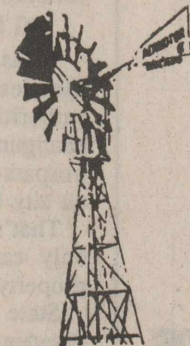
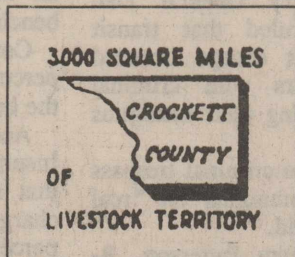
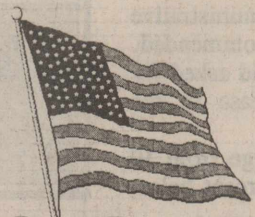

## Judge Throws Out Election Suit

Judge James Onion on Monday dismissed a petition challenging the April 9 run-off election in Crockett County.

After hearing testimony, Judge Onion found that a petition filed by Bob Rodriguez May 15 was not timely filed under the election code. The suit should have been filed within 10 days of the April 16 runoff election recount, according to Onion.

Rodriguez received the most votes in the March primary, 479, to 367 for Shane Fenton. In the run-off, Fenton won with 975 votes to Rodriguez' 902.

A. O. Fields, Democratic Party

chairman, testified Monday when questioned about a canvass of the recount requested by Rodriguez, that "I consider the recount the canvass. The (Democratic) committee was there, I was there, I gave the tally to the county and district clerk," Fields said of the recount results. "I canvassed the recount myself in the presence of the candidates."

Witness Melissa Marmolejo, step-daughter of candidate Rodriguez, testified that she had asked for the recount in the capacity of helping Rodriguez. Fields signed off on the recount in her presence and she called him later regarding when the canvass

would be. "He said he does not canvass recounts," she said.

Marmolejo stated she talked with lawyers at the Secretary of State's Office who gave her information on requesting recounts and help in writing a letter regarding the recount.

After ruling on the petition, Onion admonished "those in Austin who have time on their hands "to do something to improve election guidance. Onion said the election code is poorly written, and although it attempts to do something the election law has done before, the code makes it worse instead of better.

## Lions Lose Area Game To Bearcats

It was a day of expectations, but for the Ozona Lions it turned out to be a lesson in humility and experience. Although the Lions were outscored 10-0 by the De Leon Bearcats (19-5), experience was gained by the team members. Yet, inexperience in the playoffs hurt the Lions.

The Lions, finished their season with a 9-13 record, did very well to reach the playoffs for their first time. Last year, the Lions were defeated by the Coahoma Bulldogs in a bidistrict

game.

The Class 2A area playoff was held at Hardin-Simmons' Hunter Field in Abilene under the lights. It was the Lions fourth time to play under the lights, but Lion head baseball coach, David Delgado did not include it as a factor.

"You got to be proud of the kids for all that they accomplished and to have gotten this far," said Delgado. "We had a good year all year, and I really don't think this game is an indicator of how good our team was this year. The players should be proud of how well they did this year; they had an excellent season."

De Leon struck first in the second inning on a two-RBI single by first baseman Dusty Otwell. The Bearcats led on two walks, one hit and an error.

Ozona appeared nervous as they swung freely at the Bearcats' starting pitcher Courtney Golden.

"We were frustrated, getting out early. This pitcher kept us off balance all night," said a tired Coach Delgado. "His fast ball/curve ball combo

worked on us."

In the third inning, the two run deficit became three when Otwell was hit by Ozona pitcher Pete Castaneda. He stole second and advanced to third on a fielder's choice. He scored on a sacrifice by Chris Richards.

No turning back by the Bearcats, they added three more runs in the fourth inning. They had two walks and two hits to run up the score to 6-0.

They added another run on three hits and a walk in the fifth inning to make the score 7-0.

"De Leon showed up and we didn't. We were definitely nervous," said Ozona's only senior Lance Jamerson.

"We dug ourselves in a hole--usually we have a little spark. We just got down and never could get back up."

The Bearcats finished the Lions off in the sixth inning, getting three runs on three hits and two walks to make the final score and the game end after six innings--10-0.

