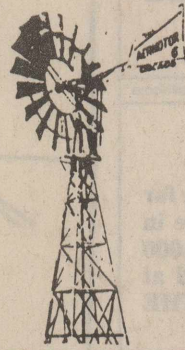
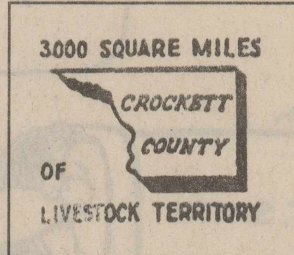
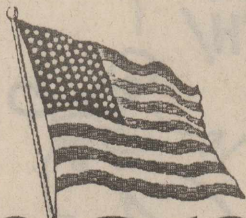

## County Vehicles Have New Look

If you think the county road department yard has become a stop-over for a military convoy, your eyes aren't deceiving you. Recent acquisitions of used military equipment by the department have added 10 vehicles to the county fleet at what could be called remarkable prices. Shutdown of military bases in the states and abroad resulted in the vehicles and other equipment being on the market to governmental entities such as the county and fire departments.

Road and parks superintendent Eddie Moore talked with commissioners Monday about the purchases, saying that he wants one more dump truck from the military sale.

Also under consideration from the military surplus vehicles were three 5-ton track vehicles for the fire department. Commissioners okayed the expenditure of \$32,000 for equipment of the fire department's choosing while it is available at such a low price. Track vehicles would result in a large savings on fire truck tires. 1994 expenditures for tires and tire repairs for the department amounted to \$10,000.

Holt company of San Antonio was awarded the bid for a pneumatic roller for the road department. The Caterpillar PS180 comes with a 5-year or 7,500 hour extended warranty at a cost of \$49,714. Other bidders were Anderson Machinery, Permian Tractor Sales Inc., Airmaster Equipment Corporation and Bee Equipment Sales. Although Holt was not the low bidder, commissioners voted to go with their product based on delivery date, parts and the 5-year warranty.

Commissioners voted to spend \$12,000 on spring clean up set for the first two weeks of May. Eddie Moore is to evaluate costs of county labor and fees to have the waste hauled and compare with costs of a proposal submitted by Permian Basin Waste Management. PBWM has a unit which can do the work mechanically, Moore said.

The court gave him the leeway of deciding which method to use based on cost.

Only one elevator bid was received. On the advice of architect Jack Meek, the court rejected the bid from

Coates Construction in the amount of \$124,500 and will resubmit for bids.

Court members voted to sign a compost lease with Double T Ranch. Under the lease, the county and water district will be able to deposit grass clippings and chipped up limbs on Double T.

On another vote, the court defined "due notice" as it pertains to payment of accrued personal time off to persons who quit work with the county. Commissioners voted to require that a person quitting the employ of the county give two weeks' notice in order to receive their paid time off.

What started as a routine approval of a contract with Gary Traylor and Associates for management services for a Texas Community Development Program grant changed rapidly as the court examined two accompanying affirmative action plans. One, headed an affirmative action plan for the Texas Community Development Program, requires giving preferences to minorities and must be enacted if the county is to qualify for the grant. The other, titled an equal opportunity affirmative action program for Crockett County, seemed to apply to all aspects of county operation, even including requiring that notices of job openings be sent to Austin.

Commissioners had voted to approve signing the grant management contract before examining the affirmative action plans. Commissioner Fred Deaton moved, seconded by Freddie Nicks, to rescind approval of the contract. On the vote, commissioners Rudy Martinez and Frank Tambunga voted against rescinding and Judge Jeffrey Sutton joined them to break the tie.

Commissioners agreed to have Mike Duran of Gary Traylor and Associates come to Ozona to explain the affirmative action requirements. Crockett County already has an affirmative action plan which is not as broad in scope as that which was submitted Monday.

"We're giving our complete hiring policy to the Federal government," Commissioner Deaton said of the plans. He commented that he would

## New Board Begins Administrator Search

The new Crockett County Hospital and Care Center Board met April 6 and approved advertising for a care center administrator. The position became open following the March resignation of administrator Gerry Phillips, and most of the board resigned in the wake of his resignation.

Plans are to hire an administrator for the care center and a manager for the hospital. Care center administrators must be certified. Hospital managers or administrators do not have to be certified.

The center can operate 30 days without an administrator, but Texas Department of Health will extend the day limit 90 days if there is proof of actively advertising to fill the admin-

istrator's position. Three applications have been received, but two of the applicants do not hold a nursing home administrator's license.

