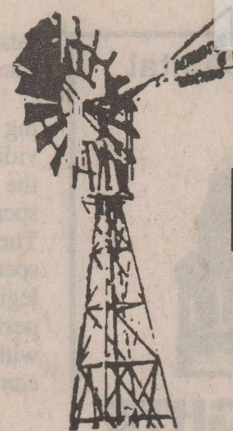
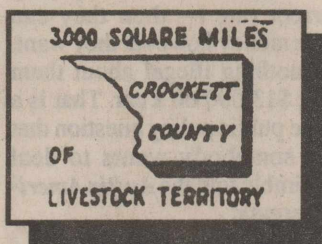

Pioneer Heritage Day Saturday

A day in the life of a pioneer family is the theme of Pioneer Heritage Day Oct. 5 at Crockett County Fair Park and Emerald House. Pioneer Heritage Day, a project of Crockett County Museum, was planned for homecoming weekend so that present and former residents could enjoy a return to Crockett County's past.

The day begins with a chuckwagon breakfast at 8 a.m. compliments of West Texas Rehab Center. A barbecue dinner on the grounds will be served from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. at a cost of \$4 per plate.

Demonstrations of ranch and household activities of the period will be held throughout the day. Games and fun activities for adults and children are also scheduled.

"Very special events, an old timers' circle, story telling and music are planned for the afternoon," said Geniece Childress. Lucille Littleton and Jewel Bailey will be among those telling of days gone by, and Shannon Gillespie of Eldorado will bring gospel music. Ms. Gillespie will be in Nashville in January or February to cut a record.

Demonstrations include authentic camp cookers Pleas Childress III, Brock Jones Jr. and Brock Jones III. There will be sheep shearing by Joe Flores, cow milking by Rowdy Holmsley, and Ira Childress will demonstrate working sheep dogs. Other ranch activities planned include horseshoeing, horse handling and saddling, goat roping and goat milking.

Chairmen of the ranch activities demonstrations are Miles Dabovich and Billy Reagor.

Typical household activities demonstrated at Emerald House will be wool carding and spinning by Kathy Roland, curator of collections at Fort Concho; butter churning by Kathryn Kessler of Big Lake and Sharon Farmer of Ozona; clothes washing by Carmen Sutton; crocheting by Opal Everett; quilting by Billie Rose Bailey; crocheting and darning by Blanche Walker; tating by Patsy Hester; and embroidery by Charlotte Harrell and Dean Stroud. Barbara Malone is chairman of the household activities segment of the day.

A children's group from Erik's Little House Day Care will have games at 11:30, and other children's activities during the day are soto stick horse races, candle making and rug beating. Vickie Stokes and Terri Faught are co-chairmen of children's activities.

Washer pitching begins at 1 p.m. and there will also be horseshoe pitching. The Silver Ridgerunners of Menard will perform at 2 p.m. and a square dance demonstration by Levis and Lace starts at 3 p.m. Rob Whitesides is in charge of fun activities.

Everyone is invited to come spend the day. Bring your lawnchairs and prepare for an afternoon of entertainment and visiting.

Eagles Outscore Lions 23-7

September 27 was a frustrating Friday night as the Ozona Lions had several scoring opportunities but failed to capitalize on them. The Eldorado Eagles defeated the Lions 23-7 in Eldorado. The Lions fall to a 1-3 season record and a 9-1 district record.

"Our guys played real hard, and their guys played harder. They took advantage of their opportunities, and we didn't," said a frustrated but not down Ozona head coach Walter Hargrove. "We gave up some big plays defensively; that really hurt."

Speaking of opportunities, Eldorado had plenty. "We gave them the ball five times inside our 45, and they scored twice. We got the ball twice within their 30-yard line and didn't score. We had a couple of real good opportunities to cash in, and we just didn't do it - we just didn't execute," he said.

It appeared to be Ozona's night as Eldorado's quarterback Casey Snelson was intercepted on their first possession by Pete Castaneda and on their second possession by Justin Browne. Then the tide turned on an Ozona fourth-and-five at their own 27-yard line. A snap to punter Matthew Galindo sailed high over his head, and Galindo was tackled in the end zone for an Eagle safety.

This unusual scoring event occurred with 5:55 remaining in the first quarter to give the Eagles a 2-0 lead.

In the second period, good defense by the Lions held the Eagles off for a while, but the Eagles got busy, starting from the Lions' 40-yard line. Eldorado's Snelson rolled right for a pass from the Lion 36-yard line, saw daylight and took off through the middle for an Eagle touchdown with

7:57 left in the second quarter. The PAT by Cory Reeves was good, and the Eagles took a 9-0 lead.

