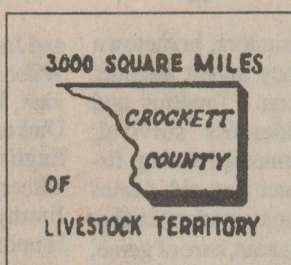

Health Board Interviews Physician's Assistant

Members of the Crockett County Hospital and Care Center Board met June 6 at which time they interviewed a prospective physician's assistant for the rural health clinic. Joyce Duncan of Shannon Clinics introduced Robert Schreier who is currently working as a PA in West Texas.

Peggy McWilliams, clinic direc-

tor, asked the board to develop a list of items on hand to be used for the EMS and care center so she can fill in the replacements with Shannon.

The board decided to keep the following: IV poles, suction machines, automatic blood pressure machine, ice machines, televisions, wheel chairs, four or five metal clothes lockers, one gooseneck floor lamp for examinations, breathing treatment trays and all of the items in central supply except what Shannon needs for clinic start-up. The emergency room and the extra crash cart with monitor will be left for Shannon. All of this is with the understanding that Shannon may use any of these until they are able to find replacement items.

According to contract, maintenance, housekeeping and utilities on the entire building are the responsibility of Crockett County.

Life safety code compliance for the new care center wing is being held up until the grab bars, overhead lights and wall covering can be completed. It will be necessary to get architect Jack Meek back to see that the fire code for

the care center and the clinic are both compatible and within the code limitations.

A discussion was held on the intended use of the Care-A-Van. The board re-emphasized the policy that it is to be used only for transporting patients to the out-of-town doctors and for activities organized and sponsored by the care center and shall be driven only by an appropriately licensed driver.

Administrator Virginia Box reported that she had attended a recent meeting in which it was apparent that care centers would have to fight for a share of the managed health care money from the state.

The board went into executive session at 9:10 and emerged at 9:27.

At this time they voted to recommend to the commissioner's court that the salary of Virginia Box be raised to \$40,000. When she was hired she was promised a review and evaluation in six months. The board believes that Mrs. Box "has spent many long hours in keeping us in compliance with all legalities during this difficult time of transition and we feel she is entitled to this. This figure is in line with other care centers in our area."

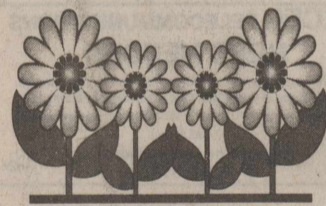
The board will meet June 20 with members of the commissioners court to tour the care center and evaluate its future needs.

Court Approves Drug And Alcohol Policy

The need for a barrier behind the not yet built courthouse annex was discussed again at Monday's meeting

of commissioners. Court members believe a wall needs to be placed atop the rock cut to prevent autos or people from falling off the ledge and/or into the top of the new annex.

Judge Jeffrey Sutton, Commissioner Frank Tambunga and Eddie Moore, roads and parks superintendent, have talked with landowner A. B. Morris about possible solutions. The court voted Monday to offer to buy the property needed to build a rock wall.

Commissioners approved a drug and alcohol policy for the county. Scope of the policy is outlined as follows:

"This policy applies to all employees of Crockett County Texas while on the job and situations where an employee's off-the-job or off-prem-

ises conduct impairs work performance or undermines the public confidence in, or harms the reputation of Crockett County Texas. It is also intended to apply to employees of firms doing business with Crockett County Texas while on our premises

"Although Crockett County Texas has no intention of intruding into the private lives of its employees, we recognize that involvement with alcohol or other drugs off the job eventually takes its toll on job performance. Our concern is to assure that employees report to work in condition to perform their duties safely and efficiently in the interest of their fellow workers and citizens as well as themselves."

The policy outlines responsibilities of the county and the employees,

policy implementation and condition of employment. Procedures for providing a safe, drug and alcohol-free working environment are also stated. Two orientation sessions have been held for employees.

Miles Dabovich, county Extension agent, reviewed new rules with the court for use of the 4-H/FFA feeding barn, horse barn and arena. Commissioners voted to approve the rules as presented. They are printed elsewhere in this issue of The Stockman.

