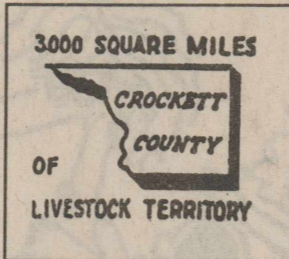

Child Injured In Bike-Car Accident

Roderick Tijerina received a broken left leg and right arm Sunday after being struck by a car while riding his bicycle.

Investigating DPS Trooper Keith Olive said the 8-year-old boy rode his bike into the street in front of a private residence at 207 Ave. E into the path of an oncoming car.

Driver Huberto Briones applied his brakes but was unable to stop in time, Olive said.

The boy, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Adrian Tijerina, was treated at Crockett County Hospital and transported by Medivac to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo. Because the boy was unconscious for a short while, he was to be examined in San Angelo for possible head injuries, Olive said.

A car/truck accident Monday night resulted in serious injury to a Midland man. Peter Berge of Midland was the driver of a 1991 Chevrolet pickup which veered into the path of a 1971 Freightliner pulling two trailers full of hay.

Driver of the truck, Allan Lefler of Taylor, swerved to the right to avoid hitting the pickup which struck the second trailer of hay.

Investigating DPS Trooper Keith Olive said the impact resulted in extensive damage to the pickup and its driver.

Jaws of Life was used at the wreck scene on Hwy. 190 about 1.5 miles west of Hwy. 163. Berge was taken by ambulance to a location south of Barnhart where he was picked up by Medivac helicopter and taken to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo.

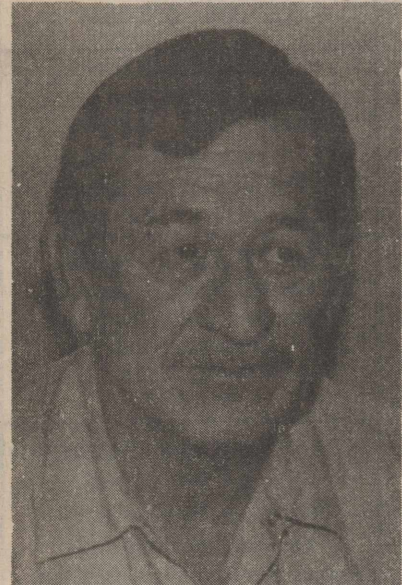
Broom And Mop Sale April 29

Barrera Asks Re-election To Board

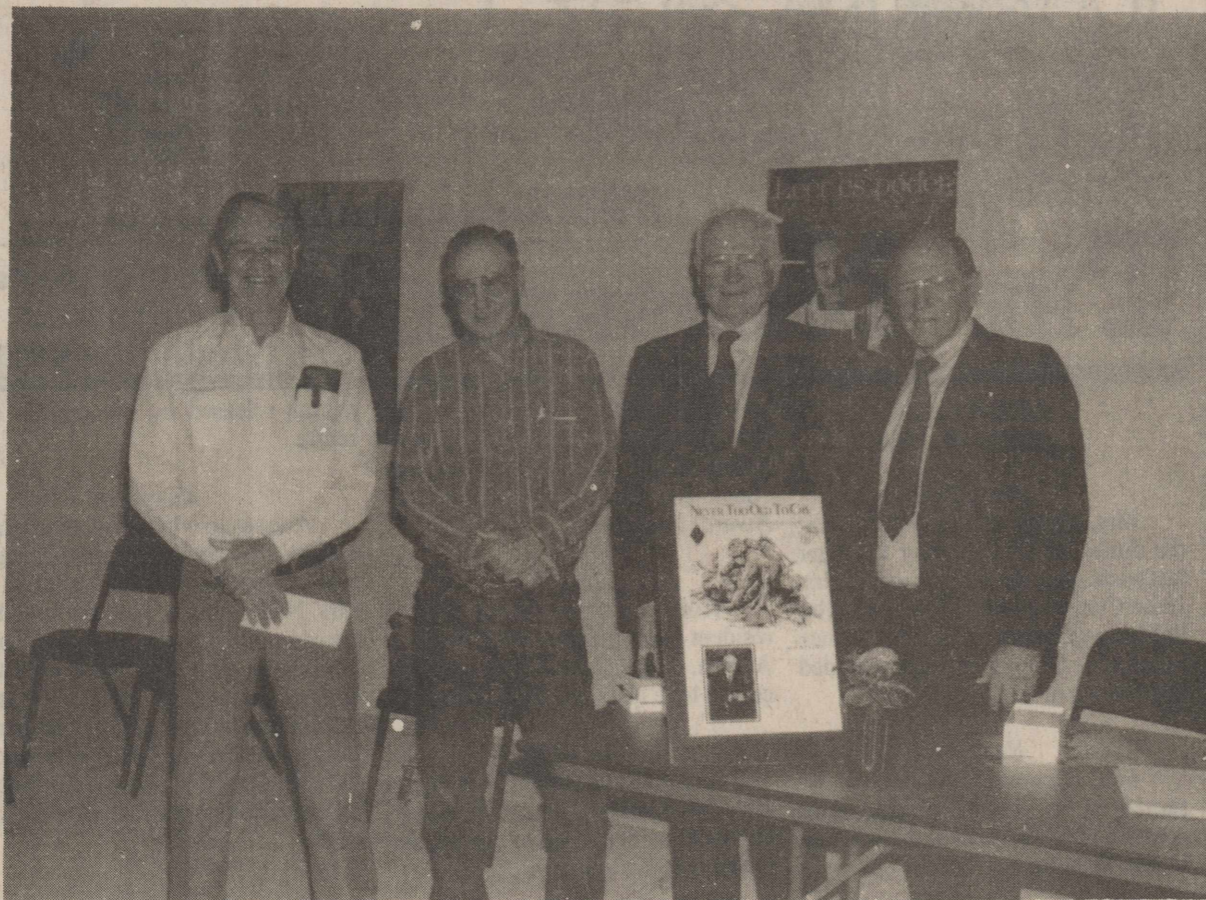

Lady Lions Win First At District, Boys Second

The Ozona Lady Lions took first place honors at the District 5-2A golf tournament held April 11 and 12 in Fort Stockton. Bobbie Bryson was the first place medalist with a two-day score of 174 strokes. The boys placed second in the tournament.

