

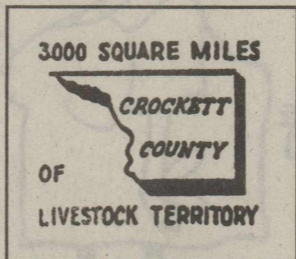

Robin Hood Education Plan Upheld

A 5-4 decision by the Texas Supreme Court Monday upheld the school finance law, Senate Bill 7, requiring property-rich school districts to share the wealth with other schools.

The decision written by Justice John Cornyn (R) stated "We conclude that Senate Bill 7 is constitutional in all respects." The supreme court had overturned school finance laws in 1991 and 1992.

Favoring upholding the Robin Hood plan along with Cornyn were: Chief Justice Tom Phillips (R), Justices Raul Gonzales (D), Jack Hightower (D) and Bob Gammage (D).

Against were: Justices Nathan Hecht (R), Craig Enoch (D), Priscilla Owen (D) and Rose Spector (D).

State aid and local property tax money primarily fund S.B. 7. The law places a cap on local property wealth, requiring school districts with property valuations over \$280,000 per student to share with other schools.

This school year there are 96 property rich districts in the state out of 1,045 districts statewide. These property rich districts had a choice of sending money to the state or becoming partners with a poorer school district.

Crockett County voters previously approved reducing the district's wealth to \$280,000 taxable wealth behind each student by paying the state for education of students elsewhere.

In 1993, the local district sent \$1,360,542.00 to Austin for education

of other students. The 1994-95 school year figures indicate an estimated \$1,669,413 will be sent from Crockett County to Austin for other students. August estimates projected a payment of \$1,850,000 for the year, but this has changed due to increased enrollment. The figure will be final at the end of the school year.

At the end of the three year transition period provided by S.B. 7, property rich districts will be able to raise no more than \$4,200 per weighted average daily attendance (WADA). The \$4,200 is based on a calculation of maximum taxable wealth limit of \$280,000 per WADA multiplied by a maximum maintenance and operating tax of \$1.50.

During this transition period, local schools were allowed three years at a tax base that, at the greater of either a tax rate set in statute or their 1992-93

rate, will generate maintenance and operation revenue per weighted average daily attendance equal to that of the 1992-93 school year. The statute set a tax rate of \$1.375 for wealthy districts for 1993-94 and \$1.50 for 1994-95 and 1995-96.

The local school district's tax rate for 1993-94 was \$1.21 per \$100 valuation. The rate for 1994-95 was set at \$1.23.

Superintendent Larry Taylor cautioned board members at an August meeting when an estimated budget of \$7,833,351 was approved for the 1994-95 year that in preparation for funding after the transition period, wealthy districts have three choices: cut back on operating expenses, raise taxes or do a combination of both.

Taylor and Ted Cotton, assistant superintendent, were in Austin for meetings Monday and Tuesday.

Top 10 Taxpayers Have 49% Of Valuation

Crockett County's top 10 taxpayers were responsible for \$274,182,950 or 49% of the total 1994 value of \$562,758,410 for tax purposes.

According to market/taxable value figures from the office of Tom Stokes, tax assessor/collector, Texaco Exploration and Production Inc. shows to be number one with \$50,955,810 valuation for 19% of the top 10.

Stokes explained that this changes when taking into consideration the purchase of Amax Oil & Gas Inc. and Amax Oil & Gas (Ladd) by Union Pacific Resources during the year. Listed third and sixth separately, their combined taxes, which will be paid by UPRC, put that company in the lead with .2182% of valuations.

Valuations for the two were \$43,403,650 and \$16,422,190 respectively.

Results from the change have Texaco in second place with \$50,955,810 for .1859%, Shell Western Exploration third with \$48,020,000 valuation for .1752%, Enron Oil & Gas fourth with \$40,397,900 and .1474%, American Exploration fifth with \$18,406,090 for .0672%, J. Cleo Thompson sixth with \$16,091,830 and .0587%, Shannon Estate seventh with \$15,480,950 and .0565%, Harrison Interests Limited with \$12,508,130 and .0457% and Devon Energy Corporation with \$12,496,400 and .0456%.

