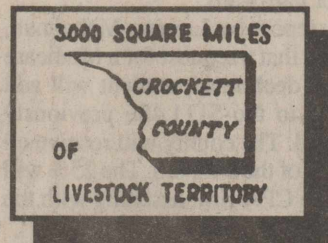

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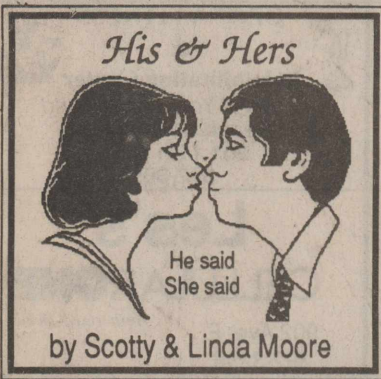

W.I.L.D. About Deer

W.I.L.D. about Deer, a new management series from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, begins April 28-29 in Ozona. "W.I.L.D.", or "Wildlife Intensive Leadership Development" is an intensive multi-site training whose pilot focus is on white-tailed deer.

Students are expected to participate in each of three, two-day workshops. The two other locations and their dates are: Sonora, July 14-15, and San Angelo, Sept 29-30. Each workshop features hands-on exercises and detailed homework assignments. The program's purpose is to give participants a chance to develop a greater working knowledge of the deer management "triangle". The triangle being habitat, populations and people.

Tuition is \$200 per person. Fees cover a textbook, resource materials, most meals and refreshments. Lodging and travel costs are the student's personal responsibility. For further information, contact Rollins at 653-4576 or Crockett County Extension Agent Miles Dabovich at 392-2721.

Task Force Agent A Possibility

Commander John Sparks of the Rio Concho Drug Task Force talked with commissioners Monday about the possibility of stationing someone in Ozona through a program which makes agents available for area law enforcement. The program was developed as part of a statewide strategy for drug control using federal funds, Sparks said. Through this, the San Angelo narcotic unit is enabled to work other areas.

The board which oversees the program is composed of the San Angelo chief of police and the sheriff of each participating county.

Cost to Crockett County will be a matching amount of 25%, \$2,000, for the year with the officer's salary, car and maintenance paid through a federal grant to the City of San Angelo. Crockett County's participation will bring the number of counties in the program to eight.

Sparks is to provide a copy of an interlocal contract for commissioners to examine.

Sheriff Shane Fenton, who accompanied Sparks to the meeting, brought the program to the attention of commissioners at a previous session.

A bid for an oil and gas mineral lease of county property was returned unopened after commissioners determined that the area did not include Lima. County attorney Bill Mason stressed that landowners in Lima need to have the opportunity to be considered part of that leasing unit.

A representative of the bidding company said that Lima was not included because Lima could be part of another leasing unit.

A new call for bids will be issued. John Stokes, county auditor, reported that bids will be opened in May for an airport construction project. The basic package is expected to cost \$2.4 million, but seven elected items could increase the cost to \$2.8. After bids are opened, the Texas Department of Transportation will see if money is

available for the added amount. Crockett County could be responsible for \$30,000 to \$60,000 of the cost.

Land for the airport has been donated by J. Cleo Thompson. As a result, commissioners executed a termination of lease agreement with Thompson on airport land.

Swimming pool manager Sandra Perez met with the court to set pool hours and dates and discuss lifeguard training. Opening date will be May 25, and the pools will close Aug. 17. The pools will be open to the public between the hours of 1 and 5 p.m.

Mrs. Perez said she wishes to see lifeguards sign an agreement that they will work through the season or reimburse the county for the cost of certification training. All applications for certification training had not yet been received, Mrs. Perez said.

Commissioners voted to accept a policy for services and equipment for Crockett County Public Library as presented by Louise Ledoux. Mrs. Ledoux researched information for her library board to formulate the policy.

She reported that no news has been received from the Texas State Library on a proposed \$50,000 grant which would complete the expansion funding.

Commissioners voted to enter a lease with Dr. Gary Vannoy for a rabies quarantine area at his veterinary clinic. The runs built by the county years ago no longer qualify as a rabies quarantine area, Vannoy said. Cost to repair and upgrade the existing runs is expected to be about \$2,000. The lease is to be for five years at one dollar per year.

Bill Mason updated the court on computerizing the law library based on cost figures for the present system. Several county offices have some books of their own in addition to the

library. Two computers would be sufficient, he said.

Bids were let for paving rock with CSA of San Angelo receiving the coated rock contract and Lilly Construction of Ozona the uncoated. Commissioner Rudy Martinez abstained on the Lilly Construction vote.

A bid from John and Nila Kelly for a track carrier was accepted by the court, and no bids were received for rock removed from the site of the new courthouse annex.

Shelton Oil and Gas was the sole bidder for fuel, and their bid was accepted by the court.

A resolution authorizing the submission of the 1997 Texas Community Development Program Grant Application was approved by commissioners with Fred Deaton voting against.

Court members also voted to execute a resolution requesting that conferences be organized so that all 16 state mandated hours of continuing education be available at one meeting.

Purchases approved include the expenditure of up to \$12,000 for a used truck for the asphalt distributor, \$5,342 for an 18,000 pound lift for the road department, up to \$1000 for metal benches at fairgrounds park to replace some which have been vandalized, and purchase of a communications tower for the Thunderbird bus and fire department.