In the girls' division, Ozona placed first with a two-day score of 804 strokes (406 and 398). McCamey was second with 392 and 416 for a total of 810 strokes, and Van Horn placed third with 509 and 481 for a total of 990.

Bryson won top medalist with a 36-hole score of 174 strokes (86 and 88). Rebecca Shipp from Iraan placed second with 176 strokes, and Shasta Gomez placed third with a score of 195 strokes.

Others playing on the team include fourth place finisher Emily Stuart with 103 and 93 for 196, strokes and Kristy Pridemore with 104 and 98 for 202 and eighth place.

Playing as individuals from Ozona were Lauren Wilkins with 113 and 119 for 232 strokes, Loretta Stewart with 113 and 122 for 235 strokes, and Haley Holden with 127 and 123 for 250 strokes.

In the boys' division, McCamey won the tournament with a two-day total of 311 and 312 for 623 strokes. Ozona was second with 331 and 336 for 667. Tying for third were McCamey B and Iraan with 690 (McCamey 345 and 345 and Iraan 357 and 333). Fifth was Eldorado with 369 and

354 for 723, sixth Van Horn with 393 and 361 for 754, and seventh, Iraan B with 392 and 396 for 788 strokes.

"I was really happy with the way they played," said boys' coach Rodney Johnson. "They played pretty consistent, and I think they will play better at regional. Their course has fewer water hazards, and it will help us play better."

In the individual medalist standings, McCamey had the top four places with first place going to Isaiah Navarette with a total of 153 strokes. Ozona's Casey Upham placed fifth with a total of 82 and 78 for 160

Special Stamp Cancellation To Honor Lady Lions

The Ozona Post Office, in conjunction with the Ozona Independent School District and the Ozona Lions Club, would like to invite the community to come and celebrate a special cancellation on May 4, 5 and 6 in honor of the state champion Lady Lion basketball team. The temporary station will be called Lady Lion Station, and the special cancellation will take place at the Ozona Post Office.

A special cancellation is a unique postmark used to cancel mail on the day of the event. A special cancellation is authorized when a scheduled event to be observed is of interest to the general public. The Postal Service must endeavor to make all unique and unusual postmarking service widely known to collectors through advanced national publicity.

The special cancellation will cover a three day period. "This is an excellent opportunity to mail your graduation invitations and have them cancelled with the special cancellation," said Postmaster Ernie Jones. "Our Lady Lions will be involved in the special cancellation. We will have two or three performing the actual cancellation, two or three at the free candy table and two or three at the free Coke machine. They will alternate days to ensure they all get to participate."

"This special cancellation is scheduled to be a big and beautiful event," Jones said. There will be decorations, presentations and ceremonies. The stamp selected for this special cancellation is the KIDS CARE stamp which was just released on April 21, 1995. There will be several postal products enhancing the special cancellation, several collectors' items and philatelic material.

Several Post Office officials are scheduled to attend. R. H. Gonzales, district manager; Richard Sechelski, manager of Post Office Operations; John Howard, manager Post Office Operations and postmasters from San Angelo, Sonora, Eldorado, Robert Lee, Loraine, Mertzon, Christoval and Big Lake are expected to be here. Other surrounding areas have also made plans to have representatives present.

The Ozona Lions Club, which has always been a strong supporter of the community of Ozona, is sponsoring the cachet sales. The cachet is the Lions Club emblem with a message which goes well with the Lion emblem on the cancellation.

"I urge you to please support the Lions Club by purchasing the envelopes with their message of goodwill," said Jones. "I can safely say that your money will come back into the fine community of Ozona."

School Receives \$34,927 Grant

The Crockett County Consolidated Common School District has recently received three grants totaling \$34,927. The Share Our Strength (SOS) grant of \$8,000 was applied for and will be used to expand and improve the school breakfast program. The Carl D. Perkins Grant, through the federal government awarded \$13,427 in the career and technology education field. The Texas School Telecommunication Access Resource (T-STAR) grant of \$13,200 is an integrated telecommunications system. This statewide network will provide one-way video/two-way audio communication services for the school district.

The Share Our Strength grant was applied for by Supt. Larry Taylor, food services director Coleen Everett and school business manager Mae Lay. The grant was established in 1984 to alleviate and prevent hunger through-

Care Center Directors Review Applications

At an April 20 called meeting of the hospital/care center board, directors examined resumes from 13 candidates for care center administrator. Interviews with four of the candidates are expected to begin this week.

The center can operate up to 30 days without a certified administrator, but this time limit has expired. Previous information that the Texas Department of Health will allow the center to operate on a waiver basis for 90 additional days is incorrect according to Eddie Moore, board president.

Hospital employee Zoe Green is currently serving as interim administrator for the hospital and care center. However, Mrs. Green is not certified as a care center administrator.

A certified administrator may be brought in for the interim during the hiring process, Moore said.