The Lions wasted little time in coming back as junior quarterback Justin Browne first returned the kickoff to the Lion 48-yard line. Then on the third play, Browne scampered for a 52-yard touchdown with 7:08 remaining in the first half. The versatile Browne kicked the extra point to narrow the gap 9-7.

An Ozona fumble gave the Eagles the ball on the Lion 42-yard line late in the second quarter. Snelson completed a 42-yard pass to tight end Zane Bruce to the Lion 1-yard line. Halfback Clay Butler ran the ball in from the one with 15 seconds left to give the Eagles a 16-7 halftime lead after Reeves was successful on the PAT.

Coach Hargrove summed up the Lions' defensive game when he said, "Defensively, we missed too many tackles. Some of our other guys had opportunities to tackle in the backfield, and we missed."

Ozona was aided on defense by returning starters Stephen Montes and Robert Kelly, who had been injured the past several weeks. Leading the defense in tackles was Justin Browne with 14. He was followed by Lalo Guadarrama with 12, Manuel Mendoza had 10, Jon Sanchez 7, Anthony Ortiz, Gary Dominguez, Ruben Cruz and Matthew Galindo had six each, and both Montes and Kelly had five each. Nine other Lions had a total of 15 tackles.

School Revises Exemption Policy

A revised test exemption policy began at Ozona High School Sept. 17 announces Principal Tanya Sorrells. As of that date, all students were exempt - meaning all previous absences, tardies and discipline referrals were forgiven.

All pre-existing criteria for exemption must be met as follows:

This policy incorporates grades, attendance (including tardies), and discipline referrals.

If a student's grade is between 96-100 three absences are allowed per quarter. Those with grades between 91-95 are allowed two absences per quarter, and one absence per quarter is allowed for those with grades between 86-90. A student with grades between 80-85 is allowed no absences per quarter.

Exemption Requirements and Explanations

Students with four or more absences will take all exams. This includes absences to tutorials as well. One unexcused tardy equals one

absence.

A student may be exempt only once per term per class. If a student is enrolled in two consecutive nine-week courses such as speech, micro computer applications, health, government or economics, an exemption can be taken in only one of the courses.

All exemptions are void if a student is sent to the office for a discipline problem.

Absences due to co-curricular or extra-curricular activities will not count against a student when applying the exemption/attendance policy.

Because of new state attendance/funding requirements, all students must be present during their assigned tutorial/activity period for roll check - that is one period each day.

If a student is absent from the tutorial/activity period on either or both exam days, they will lose exemptions to all tests and must take all tests immediately upon their return. Their

grade will be marked "incomplete" until all tests are taken and promptly graded.

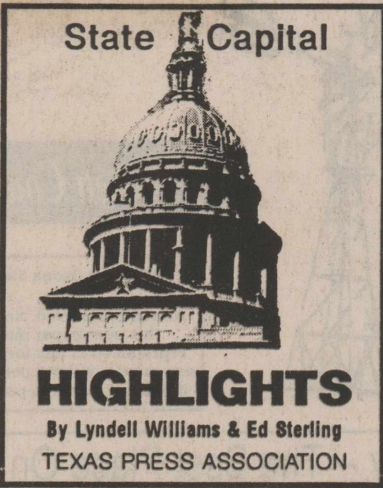
Skiles Publishes Book On Judge Roy Bean

The first new book in several decades to address the legend of the only "law west of the Pecos", *Judge Roy Bean Country*, is the best combination of hard scholarship and oral history. Written by Langtry native Jack Skiles, this is the story of a wild and barren landscape populated by heroes, villains, adventurers and treasure-seekers.

Author Jack Skiles armed himself in the early 1960's with a second-hand tape recorder and a determination to discover the truth about Texas legend Judge Roy Bean while those Texas Rangers, ranchers, Langtry citizens, and any other old-timers with a good memory and a story to tell about the Judge were still living. Forty years later, after a lifetime of pursuing the truth, Skiles creates from those interviews, a compelling panorama of the rugged life in the Chihuahuan Desert along the Rio Grande River. These are tales of humor, adventure and pure misery from the romantic: Old West. Following Jack Skiles into the Land West of the Pecos, prepare to meet one old reprobate by the name of Judge Roy Bean - and history-telling at its very best.

Jack Skiles grew up playing in the Judge Roy Bean Saloon. A rancher, retired school superintendent, archaeologist, botanist, biologist and manager of the Judge Roy Bean Visitor Center for 18 years, Skiles is a frequently cited authority on the Rio Grande River and the southwest.