Tax rates per \$100 for the period are: .537 County, .146 road, \$1.23 school and .016 Emerald Underground Water District.

Ozona Splits Two With Anthony

Friday night, Jan. 27, was both exhilarating and disappointing for Ozona basketball as the Lady Lions trounced the Anthony Lady Wildcats 83-42. Unfortunately, in the boys' game, both teams played it close, and the Wildcats pulled through with a 66-55 win over the Ozona Lions.

The Ladies increased their winning streak to 17 games in a row, a season record of 22-1 and district record of 5-0.

Speed is one thing, but shooting percentage is another as the Lady Lions shot well throughout the entire game. The Ladies were unstoppable and put 20 points on the board while the Lady Wildcats could only muster 10 points for a first quarter score of Ozona 20, Anthony 10.

The second period was more of the same as the Lady Lions continued their pace by scoring 21 points. Anthony came up with another 10 points,

but Ozona led at halftime 41-20.

Good shooting, rebounding and forcing turnovers gave the Ladies a good second half. The Ladies continued with relentless enthusiasm in the third period as they scored another 20 points and held the Lady Wildcats to only six points for a 61-26 score. The fourth quarter was no exception, as the Ladies scored 22 points to Anthony's 16 for an 83-42 win.

"It took a while to get started, and you could tell we've been off a week," said Coach Dickie Faught. "I was very pleased with the shooting percentage - it was 65%. Anthony was real quick, and we had to make adjustments on our press and our defense. The girls did a good job with those adjustments. We had great balance in scoring with five girls in double figures."

Leading the scoring was Amber Tarr with 18 points. Amber McWilliams made 12, Tara Wilkins, Stormi Sessom and Shelly Sullivan scored 10 each points each. Gloria Peña-Alfaro made eight, Bobbie Bryson scored six, Heather Hall made four, Connie Fielder scored three and Leigh Chandler made two points.

The Lions came out ready to play, but a weak third quarter left them vulnerable to the district-leading Anthony Wildcats and resulted in a 66-55 final score. The Lions' season record is 15-8, and their district record is 4-2.

Shooting well, the Lions stayed with the Wildcats in the first quarter,

scoring 16 points to the Wildcats' 17 points. Continuing into the second quarter, both teams played hard and fast with Ozona scoring 15 points to take a one-point halftime lead at 31-30.

Missed baskets and passes took their toll on the Lions in the third period as Ozona scored only eight points. The Wildcats scored 16 points and never seemed to miss as they led after three quarters by a score of 46-39. Although they had fallen behind, the Lions continued to fight hard for the win. However, no matter how hard the Lions played, the Wildcats played just as hard, and Anthony scored 20 points to the Lions' 16 points in that final period to win the game 66-55.

"We hit a stretch in the third quarter (last three minutes) where we threw the ball away and took a bad shot, and that was critical," said Coach John Curry. "We couldn't overcome that. They (Anthony) have a good ball club, and you can't afford to make any mistakes. That leaves us in a position that we have to 'win out' for second place. We really appreciate all the fan support for both the boys and girls," he said.

Ray Fierro led the Lions in scoring with 22 points, including one three-pointer. Chirs Sanchez scored 14 points, Mel Martinez made eight, James Nelson scored four, Lance Jamerson made three, and David Browne and Lupe Llanas scored two points each. Others playing in the game were Doug Meador and Jon Sanchez.