Court members heard reports from Sheriff Fenton, Auditor Stokes, Librarian Ledoux, civic and youth center director Garland Young, care center administrator Crystal Hargraves and Gerald Creel, director of nursing. Written reports were received from Janet McDaniel for Helping Hands and Bob Falkner for the fire department.

Arrest Made On Theft Charges

Johnny Lynn Ferguson of Big Lake was arrested April 8 on three counts of felony theft following indictment by the Crockett County Grand Jury. He is charged with theft of pipe and cattle from the Shannon Ranch Estate in Crockett County.

Ferguson was indicted on charges of stealing 270 joints of pipe valued at \$3,240 on June 10, 1992, 15 head of mixed-breed heifers valued at \$6,375 on March 23, 1995, and 15 head of mixed-breed heifers valued at \$3,552 on Sept. 30, 1995.

A second man was indicted along with Ferguson, but no arrest had been made as of April 15. Authorities in Wyoming have notified the man that he has been indicted, and he has been asked to return to Ozona to be arrested. He will be arrested and extradited if he does not comply.

An indictment means that at least nine of 12 grand jurors believe there is cause for trial.

50,000+ Awaiting Donor Organs

There are more than 50,000 Americans awaiting organ transplants this spring, 1,000 of which are children. The number of potential transplant operations is increasing, and there is not a corresponding increase in the number of donors. Because of this, about one out of five may not receive an organ in time.

During National Organ and Tissue Donor Awareness Week April 20-26, The Living Bank strives to make the public aware that every year millions of organs and tissues are buried that could save or enhance the lives of others.

Jack Adams of Ozona is an example of the miracles which can be wrought through organ replacement. Jack waited 4 1/2 months before receiving his new heart Feb. 2, 1993. Months spent in Houston awaiting a donor saw Jack at the edge of death numerous times. After he went code blue more than 12 times, they stopped counting, said his wife Terry.

When Jack arrived in Houston, he

was put into the critical care unit where he stayed until a donor was found with a good match. During that time he was on a balloon pump to keep his heart going, spent time on a respirator and had a chest tube inserted when fluid

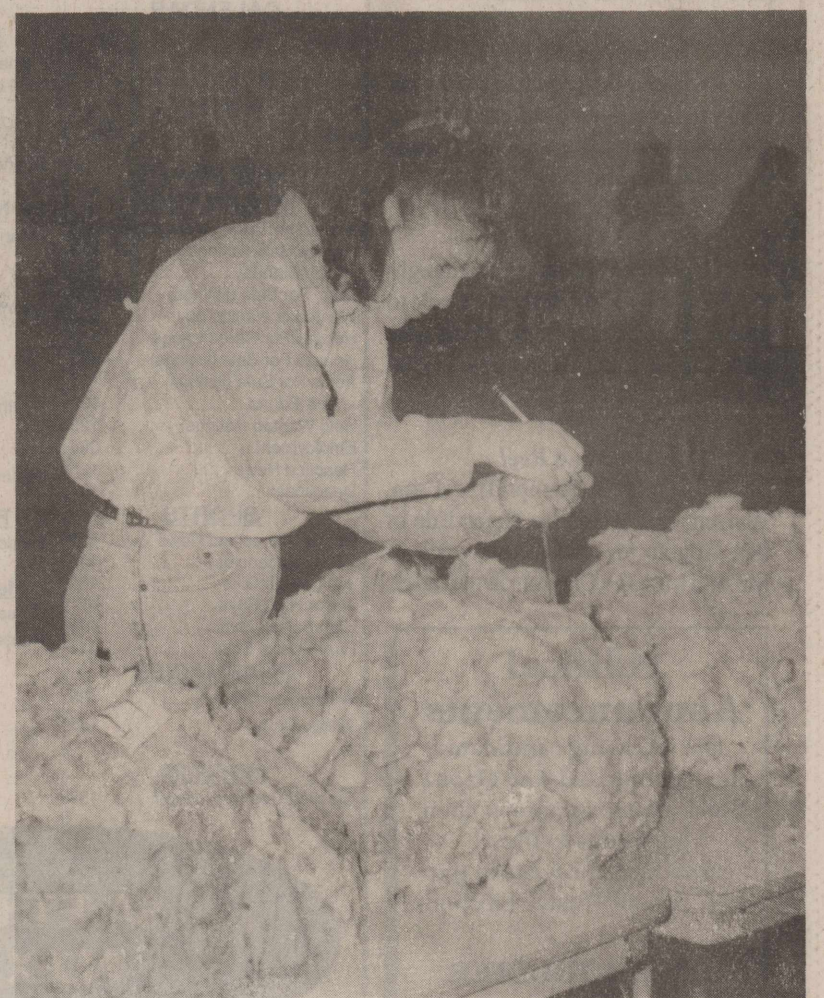

Ambulance Runs Double For 1st Quarter

The number of ambulance runs has doubled the first quarter of 1997 compared to the previous year, EMS coordinator Doug Meador said Thursday night. Meador was making his monthly report to members of the Crockett County Care Center and Health Services Board. The 109 runs included 55 transfers, a number of which were from home to clinic and back, he said.