Approval was given on a bid with change orders received by Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1 for the grant project to improve water service to an area

Reports received here indicate that Bobbie's leukemia is in remission. She is to have about seven more weeks of treatment in Memphis before returning to Texas.

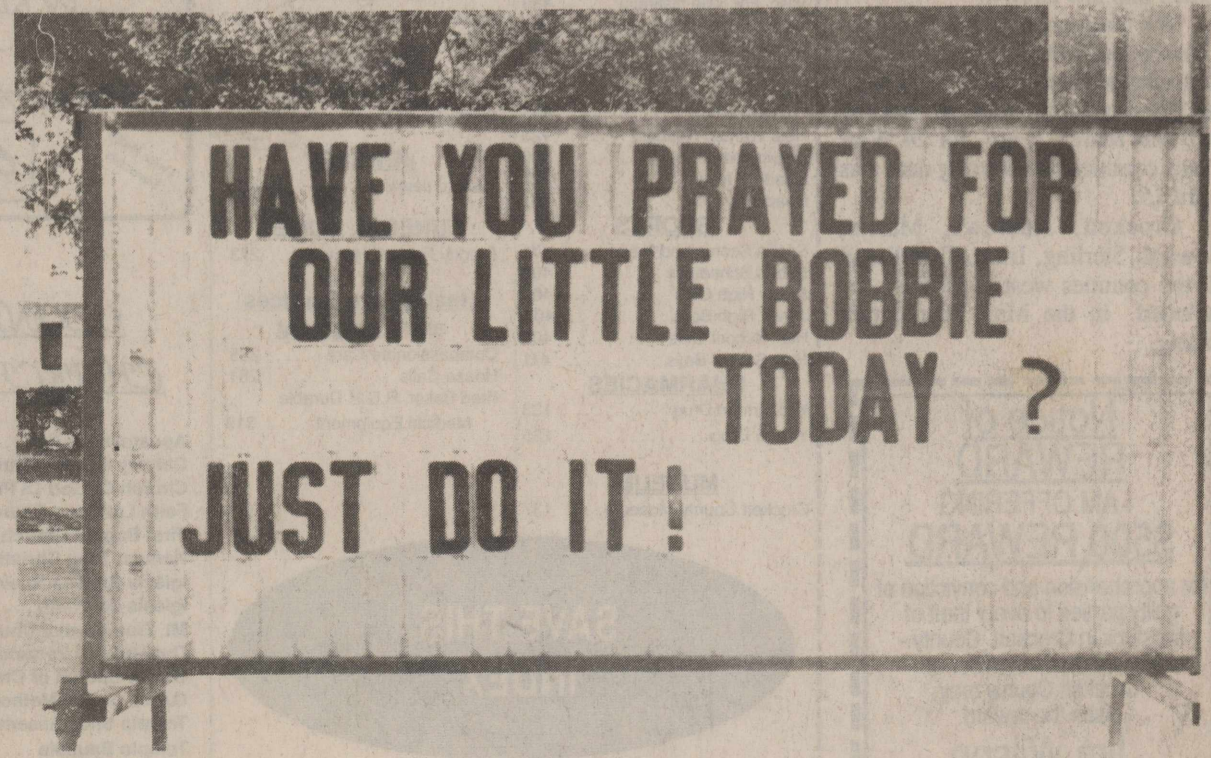

Emergency Feed Program Ends

The Emergency Feed Program for Crockett County was not extended, says Laurie Hale of the Crockett County Farm Service Agency. The program ended on May 31, and producers have until June 14 to turn in head count changes, feed receipts and feed on hand.

"You should have received through the mail a letter and form to fill out with the required information; if not, they are available in the office," said Mrs. Hale.

"It will take congressional action to extend the feed program for Crockett County. To date, this office has not heard if anything will happen. As soon as we know something, we will contact producers. If you have questions, call or come by the FSA office at 201 11th Street."

Crockett is one of 24 counties whose feed assistance programs were cancelled when the new farm bill was signed into law April 4.

The program is extended to Aug. 31 for counties which had started their 1996 crop year prior to the bill's signing. For most of the state, the starting date was March 1, but for 24 West Texas counties, the starting date was April 15.

Crockett, Andrews, Martin, Howard, Sterling, Irion, Terrell and all the counties west to El Paso are included in the May 31 program ending.