Long-time employee Zoe Green is currently acting as interim administrator with no additional compensation other than overtime pay.

The vacancy in accounts payable at the care center has been filled. Cheryl Vestal will begin work in that capacity April 17. She will also be working with the auditor's office to get the general ledger back on line.

A possible direct computer link with the auditor's office was discussed regarding accounts payable. This will be considered as a future goal to enhance communication and cooperation

between county offices. This would also assure proper posting of payments against correct line items in the budget.

New regulations to be required by the Texas Department of Health, effective July 1, 1995, were discussed. The main concern at this point is the staffing requirements which will be

the same as Medicare requirements. These will have to be met in order to maintain licensure. Becoming Medicare certified again was discussed and will be addressed at a later time.

Higher reimbursements are realized by being certified, and the facility

## Early Voting begins April 17

Early voting for school trustees and directors in the Emerald Underground Water Conservation District begins April 17 and continues through May 2. Asking election to the three directors' positions are George Bunger, Johnny Jones and Nat Read.

Those wishing to vote early may do so at the Ozona Airport between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. weekdays. Applications for a ballot by mail should be sent to Mary Jo Hearne at Box 1859, Ozona, TX 76943. They must be received no later than the close of business on April 28.

Election day is May 6 with voting to be conducted at the airport between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

There are three places open on the school board. Up for election are trustees in Dist. 1, Dist 6 and Dist 7, the at large position. All eligible voters in the county may vote for the at large candidate. Every ballot will also have

on it a proposal to authorize the board to educate students of other school districts with local tax revenues as defined in Option 4 of Senate Bill 7, the education funding bill.

Candidates on the Dist. 1 ballot for the single member position are Jessie Reina-Zuniga and incumbent Elliott Barrera. Asking to be elected to the Dist. 6 place are Steve Mobbs and incumbent Wade Richardson. In Dist. 7, the at-large position, Walter Spiller and incumbent Dr. Marcus Sims are on the ballot.

Early voting by personal appearance in this election will be held at the courthouse on weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Election day is May 6 with voting to be between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. at the courthouse.

To request a ballot by mail, apply to Leslie Wilson, Early Voting Clerk, Box 400, Ozona TX 76943, no later than the close of business April 28.