Cubettes Win Second Tourney Of Year, Remain Undefeated

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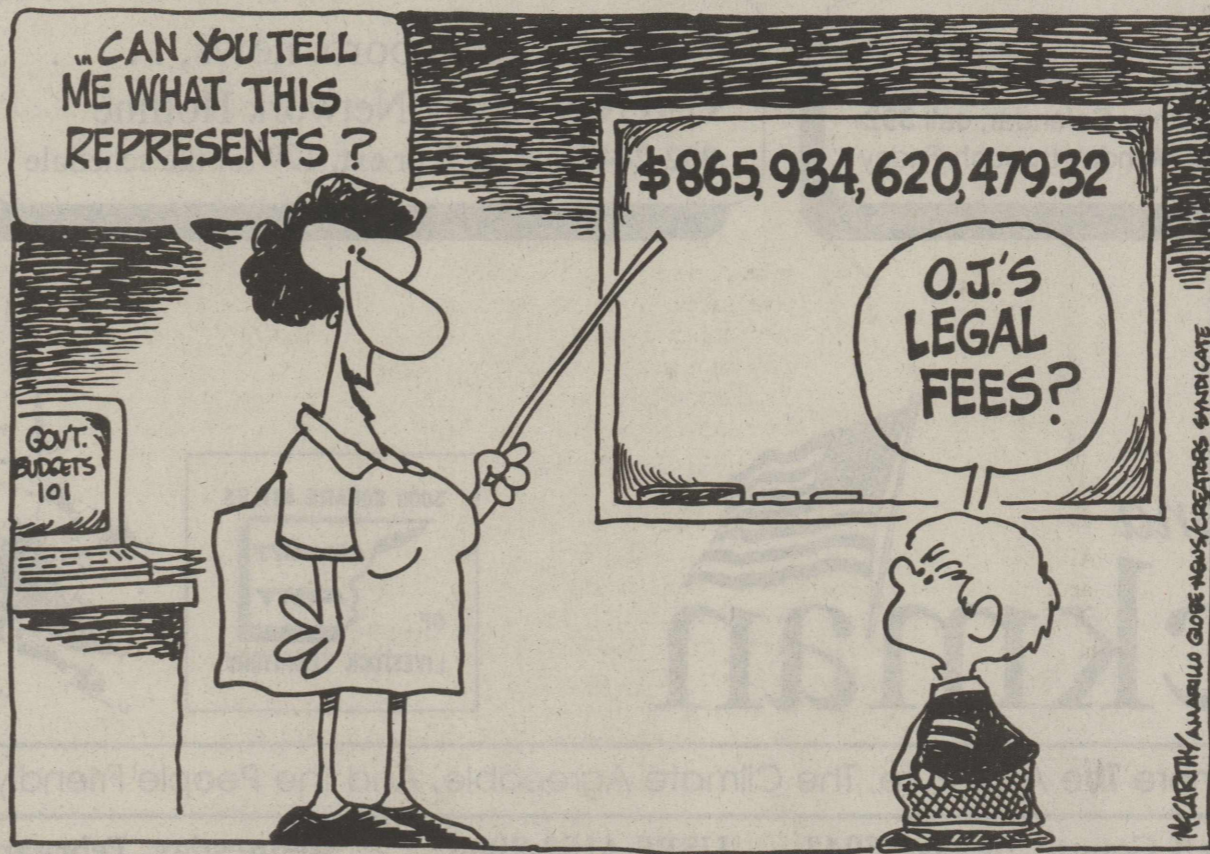

Thoughts and prayers of the group are with club members and their families who were reported not well by the Sunshine Committee.

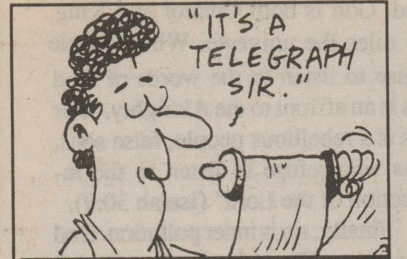
A letter from International was read on insurance and also registrations for the upcoming convention that is to be held in San Antonio. Members should look this over carefully and consider going.