Hunter Education Camp A Huge Success

The ninth annual West Texas Hunter Education Camp was held on the Gene Perry Ranch of Crockett County on June 7, 8 and 9, 1996. Five girls and 17 boys ages 12-16 were successfully certified for hunter safety as per the mandatory hunter education law implemented on June 1, 1988.

During the 3-day weekend, students were instructed in firearms and ammunition, handling firearms safely in the field, wildlife management and identification, marksmanship and field dressing of big game, hunter ethics, wilderness survival, game laws, private ownership of firearms, poisonous snakes, archery, blackpowder and muzzleloading, and hunter first-aid. Students also had hands-on training on the firing range by shooting .22 rifles, .243 rifles, 20 gauge shotguns, several different calibers of pistols, and blackpowder firearms. Students took their new-found knowledge to the field on Sunday and trekked through a shoot-don't-shoot walk-through, and tracked wounded game on a simulated blood trail.

Students certified and their hometowns include: Clayton Dees, Brenham; Justin Routh, Sean Fields and James Elliott of Sonora; Leta Bange-man, Juan Garcia, Cody Webb, Brad Sullivan, Jared Shaffer, Terry Joe Davis, Jed Roane, Jason Puckett, Steven Moreno and Wesley Bishop of Ozona; K. Brent Speed, Midland; Michael Beavers, Adrian Arellano, Melissa Beavers and Kristin Milliom of Burnet; and Brandon Logan, Candice Humphrey and Minica Haire of San Angelo.

Jason and Michelle Montgomery of Leander brought the youngsters from Burnet and assisted around camp. Michelle was also recruited as a student and was certified with hunter education. Others assisting with general chores around the camp were Rusty Bishop and Jonathan Hill, both of Ozona.

This type of camp is successfully completed only with the assistance of

many people. Instructors, hometown and the courses they taught include: Dee Keilers, Ozona - firearms and ammunition, wilderness survival, blackpowder and muzzleloading, firing range and hunter first aid; James Montgomery, Ozona - marksmanship and big game vital areas, care of game, field dressing big game, archery, firing range, and walk-through and tracking wounded game; Dorris Haire, San Angelo - registration of students, making sure camp ran on schedule, firing range master, conducted test, and prepared paperwork for camp; Doug Meador, Ozona - poisonous snakes' identification and demonstration; Mary Humphrey, Sonora - wildlife management and identification, firing range and general paperwork for camp; Dude Speed, Midland - firing range, hunter first aid, private ownership of firearms and sergeant-at-arms; Bob Harris, Ozona - firing range and walk-through and tracking wounded game; Jerry Byrnes, Ozona - firing range and hunter first aid; Ed and Will Collett and John Thompson of Ozona - firing range.

New Crockett County Game Warden Joe Guidry was immediately recruited to instruct hunter ethics, game laws, firearms responsibility and hunter first aid. He also assisted on the firing range. Many thanks to Lieutenant Game Warden Jerry Peiser from San Angelo and Sergeant Game Warden Alan Masloff from Del Rio for their assistance on the firing range and in teaching game laws to the students.

Rev. Bill Fuller of Ozona gave a beautiful evening devotional on Saturday, and had the camp participants "picking and grinning" with camp sing-alongs. Thanks also to Laurie English from Ozona for assisting with the sing-alongs with her beautiful voice.

Once again Harvey Hill, Virginia Gotcher, Ky Montgomery and Lisa Benson of Ozona prepared food for all camp meals, a tremendous and delicious undertaking.

Last week eight 4-H'ers participated at the Texas 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University in events such as wool judging, fashion show, method demonstrations and TOTAL leadership program. The highlight was the \$10,000 scholarship presented to Casey Upham from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. 4-H'ers from across the state received more than \$751,000 in Texas 4-H Foundation Scholarships.

Members attending 4-H Roundup were Amy Laughlin, Casey Upham, Tara Wilkins, Mark Childress, Leana Baggett, Jason Hignight, Charles Villarreal and Amanda Hignight. All 4-H'ers participating seem to have had a good time. The wool judging team even got a lesson in bowling from their Ag Agent Miles Dabovich and Wool Judging Coach Donnie Laughlin. We "spanked" them! All in all, I think everyone enjoyed Roundup.

