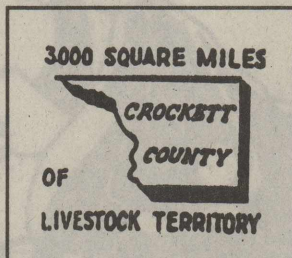

Transportation Corridor Could Bring Development To West Texas

In a meeting with the I-35 Corridor Coalition Feb. 3, the Midland/Odessa Transportation Alliance (Motran) sought the coalition's endorsement of the "La Entrada al Pacifico" Corridor, a transportation corridor from the Mexican Pacific port of Topolobampo through Midland-Odessa and on to the Dallas-Fort Worth metropol. La Entrada al Pacifico was conceived by Motran as part of ongoing efforts to promote the extension of I-27 through Midland-Odessa.

According to Charles Perry, chairman of Motran, the I-35 Coalition board is expected to approve a resolution in support of the Entrada Corridor at its next meeting on Feb. 17. "We were warmly received and strongly encouraged by the response to our presentation," said Perry. The relationship we have established with the I-35 Coalition is very good news for the Permian Basin.

Motran has been working with the office of the governor of Chihuahua since last summer developing the concept of the "Entrada" trade corridor. The support of the corridor by the Dallas/Fort Worth area, coupled with the strong support of the State of Chihuahua, will provide the anchors on each end of the corridor, with the Midland-Odessa area lying in the center.

Motran, with the anticipated support of the Dallas-Fort Worth area and the office of the governor of the State of Chihuahua, will present the concept of the "entrada" corridor to the

Texas Department of Transportation Commission on March 30. The commission will be asked at that time to pass a resolution supporting the concept of the corridor, and will be asked to instruct the staff to determine what additions to the highway system will be required, estimated costs, and that the International Relations Office coordinate with the Mexican highway officials.

"The 'Entrada' corridor will offer tremendous economic development opportunities to all of West Texas, particularly those cities along the corridor and at major junctions. According to Dr. Perryman, trade with the western states of Mexico is already over \$6 billion per year alone. Chihuahua is already one of the four largest trading partner states with the United States, and this new corridor would capture a majority of this trade for Texas. A recent Department of Commerce reports shows that trade for 1993 with Chihuahua alone and the United States exceeded \$2 billion per year imports and \$2 billion per year exports. This trade is expected to quadruple in the next few years. Trade through this corridor with the Pacific Rim countries and growth in trade with Mexico make the future for this corridor almost unlimited.

Long term, after the completion of a highway from Chihuahua City to Topolobampo, and improvement of rail facilities, it would offer Texas access to a Pacific deep water port that is approximately 500 miles closer and

much less expensive than the Port of Los Angeles.

Nearly all of the trade with the state of Chihuahua now passes through the border cities of El Paso and Juarez. The bridge and port facilities at the crossings in El Paso-Juarez are already overloaded, thus justifying the construction of the so called Santa Teresa crossing approximately 20 miles west of El Paso, into the state of New Mexico. This crossing when completed, along with a proposed north-south interstate highway in southeast Arizona, will essentially direct all of the trade with Chihuahua into Arizona and New Mexico and will totally bypass the state of Texas.

With the volume of present and future trade with Chihuahua, Durango and Sinaloa, as well as the Pacific Rim Countries, there will be enormous opportunities for warehousing, distribution, sub-assembly and assembly of imports, and manufacture, warehousing and distribution of exports, all in Texas. The state already has the basic infrastructure in areas along the proposed corridor to take advantage of these types of businesses. It is estimated that these businesses can result in substantial additional employment and economic impact for Texas if the proposed corridor is developed.

All cities in West and Central Texas which have good access to I-27, I-20 or I-10 should benefit due to the access to these new markets.

Lady Lions Maul Eldorado In 67-34 Win School Libraries Work Toward Full Automation

The Lady Lions continued their march to a district championship with a 67-34 win over rival Eldorado in Davidson Gym on Friday, Feb. 3. The victory gave the Ladies a 26-1 season record and an 8-0 district lead.

Coach Dickie Faught praised the Lady Lions, "Our execution on offense and defense was the best it's been all year. I believe that was the biggest win

I've been associated with since I left Brownfield because of the magnitude and importance of the game. All the credit goes to the girls because they performed so well."

Faught added, "They made my job easy--I sat over there and admired their work...that's what makes this team so fun to coach." He said, "The most impressive thing about our performance

was our consistency throughout all four quarters. Unlike the first game, we jumped out in the first quarter and played them even the last three quarters."