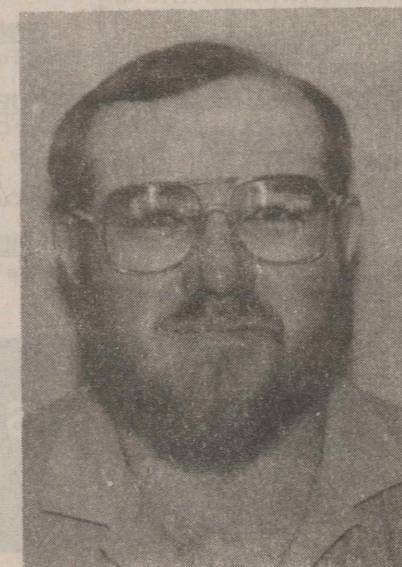

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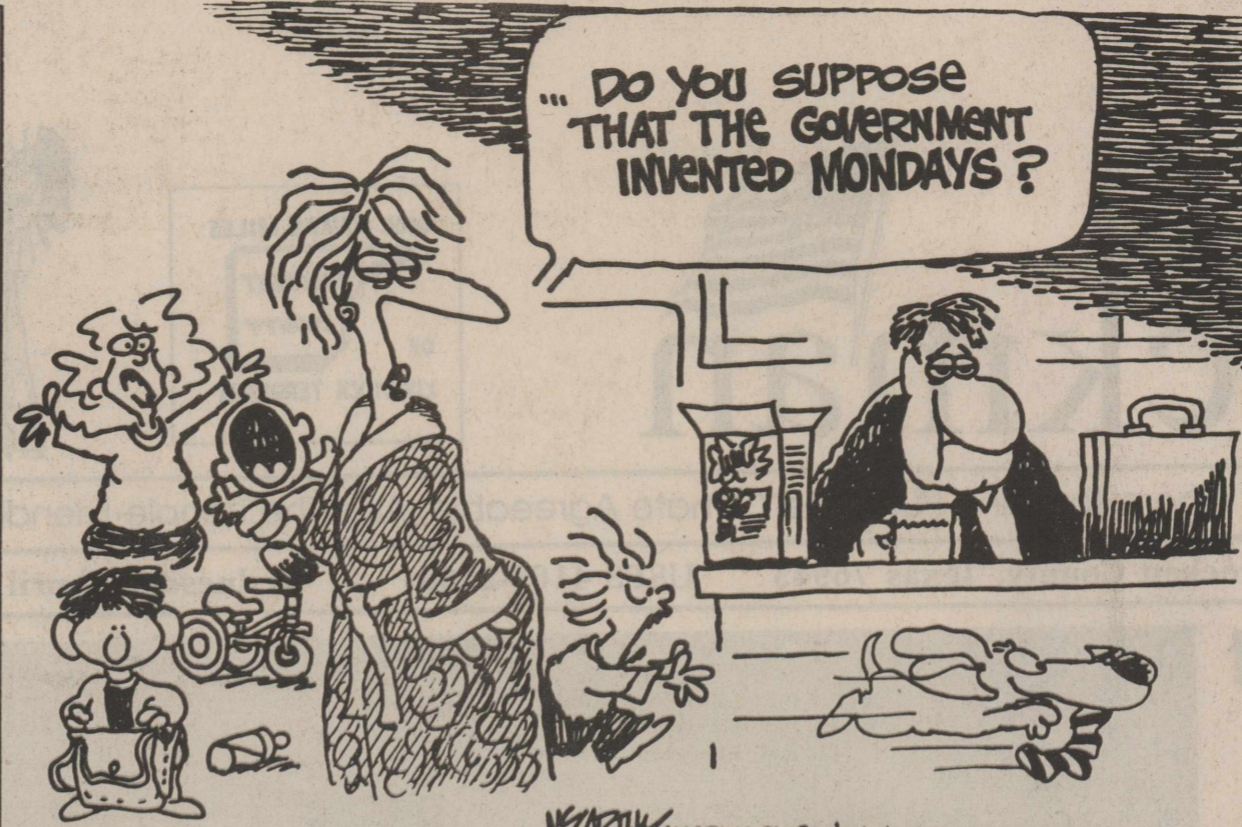

Social Security Is An Independent Agency

As of March 31, the Social Security Administration became an independent agency, separate from the Department of Health and Human Services which has been its home base since 1953.

The change is expected to provide a new level of recognition to SSA and to all those who receive Social Security benefits and support the system through their payroll contributions, officials stated.

Under the 1994 Social Security Independence and Program Improvement Act transferring the agency, SSA

retains the responsibility for administering the Old-Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance programs and Supplemental Security Income program. SSA will also continue to assist in administering the Medicare and Black Lung programs.