Also, over the past weekend, 18 4-H Horse Project participants from three different counties participated in an Aggie Horsemanship School sponsored by the Extension Office and the Texas A&M Equine Science Department. Participants learned numerous horsemanship skills and the im-

portance of using these skills when riding horses. The instructors were two students from Texas A&M. Special thanks to Kay Stewart and Lucy Humphrey for all their help with this project.

The rest of June doesn't seem to offer much slack for Crockett County 4-H activities, as it looks like there will be many things going on. This week, 4-H'ers will be participating in local Horse Project Play Day activities along with wool judging and range judging contests in Sonora. The week of June 17, 15 4-H'ers from Crockett County will be participating at the District VI 4-H Horse Show to be held in Fort Stockton. Members will participate in judged events, along with roping and team penning.

Along with the District Horse Show comes the World Championship Goat Roping, which begins on June 20. Remember, with the current drought conditions, producers won't keep their lambs forever. It may be a good time to start thinking about your lamb project now.

Along with all these activities, 4-H'ers will be attending various camps

and preparing their record books for judging in July.

Remember, everyone age 9 (or in 3rd grade) to 19 is invited and encouraged to join 4-H in Crockett County. It is more than you ever imagined.

"A little slice of life" would be a good term to use for Texas 4-H Roundup each June, as over 3,000 4-H members, leaders and agents travel to College Station and the Texas A&M campus for a variety of activities and contests.

This year, eight lucky members from Crockett County had the opportunity to compete and learn from their peers and others at the 50th Annual Texas 4-H Roundup from June 3-7. The term "Roundup" is often confusing to non-4-H'ers, but it simply describes the huge variety of what goes on during the week. Judging contests, method demonstrations, rifle matches, public speaking, skits, assemblies, fashion show, food show, a leadership seminar, daily 4-H rallies, meeting new friends and learning about life on a major college campus characterize the week.

Rev. Jim Carter continues as the pastor of the Ozona United Methodist

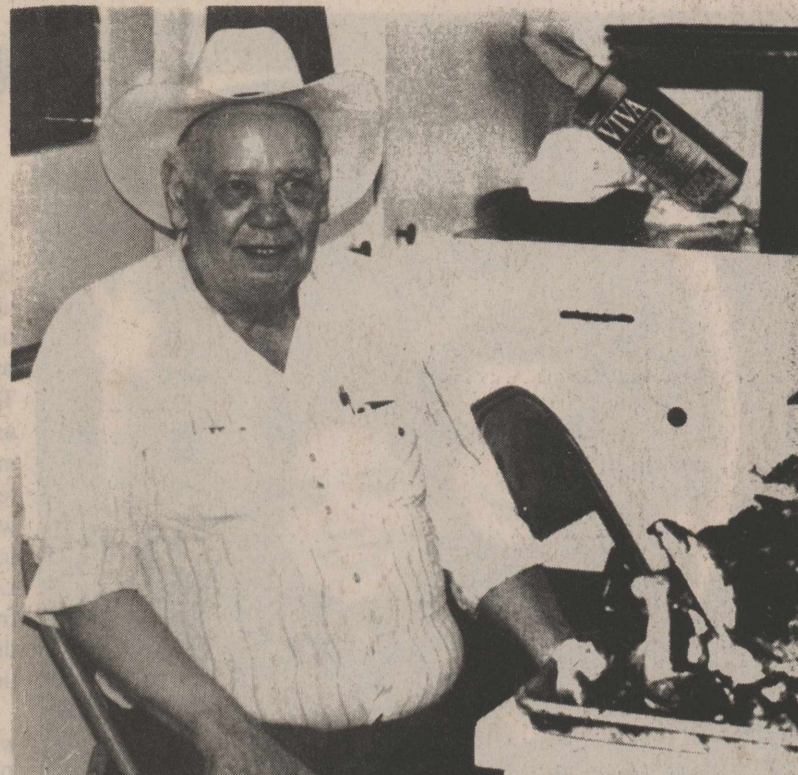
Church.