The Lady Lions, according to Faught, showed a tremendous defensive effort on everyone's part as they held Eldorado to 34 points overall, with only 12 points in the entire second half.

The Ladies started off the night shooting well, and Faught felt the six three-point shots by Gloria Pena-Alfaro and Amber McWilliams shook up Eldorado early because the Lady Eagles seemed to be concentrating on stopping the Ladies' inside game.

The first quarter ended with the Lady Lions in command at 20-10. The Lady Eagles tried to even the score but could only manage 12 points to Ozona's 14 in the second period. The swift Ozona defense led to a number of turnovers as the night went on, and a total of 12 steals from Bobbie Bryson (7 steals) and Gloria Pena-Alfaro (5 steals) helped seal the Eagles' doom.

The Lady Lions came out in the third quarter ready to put the game away, scoring 15 points to Eldorado's five to take a 49-27 lead at the end of the period. Faught praised Bryson and Pena Alfaro's tough defense at the top of the zone, and noted the exceptional shooting percentages from the Lady Lions' Tarr, Bryson, McWilliams and Fielder. Call 392-2447, extension 303 for a report by KLST channel 8's meteorologist Mike Daniels. Daniels went on line with the weather forecast Monday night and plans to update the forecast twice daily for Ozona/Crockett County.

Automation of the four school libraries of the Ozona Public Schools is proceeding according to plan according to high school librarian Sherry York. The automation process began in 1992 and is expected to continue during the next few years.

The Ozona High School Library is now fully automated. The card catalog is now on 20 computers in a network in the library. Books are checked in and out using computer bar codes and a bar code scanner. Information on any of the 7,427 books and video tapes housed in the high school library can be found on any of the computers in the library network. The high school library currently has 310 patrons who can check books and other library materials. Patrons at the high school include high school students, teachers, aides, administrative staff and school administrators.

Automation of the high school library began during the 1992-93 school year with the bar coding of all books and library materials. Current patrons were assigned bar codes and the process of checking out books by computer began. After that process was completed, data for each title in the collection was input into a computer data base in a process called retrospective conversion, Mrs. York said. With the retrospective conversion completed, high school library patrons then had access to an automated card catalog.

The automated card catalog speeds up searching for library books and allows 20 students to use the card catalog at the same time. The automated card catalog also provides students with the capability to do keyword searching using Boolean operators, AND, OR, and NOT, to combine terms and do very precise searches.

Automation at the Ozona Intermediate School started during the 1993-94 school year and continues. There are 226 patrons and 5,704 copies of books and materials at the Ozona Intermediate School Library. Many of the books and materials were bar coded during the 1993-94 school year. The bar coding process was completed during this school year. The first phase of the retrospective conversion of library book records to computer data was accomplished during January 1995. This process is being completed by librarian Donnie York with the assistance of library aide Kathy Hall.

The data conversion process at Ozona Intermediate is slowed somewhat because the library remains open for students to check books in and out and to take Accelerated Reader tests. Mr. York is delighted that the library is being used so much, but it is difficult to find time for book cataloging during their busy days.

When the automation is complete, Ozona Intermediate School students will have access to an automated card catalog and Accelerated Reader tests

on the library computer network. Books and library materials are already being checked using bar codes, scanner and a computer.

The Ozona Middle School library is next scheduled for automation. Computer software and supplies have been ordered and received. The process of bar coding of books and library materials will begin when the intermediate school library automation is completed. Library aide Irene Gonzales will be working on bar codes while keeping the library functioning as usual.

At Ozona Primary School, Principal Faith Ballard, librarian Donnie York and library aide Simplicia Cervantez are working together with primary school teachers to enlarge the library collection to ensure that it adequately meets the needs of students in the kindergarten, first and second grades. Automation of that library will begin upon completion of the middle school project.

"Funding for automation of these libraries has been made possible through a combination of federal Chapter II funds and state and local technology funds," said Mrs. York. "Support of the administration and school board has made it possible for students in the Ozona Public Schools to have access to the advantages of library technology as they become learners and users of technology in the twenty-first century."

A low-fat diet makes weight control easy and helps lessen several health risks including high blood pressure, cardiovascular disease, certain types of cancer, diabetes and other problems.

Unfortunately, when most of us think of low-fat, we think of "rabbit food" or a few tiny pieces of food on a plate. That doesn't have to be the case when one knows how to fool the palate and eye with tasty low-fat substitutions, cooking methods and portion control.