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FCE Clubs Invite New Members

Whether a young mother with toddlers, a retired grandmother, or a working mom facing the prospect of another stressful week, Family Community Education Clubs are for you.

Two Family Community Education Clubs currently serve Crockett County. They meet on one Thursday each month, with one group meeting at 10 a.m. and one meeting at 7 p.m. Annual dues are only \$4, and entitle members to apply for scholarships and receive the state organization newsletter, "The Messenger", as well as monthly meeting notices.

Women of all ages and backgrounds can come together in the FCE clubs for educational programs, fellowship and fun. "It's an excellent way to get to meet new people and relaxing to have a place to express your feelings and concerns," said Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent for Family and Consumer Sciences. Ulmer, as a professional staff member of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, works with the members to develop educational programs that strengthen and enrich families, and which are of interest to the people in the community.

"Whether you're new in town or have been a resident all your life, we'd love for you to attend," said Ulmer. There is no charge for interested persons to attend the programs, but the group does encourage membership as a way for the club to attain its goals.

Upcoming programs will include topics such as women's health and nutrition issues for the '90's, making

healthy lifestyle choices, decorating with sheets and slipcovers, and a follow-up program to last year's on home businesses.

For more information on FCE, contact the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721, or come to next month's meeting on Thursday, Feb. 16, at either 10 a.m. or 7 p.m., whichever is most convenient. The meeting will be held at the Crockett County Civic Center, in the large meeting room.

The program will demonstrate food preparation methods that help you lower fat and calories in the diet, while making food preparation quicker and easier. Focus will be on the use of meats and fresh fruits and vegetables.

Lawlessness, Rebellion, Pollution

I've been asked the question more than once, "What is sin?" Our society is so far removed from God it rejects the concept. Here is a three-fold answer.

First, sin is violation of God's standards for living. These standards are found in the Ten Commandments. For example, cheating on an exam is sin. Cheating is stealing answers from someone. The Eighth Commandment says, "You shall not steal" (Exodus 20:15). This is God's law. "Sin is the transgression (violation) of the law" (1 John 3:4). Adultery is also sin. The Seventh Commandment says, "You shall not commit adultery" (Exodus 20:14).

Second, Sin is rebellion against

God, God is both Creator and King. He rules the universe. When people refuse to listen to the words of God this is an affront to the Almighty. "For this is a rebellious people, false sons, sons who refuse to listen to the instruction of the Lord" (Isaiah 30:9).

Finally, sin is inner pollution. God says to us, "Be holy; for I am holy" (Leviticus 11:44). Our problem is a lack of holiness. That is, our hearts are inclined against God. We would rather snub Him and please ourselves. We'd rather rebel against God and cheat on the exam or shack up with our girlfriend. We have no qualms. We feel no guilt. That's inner pollution. That's sin in our hearts.

Exciting to the end was the Ozona Lions and Iraan Braves ballgame with Ozona squeaking by 57-55 in a recent game in Davidson Gym. The Lions improved their district record to 4-1 and their season record to 15-7.

The Braves and Lions started battling it out in the first period with the Lions on top 15-11. The pace continued in the second period with Iraan scoring 16 points to the Lions' 13 points, but Ozona maintained the lead 28-27.

The second half was even more exciting than the first. Each team picked up the tempo at different times. Iraan shot well, making 17 points to Ozona's 12 points to take over a third quarter lead Iraan 44, Ozona 40.

Ozona decided it was "now or never" as they made their move in the fourth period. Picking up the pace in scoring and playing good defense, the Lions got back in the game. They scored 17 points to the Braves' 11 points to win the game 57-55.

Shooting well in the third period, the Lions scored a big 21 points and controlled the Braves to 13 points for a 52-35 lead. The final quarter was close with both teams playing hard and staying alert, but the Lions arose and hustled the whole ball game," said Coach Ronnie Casey. "That was definitely our best defense and rebounding all year. Justin Browne played his best game since the Rankin game. That should put us in second place in the JV division."