Judge Roy Bean Country is published by Texas Tech University Press and sells for \$29.95 clothbound or \$18.95 paperback.

AUSTIN — The Office of the State Auditor has uncovered more than \$1 million in questionable expenditures by tax-supported nursing homes and in-home health-care companies.

The expenditures were discovered in cost reports submitted to the Texas Department of Human Services, the agency which regulates such facilities. The cost reports show how revenue from all sources — including Medicaid, Medicare and private insurance payments — was spent.

"The funds used to make these expenditures could have been used to provide higher quality care or to provide care to a greater number of clients," the audit report said.

Among the findings: 10 nursing homes spent almost \$615,000 on items such as a Cadillac, Texas Rangers baseball tickets and jobs for relatives who did no work; and five in-home health-care companies spent almost \$387,000 on employee parties, leasing an airplane from an employee, car window tinting and other items.

The names of the nursing homes and health-care companies were not made public.

Last week, State Auditor Lawrence Alwin recommended that the Department of Human Services set limits on how Medicaid funds can be spent and devise a system to recoup money spent in a questionable manner.

Terry Trimble, acting commissioner of the DHS, said the audit

raises legitimate public policy questions. "Once the money goes to the nursing facility — assuming they're providing the service and we're paying the correct rate — then they can spend the money however they want. There's nothing illegal about them spending \$13,000 on a car. That is a legitimate public policy question that perhaps somebody wants to deal with," Trimble told the *Austin American-Statesman*.

Audit Takes Senate to Task
Meanwhile, another state auditor's report distributed to state senators last week called for tighter control over Senate expenses.

According to the management audit report, the Senate spent \$25.7 million last year. Individually, the 31 senators spent from \$160,421 to \$467,907 on office expenditures. The disparity in those amounts could be attributed to the costs of commuting to and from Austin, suggested Mike Hailey, a spokesman for Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

A financial audit of the Senate is in progress, but no date has been set for its completion.

More Violent Offenders in TYC
A new state study shows Texas' increasing number of juveniles being sentenced to the Texas Youth Commission are violent and are more likely to have used weapons in crimes.

The study was done by the Criminal Justice Policy Council, a state agency that monitors crime trends.

Since 1990, the percentage of violent criminals in TYC lockups grew from 16 percent to 37 percent in 1995, when the total number of commitments rose to 2,318. The study also shows an increasing number of teen-age criminals are substance abusers and are affiliated with gangs.

Steve Robinson, executive director of the Texas Youth Commission, told the *American-Statesman* the agency is focused on changing offenders' behavior "... so that when they leave they will know how to act appropriately in society — know the difference between right and wrong."

Another finding: 41 percent of

those who are incarcerated will be back behind bars within three years.

Hispanic Educators Discuss Hopes
Hispanic educators and civil libertarians met in Austin last week to discuss ways to open higher education to more Texans, in light of the federal court decision that barred Texas colleges and universities from using race as a factor in the student admissions process.

State Rep. Ciro Rodriguez, D-San Antonio, and leaders from Hispanic education groups, called for state higher education officials to de-emphasize the results of standardized tests in the admissions process and instead give more consideration to each student's grades and personal character.

"The main thing is to provide hope to individuals and to provide opportunities to individuals," Rodriguez said.

Texas officials have said the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals decision covers the granting of scholarships and financial aid.

Minority groups contend, however, that such an interpretation is counterproductive because it slams the doors on African-American and Mexican-American students when the state's minority population is increasing dramatically.

Other Capital Highlights

■ Newly appointed Texas Senate Education Chairman Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, is looking at ways to make the state university admissions process more efficient and student-friendly. One idea: instead of sending an application only to the campus they wish to attend, students would apply to the University of Texas System. The system would tell them which of UT's campuses they would be able to attend.

■ The Department of Human Services reported a 12 percent drop in the number of Texas welfare recipients over the last two years. That's 96,000 fewer recipients. But, the number of welfare clients in border counties with high levels of unemployment and poverty, such as Cameron and El Paso, increased over the period.

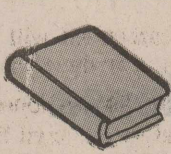

Banned Books Week

Banned Books Week 1996 is the 15th annual promotion celebrating the Freedom To Read. In the past year, not only were many books the targets of censors, but even Banned Books Week itself came under attack. Some thought the event provoked censorship hysteria, was misleading and anti-family. Even those who support intellectual freedom and a week to acknowledge its value through the name itself emphasized the negative and should be changed.

The right to freedom of speech, firmly rooted in the First Amendment to the U. S. Constitution, require constant vigilance in order to keep it vital. This week-long celebration examines the freedom of speech by showing actual situations where that freedom has been challenged.