"Fifty-two calls is usual on a 3-year average. Fifty-two calls in March is a record," Meador said. He reminded the board that the ambulance budget had been increased by 25% this year, but calls are up 50%.

Peggy McWilliams reported 883 visits to the health clinic during March. Of those, 609 were to the doctor, 150 to the physician's assistant, 94 for lab work and 30 to a nurse. Accounts receivables totaled \$58,133.

A medication aide program approved for Ozona by the state last week will see Mrs. McWilliams, R.N., and Gary Lake, registered pharmacist, teaching the course through Midland College. Classes will be held on the school campus.

Seven of the care center's nurses' aides will be sponsored for the program. Remaining slots will be offered to any other CNAs who wish to pay the course fee of \$305. If all slots are not taken, they will be offered to surrounding counties said Gerald Creel, director of nurses at the center.

Creel's goal of obtaining physical, occupational and speech therapy for center residents is near. He has a signed letter of intent from Columbia Medical Center of San Angelo for these services and a tentative contract for review. There are 20 residents in need of physical and occupational therapy now, Creel said.

Once the services are assured for the center, a physician's order will be necessary for each participant, evaluation will be conducted and a therapy plan made. Therapists will instruct aides in following the plans for residents receiving the service.

Creel said the service will be eligible for payment by Medicare Part B. Increased reimbursement will be received from the state for the added care to residents receiving physical therapy.

Purchase of updated computer software for the center was requested by Creel. The proposal he presented included \$4980 for software, \$1088 training cost, an annual fee of \$1032 and a charge of \$780 for a drug data base program at a total of \$7880 plus travel expenses for training. He reminded the board that they will receive a \$4000 reimbursement from the state toward the purchase of software or hardware.

A report by Ladyne Mahannah, revealed that a request for a Medicare hospital decline adjustment will add \$46,425 to the \$111,486 previously approved. The county will receive all but 25% of the \$46,425. The 25% will go to the CPA firm assisting with the recovery.

Mrs. Mahannah has collected \$13,532.13 in old hospital bills this quarter and the county attorney's office \$3,214.44 for a total of \$16,773.57. Remaining on the books is \$67,046.36.

The collections have been put into a trust by County Attorney Bill Mason.

A proposal by Crystal Hargraves, center administrator, to increase salaries for 48 employees was approved by the board. Most would receive 50 cents an hour more. The increase, which would total \$52,520, is necessary to bring many of the recipients to the minimum wage requirement of \$5.15 which begins in September. Presently, 27 employees are making what will be at or below minimum wage in September.

Also in her report, Ms. Hargraves provided the board with a chain of command for employee complaints, stated that a new patient lift had been ordered to replace one which was broken and said that five nurse aides took and passed the required state test for certification in San Antonio April 1.

As of last week, there were 44 residents in the care center.

Someone's In The Kitchen

Katharine Russell, one of Ozona's many great cooks, credits her mother with helping develop her ability in the kitchen.

"I learned a lot about cooking from my mother - watching her during the war - improvise on recipes when many ingredients were rationed," said Mrs. Russell.

"Growing up I helped with canning corn and beans and making jelly and preserves.

"My family grew up liking most anything I cooked, so I enjoyed cooking various dishes.

"After having heart surgery, I have had to change my way of cooking. I watch for the fat contents in food, the cholesterol, the sodium and fiber."

One of her hobbies is collecting recipe books, and she has quite a few from various places. "Two of my favorite cookbooks are the *Ozona Methodist Cookbook* and the *Diamonds in the Desert*."

Some of her favorite recipes are shared below.

Curried Chicken Salad

1 1/2 c. cooked rice
2 Tbsp. salad oil
1 Tbsp. vinegar
1 tsp. salt
3/4 tsp. curry powder
2 c. cubed chicken
1 c. chopped celery
1/4 c. green pepper
1 10-oz. pkg. frozen peas (cooked)
3/4 c. mayonnaise
Combine rice, salad oil, vinegar, salt and curry powder. Chill overnight. Combine chicken, celery, green pepper, peas and mayonnaise; combine with rice mixture and chill several hours. 8 servings.

ICE BOX OATMEAL COOKIES

A recipe from the late Roberta Cooper

Has no eggs and uses brown sugar.
3 c. dry oatmeal
1 c. brown sugar
1/4 c. hot water
1/2 tsp. salt
1 c. flour
1 tsp. soda
1 c. oleo melted
1 c. chopped pecans
Mix all ingredients and make into a roll as ice box cookies, chill, slice thin and bake at 325 about 10-12 minutes.

WHITE CAKE

My family's favorite for birthdays!

1 c. Crisco
2 c. sugar
3 c. flour
1 c. sweetmilk
2 tsp. baking powder
Pinch of salt
1 tsp. vanilla
5 eggwhites (small eggs)
Separate eggs, put whites in a cup and fill the cup with cold water. Sift flour with salt and baking powder. Mix Crisco with sugar, then alternate milk and flour mixture. Add vanilla, then add a little of egg whites and water a little at a time and beat a lot after each.

This cake can be made in layers or as a sheet cake. I make a filling - lemon or pineapple - and then frost with seven minute icing.

Understanding Bone And Bone Health

April Showers Bring May Flowers - which is certainly a nice option for Mother's Day. Another option is to ensure that your mother has good information to help her prevent and/or battle a crippling, deadly disease - osteoporosis.

