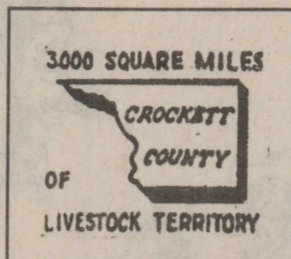

## Stores Ready For Lone Star Cards

Equipment is in place in Town and Country and T&T grocery stores in Ozona to utilize the Lone Star card, the high-tech system which is replacing food stamp coupons and Aid to Families With Dependent Children checks across the state.

According to information from the office of state comptroller John Sharp, Crockett County is scheduled to go on-line with the program in October. However, one of the stores reports that two customers are already using the system there.

This electronic benefits transfer system works with a plastic card, the Lone Star card. Money is credited by the state to the holder's account each month whereas previously, benefits recipients were mailed food stamp coupons and AFDC recipients received checks. With each transaction through the Lone Star card, the card holder receives a printed receipt showing the amount of funds still available for the month.

The clerk runs the card through, then the card holder enters his or her personal identification number.

Crockett County is one of the state's Phase 4 group implementing the system. The number of machines at each store is based on the monthly volume of food stamp customers.

"The card will cut down on fraud, but it is still not fraud proof," said

Wayne Tomlinson, manager of T&C. "The card will also cut out the buying and selling of food stamps and cut out the cost of printing food stamps."

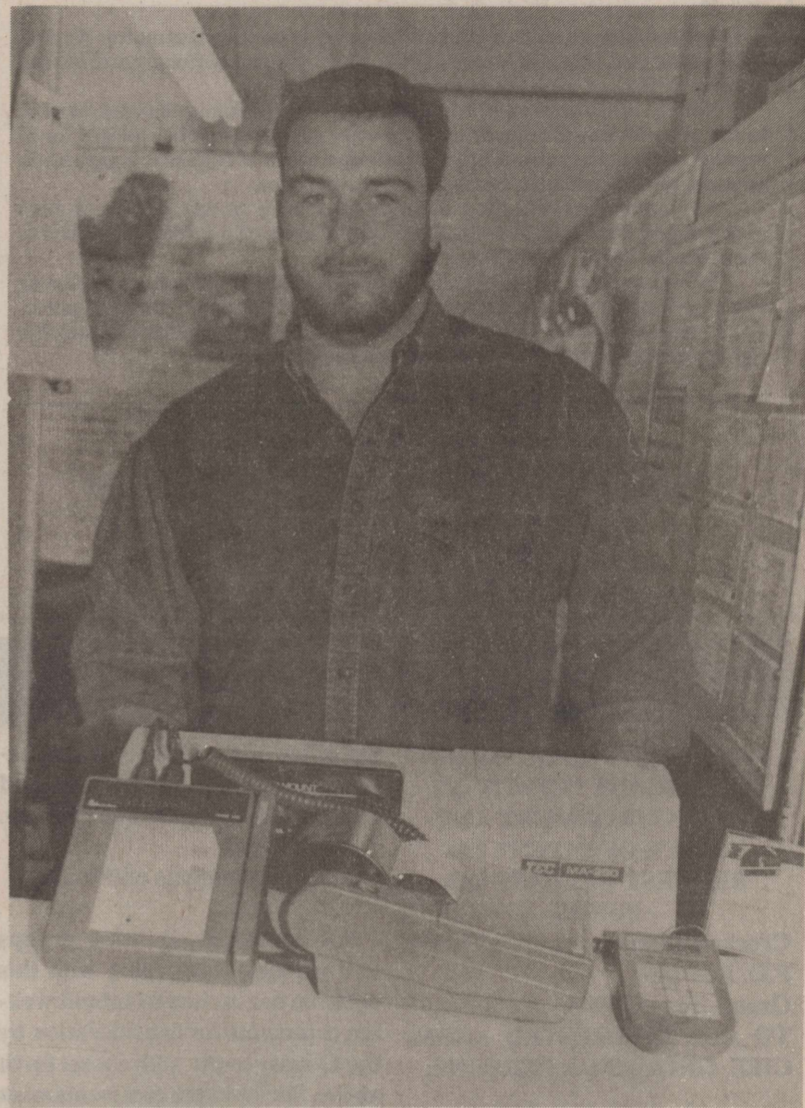
T&C has two card machines, one at a checkout counter and one at the office. The machine in the office will be used for recipients of Aid to Dependent Children. Recipients may take their allotment all at once or in portions during the month, Tomlinson said. A receipt showing the balance will be printed out with each withdrawal.