Those who would limit the options of others do so for the "best" of reasons. They wish to impose their values and beliefs on others because they are secure that their values are the "right" ones. But, time after time, it seems there is more than one "right". It is "right" to shelter children from evil and harm, yet it is also "right" to educate children about how to recognize evil and to teach them to protect themselves from harm. It is "right" to despise racism and discrimination, but it is also "right" to allow free expression. The solution to this dilemma is the freedom of choice. Freedom to choose what is right for a specific individual at a specific time. When options are restricted or eliminated, then one cannot objectively choose a point of view. Libraries could become propaganda centers and not the free market of ideas.

The display of banned books at CCPL includes materials that were merely "challenged". These incidents should not be considered less important than "real bannings", where a book is removed from the shelves of a library or bookstore, or when a work is removed from the curriculum at a school, because the threat to censor remains and should be documented. Someone has tried to restrict another person's freedom to choose.

Banned Books Week has been labeled anti-family, because it seems critical of parents wanting to protect their children from "dirty language", from "smut", and from books that seem to challenge or reject the beliefs that parents work to teach their children. The true message of Banned Books Week, however, is to allow parents and children access to a full range of options. Parents need to and should guide their children's reading

and library use. That right, however, does not extend to other people's children. Restricting or preventing access to further the beliefs of one family only means that the rights of another family are denied. Parents need to see the full range of options and then guide their children to the appropriate reading materials.

Banned Books Week is sponsored by the American Booksellers Assn., the American Booksellers Foundation, the American Library Association, the American Society of Journalists and Authors, the Association of American Publishers, and the National Association of College Stores. It is also endorsed by the Center for the Book of the Library of Congress. These groups sponsor this week to draw attention to the danger that exists when restraints are imposed on the availability of information in a free society.

The message of Banned Books Week is more than the freedom to choose, the freedom to express one's opinion even if that opinion might be considered unorthodox or unpopular. The essential message of Banned Books Week is the importance of ensuring the availability of all information to all who wish to read and learn.

Visit your public library and see what others don't want you to read. What one person considers threatening, another finds exhilarating. You'll be surprised at what others do not want you to "check out"!