During the 1997 EAT RIGHT AMERICA "All Foods Can Fit" campaign, we encourage you to contact a local dietitian, allied health professional or your local County Extension Agent in Family and Consumer Sciences who can provide you with some of the latest research-based information about this devastating disease.

First, knowing about Mom's bones and how to keep them healthy would be a start. Bone is not a hard and lifeless structure, but a complex, living tissue. Bones provide structural support for muscles, protect vital organs and store the calcium essential for bone density and strength.

Because bones are constantly changing, they can be affected by diet and exercise. Until the age of about 35, you build and store bone efficiently. Then, as part of the natural aging process, your bones begin to break down faster than new bone can be formed. In women, bone loss accelerates after menopause, when ovaries stop producing estrogen - the hormone that protects against bone loss.

Think of your bones as a savings account. There is only as much bone mass in your account as you deposit. The critical years for building bone mass are from just before adolescence to about age 30. Some experts believe that young women could increase their bone mass by as much as 20 percent - a critical factor in protecting against osteoporosis - through proper diet and exercise.

To determine if you have osteoporosis or may be at risk for the dis-

ease, see a physician who will ask a variety of questions about your lifestyle and medical history. Your doctor will want to know if anyone in your family has suffered from osteoporosis or if they have fractured bones. Based on a comprehensive medical assessment, your doctor may recommend that you have your bone mass measured.

A bone mass measurement is the only way to tell if you have osteoporosis. Specialized tests called bone density tests can measure bone density in various sites of the body. A bone density test can help detect possible fractures before they occur.

EMS Now Has Advance Life Support Certification

Crockett County Emergency Medical Service has upgraded from Basic Life Support (BLS) to BLS with ALS (Advance Life Support) capabilities, says Doug Meador, EMS coordinator.

With the addition of four new EMT-I (Emergency Medical Technician-Intermediate), Dee Keilers, Paula Westmoreland, Della Miller and Beverly Preddy, joining one other EMT-I, Fred Baker, and one EMT-P, Meador, Crockett County EMS is now capable to perform advance life support if needed.

These procedures include fluid replacement through I.V.s and advance airway management.

To meet BLS with ALS capabilities requirements, a service must have a medical director, protocols signed by the medical director, and ALS equipment, explained Meador. Marcus Sims, D.O., serves as Crockett County EMS medical director.

An inspection on April 4 by a Texas Department of Health representative completed the certification upgrade. CCEMS has two units capable of advance life support and one basic life support.

Several CCEMS personnel will attend an EMT-I course in Sonora beginning May 6, Meador said.

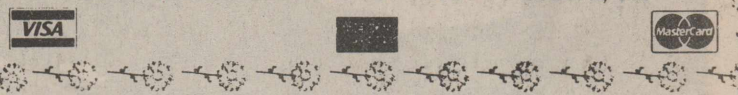

Museum Notes
From Mary

"Archeology is the systematic recovery and scientific study of material evidence of human life and culture in past ages," according to my dictionary. We have already learned a lot about the people who lived around here in the early years from the pictographs on cave walls, and the myriad of spear points and arrowheads we've found. Those whose vocation is archeology are a step ahead of the rest of us in identifying these things. The pictographs are sometimes strange looking, but a trained eye can usually determine what the image depicts and offer a theory as to why it was painted there.

The consensus is that pictographs were painted on cave walls to teach the tribal members important stories, like going to school in those days. These people had no written language so no words are found, just drawings. The paint was unique because it was made by grinding or crushing rock into powder and then adding animal fat. The rock is mineral and doesn't fade in the sun. Since the age of rock cannot be pinpointed, the animal fat in this paint is the key here. It can be carbon 14 dated. Some of the drawings along the Pecos River are believed to have been painted during the Early Archaic Age, 6500BC to 2500BC. Most of these artistic efforts still endure, although some have diminished in that length of time. Rock painting is really a more reliable system than drawing on paper, which deteriorates a lot faster, but we don't do much art in this manner any more.

In the museum are several pictures of pictographs, and some recreated, painted ones in a special display. There are also projectile points, tools, pieces of baskets, clothing, primitive food preparation articles and an atlatl, which was made by a man in Austin, who patterned it after one that was found in a cave around here. Several local talented individuals gave many volunteer hours toward assisting the representatives from the Texas Historical Commission as they assembled the displays in the award-winning Indian room, and I often wish they could hear the accolades nearly every day from visitors who represent every corner of the world. There is so much interest shown in this room for the artful arrangement of artifacts, it's no wonder the Texas Historical Commission in 1986 presented the museum with the prestigious Museum Service Award for Indians of Crockett County Exhibit.

April is Texas Archeology Awareness Month, and the museum, in conjunction with the Crockett County Historical Commission, is observing this special time with a public gathering at the Crockett Room on April 28, 7 p.m. We will have a demonstration on flint-knapping (that's arrowhead making) by Ozona's own Indian historian, Rick Bachman, followed by a video about the rock art along the Pecos River. In it, noted archaeologists and historians reflect on the beauty and mystery surrounding the legacy of this ancient art.

