

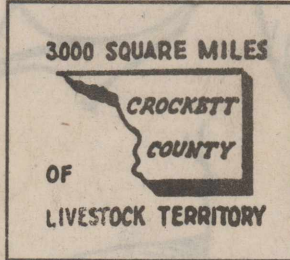

Lady Lions Win Bi-District Over Lady Buffs

Great defense by the Ozona Lady Lions in the fourth quarter gave the Ladies a 48-43 victory over the District 6-2A Stanton Lady Buffaloes in last Friday's game in Wrangler Gymnasium on the campus of Odessa Junior College.

The Ladies increased their season record to 29-2. The Lady Buffs ended their season with a record of 19-10.

Lady Lions' head coach Dickie Faught said, "It was a great feeling to win a playoff game. We shook off the first playoff game jitters a little bit. I felt like we had the best team but in a

playoff you never know what might happen."

The Ladies got off to a slow start in the first period as the Lady Buffs scored the first five points. Warming up in the latter part of the first period, Bobbie Bryson stole the ball several times and made six of the Ladies' 11 points and slowed the Lady Buffs to nine points.

With 4:40 into the second quarter, the Lady Lions led the Buffs 16-11. Ozona added another four points and Stanton only two points which was the cause for the Lady Buffs to stop for a skull session. The Ladies ended the quarter scoring a total of 16 points and held the Lady Buffs to

seven points for a 26-16 Ozona lead.

The Ladies increased their lead to 32-20 at the 5:57 mark, but the Lady Buffs started hitting three pointers by Herm and Chapa, giving them a 23-point quarter.

"They made a real good run at us. At the end of the third quarter, I told the girls that was their (Stanton) best rally of the game. We were still ahead, and I thought the fourth quarter would be ours because they couldn't keep shooting their threes." Ozona added a total of 14 points in the quarter for a 40-39 lead.

The fourth quarter was really all Ozona's as they scored eight points including four points by Amber Tarr, two points by Shelly Sullivan, and two free throws by Bobbie Bryson to seal the victory. Stanton had many chances to score and was only able to convert four free throws - two by Woodfin and one each by Herm and Bundas. The Lady Lions' good defense in the period prevented the Lady Buffs any field goals including three pointers for a 48-43 victory.

Retirement Still Means Work For Audrey Glynn

Valentine's Day 1995 was extra special to one of Ozona's sweethearts, Audrey Glynn. Mrs. Glynn was honored with a reception on that date, marking her retirement from Ozona National Bank after 20 years.

"I would have retired at the end of the year, but I started in February of 1975 and I wanted to make it a complete 20 years," she said.

The retirement is not final, however. She will continue to work parttime at the bank, going in about five days a month on statement day.

At the time of her retirement, Mrs. Glynn's job was to prepare for and send out statements and handle customer relations. During her 20 years at the bank, "I've seen changes that are unbelievable," she said. She was in the middle of the change over to computers and the addition of the branch bank at Wimberley. "But most of all I think of all the changes," she said.

Before going to work at ONB, Mrs. Glynn was secretary at First Baptist Church for many years and also worked at the abstract office. Before her husband, George, died, he said, "If anything happens to me, you go see Lowell Littleton at the bank," Mrs. Glynn said. She did, and her career in banking began.

"Ozona has been wonderful to me and my family, and so has Ozona National Bank."

The Glynn's came here in 1956 with Texaco, "and the Lord helped us to stay here," she said. Mr. Glynn owned the Shell Station for 15 years before his death. He was an active member of First Baptist Church, serv-

ing as a deacon, a charter member of the chamber of commerce and a member of Lions Club.

Mrs. Glynn has taught Sunday School at almost all levels at First Baptist. She is currently director of the children's department of the Sunday School, on the mission committee and a member of the choir. She hopes to have the time and opportunity to do some mission work now.

In the fall of 1993, she and Opal Mobbs started the First Place program at the church, and both continue to be involved with this.