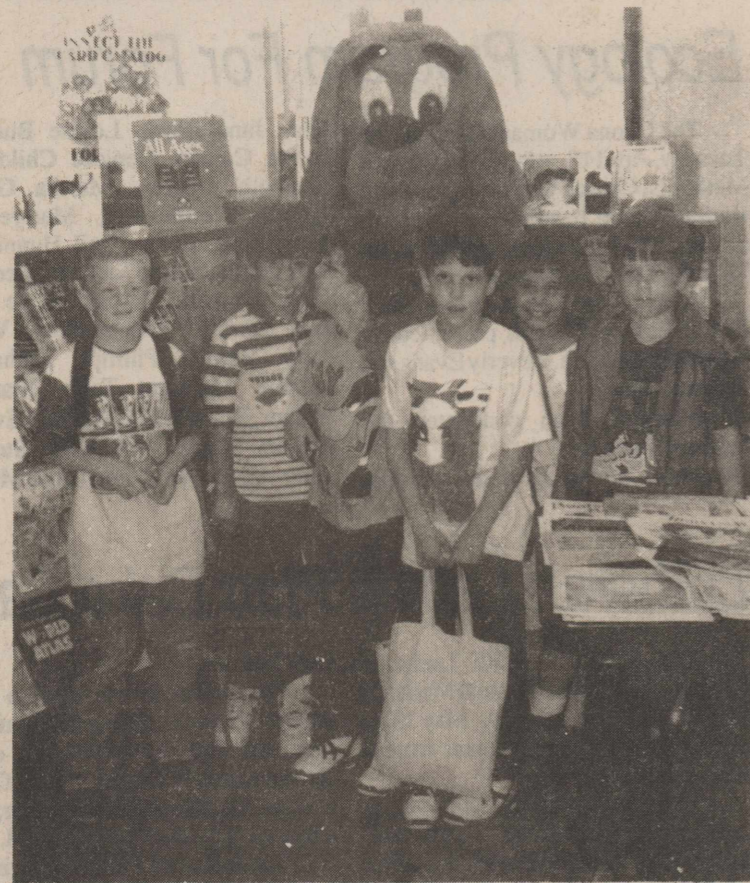

We would love to have you come join us and share your ideas and experiences with us.

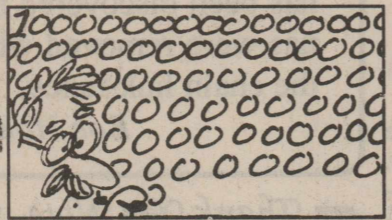

People of old said, "Come, let us build for ourselves a city, and a tower whose top will reach into heaven, and let us make for ourselves a name" (Genesis 11:4). These people wanted to build a memorial to themselves. They wanted to make a name for themselves rather than making God's name great. This effort to prove their own self worth rather than God's placed them in opposition to God. Talk about self-imposed stress.

You can fall into this same pattern when you attempt to make a name for yourself. It might work like this. Someone runs you down with words. You worry and fret about what this

other person says. Of course it is a lie. However, you act as if it is true. Your life is guided by this lie. You fret over how you are going to prove yourself. Talk about self-imposed stress.

You also forget you should "do all to the glory of God" (1 Corinthians 10:31). And so, when you attempt to make a name for yourself and to prove yourself, you neglect the greater duty of glorifying God. In this way you place yourself in opposition to God. This is the ultimate in self-imposed stress. It is needless. You should not believe the lie spoken against you. As a result, you should realize you have nothing to prove.

Divorced Spouse: Social Security Still Cares

The marriage may be over, but Social Security at least recognizes that there are still ties that bind. That is why a divorced spouse may be eligible to receive Social Security benefits on the record of her/his ex if the marriage lasted 10 years or more.

Benefits available include retirement benefits for spouses at age 62, and survivors benefits at age 60, or age 50-59 if the spouse becomes disabled. If you are a spouse with a child of the worker in your care receiving benefits, you may be entitled to a benefit at any age.

If your ex-spouse has remarried, the amount of benefits you receive will not affect the amount of benefits the current spouse can receive. Also, if there are young children receiving benefits, benefits paid to you will not affect the amount being paid to your children.

Even if you are working, you may be entitled to a higher benefit based on your ex-spouse's work record than you will get on your own record. Your benefit may be even higher if your ex-spouse is deceased. If your ex-spouse's earnings were higher than yours, you should check with the Social Security office to see if you can get a higher benefit.

When you apply for benefits, you will need your ex-spouse's Social Security number. If you don't have the Social Security number, you will need to provide his-her date and place of birth and his parents names.

You can get more information 24 hours a day by calling Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. You can speak to a service representative between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. on business days. Our lines are busiest early in the week and early in the month, so if your business can wait, it's best to call at other times. Whenever you call, have your Social Security number handy.

Shannon was also planning to bring their Medivac helicopter again this year.

Cholesterol tests are not being provided this year at the Health Fair due to inaccuracy of the "stick" tests. The most reliable tests, done after a fasting period, check levels of "good" HDL cholesterol and "bad" LDL cholesterol and permit a complete lipid profile. The Texas Department of Health will be taking appointments for the fasting tests during the Health Fair, so everyone concerned about their cholesterol levels should go by their booth and visit with the nurses about this test.

Health care providers and exhibitors confirmed for the fair at press date include the Texas Department of Health, the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Council for the Concho Valley, American Cancer Society/West Texas Coalition for Cancer Control, the Concho Valley Area Agency on Aging, Hospice, AARP, Rubi Edmonson Stress Therapy and Reflexology, Emerald Underground Water District and Crockett County Hospital.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service will sponsor educational exhibits on diet and nutrition, cancer prevention and safety. One addition to the '95 Health Fair will be the "Roller Convincer"—a pickup cab which demonstrates what happens in a rollover when passengers are properly restrained by seatbelts and shoulder harnesses—and what happens when they're not wearing restraints.

Crockett County FCE will sponsor an educational exhibit on "look alike" chemicals and drugs and provide other materials on safety. A booth

with information on Attention Deficit Disorder is also planned by interested individuals.

"It's still not too late to reserve a booth space or provide services," said County Extension Agent for Consumer and Family Sciences Tedra Ulmer. "Just call 392-2721 before Thursday, May 4." Ulmer urged readers to check the flyers in their church bulletins on May 7 for the final list of providers and services.

Volunteers are also needed to bring food for the health care workers, help prepare food and help with booths. To see how you can be of help, call the County Extension Office at 392-2721 or Veva Vargas at the Texas Department of Health, 392-2996.

