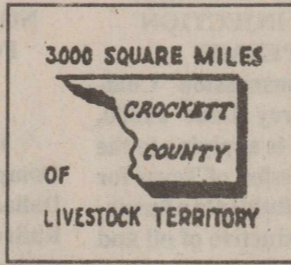

Pre-Kindergarten Program Change

Due to changes mandated in the recent educational legislation, Senate Bill 1, the guidelines for the pre-kindergarten program in regard to enrollment have been brought in line with the guidelines for kindergarten through fourth grade. The school is now allowed a ratio of 22 students to one teacher in the pre-kindergarten program. Due to this change, the Ozona Primary School will be extending the pre-kindergarten to a full-day program to better serve the needs of the community and to utilize the professional personnel connected to the program in a more efficient manner.

This program change began Monday, Aug. 22, and will continue for the remainder of the school year. The hours of the program will be the same as for kindergarten through second grade, 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The children will be given the opportunity to eat breakfast at school beginning at 7:30 a.m. and will be eating lunch in the cafeteria at 12 p.m. each day. The snack-time that is scheduled into their day in the present program will continue. The extension of this program to a full day will necessitate that these children be given the opportunity to take a nap after lunch. This will make it necessary for a mat, as well as a small towel or blanket, to be brought to school as part of the supplies needed for this program.

"We are very excited about this change and anticipate that it will be a positive one for both the children and parents that we serve and the teachers and staff at Ozona Primary," said Principal Marilyn Luce. If you have any questions regarding this program, or if you are interested in enrolling your four year old child in pre-kindergarten, contact Ms. Luce at 392-5505. "We need to hear from many of you soon because we cannot enroll more than 22 eligible students."

Remodel Or Rebuild

Board Studies Middle School

In their regular monthly meeting that was held on Tuesday, Aug. 15, members of the Ozona School Board approved a contract with Larry Harvey of Green Harvey Associates in Lubbock to conduct a feasibility study on remodeling Ozona Middle School. The school, originally constructed in 1947 and named North Elementary at that time, housed kindergarten through sixth grade students for many years and has not been remodeled, except for the sealing of windows and the installing of heating and air conditioning in 1977, since it was built.

According to Harvey, who conducted a visual inspection of the building prior to the meeting, the feasibility assessment will consist of six parts: (1) the compiling of historical data on the facility; (2) interviews with the school staff and students to obtain their observations of areas that need remodeling; (3) inspection of the building's structure by a team of engineers; (4) determination of major building faults by the consulting firm; (5) in-

spection for educational adequacy (classroom size and space); and, (6) inspection for environmental issues. "Once this feasibility study has been completed," Harvey said, "we will have a very accurate data base on the building in order to determine what exactly needs to be done."

The feasibility study on completely remodeling the middle school versus building a new one received the highest priority of facility recommendations presented to the local school board by the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Programs and Facilities Committee on May 9 of this year. The committee was chaired by Dr. Gary Vannoy.

Trustees studied a report on the district and campus accreditation status as determined by the Texas Education Agency's Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS) Report. The agency noted that the district was fully accredited, and three of the four campuses (Ozona Primary, Ozona Intermediate and Ozona Middle School)

received an "accredited-acceptable" rating, but one campus, Ozona High School, received an "accredited-low performing" rating.

Superintendent Larry Taylor explained that the "accredited-low performing" rating for OHS was assigned because the high school's 1993-94 school year drop-out rate of 7.2% did not meet the state's requirement of 6% or less drop-outs in Texas high schools. "In all of the other indicators (student attendance, TAAS scores, and college admissions results) we were above the statewide average; however, because we did not meet this one state criteria, the high school was assigned the rating. It is ironic because our drop-out rate this past 1994-95 school year was less than 5%, which is far below the state's 6% requirement. It is further ironic that over 250 of the state's approximately 1,000 high schools this year received "accredited-low performing" ratings due

Lions Work Hard Toward Opener

With most intrasquad scrimmages, coaches and players learn what they need to improve on, and the 1995 Ozona Lions are no different, as they found out Saturday morning. Several good runs and passes were made along with good blocking and tackling. Of course, there were broken plays, blocked passes, fumbles and missed tackles, but the main thing is the Ozona Lions are coming together as a team.