The program will be held on Thursday, Feb. 16, at 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. at the civic center. Participants are welcome to attend whichever session is most convenient. Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent - Family and Consumer Sciences, will demonstrate cooking techniques, and audience

members will have the opportunity to sample tasty treats.

"You'll be surprised at how delicious lower-fat cooking methods can be - and if you didn't know the food was low-fat, you would probably be fooled!" said Ulmer.

Family Community Education Clubs are open to all interested persons regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or disability. Membership in the clubs is not required to attend programs, and it costs only \$4 per year to join the state organization.

Members in the FCE club enjoy fellowship and fun along with their educational programs each month. They also have the opportunity to apply for adult educational scholarships and receive the state FCE newsletter, "The Messenger".

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Lions Cage Eldorado Eagles 63-50

The Ozona Lions plucked an exciting 63-50 victory from the Eldorado Eagles on Friday, Feb. 3 in Davidson Gymnasium in front of a roaring home crowd.

The win brought Ozona's overall record to 17-8 and their district record to 6-2. As head Coach John Curry stated, "That put us in good shape for a playoff position if we can finish up 2-0 (against Iraan and McCamey in away games) next week."

The first quarter started off with a bang, as Eldorado jumped out to a fast lead. However, good shooting and tough defense helped the Lions match the Eagles point for point as they ended the quarter tied at 15-15. Chris Sanchez was called on three quick fouls in the first period and Coach Curry had to use him sparingly throughout the rest of the game.

The Lions rallied in the second quarter, with tough defense holding Eldorado to only four points. The Lions, however, were hot on scoring, making 16 points to lead at halftime 31-19. Eldorado hung on, however, coming out and scoring 14 points to Ozona's eight in the third period, and narrowing the gap to 39-33 in favor of the Lions.

It was the Lions' night to shine, as they poured in 24 points to Eldorado's 17 in the fourth period. The Lions forced numerous turnovers in that period, and as Eldorado began to foul, Ozona took advantage with good free throw shooting to put the game out of reach.

According to Curry, "The difference in the game was they couldn't defend our spread offense, and we were able to make free throws down the stretch."

Panel Says Everyone Needs More Calcium

From mother's admonition to "Drink your milk" to the recommendations of a recent National Institutes of Health consensus conference on optimal calcium intake, everyone seems to agree: calcium is an essential nutrient, and most people need more of it to stay healthy. Dr. Khashaya Sakhaee, professor of internal medicine at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas, presented data to the NIH consensus conference on optimal calcium intake.

A daily calcium intake of 1,200 to

1,500 milligrams a day - the equivalent of four to five 8-ounce glasses of milk or approximately 4 to 5 ounces of cheese - helps adolescents and young adults attain their peak bone mass, and a daily intake of 1,500 mg daily can protect post-menopausal women and men over age 65 from the bone loss of osteoporosis, Sakhaee said.

Most adolescent girls and young women consume less than 900 mg of calcium a day, and older men and women rarely consume more than 600 mg per day.

