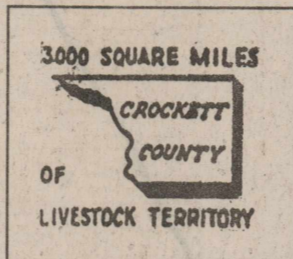

CROCKETT COUNTY DEERFEST Game Dinner & Prizes

Eighth Annual DeerFest Saturday

DeerFest, a high point in the year for Ozona, will be held Saturday, Dec. 2, beginning at 6:30 p.m. The Fair Park Convention Center, built as a direct result of DeerFest, will again be the location for the gathering. This is the eighth year for DeerFest, which is sponsored by the Crockett County

DeerFest Association.

Not one but two grand prizes will be given away this year. A Polaris 4x4 Trail Boss 250 and a Sea Doo SP watercraft will go home with some lucky winner. More than 100 guns and 100 additional door prizes will also be given away during the evening.

Admission to DeerFest is \$5, and this includes a meal. Door prize tickets are \$1. Tickets will be available at the convention center all day Saturday.

The 2000 who ate at DeerFest last year were served in an hour's time.

The line should go fast this year, also. A meal of fried venison, tamales, chili, patties, feral hog, sausage, wild cow, goat, fried turkey, river potatoes, beans and a new item, black buck antelope guisada will be served.

Proceeds from DeerFest are put

back into the community through donations to worthy projects. Since the DeerFest Association was formed as the sponsoring organization, money has gone toward construction of the EMS building and the convention center, and for equipment needed at the hospital emergency room and

Ozona Community Center. The association has also donated to the All Night Graduation Party, sponsored radio broadcast for the Lion football games, and sponsored a trip for the 4-H Project Leadership group and a Texas Game Wardens' Association youth camp.

Lions Take Thriller In Reagan County

The Ozona Lions chalked up their first win of the season with an exciting 62-60 overtime victory against the 3-A Reagan County Owls Tuesday, Nov. 21, at Big Lake.

The Lions, who played doggedly against the considerably larger Owls, never gave up - even after Reagan County opened a nine point lead in the third quarter.

Ozona started off using their quickness to score 14 points to the Owls' nine in the first quarter. Mel Martinez picked up two fouls early, and Reagan County pulled ahead in the second quarter as Coach Ronnie Casey had to use his only big man sparingly. However, Ray Fierro gave a big boost to the Lions by calmly pulling up and hitting a three-point jumper at the buzzer to send the Lions into the locker room with a 22-21 lead.

According to Casey, "We stalled

in the second quarter to conserve energy and keep Mel out of foul trouble. We controlled the tempo of the game all night."

In the third quarter, Reagan County showed some good rebounding and pulled ahead of the Lions. Coach Casey noted of his team, "They played with a lot of class and poise," as the Lions pulled back in the fourth quarter and tied the Owls with a little over two minutes left on the clock. Ray Fierro hit several key shots, including two Owl-killing three-pointers in a row, and teamed with high scorer Mel Martinez to take the wind out of the Owls' wings. Ozona called a time out with 14 seconds left, but was unable to put the game away.

In overtime, costly fouls by Reagan County gave the Lions a chance to pick up some easy points on free throws. Once the Owls were in a penalty situation, the free-throw shooting of the Lions put them ahead at the 1:30 mark by a score of 59-58.

Reagan County took possession

of the ball but quickly fouled, giving David Browne the opportunity to sink three of four free throws. With the score at 62-58, Reagan County again went down and scored, bringing the score to 62-60, but couldn't recover the ball and had to foul Browne again with five seconds remaining in the game. Although Browne missed the shots, the Owls were unable to get the ball downcourt, and the buzzer went off, providing a great deal of joy and relief for the Lions, their coaches and fans.

Casey said of his team, "We went to Reagan County to execute and come out with a win, and we did. I think that was a big win for us and our entire program. It really boosted the boys a lot as far as confidence goes." Casey added, "I think that is going to help us in the long run more than anyone realizes."