The Health Fair is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Crockett County Extension Family and Consumer Sciences Committee, and the Texas Department of Health. Children And Vegies Don't Always Mix

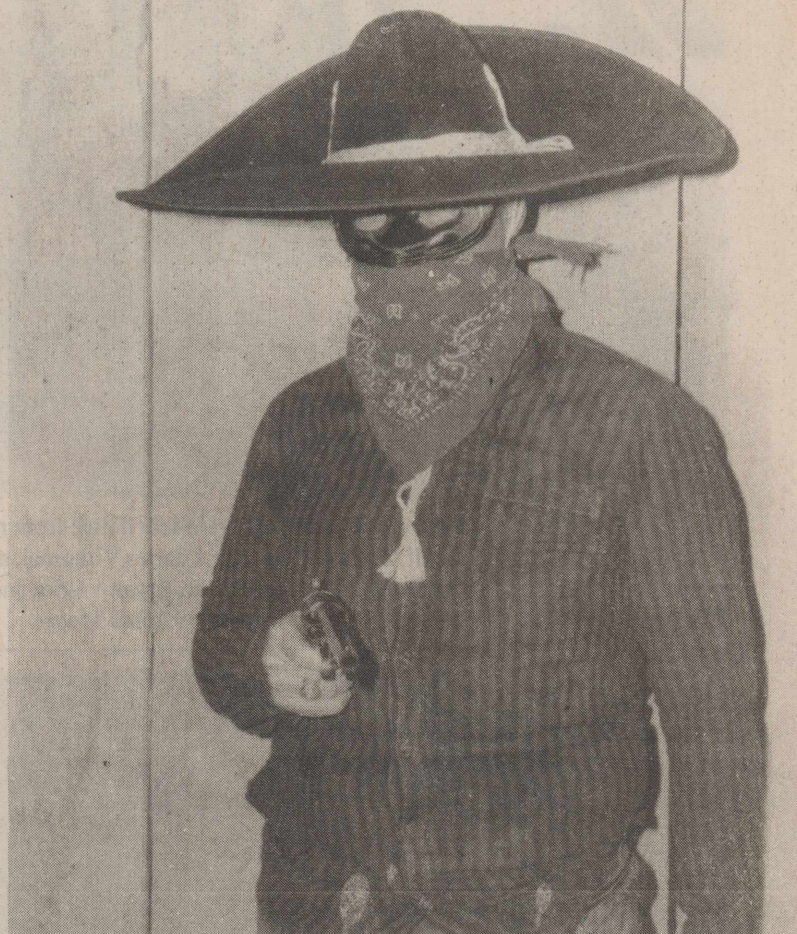
HOUSTON - Children need help in minding their "Peas" and Q's.

They need at least three vegetable servings daily, said Janice Stuff, a dietitian at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

For children ages 1 to 3, one tablespoon per year of life is a serving. For ages 4 to 8, a quarter- to a third-cup of cooked vegetables or a half-cup of salad is a serving. For ages 9 to 17, it's a half-cup of cooked vegetables and a cup of salad.

To make vegetables more appealing, Stuff suggests:

- *Mixing favorite vegetables with less popular ones.
- *Offering celery stalks as "edible spoons" for scooping up stew.
- *Adding red or green bell pepper to tacos.
- *Taking children to farm stands or produce markets to let them select their own vegetables.