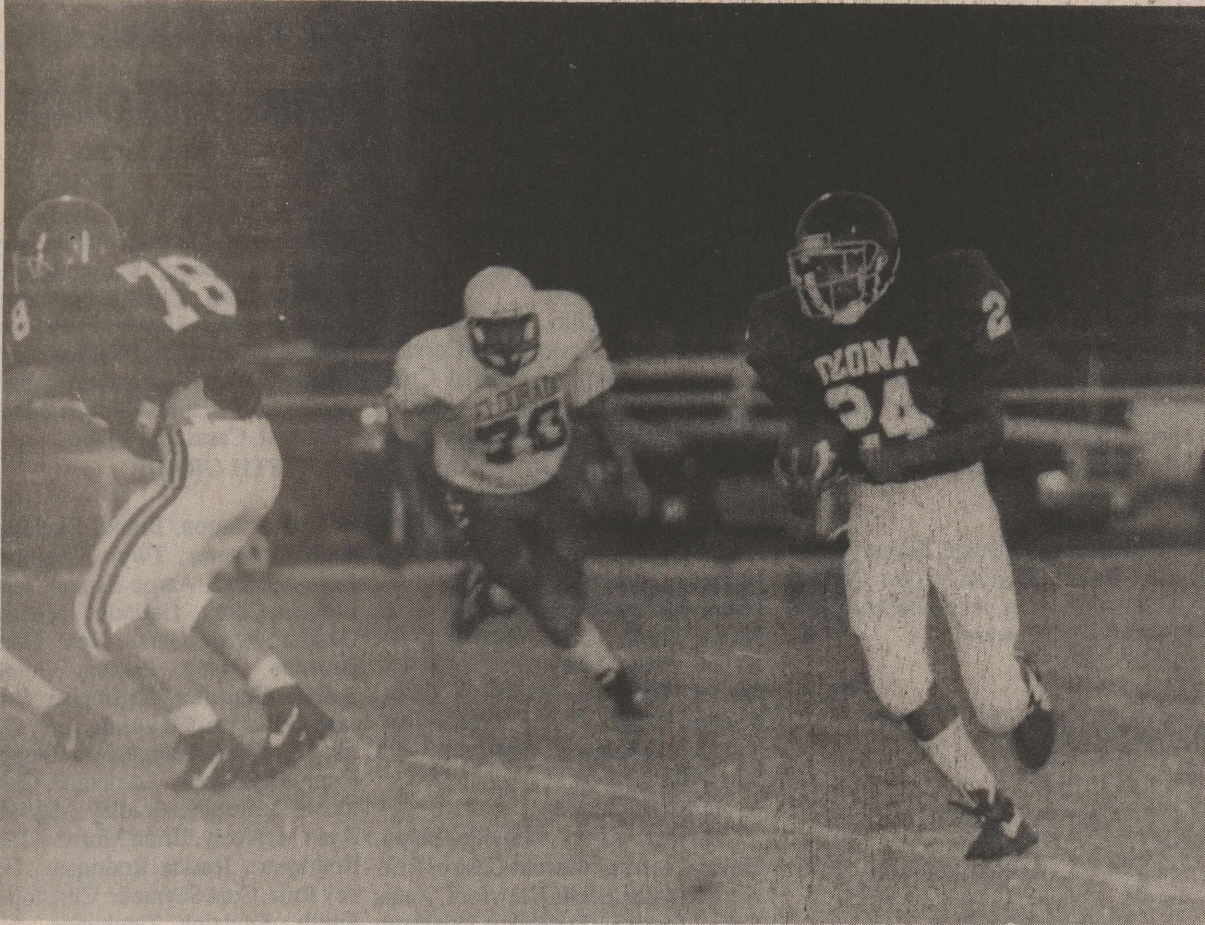

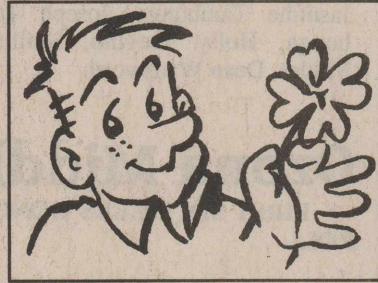
The leading rusher was Cade Clark

The Ozona JV Purple Lions had an enormous night last Thursday as they scored six touchdowns to defeat the Eldorado JV Eagles 40-16 in Lion Stadium. Their season record is now 4-1.

"I thought offensively, our offensive linemen dominated all night long," said offensive Ozona JV Purple coach Ronnie Casey. "With them dominating the line of scrimmage, we were able to execute our offense extremely well."

The PAT by Miguel Rios failed but the Lions lead 6-0.

Close to the end of the first period, the Lions took over for their next possession from the 41-yard line. A fake punt and a pass from Crawford to Chad Myers for 27 yards on a fourth-

and 22 set up the next Lion touchdown. Rick Hamon scored on a 26-yard run with 7:30 remaining on the clock in the second period. A fake extra point attempt and pass fell incomplete but the Lions inched ahead 12-0.

The fake punt occurred because they didn't cover Ozona's end. "Ross Crawford made a great pass and Chad Myers made a good catch and move to get the yards we needed," said Coach Casey.

An Ozona personal foul penalty, many short yardage runs, and a 19-yard pass completion propelled the Eagles to score on a one yard run with 50 seconds left in the first half. A two-point conversion run was successful as the Eagles trailed the Lions 8-12.

"With the exception of four plays, our defense played with consistency. We bent a few times but never did break our defense," said Coach Gonzales. "For the score to be 12-8 our kids showed a lot of discipline."

In the third quarter, Tim Maldonado returned the ball to the Lion 34-yard line. On the next play, Crawford ran 66 yards on the option for a touchdown. A run by Hamon for the conversion failed but the Lions increased their score to 18-8.

On the next Lion possession, Matt Castaneda set up their next touchdown throwing a 44-yard halfback pass to Ken Sessom to the Eldorado 16-yard line. Sessom ran 12 more yards and Castaneda scored on a 4-yard run with 4:20 to go in the third quarter. A pass intended for Mark Childress fell incomplete nevertheless, the Lions enlarged their score to 24-8.

Eldorado took little time in bouncing back as they score on a 69-yard run. The same Eldorado back scored the two-point conversion and they trailed the Lions 24-16 with 3:36 remaining in the third quarter.

Another Lion touchdown was set up after Hamon and Castaneda picked up some good yardage along with a

26-yard pass completion to Brad Sullivan placing the Lions in scoring position again. Crawford scored on a 6-yard run and Castaneda scored on the conversion to expand their score to 32-16 with 1:56 left in the third period.

A good Lion defensive stand and especially some good stops by Michael Bullard, Chad Myers, Miguel Rios, and Donnie Bullard allowed the Lions to take the ball over on their own 49-yard line. Diabetics, Caregivers Invited To Oct. 21 Diabetes Workshop

A free, bilingual workshop, "Managing Your Diabetes", will be held at the Crockett County Civic Center on Monday, Oct. 21, from 1-5 p.m. All diabetics and their caregivers, plus all other interested persons, are encouraged to attend.