Retirement plans include enjoying the grandchildren's activities more, spending some time at her place on the Nueces River near Camp Wood and tackling a stack of projects which includes refinishing furniture.

"I thought about cleaning the oven and closets, but nah, they've been that way this long," she quipped.

Members of her family were here to join in the retirement celebration and accompany her on her first retirement project the following day, eye surgery.

Mrs. Glynn's daughter Ginger Bailey and her husband, David, live in Beeville where she is director of social services at South Texas Children's Home and he has his own carpentry business. Daughter Ann Heard and her husband, Pat, live in Abilene. She is a registered nurse at Hendrick Hospital, and Pat is with the pastoral counseling center. Their two children are Matthew, a freshman and a basketball player at Abilene High School, and Melissa, an energetic kindergartner who will soon be six.

Lions Beat Wildcats In Overtime

A ferocious fight embroiled as the Ozona Lions and the District 32-1A champions, Water Valley Wildcats, battled last Thursday's game in Water Valley. The game saw-sawed throughout the evening with both the third quarter and fourth quarters tied, yet Ozona prevailed, winning 65-56 in overtime.

The Lions earlier completed their district race with an 8-2 record and increased their season record to 20-8. The Wildcats won their district with a perfect 10-0 record and have a season record of 24-6. The Lions will face the

District 6-2A champions, the Jim Ned Indians (23-5) on Thursday, Feb. 23, at 7:30 p.m. in Midland Greenwood. The Wildcats will play the winner of the Panther Creek and Paint Rock game.

"I was happy we got a win out of that, especially in a tight game," said Coach John Curry. "I thought our kids played well in overtime."

Both teams started out at a fast pace as Ozona just stayed ahead of Water Valley at 7-5 with 3:56 left in the first period. As the quarter ended with Ozona leading 11-9, the Lions realized it would be a tougher game

We live in an upside down world! At the same time that our Congress is considering a Balanced Amendment, our President has decided by executive order to authorize a \$40 billion dollar "loan guarantee" for Mexico. Surprisingly, there is support from both parties on this issue, and some of those who see "red" when spending is increased for domestic welfare, seem to be supporting this measure.

Is there something fundamentally wrong in Mexico? After all, we bailed them out of a similar mess in 1982. Mexico is ruled by one party tyranny, which never checks out for corruption and embezzlement. To its credit it has taken some steps toward privatization recently. But, Pemex and the mining interests and assets before asking us for another bailout. The PRI political party has controlled their country for a hundred years. Do the U.S. taxpayers have any interest in perpetuating this corrupt one party system?

Since Mr. Greenspan has pitched hard for this measure, its safe to assume that the major U.S. banks hold the notes that are due. They took a high risk in expectation of high returns. But now the deal has turned sour and they want "down side" partners or "chumps".

If you listen to C-SPAN, Mr. Rubin and Mr. Greenspan tell us that

"we the taxpayers" have no exposure, because the Pemex oil stream will be pledged to the Federal Reserve Banks in the event of payment failure. First, that confirms to me who currently holds the notes. Second, if this is such a sure deal, then the banks should have been required to re-negotiate these notes and get the commitment of the oil without getting the U.S. taxpayers involved. However, the banks realize that it is impossible to get their hands on collateral from another sovereign government. Therefore, the banks cried disaster until they found a sucker.

Many of us have been taught never to co-sign unless we plan on assuming the payment. If the Chiapas revolution succeeds or if Mexico gets some investment advisers from Orange County, then banks will turn to John Q. Public for installments.

If you share my desire of lower taxes and a balanced budget, I encourage you to write or call your congressman and tell them you feel that President Clinton has over-stepped his Executive Order privilege since all appropriations or money matters have to originate the U.S. House of Representatives.

A Union Of Cultures Takes A Lot Of Love And Work

Charlie Mathews considered himself a confirmed bachelor before he met Lydia Varlea Maldonado.

Charlie, who is Indian, is a private sort who had avoided the traditional Indian dating scene.

