Bill Mason Honored By College Of State Bar

The College of the State Bar of Texas recognized 4,100 attorneys as certified members of the College during its annual awards luncheon in Austin on Feb. 22. This distinguished group of attorneys accounts for less than eight percent of Texas' 62,000 attorneys. Bill Mason of Ozona was among those recognized.

The College was created by the Supreme Court of Texas as a means of recognizing members of the State Bar who voluntarily attain an extraordinary number of continuing legal education credits each year. To qualify for membership, attorneys must complete 80 hours of continuing legal education (CLE) within a consecutive three-year period or 45 hours during the current year. To maintain membership in the College an attorney must complete 30 hours of CLE each year.

Filing takes place in the school's administration building at 797 Ave. D and the water district office located at 1102 Ave. I.



"But we saw a lot in Lima itself in a very short time."

Many homes and cathedrals built by the Spanish still line narrow avenues designed not for cars but for the horse drawn carriages of another

The last 25 years have been especially difficult for the country because of the growing population and political instability. Terrorism and runaway inflation have taken a heavy toll. But a rebirth is taking place, with industry and tourism growing rapidly, explained Charlena. "So it's safe to say that Lima is 'booming' under the government of Alberto Fujimori, a Peruvian of Japanese descent. Peru enjoys excellent diplomatic and trade



A free bilingual weight management course called "Puente de Salud" is being offered to women in Crockett County starting Tuesday, March 18. The course is being offered through the Texas Agricultural Extension Service's Better Living for Texans

The first session will be held at 7 p.m. on Tuesday at the Extension Office Conference Room located next to the convention center at 1301 Ave. AA. Participants will receive information about the course and decide on a meeting schedule at the first

meeting. The program was put together by Dr. Bethann Witcher, Extension Nutrition Specialist for TAEX, and was tested for effectivness with Hispanic clients in San Antonio before being offered statewide.

Crockett County is one of the first counties in the state to offer the program. County Extension Agent Tedra Ulmer and Better Living Program Assistant Myra Tambunga attended training for the program last week in Corpus Christi. "The course is fun as well as

educational," said Ulmer. The agent noted participants will learn simple lifetime tips to control weight and will enjoy fun exercise with the group along with a low-fat recipe demonstration at each class session. Participants will learn that lowering fat doesn't mean losing flavor - the recipes are ones the whole family will enjoy.

"The recipes are foods we already eat, but are lower in fat without losing taste," said Tambunga. She said recipes for items such as baked tortilla chips, "retried beans", Mexican zucchini and oven french fries are included. Modified recipes for such favorites as Enchiladas Verde and oatmeal cookies are also tasty and can be included in a healthy diet.

No matter how over-weight a person is, it's never too late to make changes according to the Extension educators. "Even small changes in diet ony. and exercise can add up, and can make a big difference in feeling good," said Ulmer. She noted the recent study which listed the 10 most "overweight" cities in the U.S. put San Antonio at third place. "If San Antonio is high on the list," said Ulmer, "you can bet we would be as well."