Head football coach Walter Hargrove told the players, "It was a good session - it was pretty even." He explained that the group (junior varsity and varsity) was divided fairly equally into two groups - the purple and the gold squads.

"It wasn't necessarily our starters against the second teams," according to Hargrove. "Because of that, our timing was off on a few things, and there were some breakdowns in a few areas. Overall, it went good as we had some intensity and enthusiasm. The things we need to correct are things we can correct. Overall, with the scrimmage I was pleased - we're getting better every day."

Offensive coach Alan Phillips remarked, "We are coming around - there's a couple of kids coming on. Some of our younger kids are coming around real well." Agreeing with Coach Phillips, Coach Pete Maldonado said, "The younger kids were doing what they were supposed to."

Coach Ronnie Casey said, "It was a real successful scrimmage - no

one got injured."

This Lions will have their hands full this Thursday evening as they face the District 11-A Robert Lee Steers starting at 6 p.m. in Lion Stadium. The Steers return from a 10-1 area championship and return 12 lettermen. Players to watch are quarterback Aaron Hood, twin brother Eric Hood at wide receiver/defensive back, tailback Adam Morgan, defensive end Marc Owen and linebacker Jeremy Burns.

The Steers will be running an I offense and a split 6 defense. The scrimmage will start with 20 offensive plays by the varsity teams, then 15 plays by the junior varsity teams. The main things that the Ozona coaches will be looking for in this scrimmage and the next one are technique and responsibilities, according to Coach Hargrove.

The Lion are set to scrimmage in Crane on Aug. 31 at 6 p.m. Their regular season will open against the Reagan County Owls in Big Lake on Sept. 8, and the first home game is against Sonora Sept. 15.

School Enrollment Up From 1994

Ozona schools reported enrollment of 968 on the third day of school this year, up 42 from first day figures of 926 in 1994.

Intermediate showed the largest increase, up 27 from 196 to 223. Total for Ozona Primary this year is 216 compared to 212 in 1994. Middle school enrollment was 251 compared to 242 and at high school enrollment was 278 compared to 276 last year.

Enrollment by grades this year was: Pre-kinder 8; Kinder 63; 1st Grade 71; 2nd Grade 74; 3rd Grade 71; 4th Grade 70; 5th Grade 82; 6th Grade 71; 7th Grade 84; 8th Grade 96; 9th Grade 72; 10th Grade 87; 11th Grade 63 and 12th Grade 56.

Eagle Scout Badges Awarded

Ozona Boy Scout Troop 153 added two more Eagle Scouts to its ranks Aug. 17, when Elliott Barrera Jr. and Doug Meador Jr. were presented in an Eagle's Court of Honor.

Master of ceremonies for the event, Scoutmaster Ray Don Myers, expressed pride in the two he has "seen all the way through" their road to achieving this highest of Scouting ranks. Less than two percent of all Scouts in the United States reach the Eagle rank.

Assisting in the court of honor were Big Lake Scouts Terry Younggren and Tracy Younggren and Scout Council executive director Carl Cummings of San Angelo along with an honor guard of Ozona Scouts.

Badges earned by both the new Eagles in their climb to the rank of Eagle include: archery, basketry, camping, citizenship in the world, citizenship in the community, citizenship in the nation, communications, emergency preparedness, environmental science, first aid, fish and wildlife management, geology, horsemanship, leatherwork, mammal study, nature, orienteering, personal manage-

ment, pioneering, rifle, shooting, safety, shotgun shooting, soil and water conservation, sports, surveying, swimming and wilderness survival. In addition Meador earned the family life badge, and Barrera the God and Country award.

Eagle rank requirements include: 1. Be active in your troop and patrol for at least six months as a Life Scout; 2. Show Scout spirit; 3. Earn a total of 21 merit badges; 4. While a Life Scout, serve actively for a period of six months in a leadership position in the troop; 5. While Life Scout, plan, develop and give leadership to others in a service project helpful to the Scout's religious institution, school or community. The project must be approved by the Council office; 6. Take part in a Scoutmaster conference.

Joining the young men at the ceremony held at the civic center were their parents, Esme and Elliott Barrera and Barbara and Doug Meador. After being formally pinned with their Eagle awards, the Scouts presented their mothers with Eagle pins and their fathers with Eagle tie tacks.

