveness of current drug-screening techniques and is working to develop better methods.