There is no charge for this presentation, and the public is most cordially

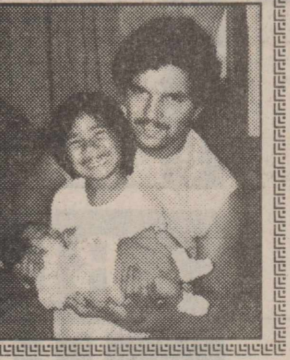

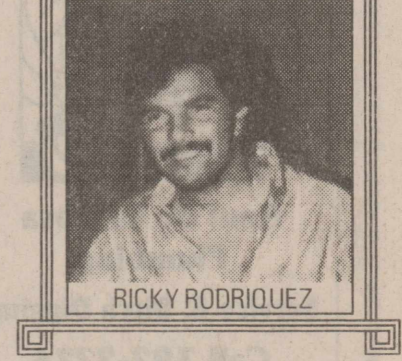

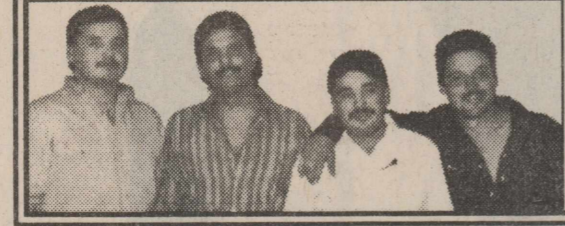
The Friends have raised over \$110,000 locally and over \$70,000 in grants and corporate donations and are now working on the last \$50,000 needed to begin construction.

caused him to double in size in a very short time. An infection sent him to isolation for two weeks, and it was just when he was recovering from this that word was received of a donor.

The Adams were told that success with insulin dependent patients was "pretty slim".

"They told me if he made it off the table he might live six months," Terry recalls.

"We had a whole town behind us, and that was the most wonderful feeling," said Terry.

Today, thanks to the donated heart of a 37-year-old man, Jack Adams is able to lead a full life. As he goes about his work with Reef Chemical, Jack is looked upon as walking evidence of the miraculous success of organ transplants.

The Adams are naturally strong supporters of the donor program, and Terry is always glad to talk about The Living Bank in Houston and how donations can be made.

Most states encourage drivers to sign their licenses indicating their wish to become an organ donor. The Living Bank also encourages registering these wishes and carrying a donor card in addition to the driver's license.

One of the most important elements in becoming an organ donor is discussing wishes with family, especially next-of-kin so that if the time ever comes for a decision, they will know and remember what you wanted.

In 1985, legislation was passed which required all hospitals to develop protocol to ask the next of kin for permission to procure the organs of a patient if their death was impending. This is in addition to the donor card and driver's license. This is why it is so important that you discuss donation with your family when you register with The Living Bank. It is not required that you sign your card in their presence, but it is a good idea so they know your wishes.

There is no fee to register with The Living Bank and no dues to pay. A person under age 18 can be registered with the permission of their parent or legal guardian.

Right now, there is a national waiting list for donors of 34,956 kidneys, 7,837 livers, 3,753 hearts, 2,298 lungs, 1,480 kidney/pancreas, 333 pancreas, 232 heart/lungs, and 88 intestines for a total of 50,977. Registration by age is 653 for 0-5, 370 for 6-10, 795 for 11-17, 28,145 for 18-49, 17,631 for 50-64 and 3,383 for age 65 and up.

United Blood Services of San Angelo will conduct the drive. As the blood provider for approximately 20 hospitals across West Texas, UBS San Angelo must collect nearly 400 units every month to supply patients in need.

Some of the units collected at this drive will be considered replacement units for Etoile Bennett, mother of Ozona resident Lisa Branch. Mrs. Bennett has recently received blood at Midland Memorial Hospital.

Blood donors are asked to bring identification, such as a UBS donor card or driver's license. Donors are also asked to know the name of any medication they are taking.

Information about organ and tissue donation will also be available at the blood drive.

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Easy Moving. If you move to a new location where an electric meter is already installed, we will turn the power on by the end of the next day after you submit your service request.

Early Notification. From time to time, we must interrupt your electric service to make planned/scheduled repairs or improvements. When such a need arises, you can count on us to notify you two working days in advance.

Lights On. If your WTU maintained security light should burn out, we will relamp the fixture within three working days of hearing from you.