School children classified as "at risk" are inevitably the kids without dad at home. These youngsters are more prone to drugs, promiscuity and violence.

south of the interstate. West Oaks of Houston is the successful bidder. The water district will contribute \$65,260.80 to the project, up from its original commitment of \$38,000.00. The county will repave the 4.13 miles of streets which will be damaged by the project at an estimated cost \$60,000.00. Grant monies will provide \$604,299.00 of the project's cost. Commissioners also, in a related item, approved the transfer of a property title from Catarino Cervantez Jr. to the water district. The land involved will be the location for a pump station to pump water up a hill.

His appointment to the Concho Valley Council of Government solid waste advisory committee was also approved at this meeting. Commissioner Fred Deaton has represented the county in this capacity for two years.

No action was taken on an agenda item to approve \$600 for summer help for the county attorney's office because this item was already included in the year's budget.

Expenditure of \$3346.00 for repairs to the jail was approved. The project will involve some new carpeting and scraping, plastering and painting some of the walls.

Monthly reports were given by: John Stokes, auditor; Garland Young, civic and youth center director; Janet McDaniel for Helping Hands; Eddie Moore, roads and parks superintendent; Zoe Green for the hospital and care center, and Louise Ledoux for the library.

Young told the court that the all-night graduation party was "a tremendous success". There were 215 youngsters in attendance, including 44 of the 46 graduating seniors.

The Helping Hands report for May showed that there were 1305 meals served that month.

Heavy rains in parts of the county pushed the road department's schedule back by seven or eight days according to Moore. During his report Moore told commissioners that vandalism continues at the east park near the arena. Restrooms are targets for

destruction, and the corners have been broken off a four inch thick concrete bench. He recommended a specific closing time.

Commissioners agreed to make a formal request to the sheriff's department to try to stop the park vandalism.

Mrs. Ledoux announced that the library is now connected to Internet through the Concho Valley Council of Governments' job training center. The library pays an access fee for the service.

4-H'sers Enjoy Fun In Sun On Horseback

A total of 17 4-H'sers from three counties participated in an annual two-day 4-H horsemanship school sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Crockett County 4-H Horse Club.

The event was held at the arena at the Crockett County Fairgrounds on June 7-8. On both days, instruction was from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. by two horse program assistants from Texas A & M University in College Station.

Attending the school from Ozona were: Lana Stewart, Jake Stewart, Clay Hale, Trey Hale, Marie Pierce, Laura Pierce, Stephen Humphreys, Hayse Worthington and Zane Coates. Attending from Big Lake were Jess F. Mullan, Luke McMullan, Jed V. Athery, John Weatherby, Jamie Morrow, Ryan Long and Jamie Lee. Also attending was Cheryl Strauch from Sonora.

Instructing the 4-H'sers were Sara Hayes from Richwood and Angela Smith from Kingsville. Both horse program assistants attend Texas A & M, where Hayes is a sophomore majoring in animal science, and Smith is a junior majoring in agricultural development.

"I liked Ozona and loved working with these kids—they are definitely a rowdy group," said Hayes, a former 4-H'er herself with nine years under her belt. "This is a great program, fun, and a good way to meet new people by being in this summer work program."

"The kids are wonderful," said Smith, a four-year former Future Farmer of America and past chapter president. "I was teaching kids back home and I want to give these kids a positive influence through teaching them proper horsemanship skills."

Both of the program assistants got a treat as one of Ozona's 4-H'sers, Hayse Worthington, put on a goat roping exhibition. "I've never seen goat roping and saw it here for the first time," instructor Hayes said.

Smith chimed in later as she was putting up her horse. "I heard about goat roping, but had never seen one roped. I saw my first one roped by Hayse Worthington."

4-H'sers not only got to ride their horses, but they learned about them and the equipment as well. Safety was extremely important, along with functional horsemanship.

Topics in the school included the types of bits to use and how they work, teaching a horse to respond to bit pressure, correct use of body, leg and rein aids, and advanced maneuvers including individual problems and solutions.

Other training maneuvers taught to the 4-H'sers were suppling exercises—achieving lateral and vertical flexion, leads, circles, backing, teaching the

horse to respond to direction, gait transitions and stopping. Hopefully the students absorbed how to develop turn-arounds, spins, and lead changes, according to their instructors.

"How to identify a lead—is what I've hoped to have taught them," said Smith.

The youngsters were also instructed on showmanship at halter with special emphasis on safety from

the ground, how to show a horse, ground training for leading and turning around.