The more a parent is involved in their child's education, the better that child will do in school. Improved and more frequent communication between parents and teachers is an important element in the success of children and their educations.

Communication is very important, however it is often influenced adversely today by busy lifestyles. Often parents do not feel well informed about their children's schooling. Even though teachers make every effort to communicate with parents via notes home, these notes don't always make it to the parent or get misplaced before acted upon.

InHouse Network, provider of the Parent-Teacher Line, makes the program available through voice mail. "Voice mail has become a very popular tool for much of the country, and rightly so," says Connie Jennings, system administrator. "It is considered to be an effective means of communication and a great time saver. The Parent-Teacher Line, however, is much more than 'voice mail'. It takes the advantages of voice mail and combines it with a comprehensive communications program that will change as the needs of the parents and teachers change," Mrs. Jennings explained.

The Parent-Teacher Line also offers the school lunch menu, information on school activities, messages from administrators and immediate information on school delays and closings during inclement weather.

Any boy or girl in grades 1-5 is eligible to participate in the league. All parents and interested persons are encouraged to attend the meeting.

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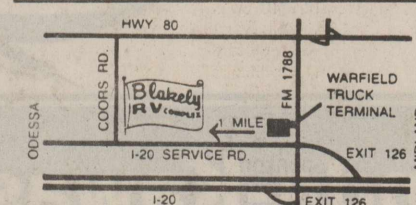
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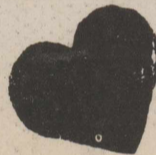
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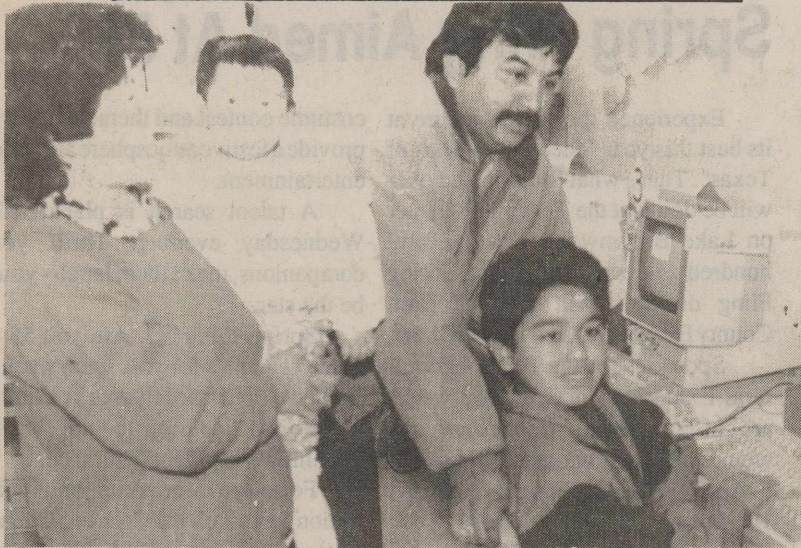

4-H Roundup Is Around The Corner

4-H'ers and parents need to be aware that district and state 4-H Roundup contests are just around the corner, and 4-H'ers need to sign up soon for demonstration and judging contests they may wish to participate in.

"These contests are fun and the participants learn so much from doing them - including poise, self-confidence, public speaking skills, evaluation skills and much more," said Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent in Crockett County. Ulmer noted there is a contest to fit almost everyone's schedule and pocketbook. The activities in 4-H, she added, complement many of the UIL activities the youths are already involved in.

There are several different types of contests, and activities are available for individuals as well as teams. Both junior 4-H'ers (age 8 and in third grade, through age 14) and seniors (over age 14) can compete. Juniors and seniors will both compete at district Roundup on May 6 in Fort Stockton, and Seniors have the opportunity to advance to Texas 4-H Roundup at College Station in June.