Jason Tomlinson of T&T says the cards will simplify operations at their store. Use of the Lone Star card will cut out reports and the labor involved in preparing bank deposits with the food stamp coupons.

"The machine does everything for us," Tomlinson said. "It will be interesting." T&T will process both AFDC and food benefits.

In fiscal year 1994, Crockett County had 671 food stamp participants receiving \$437,789. There were 106 families in the county receiving Aid to Families with Dependent Children amounting to \$72,981.

The card benefits program is administered by a private/public partnership of the Texas Department of Human Services and Transactive Corporation, the system's Austin-based operator.

The 1995 Ozona Lions are ready to start the season. "We're doing things a lot better and we're getting better every day," said Walter Hargrove, head coach.

Predictions of sportswriters and coaches abound every year at this time but the main thing is what actually happens on the field. Most people know that anything can happen at any given time with high school football on a Friday night.

According to sports writers of the San Angelo Standard Times and the coaches' poll of district 5-2A, they see the first three places the same. They both picked Iraan to win followed by Eldorado second and Ozona third. The coaches further picked Van Horn fourth and a tie for fifth and sixth between McCamey and Anthony. The sports writers picked McCamey fourth, Van Horn fifth, and Anthony sixth.

Dave Campbell's Texas Football Magazine picks Iraan first along with the other teams the same as the San Angelo Standard Times.

Regardless of who is picked first, the '95 football season will be filled

with great plays and excitement. The Lions will be returning nine lettermen and 10 starters-- six offense, four defense.

## Lions Show Improvement In Crane Scrimmage

Further improvements were seen by Coach Walter Hargrove of the Ozona Lions as they faced the District 8-3A Crane Golden Cranes in a controlled scrimmage last Thursday evening in Crane. The varsity was outscored 4-1 by Crane and the JV was outscored 3-0.

"We made a lot of improvement from the previous week. The first session, both offensively and defensively, we didn't execute very well and gave up some big plays but then we didn't panic," said Hargrove. "In the second session, we played a lot better both offensively and defensively. We seemed to be settling down--we just played a lot better the second session."

As with most teams, some have a high spirit and playing level at the beginning of a game which diminish at the latter stages of the game. Some teams do not play at a high spirited level at the start but increase toward the latter, affecting the outcome of a game.

In the varsity scrimmage, the Golden Cranes started at a high level which enabled them to get two quick touchdowns. The first TD came on the second play of the scrimmage when a Crane running back ran 73 yards. On the next play they scored on a 70 yard pass play.

The offense came back in the second session led by quarterbacks David Browne and Pete Castaneda. Ozona's only touchdown came on a 35-yard run by junior running back Shayne Fuentes. Running backs Justin Browne, Shayne Fuentes, Johnny Porras, Brian Badillo, and Iraan transfer Darin Jackson picked up some good yardage opened up by the front line.

Some good defensive plays were provided by defensive backs Jon Sanchez, David Browne, and Ray Fierro. Steve Montes caused a Crane fumble recovered by Lance Jamerson and David Browne. Other good defensive plays were made by Bryan Mendez and Adam Carroll.

## Ozona Cross Country Teams Aspire To First Place

The '94 Ozona cross country teams did well last year and the '95 team has the ability to do even better. Both the girls' and boys' teams will see action this week at the Odessa meet on Saturday, Sept. 9.

The teams will be coached again this year by veteran cross country coach Pete Maldonado. He said, "We are looking forward to a great season and will qualify as many as we can at state. The kids know the tradition of cross country at Ozona and the runners have committed themselves to keep the tradition going." There will be eight girls and nine boys competing this year.

Members of the girls' team include juniors Patti Dominquez (placed in the 30's at regional last year), Amy Laughlin (placed 25th at regional last year), Maria Trujillo (placed in the 30's at regional last year); sophomores Terren Marshall (placed 21st at regional last year) and Felicia Ramirez; and freshmen Lori Sanchez, Robin

Tambunga, and Gina Castro.