Ozona managed only six hits, all singles. Lance Jamerson was 2-for-3,

Mason will run as an independent challenging incumbent Orlando De Hoyos who will be on the ballot as a Democrat.

The service, a project of the Crockett County Historical Society with assistance from Sharon Farmer of Ozona Chamber of Commerce, opened with a welcome by Camille Jones, president of the society.

Raising of the Flag by Marine reservist Sgt. Frank Tambunga and his nephew, Boy Scout Johnny Tambunga, was followed by the reading of the names of those killed in action.

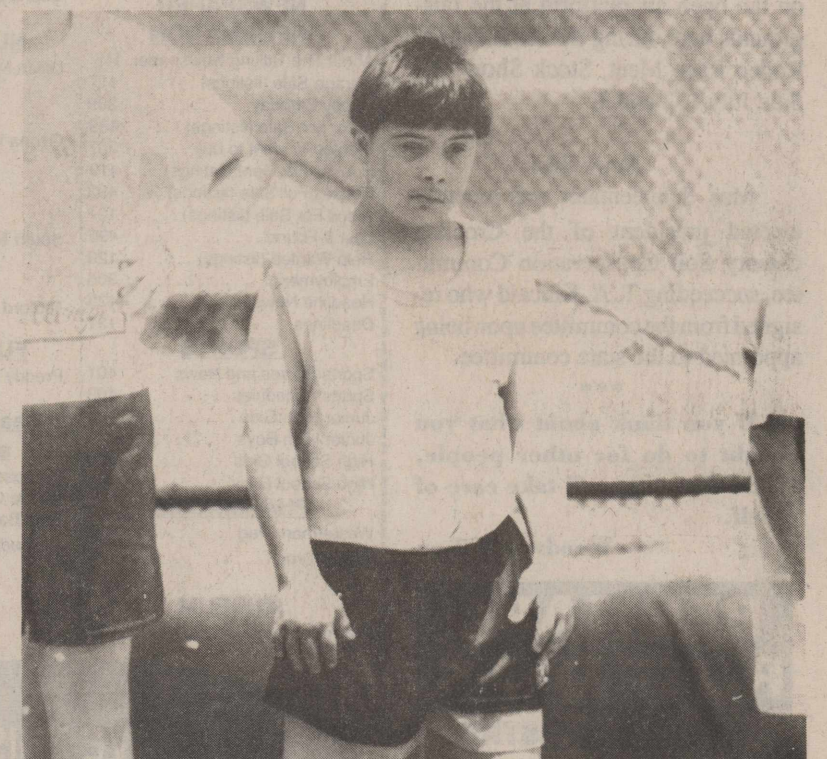
He started Wednesday with the softball throw for distance preliminaries, throwing the ball 6.83 meters. This was used to heat the finals for Friday morning.

**AUSTIN** — Gov. George W. Bush has sworn in the 16-member Citizens' Committee on Property Tax Relief, the first step in a plan to study how \$10 billion a year in property taxes might be replaced.

Bush said the committee's job will be to determine "whether the people are hot enough about property taxes to replace them" — or support an overhaul of the state tax code. Texas businesses and homeowners, whose plea for tax reform is growing louder, presently shoulder more than 90 percent of the property tax burden.

Committee members were furnished with state figures showing that Texans are paying a continually rising property tax even though property values are increasing.

The committee will be taking public testimony on other ways to fund state government at 14 hearings to be held across the state. The panel is to report back to the governor by the end of September.

Bush said he would not support any plan that raised more or less money than the property taxes, and he reiterated his insistence that a state income tax is not an option.

So far, three options under consideration are:

- Expanding the 6.25 percent state sales tax to include items not presently taxed;
- A business activity tax; and
- A gross receipts tax on all business and investment income.

**AG Issues Handgun Ruling**

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales has ruled that transit authorities can't charge licensed handgun carriers with criminal trespass for taking their handguns on city buses.

That's because criminal trespass only can be committed on "real property," he said.

State Sen. Jerry Patterson, R-Pasadena, told the *Houston Chronicle*, "We knew these restrictions (by transit authorities) were unenforceable from the beginning and the attorney general agrees."