The coach noted that the team's defense "made things happen in the

*VIP Alert. Identifies up to 12 important callers by the sound of the ring.

*Call Tracing Service. Allows tracing of harassing, threatening, or obscene calls. By using the assigned code, the caller's number, as well as the date and time of the call, are sent automatically to GTE's Security Department in case further action is required.

*Call Waiting. Gives you a tone when a person is calling while you are on another call.

*Cancel Call Waiting. Lets you cancel the call waiting feature anytime you want to avoid call interruption.

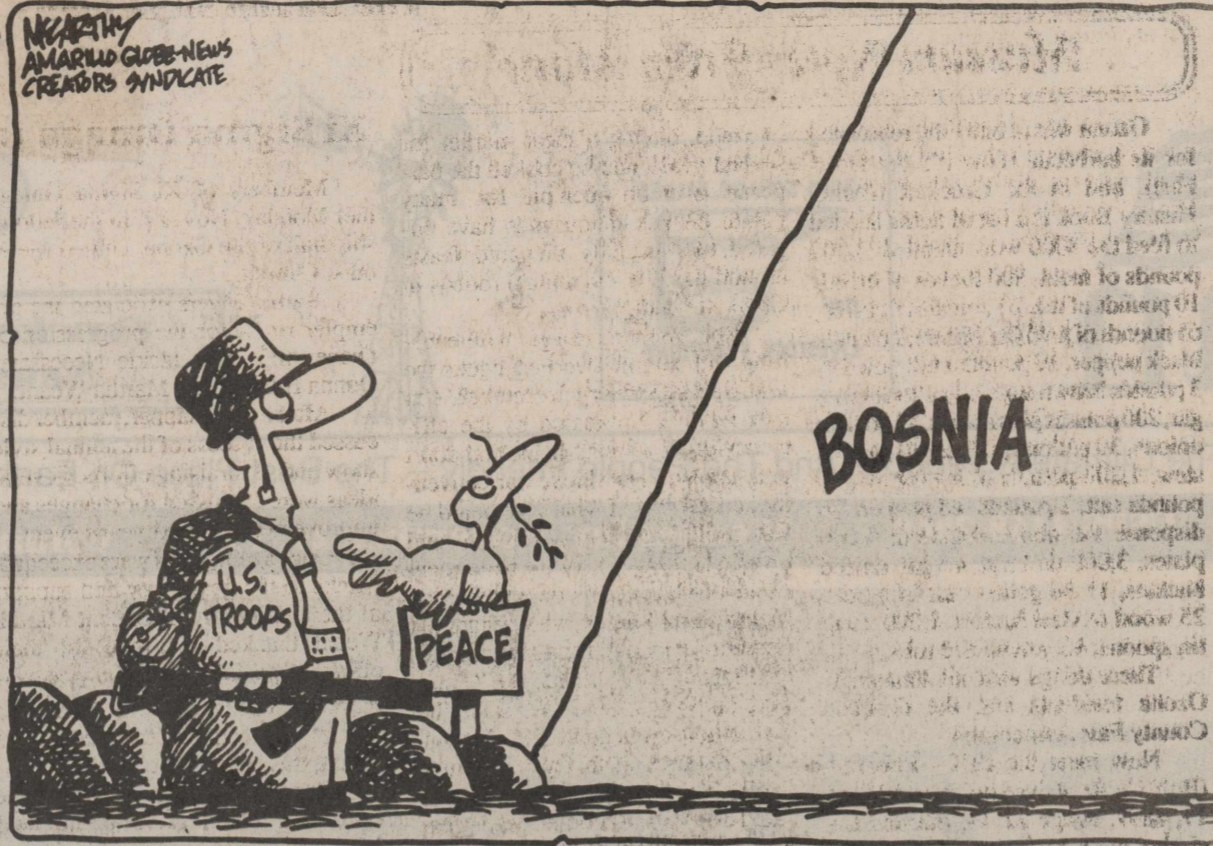
Nov. 25 Service For Mrs. Fierro

Lloyd Bentsen To Speak In San Angelo

Former U. S. Secretary of the Treasury and U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen will be the speaker for the 1996 Ralph R. Chase Lectureship in the Humanities at Angelo State University Feb. 19-20, according to Dr. Otto Tezlauff, chairman of the Humanities Lectureship Selection Committee.