Members of the boys' team include junior Charles Villarreal who placed 13th at state and 10th at regionals last year; senior Johnny Porras who has run for four years and placed 23rd at regional last year; junior Codie Porras who placed 25th at regional last year; seniors John Baker and David Martinez; junior Blas Villa; sophomore Justin Browne; and freshmen Will Roane and Alex Castaneda.

Commenting on the girls' and boys' teams, Coach Maldonado said, "We are looking forward to a good year, especially the girls have a great opportunity to compete at all levels including state! The boys are really inexperienced and don't have depth the way we usually have."

Both teams will compete in San Angelo on Sept. 16, Mertzon on Sept. 23 and Big Spring on Sept. 30. In October the teams will compete in Ozona on the 7th, and Water Valley on the 14th. The district contest will be on Oct. 21, regional on Nov. 4, and state on Nov. 11.

## Blood Drive On Behalf Of Elvira Caldwell

A community blood drive will be held in Ozona Thursday, Sept. 14, from 1 until 7 p.m. at the Crockett County Civic Center.

Sponsored by Xi Sigma Omega, the drive is the first to be held in more than a year. Blood donations will be credited to Elvira Caldwell of Ozona who is hospitalized in San Antonio with leukemia.

United Blood Services of San Angelo will conduct the drive, and, as part of their new operating procedures, is asking donors to make appointments and provide positive identification. A maximum of 30 blood donations can be accepted during this time period. If more than 30 appointments are taken, the drive hours will be extended.

UBS and US Food and Drug Administration guidelines require the center to work with appointments whenever possible. The objective is to allow donors to get in and out in as timely a manner as possible. Walk-ins will be accepted when there is no conflict with an appointment.

Donors may make appointments by calling InHouse Network's voice mail and messaging line at 392-3840.

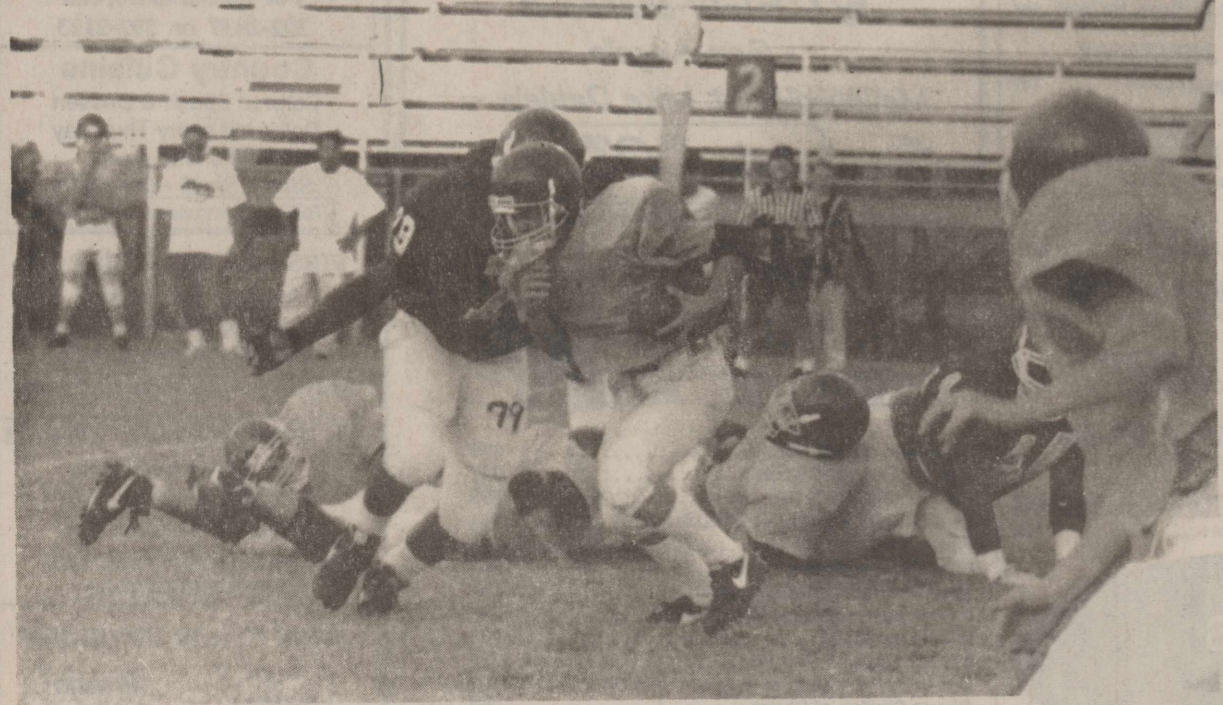
Enter "1" to leave a message, and leave preferred appointment time in voice mail box number 200. Connie Jennings, local drive coordinator, will contact the donor to confirm donation time.