AUSTIN- Texans seeking concealed handgun licenses may begin the application process Sept. 1.

The DPS is gearing up by distributing application request cards and registering gun ranges.

Application request cards will be available by Aug. 16 at all regional, district and sub-district DPS offices. The cards are free and may be picked up by individuals or by business owners for distribution to their customers. Photocopying them for further dissemination is permissible on any type of card stock or plain paper. Application request cards are not available from the DPS by mail.

Jury Call Coming Up In Albers Case

County and District Clerk Debbi Moore said Monday she is expecting an order from Judge Brock Jones to draw names Aug. 28 for prospective jurors in the Larry Albers case. Preliminary examination of those called would begin on Sept. 15.

Pre-trial hearings are scheduled for Sept. 1, 12 and 13.

On trial in the March 1994 murder of Albers are Loretta C. Neumuller and Tyrone Cornilous Parker.

Runaway Attempts To Elude Officers

A 14-year-old Florida girl led officers on a chase through town at speeds estimated at 80 miles per hour last Thursday after unsuccessful attempts to stop her east and west of town on the interstate.

DPS Trooper Keith Olive began the pursuit east of Ozona after a routine license plate check returned the message that the driver was a runaway. The young driver exited I-10 at the truck stop, then cut back to I-10, driving west past Ozona at speeds estimated at up to 110 miles per hour.

In an attempt to turn back onto old Hwy. 290, the car spun out and came to a stop. As Olive approached the car on foot, "she tried to run me down," he said. At that point he fired one round at the car in an attempt to

disable it, Olive said.

The car raced through Ozona with three DPS vehicles and two sheriff's department cars in close pursuit. East of Ozona Trooper Kenny Wadsworth distracted the driver and Olive was able to get past her, he said. With a DPS car ahead and two behind, they then managed to slow the car, which had a flat tire, to a stop. "I think she was ready to give it up by then," Olive said.

A passenger in the car, 18-year-old Jefferson L. Templeton of Florida, was arrested on charges of fleeing from a police officer, harboring a runaway and possession of drug paraphernalia. He is in county jail awaiting arraignment in county court.

The driver was taken to the juvenile detention center in Pecos.

will then, beginning Sept. 1, mail application packets to requestors.

Also Sept. 1, concealed handgun program instructors certified by the DPS may begin offering the 10- to 15-hour classes which applicants must take to become licensed. Certificates, which indicate successful completion of those classes, must be forwarded to the above-listed address along with completed application packets. The DPS-authorized course will consist of both classroom and firing range in-

struction. While shooting ranges are not subject to direct DPS regulation, owners or operators must register any facilities that will be used for this instruction.

The DPS immediately will begin registering ranges at no cost. Range owners and operators may call the DPS at 512 706-7293 or 512 706-7294 to request registration of their facilities. Then, the DPS will contact the owners and/or operators to complete the registration process.

On Aug. 17 I attended a workshop in Abilene to learn more about CD-ROM based reference materials, which will be part of the BCLS Computer Network. Electronic reference workstations with on-line multi-CD-ROM disks are planned for the library. The merits of various disks were reviewed, and the pros and cons discussed.

In anticipation of the arrival of the workstations, CCPL has installed on its present single PC the Windows CD-ROM version of *The 1995 Grolier Multimedia Encyclopedia*. This disk has, in addition to the Academic American Encyclopedia, 6 full hours of audio-visual information with pictures, animations, multimedia maps, videos, and timelines. Come by the Public Library for a demonstration of this exciting multimedia reference tool.

In anticipation of all the changes that will come with our expansion, and in an effort to make the library seem more approachable to anyone uncomfortable about making use of its facilities, we have posted extremely clear sheets giving instructions on the use of the card file, the location of the books, and the use of the micro fiche machines.