## Band Earns Sweepstakes

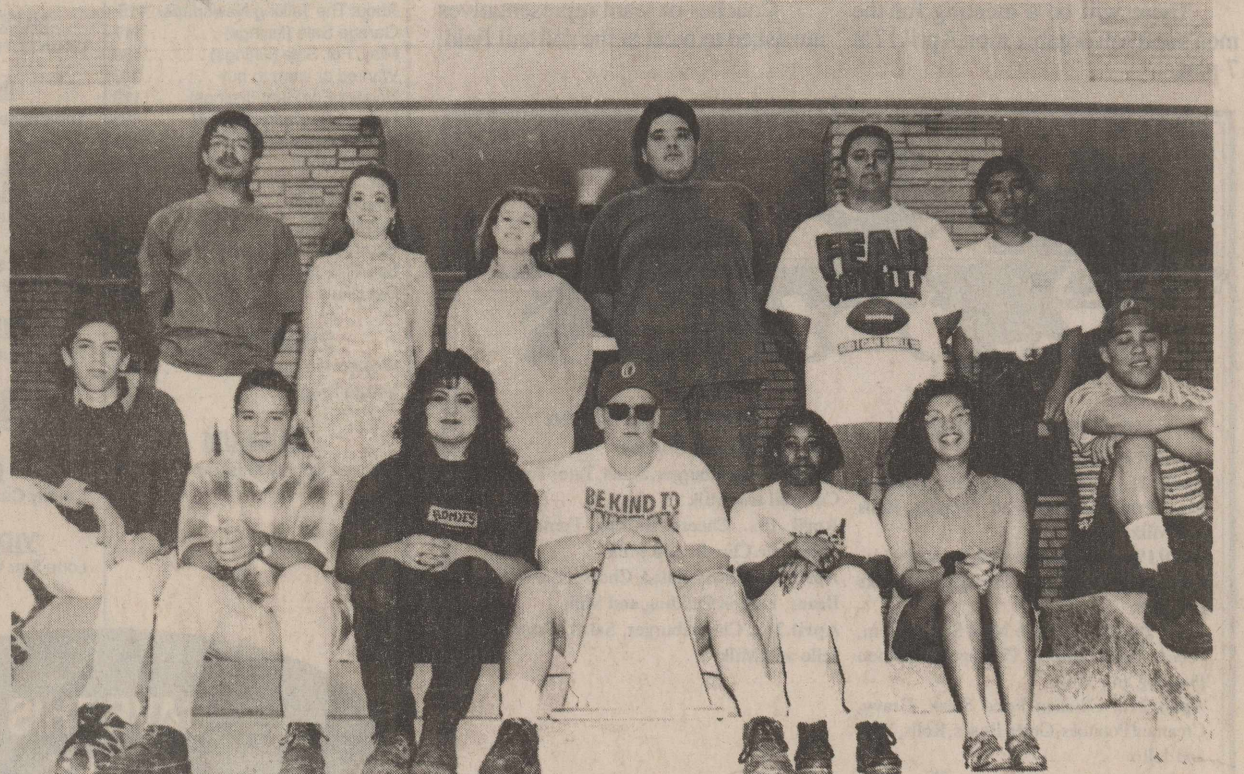

I have just returned from the Texas Library Association's Annual Conference in Dallas. The 1995 theme was "Libraries Make the NETwork", and the emphasis was on networking services for education, recreation and the Internet. This year almost 7,000 people attended the 4-day conference and learned from and enjoyed dozens of workshops, author programs and sessions on automation, fundraising and library management. Academic, school and public libraries are all dependent on state and federal fund-

ing. Please take a moment to call or write your legislators and urge them to keep libraries in mind for funding and to remember to not cut essential funding programs for libraries. In 25 years the federal government has spent less on libraries than it has on just one aircraft carrier. Federal library funding is at a crucial juncture. The Library Services and Construction Act, which has served as the principal federal financial underpinning for public library services for nearly 40 years, will sunset in 1996 unless renewed by Congress. The Clinton administration has just zeroed out two titles of Higher Education Act funding for libraries. Congress is considering legislation that would play a major role in paving the information superhighway. Research shows that the public library is the most important institution in providing basic services which are free and available to all users. Rural public libraries should provide the access point for the Internet and other online informational data-bases. Contact your legislators and put in a good word for libraries during National Library Week.

### Twenty-Four Hour Days And Stress

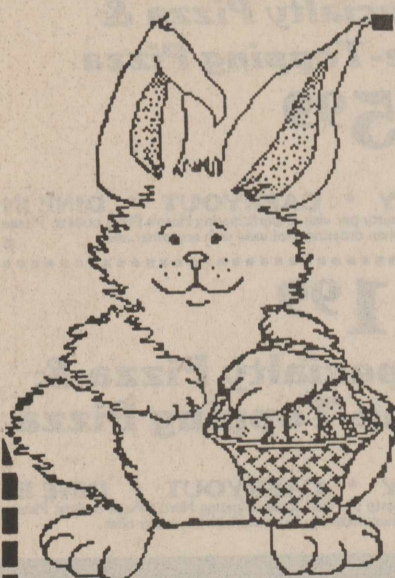

"There is never enough time in the day for my work. We should have 25 hours in each day." But God gave us 24 hours each day to accomplish our tasks and oh, how we chafe under the restraint. Then we try to accomplish more than time allows. We place ourselves under huge amounts of self-imposed stress.

As we do so, we also fight against God. We fail to recognize it cannot be God's will to pack more into a 24 hour day than will fit. Because we don't like God's time constraints, we push ourselves. We get up early. We go to bed late. Yet the list of work grows