Judging contests, such as range evaluation, plant identification, wool and mohair judging, horse judging, consumer decision-making and livestock judging usually involve a team of 3-4. Participants learn to make accurate evaluations and identify certain factors, and in some cases, to verbally relate these factors to the judges.

Share-the-Fun involves five contests, in which an individual or team may compete. This year, the categories include poet or comedian (individuals only); dance, drama, music or 4-H skit. Teams may number up to nine persons.

Public speaking involves prepar-

ing and giving a speech on a topic by an individual. No props or visuals are used.

Method demonstrations and illustrated talks allow an individual or team of two to teach about a topic using props and visuals such as overheads or posters. One contest allows a team of up to five persons to participate.

Horse Bowl involves a team answering questions about horses, their care, horsemanship and other related topics.

Two rifle teams will also be formed from top shooters in the rifle project and will compete at district.

In addition to the regular Roundup contests, 4-H'ers are reminded that clothing projects and the fashion design project will culminate in county and district shows; the district competition is held during district Roundup on May 6 in Fort Stockton.

4-H clothing entries in the fashion show competition can be either purchased in the consumer buying division or made by the 4-H member in the construction division. Age categories for fashion show are: Junior (Grades 3-5), Intermediate (Grades 6-8) and Senior (Ages 14 and over).

The fashion design competition allows a 4-H member to design an original garment, textile or accessory, or to re-design an existing garment. Creativity - not artistic ability - is the most important factor. Clothing and design competitions are open to both boys and girls. More information on the contests, or to sign up for a particular contest, call the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721.

Scholarships Available Through 4-H

Many people don't realize that the Texas 4-H Foundation administers the nation's largest scholarship program. Almost 100 scholarships worth approximately one million dollars will be given away this year through the Texas 4-H program.

Graduating seniors who have been active in project work, leadership and citizenship are encouraged to pick up scholarship applications. The deadline to complete the applications and return them to the Crockett County Extension Office is Feb. 25.

Scholarships are awarded on the basis of 4-H work, grades and college entrance exam scores - either SAT or ACT.

In the past six years, 4-H members from Crockett County alone have received almost \$100,000 from 4-H and related scholarships. "The activities a 4-H member participates in also relate directly to most other scholarships," said Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent in Crockett County. "That's why we encourage younger 4-

H'ers to keep good records and even participate in the 4-H Recordbook program, because the information they accumulate can be used for most scholarship applications, college applications, preparing resumes and job applications," said Ulmer.

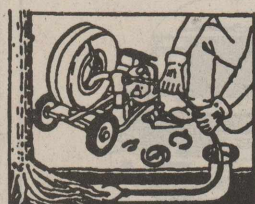
Around 100 scholarships will be awarded from the WTC Scholarship Foundation for the 1995-96 school year. Scholarships are awarded on a first come basis.

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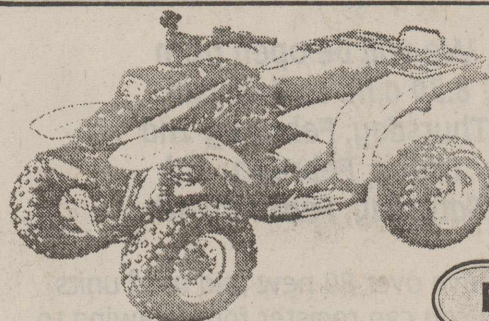

FCE Extends Education To Women Of All Ages

You may have read or heard about the Family Community Education clubs here in Ozona. Whether you're a young mother with toddlers, a retired grandmother, or a working mom facing the prospect of another stressful week, FCE is for you.

Many of you may be familiar with FCE under another name - either Home Demonstration Club or Extension Homemakers. Although the program has undergone several name changes since the first club was organized, the main purpose for its existence has remained the same - continuing education for women from all backgrounds, races and ages.

Home Demonstration work began in Texas around 1914, and really came of age in the 1930's, when County Extension Agents taught skills to women that they in turn used to get their families through the Great Depression - money management, food and clothing production, health and nutrition and much more.