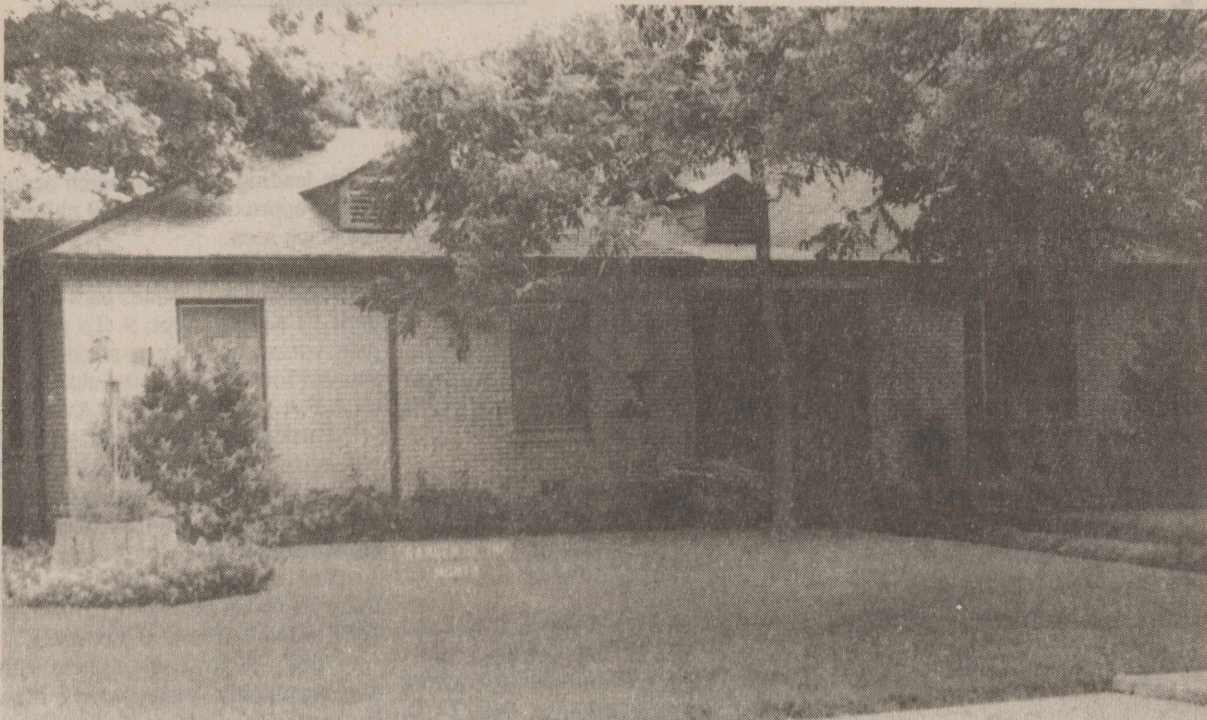

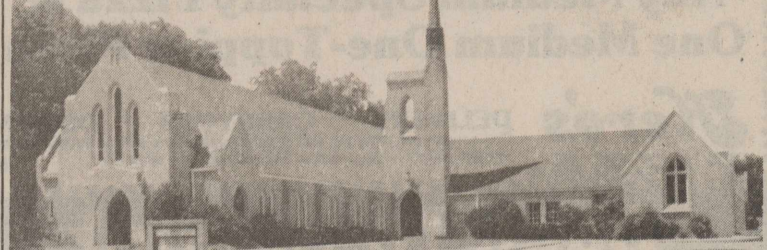

FR. Du Buisson Celebrates Ozona Anniversary Aug. 26-27

Fr. Bill Du Buisson will celebrate the anniversary of his sixth year in Ozona the weekend of Aug. 26-27 at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church.

In January of 1989, Fr. Du Buisson was transferred to Our Lady of Perpetual Help as pastor. In April of 1991, he became pastor of St. Ann's in Sonora with responsibility of Ozona.

Currently he serves on the Presbyteral Council of the Diocese of San Angelo and on the College of Consultors. Since 1983, he has been a Judge for the Tribunal of the Diocese and was appointed as Adjutant Judicial Vicar in May of 1994. Fr. Du Buisson has also served several terms as Superior of the Oblate Fathers District of West Texas.

William Robert Du Buisson was

born in San Antonio on Dec. 25, 1929. He is the son of the late Louise Fox and William Robert Du Buisson Jr. His one brother, Donald J. Du Buisson, is deceased.