"Concealed handgun license holders may ride the bus without fear of retribution if their weapon remains concealed," said Patterson, a co-sponsor of the right-to-carry bill that became law last September.

But Morales spokesman Ward Tisdale said it still is within transit authorities' rights to ban handguns. "This new ruling says handgun carriers don't necessarily commit criminal trespass, but it doesn't say they didn't commit another offense."

**Morales Warns Republic**

Meanwhile, Morales has warned the Republic of Texas movement that if they break state laws, they will be prosecuted.

"My office cannot and will not condone deliberate and willful violations of state and federal law," Morales said in a letter "I am duty-bound to enforce the law of the land and can make no exceptions for those who profess political or philosophical disagreements with our government."

The attorney general's staff mailed the letter to 55 people believed to be associated with the right-wing organization, which denies the legal legitimacy of the government of Texas.

**Bomer Sets Insurance Hike**

Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer last week ordered a 3.2 percent average statewide increase of the automobile benchmark rate, to go into effect in August. The increase is about half of

what a panel of administrative law judges had recommended. Insurance companies had asked for an 11.3 percent increase in the benchmark rate.

Companies may charge from 30 percent above to 30 percent below the benchmark rate.

According to the Department of Insurance, 68 of 229 companies that sell auto insurance in Texas charge between 21 percent and 30 percent above the benchmark, so it pays to shop around.

Lyndon Anderson, an associate insurance commissioner, said, "With more than 200 car insurers offering a wide range of rates, consumers should shop around for the best deal."

**GTech Contract Extended**

GTech Corp. has been awarded a five-year contract extension to operate the Texas Lottery, the maximum extension allowed under the corporation's current contract with the Texas Lottery Commission.

Under the contract extension, GTech agreed to reduce its sales commission from 3.944 cents per \$1 ticket down to an average of 3.4 cents over the term of the contract, and to install 6,000 new on-line lotto terminals in retail stores across Texas.

The lottery has had ticket sales of more than \$8.3 billion in its first three years.

**Other Capital Highlights**

■ The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals has ruled that trial judges, on rare occasions, can decide that juries have made a wrong decision about the facts and can overrule their decisions. To that effect, last week, the court sent 11 cases back to lower courts to review questions of fact raised by convicted criminals.

■ A report by the Texas Criminal Justice Policy Council says 37 percent of people given probation for crimes in 1991, then tracked by the state for three years, ended up sentenced to prison. The study tracked 3,772 people sentenced to community corrections. Those convicted of drug and property offenses had the highest rate of repeat criminal behavior.

**Ozona Teens Ready For 4-H Roundup**

A number of teens from Crockett County are participating in the wide variety of activities available during Texas 4-H Roundup this week, June 3-7, on the Texas A&M University campus at College Station. Teens age 14 and older were eligible to compete at district in April and May to advance to state contests. Additional activities such as scholarship presentations and an intensive youth leadership seminar round out the week.

For the first time, two brothers from Crockett County shared the huge stage at Rudder Auditorium on scholarship night. The Texas 4-H Foundation gives approximately 100 scholarships annually, ranging from \$500 to \$15,000. Casey Upham was one of the 4-H'ers selected from the more than 300 who applied this year, and he received a scholarship on Tuesday evening, following his final interview on Monday. At presstime, the donor and amount of the scholarship were still unavailable.

4-H scholarships are awarded on the basis of an outstanding 4-H career in which leadership and citizenship are most important, the applicant's high school academic achievement and financial need.

Chad Upham, who currently attends Texas A&M on a \$10,000 Houston Livestock Show 4-H Foundation Scholarship, received a \$1,000 4-H Collegiate Scholarship from the 4-H Volunteer Leaders Association of Texas.

Since 1988, 4-H members from Crockett County have received almost \$100,000 in 4-H Foundation Scholarships alone, and well over that sum in related scholarships earned because of their outstanding 4-H leadership, citizenship and project work as well as academics and community involvement.

Today, Wednesday, judging contests and other activities got underway, with the wool and mohair judging team of Casey Upham, Tara Wilkins, Amy Laughlin and Mark Childress competing for the state title and the opportunity to judge at the national contest in Sonora. They are coached by Donnie Laughlin.