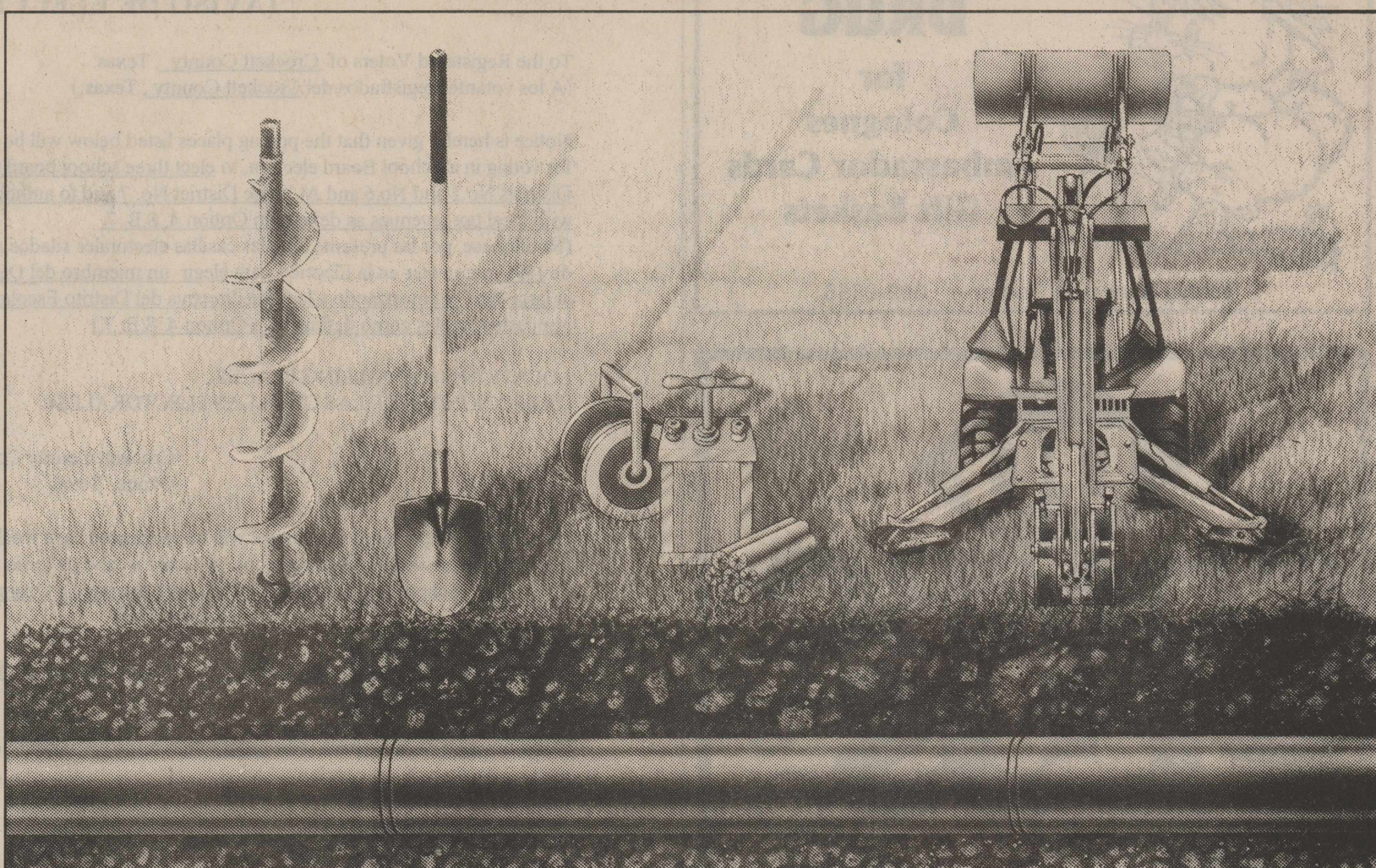

is also reimbursed more quickly. By being decertified, the hospital is on 100% medical review for all emergency room Medicare patients. This involves multiple submittals per claim, more forms to be completed by nursing staff and physicians and possible non-coverage when reviewed by Medicare. In most cases, this results in writing off the charges unless a financial waiver was obtained at the time of service. Financial waivers are statements signed by the patient that due to not meeting emergency criteria, they will be responsible for the bill.

Board members were told of a care center two-day full book survey by the Texas Department of Human Services. On March 27, a five member survey team arrived and was joined by two more members for life safety codes inspection on March 28. This was an unannounced survey made due to the departure of the administrator. The survey team was originally scheduled to be here at the end of April.

Mrs. Green said several deficiencies were noted. Some were due to not being able to locate maintenance files. A plan of correction has been established to correct deficiencies noted in the life safety code survey and this has been returned to TDHS. A statement of deficiencies regarding nursing had not been received by the board meeting.

Due to problems and questions regarding the maintenance department, David Morgan has been hired to replace Ron Repman who also resigned. Morgan will begin on April 17.

The board carefully examined bills and approved payment of all but

two which were in question. Total payables approved, both past due and current, were \$66,302.73 for the hospital and \$38,866.33 for the care center. Mrs. Green said she had discovered \$10,000 in past due bills for the hospital and \$1,700 for the care center, some as much as two years old.

The board thought it better to clear the slate for Crockett County Hospital and Care Center to maintain good credit standing with the vendors.

Dietary manager Sue Denny reported to the board that more than 70,000 meals were prepared there in 1994. Prices are \$4.50 for care center residents, \$4.00 for guest trays, \$3.00 for county prisoners and \$2.00 for employees.

Board members were provided with copies of job descriptions for all departments. Written job descriptions were one of the suggestions put before the previous board by Judge Jeffrey Sutton.