Through the years, clubs began to reach both rural and urban women, and the name was changed to Extension Homemakers in the 1970's. The current name change, made in 1993, reflects the mission of the organization.

That mission is to work with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to strengthen and enrich families through educational programs, leadership development, and community service. The Texas Family Community Education Club serves as a coordinating organization for the statewide activities of FCE Clubs, including scholarships for 4-H youths and for adult members of the FCE organization.

TAFCE has put together some core values which embody their philosophy. TAFCE and its members value -

- *Strong families as basic to the well-being of Texas
- *Educational programs that address critical needs impacting Texas families and communities
- *Education as a life-long learning process
- *Volunteers and opportunities for volunteer development
- *Leadership development which offers opportunities for personal growth and development
- *Cultural and ethnic diversity in programs and membership
- *Global Awareness
- *Cooperative efforts with the Extension Service to attain mutual goals.

Annual dues are \$4 per person and enable members to be eligible for state awards, receive an annual membership card, apply for Adult Career Scholarships, have a part in providing both 4-H and adult scholarships, and supporting 4-H work across the state of Texas. There are no local dues, and national membership dues of \$12.50 per person are optional.

The national organization has more than 300,000 members from 42 states, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. Won't you join these women today in developing your educational,

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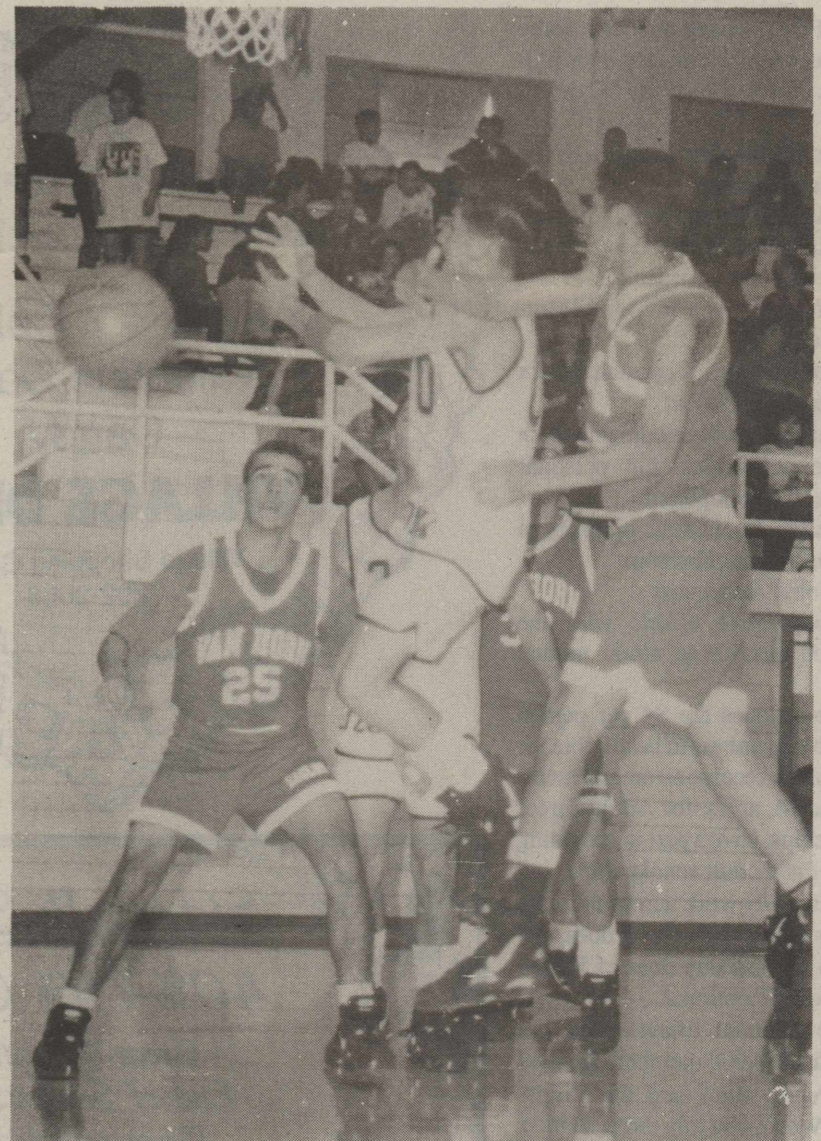