Jason Hignight advanced to the formal buying division of the Texas 4-H Fashion Show on Wednesday. He will also compete on Thursday with partner Charles Villarreal in a consumer life skills illustrated talk on water conservation in the home. The presentation grew out of the pair's experiences at Texas 4-H Water Camp

last summer. Amanda Hignight will also present a talk in the dairy competition on economic opportunities for dairies in West Texas.

Meanwhile, Leana Baggett began her advanced leadership training in the TOTAL program on Wednesday. TOTAL stands for "Teens of Texas Acquiring Leadership", and is an intensive one and one-half day leadership seminar developed by the Texas 4-H Council several years ago. It is coordinated by the Texas A&M University Department of Ag Education at the State 4-H Council.

Ozona's own JoLynn Vannoy came up with the name and acronym for the program, and as a State Council member, helped develop plans for the first TOTAL seminar. The program was designed to expand 4-H leadership opportunities for Texas youth and adults and to involve 4-H youth in an educational activity as part of the State 4-H Roundup experience.

Participants are on a district-selected team of four youth and one adult leader, and cannot compete in Roundup contests while undergoing the TOTAL program because of the time required. However, they do attend all assemblies and recreational events, stay in the dorms, and are recognized on stage Thursday evening.

Roundup week is a unique experience, as the crowd of more than 2,000 excited 4-H members, leaders and agents enjoy exploring the A&M campus, meet new and old friends from around the state, and experience the pride of being an outstanding member in the world's largest youth organization. Last year, the group had the special experience of being featured on "CBS This Morning" singing "Oh, What a Beautiful Morning".

The Crockett County 4-H team was accompanied by adult leaders Donnie Laughlin, Neal Ulmer, Elizabeth Upham and Randy Upham, as well as county Extension Agents Tedra Ulmer and Miles Dabovich.

"We are proud to have these young people representing our county, and we appreciate their parents and leaders for the time and effort they have put in to help them reach their goals," said the agents, urging 4-H members and parents to begin thinking now about next year's Roundup.