The Ralph R. Chase Lectureship in the Humanities at Angelo State is sponsored by Angelo Community Health Foundation.

Bentsen will give a pair of presentations during the two-day lectureship and will also visit with students informally. Both lectures will be in the Houston Hart University Center Ballroom. Admission is free, and the lectures are open to the public.

Bentsen served as Secretary for the Department of Treasury from 1993 to 1994. Prior to his cabinet appointment he served as chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Joint Committee on Taxation. He was also a member of the Senate Commerce, Science and Transportation

Committee and the Joint Economic Committee. The native Texan was first elected to the Senate in 1970. In 1988, Senator Bentsen was the Democratic Party nominee for vice president of the United States.

Prior to his election to the Senate, Bentsen was a successful businessman in Houston for 16 years. By 1970 he had become president of Lincoln Consolidated, a financial holding institution. His business career followed several years of public service, first as county judge of Hidalgo County in South Texas and then as a member of Congress. In 1954, after three successive terms in Congress, he declined to seek reelection.

Bentsen served in the U.S. Army during World War II. He rose to the rank of Major as a B-24 pilot and Squadron Commander in Europe. Bentsen was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with three oak leaf clusters. He was promoted to Colonel in the Air Force Reserve before completing his military service.

Bentsen is married to the former Beryl Ann Longino, known as B.A., of Lufkin. The Bentsens have three grown children.

Giving The Sandwich Generation A Break

HOUSTON - Sandwiched between their children and aging parents, baby boomers sometimes find themselves overwhelmed by their caregiving responsibilities.

"Long-term care giving can be increasingly stressful if you do not pace yourself," said Dr. Nancy Warren, a psychologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Giving your all can result in social isolation, depression, anxiety and illness."

Warren suggests these strategies for "de-stressing":

- *Set limits on demands from family and others.
- *Divide household responsibilities.
- *Reach out for emotional, physical and financial help from extended family members.
- *Join a support group.
- *"Each day do something unrelated to care-giving."

Museum Notes From Mary

Ozona was at one time renowned for its barbecue (now it's the DeerFest), and in the Crockett County History Book is a list of items needed to feed the 3000 who attended: 3,400 pounds of meat, 500 loaves of bread, 10 pounds of tea, 25 pounds of coffee, 65 pounds of jowl (for beans), 2 pounds black pepper, 10 pounds chili powder, 3 pounds brown sugar, 3 gallons vinegar, 200 pounds pinto beans, 75 pounds onions, 30 gallons pickles, 50 gallons stew, 1,200 pounds of ice for tea, 75 pounds salt, 2 pounds red pepper. To dispense the above required: 4,000 plates, 3,000 tin cups, 40 galvanized buckets, 15 30-gallon cast iron pots, 25 wood or steel barrels, 4,000 small tin spoons, 42 galvanized tubs. These things were all donated by Ozona residents and the Crockett County Fair Association. Now meet the chef - Robert J. (Bob) Cooke arrived in Ozona on Sept. 17, 1897, at age 22. He married Lucinda Patrick on Christmas Day, 1898, and they had eight children. On Jan. 6, 1920, 18 months after the birth of their last child, she died. He was a butcher

by trade, having a meat market for several years, and he cooked the barbecue over an open pit for many public picnics. Thousands have enjoyed his specially prepared feasts around the July 4th annual rodeos in Crockett County. Bob would have a great time visiting with all our DeerFest cooks the first Saturday every December. I'm sure he'd be impressed by the efficiency of the serving lines, and don't you just know he'd love our convention center. From what I've heard he was truly community-minded and offered his services for the betterment of all of Ozona. His daughter, Mrs. Maurice (Tas) Black, who divides her time between Ozona and Mertzton, has fond memories of her family. "Times were hard back then," she said, "but we had love in our home." She brought some pictures in to the museum to share. The DeerFest committee is gearing up to feed a lot of hungry folks this year. Seems like the event gets larger each year, but they'll go some to catch Bob's 3,000. See you there. Mary Hillman