EMS coordinator Doug Meador gave a report to the new board on the county's three ambulances, one 1983 model, one 1985 and one 1991. He also reported on the grant which will provide for additional training and certification for EMT's.

Board members present for the meeting were: Eddie Moore, newly elected president; Jo Davidson, Jean Read, Matt Gutierrez and Dr. Robert Owensby, a non-voting member. Members Elma Buckner and Don Long had excused absences.

Mrs. Davidson was elected vice-president and Mrs. Read secretary. Mr. Gutierrez submitted his resignation from the board at this meeting.

prefer to raise money locally for the water and sewer projects rather than accept grant money with such requirements.

Interim hospital/care center administrator Zoe Green reported that "The new board went over the bills with a fine-toothed comb," at their meeting April 6. Mrs. Green said she had located past due bills of \$10,000 for the hospital and \$1,700 for the care center. These were approved for payment along with all but two bill submitted. Questions on these bills are being resolved.

Mrs. Green said the new board started advertising last weekend for a nursing home administrator and that salary amount needs to be set.

The court voted to allow up to \$40,000 for salary for an administrator for the care center. An administrator for the hospital will be hired at a later date. They also voted to accept the resignation of board member Matt Gutierrez.

Civic and youth center director Garland Young reported that the board had voted to take money from the youth center account to spend on entertainment for the all night party. The party will be held at the convention center this year in order to have more

room for games.

Young said that a recently discovered gas leak at the civic center was necessitating total replacement of exterior gas lines.

Louise Ledoux, county librarian, reported that she had recently learned that the \$10,000 the library building fund had received from Union Pacific would continue in future years.

Written reports were received from Helping Hands and the fire department. The Helping Hands summary sheet showed 1203 meals served in March and commodities given to 52 families. Fire department activities included response to one gas leak, one EMS rescue, one bomb threat and one oil field fire and four grass fires.

Commissioners will meet on Thursday, April 13, at 1 p.m. to discuss the county and district retirement system. Joe Froh, a representative of the Texas County and District Retirement System, of which the county is a member, will be present.

## TSGRA Moves To Bring Lamb Packer To Area

Responding to a recent announcement that Monfort is closing its San Angelo lamb-processing facility, the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association has initiated a dialogue with key industry leaders about bringing a new packer to the area.

"Texas has the lamb numbers, the feed, the feedlots and established marketing system to complement and sustain a packing company on a year-round basis," TS&GRA President Allen Turner said in a statement released April 5. Monfort plans to close its facility, the only major lamb-processing plant in the nation's largest

lamb-producing state, June 1.

Texas produces 1.2 million lambs each year, according to the Texas Agricultural Statistical Service, and about half of those go through a Texas packing facility. The freight charge alone on 600,000 head costs Texas producers 1.8 million dollars annually. That is a cost producers cannot afford to bear, Turner said, making it critical for the industry to find a way to replace the loss of the Monfort plant, which currently processes about 450,000 lambs each year.

Plans for a replacement facility are in the very early stages, Turner

said. As to when and what form or structure this company will reflect is not clear. What is clear is that Texas produces more than 20 percent of the nation's feeder lambs. If each lamb produced in Texas has a \$2.75 or \$3.00 freight charges assessed to it to have it transported to a packing facility in Colorado or other far-off destination, then it is time to examine other alternatives.

"Texas sheep and goat producers are anxious to have a packing plant for their production in the state and will work diligently to ensure this becomes a reality," Turner concluded.

Yes, but multiple-program timed recording is quite complicated because the satellite receiver must have the channels changed manually to another satellite channel before the second recording is to be made on another channel. *Cable is readily compatible with most VCRs for time recording. Other channels can also be watched while recording from cable. Not so with DSS.*
- Q. CAN I GET HBO ON A DSS SYSTEM?**  
A. Yes, but it requires another monthly subscription to another service other than Direct TV that carries the bulk of the DSS programming. *Cable can easily provide HBO for an additional fee of only \$10 per month.*
- Q. CAN I CONTINUE TO USE MY TV REMOTE CONTROL?**  
A. Yes, it will be needed to turn your set off and on and change the volume, but cannot be used to change the channels unless it is a programmable multi-device control. *Cable is totally compatible with your present control unit.*
- Q. IS DIGITAL SATELLITE TECHNOLOGY GOOD?**  
A. It's great. In fact, cable is also beginning to use digital technology. The problem with DSS is that all of the monthly service fees go out of the local community. *Cable supports the local community in many ways and provides jobs for numerous people in the local economy. In fact, a dollar spent locally, turns over five times supporting the local community.*