The workshop, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service's Family and Consumer Sciences Committee, will address the main concerns of diabetics - meal planning, foot care, and medications.

While there is no charge to attend or deadline to register, it would be helpful to the speakers in planning for enough materials if people planning to attend would call 392-2721 in advance.

Speakers are from Shannon Medical Center and include Carolynne Glass, coordinator of the Diabetes Management Program at Shannon, Angie Land, in-patient nurse educator, and Tamara Hargett, a registered clinical dietician.

All sessions will be bilingual. Following a general session overview of diabetes and how to control it, the three topics will be offered in 45-minute workshops, which will be offered twice during the afternoon. Participants can choose two of the workshops to attend.

Following the workshops, the panel of speakers will answer questions from the audience.

"This is an excellent way for diabetics to get their questions and concerns answered immediately," said Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent for Family and Consumer Sciences. Ulmer said the bilingual sessions should be helpful to the many Hispanics who either have diabetes or are at risk for the disease.

"We appreciate chairman Peggy McWilliams for putting this workshop together," said Ulmer. "We have had many requests for this type of program, and we hope our Crockett County residents will take advantage of the opportunity." McWilliams is a member of the Extension committee sponsoring the event.

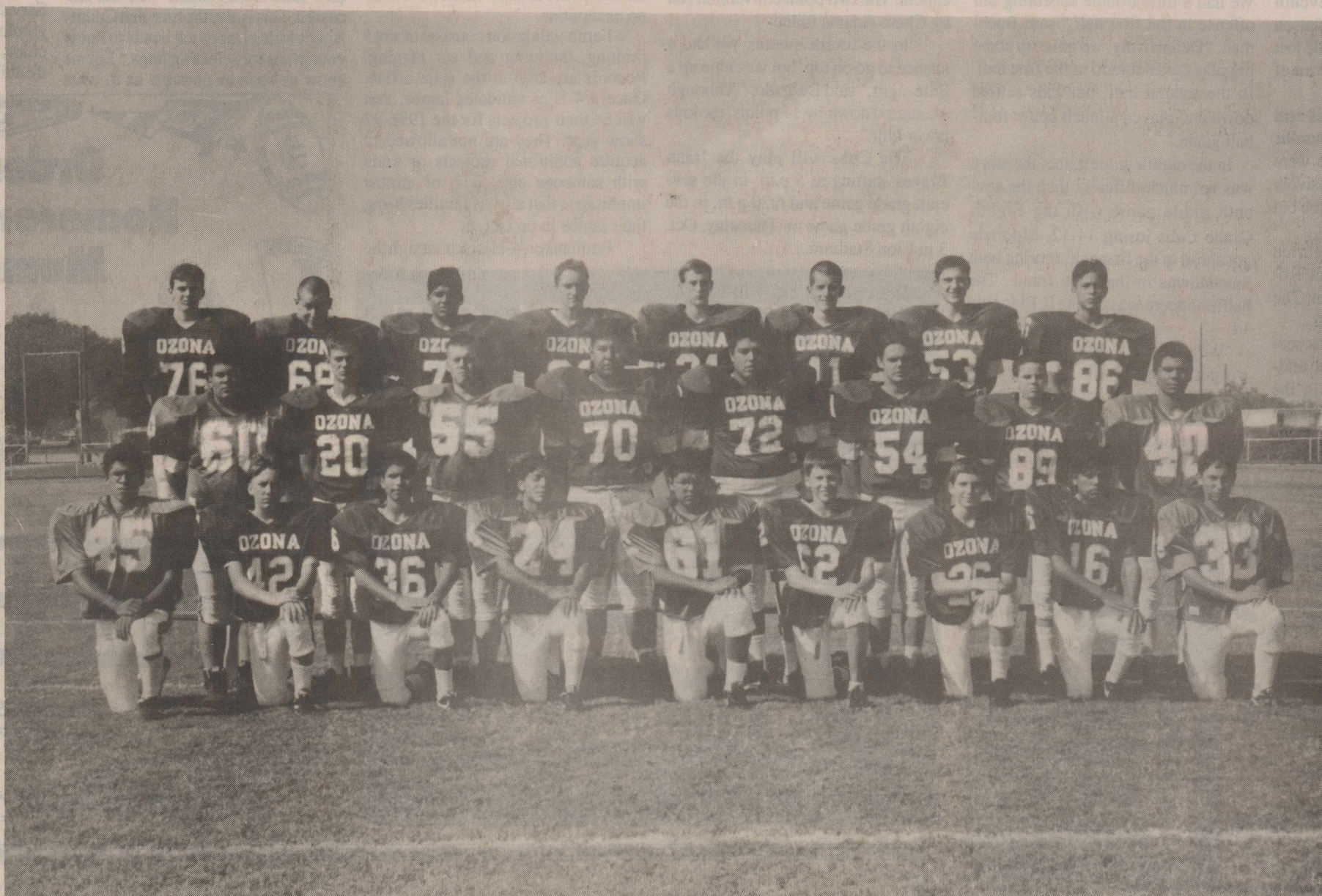

Hargrove had some respect for Eldorado, as well. "They had a little more quickness. Their skill people were quicker," he said.

"We had a hard time moving the ball. They put a lot of pressure on the line of scrimmage, and we thought they would - we anticipated it," Hargrove continued. "Our linemen didn't stay on their blocks well, and our backs did not block well."

In the second half, Eldorado took the ball from their own 31-yard line and started driving for their goal line. The Lions thought they had Eldorado stopped, but they received a pass interference call that gave the Eagles the ball on the Lion 33-yard line.

That took a little wind out of the Lions' defense, and Eldorado's Garrett Bownds gouged some more on a 17-yard gain to the Lions' 16-yard line. Bownds then added more Lion misery, scoring on a 16-yard run to essentially seal the Eagles' victory.

The touchdown occurred with 8:52 left in the third period. Reeves added the PAT to give the Eagles a 23-7 edge.

"In the second half, Eldorado had a good drive going and got an (Ozona) interference call. The interference call was a big play. That gave them a first down on about the Lion 33-yard line. They had a couple of big plays on that drive," said Coach Hargrove.