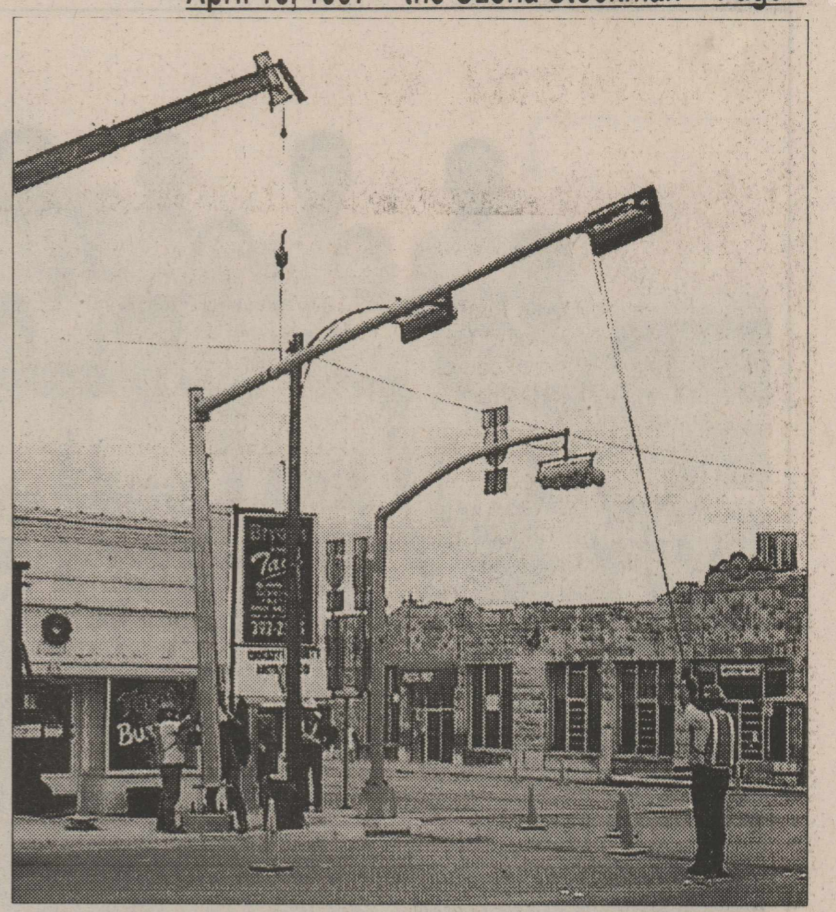

New Stop Lights Part Of Area Upgrade

Installation of four new mast arm traffic signals in downtown Ozona was completed last week by Roy Willis Electric Co., Inc. of Abilene. Drivers negotiated the intersection of Hwy. 163 and Loop 466, old Hwy. 290 to most, through several days of destruction and construction necessary to the project.

"It was a tough place to fit, working around water lines, sewer lines and gas lines," said Paul Chevalier, resident engineer with the Texas Department of Transportation in Sonora. "We appreciate everybody's patience with us."

Ozona is actually the last town to be converted to the mast arm type signal on a state contract which included Bronte, Winters, Sterling City, Carlsbad and Sonora. Ozona was last, and more expensive to change, because of the difficulty in making the

replacements here.

The town didn't have span wire type signals, and the poles were in a bad location. With the mast arms, the light heads will hang out over the intersection more and 12 inch lenses replace the old 8 inch models.

Total contract amount for the six towns was \$276,000, Chevalier said. Cost to upgrade the Ozona signals was \$23,000.