Some in-depth instruction was given on specialized events. Events covered included Western pleasure, Western horsemanship, Western riding, reining, barrel racing, pole bending, hunter under saddle and hunter horsemanship.

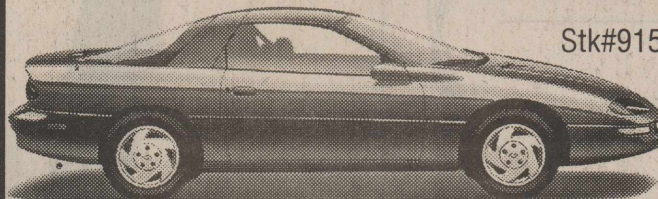
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Commissioners Approve New Rules For 4-H/FFA Feeding Barn, Horse Barn and Arena

At a meeting of commissioners' court on June 10, a set of rules for use of the 4-H/FFA feeding barn, horse barn and the arena was presented by Miles Dabovich, Extension Agent.

Commissioners voted to accept the proposed rules.

The rules, as submitted by Mr. Dabovich, follow.

As stated, stalls will be emptied by August 1 and all stalls repaired, cleaned, numbered and locked. Reservations for stalls in the horse barn will not be taken until all work is finished in the fall. Reservations in the 4-H/FFA feeding barn (for horse stalls) will not be taken until after April 1, 1997, and will only be allowed until Aug. 1 of each year. After that time, all stalls in the 4-H/FFA feeding barn must be turned back over to 4-H and FFA for feeding projects until the next April.

Set date when horses must be out of stalls so 4H/FFA livestock can be put in barn each year (Aug. 1). At that date in 1996, put new rules into effect. At that time, all stalls will be cleaned, repaired, numbered and locked. The Extension Office will be in charge of these stalls. These stalls will be offered free of charge to 4-H and FFA students. Barn will be reserved for 4-H/FFA livestock from Aug. 1 through April 1 of each year. Youth livestock feeding takes precedence over all other uses. If youth livestock use increases, dates may change for stall-use for horses.

Between April 1 and Aug. 1, these stalls will be used for horses. There will be no monthly charge for 4Hers to stall a horse during this period, but they must pay a \$100 deposit for the stall. This deposit will be returned when the stall is released, if it is clean and no repairs are needed. They will be limited to one horse per child. Child must be enrolled in Crockett County 4-H Club or be a member of high school rodeo team. First priority will be given to youth,

then to adults wishing to rent stalls. There will only be one horse allowed per stall.

All adults wishing to stall a horse during this time period must pay a \$300 deposit per stall and a \$20 monthly fee to go toward upkeep of the facility. There will be no exceptions. If a stall is released and it is clean and no repairs are needed, the \$300 deposit will be returned. These stalls will be reserved on a first-come, first-served basis; however, priority will be given to 4H horse project participants and high school rodeo team members. This rule will go into effect on Aug. 1, 1996. There will be only one horse allowed per stall. All stalls will be reserved through the Extension Office. Deposit must be paid at time of reservation.

All stalls will be locked until rented. Stalls will be numbered and all animals must be kept in assigned stalls. Two to four stalls will be reserved and kept empty for youth who want to start their livestock feeding projects before Aug. 1.

Stalls must be kept clean and manure loaded and hauled to designated area or off grounds. These rules will be on a trial basis. If the area is not kept clean and maintained, stricter rules will become effective. If you want to use it, TAKE CARE OF IT.

HORSE BARN

The same rules and charges apply to the horse barn, with the exception of the removal date for horses each year. However, All horses must be removed by Aug. 1, 1996. Stalls will remain empty until they can be cleaned and repaired. After repairs are made, stalls will be numbered, locked and rented. Members of 4-H, FFA and the high school rodeo team wishing to rent stalls will be given precedence over adults. Two-four stalls will be

kept open (unrented) for travellers. No horses will be turned loose in the arena or the faigrounds area. All must be kept in stalls. Only one horse is allowed per stall.

RODEO ARENA RULES

All arena rules apply to every individual. No exceptions.

"Youth only" activities take precedence over all others.

Arena will be reserved for general public use for riding only (barrels, poles, etc.) on every Monday and Tuesday. No roping is allowed on these days and no bookings will be accepted.