Make This Christmas Merry

Remembering that "less is more" can help put the "Merry" back in Christmas, says a Houston psychologist. "There is so much pressure, especially on women, during the holiday season," said Dr. Nancy Warren, director of Baylor College of Medicine's Family Transition Program. "When added to the usual job and family responsibilities, Christmas can become a daunting task." In the quest for a storybook holiday, it is easy to become overwhelmed with a long "to do" list. Warren encourages women to look at what they usually try to do and to see how it can be simplified. "Start by finding out what Christmas traditions are most important to your family," Warren said. "That way you are not creating memories that are irrelevant." It is important to be tough about priorities. Pick activities that are meaningful, not just things that "should" or "ought" to be done. "Remember that less is more — more relaxed, more enjoyable, more intimate, more time with the family," she said. Warren suggests the following ways to make Christmas less hectic: -Alternate years for favorite holiday projects; give a party one year, and do extra baking the next. -Be more relaxed about decorating; is it a home or a showpiece? -Involve the family in shopping, decorating and baking. -Shop by catalog; buy gift certificates and movie passes. -Stockpile gifts, and wrap at one time. -Designate a wrapping room, and wrap to Christmas music. -Cut corners. Buy frozen pies or slice-and-bake cookies.

Take the stress out of the holidays, Warren says, by focusing on strengths. "Give yourself credit for what you do well, and plan activities accordingly." "Warm memories are not built by keeping frantic, frazzled schedules," Warren said.

The time children are away from home will be the hardest. If they will be gone for an extended period, Warren recommends spending some special time with them before they leave.

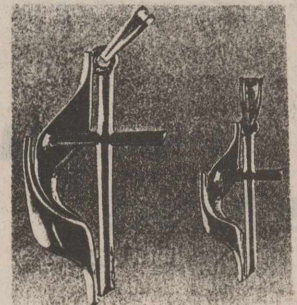

Cubs Take Two From Owls

The Ozona Seventh and Eighth Grade Cubs beat the Reagan County Owls in two games Nov. 20 in Ozona. Both of the Ozona teams are now 2-0 for the season.

The eighth grade won 41-27, and the seventh grade won 35-24. The eighth grade B team won 23-7, and the seventh grade tied with the Owls 8-8.

Concerned how the eighth grade played, Coach David Delgado said, "We didn't shoot as well as we should have, but our hustle made up for missed shots."

All of the shots the eighth grade Cubs took in the first quarter may not have gone in, but a majority of them did. Helping in the scoring department were Peter Rodriguez with nine points, Matt Castaneda scored six, and Clay Richardson, Ross Crawford, Ernie Hernandez, Miguel Rios and Ryan Bean scored two points each. Others playing in the game included Seth Webster, Matt Graner, Ty Porter and Ken Sessom.

The seventh grade Cubs beat the Reagan County Seventh Grade Owls 35-24 in an earlier game. The Cubs' season record is now 2-0.

"I though we played a great game, overall," said Coach Rick Bachman. "I felt that in this game the kids were much improved from our first game. I was real proud of the way all the kids played."

The Cubs used their enthusiastic energy as they shot well, scoring 11 points while holding the Owls to four points in the first period. They continued in their stride as they added 10 more points in the second, and the Owls added six points for a 21-10 lead for the Cubs at the half.