He attended St. Anthony School in San Antonio from Grade 1 to Grade 7 and attended Bishop John Carroll School in Oklahoma City for 8th Grade. In 1943, he entered St. Anthony High School Seminary for high school and junior college. He went to St. Peter's Novitiate in Mission in 1948 and took first vows on May 31, 1949. On May 31, 1952, he took Perpetual Vows at De Mazenod Scholasticate (now Oblate School of Theology) in San Antonio. Archbishop Robert E. Lucey ordained him as a priest Sept. 8, 1955, in St. Mary's Church in San Antonio where he had been baptized and confirmed. Fr. Du Buisson took science and education courses at the University of Notre Dame in Indiana and St. Mary's University in San Antonio.

From Sept. 1956 to June 1963 he taught high school science courses at St. Anthony High School Seminary. In June of 1963, Fr. Du Buisson became the treasurer of the Seminary.

In June, 1964, Fr. Du Buisson volunteered to go to Notre Dame Seminary, Cotabato City, Philippines. Here he taught high school science and English classes at the Seminary. He also taught religion courses at the University of Notre Dame in Cotabato City. He headed several committees for curriculum development for Notre Dame Educational Association, Philippines. On weekends, Fr. Du Buisson was involved with ministry at the local colony for sufferers of Hansen's disease (leprosy), and in nearby parishes.

Fr. Du Buisson returned to the United States in June of 1968 and was stationed at Immaculate Heart of Mary in Harlingen. In June of 1969, he was transferred to Our Lady of Sorrow Parish in Houston. Soon, however, he developed paralysis of the right diaphragm. After treatment, Fr. Du Buisson moved to West Texas.

In January of 1970, he became pastor of Sacred Heart of Mary at Rocksprings with the missions of St. Mary Magdalen at Camp Wood and St. Raymond at Leakey. He became administrator of Sacred Heart at Del Rio in October of 1976 and later pastor there until July 1981. During his service in the Archdiocese of San Antonio, Fr. Du Buisson was elected

to several terms on the Senate of Priests. He also served several terms as Superior of the local Oblate District.

In September of 1981, Fr. Du Buisson pursued advanced degrees in Canon Law at the University of Ottawa and St. Paul's University, Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. He received the civil degree of Master in Canon Law and the ecclesiastical degree of Licentiate in Canon Law.

Fr. Du Buisson returned to Texas and during the latter part of 1983 served in the Oblate parishes in Midland. On Jan. 2, 1984, he was named pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes in Andrews where he remained until coming to Ozona in 1989.

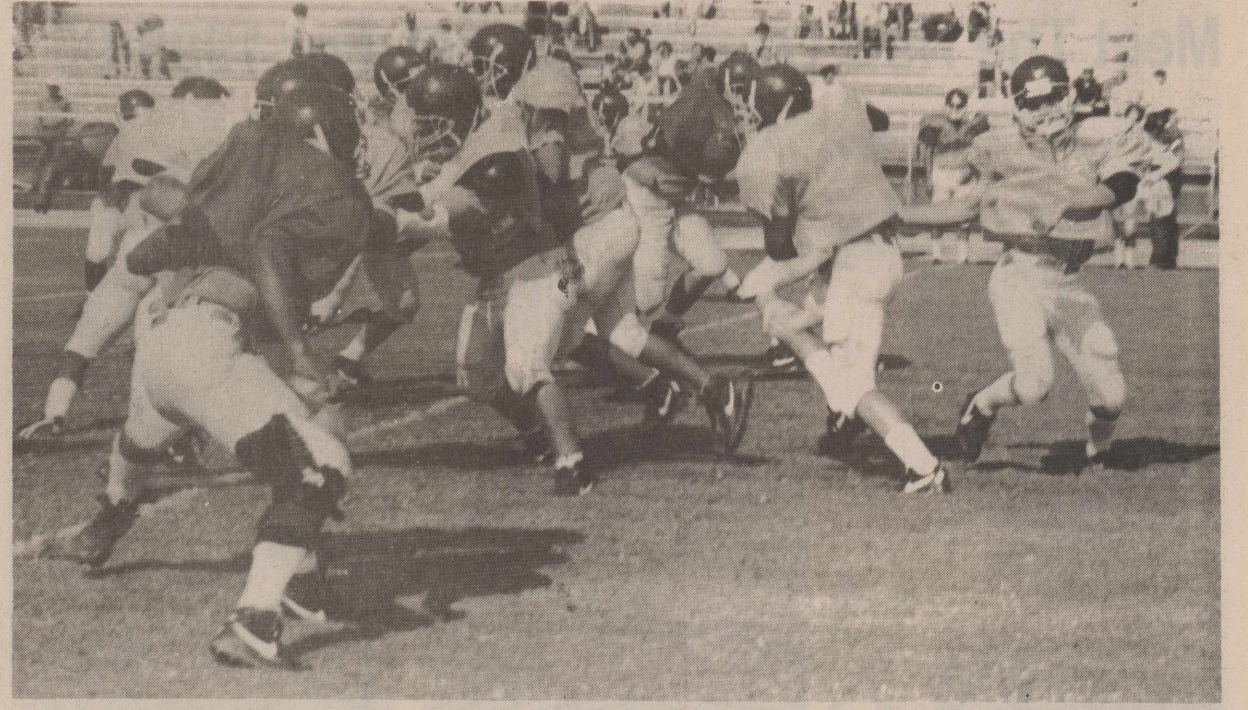
solely to their 1993-94 drop-out rate," he said.