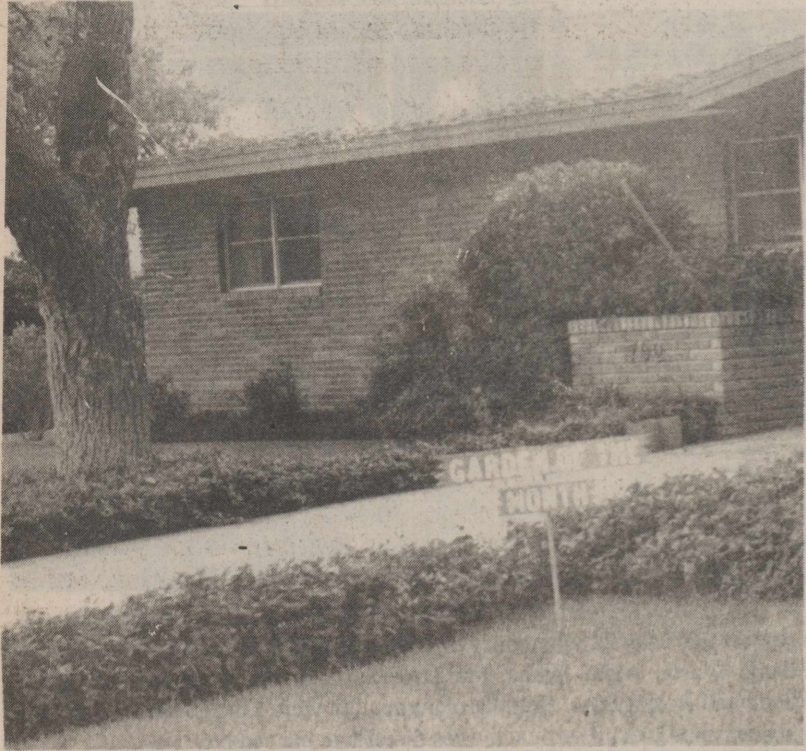

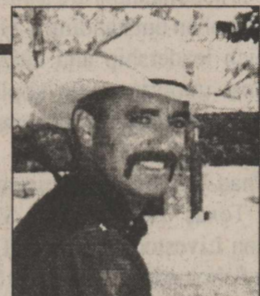

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## Museum Notes From Mary

Goats are everywhere in Crockett County. I understand that they're the least finicky eaters around and will devour just about anything as far as grass, weeds, prickly pear and tree leaves go. I've seen them eat the other cactus, too, and then walk around with stickers in their tongue. They don't impress me as being the smartest animals we have, but they add a lot to our county in terms of mohair production and rodeos. The mohair comes from Angora goats and the rodeo is the famous World Championship Goat Roping with Spanish goats, which is due to take place the weekend of June 20, 21, and 22. This year there will be a new event added called "The World's Most Beautiful Nanny" contest where goats will be all dressed up in their finery. The winner is scheduled to get a big smooch from our county judge, Jeffrey Sutton. The cook-off will take place Saturday, June 22. This is the fourth annual event and the caps and tee-shirts proclaiming the fun fest are popular items.

Spanish goats are also good for barbecue, called "cabrito" by those in the know. I haven't yet fixed goat meat that tasted good, but I know some who do.

Angora goats came in 1849 from the Himalaya Mountains in Asia. Being used to the rugged areas, they fit in around Texas very well. They produce the long, silky hair that is used to make mohair, which brings in over \$2.5 million annually to Crockett County in mohair production alone. This establishes Crockett County as third highest producer of mohair in

Texas. Another fact - Texas leads in the national production, and the United States is second only to South Africa in world production.

Angoras are sheared twice a year, in spring and in fall, and one animal can yield from 6 to 12 pounds of that soft, silky hair a year. Mohair is graded into quality levels which determine the desirability and price, the finer the mohair the more money the producer receives. The grades are super kid-the finest, kid, yearling, fine adult and adult-the coarsest. Mohair has four characteristics that buyers look for: fineness, white bright lustre, long staple length, and freedom from vegetable matter or any other foreign substances.

The Mohair Council of America suggests that when you purchase mohair, look for the logo with the Angora goat, or check the contents label on the item. The word "Angora" on the label means the item has rabbit fur from the angora rabbit in it. Look for the word "mohair" on the label. Mohair is used for clothing for both men and women, blankets, carpet, curtains, upholstery, wigs, and even paint rollers.

I looked in my dictionary for a definition of goat and found horned, bearded mammal originally of mountainous regions and widely domesticated." Our Creator sure showed His sense of when He made these little sure-footed creatures, who have a personality all their own. They're funny, free-spirited and a little stubborn. Hmmm, I know some humans like that!

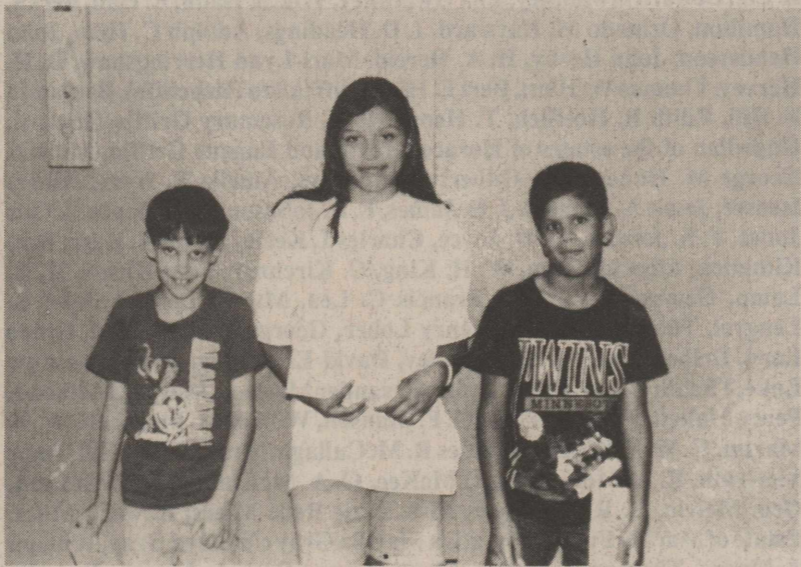