New regulations also require that donors provide proper identification. Identification allows UBS to purify donor records and make sure all information in our computer system is correct. A driver's license, social security card or UBS donor card would all be sufficient.

Ozona plays a critical part in UBS operations, according to Angie Tyson, UBS community relations representative.

"The community of Ozona can help us reach our goal of providing a safe and adequate blood supply to the hospitals and patients we serve. There's no way we could have reached that goal in the past without Ozona's help, and we're asking the community to help us reach that goal today," Tyson said.

**The Patience Of God**

Also, any 4-H member who completed a record book does not have to fill out an application for Gold Star, I Dare You or Mother Davidson. They will automatically be turned in for consideration. However, the memorial scholarship does require an additional form.

A record book is required to apply for Gold Star and Mother Davidson. A 4-H member should have already received or concurrently receive the Gold Star before receiving the Mother Davidson award for outstanding 4-H member.

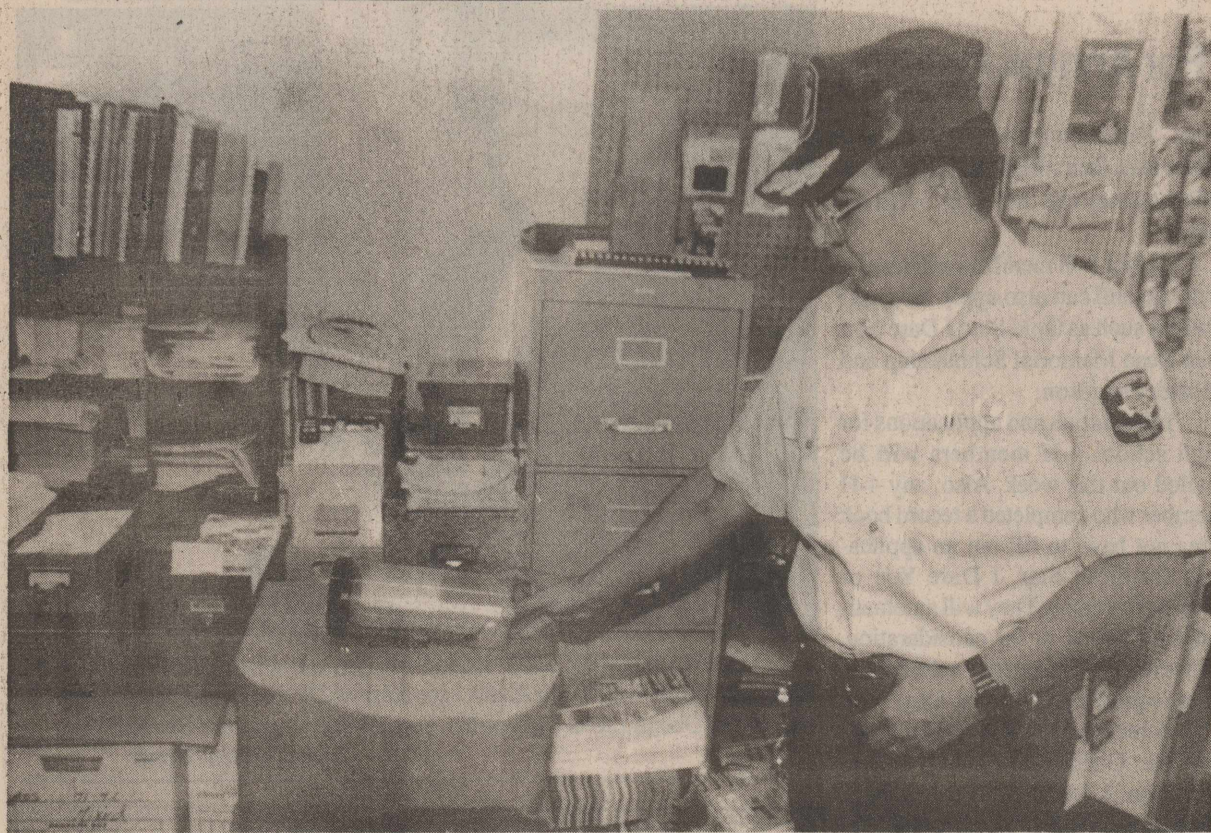

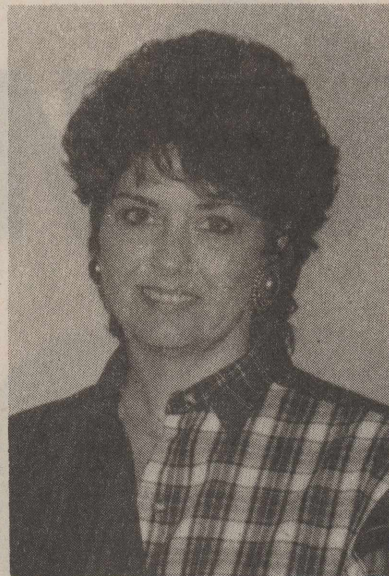
### JODIE CHILDRESS

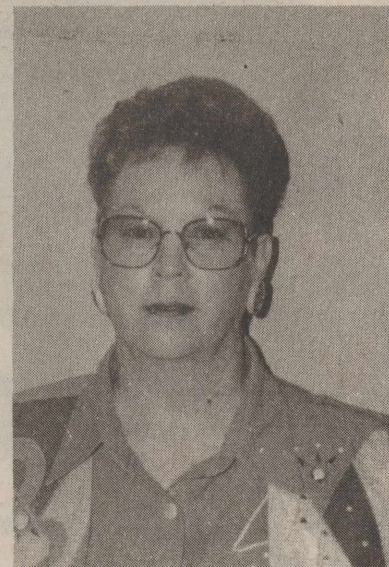
### BARBARA CARTER

Mrs. Carter was formerly office manager for the City of Victoria Health Department and is "looking forward to this school year and being the secretary here at the intermediatel school."



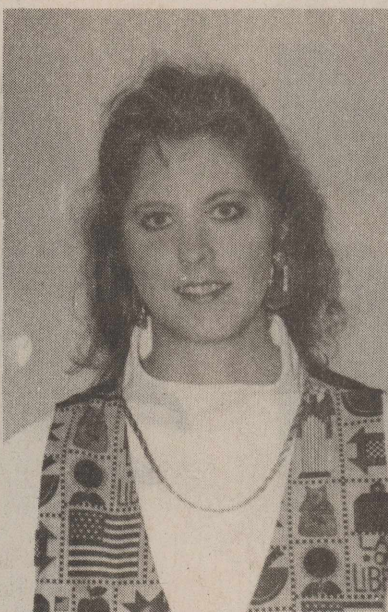

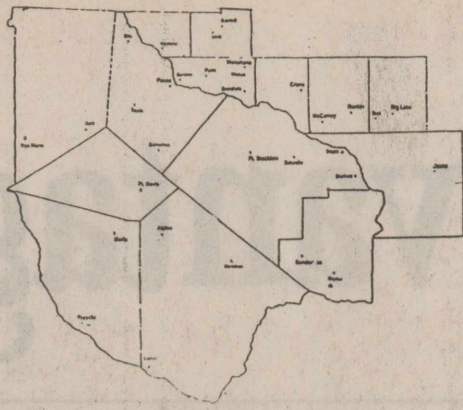

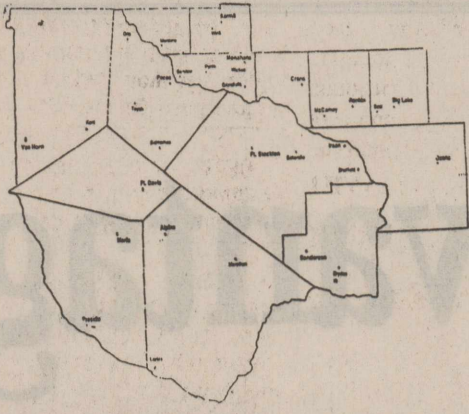