Every event held in arena must be booked with the Extension Office a week ahead of time. This includes all ropings, Play Days, rodeos, barrel races, Horse Shows, etc.

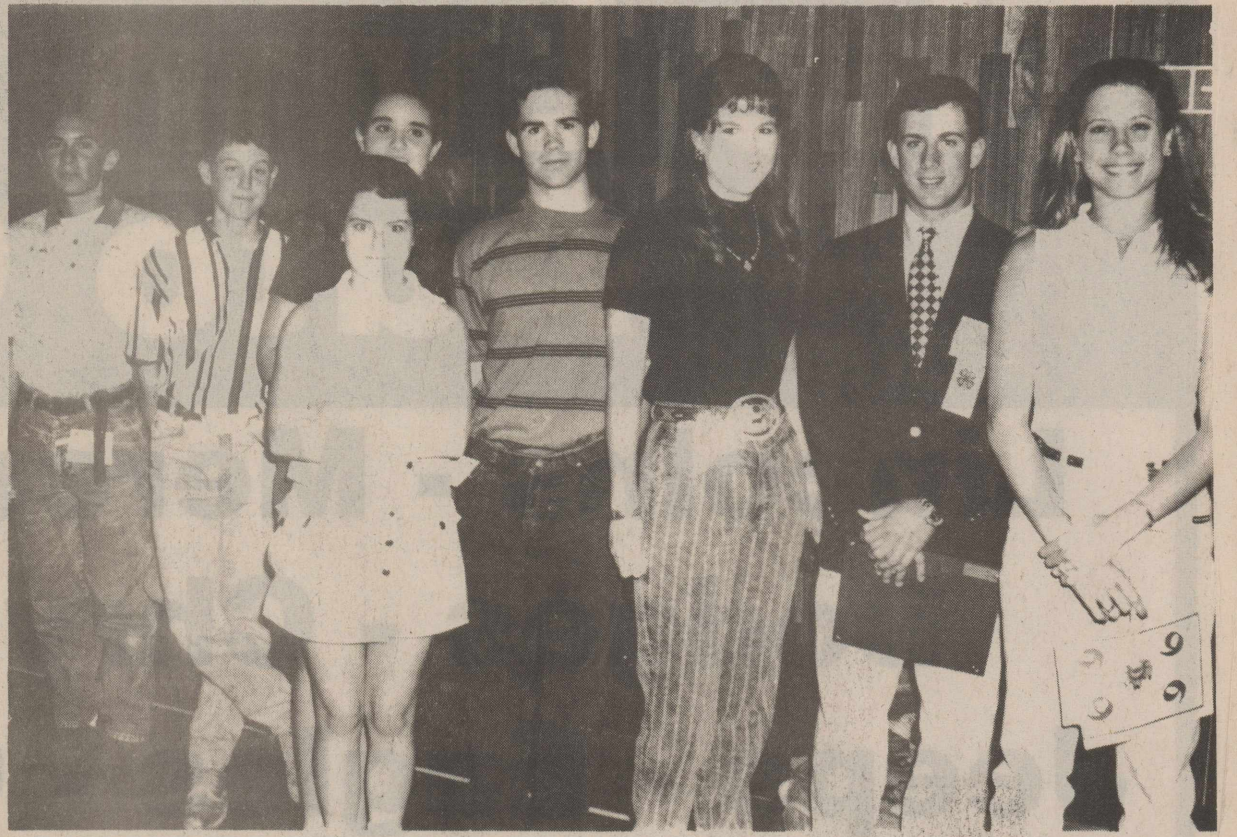
A booking fee of \$25 per day per event will be charged for all events to cover cost of arena upkeep and electricity. Exceptions are "youth only" activities, High school rodeo, 4-H Club events, etc. Keys to facility will be picked up and returned to Extension Office. Exceptions must be officially approved by the board.

Youth may ride in arena any nights there are no booked events. They will not be asked to leave.

A monthly charge of \$50 will be paid by the Crockett County Roping Association for use of the arena for practice sessions only. All other events must be booked and paid.

Livestock pens and other areas around the arena are to be used by organizations, clubs and for events only, not for private livestock storage. No outside grazing of animals is allowed. All livestock must be kept in assigned stalls or pens.

Organizations using the arena will be responsible for upkeep and cleaning of the arena and surrounding area.