"Defensively, the kids did exactly

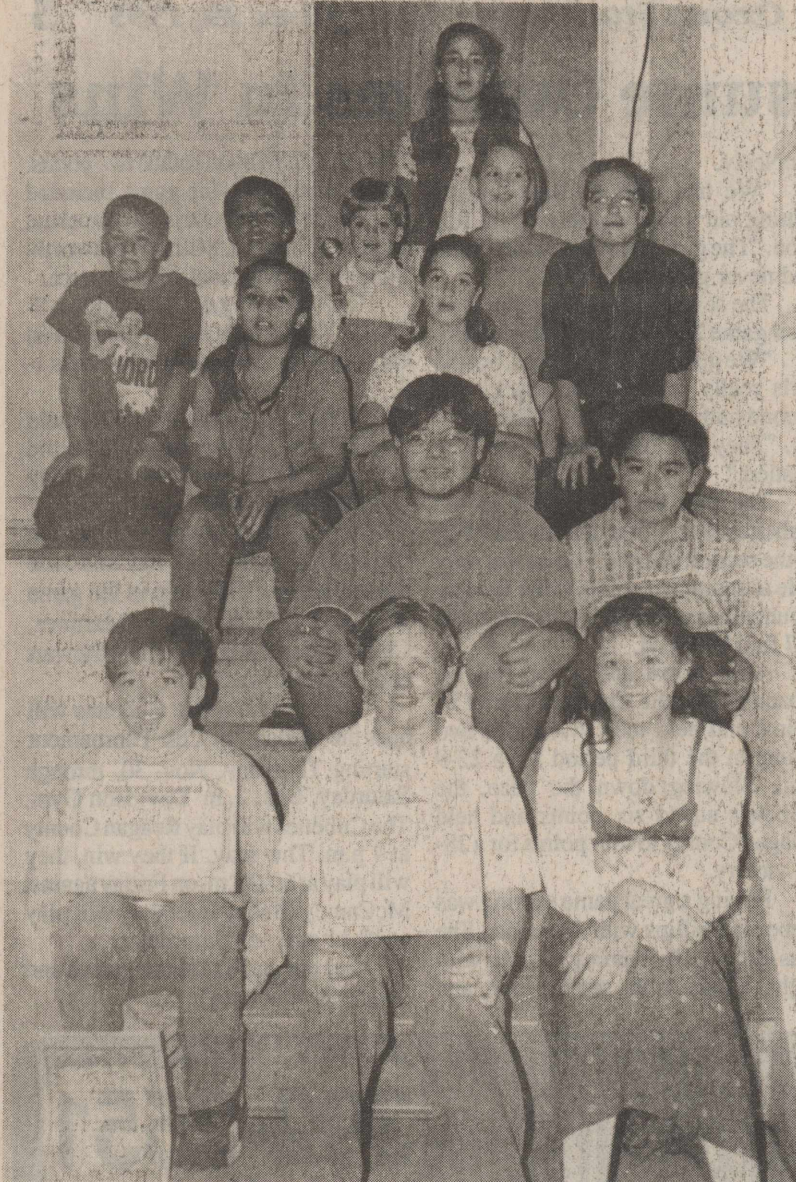

OHS Math Class Decorates Doors

Ozona High School math teacher Elinore South recently assigned her precalculus and calculus students to divide into four groups and decorate doors. Were they decorated for football season, Thanksgiving or Christmas? Well, not really.

Seventeen juniors and seniors of the two classes were asked by their teacher to pick a non-math subject and decorate a door. Sounds easy, you say to yourself.

The decorated door had to show connections between math and other subjects. That might not be so hard, either. Get a few tinsel type decorations, put a few math symbols on, and add a few numbers on, right. Actually, the main theme to the door decoration project was to point out that math is important in other areas and not just math.

Of course, there have to be guidelines and a way to determine how many points are earned for the project. The project guidelines were divided into three main parts: preparation - 30 points, design - 30 points, and connections - 30 points.

Each of those areas was broken down. Under preparation there were two main parts: 1) research which included getting copy information and a bibliography, and 2) construction which included a) a door cover, b) letters, pictures, posters and c) tape, scissors, glue, etc.

There were five things which made up design: 1) originality, 2) complexity, 3) balance, 4) color harmony, and 5) craftsmanship.

The last main part was connections. The students had to come up with 10 ways of showing the connections by graphs, applications, etc. There were three things that made up connections: 1) quantity (10), 2) variety, and 3) quality.