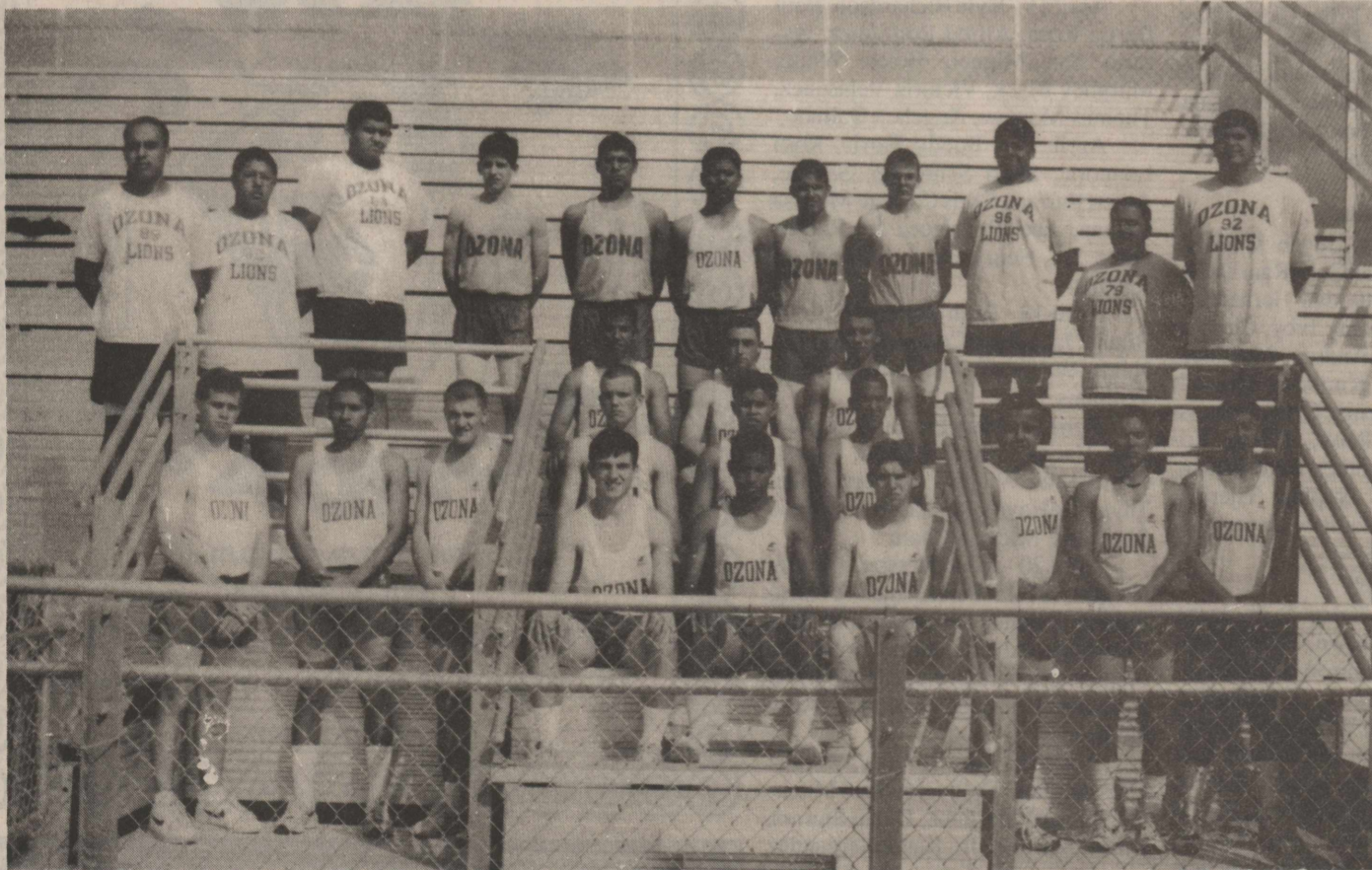

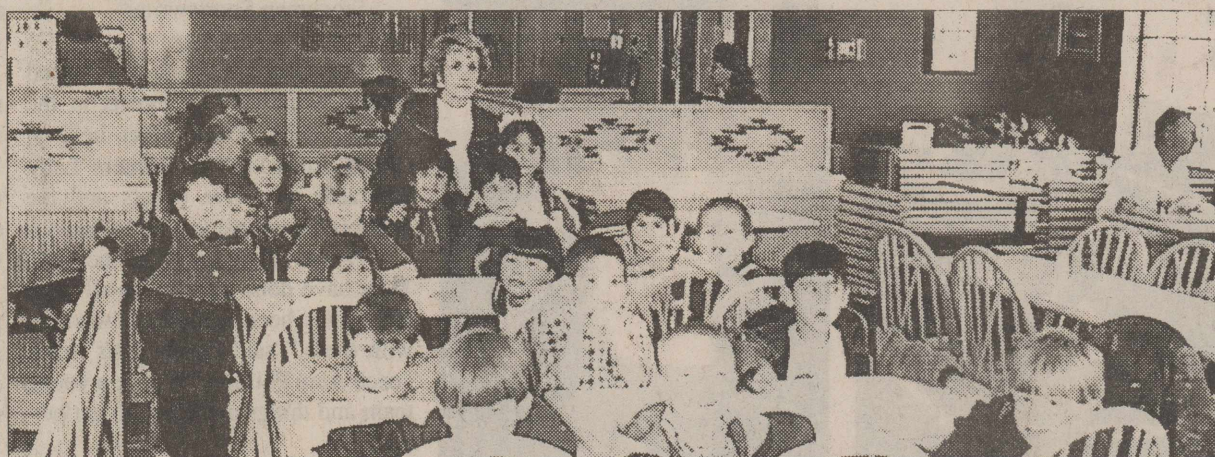
Wall came back in the bottom of the third inning to score one run on one hit and one error. They inched the score up to 6-2.