Each team had trouble moving the ball and holding on to it in the middle of the third quarter and all through the fourth quarter. Close to the end of the third quarter, Ozona had the Eagles in a hole on the 1-yard line after a 54-yard punt by Galindo.

Three plays later, the Eagles fumbled and the Lions recovered on the Eagle 15-yard line. Unfortunately for the Lions, the fumble disease caught them, and they gave it back to the Eagles on their own 8-yard line.

"They (Eldorado) blitzed a lot, and we had a hard time picking them up both offensively and defensively," said Coach Hargrove. "They double covered Jon (Sanchez) and made it hard to get it (the ball) to him. We had other receivers but failed to get it to them."

The Ozona Lions will host the Iraan Braves for their homecoming game with the pre-game activities starting at 7:35 p.m. Friday, Oct. 4. There will be a bonfire on Thursday evening starting at approximately 8 p.m. (after the junior high games) at the baseball complex north of town.

Fans should expect a highly entertaining game as the Braves enter the contest with a perfect 4-0 record.

According to Coach Hargrove, the Braves have on their roster 20 seniors, 10 juniors and one sophomore.

"They are every bit as good as their ranking (one poll ranks them sixth and one seventh in the state in Class 2A) and they are that good," said Hargrove. "They are extremely talented - they really are. They have a lot of experience. They are quick, they are fast, and they are physical - they will run into you."

The Braves are coming off a 53-0 slaughter of the Wall Hawks and are directed by head football coach Larry Hanna. Last year the Braves were very successful, winning the district title with a record of 5-0 and season record of 10-1.

Fans will see an experienced team that has speed and quickness and a winning attitude. A possible weakness (if they might have one) would be the replacement of key positions. Although that doesn't look to be a problem with 16 returning lettermen, six offensive starters and nine defensive starters.

Iraan will start the backfield with Billy Palmore as quarterback; Renaldo Mendoza, who had 72 rushing yards and one TD against Wall, at running back; and running back Brandon Ramsey, who had 71 yards and two TDs against Wall. The Braves will run a wing-T offense with split end Robin Hanna and tight end Ross Blackwelder. They will use a 4-3 defense.

"It's a big challenge for our kids, and I hope we are up to the challenge. Our kids played real good against them last year," Hargrove said. "If we don't play physical and play quick, it will be a long night. The only thing we gotta do is cinch our belts up tighter and play better than we have."