"My priority was being successful," says Charlie, 30, who works in freight forwarding for Duncan/Alexander, an international shipping company.

Lydia, too wasn't thinking about marriage when she met Charlie through mutual friend in January 1993.

"I was looking to make a career," says the 28-year-old account executive for the Spanish language radio network Spanish Information Service. She had been in Hispanic marketing and advertising for six years and, like Charlie, was looking at career opportunities outside Dallas.

Though they soon began dating each other exclusively, neither was ready for a long-term commitment. Or so they thought.

About a year after their first meeting, Charlie had a daydream while at the movies. He saw himself and Lydia sitting together in front of a fireplace. He knew then that she was the woman he was going to marry. But he wasn't ready to stick his neck out by telling her.

By last April, though marriage seemed inevitable.

On May 24, a client asked Charlie why he hadn't proposed to Lydia. Charlie took the question to heart - he proposed later that night at her apartment.

She thought he was joking and asked where the ring was. It wasn't like Charlie to not have the finest detail worked out. He took off his pinky ring and gave it to her. He called the next day to make sure she knew he was serious.

Neither realized initially how complicated it would be to plan a meaningful wedding ceremony that expressed their respect for each other's culture.

Lydia was brought up in an Assembly of God church, but now pre-

fers to attend a Bible church. Charlie is a member of the Syrian Orthodox Church.

Though he was raised in southern India, Charlie has lived in the United States since 1970, so he really didn't know a lot about Indian weddings. But he thought a Syrian Orthodox ceremony would represent his culture.

Lydia, however, didn't know if she could do without some of the basics she had come to expect, such as an exchange of vows.

"The hardest part of bringing the two cultures together was to keep the wedding from pitting one culture against the other," she says.

"This wedding is about two individuals from two backgrounds coming to form a union," says Charlie. "It has taken a lot of strength not to lose sight of that."

Before the Syrian Orthodox ceremony begins on Feb. 18 at White Rock United Methodist Church, a minister from Lydia's hometown of Ozona, Texas, will greet the guests, give a homily and lead Lydia and Charlie through an exchange of vows.

In a nod to Hispanic tradition, Charlie's cousin will present the couple with a family Bible. The Syrian Orthodox ceremony will be recited mostly in English, with some prayers and chants in a southern Indian dialect.

The reception will include an Indian buffet and strolling mariachis. A Hispanic-flavored party afterward will feature a band playing salsa and Tejano music.

Lydia and Charlie plan to bring all aspects of their culture backgrounds into their home. "Our children will be fortunate enough to have two cultures," says Charlie.