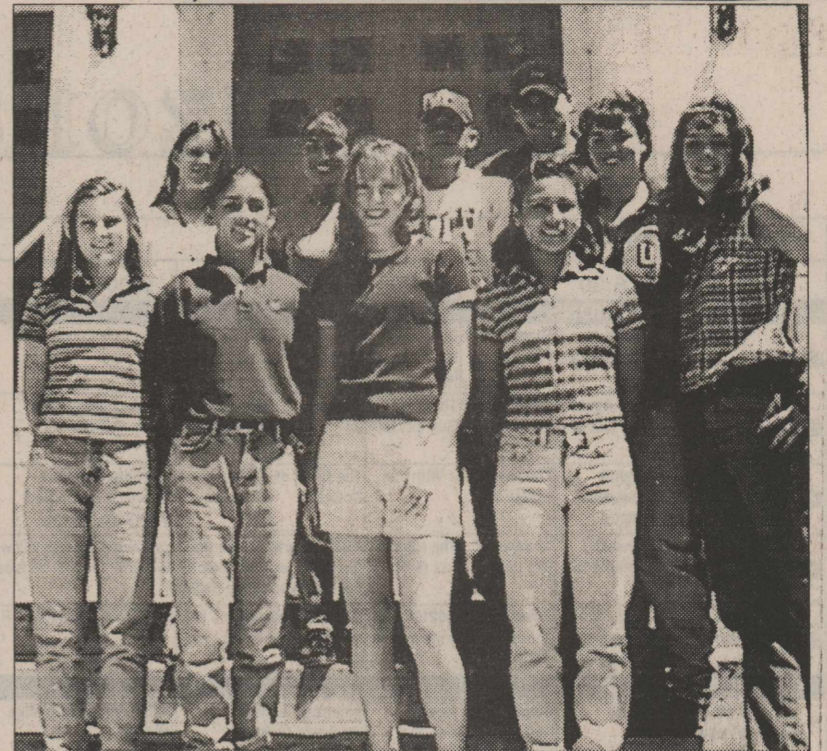

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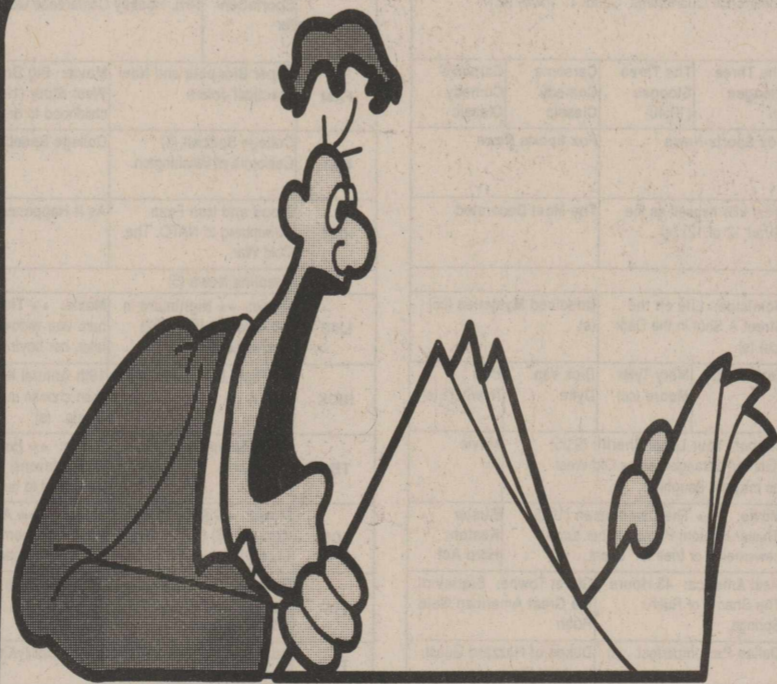

Lamb Producers May Participate In Second Pasture To Packer Program

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is gearing up for its second Pasture to Packer lamb feeding program beginning July 9-11.

The program gives producers a taste of retained ownership while providing them with their animals' feedlot performance and carcass data.

It's been three years since the last Pasture to Packer program. The first one was very successful with more than 1200 animals being fed and 62 producers represented. Unfortunately, we had to curtail and program with the closing of Monfort's San Angelo facility. Now with the anticipated opening of the new Ranchers' Lamb plant this summer, we're again implementing the Pasture to Packer Program.

All producers should know how their sheep fit the needs of the entire lamb production system. Pasture to Packer is designed to give the ranchers information on how their lambs perform in the feedlot and on the packing house rail.

It's not a contest between breeds or breeders. Many producers will find they are raising the right lambs for their particular environment. Others may want to use the information to change their flocks' genetics to improve post-weaning performance and carcass acceptability. The program is specifically designed to help them make such decisions.

The feedlot performance information collected will include: on-test weight, final weight, average daily gain, feed efficiency, total cost of

gain, break-even price and net return. The carcass information to be collected will include: carcass weight, dressing percent, quality and yield grade, fat thickness and loin eye area.

Consignor's may enter a minimum of 10 and a maximum of 20 animals. Only wether and ewe lambs will be fed. Coordinators recommend that lambs be selected from known sire groups. County Extension Agents are familiar with the program and will assist in making selections if asked.

Entries must be nominated by June 1. A \$2 per head non-refundable entry must accompany each nomination. All lambs should weigh at least 50 pounds.

Consignors must deliver their entries to the Denis Feedlot located approximately two miles south of Vancourt on the Fort McKavett Road between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. on July 9-11. It is recommended that the lambs be weaned and vaccinated against enterotoxemia at least 30 days prior to arrival to minimize health problems.

Lambs will be ear tagged and individually weighed on arrival. They will then be processed according to the feedlot's routine procedures. Each lamb will be assigned a per hundred-weight (CWT) value based on market conditions at time of arrival. The value will be used to calculate theoretical breakevens and profitability of the feeding venture.

Lambs will begin the feeding period on a starter ration that will be switched to a finishing ration through a series of ration changes. Lambs will

be shorn three to four weeks after arrival.

Feed consumption will be figured at the end of the program. Feed costs will be the same as that charged to other customers of the feedlot and will be priced according to current ingredient prices.

Specific charges levied on consignors will include: processing fee, additional medicine costs, shearing, feed, freight and predator checkoff.

Lambs will be weighed individually at the end of the test. A four percent pencil shrink will be added to the final weight to determine live scale weight for calculating feedlot performance. All entries will be slaughtered at Ranchers Lamb of Texas when each group reaches the appropriate endpoint. This decision will be made by the feedlot manager and Texas A&M Pasture to Packer management.

Lambs will be sold on a carcass basis. Premiums and discounts for quality grades, yield grades and carcass weights will be set before slaughter. All proceeds will be mailed directly to the consignors after expenses are deducted.

The Pasture to Packer program is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas A&M University Animal Science Department. Cooperators include lamb feeders, Ranchers Lamb of Texas and Denis Feedlot.

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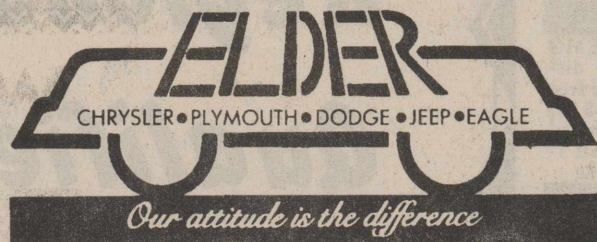


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