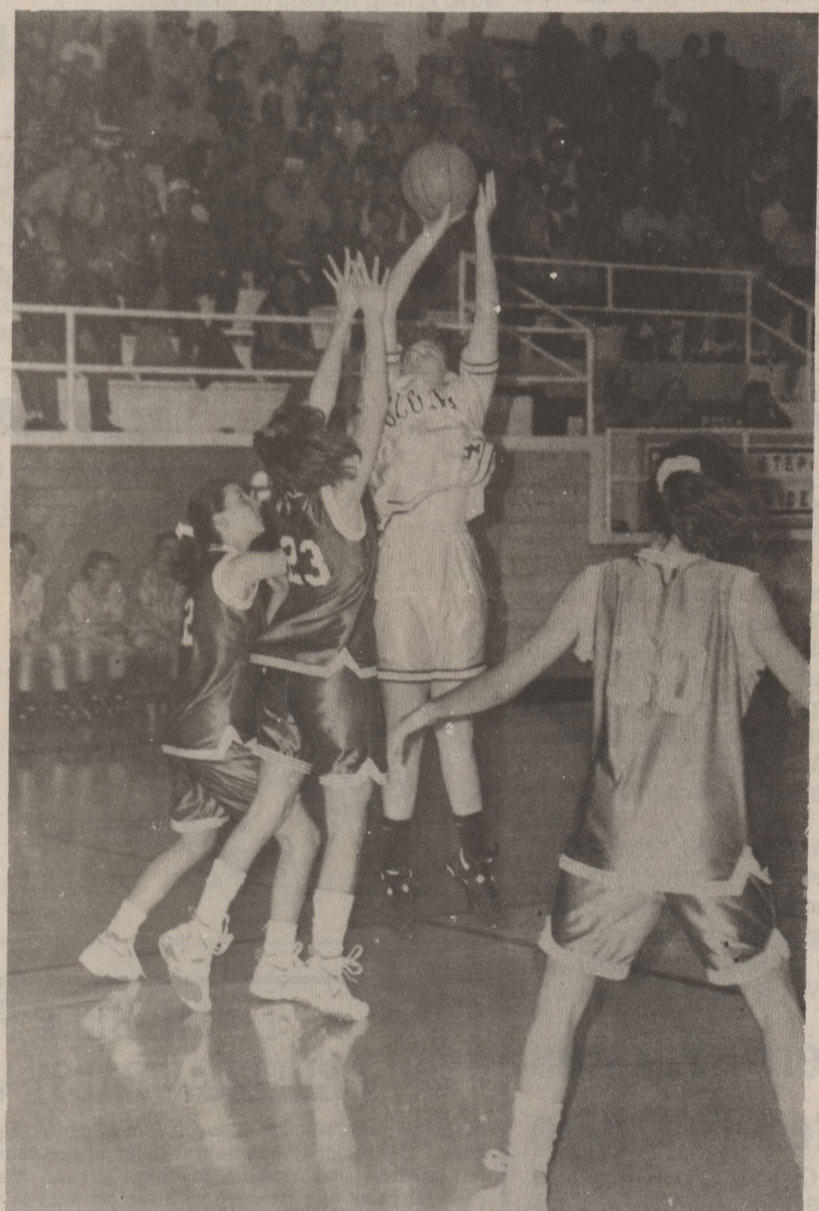

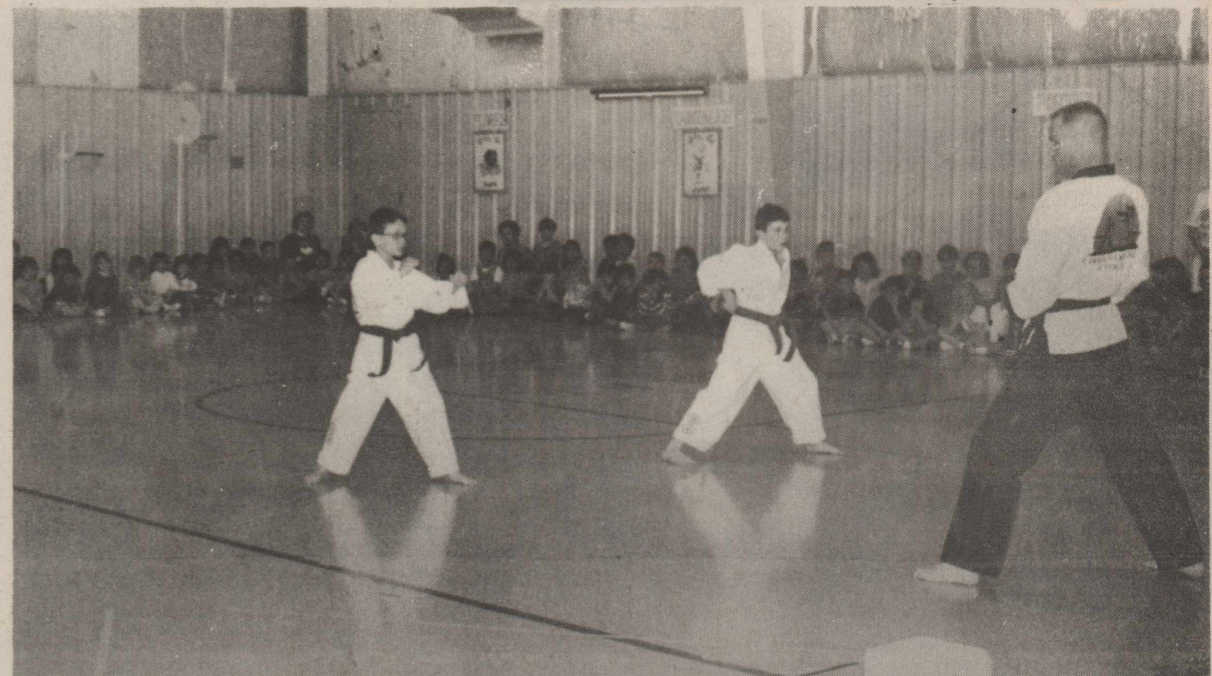