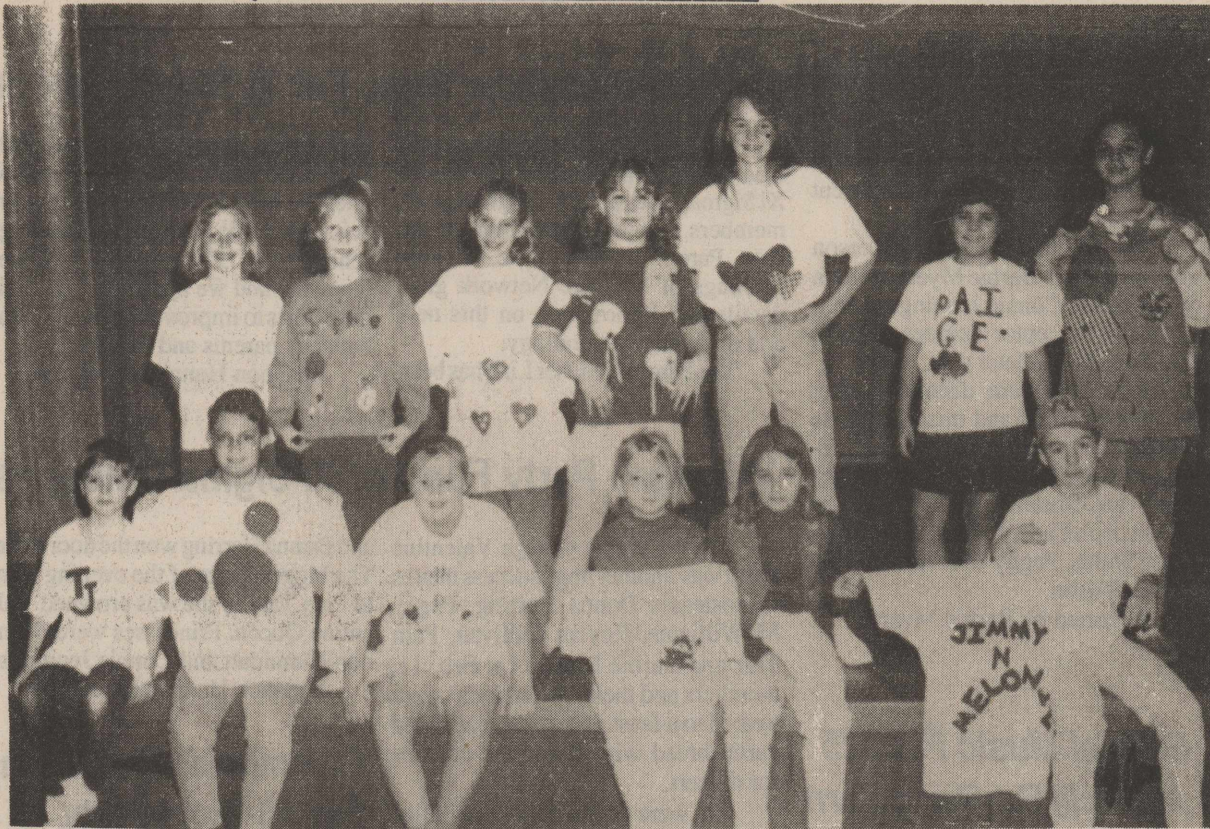

All Crockett County youth from third grade through age 19 are invited to sign up for the 1995 4-H Clothing Project by calling the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721 or by coming by the office on Monday, Feb. 27, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday is the deadline to sign up for the project.

Reminder postcards have been mailed from the county office. Participants will not be called individually to remind them to sign up.

The clothing project involves much more than sewing, from designing clothing, accessories and fabrics to buying, modeling, tie-dyeing and embellishing t-shirts. Opportunities include special workshops, tours, camps, seminars, trips, demonstrations and scholarships.

Tedra Ulmer, Crockett County Extension Agent, said that anyone who intends to participate in the project must come by the Extension Office or call and sign up, even if they have already checked the clothing project on their enrollment form. "We need to know who will actually be participating, and we will be asking a few questions to find out what types of programs we need to offer," the agent said. She suggested younger children should be accompanied by a parent for that reason.

Ulmer also announced a special planning and update session for parents and leaders will be scheduled for early March, as soon as the 4-H'ers who plan to be in the project have been identified. That meeting will enable the group to set dates and get final information out to the participants, and will allow us to give new 4-H parents a chance to find out about all

the different types of activities and opportunities in the clothing project," she added.

Ulmer noted that participants in the clothing project do not necessarily have to be in the county fashion show, and that the fashion show now includes both a construction division and one for buying. "The neat thing about the buying division is that it encourages good shopping habits - last year one of our district winners in the junior division spent less than \$20 on her outfit, and we have had people advance to the state contest with \$15 pajamas," Ulmer said.

The agent also mentioned that the new design project and contest is enjoyable and also low in cost. "All you need are imagination, a pencil, paper and some markers or crayons - you don't even need to be a great artist," she added, noting that, "One of our members won a \$250 scholarship several years ago by taking first place in the accessory design competition at state with a simple pair of earrings."

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

It has certainly been a busy week this past week with the boys and the girls in the playoffs and U.I.L. activities on weekends. With all this fun, it is easy to set aside posts-secondary school applications and registrations for the SAT and ACT.