There were four doors chosen from the other subject areas. The four subjects were physics, band, art and economics.

For the physics door, the group decided to use a playground theme. They showed how physics formulas are related to each piece of playground equipment.

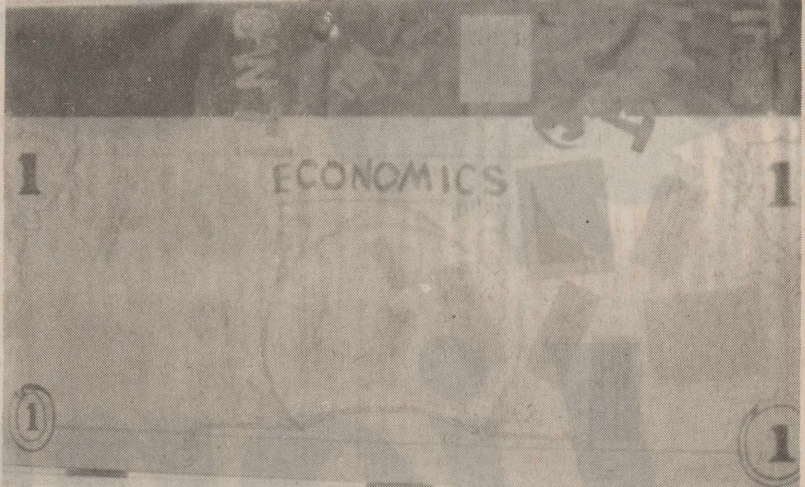
For the art door, the group had 10 applications showing perspective, similarity and other aspects of art and how they are related. A large piece of cardboard that covered the door was cut into jigsaw puzzle pieces which actually worked.

The two doors inside the band hall were decorated with a Halloween theme. In music, the group showed how math was related to waves, vibration, steps used in marching drills and note relationships.

The economics door had a large dollar bill, which was colored green.

The theme showed the different applications of economics and how math is related to them. For example, tax formulas, unemployment, gross national product and others.

Ms. South was impressed by the originality and talent shown by the groups. Each door looked good and was different from the others. The students also learned more about math.

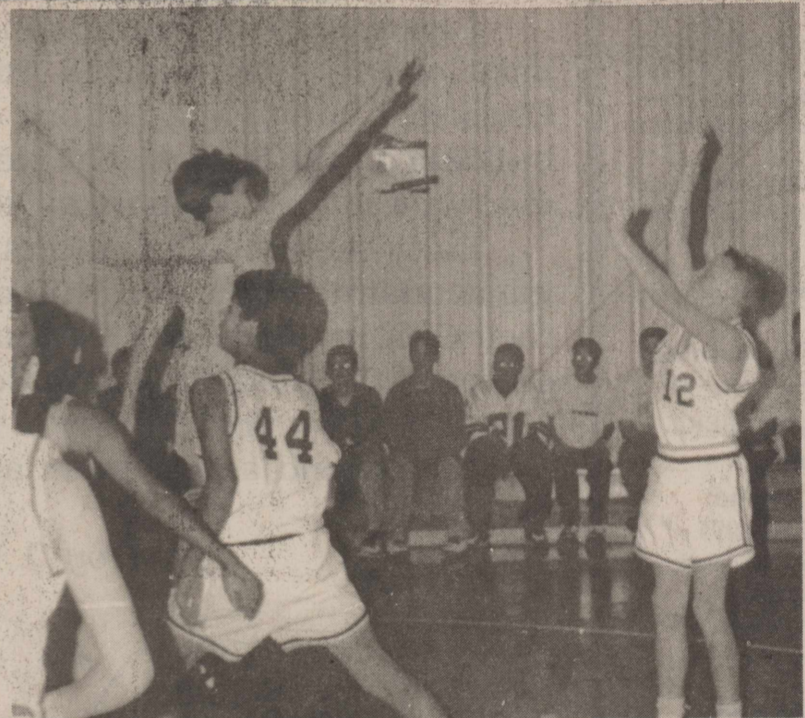