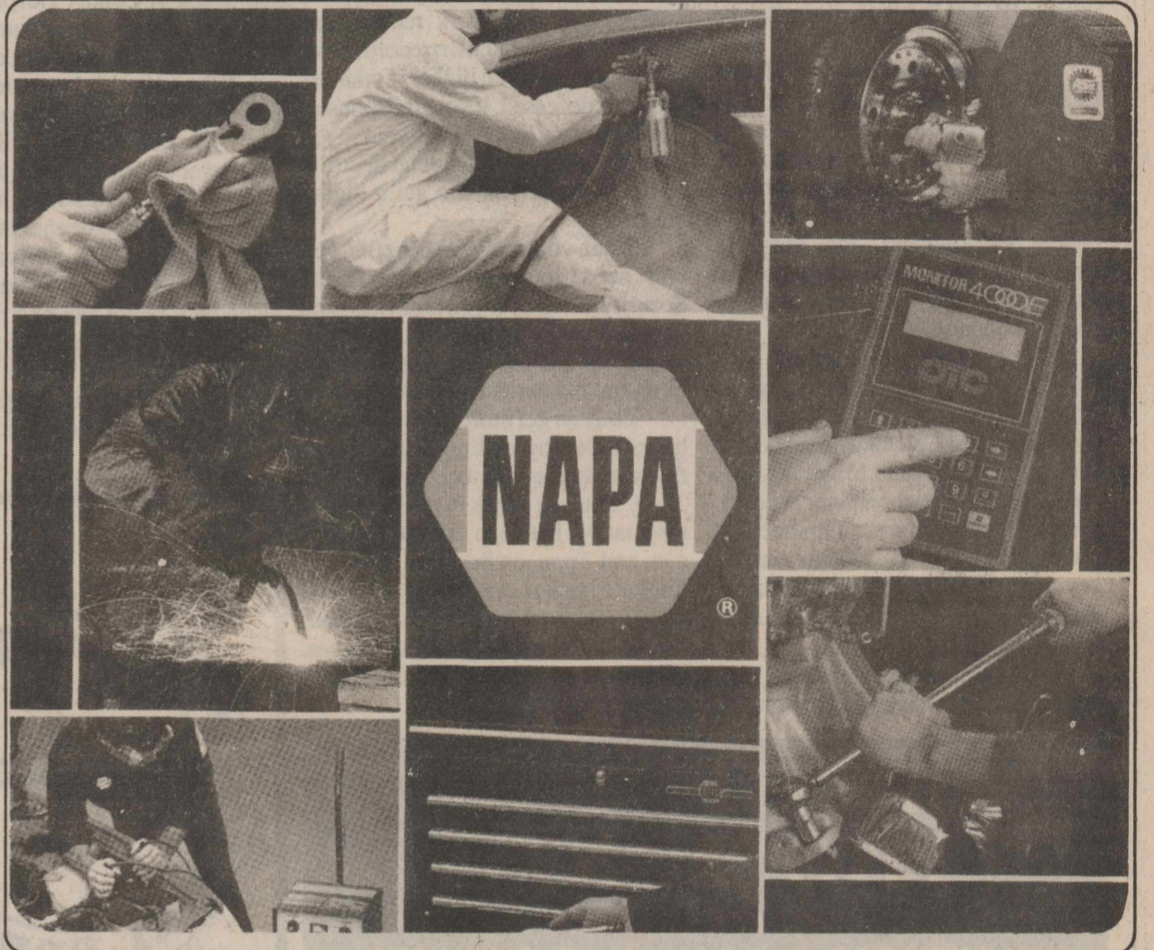

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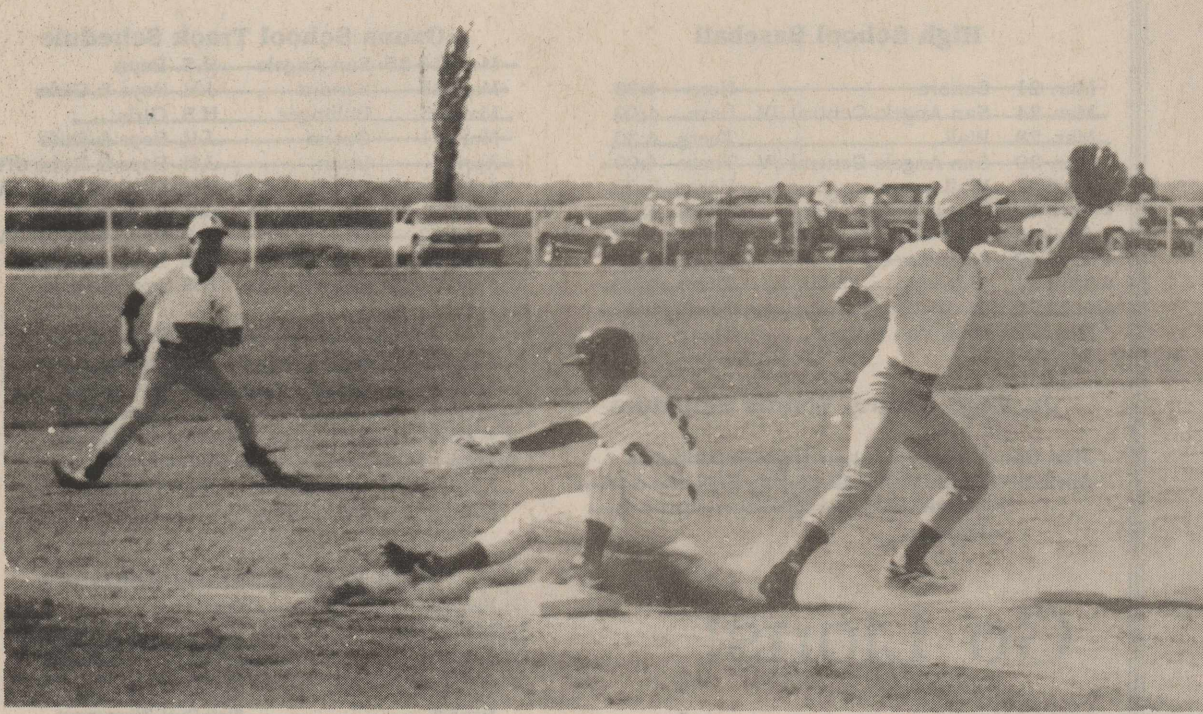

The Lions came back in the fourth inning when Jon Sanchez started the comeback on a walk with two outs and scored on a double by Pete Castaneda. Garza and Jamerson both hit triples with Castaneda and Garza scoring to give the Lions a 5-3 lead.

Pitching in the game was Castaneda, who held San Elizario scoreless for the last three innings. He gave up three runs, two walks and had six strike outs.

Ozona picked up one run in the fifth as Andreas De La Garza reached base on an error. He scored on a double by John Screws, making the score 6-3.

The Lions exploded in the seventh inning as seven runs were scored. Scoring for the Lions were: Chris Sanchez, De La Garza, Joe Esparza, Screws, Jon Sanchez, Castaneda and Garza, making the final score 13-3.

Top hitters for the Lions were Garza, De La Garza and Castaneda. Garza had three runs scored on two hits and one walk, De La Garza went 2 of 3, had one walk and scored two runs, and Castaneda went 2 of 4 on two doubles and scored two runs.

out the U.S. and the world. The purpose of this grant will be to increase student participation in schools that currently offer school breakfast but wish to improve low participation rates.

In Ozona, it will be used to improve school breakfast at all the campuses. A large portion of the money will be spent for equipment along with an outreach/promotion program, and for staff training and consultation.

At the present time, all of Ozona school children have access to the school breakfast program. Breakfast is served at 7:30 a.m. at the primary school to an average of 45 students per day. The three other campuses serve breakfast at 7 a.m. The intermediate school serves an average of 43 students per day. The junior high serves 54 students and the high school serves an average of 37 students per day.

Breakfast tickets at all campuses are: school children 50 cents, reduced 30 cents and adults 75 cents. The lunch prices are K-12 \$1.00, reduced 40 cents, adult \$1.75 and guest \$2.00.

The Carl D. Perkins grant for \$13,427 is intended for the use in the career and technology education field. This grant came through and was applied for through the Texas Educa-

tion Agency. Supt. Taylor and Mrs. Lay applied for this grant. As of March 31, they have received \$11,920 of the grant money.