Parents of juniors, who plan on their students going to a four year college, please encourage your students to pick up an ACT and/or SAT form from the counseling office in order to take the admissions test by June 10, 1995, for the ACT and June 3, 1995, for the SAT.

Parents of seniors, please encourage your student to make last preparations for attending post-secondary institutions. This includes picking up scholarship applications, checking housing deadlines, financial aid deadlines, and for some, application deadlines. If your student is a male and is 18 years old, make sure they have registered for the selective service.

The Crockett County Arts and Crafts Guild local scholarship application is in and your students may pick

these up from the counselor. There are many scholarship opportunities for students willing to take the time to fill out applications, write essays, and peruse through the scholarship listings. These may be found in the counseling office and in the English IV classroom (Mrs. Schneider's).

Did you know that in the entire work force, 15 to 20 percent need no skills (and you can guess what type of jobs these are), and 65 percent need developed skills? Technical skills can be learned from attending post-secondary institutions such as community colleges, trade schools, the armed forces, and going through an apprenticeship. Seniors, register for the TASP test now! Any college students, whether attending a junior college or senior college, must take the TASP test before completing nine semester credit hours of academic courses.

Are back issues of the magazines you subscribe to getting out of control? Have you finished reading them, but you can't bear to throw them away? Does your reading area need a spring cleaning even though it's only February?

Consider donating those magazines you no longer want to the Ozona High School Library. Librarian Sherry York will be happy to accept back issues of magazines for use by high school students.

During the 1994-95 school year Mrs. York reduced the number of magazines the library subscribes to because of the advent of the new CD-ROM magazines program. The InfoTrac program now available on the high school library computer network allows a number of students to use the program at the same time. This program provides access to full-text magazine and newspaper articles in more than one hundred periodicals. The program is updated monthly so Ozona students have access to more periodicals than ever before.

According to Mrs. York, "The new computer program is wonderful for students doing research in magazines. It saves students time when doing research, and we now have more up-to-date magazine articles than we ever had previously."

One consequence of purchasing the new CD-Rom magazine program has been that the library has reduced the number of magazine subscriptions purchased each year. Microfiche and paper magazine indexes like *The Reader's Guide to Periodical*

Literature are no longer ordered since the new program eliminates the need for these items.

Students still enjoy looking at and reading magazines in their leisure time. The computer magazines program contains only text, no pictures or graphics. A long-time service of the high school library has been to pass along discarded magazines to high school teachers and students. Since the advent of the new magazine program, the supply of discarded magazines has dwindled to none.

In the past discarded magazines were used by teachers in their classroom and by students working on collages, posters, or other projects that required pictures from magazines.

If you have magazines that you would like to donate to the high school library, call Mrs. York to make ar-

rangements, drop the magazines by the library or send them with a high school student teacher.

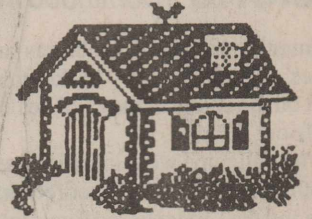
Especially popular with high school students are sports magazines and teen-interest magazines like *Seventeen* and *Teen*, but many others such as *National Geographic*, *Texas Highways*, *Texas Monthly*, *Omni*, *Popular Science*, *Popular Mechanics*, *Better Homes and Gardens*, *Woman's Day*, *Smithsonian*, *Outdoor Life*, etc. would also be useful.

Magazines you donate will be kept in the library for use by students, given to teachers for use in their classrooms, or given to students. By donating your magazines you will be helping the high school library provide a service to students and teachers. You will also be recycling, an environmentally friendly thing to do.