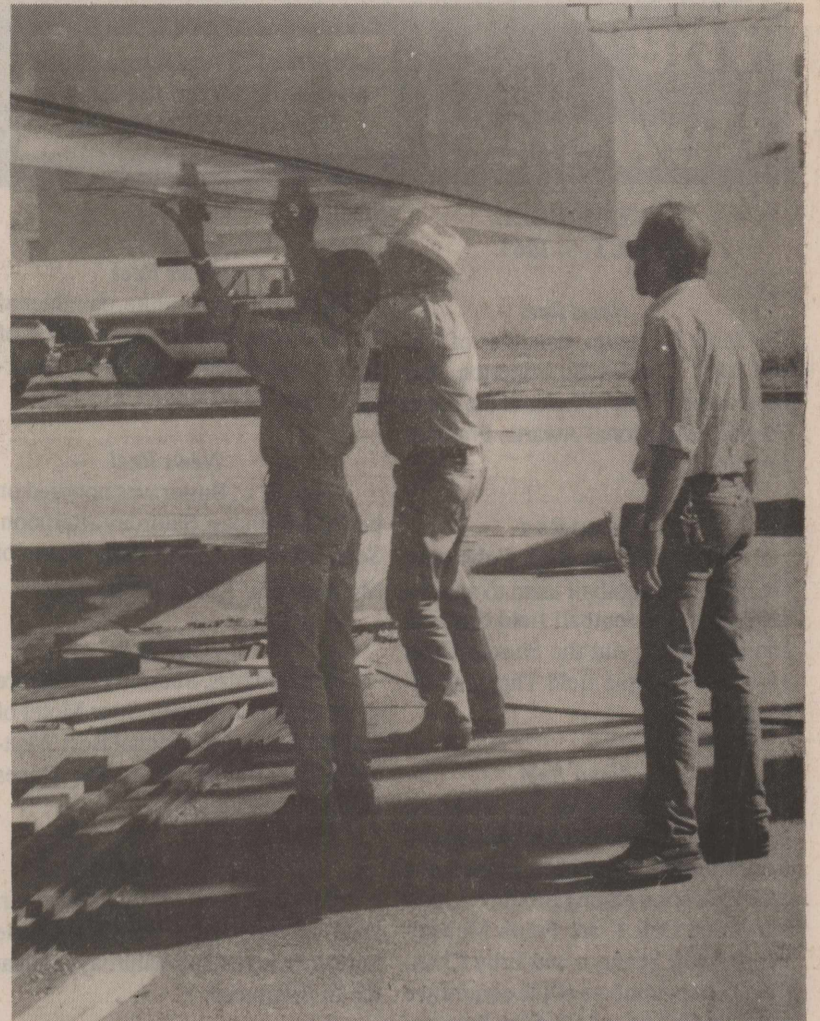

Conference Offers Survival Strategies For Ranchers

Ranchers looking for practical ways to manage during periods of drought and depressed cattle prices are invited to attend the Concho Valley Cattle Producers Conference Monday, Oct. 14, at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center in San Angelo, says Chaunce O. Thompson Jr., president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

The free conference, which begins at 9:30 a.m. and ends at 2 p.m., is one in a series of regional meetings which TSCRA is conducting in Texas and Oklahoma. Texas Production Credit Association and the Federal Land Bank Association of San Angelo are underwriting the project.

"We feel that we must roll up our sleeves and help our members on a personal basis during this period of crisis for the Texas cattle industry," says TSCRA President Thompson. "Conditions are different in each area; we have to be there to hear what our members want from their association and offer area-specific information to help them survive."

"To be sure that we provide the kind of information needed by ranch-

ers in each area, TSCRA directors and staff members who live in each region have been asked to help plan the program," Thompson says.

Christopher Womack, a veterinarian at Los Caballos Veterinary Clinic, will be addressing health problems cow-calf producers in the region need to understand. Womack will discuss common diseases that are seen in his clinic, routine vaccinations that ranchers in the area should administer, preconditioning programs and other general animal health concerns.

Dale Rollins, extension wildlife specialist from San Angelo, will discuss balancing brush control with wildlife management.

"Clearing brush can be one of the best methods for managing wildlife habitat, but too often it's one of the worst," Rollins says. "The key is to incorporate wildlife needs into your overall ranch plan long before the bulldozer is unloaded or the spray plane is in the air."

The Brush Buster program will be explained by Darrell Ueckert, rangeland professor with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and Allan McGinty, extension range specialist, both from San Angelo.

"Brush Buster's 'do it yourself' methods are user friendly, highly selective and environmentally safe," says Ueckert. "They're ideal for sculpting landscapes to achieve landowner goals for livestock and wildlife production, aesthetics and real estate values."

By attending this conference, producers can earn two continuing education units which are required for a pesticide applicator's license. There will also be information on services available from the Texas Production Credit Association, the Federal Land Bank Association of San Angelo and TSCRA, including question-and-answer sessions with officers and staff members of these organizations.

A complimentary lunch will be provided by Hi-Pro Animal Health. Participants will also have the chance to win door prizes.