In an earlier game, the JV Lady Lions beat the JV Bravettes 29-15. With the win, their record increased to 9-6.

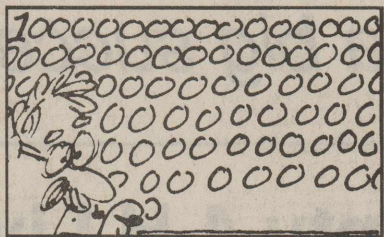

Burks is employed as an accountant with the Department of Human Services in Austin.

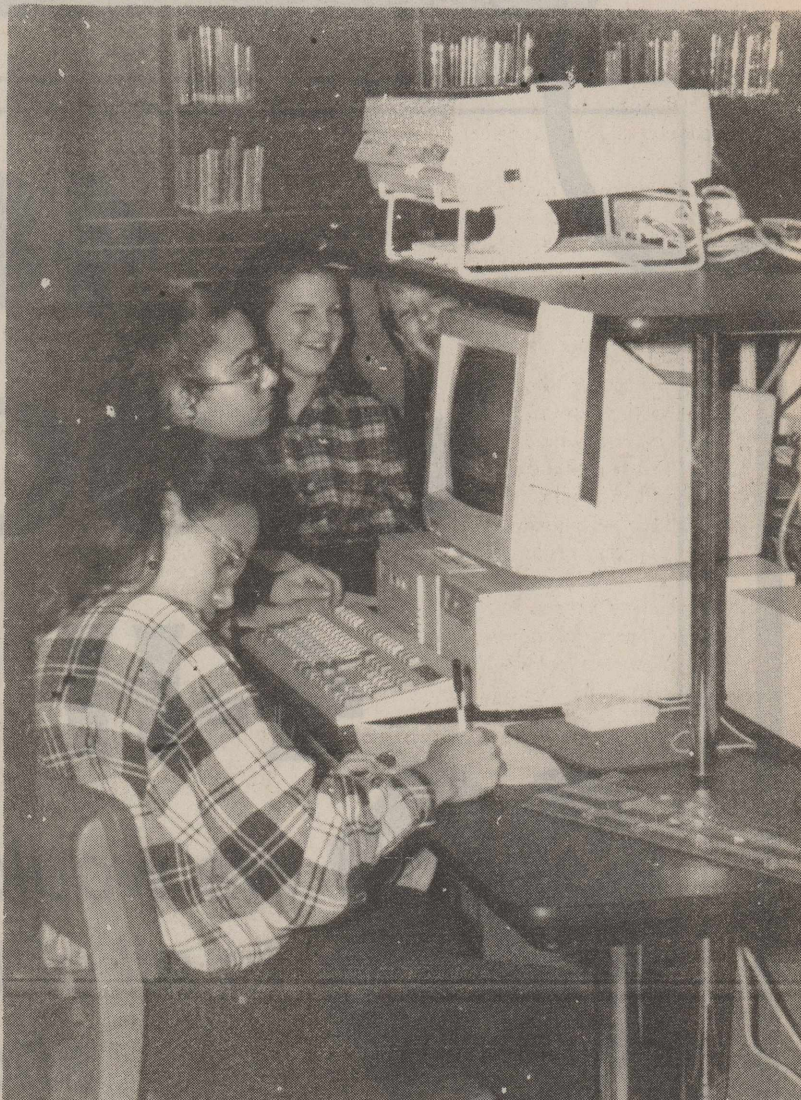