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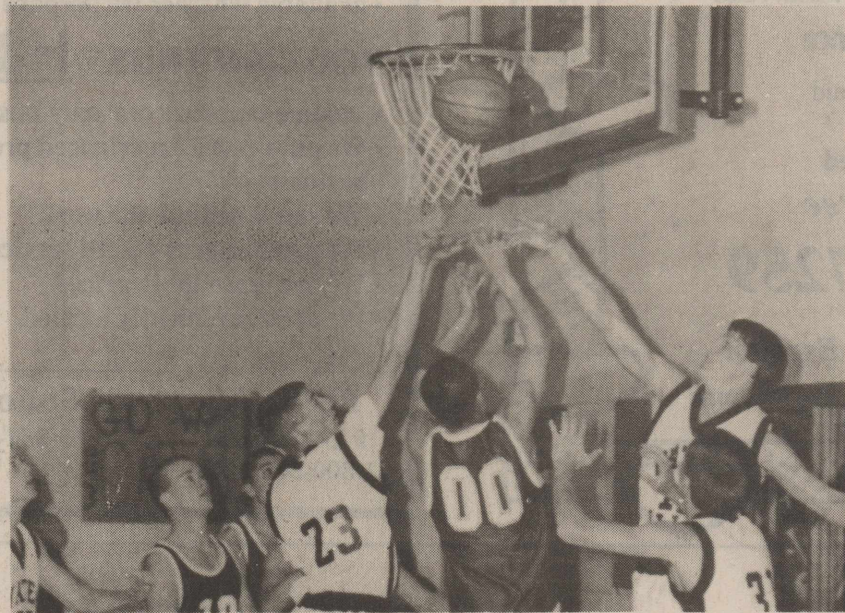

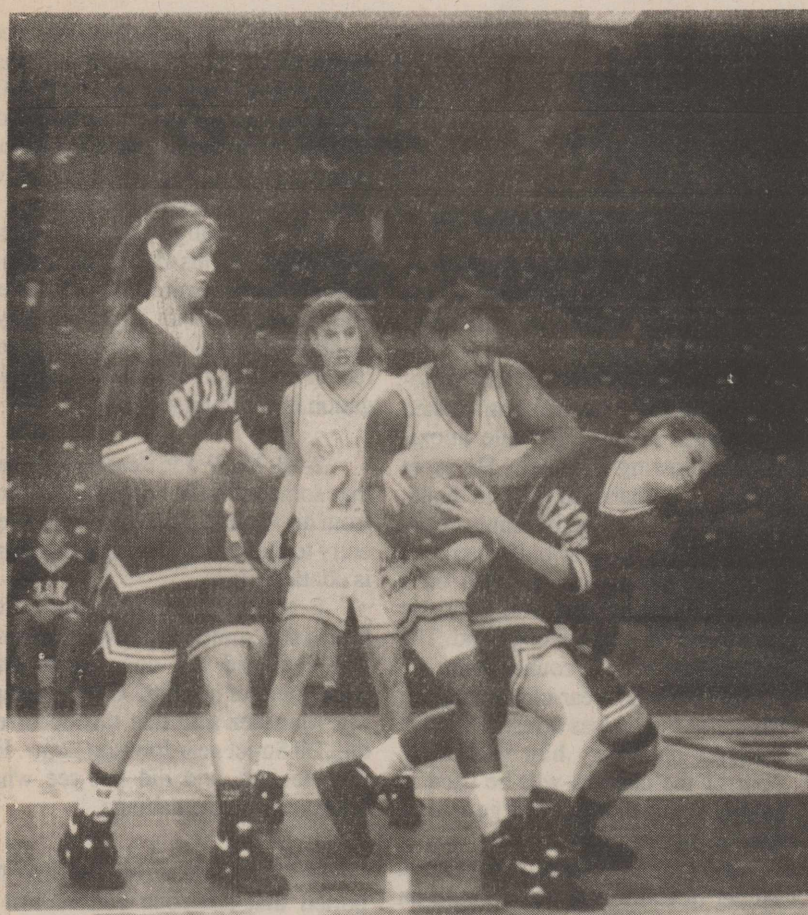