Supt. Taylor also reported on an item of legislation contained in the recently passed Senate Bill 1 that will benefit school districts, particularly those in West Texas. "In regard to student transportation, Senate Bill 1 now allows us to use passenger cars for bus routes. A passenger car is defined as a vehicle that carries nine passengers plus a driver, which is a total of 10 or less. We have three bus routes that have five or less students riding; therefore, we can now use cars instead of small buses and that will result in a considerable decrease in the amount of gasoline that we will have to purchase," he explained.

Following discussion of the transportation issue, the trustees approved going out for bids for the purchase of two cars, a suburban-style van, and a 19-passenger bus to be used on more populated routes.

The school board also approved the establishment of an alternative placement program mandated by Senate Bill 1 for students who engage in serious misbehavior that violates the district's student code of conduct and the establishment of an alternative high school program for students who are in danger of dropping out of school due to low grades or who fail to obtain enough course credits in order to graduate in a reasonable period of time.

Under the terms outlined in Senate Bill 1, school districts are required to have an alternative placement program that: (1) is in a setting other than

the student's regular classroom; (2) is located on or off a regular campus; (3) provides for students assigned to the program to be separated from students in the regular school program; (4) focuses on English language arts, math, science, history and self-discipline; (5) provides for students' educational and behavioral needs; and (6) provides supervision and counseling.

An alternative high school program, while not required by Senate Bill 1, is an effective method many school districts have established to meet the needs of students who have difficulty in obtaining the required number of credits for graduation. These students are typically "at risk" of eventually dropping out of school and facing limited employment opportunities when they do so. The program would provide assistance to students by preparing them to obtain their Graduate Equivalency Degree (GED) so that they could obtain jobs that require a GED or high school diploma.

Student entry into this program will be by application.

Both the alternative placement program and the alternate high school program will be located in a school-owned house located east of Ozona Intermediate School and will be staffed with degreed personnel.

During the meeting the board also approved a bid from Meadows-Fisher & Cleere Insurance Company for

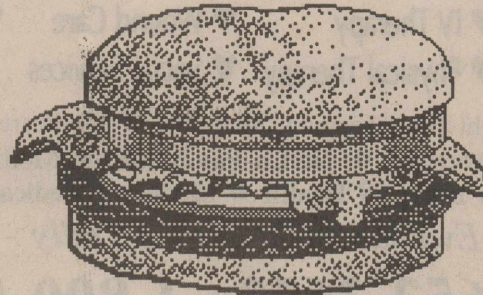

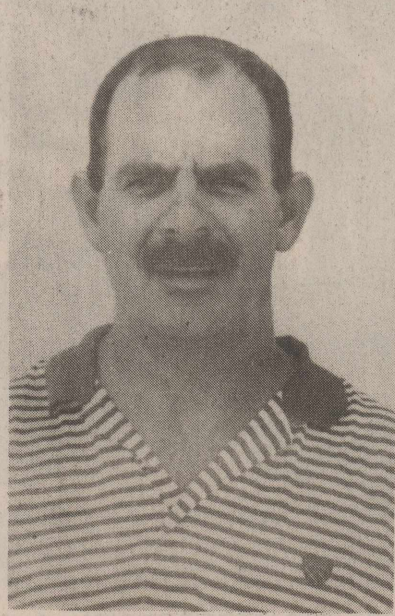

In Ozona, he will teach high school science, coach quarterbacks and running backs in football and will coach high school girls' track.