The grant will be used to improve the district's vocational programs through the following: (1) A work study program for four vocational students. These students will work two hours during the school day and eight hours during the summer. (2) A portion of the money will be spent for supplies and equipment for home economics, wood shop, vocational agriculture, cosmetology and auto mechanics. (3) Ten percent of the grant will be used for guidance and counseling.

The T-STAR grant of \$13,200 is an integrated telecommunications system network that provides one-way/two-way audio communication for the school system. The grant was applied for by Ted Cotton, assistant superintendent.

The system is composed of a satellite dish, receiver, VCR, computer with a modem, software and a telephone line. The system is now set up in the high school library.

The main purpose of the system is to provide users access to distance learning courses, professional development services and a variety of instructional television programs available by communication satellites or through the Texas Education Agency.

It is used through networking to computers and televisions in the main library, reference room and the two classrooms located below the library.

Currently, the system is being used by high school librarian Sherry York to record satellite programs on a video cassette.

In the future, the system will be used by several teachers in fields such as science, history, government and languages. Teachers will show their students a live program or a video copy of a program to support or expand that particular curriculum.

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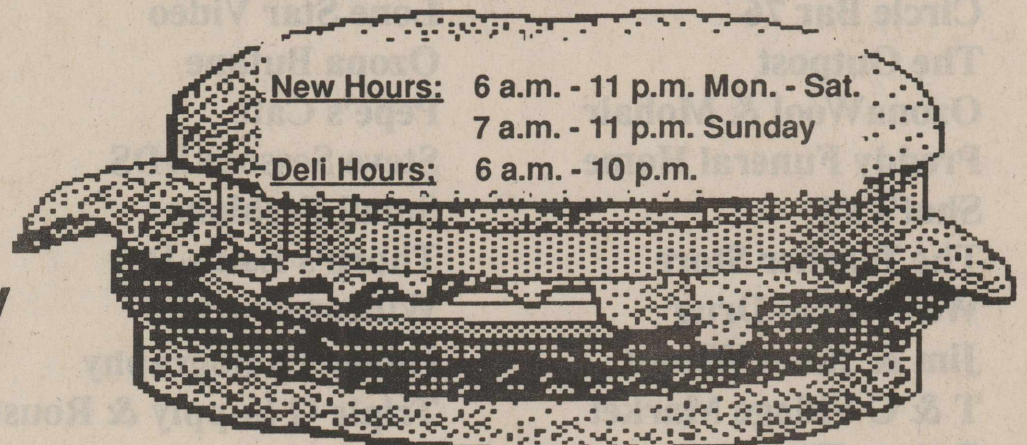
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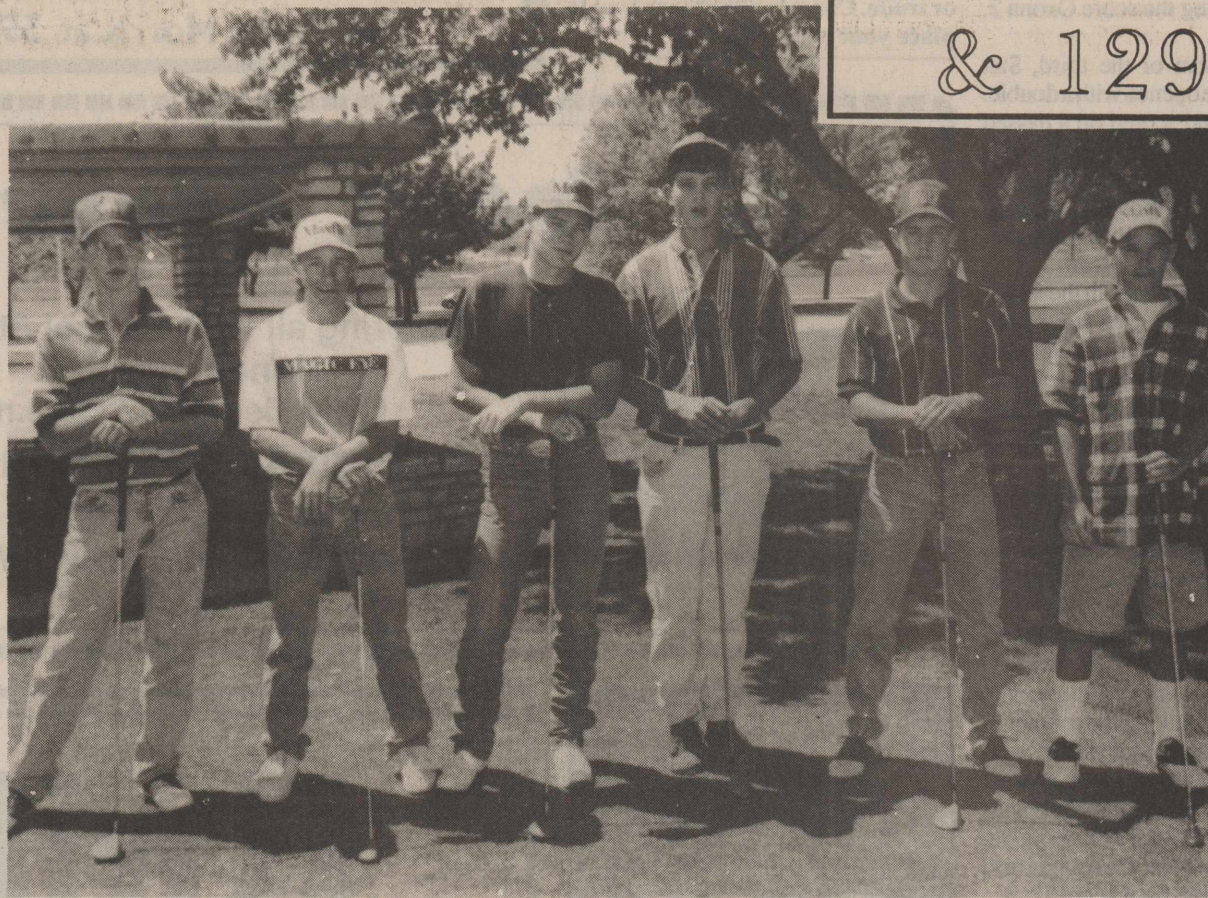