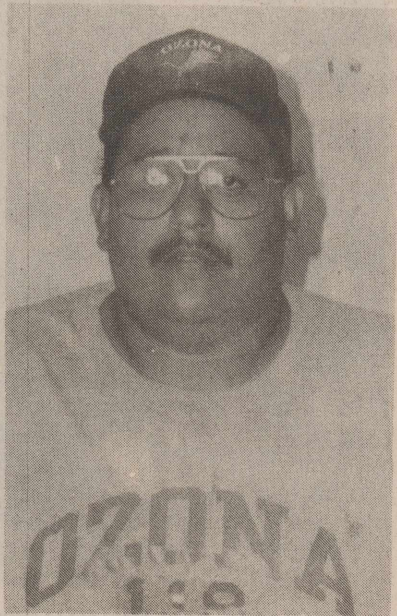

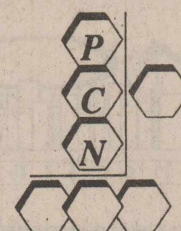

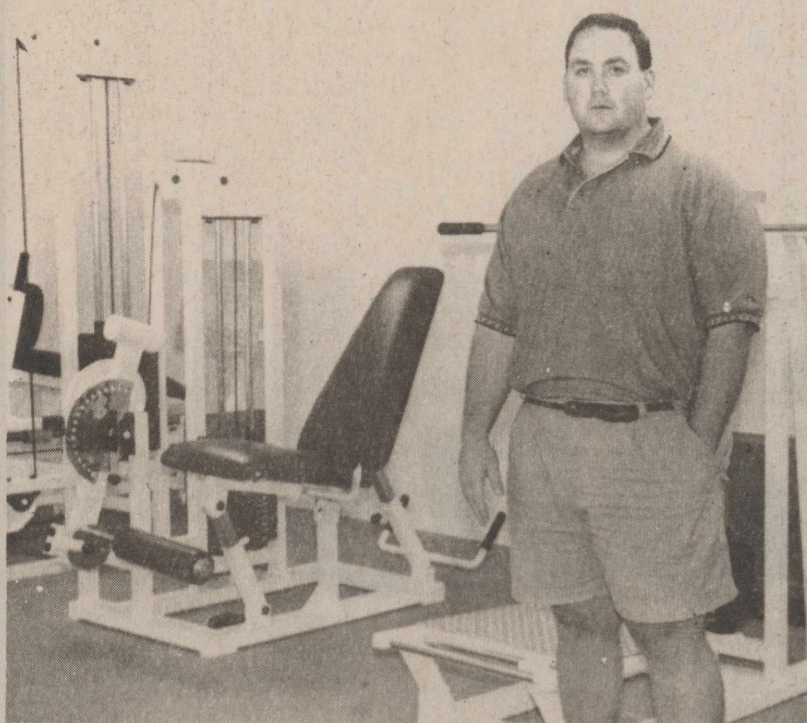

The County Attorney and the County Judge both said that they did not see a problem with the request, Mr. Davis replied, "If they want to be held responsible they can put up his bail". Mr. Davis was then asked if Mr. Rodriguez could ride with one of the deputies since they were going to be involved in the funeral anyway. He still refused. When Mr. Rodriguez was told that permission to attend the funeral had been denied...one can only imagine how confused he was and what went through his mind.

Why did Mr. Davis deny this request? Especially when the family was already going thru a painful and sorrowful time. Not allowing Mr. Rodriguez to attend the funeral only added to both Jesse and the Longoria's sorrow.

It took four days for the suspect to be charged and arrested on two counts of involuntary manslaughter. This is a disgrace when compared to the one hour it would take to pay your last

respect to a loved one. Does this seem fair?

Ozona is a small community; what kind of Judicial system is in place here, when not even the requests of a family in mourning is honored.