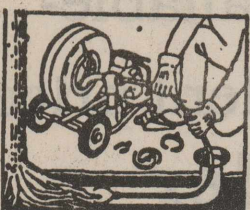

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Time To Nominate Students For G/T Program

The Crockett County Consolidated Common School District is now in the process of accepting nominations for its gifted and talented program for students with exceptional intellectual abilities.

According to Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton, gifted/talented students are those who excel consistently or who show the potential to excel in any one or a combination of the following areas: general intellectual ability, specific subject matter aptitude, creative and productive thinking ability, leadership ability, ability in the visual and performing arts and psychomotor ability.

"Students in the local program are identified and served in the area of general intellectual ability," Cotton said. "This area is defined as possessing superior intelligence with potential or demonstrated achievement in several fields of study and the ability to perform complex mental tasks. At the present time, the students in our gifted and talented program are working on developing more higher-level thinking skills beyond what is normally required in the regular classroom. Gifted/talented education does not take the place of the regular classroom but supplements and provides time for students to use their thinking and reasoning skills to a greater degree."

Identification of gifted/talented students is very complex and comprehensive, consisting of two distinct steps: (1) nomination and screening, and (2) selection. In the nomination and screening phase, a student may be nominated for the program by his/her parent or guardian, by a teacher, or by

scoring very high on a standardized achievement test. Once a student has been nominated, he/she will be given two nationally-developed tests of higher-level thinking skills to determine the student's potential to succeed in the program, and after all data has been collected on each child, a committee of professional educators will review this information and determine which additional students qualify for inclusion in the program.

"Anyone with a child attending

grades kindergarten through eleven this year and wishing to nominate them for this program is asked to go by the principal's office and request a nomination form, which needs to be returned to the school by Friday, May 5. If you are unable to go by the school, please call, and we will see that you get one," Cotton said. Students who did not make the gifted/talented program last year may be nominated again if parents wish to do so.

Hunter Safety Education Camp Scheduled For Early Summer

Now is the time to sign up for Hunter Education Camp. Under state law, anyone 12 or older who wishes to hunt is now required to take a hunter safety education class and receive certification. The Texas Game Warden's Association and various local contributors sponsor the West Texas Hunter Education Camp each year for those who need their certification.

Camp this year is scheduled for June 9-11 the Gene Perry Ranch in Crockett County. Enrollment is limited to 25 boys and girls ages 12-16. Acceptance will be on a first-come, first-served basis. There is no cost to participants.

Camp will begin at 8 a.m. on Friday, June 9, and run through Sunday evening, June 11. Bunkhouse

facilities and chaperones are provided. Instruction is given by qualified individuals. Firearms and ammunition are furnished at camp. Upon completion of the training, participants will receive their certification.

Enrollment forms will be passed out at both junior high and high school. If you are interested in attending and did not get an enrollment form at school, go by the County Extension Office and pick one up. Registration deadline is May 17, 1995. All enrollment forms need to be returned to the County Extension Office, which is located on the top floor of the courthouse annex.

According to Coach Pete Maldonado, Ozona's mile relay team posted their best time of the year with three minutes, 21.1 seconds. They are also one of the top five teams in the region in Class AA. The team is composed of David Browne, Johnny Porras, Lalo Guadarrama and Anthony Sanchez.

Sanchez, top runner in Region I-AA in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles, posted a time of 39.02 seconds. David Browne, one of the top five competing at regional in the pole vault, tied for third with a vault of 13 feet. In the discus competition, Adam Carroll's best throw was 144 feet. Carroll will be one of the top five hurlers to watch at the regional meet.

Bryan Valdez placed fifth in the 3200 meter run with a time of 10:41. Charles Villarreal placed seventh in the 1600 meter run with a time of 4:52. Both Valdez and Villarreal are in the region's top four competitors, and Villarreal has the top time in the region in the 1600 meter run.

On the ladies' side, the OHS women tracksters competed at the meet and made quite a respectable showing. Terren Marshall placed eighth in the 3200 meter run with a time of 13:30.89. Marshall will go to regionals in both the 3200 and 1600 runs.

Dana Bishop posted a leap of 32 feet, 1/4 inch to place 12th in the triple jump. She did not make the finals in Odessa, but will represent Ozona at the regional in that event. Abbey Maldonado ran the 200 meters in 27.61 and improved on her personal best time.

Also going to the regional meet will be Tara Wilkins in the 300 meter hurdles and Amy Laughlin in the 800 meter run. The two did not attend the

qualifiers' meet.

Fans can watch OHS at the regional meet on Friday and Saturday, April 28 and 29, at Elmer Gray Stadium, Abilene Christian University.

Beginning on Friday, Ozona will have good representation in both the girls' and boys' 3200 meter runs as Marshall and Villarreal compete at 10 a.m. Adam Carroll will compete in the discus at 3 p.m. on Friday, and runners will compete in prelims beginning at 5 p.m. on Friday.

On Saturday at 10 a.m., David Browne will try to take the pole vault title, while finals in running events will get underway at 1 p.m.
